

# FROST IS PREDICTED IN PANHANDLE

## New York G.O.P. Votes Repeal Of Prohibition Law

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 25.—By a vote of 193 to 108 the New York Republican state convention incorporated in its party platform today a plank calling for the repeal of the 18th amendment.

The repeal declaration, reversing a dry policy adhered to by the party for many years, was the certain cause of excitement on the floor of the convention, but the vote was in the stable and confident of their ability to procure its adoption only the first ballot when the completion seemed in sight today to pass upon the platform and select a state ticket.

The plank coincided with the anti-prohibition attitude of Charles H. Tuttle of New York, federal district attorney, and its approval by the platform committee added to the certainty that Mr. Tuttle would be named today on the first ballot as the party nominee for governor.

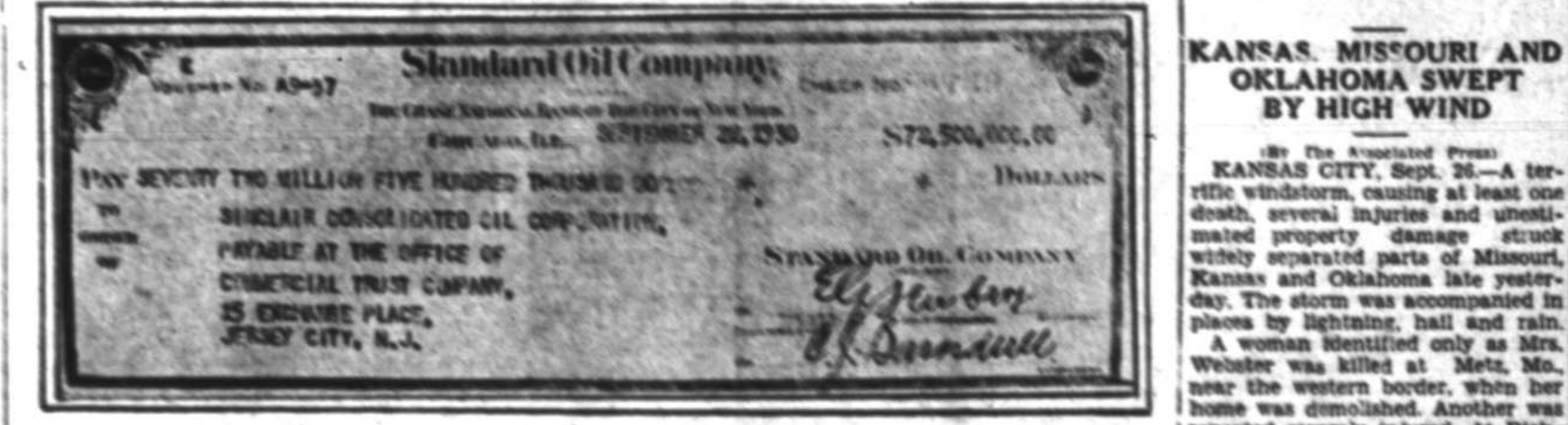

# GARNER FLAYS HOOVER RULE, TARIFF

## TEXAN SAYS DEMOS TO GLADLY ACCEPT THE ISSUES GIVEN

(By The Associated Press)  
 WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—The tariff and the Hoover administration were accepted last night as the issues of the November congressional election by Representative Garner of Texas, the Democratic leader.

In a radio speech over the Columbia Broadcasting system, Garner said they had been proposed as the issues by Representative Wood of Indiana, the chairman of the Republican congressional committee, and that he "gladly" accepted them.

All Past Ones Ignored  
 "If the Hoover administration can be designated as a success," he added, "all past standards must be ignored."

Garner said a few weeks ago Wood had characterized Mr. Hoover as "the most expensive luxury that was ever fastened upon the country." He added that "the events of the past 18 months would indicate that Mr. Wood's characterization of 1920 is even more applicable in 1930."

Carry Out Pledge  
 Discussing the tariff bill, the Texan said recent statistics indicated the Republican leaders "have carried out at least one of their 1920 campaign pledges."

