

ONE DEAD, 18 HURT AS SHELL HITS U.S. VESSEL

START MOVE TO CLOSE CONGRESS TONIGHT

Action Picks Up As Bills Sent To FD

Low-Cost Housing Measure Only Major Topic Remaining

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Congressional leaders virtually abandoned hope of adjourning congress tonight when senate-house conference committee failed to reach an agreement on the important Wagner housing bill. House Leader Rayburn told reporters a resolution for adjournment tonight definitely would not be brought before the house.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—A move started at the capitol today to end this session of congress sometime tonight.

It received first impetus on the senate side where Majority Leader Barkley said there was a chance to wind up the seven-month session before tomorrow, the time previously set.

Ready To Quit

House leaders were not so optimistic, but the house membership displayed a distinct desire to get the long grind over with as soon as possible.

In quick succession representatives accepted a conference report on the revised sugar control bill and approved minor senate amendments on the administration's tax loophole measure. Both bills were dispatched, by this final congressional action, to the White House.

Less easily cleared away was the Wagner low-cost housing bill over which the senate and house have differed sharply. It possibly held the key to adjournment although another major factor was the fact that the house had a full calendar for today and a private bill session—dear to the hearts of members—set for this evening.

A conference committee of senators and representatives sought to settle the differences over the housing bill. But they worked through the noon hour without making much headway.

Cost Limit
Their discussion centered first on what limitation should be imposed on low-cost housing units. The senate voted a \$4,000 limit; the house fixed a \$5,000 limit for the average of all units and provided for variations according to communities.

While the house moved down its crowded calendar as rapidly as possible, the senate debated the \$138,000,000 third deficiency appropriation bill.

The night session in the house was announced by Speaker Bankhead after a conference with Majority Leader Rayburn.

Not for many years has there been so little major legislation in the mill at a session's close. It happened this time only because most of the controversial problems were postponed until the next session.

Some Topics Ditched
It was this procrastination which provided the only worry for tired legislators as they looked forward with relief to adjournment. They wondered whether it would cause President Roosevelt to call them back into a special session two months hence.

Ditched in the rush to adjourn were not only the wage-hour and farm bills, but a crop insurance measure and a host of less important bills.

House leaders believed they might salvage from the wreckage a bill already passed by the senate for an unemployment census, and some senators were seeking a vote on a natural gas regulation measure which the house has approved.

Before quitting, house leaders also planned to approve a senate resolution making farm legislation the first order of business at the next session.

THREE INJURED IN BORDER FIGHT

EAGLE PASS, Aug. 20 (AP)—Three persons were injured, two seriously, in a gun fight involving customs guards and policemen in Pedras Negras, across the Rio Grande from here, last night. As a crowd moved out of the city's largest theater, flying bullets clipped Customs Guard Donato Garza, Policeman Francisco Vasquez, and Jose Moreno, a bystander who took refuge in a car.

Police Chief Antonio Santos led a squad of five men into a drinking establishment across the street from the theater to arrest four men he said had been making a disturbance.

School Gymnasium Out Of Use Until Repairs Made

Consulting Engineer Concurs With Board's Condemnation; 'No Danger' In Building's East Wing

Condemnation of the high school gymnasium for play use will remain in effect, members of the board of trustees of the Big Spring Independent school district decreed Thursday night, after receiving a report from a consulting engineer who made a detailed study of the building. The report said in part:

"x x x This floor is not safe to be used as a gymnasium and its use as such should be discontinued immediately."

Co. Schools Get Money

Final Part Of 36-37 Apportionment Is Received Here

Payment of the 1936-37 scholastic apportionment to Howard county common school districts has been completed, Miss Anne Martin, county superintendent, said Friday.

Receipt of \$2 Thursday brought the total for the year to \$19 per capita. Based on a common school district census of 1,417 eligibles, this brought \$25,860.25 to the schools during the year. The balance of \$1,062.75 goes into the county administration fund.

Payment of the last \$2 in August completed the apportionment obligation at its earliest date in years. It was ahead of last year, a record year for early payment.

MAPS DUE SOON

Aerial maps of Howard county, to be used in measuring work when checking for compliance under terms of the federal farm program, will be received here the week of Aug. 30, County Agent O. P. Griffin was informed Friday.

Several counties in this area have received their maps and have started checking for compliance.

Extensive Search Gets Underway For Missing Soviet Aviators

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 20 (AP)—Missing a week, the Soviet transpolar fliers were the object today of the greatest international aerial search in Alaska-Arctic history as Sir Hubert Wilkins, noted explorer, joined the hunt with a party of five in a 17-ton flying boat.

Sir Hubert and his pilot, Herbert Hollick-Kenyon, expert Canadian aviator, arrived at Fort Arthur, Ont., last night from Toronto, and planned to take off for Fort Smith, N. W. T., 1,200 miles distant today. The huge silver flying boat, purchased by the Russian government for the expedition, will then fly north to join other aviators in the search for Sigismund Levanevsky and five companions, last heard from a week ago today, several hours before their four-motored off.

The school board this spring had declared the gymnasium would not be used this year.

Report of the engineer, R. L. Rolfe of Dallas, said that the east wing of the school building, in which cracks have appeared, may be used; but he recommended that repairs to that part of the structure be made as soon as possible. Trustees had taken no action on the east wing, but had called attention to apparent structural defects in asking public support in repairing the school plant.

Housing Problem
Arrangements to replace the gymnasium space have yet to be made by school officials, who are confronted with a problem of providing adequate housing for an expected heavy student load during the term which starts September 7.

The trustees also are studying means to finance needed improvements to the building. They voted Thursday night to send the school business manager, Edmund Note, to Fort Worth to confer with Texas PWA officials concerning a grant authorized by the agency this week for the district to construct new buildings. That allotment was \$146,250, but represents 55 per cent of an amount which must be matched by 45 per cent financed locally. The school district had withdrawn the PWA application, thinking it a closed issue, and there is no way immediately to raise the local funds.

Any Part?
Note will determine whether any part of the PWA allotment could be received if proportionate funds were provided by the district. If a smaller sum could be obtained, the money would go toward repairing the east wing of the school building.

LUKE TRAMMEL PUT TO DEATH IN CHAIR

HUNTSVILLE, Tex., Aug. 20 (AP)—Luke Trammel, 27, farm hand turned criminal, died in the state's electric chair today for killing Guard Felix Smith during a break from Retrieve prison farm a year ago.

Several hours before his death Trammel said: "I didn't think the parole board of Texas and the governor of Texas would see a man executed on such evidence." Shortly after midnight, a minute from death, Trammel said he "was ready to go."

