## Watergate Black Out?

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge today put off a decision on whether to black out news coverage of key testimony at the Senate Watergate hearings, while another judge cleared the way for the committee to hear former Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans.

In Washington, U.S. Dist. Judge John J. Sirica said he would rule Tuesday on a request by special prosecutor Archibald Cox, who wants the committee to take testimony in secret from anyone facing indictment in the past Watergate scandal. The committee opposed the request, saying Sirica has no power to issue such an order.

## IN EXPLOSION Autos, Garage Are Destroyed

A massive explosion thought to have been detonated by an automobile gasoline tank demolished the garage and two cars of the A.M. Hernandez family at 508½ NW 5th St. about 8:40 p.m. Thursday.

Six local firemen spent half an hour extinguishing the blaze which completely destroyed the family's garage and two 1973 Chevrolet cars and damaged the west wall of their house. No one was home at the time.

Debris was scattered in a 100-foot area. Firemen reported that the dash and windshield of one of the cars were thrown by the blast on top of the roof of the home. The explosion sent the garage wall crashing into a nearby chain link fence, ripping it down.

Hernandez said one of the cars had given him trouble ever since he brought it. It was believed to have been the cause of the explosion, according to Fire Department Captain John Waddill.

No monetary estimates of total loss had been made this morning.

One fireman said fire fighters were hampered in getting to the scene by citizens crowding the street. Luckily, he added, no one was injured.

Hernandez said his family is beginning to try to clean up the home and is waiting for insurance company representatives to see what can be done about the loss of the cars.

## FOUND IN APARTMENT Suicide Is Ruled In Death Of Man

The blood-stained partially corroded body of Harry James, 69, believed to have been dead since May 31, was discovered at Northcrest Apartments shortly after 1 p.m. Thursday.

Peace Justice Gus Ochotoreno called to the scene along with four police officers ruled the death a suicide. There was a single shot through the middle of the forehead.

A 32 caliber Ivory-Johnson revolver was found next to the body along with two notes considered suicide notes. Funeral services are pending at River-Welch Funeral Home.

James' body was found in Apt. 31 lying atop blood-soaked newspapers on the floor near the kitchen with his face turned north. No bullet was found in the vicinity.

An investigating officer said smears on the newspapers and floor indicated that James had thrashed around after the shot. He said it appeared the man set down the newspapers, reclined on them and pulled the trigger.

One of the two notes found written in a scrawling handwriting claimed innocence of something he had been accused of and referred to a happening some 30 years ago. Police said James had a clean police record.

Neighbors said they had begun to worry about James after not seeing him in about a week. They said he was a friendly person.

Bottles of prescription medicine, vitamins and an open jar half-filled with water were found near the body. Eyeglasses and a key were stuck with blood to the floor near the body.

Only known survivor is a sister in Louisiana. However, a message dated 1969 was found in a bedroom dresser mentioning that his brother from Oakland, Calif., was going to come to Big Spring.

James was born July 30, 1903. He served in the Army Dec. 2, 1942-April 1, 1943. He filed for a pension January, 1966 and had received it ever since.

He had been treated in the local Veterans Administration Hospital January-July, 1966 and was believed to have also been treated in the Dallas VA facility.

Mrs. Billie Averitt, secretary to the state service officer at the VAH, said James came in her office every few months to fill out forms. She described him as "very pleasant, cooperative and very honest."

# Politician Gunned Down

CHERRY HILL, N.J. (AP) — Major B. Coxson, a flamboyant ex-convict defeated recently in Camden's mayoral race, was slain "gangland style" today in the bedroom of his mansion here, police said.

Coxson last month lost a bid to become Camden's first black mayor.

Coxson's wife, Lois, 35, and two children, Lita, 15, and Toro, 12, were wounded in the predawn shooting.

The Cherry Hill Medical Cen-

ter said the mother and daughter were in serious condition. The son's condition was listed as fair.

A second son escaped unharmed.

**HUNT FOUR MEN**  
Police said an alarm was out for four black men, all believed armed, who entered the \$150,000 Coxson home about 4 a.m., EDT.

Police said Coxson's body, clad in pajamas, was found in a kneeling position with his

head resting on a bed. His hands and feet were bound with neckties and he was gagged.

Police said the four gunmen apparently were admitted to the house by Coxson after they honked the horn of their black Cadillac several times.

Public Safety Director Thomas O'Rourke said there was some conversation between Coxson and the men inside the house and then the entire family was bound hand-and-foot and gagged with neckties.

O'Rourke said Mrs. Coxson was found in the same bedroom as her husband but had "made some effort to go to the bathroom and then to reach the telephone."

Lita was found in her bedroom and Toro was found in the living room.

Lex, 13, the other son, was also tied and gagged but managed to wriggle out a sliding bedroom window and make his way to the home of a neighbor who notified police.

O'Rourke said three of the assailants were described as being about 31 and that the fourth man was about 38. The director said two of the men carried chrome-plated revolvers of unknown caliber.