"They have practically achieved

parity between agriculture and industry," he continued. "Both are in as desperate plight as it is possible to conceive."

Garner said defenders of the Hoover administration "are utilizing every method and device to camouflage existing conditions and evade responsibility."

Latest "Red" Herring  
 "The latest 'Red' herring drawn across the trail," he asserted, "was the alleged discovery of President Hoover's secretary of agriculture that Soviet Russia is responsible for the low price of wheat."

"The astounding part of this incident is that the president, with his great wealth of experience, should lend his office to the pure buncombe that has emanated from the office of the secretary of agriculture."

"As a citizen I resent the idea that any country through manipulation of our domestic markets, can force down the price of a major farm product, a product upon which the prosperity of millions of American farmers depends."

"If such a condition exists, as alleged by Secretary Hyde who is responsible? The Republican party has been in complete control, and if that condition does exist the wheat growers should call the party to account."

NEW YORK, Sept. 26. (AP)—A silver cup to be presented to Sir Thomas Lipton for his sportsmanship in the America's cup races will be accompanied by a book containing thousands of letters from his admirers.

Mayor Walker, chairman of the committee to raise funds for the cup, announced today \$1,510 has been received in contributions not exceeding \$1 each. With most of the contributions came letters praising Sir Thomas.

"I feel that these letters express a sentiment greater than the symbolism of the cup," Mayor Walker said.

Sir Thomas Lipton will sail for home Saturday on the Leviathan. The committee plans to send the cup and letters to him later.

### THREE WISE MEN OF EAST SHOW FATHER SCIENCE HOW HE MAY PEEK THROUGH STEEL GIRDERS, BATTLESHIPS, ETC.

BY GORDON H. SESSONS  
 CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—Three wise men from the east slipped a new pair of glasses onto the eyes of father science today and showed the venerable gentleman how to catch peek through steel girders and battleship hulls with all the ease of a small boy gazing through a microscope.

The peering has been made possible, the American Society for Steel Treating was told, by the use of radium's gamma ray—much the same sort of ray that gave the world radio and artificial sun light.

Small in size  
 With the use of a bit of radium less than a 25 calibre bullet, engineers can get a photographic plate behind the girders of your apartment house and see that they are sound. Workmen can take pictures of locomotive wheels and determine if all is well within, and submarine crews can study vital points of their craft for suspected weaknesses.

The inspiration is the work of Robert F. Mohl, superintendent of the division of physical metallurgy in the naval research laboratory,

Washington, D. C.; Gilbert E. Dean, assistant professor of metallurgy at Lehigh university, Bethlehem, Pa.; and Charles S. Barrett, assistant physicist with Dr. Mohl in the naval research laboratory. The work was done under auspices of the naval research laboratory and today's paper read by permission of the navy.

Advantage Overcome  
 Hitherto, the x-ray has been the sole means of such inspection for defects in metals, and there have been three notable disadvantages which the gamma ray of radium has overcome. The x-ray, for example, with equipment generally available, can not penetrate deeper than 3 1/2 to 4 inches within reasonable time. Research reports of a large electric company have estimated it would cost \$100,000 to develop an x-ray machine capable of penetrating the 10 inches reached by the radium gamma ray.

Another advantage of the new method is portability. The radium and tube necessary could be carried in a special small metal case for use in the field. Alpha or roentgen tubes, in contrast to the bulky equipment needed for x-ray

and the added requirement of a plant to develop high electric current.

Finally, there is the matter of simplicity. The technician can group the objects to be tested to photograph and leave word for the night watchman to drop the radium during the night and the technician can pick up his plates in the morning.

An important phase of the gamma light photography is its simplicity; it will reveal defects in materials as two per cent of the metal's thickness.

The extent of the practical application is still problematical, but three scientists pointed out, but declared that early indications are that it will be of great value in testing heavy castings. Naval engineers have manifested particular interest in its possible use for testing heavy gun and metal gun barrels.

Judge Homer L. Pharr of Lubbock presided over the court. Civil cases were on the docket for this week.