Trammel repeatedly had claimed one-eyed Forest Gibson, Limestone county convict, actually fired the shot that killed the guard. Gibson is serving 60 years for the slaying. The parole board refused to save Trammel from the chair.

Per Capita Is Again Fixed At \$22

AUSTIN, Aug. 20 (AP)—The state board of education today voted again to set the per capita scholastic apportionment for next year at \$22.

New Development
The action was the latest in the row over what the state should contribute to the upkeep of its free school system and what the ad valorem tax for school purposes should be.

The board first voted, 6 to 3, to reconsider its decision several weeks ago fixing the apportionment at \$22 and then by an unanimous vote re-set it at the same figure.

The peculiar procedure seemed to have been made by Comptroller George Sheppard in a court hearing at San Antonio, that funds would be available to pay a \$22 apportionment if business conditions continued to improve and the legislature did not limit school revenues.

Fund Bill Is Before Senate

Additions Made To Sum Previously Voted By House

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The senate appropriations committee sent to the floor today a \$138,000,000 deficiency appropriation bill, the last major measure awaiting senate action before adjournment.

It wrote in new appropriations totaling \$53,000,000, but trimmed \$1,700,000 off items approved by the house.

The bill therefore carried a net increase of \$38,300,000 over the house figures. The largest addition was \$50,000,000 to carry out the provisions of a new sugar bill.

The major slash was \$13,000,000 which the house had voted to compensate federal land banks and the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation for a continuation of low interest rates on farm loans.

The senate committee also scratched out a \$1,500,000 item for construction of a government printing office annex.

New appropriations inserted by the committee included:

\$10,000 to the widow of the late Majority Leader Robinson (D-Ark).
\$10,000 for the constitution sesquicentennial commission.
\$25,000 for the commerce department's accident prevention conference.

\$500,000 for the construction of small reservoirs.
\$600,000 for the naval medical center, to be built in Washington.

\$600,000 for the diplomatic and consular service to be used in emergencies abroad, such as the evacuation of Americans from the Chinese war zones.

\$400,000 to establish a national cancer institute.

TAX LAW COMPLETED
WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—A bill to seal loopholes in the revenue laws as a means of preventing tax avoidance and evasion received final congressional approval today and went to the White House for the president's signature.

Business Bureau Director Confers With Group Here

Dr. F. A. Cuchel, assistant director of the bureau of business research of the University of Texas, was here Friday seeking to enlist representative firms as regular reporters on employment, payroll and retail sales.

He conferred here briefly Friday morning with Pascal Buckner, coordinator of the school diversified occupations course relative to the work. Dr. Cuchel planned to remain here through Saturday.

Making a tour of the principal West Texas cities, he will address a credit meeting in Colorado Aug. 22. Dr. Cuchel is also a representative of the federal department of labor and commerce in his field of work.

American Business club members Friday decided to seek the 1938 district convention for this city, and elected to send a large delegation to the district parley in Enid, Okla., in September for that purpose.

Per Capita Is Again Fixed At \$22

Education Board Affirms Stand By A Unanimous Vote

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Six Members
The meeting was called by six members of the board, including Ben F. Tinsinger of Dallas, who contended the board acted illegally in setting the apportionment the first time before the state automatic tax board had decided on the rate of the ad valorem tax.

Shortly after the \$22 apportionment had been ordered, the latter board voted to cut the tax for school purposes from the current rate of 20 cents on the \$100 valuation to seven cents.

At that time, experts of the comptroller's department testified the seven cent rate would sustain an apportionment of approximately \$20, and school men had urged retention of the 20-cent levy.

Meanwhile, the department of education announced release of the final payment of the current per capita apportionment of \$19 and said the first apportionment for 1937-38 would be in October and probably for \$3 per capita.

This immediately stirred demands among some members of congress that the United States evacuate its citizens and withdraw from the war areas as rapidly as possible. Other congressmen said the president should invoke the neutrality act, but some leaders expressed belief Mr. Roosevelt had acted properly in delaying invocation thus far.

Protests?
There was speculation in naval quarters here that Admiral Yarnell probably would protest the shelling incident to both Japan and China. Dispatches from Shanghai said the source of the shell was unknown.

When the president was asked what he intended to do about the incident, he observed that officials in Shanghai could tell more about it than those in Washington. He declared, however, that such things were almost bound to happen under conditions such as those at Shanghai.

While the government went about removing its citizens from that war-torn city today, steps were taken here to prevent any more from going into China for the time being. Persons applying for passports learned that the situation there is considered too serious for the government to authorize travel into the country except in extraordinary cases.

INCREASE SHOWN IN STATE'S DEFICIT
AUSTIN, Aug. 20 (AP)—The general fund deficit stood at \$10,738,060.22 today when the treasurer announced payment of general fund warrants up to and including March 4, 1937. The amount of the call was \$140,869.77.

The new deficit reflected an increase of \$41,352.69 since August 5.

There was no new call for Confederate pension warrants. The pension fund deficit was \$4,658,864.45.

4-H Girls' Camp Set Aug. 25-26
Howard county's 4-H club girls will hold their first encampment here Aug. 25-26 at the CCC camp in the Scenic Mountain state park.

Miss Lora Farnsworth, county home demonstration agent, said that details of the encampment had been worked out and that the meeting definitely would be held.

Girls will be asked to meet on the west side of the courthouse lawn at 4:30 p. m. on Aug. 25 and go in a body to the Scenic Mountain camp site. They are instructed to bring their own bedding and enough food for three meals.

There will be an incidental fee of 20 cents per girl, if she wishes to swim at the city park, or five cents if she desires to forego the swimming.

Miss Farnsworth asked that girls check with their sponsors for further details.

ABSENTEE BALLOT TOTAL GOES TO 34
Twenty-four hours before absentee voting ends in the city's \$50,000 bond election set for Thursday, a total of 34 persons had cast ballots, it was announced at 1 p. m. Friday.

Approximately 15 additional votes were expected to be received in the mail since ballots were mailed to about that many.

Commander To Determine US Move

FD Says Officials In Shanghai Know Better How To Proceed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—President Roosevelt put up to Admiral Harry E. Yarnell and other American officials in Shanghai today the decision as to what this nation should do about the shelling of the cruiser Augusta there.

One sailor was killed and 18 were wounded when an anti-aircraft shell fired in the battle between Chinese and Japanese exploded aboard the cruiser, the flagship of the Asiatic fleet.

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Artillery Duel
At 10:30 p. m. (8:30 a. m. C. S. T.) the Shanghai international area was rocked as if in an earthquake by the savage artillery duel over the Whangpoo. Chinese batteries well to the south of the settlement were exchanging shells with Japanese warships on the river and projecting.

