If you haven't already mailed in your claim for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline used on the ranch or farm, you still have time to get it in the mail. All claims must be filed on or before October 1, 1962. The claim should include all gasoline used on the ranch or farm operation purchased from July 1, 1961 through June 30, 1962.

Claims forms are available in the county agent's office.

October 2 is the election day for Soil Conservation District Supervisors. This year, the supervisor of Zone 4 of the district is to be elected. Zone 4 of the North Concho River District is that portion of the district in Tom Green County.

All interested parties are invited to attend the field day at the San Angelo College farm whether or not they live in that zone. College officials will conduct a tour of the farm, Leo Merrill of the Sonora Experiment Station will talk on deferred rotation grazing and range management, and other speakers will be on the program. A barbecue will be held in the Dry Creek park of the North Concho Lake area at noon.

A new bulletin, WILD GAME CARE AND COOKING, is now available in the county agent's office. This bulletin, prepared by the Extension wildlife specialist and the food and nutrition specialists, covers the care and preparation of a number of species of wild game and birds. Recipes included in the bulletin include venison, rabbit, possum, coon, turkey, dove, quail, and other forms of game birds.

If you would like a copy of this publication, drop by the office, write, or call and we'll see that you get one.

Reynolds and Ross Foster recently finished putting up a good crop of silage. The silage was raised on the irrigated field on Reynolds' place on the Barnhart road.

A spot cutting we made on a measured area weighed out 27 3/4 tons per acre. The variety planted was Beefbuilder, a new variety. Grown under irrigation, it was fertilized with anhydrous ammonia when about ankle high.

In areas where it is a practice to produce silage for sale, the price has been from \$6 to \$8 per ton. If it continues as dry as it has been, the feed will be worth more than that to Reynolds and Ross this winter when they begin feeding it to their cattle.

The State fair of Texas opens for its 77th annual run on Oct. 6. Theme of the fair this year is the "Exposition of Nations".

The largest State Fair, our own Texas State Fair last year drew 2,764,398 persons. It includes the Pan American Livestock Exposition from October 6-14 and the Junior Livestock Show October 15-20.

Screwworm cases, which had decreased since September 1, are beginning to show an increase in Sterling County this week. Several persons have reported that the wounds they have recovered worms from in some of the late cases have only one or two worms however.

I would like to urge everyone to send in their samples to the Mission plant as long as you have cases. The fly production at Mission is scheduled to reach 75 million sterile flies per week this week. With this production, it will be possible to drop flies in hot spots or areas having trouble. Basis for the drops will be the number of confirmed cases received by the Mission plant. So, send in as many as you can. Mailing

O.W. Parker, 86, Dead Class Organizations at High School

Father of Mrs. Worth Allen

O. W. Parker, 86, pioneer West Texas ranchman, was held last Saturday at Johnsons Funeral Chapel in San Angelo with the Rev. Lee Butler, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Iraan, and the Rev. C. A. Bickley, retired Methodist minister of Iraan, officiating. Burial was in the Fairmount Cemetery in San Angelo.

Mr. Parker, father of Mrs. Worth Allen of Sterling, died at 2 a. m. Thursday at his home near Iraan. He had been an area resident for 53 years.

He came to the Pecos River country for his health around the turn of the century. The climate agreed with him and he stayed to live.

Mr. Parker started cutting cedar for \$25 a month and built a ranching empire centered by the T-4 "hacienda" which has been described as an oasis in the undulating greasewood and cedar hills of Upton and Crockett counties.

Mr. Parker married at the home of his wife's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Ellis in Leesville Sept. 12, 1907. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1957.

The couple set up housekeeping in Ozona for the first two years of their marriage, then in October 1909 moved to their ranch home in western Crockett County about eight miles from Iraan.

Mr. Parker was employed on the JM spread (owned by Half Bros.) in 1902 working cattle and greasing windmills. That was when the ranch headquarters were located on what is now the Gilcrease lease on the Crockett-Upton County line. The ranch was 80 miles from one end to the other.

Mr. Parker recalled that roundup time began about September 1 and continued into February with the cowboys moving camp as branding and rounding up progressed.

After assuming duties as wagon boss Mr. Parker made three trips up the trail with herds to Portales, New Mexico where other JM outfits added their trail herds to be shipped by rail to Denver or Kansas City.

The JM outfit sold out in 1906 and Mr. Parker speculated in horses from 1906 to 1908.

His first purchase of land was 2 1/2 sections 12 miles east of the present ranch. Later he bought 7 1/2 sections from Ben Ingraham and added to this until the ranch comprised 28 sections.

Discovery of oil in the area came as no surprise to Mr. Parker. He had many times seen oil seeping from the banks to discolor the muddy waters of the Pecos River near the Red Barn Crossing on the Ira G. Yates spread.