# CARDINALS PRACTICALLY 'IN'

## ONE LOSS FOR CUBS WILL DECIDE

### HORNSBY IS IN CHARGE THURSDAY; CARDS NEED ONE WIN

Only one game now stands between the St. Louis Cardinals and their third National league pennant in five seasons. They got back into action at home yesterday and beat Pittsburgh 9 to 0.

Chicago, managed by Rogers Hornsby, defeated Cincinnati 4 to 3. One more St. Louis victory or one defeat for the Cubs will settle the struggle. If Chicago wins its remaining games against the Reds and the Cards lose three to Pittsburgh, the season will end in a tie with a three-game playoff to decide the pennant winner.

As the veteran spitballer, Burleigh Grimes held the Pirates to seven hits, the St. Louis batters collected a dozen effective blows.

Taylor Douthett, one of the few survivors of the champion Cardinals of 1926, opened the action with a double and scored the first run on Frisch's single. Then with Adams and Frisch still on base, Jim Bottomley hammered a home run over the right field pavilion to give the Cards a 4 to 0 lead.

The Cubs got a start against Cincinnati, as the Reds proved troublesome. Hornsby, who became active manager just before the game, sent young Bud Teichout to the mound, and the youthful southpaw did well for eight frames. Home runs by English and Hartnett in the first two innings started the Cubs off ahead and a few more timely blows gave Chicago a 4-1 lead going into the ninth. But then Tony Cuccinello drove his second home run of the day over the left field wall. Harry Melemann duplicated the wallop and Frisch singled before Malone was hurried in to save the game.

The American league champions, the Philadelphia Athletics, played six innings against the New York Yankees before rain halted the game. They piled up 17 hits off Bulling and Johnson and a 13 to score. Lou Gehrig's first home run made in the first inning accounted for all the Yankee runs.

The second game, Washington Senators, directed by Fritz Dierman, Joe Judge, found the going somewhat tougher against the Boston Red Sox. They finally came out ahead, 3 to 2, as a few timely blows put over two runs in the seventh inning while Ad Laska gave the Red Sox eight hits. Detroit game was rained out, bringing a doubleheader for tomorrow.

