Tax Payers Can Obtain Discounts By Paying Early

Lamesa School District tax payers will have opportunity to obtain the discounts for early payments of 1945 taxes, according to a resolution passed by the school trustees on Tuesday night. The discount allowed is 3 per cent if paid in October, 2 per cent if paid in November, and 1 per cent if paid in December. Taxes become delinquent if not paid by February 1, 1946.

Tax Officer Leslie Pratt reported that the tax evaluation for the year amounts to \$5,076,490.00. The tax levy rate which was set by the trustees is \$1.00 which includes 71 cents for maintenance and operations of schools and 29 cents for providing interest and sinking funds for outstanding bonds.

He is a former student of the Spangenberg High School, and at one time was employed by Sam Richardson in this city.

First Home Loan Granted In City Under G. I. Bill

R. L. Price, Dawson County Service Officer, reports that the first loan in the county for a home purchase under the G. I. Bill of Rights has been granted.

He states that the loan was made to William C. Bush, veteran of World War II, and that through this loan the government guarantees half of the payment for the home.

Service Officer Price states that the loan was granted through the veterans administration at the regional office which is located in Waco.

He further reports that to be eligible for loans, a World War II veteran must have served for a period of 90 days in the military service. He may still receive a loan, according to the G. I. Bill of Rights even if he has not served for a period of ninety days, if a disability was incurred in line of duty. In order to receive a loan the veteran must have received an honorable discharge.

Flower Grove School Will Open Monday, Sept. 10

Elmer Miller, superintendent of the Flower Grove School, reports that the institution will open Monday, September 10. A feature of the opening exercises will be an address to the student body by Rev. Steele, pastor of Ackerly Baptist Church.

Superintendent Miller states that the bus routes for the coming year will be the same as they were last term.

The following teachers have been employed at the Flower Grove School: Elmer Miller, superintendent; Slater Johnson, high school principal; and Mrs. C. Miller, elementary principal.

Mrs. Jewel Fleming will instruct mathematics, with Mrs. Miller teaching English.

Mrs. Ramsey will teach the fourth and fifth grades and Mrs. Beckmeyer has been assigned the second and third grades. Mrs. C. Teasdale will teach the first grades.

It is reported that a teacher for the sixth and seventh grades has not yet been employed.

Levelland Club To Play Tornadoes Here On Sept. 14

Levelland High School has been scheduled for the football game in Lamesa with the Golden Tornadoes on September 14, to fill the gap occasioned by former Tahoka authorities scheduling the Bulldogs with Big Spring for their first game and not informing Coach H. J. Sanders of the change.

The Levelland High School team were district champions last season and are slated to make a better showing this season.

Two Local Men Go To Presbytery

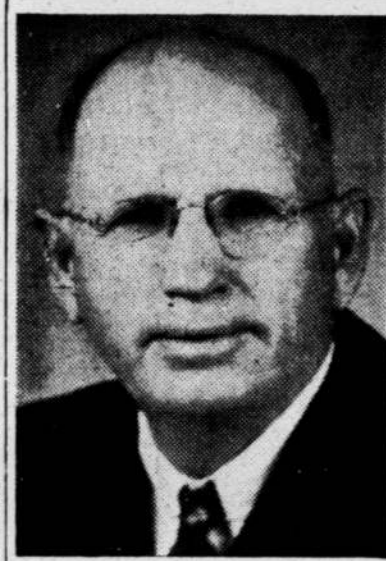

Save Paper For Next City Wide Collection Day

Seventeen hundred sixty-eight pupils were accounted for in the three Lamesa public schools last Monday, September 3, according to an announcement received this week from Superintendent V. Z. Rogers.

The local elementary school had received 1248 at that time and, according to Principal G. M. Roberts, the enrollment has increased since until it has already reached 1257. This brings the grand total enrollment of the local schools up to 1823.