ADDITIONAL RAIN IN SOUTH PLAINS AREA

Split-Payment Of Back Taxes May Be Made From Now Until Sept. 1

An unprecedented campaign for the collection of delinquent state and county taxes, both from the point of procedure and duration of the campaign, gets underway here and in other Texas counties Saturday.

Acting under a law passed by the 46th legislature, Tax Collector John F. Wolcott will accept partial payments on delinquent taxes from Saturday to Sept. 1. Unless taxpayers, behind in their obligations, make the initial installment before Sept. 1, they may not avail themselves of the plan.

Any person may retire his back tax obligations under the plan provided his payments amount to as much as \$1 and the total obligation is not less than \$10. There is a 20-month time limit for the amortization of the delinquent tax under the plan.

In keeping with the legislative act, when an amount has been paid in sufficient to pay the earliest unpaid year of delinquent taxes owed by the payee, the amount "shall then be applied upon such taxes and a redemption receipt issued. In the discretion of the collector, the amount already paid into a partial payment account may be applied upon such taxes in event the property covered in said or transferred."

Special funds are set up to handle the partial payment moneys. When enough money has been deposited to pay one year's taxes, it is turned over to the tax collector for proper distribution to the different participating agencies.

FLEET'S FLAGSHIP CAUGHT IN FIRE OF BATTLE

Louisiana Sailor Is Victim; Savage Fighting Continues In Shanghai, Much Of City Is In Flames

SHANGHAI, Aug. 20 (AP)—An American sailor was killed tonight and eighteen were wounded when the cruiser Augusta, flagship of the United States Asiatic fleet, was struck by an anti-aircraft shell in the midst of terrific Chinese-Japanese artillery and aerial warfare along the Whangpoo river.

Fires crackled in a fourth of all Shanghai at the time. The one-inch projectile—of undetermined origin—plunged from a high angle onto the cruiser's after well deck.

The sailor killed was Freddie John Falgout of Raceland, Louisiana. None of the wounded was badly hurt.

Men At Mess
The American flagship, which has been lying in the Whangpoo a little below the heart of Shanghai to cover evacuation of some 2,000 American refugees, was struck at 6:40 p. m., while most of the officers and crew were at mess. Other casualties probably would have been greater.

One-fourth of Shanghai was burning, the result of savage Chinese airbombings of Japanese properties in Pootung and the Hongkew district and Chinese land batteries blasting at Japanese defense lines in the eastern district.

American-owned buildings were believed engulfed in the flames, which spread over wide areas unchecked.

The artillery duel between Japanese warships on the river and Chinese shore batteries was the fiercest of the eight-day-old battle for Shanghai. The international settlement rocked to the detonations.

Other Shells Fall Nearby
Three shells, believed to be from Chinese batteries in northern Shanghai, had fallen near the Augusta shortly before she was hit. Another fell less than 100 yards astern shortly after.

Her crew of 800 was ordered to remain below decks as much as possible. Similar precautions were taken by the United States destroyers Eadsall and Parrott and other foreign naval ships off Shanghai.

Some prepared to move to safer anchorages.

The Augusta, \$10,000,000, 9,050-ton flagship of Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet, had stood by earlier today as the Parrott and Eadsall and Dollar Line tenders carried 1,100 United States refugees down the Whangpoo to the Dollar liner President Hoover, bound for Manila.

Admiral Yarnell had told the Japanese navy concisely that American vessels would navigate the Whangpoo whenever and however he wished without reference to the Japanese, who had asked him to give advance notice if any United States craft were to move on the river after dark.

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CRITICALLY HURT
WICHITA, Kan., Aug. 20 (AP)—Mrs. Cloa Falkenberg, 44, of Medford, Okla., injured in a 3-car crash south of here last night, was reported unconscious and in "critical" condition at a hospital here today.

County officers said a car driven by R. E. Adams of Bartlesville, Okla., smashed head-on into another automobile after striking the rear of a machine driven by Al Modelling of Wichita Falls, Texas. The accident occurred during a rainstorm. Modelling and Adams were taken to a hospital in Wellington.

Rebel Capture Of Santander Imminent

Franco's Columns On Steady Advance In Northern Sector

HENDAYE, France, (Spanish Border) Aug. 20 (AP)—Santander and the Spanish northwest today appeared doomed to a quick fall before Generalissimo Francisco Franco's columns, slowly but relentlessly advancing through rain and mud.

"It's only a question of days," said several French and Belgian citizens who arrived at Bayonne from Santander, last important city stronghold of the government in northwest Spain.

These refugees said famine faced the city because it was impossible to get food through the insurgent blockade of the port.

Today, Franco's troops pounded through a natural barrage of fog and rain for possession of the waterworks of the city at Arrieta park. The generalissimo's communique said his forces met strong resistance in all sectors on the Santander front.

The insurgent chieftain himself visited the city, advancing from the front, pleased by the now almost unopposed push toward the Spanish government's last city stronghold on the northern coast.

In less than a week of the insurgent offensive, Franco's commanders reported, Santander's outlying defenses in the tumbling terrain to the city's southwest had been virtually smashed.

The drive yesterday was confined to infantry attacks against the last strands of the government's defensive. Thick fog and a driving rain throughout the southern sector grounded the insurgent aerial armada and Franco's field guns were useless in the low visibility.

Meanwhile, normal business activity within Santander had come to a tense halt. Workers were rushed to the fringes of the city to build last line fortifications against the advancing insurgents.

Santander authorities clung to the hope that fortifications about Torrelavega, an important industrial, mining and water power center, 11 miles to the southwest, might serve to check the offensive. The erection of defenses was centered there.

Refreshments were served Mexican style from a dining table centered with a bouquet of mixed summer flowers.

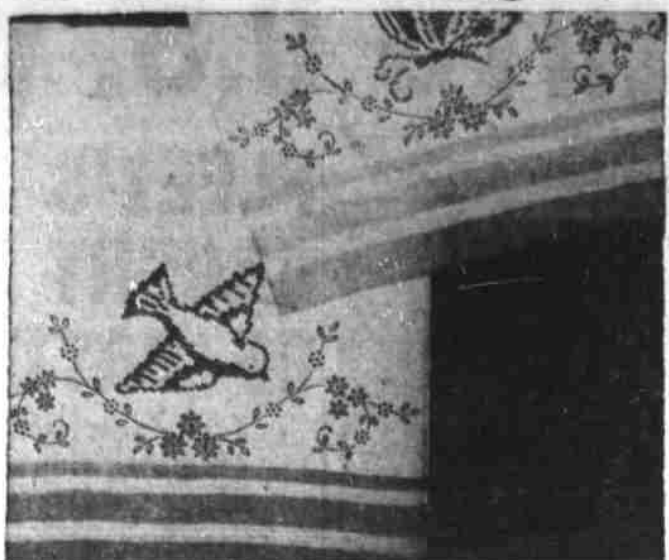

READING AND WRITING

By John Selby
"ORDEAL IN ENGLAND," by Philip Gibbs; (Doubleday, Doran; \$3).