Camden County Coroner Dr. Tom Daley said Coxson died of one gunshot wound, probably fired at close range, to the back of the head.

The other victims also were bound, police said. Medical authorities said the wife and

daughter were shot "more than once," but did not elaborate.

Police said the wounded son told them he heard a "scream in the night" coming from his father's bedroom. The boy also told of being ordered by the gunmen to lie on the floor.

Coxson, 43, a flamboyant rags-to-riches businessman who made most of his money in the automobile business, lost a bid to become Camden's first-black mayor in the May 8 Democratic mayoralty race.

## Charging 133 Cease-Fire Violations

SAIGON (AP) — Talks between South Vietnamese government and Viet Cong officers on strengthening the cease-fire deadlocked again today and the Saigon command reported enemy attacks increased to the highest number in two months.

The command charged 133 violations of the cease-fire by the Communist side during the 24-hour period ending at dawn, including several shelling and small-scale infantry attacks within 5 to 25 miles of the capital.

Lt. Col. Le Trung Hien, chief command spokesman, said this was the highest number of incidents since April 14 and one-third more than the daily average over the past two months.

Government and Viet Cong representatives traded angry charges at a Joint Military Commission session on the question of zones of control, a major unresolved issue that has kept the fighting going.

The South Vietnamese government indicated it is prepared to sign a joint appeal calling for a cessation of hostilities in Vietnam. But it hedged this with hints of disagreement with the United States.

# 'Dirty Tricks' Money Bared

WASHINGTON (AP) — The deputy director of the Nixon campaign procured perjured Watergate testimony and told a colleague he himself had lied a dozen times, Senate investigators have been told.

Herbert L. Porter said the lying stopped last April when Jeb Stuart Magruder, the deputy director, emerged from a White House meeting and told a friend: "It's all over. The President has directed everyone to tell the truth."

Porter, former scheduler for the Nixon campaign, told the Senate Watergate committee Thursday that at Magruder's request he had agreed to lie to a federal grand jury and at the Watergate trial.

**FALSE STORY**  
The motivation, he said, was a desire to avoid embarrassment to the President and a personal loyalty dating to the day in 1946 when he wore his first Nixon campaign pin at the age of 8.

Porter said he and Magruder worked out a false story that the \$100,000 given to campaign counsel G. Gordon Liddy was paid to college students to infil-

trate radical groups thought capable of disrupting the speeches of the Nixon stand-ins whose appearances Porter scheduled.

Both Porter and Magruder told that story at the Watergate trial. But Thursday Porter said he had no idea how the money was spent.

**'DIRTY DEAL'**

Porter said Liddy, who was convicted as the organizer of the Watergate break-in, was pointed out to him in December 1971 as the man in charge of "dirty tricks" aimed at Democrats.

He said Magruder told him then that Liddy would be coming to him for funds, and added he paid out \$69,000 in cash over a period of several months.

After the Watergate arrests on June 17, 1972, Porter said, "Mr. Magruder swore to me that neither he nor anyone higher than Liddy had been involved."

He said he changed his mind on the afternoon of April 14 when Magruder told him that he and several others likely would be indicted, that former Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell,

"was going to deny complicity to the end," and that Magruder had perjured himself 12 times in sworn testimony.

Porter will return to the Senate hearing when it convenes next Tuesday.

Just before he left the witness stand he told Sen. Howard Baker (R-Tenn.), the committee's vice chairman, that he had handled several Democratic party documents, knowing them to be stolen.

Porter said he had been told such things go on in all campaigns.

Why had he never objected? Baker asked.

"Because of fear of group pressure . . . of not being a team player," Porter responded.

## RESIGNS AS PRESIDENT

# Franco Continues To Reign In Spain

MADRID (AP) — Gen. Francisco Franco has given up his post as Spain's president but is remaining on as chief of state, the nation's highest post, official sources said today.

They reported that Franco had named a trusted lieutenant, Adm. Luis Carrero Blanco, to take over the presidency, which is an administrative post.

Franco has been Spain's sole leader since the Spanish Civil War which ended in 1939.

Franco is 80 and is reported to have come under pressure from his family to take things easier. Carrero Blanco is 70 and in recent years has been taking on some of the administrative matters for Franco.

As president, Carrero Blanco would perform such tasks as

presiding over Cabinet meetings and seeing that Franco's policies are carried out.

The generalissimo has said that the post of chief of state, on his retirement or death, would go to Prince Juan Carlos, who would become king. Juan Carlos was handpicked by Franco over other claimants to the Spanish throne to serve as his successor.

**FIRST TIME**  
Up to now, Carrero Blanco has been vice president or deputy government leader.

Franco's decision was reported to have been made after a meeting Wednesday of the Secret Council of the Realm, Franco's consultative body.

This would be the first time that Franco had relinquished

any of his powers. But Carrero Blanco is regarded as a staunchly loyal to the generalissimo.

Franco is planning a drastic shakeup of his cabinet, the informant told the Associated Press, but it will not be announced until after the visit next week of Argentine President Hector J. Campora.