The elementary school enrollment is the greatest that the institution has had since it has been in existence. Principal Roberts reports that the rooms of that institution are overcrowded, and that there is no extra space for expansion. He states that there are a number of pupils in the city who have not yet enrolled and that the problem of getting places for them has arisen.

It is stated that some auditorium space will be used for class occupancy until additional classroom space is provided.

Enrollment in the Lamesa High School was reported to have included 439 pupils. Superintendent Rogers states that the school has been operating smoothly since its opening on September 3, under the management of the regular faculty and five teachers aiding on substitute basis.

At one school for negro children in this city 81 pupils had enrolled by the end of Monday.

Women Invited To Have Part In Canning Project

According to Mrs. Myrtle Negy, county home demonstration agent, the Bureau of Human Nutrition is sponsoring a research project on home canning. Foods that have been canned in Texas homes and have spoiled will be examined in research laboratories at A. and M. College and the University of Texas.

Any woman in Dawson County who has jars or cans of spoiled foods on hand may bring them to the home demonstration agent's office. They will be properly labeled and mailed to a laboratory. The woman who furnishes the food will be given an equal amount of commercially canned food of similar type and a report showing what caused the food to spoil.

Mrs. Negy states, "This study should improve the quality of foods preserved in Texas homes. It may also result in some new canning methods which are not only more simple, but more fool proof."

Mrs. Negy invites you to come to her office if you have spoiled foods and she will discuss the matter with you.

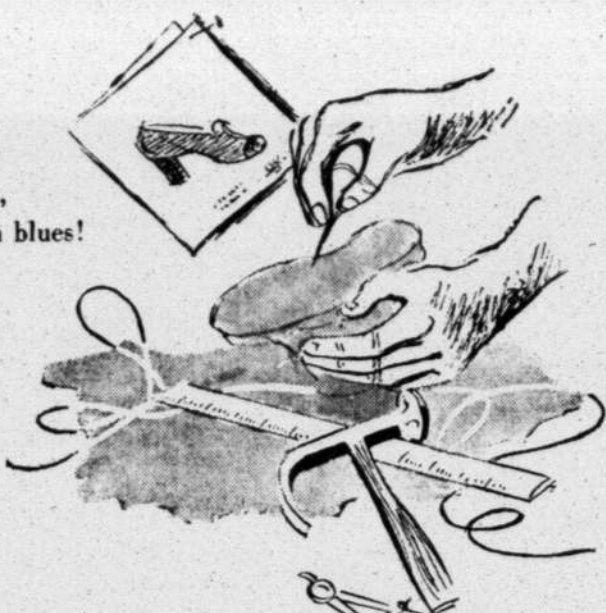

Sgt. Franklin Dennis of San Antonio spent the week end here visiting with his wife.

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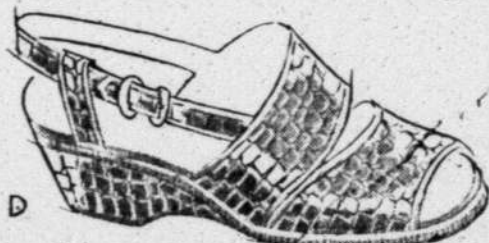
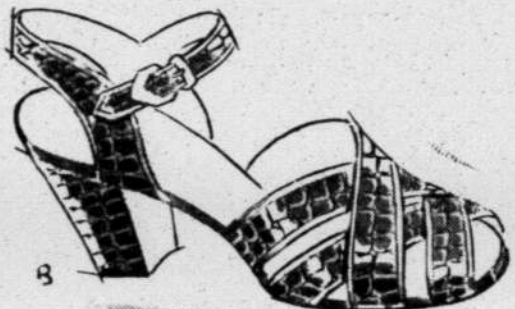