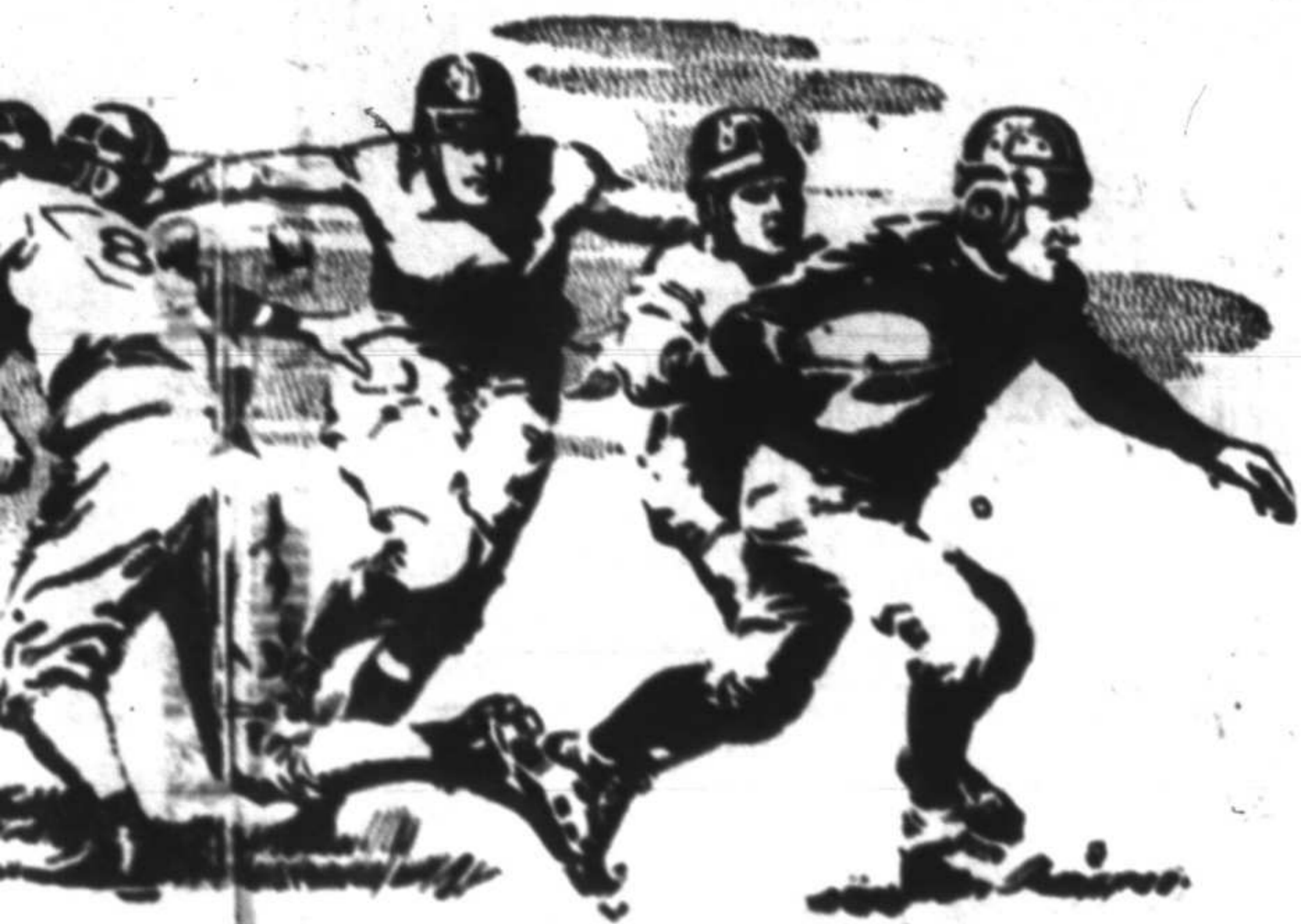

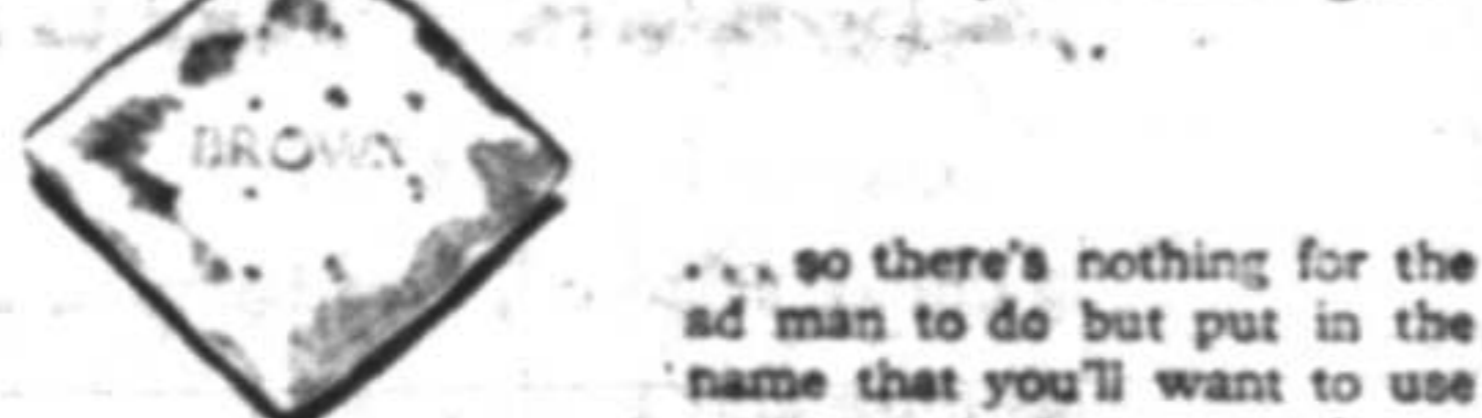

 MANILA, Sept. 25.—Filipino leaders expressed gratification at the announced resignation of Nicholas Roosevelt, as vice governor of the Philippine Islands, which they termed "a great moral victory for the island people."