Alejandro Rodriguez de Valcarlos, president of the Spanish Cortes, or parliament, will be named vice president in the same decree, the source said.

Valcarlos, 55, also will be named secretary general of the Movement, the country's only political organization.

Franco thus retains two of his powers — chief of state and head of the armed forces.

## Texans Voice Varied Opinions Before Revision Commission

MCALLEN, Tex. (AP) — South Texans have expressed their view on the death penalty, education, the justice of the peace system and agriculture to the Constitutional Revision Commission.

The commission is holding a series of public hearings around the state to obtain the views of Texans on what they want included in a new constitution. The Texas Legislature will meet early next year to act as a constitutional convention and will presumably rely heavily

on the commission's findings.

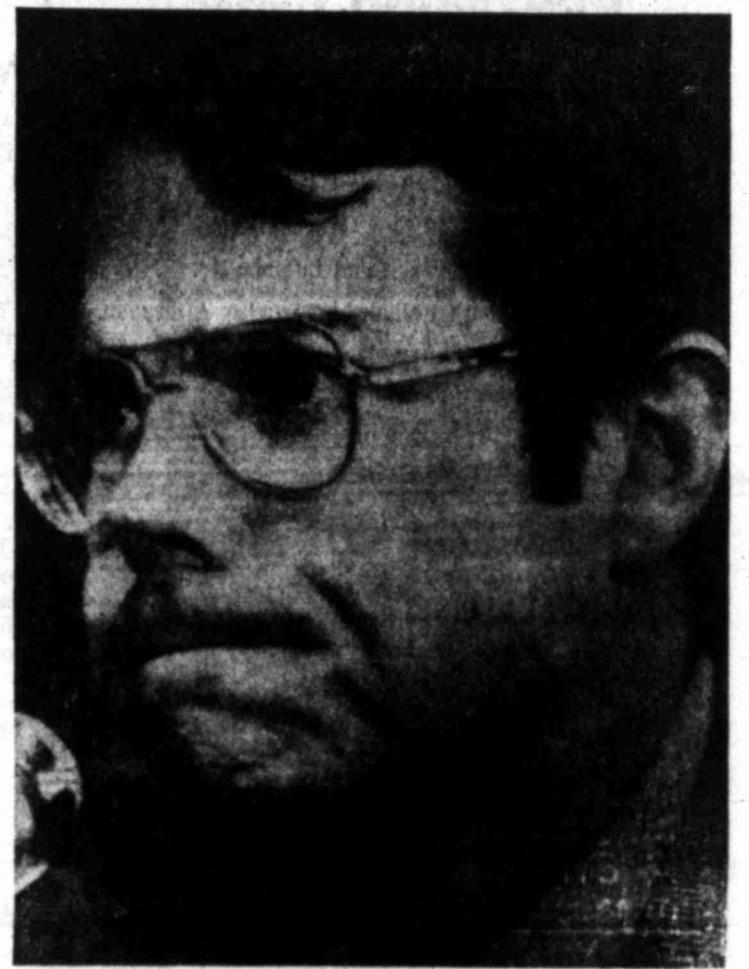
**'CRUEL PUNISHMENT'**  
The McAllen hearing Thursday was one of three held in South Texas this week. On Wednesday, a hearing was held in Corpus Christi and today one was under way at Laredo.

R. F. Neeley of Pharr, representing the Lower Rio Grande Valley chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, urged commission members to officially designate the death penalty as "cruel and unusual punishment."

Commission Chairman Robert W. Calvert told Neeley that the commission is not supposed to make any changes in the bill of rights portion of the constitution.

**'TUNE OUT'**

Several speakers devoted their testimony to education. Mrs. Violet Lang, a Rio Hondo school teacher, urged that kindergarten not be made compulsory because she feels that some pupils "tune out" on education before finishing elementary school.

Mrs. Eugene (Lois) Bond, 60 of Coahoma was killed and Mrs. Edna Bond Hopper of Big Spring was injured when they were involved in a two-vehicle wreck in Gaines County while en route to Colorado to the wedding of Mrs. Bond's granddaughter.

Mrs. Hopper, who was driver of one of two vehicles involved in the wreck, is hospitalized in Seminole Memorial Hospital in fair condition. She has fractured arms and legs.

Mrs. Betty Tilley, Hobbs, N.M., driver of the second vehicle is hospitalized in Hobbs with a broken right leg and abrasions.

The cars hit almost head-on when the car driven by Mrs. Hopper, which was headed west of US 62-130, attempted a left turn into a private lane and collided with the eastbound car driven by Mrs. Tilley, according to the report of the investigating officer.

The accident occurred at 7:30 a.m. Thursday 16 miles west of Seminole. Clayton Kounce of Seminole was investigating highway patrolman.

Funeral services for Mrs. Bond will be at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Coahoma Church of Christ with Ralph Biestele, minister, officiating. Burial will be in Trinity Memorial Park in Big Spring.