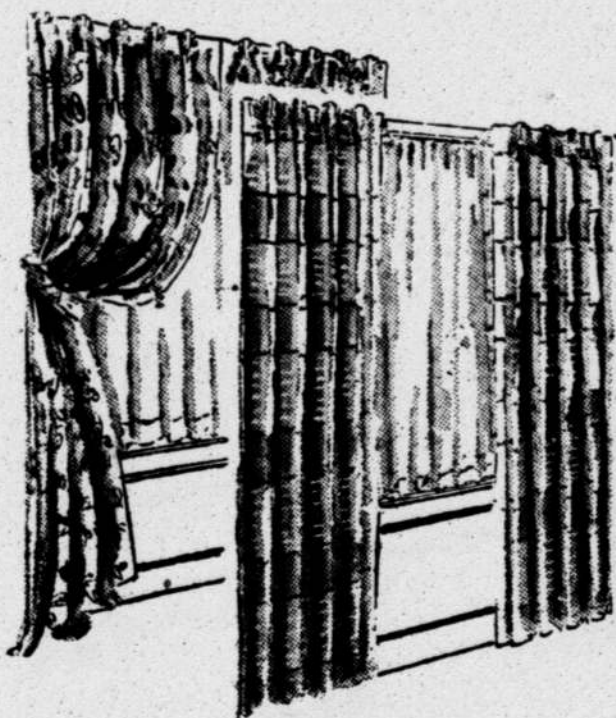

Walking Stick Provides Violin For Radio Star

AP Newsfeatures

NEW YORK — Chances are you won't be hearing it on the Hour of Charm radio program, but Evelyn, Phil Spitalny's violin soloist, has a new fiddle.

It is made from a pot-bellied mahogany walking stick — a novelty popular with German and Hungarian musicians — carpenters 150 years ago. Collectors say the instruments are rare today.

The cane becomes a violin when a center panel is removed, revealing the strings. The handle un-

screws to open a hollow shaft where a bow is kept. When it is replaced the curved handle fits under the chin.

Evelyn says the violin can play about everything a score would call for, from pizzicato to harmonics.

The fiddle was sent to her by Fred Wright of Ajo, Ariz., a weather-beaten Irish prospector 77 years old. Wright says his brother, now dead, brought it to this country from Africa in 1901.

He sent it to Evelyn, he says, because she's his favorite violinist.

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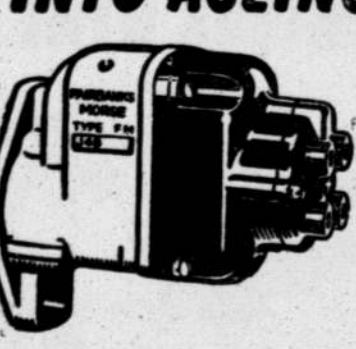

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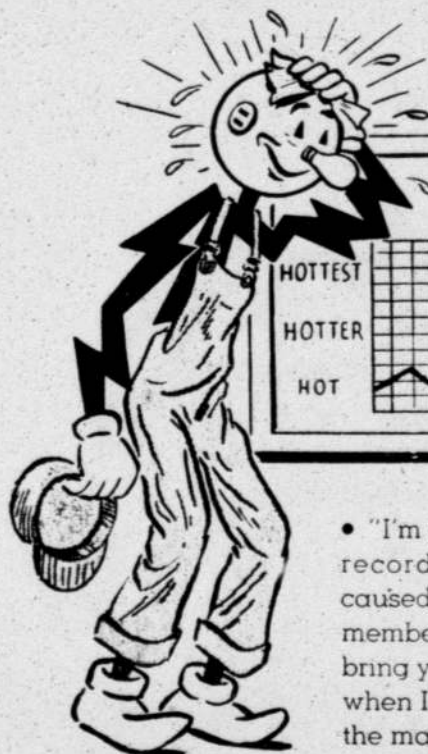

Lt. T. Billstrom Cited Recently For His Services

First Lieutenant Ted J. Billstrom, who has been a member of the service for the past 5-12 years, and who has served on two separate tours of foreign duty, recently joined the 14th Armored Division, which was scheduled to leave Europe for the United States in September. Lt. Billstrom is the husband of the former Miss Faye Hyatt who makes her home in this city at 608 North Katherine Street, and who is employed at the local selective service office.

