

Wolves prepare for Gatesville playoff

The Colorado City Wolves, runners-up in district 7AAA, begin their march into the state football playoffs this coming Saturday with a bi-district clash against 8AAA champion Gatesville.

San Angelo Stadium will be the site for the 2:30 p.m. kickoff pitting the 9-1 Wolves against the 5-3-2 Hornets.

Not since 1978 has Colorado

City found itself in post-season play and not since 1954 has a Wolves team advanced past the first round of the playoffs.

"They're very quick and possess good team speed," said Colorado High School head football coach Tom Ramsey of the Hornets.

"They do a very good job of running the trap. They try to hit you wide on sweeps. They don't look that interested in throwing

the football but they will throw it. They run a lot of quarterback keepers."

"The tailback (Charles Mayberry) and quarterback (Kevin Clark) are real fast. They're pretty balanced. Their fullback Paul Griffith is listed at 172 pounds and is doing a good job controlling the line of scrimmage with trap blocking."

Gatesville, which dropped from AAAA to AAA three years

ago, has scored more than one touchdown in only three games—averaging 12 points a game while allowing 10.1 per game.

"They play good defense. That league (8AAA) is more defense oriented. They don't give up many points. Their defenses have been winning the games. The top three teams are just about equal."

"They had a pretty tough schedule. Their non-district se-

hedule was probably tougher than their district schedule. Their four secondary backs are as good as we'll see and they have quickness at linebacker."

Ramsey said Gatesville and Colorado City both know the Wolves will come out throwing. "It'll be a test. They've been able to handle it so far."

"They're pretty well coached. They do like to hit."

Colorado City clinched a play-

off spot with a victory over Sonora two weeks ago but didn't end the regular season until last week's 34-7 romp over Crane. The win marked a return appearance by the Wolves offense after a slight two week lapse.

"It certainly made my stomach quit hurting," said Ramsey. "We played like we're capable of playing in the second half. We sort of got after it and

County jail gains certification

Mitchell County Sheriff Wendell Bryant told the commissioner's court Tuesday that the jail has been certified for another year by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

Bryant addressed the commissioners during their regular meeting to announce that the jail is in compliance following an inspection by the state agency.

"The jail did pass and it is certified for another year," said Bryant.

In other business Tuesday, the commissioners formally approved a solid waste permit for the

city of Loraine which is in the process of opening a new sanitary landfill site. Judge Bill Carter said no application is required by the county, but that state regulations require the county to approve the site.

Two bids were awarded for three dump truck beds for precincts three and four. Two six-cubic-yard water level beds costing \$4,086 each were approved for Bill Preseton's precinct and a 10-cubic-yard water level dump bed costing \$6,390 was approved for Paul Hunter's precinct. The bids were awarded to Hobbs Equipment Co. of Lub-

Loraine trustees appoint committee

The Loraine Independent School District Board of Trustees Monday night appointed a textbook committee for 1984-85.

Teachers named to the committee include Brenda Martin, Almaz Webb, Patsy Walker, Janet Moore and Charlene Reilly, grades 1-5 science and math; Kent Boyd and James Chunn, grades 6-8 science and math; Kent Boyd, introductory biology and biology I and II; and Donna Mize, data processing and computer programming.

In other business, Supt. Glenn Sanders reported on the accreditation visit of Oct. 24. An accreditation team from the Texas

Education Agency (TEA) visited Loraine Schools and as a result of the visit, the school district remains fully accredited with the TEA. A school district must be accredited by TEA to receive state funds.

Also Monday night, the board met in executive session to evaluate personnel which included the principal's evaluation of teachers, the superintendent's evaluation of the principal and the board's evaluation of the superintendent.

The next regular meeting will be Monday, Dec. 10 which will be preceded by a dinner hosted by the home economics class.

Thomas resigns board spot

The Colorado Independent School Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of board member Dr. Pat Thomas during its regular meeting Monday night.

Thomas, who is moving to Bonham, explained board president Mac Morris, had served on the board since 1980 and his present term was to have ended in April of 1986.