# HUNT REPUTED NARCOTICS RING LEADER

## Two Gangland-Style Deaths

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Two gangland-style deaths have renewed attention on the search for Fred Carrasco, reputed narcotics kingpin who escaped last November from a Guadalajara, Mexico, prison.

### Rites Scheduled At State Park

COLORADO CITY — Formal dedication ceremonies of the Lake Colorado City State Park will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday at the new entrance to the state park.

The regional director of the parks and wildlife department from the Ft. Davis State Park will represent the state at the ceremony.

Also present will be city, county, and Chamber of Commerce officials along with representatives of Texas Electric Service Co. from Fort Worth.

Cost of new facilities financed through a \$228,040 federal grant with matching funds from the state totaled almost \$500,000.

The bodies of Joe Richard Garcez, 24, and David Garcia, 26, were found in south Bexar County early Thursday.

### 'NO. 1'

According to Lt. Alfred Carreon, a veteran's sheriff's investigator, the name of Garcez was "No. 1" on a revenge list reportedly carried by Carrasco.

He said the deaths of Garcez and Garcia were similar to three others occurring in the same region of the county this year.

Carrasco, 33, is wanted on charges of murder in connection with the shooting death of Gilbert Escobedo earlier this year. Escobedo was drinking a beer in a tavern when a gunman burst through the door and opened fire.

Carasco is also named in an outstanding federal warrant for allegedly violating parole, Sheriff's officer Mike Hernandez said.

### KEEPING LIST

"We've been keeping a list here and just 'x-ing' their names out when they get killed," he said.

Of the 12 men police have identified as being on the revenge list, five have been slain, two are in custody and five are "still running and hiding," said Carreon.

Hernandez said besides the federal warrant and the state murder warrant against Carrasco, "We are investigating his role in several other cases—several other murders."

Garcez's body was found in a roadway while Garcia's body was in an overturned 1930 Ford Coupe. The antique car was in "mint condition," said officers.

Both men were shot.

The San Antonio News identified Garcia and Garcez as being apprehended along with a third man last summer in connection with the recovery of more than one-half pound of heroin and \$13,101 in cash.

East's strategy in defending against South's five diamond contract was soundly conceived and impeccably executed. The latter was tuned in on the same wavelength however, and East's efforts went for naught.

The jump overall of three clubs by West is preemptive and designates a good suit of at least six-card length and a maximum of approximately 10 high card points. North and South were not to be denied, however, and they arrived at their five diamond contract without undue pressure.

West opened the king of clubs and East promptly overtook with the ace. In view of his partner's jump overall, it seemed highly improbable to East that a second round of the suit would

not go thru, and he wanted to avail himself of the only opportunity he could count on to make a play for his partner. East accordingly shifted to a spade at trick two.

South put in the ten of spades from his hand and West won the trick with the jack. There was no apparent reason to return the suit, so West shifted back to the queen of clubs which declarer ruffed.

South had paid close attention to the defensive strategy, and he promptly drew some enlightened conclusions. If East had the king of spades, for example, it did not appear likely that he would be so anxious to overtake his partner's king of clubs in order to play a spade. East's shift appeared to be based on a desire to promote his partner's holding in spades by leading thru the declarer, up to dummy's weakness.

Declarer decided to proceed on the assumption that the spade finesse would fail. He proceeded to run the entire trump suit, followed by three rounds of hearts ending up in the North hand.

As the last heart was led, dummy was left with the ten of clubs and a spade. Declarer retained the ace-queen of spades. West held the jack of clubs and the king-five of spades with one discard to make. He gave up the five of spades in order to guard the club suit. A spade was led from dummy and South played the ace. When the king dropped, declarer's queen became the fulfilling trick.

# Presbyterians Send Allen To National Assembly Meet

DR. J. GLENN ALLEN will represent the Big Spring First Presbyterian Church as one of the commissioners from the Texas Presbytery, U.S. at the General Assembly to be held in Fort Worth beginning Saturday at 8:30 a.m.

Dr. Allen is a Ruling Elder in the local church and has served his church in every capacity including a term on

the board of deacons, chairman and treasurer of the board, served as Elder on the session, clerk of the session, president of the Men of the Church, a Sunday School teacher and superintendent and is presently on the Sunday School board.

He has also worked on various committees of the Presbytery and Synod and helped organize the Youth Camp at Chimney Springs, N.M., and has also been church counselor at this camp. He has always worked very closely with Dr. R. Gage Lloyd on religious activities at the nursing inn and with shut-ins.

Dr. Allen taught a number of courses for the Dental Assistants 104 hour certifying course, enabling many of them to get their CDA certificates. He has been advisor for the Permian Dental Assistant Society four years and an educational speaker on many occasions. In 1971, he was presented an award for outstanding efforts in promoting good dental assisting.

He helped organize the dental clinic at the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center for underprivileged children and along with five other local dentists has given freely of his time.

A graduate of Arkadelphia High School in Arkansas, he attended Henderson State College, Howard County Junior College, and the University of Texas Dental School, receiving his license in 1954. He is a member of the Delta Sigma Delta fraternity.