Mr. Parker retired as president of the First State Bank in Rankin in 1955. He had served as a director of the bank for many years prior to becoming its president.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Parker were natives of Gonzales County.

He was born July 8, 1876, in Goliad.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Colton Parker of Raleigh, N. C. and Wendell Parker of Texon; two daughters, Mrs. Meda Johnston of San Miguel Allende, Mexico and Mrs. Worth Allen of Sterling City; one brother, T. W. Parker of San Angelo; one sister, Miss Ida J. Parker of San Antonio; 10 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Active pallbearers were Horace Blackburn, Walter McCarter, C. G. Montgomery, Elgy Watson and Leo Richardson, all of Iraan and Dunn Lowery of Rankin. Honorary pallbearers named were officers and directors of the First State Bank of Rankin and members of the Ranchers Wool & Mohair Assn. of Rankin.

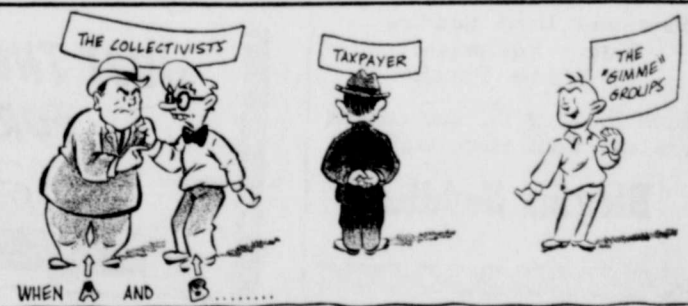
Barbecue Supper at McDonalds

A supper of barbecue chicken, beans, salads, hot bread, baked potatoes, cakes and ice tea or coffee was served to the group. Forty two persons were present.

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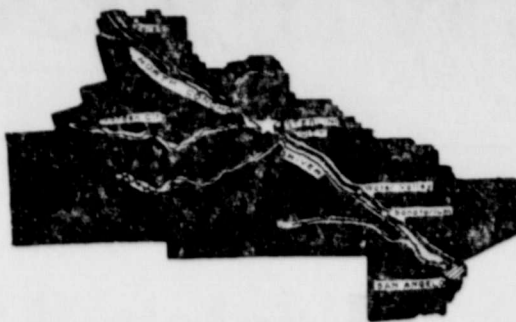

ELIGIBLE FOR SOCIAL
SECURITY**Over fifty million people
have worked long enough un-
der social security to qualify
for cash disability benefits if
they become disabled. This
means that they have social
security credits for five years
(20 quarters) out of the past
ten years. Floyd B. Ellington,
district manager of the San
Angelo Social Security office
said. In the case of a severe
disability, the worker and his
dependents may be eligible
for monthly cash social secur-
ity disability benefits if he
meets this work requirement.It is not necessary to be
completely helpless to qualify
for social security disability
benefits. These benefits are
payable to those who suffer
from a crippling disease or a
severe impairment which
makes them unable to do any
substantial work.Disabled adult sons and
daughters of retired, deceased,
or disabled workers may also
receive childhood disability
benefits if they become dis-
abled before they reached age
18.Anyone suffering a severe
disability which prevents him
from doing any substantial
work should get in touch with
the local social security office
to determine his eligibility un-
der the Social Security disa-
bility program, Ellington stat-
ed. He may be losing benefits
if he fails to apply for them
promptly. The social security
district office will explain to
disabled workers and their
families their rights under the

For a Beautiful Cake!

HEAVENLY frosting, delicately honey-flavored, and covered with frosty-white flaked coconut, makes a "beauty" out of the simplest of cakes! You can use bakers' cake layers; or you can make layers or a large loaf from a mix, or from your own favorite recipe.

Coconut Honey Frosting

2 egg whites; 1½ cups sugar; ½ teaspoon salt; ½ cup water; 2 tablespoons light corn syrup; 2 tablespoons honey; ½ teaspoon vanilla; ¼ cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, corn syrup, and honey in top of double boiler. Beat 1 minute until thoroughly mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating constantly with sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 5½ cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

Dr. Salk Coins A Word: Bionauts

"Super stars" of science will make up the research team of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies.

Dr. Jonas Salk, who will direct the Institute at San Diego, Calif., quite often draws analogies between sports and science.

He once said, modestly referring to his historic role in developing the polio vaccine, that "I just happened to be in the right place to catch a long forward pass."

Today he might select another sport and say that the Institute faculty members are the Mickey Mantles of science—they can hit home runs from either side of the plate. Dr. Salk points out that in recruiting his Institute Fellows he searched for and found versatile scientists "who have all been trained in a field other than that in which they are working today."

