Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q I am a Korea veteran with GI term insurance which I took out several years ago. I understand I may exchange this old term policy for a new kind which costs less. Please give me the details.

A If your policy has the initials "RS" before its number, you may exchange it for a term policy with a premium two-thirds less in cost. This new type term gives the same protection, but cannot be renewed after age fifty. You may convert this policy to permanent type GI insurance at any time before the last renewal period runs out.

Q I served in Korea and am just now getting around to using my GI school privilege. I start school at the spring semester. Will I get a GI allowance check soon after I start school?

A You must expect to wait about two months after school starts before you receive your first check. VA is not allowed to pay you until after you have completed your first month of school, and it may take up to a month after that before your check arrives. Have enough money with you to tide you over the first two months.

Q May I take on the job training under the War Orphans Education program?

A No. The law limits War Orphans education to training conducted in a school, although a wide variety of school training is permitted. Job training is definitely prohibited.

3031 Pay Poll Tax Car Tags On Sale Feb 10

Tom Glover Tax Assessor and Collector announced this week that the final count on paid up poll tax on the last day of January with the 21 age exemptions totaled 3,031, as compared with 3,039 in 1956, the last presidential election year.

Mr. Glover stated there would probably be a thousand or more over age exemptions which would bring the total to more than 4,000 qualified voters.

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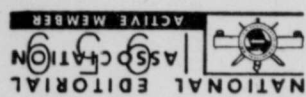

Women Play Key Role In 'Dimes' Research

Growing a killer virus in a laboratory test tube to see what makes it tick may not seem like an ideal pastime for women. Yet in recent years an increasing number of women have attained top-rank recognition as medical research scientists, many of them under grants supplied by The National Foundation with New March of Dimes funds.

The researches of these women have enlarged the body of new medical information and helped solve a wide variety of health problems. Not least among these was the conquest of a virus that killed and crippled its victims in wave after wave of epidemics—polio.

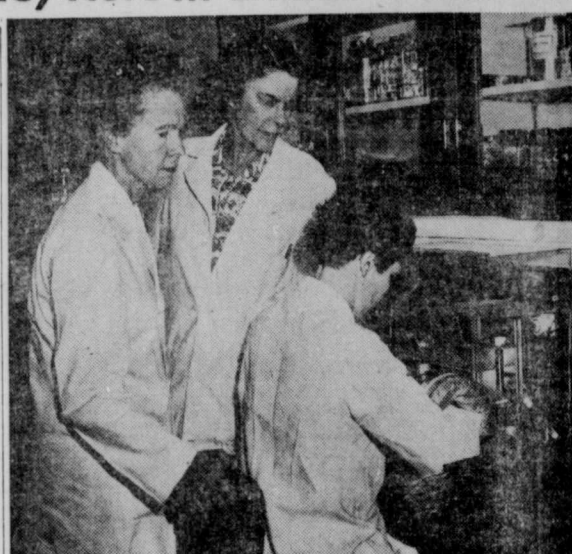
Pioneer in Protection
Dr. Isabel Morgan Mountain is one of the most famous of these women scientists. As a member of the Johns Hopkins research group some years ago, she won medical recognition for demonstrating that animals could be protected against polio by a vaccine. This was a giant step toward the development of the Salk vaccine for humans, which—like Dr. Mountain's work—was done under grants financed by the March of Dimes.

Dr. Mountain's parents, Dr. and Mrs. Thomas Hunt Morgan, were both well-known geneticists. Her father won a Nobel Prize in 1933 as the originator of the gene theory of heredity. Dr. Mountain, who is married to a prominent surgeon in New York, is included in the Polio Hall of Fame at the Georgia Warm Springs Foundation.

Until recently Dr. Mountain

has been collaborating with two other well-known women research scientists at Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons. They are Dr. Hattie Alexander and Dr. Katherine Sprunt, both notable for their work in contagious childhood diseases. The March of Dimes-supported grant under which Dr. Alexander and Dr. Sprunt work calls for studies in the possible control of the hereditary factors of polioviruses. The findings of this team have added new knowledge to the whole field of virus research.

At Yale University, Dr. Dorothy Horstmann has won fame for her researches in polio-virus, in epidemiology (the science of epidemic diseases) and in the newer viruses only recently discovered. She is on the research team of Dr. John Paul under a National Foundation grant.

Nun Studies Proteins
At St. Louis University, Sister Mary Celeste of the Order of the Immaculate Heart of Mary and a doctor of medicine, is involved in studying the role proteins may play in virus reproduction. Her research project, headed by Dr. Norman E. Melechen, one of the most advanced scientists in the virus field, is also financed by New March of Dimes funds.

Another woman scientist who can be found hard at work in a laboratory is Dr. Matilda Melnick, at Baylor University Medical School, Houston, Tex. She and her famous scientist

husband, Dr. Joseph L. Melnick, are conducting experimental studies in the Sabin live-virus anti-polio vaccine which, like the Salk vaccine, was developed under March of Dimes funds.