CISD Supt. Charlie Uselton said that the board will have the option of appointing someone to fill the vacancy or leave the spot open until the 1985 election. If someone is appointed now, they will have to run for a one-year term in April of 1985, explained Uselton.

The board met in executive session Monday night to consider an appointee, but no action was taken. Prior to Monday night's meeting, Thomas was presented a plaque of appreciation from the board at a dinner hosted by the CVAE.

In other business Monday, the board agreed to advertise for bids for the sale of a lot. Colorado City Mayor Elmer Martin and City Manager Brenda Tarter asked that the board consider selling an additional lot

for a proposed fire station. The board earlier had sold two lots, each 50x140 feet, for \$500 each to the city on bid basis.

Mrs. Tarter explained that the additional lot will be necessary for the building project. The lots are located on the property behind the school administration building.

School trustees also approved the application form to be submitted to the Texas Education Agency for an honors program at high school.

Dr. Walter Bingham said the courses to be included in the advanced high school honors program include English I, II, III, IV STS; algebra I, II, STS; geometry STS; trigonometry STS; elementary analysis STS; analytical geometry STS; physical science I STS; biology I STS; chemistry STS; physics STS; and Spanish I, II STS.

Bingham said that admission to the honors program, to be implemented in the 1985-86 school year, will be determined by test results, prior performance, teacher recommendation and parent approval.

Named to the textbook committee for the 1985-86 book selections were Charlie Uselton, chairman; Dr. Walter Bingham,

all subjects; Susan Scott, mathematics, grade 1; Wilma Reynolds, mathematics, grade 2; Nancy Moore, mathematics, grades 3-5; Deborah Ottaway, mathematics, grades 3-5; Molly Bruce, mathematics, grades 6-8; Anita Graham, mathematics, grades 6-8; Linda Stewart, science, grade 1; Barbara Girvin, science, grade 2; Annette Callaway, science, grades 3-5; Janie Lou Greenlee, science, grades 3-5; Gail Evans, science, grades 6-8; Charles Upton, biology, grades 9-12; and Joan Lemons, computer, grades 9-12.

The board also approved the sale of two tracts of property awarded to the CISD in trust after being acquired by the county and school district. The bids were below the amount of taxes owed on the property, and all three taxing entities must approve the bids before they are finalized, explained Mrs. Geneva Findley, tax collector and business manager. A small lot next to 1104 E. Sixth Street, which carried a minimum bid of \$301.45, had a bid of \$75.45 from Ralph Del Real and two lots at the southwest corner of End and Third and Cedar streets, which carried a minimum bid of \$1,830.

Cable rate hike requested

Dale Mathis of Landmark Cablevision asked the Colorado City Council to approve a 51-cent increase in the basic cable service during the council's regular meeting Tuesday night.

No action was taken on the request until further study, but Mathis told the council that it has been several years since the last rate increase. He noted that the basic service now is \$9 a month with tax \$9.46. He said the 51-cent increase would bring the basic monthly bill to \$10, including tax.

Mathis said there are over 1,800 subscribers and that the increase would bring in an additional \$11,000 a year. Mathis said the local cable company's basic rate is at or below the average in West Texas which he estimated at \$9.85.

In other action, the council gave its approval to a plan by the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation to install a traffic signal at the intersection of 17th and Hickory streets. City manager Brenda Tarter explained that the project will cost the state about \$60,000 and that the traffic signals should be in place within six months. She said the highway department studied the traffic flow in the area before deciding to install the signals which will include left-hand turn signals from Hickory onto 17th Street.

On another traffic flow related item, businessman Phil Anderson addressed the council concerning the recently installed four-way stop sign at Third and Chestnut streets.

Anderson, who owns Anderson Motor at that location, said the four-way stop has slowed the

traffic flow and has created a bottleneck for traffic on Chestnut. Anderson predicted that the situation could develop into a serious traffic situation and asked the council to consider removing the stop signs on Chestnut. The council took the request under advisement and will report back at a later meeting, Mayor Elmer Martin explained.