Germany, which drew the wrath of the mightiest armada in history on "D" Day, 1944, will receive a vastly different invasion force from the United States on "D" Day, 1973.

A Christian armada of nearly 400 Southern Baptists will storm the Rhineland for two weeks June 6-20, but instead of tanks

and guns, their weapons are Bibles and their ammunition is the love of Jesus. Among the group is a delegation from East Fourth Street Baptist in Big Spring.

Spearheaded by two plane loads of Christian lay people from 21 churches in Texas, Tennessee, Kansas and Kentucky, the Baptists will preach throughout Germany and tell what Christ has done for them, said W. H. Jackson Jr., director of World Evangelism Foundation (W.E.F.), Dallas.

The "New Life Crusade" sponsored by WEF and church members of the German Baptist Union, said Jackson, follows a

similar pattern to an evangelistic crusade held in Spain in November, 1971.

World Evangelism leaders said 386 emissaries for Christ will fly to Germany June 6. There they will divide into evangelistic teams to speak in 21 churches and witness for Christ in public places.

Among the group leaving on two planes from Love Field, Dallas, June 6, will be the Hardin-Simmons University Choir, the New Californians singing group of San Diego and several celebrities including former Olympic wrestler Shelby Wilson of Boulder, Colo., the Ohman Brothers trumpeters of Royal Oaks, Mich., and Negro spiritual singer Willa Dorsey of Portland, Ore. Miss Dorsey gave a pre-crusade concert before a capacity crowd in Dusseldorf in 1971.

In other pre-crusade appearances, 70 members of the Baylor University Choir from Waco gave a 10-day concert tour in May in Frankfurt, Berlin and other German cities.

Most of the Southern Baptists came from churches in Texas including the Forest Meadow and Bethany Baptist churches of Dallas; Bacon Heights, Lubbock; East Fourth, Big Spring; and the First Baptist churches of Merkel, Friona, El Paso, Seminole, Kermit and Munday. Also a team will go from Dallas Baptist College.

Ann Caton, daughter of Judge and Mrs. R. W. Caton, 619 Colgate, will assist in the vacation church school of Christ Episcopal Church of Sildell, La., from June 15-22. She is a member of St. Mary the Virgin Episcopal Church of Big Spring. The Louisiana program is sponsored by the Episcopal Diocese of Northwest Texas.

Rev. O. A. McBrayer, pastor of Forrest Heights United Methodist Church in Lubbock, has been appointed by Bishop Albie Carleton to assume the responsibilities of district superintendent of the Big Spring district of the United Methodist Church. The Rev. McBrayer follows Dr. Jordan Grooms, whose term has expired. Dr. Grooms will move to Hereford as pastor of First United Methodist Church. Announcement of the moves came Thursday evening during the Northwest Texas annual conference at McMurry College in Abilene.

With a record of almost 25 years in the ministry the Rev. McBrayer has been serving the past eight years at Forrest Heights.

He brings a philosophy that the church has two major purposes — evangelism (outreach) and education (nurture and learning).

"Evangelism must meet people where they are with God's Good News of grace, forgiveness and new life," he said. "One of the problems of our day is that the message of the church has not always

been the proclamation of the Gospel of Christ, but rather some simple moralism. We often have forgotten that in Christ all things are made new — broken lives, relationships, hopes and dreams."

## Even The Bible Tells Of Watergate Confessions

A contemporary translation, "The Living Bible," published two years ago and now appearing on best seller lists, tells about weeping and confession of national sins at Jerusalem's Water Gate, 2500 years ago.

Then as now, the participants were high government officials. But in that incident, the confessions were voluntary!

It all came about when the Jewish nation, after 70 years of captivity in Babylon, returned and rebuilt the ancient gates of their capital city. One of these was the Water Gate.

A mass meeting was convened at this gate to discuss the fact that the clergy, political leaders and average citizen alike were disobeying the laws God gave to Moses a thousand years earlier. In the earlier event the people broke out into weeping and confession.

But it ended for the good of all concerned. A national reform was decided on, and agreement reached for everyone — politicians and average citizen alike — to obey all of God's laws thereafter. A happy celebration was begun with gifts and feasting.

The Living Bible tells of this historic event in the Old Testament Book of Nehemiah, chapters eight and nine.

"In mid-September, all the people assembled at the plaza

in front of the Water Gate and requested Ezra, their religious leader, to read to them the law of God which He had given to Moses. So Ezra the priest brought out to them the scroll of Moses' laws. He stood on a wooden stand made especially for the occasion so that everyone could see him as he read. He faced the square in front of the Water Gate, and read from early morning until noon. Nehemiah 8:1-3