Varied Abilities

They possess more than one skill or field of knowledge. They are not limited to biology. Some of the 10 Fellows already appointed are equally at home in higher mathematics and physics, or history and literature.

This unique combination of professional skills, versatility, imagination and intellectual curiosity has been described by many as the magic formula needed today to achieve the conquest of disease—from the common cold to cancer. They believe firmly that an assault on disease of the kind and magnitude planned by Dr. Salk and his colleagues could pave the way to revolutionary breakthroughs.

Just as the Mickey Mantles depend on the baseball fans who pay their way through the turnstiles, construction of the Salk Institute will depend on contributions from the general public.

\$15 Million Goal

This summer all across the nation a campaign is in full swing to raise \$15,000,000 to build and equip the Institute. The drive is sponsored by The National Foundation through the March of Dimes. It is a renewal of the partnership between all Americans and Dr. Salk—the man who did so much for them in developing the polio vaccine, and will do so much more as director of the Institute.

As another way of describing the scientists who will work at

the Institute, Dr. Salk has coined the word "bionauts." "If we can speak of astronauts," he asks, "why can't we think of 'bionauts'—scientists who are capable of doing in biology what has now been done in the fields of space and of atomic physics?" He envisages the Salk Institute as a sort of launching pad for the gifted "bionauts" of the scientific world who will comprise his faculty.

The conditions under which the Salk Institute "bionauts" will pursue their studies are probably unique. The physical as well as the intellectual atmosphere of the Institute has been designed so that the individual scientist can concentrate fully on productive work and thought. Laboratory equipment will of course be the most modern. A highly specialized reference library on biology and related fields will be maintained. The whole environment is designed to spur the Institute Fellow toward daring and uninhibited original thinking on how to reach the goal he is seeking—faster.

Pioneering Projects

In most great universities and other research centers scientists are obliged to invest a great deal of their time in teaching and in administrative detail. There will be none of these time-consuming duties for the faculty of the Salk Institute. Its members will spend all of their time on pioneering projects. Moreover, they will have complete freedom to launch whatever projects they elect and may change the direction of their research if they wish.

Experts familiar with the scientific world and its leaders agree that the 10 Fellows se-

lected thus far are entering the stage of their most productive period. Their average age is 49 years but seven of the 10 are even younger.

Dr. Warren Weaver, vice president of the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation and a Salk Institute Nonresident Fellow who is often described as the "elder statesman of American medical research," is 67; but Dr. Melvin Cohn, a famed American biochemist now with the Pasteur Institute of Paris, and a Salk Institute Resident Fellow, is only 38.

A-Bomb Architect

Dr. Leo Szilard, long-time professor of biophysics at the University of Chicago and celebrated worldwide as one of the "architects of the atomic bomb," a Nonresident Fellow, is 63. But Dr. Edwin Lennox, an American microbiologist now also on leave at the Pasteur Institute, and a Resident Fellow, is only 41.

Dr. Jacob Bronowski, of London, a Resident Fellow who is well known in the United States for his books and lectures, is 54. His versatility is outstanding—in mathematics, philosophy and history.

Dr. Salk has remarked that the professional and cultural interests of the Fellows happily overlap. At a recent meeting of several of these scientists in New York City, they chatted with vivacity of organizing competing string quartets at the Salk Institute next year, of sailing and swimming in the Pacific, even of shooting a round of golf now and then. These "super stars" of science who may be expected soon to revolutionize biology and thus "help man make the most of his gift of life" are human beings, too.

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1963 ASC County Committee Election Results

Through this committee recommendations and adjustments, according to the county needs in the different programs, are made as necessary from time to time.

State Bar Column STOCKS AND BONDS

When you buy a share of stock you own an interest in every single thing a firm has; when you buy one of its bonds, you don't own any part of the company. The bond or debenture is merely a promise to pay. Suppose out of 1,000 shares outstanding, you own one share. Then you have an undivided one-thousandth share in the company, not in any particular thing but in every piece.

When you buy a bond, you own no part of the company. The firm promises to pay the loan back when the bond matures.

As a rule, bondholders have little say directly about the firm or how it picks its officers and manages its business. Of course, lenders exercise indirect influence since they must have confidence in the firm and its management before they will part with their money.

Bondholders get their interest before any stockholder gets his dividends; and should get a nickel.

Preferred stock, as a rule, yields fixed dividends before the common stockholders get anything, but preferred stock dividends are payable only if by the corporation.

As a rule, common stockholders risk more and therefore stand to make greater profit (or loss).

The legal invention of the entity called a corporation has made vast public investment in industry and commerce possible. By allowing anybody to buy in or to lend to the firm, a corporation has made large scale research, production, and marketing possible while each investor can study and decide where he wants to risk his capital.
