SITUATION IN MEXICO INTERESTING

In the excitement of the struggle between the opposing forces for possession of the town of Agua Prieta the maneuvering for position makes it almost impossible to avoid firing across the line at times. BUILD GOOD ROADS

The citizens of a town depending largely upon the surrounding country for support, cannot sit down effortless and expect their country friends to come to them and remain with them just because they are neighbors, or are in the same country. If they want their country friends to work with them and trade with them they must show that they have the interest and welfare of the country at heart, and demonstrate to their country friends that it is to their interest to trade with their town. And in line with cultivating the good will of their farmer friends the citizens must make the town of easy access by good roads for it takes a whole lot of good will to pull through bad roads to spend your money. As a consequence the nearest town or the easiest one to reach is the one that gets the trade.

Every farmer should send to the state engineer of his state and to the office of Public Roads at Washington and have his name put upon the mailing list, so that the bulletins and circulars, of which scores are published every year, upon road building and maintenance, road drainage and suggestions that grow out of the experience of road building can be followed up and adopted by them. If this were done it would stop an enormous amount of money that every year is wasted upon the highways by ill aimed and misdirected effort. Thus says one of the government bulletins on road building and money saving by wise expenditure in right methods of building roads. And there is truth in the statement. When the farmers take up the work of building roads— as they are bound to do as the country advances—they should know how to build the best, most durable and money saving roads that are known and these bulletins will help. The farmer should be so well informed that he will not put up with shoddy methods that are money sinkers and roads that are simply poor excuses for thoroughfares for the public to travel. Men who have made road building a study, should know more on the subject than amateurs.

Hedley Wants You

HEDLEY, TEXAS, is located on the Fort Worth & Denver City railroad, in Donley county, 264 miles northwest of Fort Worth and 72 miles southeast of Amarillo, Texas. Hedley is only three years old and already has a population of nearly five hundred and is growing all the time. Hedley is nicely located as to drainage, being almost a level country, but with just enough fall to drain well. The sanitary question is one of our first considerations.

THE COUNTRY surrounding Hedley is without question one of the most productive farming sections in the State. There has never been anything near a failure in crops here; last year when other parts of the country had almost total crop failures, this section had fine cotton and feed crops. This not being a feed farming country alone makes it more sure of producing some money crop each year.

HEDLEY is composed of live, energetic and enterprising people who are wide-awake to any thing that will help the town. We have a two-story brick school building of which a town of three thousand inhabitants might be proud; constructed last summer at a cost of \$8,000; has its own system of water-works and being entirely sanitary. The Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian churches are all well represented here. The town is strictly prohibition, having no saloons and wanting none. F. D. mail line, 1 livery barn, 1 wagon yard, 3 dray lines, 1 cold storage, 1 hotel and another under construction, 1 restaurant, 2 millinery establishments, 1 broom factory, a public waterworks, 2 or more real estate offices, 1 fire insurance office 1 furniture store, 1 undertaking establishment, 2 lodge halls, 2 good physicians, 1 good gin, a pavilion capable of seating 500 people, and a nice park being improved, a depot large enough for a much larger town—the shipping facilities are the very best, having several thousand feet of side-track on level ground.

Involuntary Resting

Even those actions which are most continuous, for example, respiration and pulsation of the heart, have distinct periods of rest. After each beat of the heart there is an interval during which the organ is at rest. This amount to one-fourth of the time requisite to make one pulsation and begin another. During an aggregate of six hours out of twenty-four, the heart is not working, and is in a state of repose; it takes short periods of of rest like a sailor, but it has its due allowance for sleep, for all that. This is equally true of breathing. If we divide the respiration, one in expiration, and

the other by a period of quiescence. During eight hours of the twenty-four, the chest and lungs are inactive. So with the other organs of the body; each has its time for work and its time for rest.

Our muscles, none of them—even the most untiring waking movements—are kept in continual action, though we may be "on the go" all day; for all that, we are not moving every part of the body at the same moment, or we should soon be so exhausted that our muscles would refuse to perform their office. The brain never rests except in sleep; one is always thinking, the brain is always active, and there is no such thing as rest so long as any one is awake. No one ever yet succeeded in thinking of nothing at all. During sleep is the only time the brain ever takes time to recuperate from the ravages of the waking period.—Medical Adviser.