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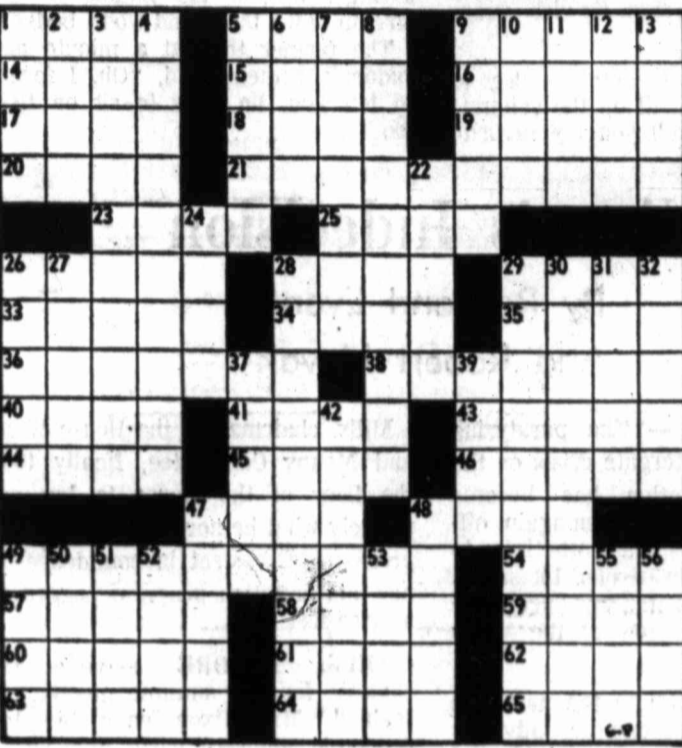

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# Agnew's Dubious Line

If those conservative Republicans who had set their hopes on running Vice President Spiro Agnew as the 1976 presidential candidate are becoming incensed, they have good reason.

As the Watergate affair has unfolded to date, the vice president has come away unscathed. There have been virtually no allegations of complicity between Agnew and the Committee to Re-Elect the President's apparent illegal actions during the last campaign. In fact, it wasn't until after the President was forced to do some top level house-cleaning in the form of H. R. "Bob" Haldeman, John Ehrlichman and John Dean, that Agnew was given any real role with the administration — except presiding over the Senate.

But speaking to the Republican Bull Elephant Club recently, Agnew termed Watergate as "the alleged and insinuated wrongdoing" which Republicans should avoid protesting too much.

Many GOP leaders like Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona are hopping mad about having that

shrouded White House crew pull the rug out from under the party.

Agnew's friends think he is risking his political future if he taints himself with the sin of pretending that Watergate is only a minor infraction of the rules. For his own political good, the vice president should listen to their counsel.

## A Good Example

House Speaker Price Daniel has raised a standard to which all good public officials can repair. He has filed a financial disclosure statement listing his assets and liabilities.

"It is my belief that a public official's financial interests, holdings, obligations and sources of income are of public interest," Daniel said in filing the statement, "I intend to continue making full

public disclosures as long as I serve in public office." If, as we keep saying, a public official is a public trust, confidence of the people in their public officials would be strengthened immeasurably by following Daniel's example of full disclosure. Others have promised to follow; they need to do so promptly. Otherwise, the public should take due notice.

# China Looks Back

SIAN, Shensi Province, China — In this treasure house of China's ancient history the old and the new are both part of the upsurge of a people whose energies have been released as rarely before.

THE BROAD Sian plain that sweeps down from the rugged country around Yenan is cultivated to the last inch and the fields of wheat, ready for harvest, are yellow in the sun. With extensive irrigation and electrical pumps to bring the water out of deep wells and send it coursing down thousands of channels, the crop yield is said to be at least half again as great as it was before 1949. By the end of the decade the total will be double that "before liberation."

The pride of commune and brigade leaders in their achievements as we have talked with them in traveling around the country is familiar enough. What surprises the visitor is pride in the ancient past. That pride is reflected in the restoration of the temple and pavilions that had suffered such sad neglect and in the zeal of archaeological teams excavating the tombs of the Tang Dynasty that flourished in Sian from 618 to 917 A.D. with imperial rule over all of China and over territory later annexed by Russia.

TO GO through the historical museum, housed in the former temple of Confucius with a fragrant garden designed around the restored pavilions, in the company of scholarly, humorous Yuan Chung-ji, coordinator of the Preservation of Relics, is to get an idea of the wealth that has already come to light and the far greater riches still to come.

A bronze wine container in the shape of a rhinoceros has a vivid lifelike quality. In one case is a magnificent Tang horse with a high glaze. This it turns out, is a remarkably faithful reproduction, since the original and a few other of the rarest pieces are in Paris at the exhibition of Chinese art that will go to London and, hopefully, later to the National Gallery in Washington.

THE DIG from which many of the objects came was that of, the tomb

of Princess Yung Tai, who died at the age of 17 in 701. The granddaughter of the third emperor of the Tang Dynasty, Li Chi, the legend, still debated by historians, is that she was poisoned by her grandmother for gossiping about Wu Tse-tien, who was to rule as empress after the death of the emperor.

To go down into the princess's tomb through the long entry way with the murals of court life on either side, many reproductions based on careful research along with the dim fragments that survived damp, cold and tomb robbers, is to get a dramatic sense of that ancient past. It is to share the enthusiasm of the archaeologists — Chao Pei-yuan, who calls himself an amateur although he has been in the work for 14 years and is head of the team, and, a professional archaeologist, Yang Cheng-hsin.