Lt. Billstrom is a member of the armored infantry and until recently was attached to the 11th Armored Tank Division. For the past 12 months he has been stationed in the European Theatre, during which time he has been in England, France, Belgium and Austria.

He wears the Purple Heart for wounds sustained January 1, 1944, the Silver Star, and other medals. Mrs. Billstrom recently received the following citation which was earned by her husband.

"First Lieutenant Ted J. Billstrom, 11th Armored Infantry Battalion, 11th Armored Division, United States Army, for gallantry in action in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 January, 1945, near Chongne, Belgium, Lieutenant Billstrom voluntarily crossed a bare ridge line and three hundred yards of open terrain three successive times to personally reconnoiter and lead his platoon to firing positions, thereby exposing himself to withering artillery and small arms fire with utter disregard for his personal safety. While directing successful fire against enemy gun positions, in direct support of a rifle company, Lieutenant Billstrom was wounded in the back by shrapnel, but refusing to be evacuated, continued to lead his platoon until the objective was taken. His gallant courage and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army. Lieutenant Billstrom entered the military service from California. The citation was signed by H. E. Dager, Maj. Gen. U. S. A.

Prior to going to the European Theatre, Lt. Billstrom served on Hawaii and other points in that area for a period of 13 months. He returned to the States in 1943 and again left for foreign duty in September of 1944.

Jap Women Now More Active In Business Life

Japanese now in the United States say the Japanese woman's war activities on farm, factory and fighting line have done much to free her from her old position, which was virtually that of man's slave.

They expect to see her much more active in careers and politics in the coming postwar world and even to win the right to vote in the next 25 years. Those who express that opinion are chiefly identified with educational fields. None of them want to be quoted. They are in the United States as enemy aliens and under injunction not to talk.

But what they say sums up to this:

"The position of Japanese women already had begun to change before the war. During the war they produced most of the country's food and much of its weapons and even fought in battle. After the war a certain number of them can be expected to exert themselves in education, literature, art, birth control, the Labor Movement and the woman's suffrage movement."

Before the war Japanese women were considered generally to be the unhappiest, most restricted women in the modern world. Their whole lives were bent on serving and pleasing men.

Their marriages generally were or rested insofar as practicable Gibson said.

arranged by family or marriage broker and many of them saw their husbands only once or twice before marriage. Once married, a Japanese wife had to wait on her husband when he dressed, scrub him in the bath, bow low before him when he left and entered the house, walk behind him, carry his packages and be waiting with a sweet smile to welcome him when he returned from a party with the geisha girls.

A husband could divorce his wife on very slight pretext, which meant disgrace and social eclipse for her.

Women were expected to spend their time in household tasks, flower arrangement, tea ritual, visits to family and shrine. They were discouraged from going to movies and theaters and acquiring much education.

But gradually the picture began to change, partly as a result of Japan's activity in the outside world after World War I.

Japan now has a number of women doctors, lawyers, teachers and dentists. Japanese women also have worked in agriculture, fishing, mining, traffic and industry. Figures of the 1930 census reveal that out of 32,059,850 women in the country, 10,589,403 were breadwinners and 354,792 of these were employers.

Women of the upper classes began to be active in social problems.

Within the last few years Japanese women formed philanthropic, social and suffrage associations and during a recent parliamentary election women speakers were in greater demand than men.

Hot Sweet Bread Makes Tempting Summer Meal

Put the spotlight on sweet bread this summer and your family will forget about cake and other rich dessert. With cold cuts, a generous raw vegetable salad and fresh fruit, hot sweet bread makes a tempting light meal for late summer days.