The year and a half since the death of King George V have been painful for England, and nobody knows this better than Sir Philip Gibbs. He not only knows the condition; he saw in it the opportunity for another book.

This book is being published today in America under the title "Ordeal in England." It is neither the best nor the worst book Sir Philip has written, but it has a good deal of value for America because it is both honest and tempered.

Gibbs' best pages have to do with "l'affaire Simpson." He has nothing very new to offer, in the way of historical data, that is, indeed, other writers have told more, whether or not it has been the truth. What Gibbs has that these have not had is a genuine and truthful sympathy for Edward, and an unclerical, un-Puritan attitude toward the entire matter.

Sir Philip rather inclined toward the possibility of a marriage which would not place Mrs. Simpson on the throne—such marriages had occurred in the past. He resented, and did not believe in the idea of the Bishops that Mrs. Simpson's divorces were shocking England to the core, even though he admits there are many Puritans left in the land. He hoped to the last that some means could be devised which would permit a King obviously popular with the masses which needed him most to continue a service potentially valuable. He does not do the about-face of Hector Bolitho; one day an Edwardian, the next the henchman of the Bishop of Bradford.

Nor, oddly, does he seem too cordial toward the idea which he says is prevalent in England—that Edward "let down" his subjects. Yet he acknowledges (temperately) the virtues of the present occupants of the throne, describing pleasantly a day he once spent with the sixth George. Now it is time to make peace, we are told.

We are told other things—about the League, armaments, other royalists, the bumpiness of Baldwin, and so on. The book will be read seriously.

Friends of Pitt Tyson Maner of Montgomery, Ala., continued to maintain the young southerner "has the presidency in his pocket."

Others in the field are Paul A. Williams of Columbia, Mo.; Thomas N. Logan of Covington, Ky.; Robert Campbell of Wichita, Kan.; Judge Charles Bliss of Taylorville, Ill.; Lockwood Thompson of Cleveland, O.; Wilford Peebles of Youngstown, O.; and Floyd Harper Tipton county (Ind.), prosecuting attorney.

Seattle, Wash., appeared to have the edge for the 1939 convention after delegates from ten far western states voted that city their support. Other cities seeking the meeting included Pittsburgh, Pa.; Omaha, Neb.; Chicago, Philadelphia and Richmond, Va.

Religion And The Church Offered As Cure For Loose Morals

DALLAS, Aug. 20 (AP)—Not from the crowded cities with all their bright lights, but from the rural districts come 75 per cent of the unwed mothers, Col. Mary Stillwell, retired Salvation Army leader, said today.

A rising tide of loose living, especially among younger women, can be stemmed only in "religion and the church," she declared.

"I used to think the girls had come to big cities and were the innocent prey of traps. Now I know that virtually all of them have fallen in their home communities and come to the city to hide their shame."

"Unmarried mothers differ greatly now from the class we used to get," she said. "Once they were from the underprivileged class. Now we have a thick sprinkling of high school graduates, college girls and even trained nurses."

For the parents of these women Colonel Stillwell, the mother of eight children, had bitter words. The mothers come to see them without shame at their condition. They smoke, are coaxed and powdered, talk loudly. Their letters have no depth of character."

Most parents neglect to explain the facts of life to their children, who thereupon find out for themselves, often "in the worst way possible," Colonel Stillwell added.

"The only cure is religion and the church. Every church should have a committee of women which should tell Sunday school students facts. The church which does not do so is not being worthy of its community trust."

Mary Stillwell is the only living member of the first Salvation Army group sent to San Francisco 33 years ago. She retired five years ago after 27 years devoted to women's social work.

Monday's election will initiate the county's new voting box located at Lenora. The box has been added to the number of voting places by the county officials because of recent re-lining of precincts and will be the second box in precinct two.

AMERICANS RESCUED FROM SHANGHAI JAIL

SHANGHAI, Aug. 20 (AP)—A United States marshal and a strong arm guard, all clad in steel vests, braved Sino-Japanese crossfire today to rescue three American prisoners from the beleaguered Ward road jail.

One of the prisoners, Mrs. Lorraine Richards, of Dallas, Tex., who had been held for an alleged attempt at suicide, said:

"I now want to live. I have seen the horrors of war and I want to work for peace."

The others were Margaret Evers, of San Francisco, and Alexandro Gonzales, former New York seaman, both held on narcotics accusations.

They thanked U. S. Marshal E. L. Faupel profusely and said the constant bursting of aerial bombs and artillery projectiles over the jail had kept them in a panic.

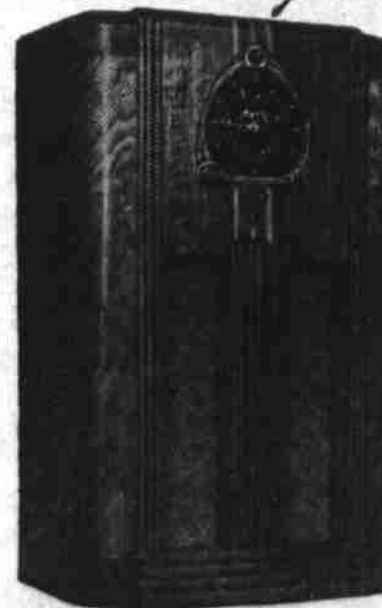

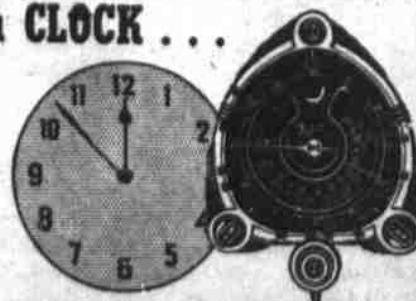

French People Fear Further Price Hikes

Soaring Living Costs
Wipe Out Wage
Increases

PARIS, Aug. 20 (UP)—Foreign countries have become aware of France's financial plight through the two sharp falls of the franc on the international market in the last month and a half, but the average Frenchman is much more aware of it through the sudden rise in the cost of living.

According to statistics compiled after one year of Blum's Popular Front government, the majority of French workers who benefited from wage rises and shortening of working hours of the late summer of 1936, now face a decrease in real wages. The cost of living has mounted so sharply in recent months that the gains registered a year ago have been more than wiped out.