BUT IF Princess Yung Tai's tomb was a success, with 1,354 pieces recovered in spite of the tomb robbers — the skeleton of one of which was found clutching gold and silver pieces after he had apparently fallen out with his confederates — it pales beside the project just ahead.

The team is preparing to excavate the tomb of Emperor Li Chi, which occupies virtually a whole mountain. A royal way leading to the emperor's tomb is lined with massive stone sculptures of birds, animals and tomb guardians. At the end of the way is a kind of royal enclosure with 61 stone figures representing the ambassadors and heads of state who came from afar to attend the emperor's funeral.

This, incidentally, belies the myth that China as the middle kingdom was shut away from the rest of the world. During the Tang Dynasty 71 countries, running from Afghanistan to Persia, were represented at court.

WHAT IS happening today in Peking, with more and more emigrants coming from abroad, suggests a parallel with the epoch of the Tang emperors in opening up a China so long unknown.

All is lost? No, indeed. There are several signs and portents

to indicate that the world is approaching hell at no more than its normal speed. What are these signs of hope — and perhaps even cheer?

Well, to name a few: Every week still has a Friday as well as a Monday in it.

If you are the kind of guy who likes attractive widows, there are more of them around now than there were in 1900.

Crabgrass is no worse this year than it was last year. Scientists virtually guarantee that the antarctic ice cube won't melt this summer and flood our coastal cities under 100 feet of water.

The pro football season will start in a few weeks. There is no national election this year.

The whooping crane is whooping it up because it has again avoided extinction. Think how much smaller your world

would be without a whooping crane in it to save.

In most cities you can still get a haircut and have enough change from a \$5 bill to take a bus ride home.

You don't have to eat so many leftovers. At today's prices who can afford leftovers?

Since extremists in the women's liberation movement have banned the wearing of brassieres, there has been more bounce to the ounce in girl-waiting.

## Some Facts About The Pill

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have been on birth control pills for almost a year. The other day I was told that if you get pregnant after quitting the pill but before the medication gets out of your system, the baby could be born with birth defects. Is there any more possibility of this happening than there is normally? — D. L.

The human race has been plagued from time immemorial with old wives' tales, or, to use a plainer term, superstitions. Now apparently there are some new ones cropping up, and a lot of them are scarce stories concerning certain supposed dangers on "the pill."

The above seems to be one of them.

The facts are these: defects can (not necessarily will) occur if a woman starts taking the pill after she is already pregnant. But, except by accident, it is difficult to see why anyone would do so.

Defects are NOT caused when pregnancy occurs AFTER quitting the pill. In fact, the effects of the pill will be out of the system before pregnancy can occur.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What is "low blood sugar"? Is this curable in a 32-year-old woman and what treatment would you

recommend? — Mrs. M. M. G. It means that the blood sugar content dips to an unusually low level, causing a variety of temporary but annoying physical and mental symptoms — visual disturbances, weakness, sudden hunger. Some poor souls have been accused of neurotic troubles until the real cause was ascertained.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Recently I broke a bone in my knee. Now that the cast is off, there is a stiffness in my knee.

Can I put hot towels on my knee to loosen up the joints? Can you suggest any other therapy that would loosen up the joints faster? — L.M. The hot towels would tend to relax any spasm resulting from the former inactivity of the muscles and the sudden freedom.

Exercise is important to reduce the possibility of any adhesions forming, but should be done at your doctor's suggestion.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What causes scar tissue in the lungs

and what can be done for it? My husband has it in both lungs causing him to be very short of breath and hoarse.

He is taking medication to clear up congestion in the lungs but the doctor says he does not know of anything to do for the scar tissue — Mrs. T.E.N.

Scar tissue in the lungs is comparable to scar tissue anywhere else in the body. It is the healed-over tissue that has been injured or inflamed by infection, or what-not.

In the lungs, infection is the usual cause — tuberculosis, histoplasmosis, etc. Or irritants inhaled into the lungs can, of course, cause scarring, and this includes oily materials and dusts of many kinds.

When the lungs have been scarred, then there is less active tissue through which oxygen can be absorbed. But, unfortunately, I don't know any way of undoing the damage that caused the scars, any more than your doctor does.

# Nixon's Indecision

WASHINGTON — The paralyzing impact of the Watergate crisis on the Nixon administration has become dangerously clear in the on-again, off-again indecision over whether to tighten up the disastrous Phase III anti-inflation program, now once more under top-level review at the White House.

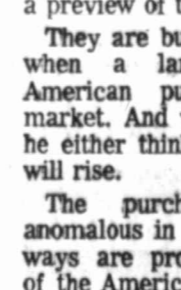
TIME AND again in the past five weeks, outside economic advisers have been instructed by presidential agents to prepare various estimates, both economic and political, on how to handle the worst inflation in this century. In each case, they were told at the last minute action would be delayed.