Miss Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, points out that quick breads, such as muffins and biscuits, are made to order for summer baking. You can stir them up in a hurry. "In fact," says Miss Lawrence, "you can save time by mixing the dry ingredients of biscuit dough in quantity ahead of time. Then all you need to do when you get ready to make hot bread is to add the fat and milk. They can be baked quickly."

Miss Lawrence says that there are countless variations on the quick bread theme. Dress up muffins by adding chopped nuts or dried fruits. Or treat the children to a surprise by baking a spoonful of jelly in the center of each muffin.

One way to vary the basic baking powder biscuit is to substitute a flavorful juice for all or part of the liquid called for in the recipe. For example, tomato juice biscuits are delicious. Or you may use orange juice. Or you may get another fruit flavor by using sweetened apple sauce that's been flavored with cinnamon for part of the liquid in baking powder biscuits. Try this and see if your family doesn't call for a return engagement.

Stomach Worms Cause Loss To Dairy Business

Dairy calves are particularly susceptible to stomach worm infestation and dairymen with calves on infested pastures may incur substantial losses if control measures are not administered, according to G. G. Gibson, Dairy Specialist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Gibson believes that it will pay dairymen to treat stock regularly under the advice of a veterinarian if their calves suffer from parasites infestations. Not only should the visibly affected animals be treated, but others, as well if pasture infestation is to be kept at a minimum, he said.

Phenothiazine can be used to good advantage in dairy cattle, but should not be given lactating animals since it causes the milk to be discolored for several days following its use.

While it is reasonable to suspect poor, unthrifty calves and yearlings of worm infestation, poor feed or other conditions may be responsible. Therefore, it is advisable to obtain a diagnosis by a competent veterinarian to determine the actual cause of the condition, the advisability of treatment, and dosage.

Calves succumb to these parasites more readily than adult stock, especially at weaning time, in the fall and spring, Gibson said. Grass in infested areas carries the immature form of the parasite which the animal swallows as it grazes.

Since moisture favors the development of stomach worms, well drained pastures are preferable. Pastures which are impossible to drain should be used for mature cattle only. Pastures should not be overstocked, and should be rotated.

Postwar Homes See The Light

Thousands of war-working women, accustomed to well-illuminated plant interiors, are going to see the light when they settle down to being homebodies again. They're going to flick on their electric light switches, and realize something is missing.

That something will be fluorescent light, says designer Lurelle Guild, who predicts a bright future for America's homes with the slender "pencil lights." The things he promises they will accomplish would make Aladdin and his lamp look like amateurs.

There'll be light tubes eight feet long and less than an inch wide to throw an even, shadowless, good-to-the-eyes light. There'll be daylight 24 hours a day, because the light tubes are made in tones to match nature's own light. And the fixtures—always the obstacle that kept fluorescent lighting out of decoration motifs—will be as good looking as anything you've seen, and will match a variety of decors. There'll be standing table lamps, with the tube running in a circle; overhead circular pieces and even square-cornered lights, in a variety of shades including white, soft white, daylight, green, blue, pink, gold and red.

As if that weren't enough Guild says the light is flattering, because it casts no deep shadows; and cool, because it throws no heat, despite the fact that the fluorescent lamp produces two or three times the light for the same power as regular bulbs.

Some decorators already have planned sample rooms using both fluorescent and incandescent illumination but you can't transfer the bulbs around as you would substitute a 50 watt for a 40 watt bulb. The tube-lights have a two-pronged base which needs its own socket. However, they require no special wiring, and can be used on regular house lighting current.

A.C. is best, but D.C. can be used along with an auxiliary compensating device. Once you have the fluorescent fixtures set, it is not possible to increase the amount of lighting by switching to a tube with higher wattage. The watt of a fluorescent light depends on the length and width, so it's necessary to decide what light you need before installing the fixture.

The time isn't far off, Guild believes, when whole houses will be equipped with built-in fluorescent fixtures, to give the same maximum light orientation an architect figures out when he decides which room should have sunny southern exposure.