Sen. Corona, acting president of the senate said:  
 "The Filipino people have good reason to be satisfied with this latest development in connection with the appointment of Mr. Roosevelt to the vice governorship of the Philippine Islands."

"It reveals again Washington's spirit of justice in favoring a solution satisfactory to all in view of the protest of the Filipino people against Mr. Roosevelt's appointment."

Manuel Bonifacio, speaker of the house of representatives, declared the resignation "brings to an end a most disastrous situation."

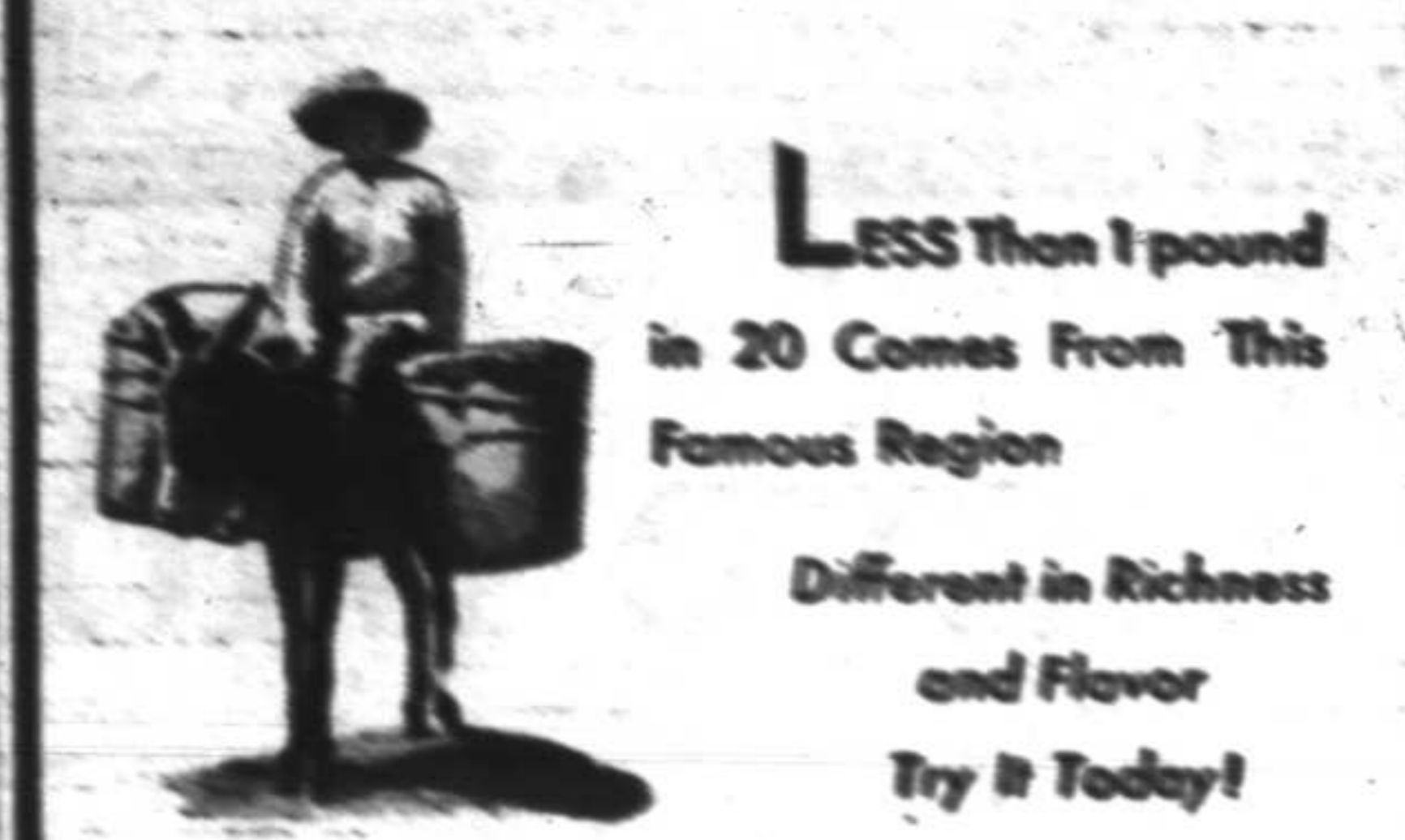

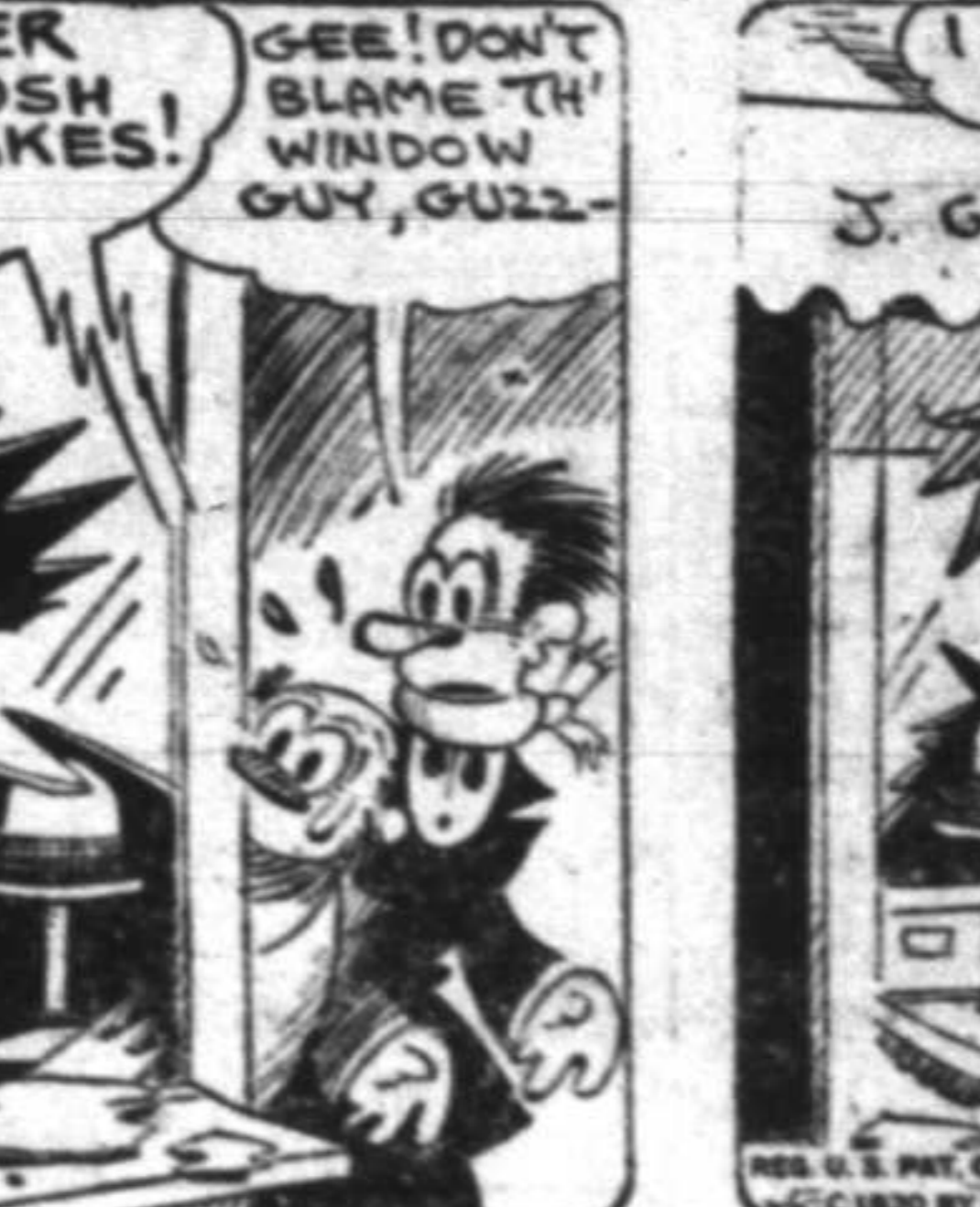

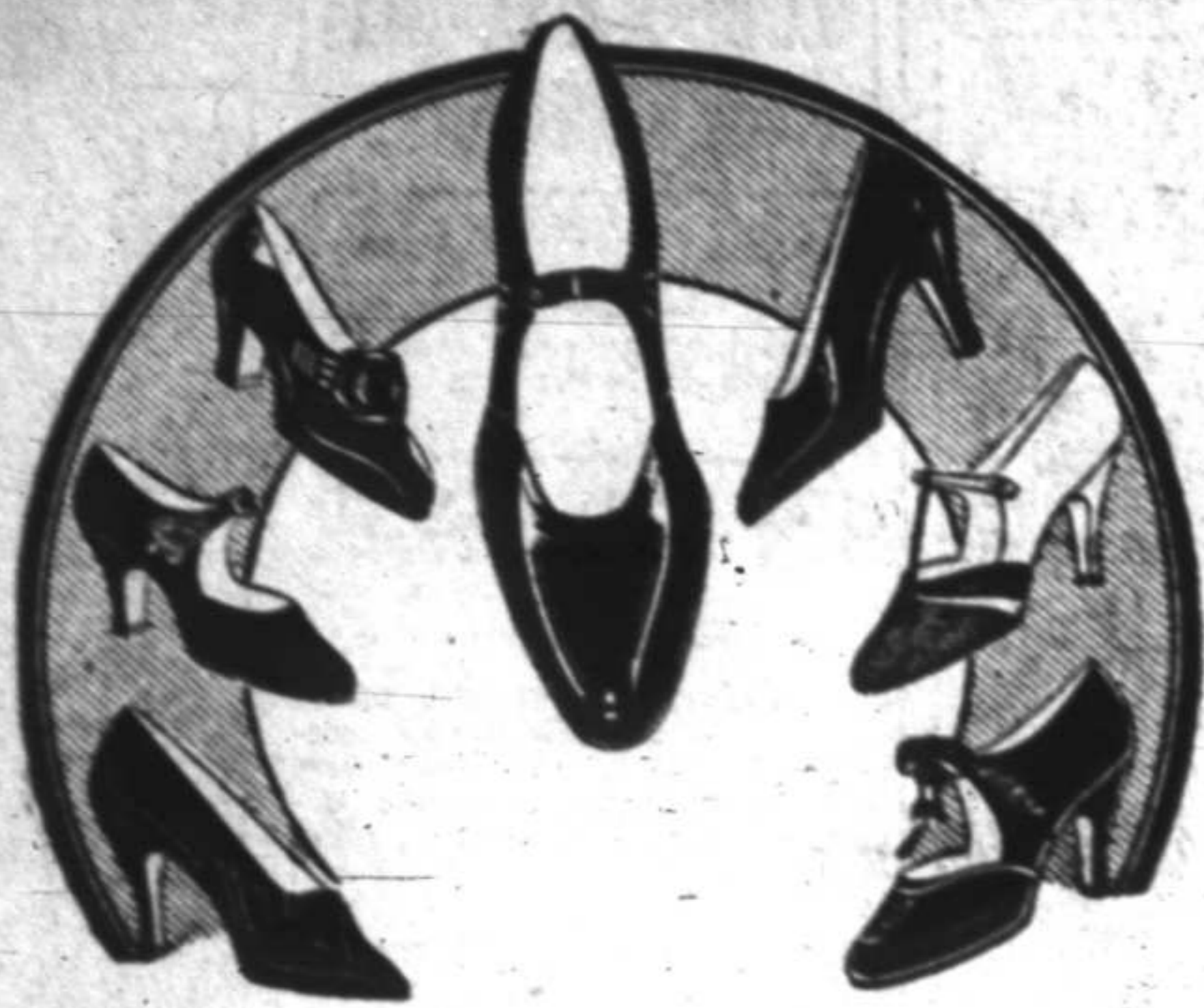