In other business, Lee Head of Freeze and Nichols, the engineering firm for the renovation work at the water treatment plant, brought the council up to date on the project.

Head said the project, which is funded with \$750,000 in 1983 general obligation bonds, is 60-65 percent complete and should be finished ahead of schedule. He said the only holdup is waiting for equipment. He also informed the council of a \$4,400 change

Church notes anniversary

Payne Chapel C.M.E. Church, located at 700 Front Street in Colorado City, will hold its 101st celebration at 3 p.m. Sunday.

Rev. Jerriion G. Smith III, pastor of Antioch C.M.E. Church in Abilene, will preach the anniversary sermon. Rev. Smith is a graduate of Wiley College in Marshall. He has done additional study at Atlanta University. Currently, he is enrolled in a religious extension course at Hardin-Simmons University.

He served 4½ years as pastor of Spring C.M.E. Church in Arp; two years at Carter Temple C.M.E. Church, Greenville; and two years at Porter

Temple C.M.E. Church in San Antonio. He was a delegate to the 1982 General Conference in Memphis, Tennessee.

He is married to the former Brenda Smith. They have one son, Jerriion G. Smith IV. Mrs. Smith, a graduate of West Texas State University in Canyon, is employed as a social worker at Abilene State School. Payne Chapel was originally organized in 1883. The organization of the congregation was due largely to the persistent efforts of William Baxter and Mesdames Emily Alexander, Flora Dunn and Amanda Vannella Everett.

After Rev. J. I. Turner officially organized the congrega-

tion, services were held in homes of members and other available places. Appointed as pastor in the fall of 1883, Rev. S. H. Washington became the first teacher in the negro school, which was organized in Colorado City in 1884. In 1888, he was succeeded by Rev. J. E. Payne, who was duly concerned about the lack of a suitable place to worship.

In 1889, a church building was erected where the Dawson Hotel now stands. The church was named "Payne Chapel" in honor of Rev. Payne. In 1909, the congregation moved to its present location on Front and Erie streets.

No action was taken on a telephone proposal from C&E Telephone Services of Midland which had proposed a new telephone system for the courthouse, courthouse annex and jail at a cost of \$22,843.50. Commissioner Hunter was appointed to obtain proposals from other companies before making any decision.

Carter also asked the commission about the renewal for the rural fire contract. He said the present contract ends Dec. 31 of this year and asked the commissioners if they wanted to submit the same contract to the fire departments again. The commissioners authorized Carter to submit a three-year contract to the fire departments with no other changes from the present agreement.

In other business, the commission:

—amended the 1984 budget reflecting an increase of \$7,136.18;

—formally accepted the resignation of county extension agent Bob Benson who has accepted a similar position in Hale County;

—approved the purchase of a Xerox copier for the extension and auditor offices at a cost of \$2,770;

—increased the errors and omissions insurance for the district and county clerk offices;

—approved requests from the

county treasurer, tax assessor-collector, county judge and Justice of Peace Joann Merket to attend various meetings and seminars and;

—canvassed the election ballots of the general election Nov. 6.

Carter reported that the election "went off very smoothly" and commended County Clerk Joan Beach and the election judges and their assistants for their efforts.

Gas, oil discoveries reported

AUSTIN - Texas oil and gas operators reported 129 gas and 52 oil discoveries in October, according to Railroad Commis-

sion Chairman Mack Wallace. In September, a total of 104 gas and 33 oil discoveries were filed with the Commission. A discovery is an exploratory well that is completed in a previously untapped reservoir.

Gas discoveries in October included one in the San Antonio area (District 1), 36 in the Refugio area (District 2), 16 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 50 in deep South Texas (District 4), seven in East Texas (District 6), 11 in West Central Texas (District 7B), three in the San Angelo

area (District 7C), one in the Midland area (District 8), three in North Texas (District 9), and one in the Panhandle (District 10).