Hunting Laws To Observe Here Given By Warden

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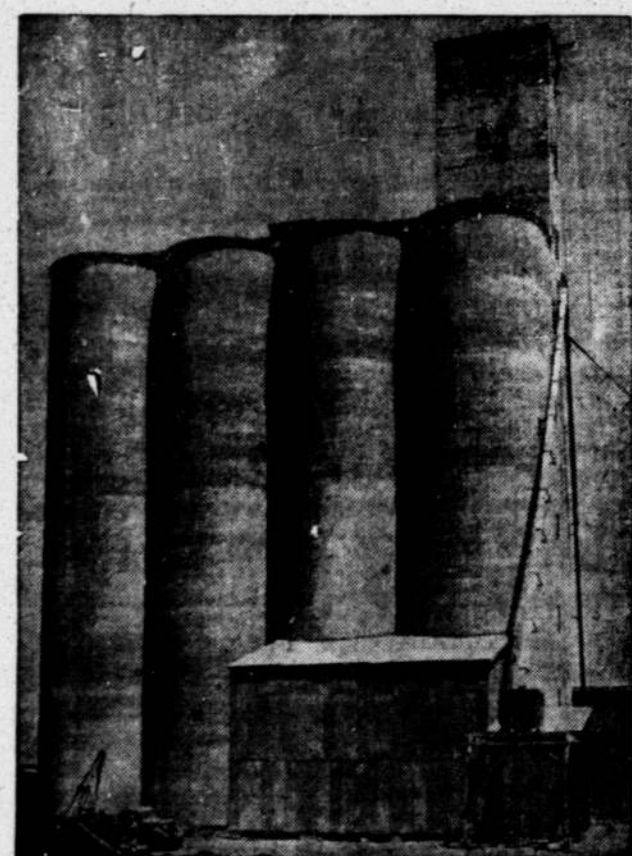

Capt. Cox Served With Powerful 459th Squadron

An article entitled "The Lightning Strike" appeared in the May 12 publication of the Phoenix, an allied magazine for all allied forces in the Southeast Asia Command.

The article described the activities and advance of the 459th Fighter Squadron of which Captain Perry Cox, Lamesa, was a member, while he was overseas. A picture of Captain Cox, flight leader of the squadron, appeared. Capt. Cox, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Audrey Cox of this city, is currently stationed in San Antonio, having reported there after his furlough home.

The article in the Phoenix stated that the saga of the P-38 Fighter Squadron, the 459th, is a story of the evolution of air war in Burma during the past year—a tale of transition from defense to offense and of the change in the day to day missions of the swift fighters.

Operating somewhere in Burma, the 459th was, a year ago, in the forefront of the air defense against the Jap Zeros and Bettys. Day after day they rose to intercept the common foe, sharing the task with a group of British-flown Spitfires and Beaufighters. The Twin Dragons have destroyed more than 12 Japs for each loss they have sustained in combat. As of May 12, the 459th had destroyed nearly 150 Jap planes in the air, accounted for about 25 probables, and damaged some 75 of the ground. Recently the squadron participated in four sweeps against key airfields in the Rangoon area, in company with other RAF and ISAAF units, the mission involving a round trip of some 80 miles; and even more recently they made a 1,500 mile round trip to Bangkok, a mission generally reserved for the heavy bombers. It was then that the operation needs and methods changed. The

Christmas Parcels To Be Mailed Overseas Between Sept. 15 and October 15; Regulations Given

Arrangements have been made by the Post Office Department in cooperation with the War and Navy Department (the latter including the Marines and Coast Guard) for acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of the armed forces serving outside the United States.

Owen Taylor, local postmaster, brings the following requirements to the attention of mailers in order that such parcels may reach the addressees on time and in good condition.