### LEADERS CLASH ON PRO LAW

SHEPPARD, BROOKHART AND OTHERS SAY IT IS FOR CONGRESS

(By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Sept. 26.—Prohibition went up today in the camp of the congressional drys against proposals that the Hoover law enforcement commission outline its views on prohibition. Senator Sheppard, Democrat, Texas, a dry leader, asserted the function of this commission was only "to determine ways of strengthening enforcement" of prohibition and all other laws. Senator Brookhart, Republican, Iowa, another dry, said it was the duty of the commission "to give us the facts." He joined Sheppard in asserting it was "the business of congress and of the people what to do about prohibition. "I am not interested in what the commission says or does," said Brookhart, "but so they give us the facts. I don't want any concealment of data when they announce their conclusions." However, there seems to be some difference of opinion among the members of the commission. Senator Glass, Democrat, Virginia, an outspoken dry, insisted last session that the commission confine its work solely to the subject of prohibition and make an exhaustive report thereon. Likewise, there is some difference of opinion within the law enforcement commission as to how far it should go in its effort on prohibition. Chairman Wickersham has stated the commission accepts the Eighteenth Amendment as a part of the constitution and does not in-

tend to pass judgment upon the wisdom of it. However, he also has promised that should the commission happen to find it to be unenforceable that would be reported. The commission reassembles here October 8 and prohibition will be among the early subjects up for consideration.

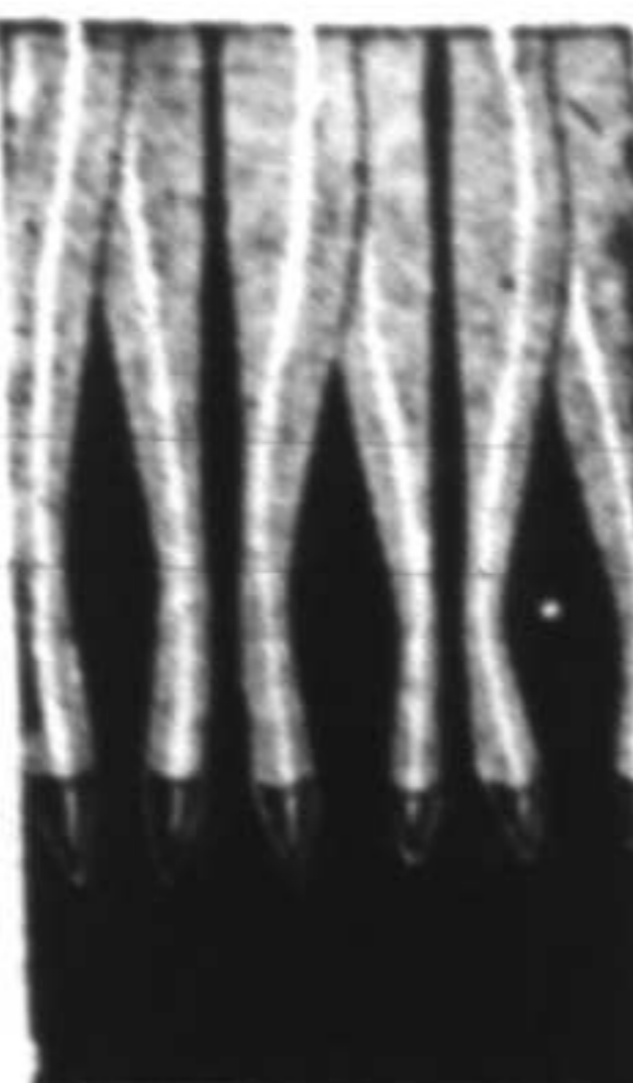

A total of \$117,000 worth of work has been done on the White House since January 1. Col. Grant said, and the jobs of painting the exterior, costing \$300, was the only one let to a nonunion contractor.