Oil discoveries included six in the Refugio area (District 2), five in deep South Texas (District 4), one on East Central Texas (District 5), three in East Texas (District 6), 20 in West Central Texas (District 7B), four in the Midland area (District 8), five in the Lubbock area (District 8A), and eight in North Texas (District 9).

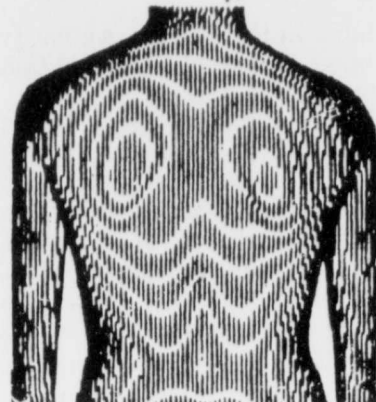

McSpadden leads Bulldogs to excellent year

Sandy McSpadden for mayor? Though he himself would probably downplay his chances of becoming the community's most prominent civic leader, it's a sure bet most Loraine residents feel if anybody can tackle a tough job he can—especially after what he has done for Loraine High School in particular the Bulldog's football team.

When McSpadden returned to his hometown of Mitchell County to coach at Loraine, he

probably wondered himself why he did it. After all the Bulldogs had long been a joke in football circles and nothing pointed to an immediate turnaround.

What happened was that this year the Bulldogs finished with a 5-5 record. No big deal unless you consider that in the three previous seasons Loraine posted two, one and one victories respectively. One would have to look as far back as the early seventies for the last winning season.

"I've been in several playoffs and had a lot more successful seasons but I don't think any have been more rewarding and gratifying than this one," said McSpadden. "The kids had so far to come and came so fast in just a short time of 13 weeks. I'll never forget this group, I know that."

One can only wonder what might have happened if McSpadden and assistant coach Ronnie James had come a year earlier.

"I think if we could have come in last April and worked with them in the spring, we could have been a true title contender," said McSpadden.

"We could have been playing for the championship instead of second place. I really did think that, especially after the Roscoe game (in which the sixth ranked Plowboys escaped with a 26-13 victory). It's hard to come in during August and find out where everybody goes by September."

Did McSpadden expect such a dramatic turnaround?

"Gosh no. I didn't see how a program could turn around that fast. Of course I like to win every game but if we could have been competitive we would have been happy. Obviously we were a little more than competitive."

Where was the most improvement?

"In their attitude about football, life and things that in later life will be more important. The ability to work with people. Teamwork, sacrifice, so many untangible things you don't gain out of textbook philosophy."

Was Loraine's success mostly a matter of breaks? Hardly so when you consider that the Bulldogs had two 1,000 yard rushers in seniors Aundra Rose (1,025) and Tony Morris (1,045)—a first in Loraine history.

"They started playing good football during the Robert Lee game (a 19-6 loss) and against Snyder's JV (a 39-14 win). The offense started to execute real well and we felt we had the possibility to be real competitive."

Actually the breaks usually went against the Bulldogs.

In typical Loraine fashion, the Bulldogs lost their first two games (14-8 to Mertzon and 19-6

to Robert Lee). Against Mertzon the Bulldogs went into halftime tied 8-8 and held Robert Lee scoreless in the second half but mistakes hampered the young team.

Loraine broke into the win column on the third game behind a strong defensive performance that led to a 24-0 homecoming victory over Abilene Christian. The Bulldogs followed that with a 39-14 victory over Snyder's JV in which they were able to overcome four fumbles. The Tigers keyed on Rose and Morris burned them for 200 yards and two TD's.

The Bulldogs fumbled four more times the following week against Spur but that time it cost them a 26-0 loss.

The following week, the Bulldogs opened 7-A play with a 27-0 shutout over the Roby Lions. Rose ran for 100 yards and scored three of the four Bulldog scores while the defense held the Lions to less than 10 yards rushing in the first half.