A glance at several essential products which figure on every Frenchman's living budget reveal that foodstuffs have risen on an average of 25 per cent while wage increases average only 21 per cent. And the average Frenchman feels a natural fear that the cost of living hasn't stopped mounting.

No More Nickel Bread
Comparing prices between June, 1936, and June, 1937, gives a better idea of what this means to the average housewife when she goes to market. Bread has risen from 1.90 francs to 2.35; milk per liter from 1.20 to 1.50; eggs per dozen from 6.80 to 8.55; sugar per kilo from 3.25 to 4.45; butter per kilo from 16.40 to 20.40; beefsteak per kilo from 23.30 to 31.10; pork per kilo from 16.35 to 17.45; coal per 50 kilos from 17 to 23.35; gas per cubic meter from .95 to 1.20; and electricity per kilowatt from 1.55 to 1.65. (The franc at current exchange rates is 3.75 cents.)

Many other items which touch every Frenchman's pocketbook also have gone up an average of 25 per cent. When the financial crisis which brought Blum to resign posed the question of filling a depleted treasury before Camille Chautemps, his successor, the first step that the new government took was to pass slashing decrees for all items which the state controls for internal taxation. Railway, bus, metro and transport fares in general rose on an average of 30 per cent; cigarettes, stamps, telephone and telegraph rates 25 per cent; while rentals were permitted to rise in equal proportion.

Indirect Taxation Used
Up to now the new Popular Front government under the direction of the Radicals has resorted exclusively to indirect taxation in its attempt to fill the coffers of the treasury. Indications that this will not be sufficient to fill the void, created in large part by a mass exodus of capital to foreign countries, came in the middle of July when the franc took a further fall of 5 per cent on the international exchange market.

Other disquieting signs have come with a slackening of the public works program inaugurated by Blum to reduce unemployment. One of the biggest items in this program was the building of the International Exposition at Paris, which absorbed about 25,000 direct workers and provided work for hundreds of thousands who supplied materials to them for the building of its pavilions.

Slum Clearance Delayed
It was proposed to launch a large slum clearance scheme in Paris and a highway construction program in the country to reabsorb these workers when the exposition building was ended, in case general business had not increased sufficiently to need them. Neither of these things has happened, and it has been largely due to this fear of future unemployment that many Frenchmen have found the reason for the slowness and delay in compelling the exposition itself. Leon Jouhaux, leader of more than 5,000,000 organized workers in France, has expressed the fear of what lies ahead in a trenchant article in the C. G. T. newspaper "Le Peuple," in which he warns the government that something must be done quickly to prevent hundreds of thousands of workers from becoming idle.

Small Merchant Suffers
Not only the workers and small peasant farmers have been hit by the price rises, but the small shopkeeper as well has felt the brunt. While wholesale prices have risen from an index of 372 in June, 1936, to 538 in June, 1937, (taking prices in 1914 as a basic index of 100), retail prices have risen only from 461 to 590 in the same period. Such a situation is extremely dangerous at a moment when business stimulation is severely needed throughout France.

On the whole, recent statistics show that all the gains which were won by the collective wage contracts following the Matignon accord of last year have been wiped out. Large business profits which carried the weight of increased salaries at that time, while no longer burdened by them, have not found the stimulus of a growing market which would have changed the unfavorable conditions of 1936-37. France has not yet emerged from its chronic depression.

In a country such as France, where the ministerial type of government permits a quick political reaction to all social and economic conditions, changes are bound to follow. What trend will become dominant is not yet clear.

Eleanor Stewart provides the romantic interest and Snub Pollard has a comedy role in the film. The western music is furnished by Lloyd Perryman, Rudy Sooter and Curley Hogg.

Urges Support Of Welfare Amendments

Method Of Preventive
Medicine Cited By
Austin Judge

QUITMAN, Aug. 20 — Helping children get a good start in life is a form of preventive medicine for the ills that beset the state's social structure, District Judge Ralph Yarborough of Austin asserted here in a speech urging voter approval of the two social welfare amendments to the Texas constitution.

The amendments, authorizing the state to give limited aid to destitute children and destitute blind, will be voted upon at a special election Monday.

Speaking at the old settlers reunion Thursday afternoon, Judge Yarborough urged support of the amendments as a wise investment as well as a moral duty.

"None of us will deny," he said, "that it is the state's moral duty to help the helpless. That principal stands back of our asylums, orphan homes, our relief work, and our old age assistance program. "But by helping these children, and by helping the blind, we can

take a long step toward making useful citizens of classes which otherwise almost certainly will add, in future years, to the number of state wards. A little money spent wisely now may save us vast expenditures in the future for the support of prisons and asylums, and that takes no account of the prevention of human suffering.

"You all know that it's a lot better to keep your body in good physical shape and avoid disease insofar as possible, than to neglect your health until it is beyond medical skill to restore it. We call that preventive medicine. To take our destitute children under the state's protective wing now, and train them to become honest, healthy, upright men and women is preventive medicine for the social body."

Eddie Murphy Will Pay Taxes Here During 1937-38 Season

NEW COACH

Ahlens will lose a progressive citizen next week when Eddie Murphy, otherwise known as "Pat," pulls stakes and pioneers westward into Howard county where he'll settle and attempt to lead the Big Spring high school gridriders through a successful 1937 season.

In coming to Big Spring, Patrick has accomplished what he set out to do some years ago. He applied for the position as director here after gaining three or four years experience as assistant in the Ahlens system. Instead he ended up in El Paso where he remained to win a district championship before returning to his home town.

Nine years' experience as a teacher and a student of the game should entrench the prematurely grey-haired Irishman well against the charges of the other schools in the largest, high school conference in the state.

Stresses Policy
In presenting his qualifications at the meeting Thursday night Murphy made it plain that he can not guarantee a winning football team but he does and will insist on a team schooled in principles admired by the followers.

Pat's teams in the past—he has coached at Cross Plains, Clyde, El Paso and Ahlens—have set a sporting example in West Texas play.

Murphy completed his high school playing eligibility in 1921, quarterbacking the Ahlens Eagles into the state's run-off race on two different occasions. He led the team into the semi-finals in 1920 and the Eagles progressed into the quarterfinals the year following before being beaten by Oak Cliff of Dallas.

Job At Clyde
Murphy, after attending McMurry until 1926, accepted a position with the Clyde high school. He remained there for one year before moving on to Cross Plains.

After being defeated for the district championship by one point by Dublin, Pat returned to Ahlens to help coach the Eagles to the state championship. He stayed on as an assistant until 1931 when the Eagles again won state honors.

Moving on to Austin high school, El Paso, in 1932, his team won the district championship, only to be defeated by Sweetwater, 13-6, in bi-district round.