True, a decision for a new gas tax and tougher price controls, so often delayed by a distracted Mr. Nixon, could be announced at any moment. But even so, the valuable time already lost has eroded consumer confidence in Mr. Nixon and brought White House adviser John B. Connally nearly to the point of quitting.

SO ISOLATED has President Nixon become from the workaday business of the economy and his falling anti-inflation program that even the illustrious Dr. Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, has been unable to arrange a meeting between Mr. Nixon and Rep. Wilbur Mills.

With Herbert Stein, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, presiding, this presidentially-ordered meeting duly took place last May 31. Sitting in for Secretary of the Treasury George Shultz was deputy secretary William E. Simon, the former Wall Street investment banker.

BUT ON returning from Iceland, Mr. Nixon once again did nothing — except to call another top-level meeting at the White House. Still unwilling to order a tightening-up of Phase III following the Monday meeting, the President ordered that yet another session be held, with himself present.

NEW YORK (AP) — While the stock market scene seems to bore Americans almost as much as those summer television reruns, foreign investors are acting as if they've had a preview of things to come.

They are buying, that is, at a time when a large segment of the American public is ignoring the market. And when any investor buys he either thinks or hopes that prices will rise.

The purchases are somewhat anomalous in that foreigners in other ways are proclaiming their distrust of the American economy, or perhaps of American political leadership, and are selling dollars feverishly. But they are buying stocks.

IN THE first quarter of the year the net total of foreign purchases — sales deducted from purchases — probably exceeded \$1 billion.

This figure was more than double the net total of purchases at the like time a year earlier, when the market was rising rather than falling, as it is now.

While the domestic boredom with stocks is blamed on various factors — such as capital gains taxes, low dividend rates, Wall Street disorganization and customer distrust, to name a few — the foreign interest is attributed to value.

Whether these values are real or imagined is an outcome that nobody can forecast, but when you look at some of the facts on which foreign decisions are made you have to agree that they seem sound.

FOR INSTANCE, as Chase Manhattan Bank notes in its biweekly "International Finance," since 1970 the dollar has depreciated by an average of 17 per cent against currencies of Germany, Switzerland, France, the Netherlands, Belgium, Italy, Sweden, Canada, Britain and Japan.

That means an added price reduction on American stocks, some of which already are discounted in their lowest prices in years when matched against their ascending earnings. The principal foreign investors, says Chase, have been institutions, "investment trusts and some banks in Japan, and, in the case of Europe, chiefly banks buying for managed accounts."

The American markets provide these institutions with large supplies of stock. What are they buying? Despite the wide choices available, Chase quotes an international brokerage house specialist as saying they've been concentrating in high-quality growth stocks such as Eastman Kodak, Polaroid, Xerox and IBM.

WHILE CHASE explains that these are among the American companies with global interests and internationally recognized products, they are also among the preferred choices of many American institutions also.

Will the trend continue? Chase believes it will. It states that a number of positive factors encourages this view, including a lower U.S. inflation rate than in many countries and rising corporate profits.

### Medal Candidate, Former POW In Viet, Divorced

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The wife of a Vietnam POW whose lawyer says he is being considered for the Medal of Honor has divorced him.

Martha Chirichigno filed for the divorce on Feb. 5, alleging she and Army Capt. Luis G. Chirichigno had been separated since January 1969.

Chirichigno, 35, a native of Peru, returned from Vietnam on March 30 after nearly 3 1/2 years in a Vietnamese prison camp.

The divorce was granted on June 1. In the divorce decree, State District Court Judge Tom Blackwell waived the six-month waiting period required by Texas' new Family Code before remarriage is permitted.

Blackwell says he did not know the captain was a POW. By waiving the waiting period, Blackwell granted permission to Mrs. Chirichigno to marry immediately.

Her lawyer, Polk Shelton II, said Thursday she either has or intends to marry Air Force Capt. Bill Davis of Bergstrom Air Force Base, outside Austin.

She and Davis left town Saturday en route to the state of Washington and possibly Alaska. No application for a marriage by anyone named Davis has been filed here since June 1.

Chirichigno's lawyer, James Branton of San Antonio, said his client is in South America on a speaking tour. He did not know if it was sponsored by the United States government.

Conference delegates turned down two proposed amendments to the general (national) conference constitution and bylaws. By a count of 262-21, the conference rejected the suggestion that the national body meet every two years instead of four years as presently.

They also turned down by a closer margin, 155-138, a resolution calling for the removal of qualifications that a delegate be at least 21 years of age.

Among the amendments approved were those changing wording that would connote discrimination among the sexes, changing "him" and "men" to

"persons" in several places. Also approved was an amendment calling for equal lay-clearical delegate strength, and for autonomy for the Puerto Rican conference.

The conference also endorsed a \$10,000,000 share for McMurry out of the denominations effort to raise \$400,000,000 in the next five years for 100 colleges and schools. The first McMurry target would be a student center, then funds for endowment.

Additionally the conference approved a pledge to seek to raise \$250,000 toward the operating expenses of McMurry for the next fiscal year. This is a supplemental effort.