The win put Loraine at 3-3 but consecutive losses to Roscoe and Forsan ended any playoff hopes. Against Roscoe a wild first quarter saw the Plowboys take leads of 14-0, 14-7, 22-7, and 22-13 before they ended the scoring in the second quarter for a 28-13 victory. Against Forsan, the Bulldogs offense never got untracked in the 34-0 loss.

Loraine then rebounded to end the season with victories over Garden City (14-7) and Sands (33-6). Against Sands a fitting end to Loraine's season saw Rose pass to Morris for the Bulldogs last score. In the game, the two backs both passed 1,000 yards rushing.

"The offensive line is such an unheralded group of people whether it's the Dallas Cowboys or the Bulldogs," said McSpadden. "They never get mentioned. John McAdams has to be the spirit of '84 really. He's been one of our main leaders both offensively and defensively."

McSpadden also praised Charles McPeters, Ricky Bailey, Del

Haltom, Danny Vasquez, Ben Esquivel, Freddie Benitez and Armando Castro.

"I can't say enough about Joe Espinoza. It was his first year to play quarterback and he played like a veteran. Rose and Morris were our thunder and lightning."

Assistant coach James said "I think it was a very productive season. They came along and got better and better each week. We had a very productive offensive line, defense and running backs."

"Having been here the year before I knew what they had and could do. It was up to us to get it out of them and they really showed their potential. I'd like to praise coach McSpadden for the fine job and hard work he's done. He's very knowledgeable and I learned a lot. He did an outstanding job of turning the program around."

Hats off to the 1984 Bulldogs.

Teachers dislike paperwork

AUSTIN—Enthusiasm is growing among educators for the new emphasis on academics and other educational reforms adopted by the Texas Legislature and implemented this fall in school districts across the state.

But while classroom teachers tell me they support the reform program, they express concern that increased paperwork is infringing on the time they can devote to teaching and preparing lessons.

The goal of House Bill 72 is to recapture the school day for academics, not for filling out forms.

How can any teacher be expected to do a quality job if he or

she is not allowed the time to work with students? How can we expect teachers to meet students' needs during the work day and then spend their evenings completing forms or filling out their excessive lesson plan requirements?

I have posed these questions in a letter mailed to the members of the newly appointed State Board of Education, asking the board and the Texas Education Agency to address this problem as soon as possible.

The education reform bill adopted this summer contains specific language instructing the board and TEA to make every effort to require no additional paperwork from local school

districts, but instead to substitute any new information needed for previous reporting requirements.

This same attention to the needs of school districts should also be paid to the needs of teachers. It is imperative that we alleviate the undue burden of excessive paperwork.

Any investigation of this problem inevitably leads to a review of House Bill 246 passed in 1981. That bill was an attempt to get curriculum writing out of the Legislature and into the hands of professional educators.

That law is quite short but the guidelines it generated are extensive. Even though comprehensive guidelines are necessary, it should not be necessary to require experienced and professionally trained teachers to fill out form after form to document the basic elements in their daily lessons. The essential elements should be documented in curriculum guides, not in daily lesson plans.

I know that the members of the State Board of Education share my concern, and I am confident that they will make it their top priority to resolve this legitimate complaint of teachers throughout Texas.

Our children deserve their teachers' undivided attention, and our teachers deserve an opportunity to do what they were hired to do—teach their subject areas.

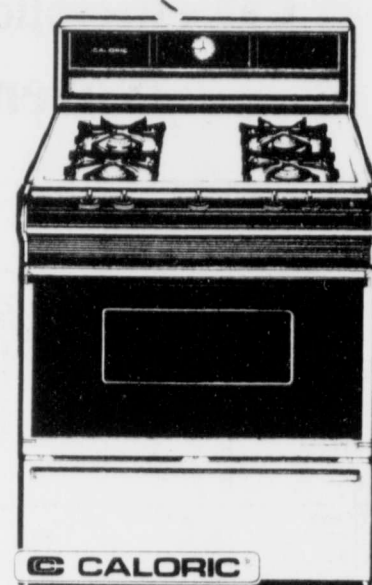