In his second year at the border city, the Tigers finished second in the district race.

He returned to Ahlens as chief aide to Dewey Mayhew in 1934 and succeeded in developing that forward wall last year that again led the Eagles into the state quarterfinals.

And what is Pat's greatest ambition? You guessed it. It's to lick the ears off Dewey Mayhew's club.

The Community's Problem

The Big Spring independent school district finds itself in the anomalous position of being offered money it desperately needs, but cannot accept. And the curing of that situation may take the eventual help of all the citizens in his district.

The Public Works administration announced this week final approval of a grant of \$146,250 to the district, this sum to go toward a \$325,000 building project. This grant was made on the assumption that it will be matched by \$178,750 from the district. In other words, PWA will finance 55 percent of the project if the remaining 45 percent is provided locally.

The local finance is quite a problem, especially in view of the rejection, some time back, of a \$65,000 bond issue by voters in the district. The submission of that issue might be explained as follows:

Original application for the PWA grant was made nearly two years ago. Terms were altered and the board of school trustees finally withdrew the application. The matter was thought to be closed, the \$65,000 issue brought forward to finance desperately needed improvements in the school plant. Later came another change in the PWA program, with approval of the grant.

With the incentive of that much federal aid, school patrons may want to reconsider a proposal to raise some money locally. The school officials' next concern is to see if any portion of the federal grant would be available provided the district could go forward on the 55-45 basis. Their aim might be to trim the whole project to raise only funds needed for immediate building improvements, getting PWA aid in proportion.

Whether it all can be worked out is a question; and a pretty serious one for all Big Spring folk, in view of the report submitted Thursday night by a consulting engineer as to the condition of portions of the high school building. Repairs will be needed there. The crowded condition of our schools will exist again this year; our teacher salary scale is as distressingly low as it ever was.

The situation will in time have to be faced. It will not be the school board's problem; it will be the problem of this entire community.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON—Back in the elegant 80's the Congressional Record was just about compulsory reading for advanced students in elocution.

Today oldtime readers of the record from Bangor to Bismarck lament the languishing of an oratorical art which formerly flourished in the halls of congress. The national legislature still boasts punchy, packing and stylish phrase-makers but almost vanished is the grandiloquence that went with frock-coated m. c.'s.

Those who like their rhetoric resonant and rhythmic fear Arizona's Sen. Henry Fountain Ashurst may be the last of the oratorical Mohicans. Fortunately the former cowpuncher, who won his spurs a year ago as one of the greatest word-wranglers of all time, shows no sign at 62 of doing a philological fade-out.

Outshines Conkling

New York's Sen. Roscoe Conkling was a forensic flash of the 19th century but some of the Ashurst enthusiasts will tell you that much of Conkling's stuff was lumpy compared with the sparkling syntax of the courtly six-foot Arizonian.

As an Ashurst classic they cite his defense of the donkey as the emblem of the democratic party—a serio-comic discourse delivered by the senator in 1890 when the republican elephant was a robust symbol of G.O.P. supremacy. An excerpt:

"He is a sure-footed, trustworthy creature of epicurean taste and gargantuan appetite; but his appetite, happily enough, may be satisfied by a nibble at a desert cactus and he is then ready for another long and lonely journey...."

"He is the personification of the sublime virtues of moderation, forbearance and rigid economy. From the vibrant chords of his throat come zigzag bars of music as thrilling as the midnight minstrel of the nightingale...."

"The donkey must not be abandoned for upon his back the democratic hosts ascend the steep acclivity to power, or to change the figure of speech, he is the pons asinorum over which they march to victory."

Conkling's specialty was the production of a melody of metaphors in an organ-toned voice. In summing up a slender case for an orphan girl client, he emitted:

"I have sisters, and I would rather that clouds should fall upon their coffins than one of them should be robbed of that priceless reputation without which a woman is a casket without a jewel, a ship without a rudder and a helpless wreck on fortune's lonely shore."

Grandiose grammar by Conkling on the laying of the Atlantic cable: "That is a great wedding day when hemispheres are married and lightning is the language in which they are betrothed."

Mr. Ashurst on the miracle of wireless: "The radio has made a whispering gallery of the skies; it assembles the people's thoughts and sends them around the world on wings as swift as the lightning's fiery bolt."

Eloquent Lewis

Illinois' Chesterfield Sen. J. Ham Lewis ranks with the great speech stylers of congressional history. A poetic passage from a plea for U. S. entry into the League of Nations delivered when Lewis was in his oratorical prime at the end of the world war:

"We can salute the regenerate earth in the new spirit which our children reincarnate it with their sacred bodies still sanctifying the soil that is their distant grave."

Indiana's austere Benjamin Harrison, 23rd president of the United States and a prominent member of the senate, was famed for felicity of expression. Upon the death of a fellow Hoosier, he said:

"He had ample time to arrange the draperies of his spirit before entering the presence of the Great King."

Sights and Sounds

HOLLYWOOD — Hamlet has turned to slapstick. Romeo has taken up burlesque and caricature. Which means Leslie Howard is having one helluva fine time.

He told about it on the set of "Stand-In," the comedy about Hollywood. Just the day before, the philosophic Leslie Howard had been biffed in the face with a stage "tomato" and subjected to verbal abuse by some of the other indelible stars dating from the golden movie age of Jettie.

But he told about it with a dash of humor and a touch of self-deprecation, and he said it was fun.

The idea struck him, he said, a few months ago in New York. He had just appeared on an Eddie Cantor program and the audience laughter was music to his ears. He had been doing his "Hamlet," at which audiences do not laugh, and he had almost forgotten the pleasure of being had from genuine laughter. He had known it once for despite his pictures he had done light and comic things in an earlier day. Back in his hotel room that evening:

"I said to myself, 'The time has come, the walrus said.' And I wired Warner's to look for a script for me, a funny script."

And so was born, not long ago the broad burlesque of two acting folk, "It's Love I'm After." Leslie Howard and Bette Davis, heretofore united in such serious pieces as "Of Human Bondage" and "The Petrified Forest," step out as a comic pair presenting the funnier aspects of actors taking themselves seriously.

In "Stand-In," Leslie Howard swings even further to the left of serious drama. His Attorney Dodd, humorless bespectacled banker sent to Hollywood to straighten out a sinking film company, is a real character, to whom manholes are not the only pitfalls and buried tomatoes not the only weapons of his adversaries. But manholes and tomatoes—they give that Bennett touch.

"It's really the only way," said Howard, "for an actor to preserve his life, to stay out of the little narrow box they're continually trying to shove him in. Show what versatility he has, and he'll live longer."