Christmas parcels for Army personnel overseas must be mailed during the period beginning September 15, 1945 and ending October 15, 1945, the earlier the better. Parcels destined for delivery in China, Burma, India, the Middle East, and the islands in the Pacific should be mailed as early as possible during the period stated, preferably not later than October 1.

During this period requests from the addressees are not required in connection with Christmas parcels mailed to Army personnel. Patrons should endorse each gift parcel "Christmas Parcel."

Since Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps personnel may receive parcels without a request at any time of the year, it is not the policy of the Navy Department to encourage the mailing of parcels during any particular period of time each year. The Navy Department suggests, however, that parcels intended as Christmas gifts be mailed not later than Oct. 15, to afford some degree of probability of delivery prior to Christmas day, depending upon the destination and tempo of the war effort, and that parcels for personnel known to be in an area which would permit mailing subsequent to Oct. 15, may be deposited for mailing at a date selected by the sender.

Christmas parcels for Army, Navy, Coast Guard, and Marine Corps personnel shall not exceed 5 pounds in weight or 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Not more than one Christmas parcel or package shall be accepted for mailing in any one week when sent by or on behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same addressee.

Christmas parcels for Army personnel en route overseas shortly before or subsequent to October 15, 1945, will be accepted after October 15, up to and including December 10, 1945, upon presentation by the sender of a change of address notification from the addressee received subsequent to September 30, 1945 provided the parcels come within the prescribed limits of weight and size and are endorsed "Christmas Parcel." Only one such parcel will be accepted from any one person to any one individual having an overseas A. P. O. address. However, use of the notice of change of address as authority for mailing is not confined to the addressee of the notice.

Boxes for overseas transmission should be stronger than containers used for parcels which do not leave the States. All articles for overseas should be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiberboard, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard, testing at least 200 pounds.

Each box should be securely tied with strong cord, preferably by four separate pieces, two lengthwise and two crosswise, knotted at crossings. Sealings the flaps with gummed tape where they meet strengthens the box but the use of such tape alone is not satisfactory since the tape loosens if the boxes become wet or exposed to moist atmosphere. Boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contents will be tightly packed to pre-

vent any rattling or loosening of the articles within the parcels. Fiberboard should be securely wrapped in heavy paper. Perishable matter will not be accepted, nor will intoxicants, inflammable materials, poisons, or compositions which may kill or injure another, or damage the mails.

Addressees must be legible, and should be typewritten or written in ink. It is preferable that the outside addresses be hand printed directly on the wrappers of the boxes rather than on labels pasted to the wrappers.

Parcels addressed to overseas Army personnel should show, in addition to the name and address of the sender, the name, including the full first name, rank, Army serial number, branch of service, organization, A. P. O. number of the addressee, and the post office through which the parcels are to be routed.

Parcels for naval personnel, including the Marine Corps and Coast Guard should show in addition to the name and address of the sender, the full name, rank, or rating of the addressee and the naval unit to which he is assigned with the Navy number assigned thereto, or name of the ship and fleet post office through which the parcels are to be routed. Mail for Coast Guard personnel is addressed the same as the Naval personnel, except that the words "U. S. Coast Guard" shall be used in place of "U. S. Navy" after the man's name.

Christmas cards for Army personnel overseas may be mailed at any time but patrons must mail such cards prior to November 15, 1945, if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas. The War Department advises that greeting cards for soldiers overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes and prepaid at the first-class rate.

The need for more pea pickers is still prevalent in Dawson County, according to T. A. Barfield, county agent, who states that the blackeye pea business is flourishing here.

Barfield estimates that the pea crops this year will be worth \$600,000 as producers are getting 3 cents per pound for their peas. He states that the crops will make from 1000 pounds to 1800 pounds per acre, and reports that some farmers are averaging as high as 2000 pounds per acre.

The agent says that there are a number of buyers in the county now trying to secure pens, and states that there is a tremendous need for pickers. Persons desiring to pick peas can call by the agent's office, and he will be happy to assist them and send them to the farms needing pickers.