These projects are aimed primarily against three major crippling diseases: birth defects, arthritis and polio. But every new discovery made by these women and other scientists with New March of Dimes support adds to the great body of our medical knowledge and contributes to man's health and well-being.

MOTHERS' DOOR COUNT TOPS MARCH OF DIMES

The 1960 New March of Dimes campaign for funds to support research, patient aid and the training of experts in the three health areas of birth defects, arthritis and polio is climaxed by a Mothers' March of two million volunteers. The Marching Mothers are also conducting a nationwide "door count" at some 30 million homes to collect facts concerning the problems of crippling diseases in their communities. The local New March of Dimes office has also appealed to all donors who have not already done so to send in their contributions in the "mailer appeal" envelopes distributed at the beginning of the year.

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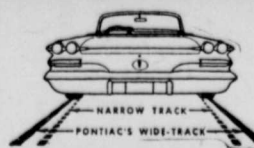
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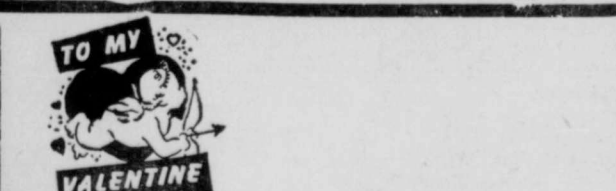

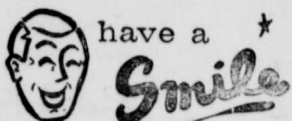

It is my desire to announce that I will be a candidate for the Legislature from the 91st district composed of Nolan, Fisher, and Mitchell Counties.

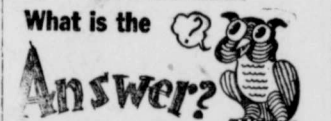

Alumni of Texas 4-H Activities Honored



Four former Texas 4-H Club members have been named state winners in the 4-H alumni recognition program for outstanding "post graduate" work in applying the principles and ideals of 4-H in their adult lives.

They are Roy B. Davis, 1901 29th st., Lubbock; Mrs. Woodrow Chervanka, Rt. 2, Rogers; A. W. Schaffner, Rt. 4, Cuero, and Mrs. Aaron McKinzie, Rt. 1, Dike.

Each received a burnished copper plaque donated by the Plant Food Division of the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corp. The program is conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Davis, manager of the Plains Co-op Mill in Lubbock, became a 4-H member in 1918 when his family had a 160-acre farm near Lamesa in Dawson county.

He continued his interest and activity in 4-H work when he became a county agricultural agent in 1927—serving successively in Gaines, Terry and Hale counties. Davis is still active in 4-H and other youth activity work and contributes considerable time and effort to further the various programs.

Mrs. Chervanka, wife of a farmer and mother of three children, was a 4-H member for three years as a girl. She is now adult leader of the East Bell County 4-H Club and is active in other community and civic affairs.

For her services she was named outstanding volunteer 4-H leader in the county in 1938. She is also a life member of the Rogers P-TA.

What makes a game-law violator?

That is one of the big questions puzzling some 200 Texas game wardens. Capt. E. M. Sprott, director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission, thinks that it is greed.

Some of it is just lack of consideration of other people. Other times it is some sort of perversion.

For instance, only recently a hunter in the cedar brakes near Austin saw a movement in the brush. He leveled his .30 caliber

rifle and shot a friend through the neck. The man had on a white shirt and the shooter thought it was a deer waving its white tail as it moved through the brush.

Both men were illegally hunting—out of season and trespassing. The landowner said that these men and others had practically cleaned out his pasture of deer and turkey on illegal forays.

A few months ago a game warden was sitting on a hill overlooking one of the Highland Lakes. He was glassing the area for illegal deer hunters.

He saw three men in a car trailing a boat a little used road to the lake. Occasionally he turned his glasses to watch them put their boat into the water.

Then to his astonishment, instead of taking fishing tackle from their car, they brought out "telephone" equipment. He watched them go out in their boat, drop the copper wires overboard and then gather up fish that had been shocked when they turned the magneto handle.

The warden used his radio to call another warden nearby and when the fake fishermen docked, the wardens were on hand to greet them. Two of the men said that they hadn't believed the "telephone" system would work and had gone along just for a ride. Anyway, they paid \$42 each in fines, and now they know how the device works.

Several years ago a fisherman walked into a stream with a charge of dynamite. He had

stripped off his clothes and had planned to plant the charge in a deep hole under a big rock, where he knew some fish made their homes.

Something slipped. The charge went off. He was blown to bits by the explosion.

Only recently a warden, working at night, caught a man and his wife and two boys. The man was jacklighting deer. When arrested he pleaded with the warden that he had a responsible position; he was a leader in one of the boy's groups in his church. He tried to talk the warden out of giving him a ticket.