Howard came into films as a "spiritual" type, in "Outward Bound," and continued as such in "Smilin' Through" and "Berkeley Square." Then came the philosophical-tragic phase, in "Of Human Bondage" and "The Petrified Forest." The classic was represented on the screen by "Romeo and Juliet." And now:

"To Give Hamlet Again." He chuckled, "this could be called the Mack Bennett stage of my career."

Howard, as independent as they come, finishes his picture work for

the year with "Stand-In." After that, he goes to England, either for play or picture, which may be "Bonnie Prince Charlie" or "Lawrence of Arabia." And some day—perhaps not soon—he is going to try his production of "Hamlet" on the stage again. The New York critics in the main didn't like it, but on the road it was acclaimed.

And his faith in his own version of the character remains undimmed.

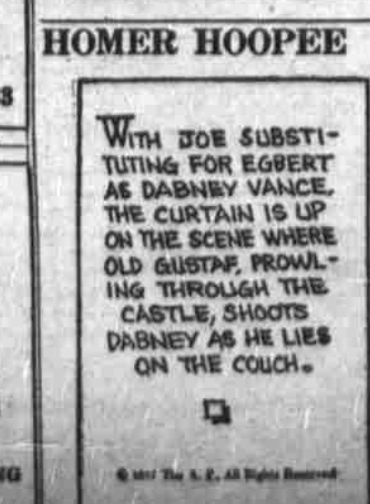

the second the east wing.

Gymnasium Wing
The gymnasium floor is constructed of 2x14 wood joists spanning approximately twenty-two feet clear and these joists in turn are supported on a built-up wood girder consisting of five pieces 2x14 bolted together. These girders have a span of fifteen feet. However, at least one member of this girder is non-continuous, giving an effective girder of only four members. This built-up girder is of sufficient strength to carry a live load of only forty pounds per square foot of floor area. All building codes specify a live load minimum of one hundred pounds per square foot for gymnasium usage.

"Therefore this floor is not safe to be used as a gymnasium and its use as such should be discontinued immediately. This floor could be made safe, however, by adding two additional rows of columns and girders between the present girders. This would give a floor span of approximately eleven feet instead of the present twenty two feet.

"The framing supporting the roof is in good shape but a new roof is needed.

"The parapet walls on this section of the building are entirely too high for an unsupported eight inch wall and these parapets should be either reduced in height or a system of bracing be built.

East Wing
The construction of this wing is as follows: Class rooms have wood joists supported on bearing walls. The corridor is a concrete slab with tarrazzo finish.

"The corridor floors, the exterior brick walls and interior brick walls are badly cracked. The stairs at the east end of the building, especially the flight from the entrance landing to the first floor show many cracks.

"The foundations under the bearing walls have settled in many places causing the above mentioned failures.

"While I believe that there is not any danger immediately to any portion of this building, structurally, repairs should be started as soon as possible before the failures reach such proportions that repairs will be out of the question. The size and number of the cracks will continue to increase until the reason for these failures has been remedied.

"All parapet walls should be thoroughly inspected for loose bricks, sections of coping, etc. Roof flashing needs repairing to prevent leaks."

ties screamed over the foreign-held parts of the city.

The fires which raged into the night over a fourth of the city's area had mostly been started in late afternoon when Chinese air-bombers and artillery struck savagely at Japanese properties on both sides of the Whangpoo river.

The sailor casualty was the fourth American to be killed in the eight days of war in Shanghai. Three United States citizens died last Saturday when misplaced Chinese air bombs wrecked buildings in the international area and killed more than a thousand persons.

U. S. Property Loss
American property suffered heavily as the battle for Shanghai, in its second week, became increasingly destructive of life and health.

The fires spread with no effort to check them, for the fire companies of the international settlement had all been withdrawn from the battle zone, which most of Hongkong has become.

The war came closer to Americans in Shanghai as Japanese shells fell on the border of the French concession—where most American residents have their homes.

Independent reports from the battle area said Chinese had not yielded an inch of their gains, and that the Chinese attack had split the Japanese lines.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Affable Mrs. Dixie Bibb Graves of Alabama is going to let her governor-husband shift for himself while she sits in the United States senate for five months.

"Always before," she said, "we have gone everywhere together—done everything together."

Governor Graves appointed his wife last night to the seat vacated by Hugo L. Black, who resigned to take his oath as a supreme court justice.

The 55-year-old Alabama woman will serve until a democratic primary next February 1 selects the party's candidate for the remainder of Black's term, which ends in January, 1939.

The governor announced he chose his wife not only because she is "best-fitted" but because he did not want to give any candidate for the nomination an advantage.

Mrs. Graves will be paid at the rate of \$10,000 a year, almost twice as much as her husband's \$8,000 salary.

She is the fourth woman ever chosen for the senate. The only female member this year has been Mrs. Hattie Caraway of Arkansas.

The new senator enjoys flying. She likes to read, particularly mystery stories.

Speech-making has no terrors for her, although it's not a favorite sport.

She said that she plans to make a further study of social questions, such as social security and better housing, before congress convenes next January.

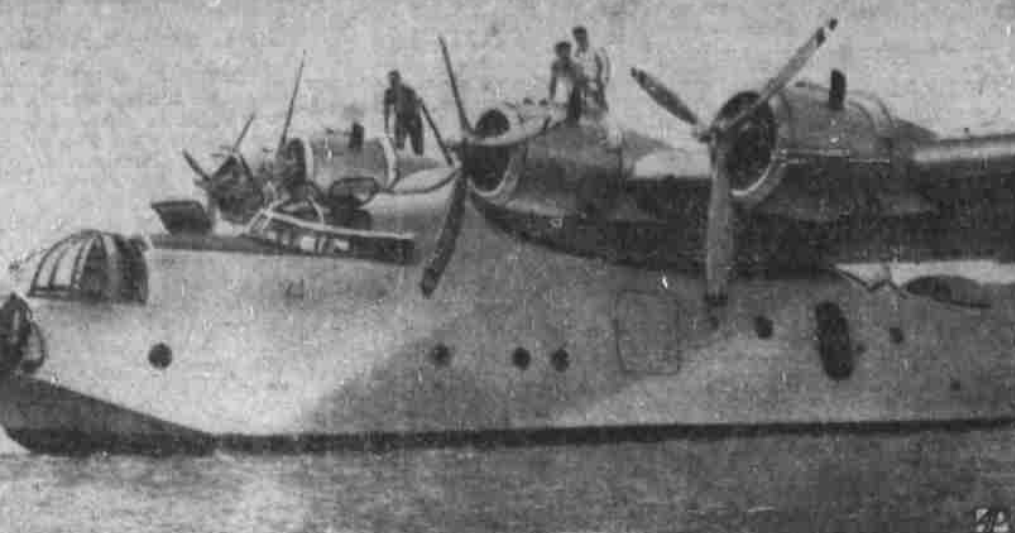

DEALER OF DEATH FROM THE SKIES



HEAVEN HELP POOR SAILORS should this "Flying Dreadnought" turn loose its missiles of death. The navy's latest weapon, weighing 54,000 pounds, is the largest patrol bomber in the world and is understood to have a cruising speed in excess of 200 miles an hour. The sky destroyer has just been test-flown and will be delivered in late summer for use in patrolling the nation's coastline.

Inventories Being Reduced By Most Retailers

NEW YORK, Aug. 20 (AP)—Trade movements appeared to find the easing of summer helpful this week, Dun & Bradstreet reported in its review today.

Hot weather enabled retailers to reduce inventories nearer to the depletion point, and thus stimulated, buyers in wholesale markets displayed less hesitancy, the trade agency said.

In production fields, consumers goods showed some signs of preparing for curtailment with shoes and textiles notable examples. Durable goods outturn held about steady.

Some retail stores experienced the brisker buying of the season, the review said.

In the middle west, the review noted, an unexpected spurt of buying pushed the average gain over 1936 to 12 to 20 per cent, with some cities exceeding that top. In the South the gains ranged from 10 to 18 per cent, in the Southwest 11 to 30 per cent, on the Pacific coast eight to 16 per cent, and in New England six to 15 per cent.

Says England And Italy Now Friends

PALERMO, Italy, Aug. 20 (AP)—Benito Mussolini told 200,000 Italians here tonight that "a lasting rapprochement with England can be reached."

He told more than 200,000 listeners here and millions more assembled before loudspeakers elsewhere in the nation:

"Italy is disposed to give its collaboration on all problems touching the political life of Europe."

The premier's address, except for one declaration, was an expression of peaceful intentions. The exception was his assertion that "we will not tolerate Mediterranean bolshevism or anything similar."

He warned that an invasion of Sicily, in the Mediterranean, would be "the height of folly."

Charges Filed In Labor Violence Case At Dallas

DALLAS, Aug. 20 (AP)—Aggravated assault charges were on file today against two men implicated in the kidnapping and beating of George Baer, millinery union organizer.

Earl Johnson and R. J. Johnson were released under \$500 bonds each, a day after Baer's wife told police a telephone caller had warned her to have Baer out of town in 10 hours.

The Johnsons were charged in connection with a labor disturbance early this week.

At Governor James V. Allred's behest, meanwhile, Texas rangers supposedly had reached the city to put a stop to labor violence. Twenty-five men, Austin headquarters said, should be here by today but at an early hour they had not made their presence known. Sources here concluded the rangers were following their policy of not making themselves conspicuous.

Capt. Homer Garrison, assistant chief of the safety department, arrived, however, to take command of the situation here. Governor Allred had promised protection to anyone requesting it.

OVER \$609,000,000 LOANED ON CROPS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Crop loans of the Commodity Credit Corporation totaled \$609,289,917 in the last four years, records showed today. Farmers have paid back all but \$121,604,157.

The unpaid balance resulted largely from loans on the 1934 cotton crop. Secretary Wallace said the corporation lost \$23,000,000 in liquidating this loan of \$300,000,000 and would lose another \$30,000,000 if the "collateral" of the carryover cotton were sold on today's market.

These losses, he said, might reduce the capital stock of the corporation, originally \$100,000,000, to \$47,000,000.

JEWELS RETURNED

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 20 (AP)—Twenty-five thousand dollars worth of jewels and furs, reported stolen from actress Ketti Gallian last Sunday, were returned to her mysteriously early today in a suitcase dumped on the front porch of her canyon home.

Billie Marsden, arrested in the Austin residence where Rea escaped a police trap, was charged with receiving and concealing stolen property. Her bond was set at \$4,000.

Rangers Patrol Dallas Streets

DALLAS, Aug. 20 (AP)—Dallas took on the semblance of being at least under partial martial law today as 25 Texas rangers, wearing high-heel boots and carrying guns on both hips, patrolled the sidewalks along the strike front among dress factories and millinery shops.

Under command of Capt. Homer Garrison, the rangers, recruited from all parts of the state and sent here by Gov. James V. Allred, had their orders to "remain neutral" but to see to it that no violence or disorders occur.

Mingling with the rangers in the patrol duty were a number of hand-picked police officers assigned to the strike area by Police Chief Bob Jones.

Industrialists Of Portugal Support Govt. Stand

LISBON, Aug. 20 (AP)—Portuguese industrialists rallied today to the support of the government in its severance of diplomatic relations with Czechoslovakia.

Manufacturers praised Portugal's decision not to accept tenders of official supplies from Czechoslovakian firms after the Praha government's reluctance to permit the filling of a large Portuguese order of machine guns.

An official communique here yesterday attributed the diplomatic breach to an international quarrel over the machine gun order and declared Czechoslovakia was influenced in her stand by "third party pressure."

(The "third party" presumably was the Soviet Union.)

A special meeting of the Portuguese Commercial association expressed approval of the government's stand in the face of the "impertinence" of Czechoslovakia in failing to fulfill the arms contract.

Man Confesses He Killed Wife And Three Children

HUTCHINSON, Kas., Aug. 20 (AP)—The "haywire" slaying of Mrs. Eugene Paul Warner and her three children—hacked to death with a double-bladed ax while they slept—were pinned on the husband today by County Attorney Wesley E. Brown.

Warner, a 31-year-old oil field worker, was quoted by the prosecutor as admitting he stole into the bedrooms yesterday and committed the crimes, explaining:

"I guess I just went haywire."

Illness had prevented him from working recently.

Late yesterday Mr. and Mrs. George Strate called at the Warner home. They found Warner in a storeroom, dazed from five wounds in his head.

Strate said Warner immediately informed him:

"I guess I went haywire and killed my family this morning."

Brown asserted the wounds, resulted from Warner's crude attempt to take his own life by letting the axe fall on his head.

BLAST AT MILL

MONROE, La., Aug. 20 (AP)—Monroe and West Monroe were rocked last night by a powerful dynamite blast that demolished a concrete flood gate at the Browns Paper Mill's reservoir and sent many tons of waste waters rushing into the Ouachita river.

Today officials were investigating the dynamiting and seeking to place responsibility.

Last year the mill purchased several hundred acres of land in West Monroe and converted this land into the reservoir.

Recently citizens of South Monroe have held mass meetings, and declared the atmospheric conditions in the vicinity of the mill had been damaging paint on their homes and sought means of remedying the condition complained of.