But the warden also was a leader in a boy's group and active in his church, and he too had a good job.

This violator paid his fine. What the boys of his group think of him now is another question.

Another man, his wife and a friend, were patrolling a dark country lane at 2 o'clock in the morning. They had shot two fawns that weighed 14 pounds each.

Crowder, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: Suit for divorce, custody of children, and for injunction as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of its issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The officer executing this writ shall promptly serve the same according to requirements of law, and the mandates hereof, and make due return as the law directs.

When the warden arrived they tried to speed away. But they failed to make a sharp turn.

By the time the warden reached them their car was on fire, and all four wheels were spinning in the air. One man had been thrown out of the car. The man and his wife were pinned beneath the burning wreckage. Luckily the warden had a fire extinguisher and a radio.

One of the men went to jail when he couldn't pay his fine. The other man and the women spent several days in the hospital. The two fawns were even too small to provide meat for a charitable institution and had to be destroyed.

Violators will attempt to hide over-limits of birds in their hub caps. They'll lock their illegal kill in the trunks of their cars and then hide the keys.

Some of these violators are persons of high standing in their own communities. They would sit on a jury and give a bank robber a life sentence. But they would rob nature's bank of its most priceless possessions and then defy the law they otherwise uphold.

Again, the question, what makes a game-law violator? One thing that doesn't make a

game-law violator is for the young to be taught by their own parents to respect all laws.

They are taught not to shoot air rifles in towns where they are not supposed to.

They are told to get permission from the landowners before going through a fence with a .22 rifle.

They are told that guns can be useful, or they can be dangerous, depending upon their handling.

They are warned not to take more than their legal limits of game or fish.

They are taught to observe shooting hours, and not to shoot from highways.

When young people are taught these things by their parents they are not likely to grow up with a desire to "telephone" for fish, shoot fawns at night by the side of the road, or kill more than their limit of birds and try to hide them behind their hub caps.

Wardens also are helping to teach this lesson. One warden said recently that when he spent as many as three nights a week working with young people he felt that he was doing much more good than when he spent three nights a week patrolling some dark road to keep down

violations. Violators make the patrolling necessary—valuable hours he could have spent helping build better young men.

There will be violators for a long time—perhaps as long as we have fish and game. But

there is no reason why the number cannot be decreased every year.

You can help by reporting game-law violators the same as you would an escaped convict or a bank robber.

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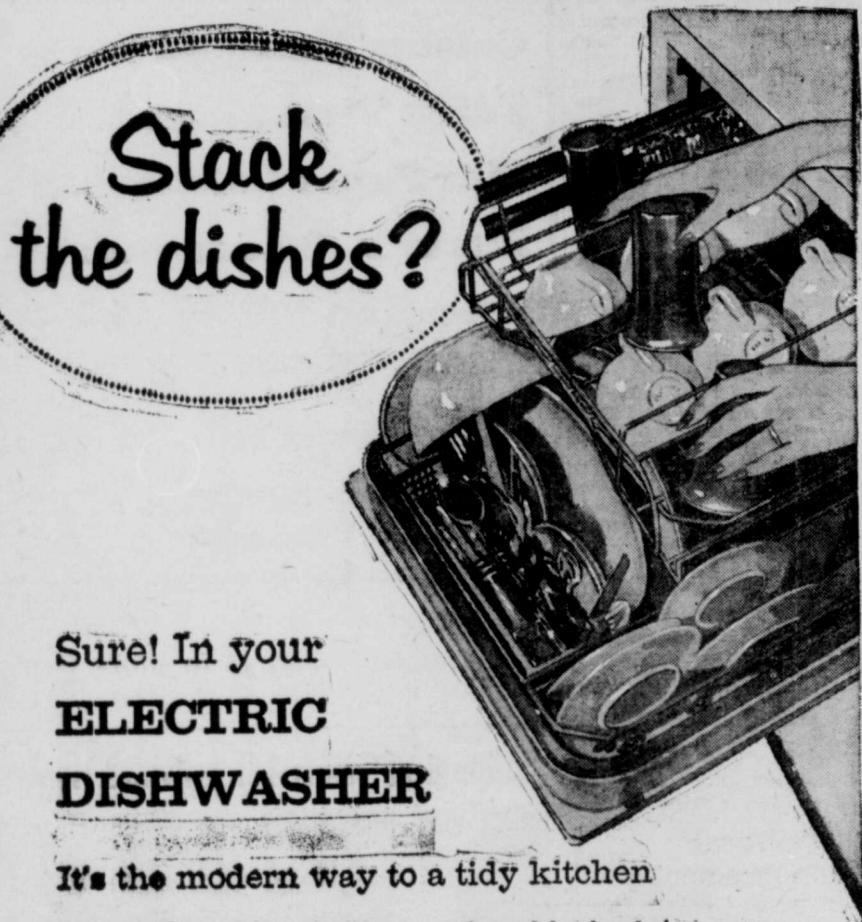
