## For Greater Hospital

TUESDAY, APRIL 2, the taxpayers of Artesia go to the polls to ballot on a \$90,000 bond issue. That bond issue, if voted, will be used to erect an addition on the present hospital.

Whether that addition is erected will depend on the attitude of the taxpayers of Artesia. The present hospital, operated by the Sisters, is owned and still under the control of the City of Artesia.

It cannot be sold or given to them to permit them to build the addition. The WPA contract under which it was erected with the aid of the federal government requires it remain in the possession of the city.

There are some things about the operation of the hospital The Advocate does not like and does not approve. The Advocate feels the hospital was erected and built for suffering humanity; that it belongs to the people; that it was constructed to serve them; and that it should serve them regardless of their beliefs, the beliefs of others or the doctor, whom they desire to consult or to call.

The Advocate firmly believes that the question of patients being admitted to the hospital is one to be decided solely by the Sisters and not by the doctors. After all, the Sisters have the hospital leased and are responsible for its operation. That practice is not observed now.

The Advocate believes that the laboratory facilities of the hospital should be open to patients of all doctors — after all, these patients are the owners of the hospital and it was built to serve them.

The Advocate is opposed to a "closed shop" in any business, any profession or any industry.

But The Advocate believes that the hospital bond issue is bigger than any one individual; any one institution; any one doctor, group of doctors; any citizen or group of citizens; any movement or any organization.

The Advocate knows that the addition to the hospital is needed, badly needed. It believes that it should be built in order to better serve suffering humanity; to save human lives; and to reduce human suffering.

The Advocate feels that the need for the addition to the hospital is the only thing, which should be considered at this time. Other matters can be given consideration, if that is desired, at a later time.

The Advocate feels that personal feelings, likes and dislikes; feelings regarding the "closed staff"; the objections to rules and regulations now imposed should be forgotten and that the community should give its full consideration to voting the bond issue for enlarging the hospital.

Now is the time to discuss the bond issue. Now is the time to approve the additional bonds for the construction of the addition to the hospital. Now is the time to build that addition to the hospital if the building materials can be secured.

Patients are now placed in halls — placed in the halls because there are not enough rooms. Patients are placed in rooms, which should not have to be used for patients.

Crowded conditions in the hospitals reduce efficiency; it reduces service; it makes for a bad situation.

Days and hours spent in hospitals are never the most pleasant. We can make them more pleasant by providing the rooms and space needed at the hospital here to accommodate the patients from Artesia and from the surrounding territory, which we serve.

The hospital has met a real need and filled a real place since its construction. But it was erected for a smaller city. We can make it serve a greater field; meet a greater need; fill a greater place by voting bonds for the construction of the needed addition to the present hospital.—O. E. P.

## Straighten That Hope Dip

THE WAR INTERRUPTED our efforts to have something done about the co-called Hope Dip west of Artesia, but the time has come to start digging again.

Our continued harping about the dangers involved in the combination S-curve and dip attracter some attention upstate a few years ago and we believe that had it not been for the war, the State Highway Department long ago would have eliminated the hazard.

Perhaps when the highway was built the dip within a curve did not constitute a danger point, for cars were much slower in those days. That fact is reflected also farther west on the highway, where turns are too tight for present-day travel—and they, too, should be eliminated.

But this is 1946, the war is over, more and more people are getting new tires, and speeds are bound to be increased. We, who live around here, know about the hazard and slow down to a great degree when we approach the Hope dip, but strangers knowing nothing about it find themselves fighting their way down and up and to right and then left without warning. And some have failed to make it!

Prior to the war, we drove back and forth over the place a number of times with a state official, whose car was equipped with a ball-bank indicator, such as is used on airplanes to indicate the proper amount of bank in turns.

On up-to-the-minute highways at that time, curves could be taken at 40 to 50 miles an hour without the ball in the indicator leveling zero. But that day when we tested out the Hope dip, as we recall, we could not drive faster than 10 miles an hour without the ball swinging off to one side.

That in itself constitutes a hazard, the fact that the curves are not properly banked. But on top of that is the fact that a driver, without previous warning, finds a deep dip in the middle of it.

Well, we've started it off again, and we're going to stay with it until the state does something about it. We want that Hope dip eliminated, straightened out, or otherwise made safe.—A. L. B.

## Keep 'Em Pinned Up

IT'S NEARLY GARDEN TIME AGAIN. And that means it's time to remind the people of Artesia that chickens and dogs have no place in other people's gardens, where they destroy or damage flowers, shrubs, and vegetables.

There is an ordinance providing that one's chickens must be kept penned up, which can be enforced and has been.

But it would be better if everyone were neighborly and saw to it that chickens and dogs do not molest others.

Judge J. D. Josey, city police judge, pointed out this week that already some complaints have been made about chickens scratching in neighbors' yards and dogs scratching and otherwise damaging shrubs, which are just starting to take on new life.

The judge has no desire to have in his court people guilty only of neglect in regard to their pets and chickens. But if complaints are signed and owners are hailed before him, and they are proven guilty, there is nothing left for him to do but to impose a penalty.

Let's all be neighborly this year, so we can enjoy our gardens, and so neighbors will not be glaring at each other in mute indignation.—A. L. B.

Remember when those workers contact you they are merely doing a job for all of us—a job, which is as much yours and mine as it is theirs. Give freely, quickly and be prepared when contacted.

## Consideration for Others

EVERY MAN HAS THE RIGHT, under our constitution, to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

We also believe that every man is entitled to work, earn his livelihood and live his life in this land of the free.

It is also the right of every individual to work or strike; labor or stop working.

But when the practices of groups reach the point where it interferes with the rights, liberty,

freedom and the pursuit of happiness of others—we believe it has gone too far.

When a group of individuals can halt the supply of electric lights; stop the water supply; deny little babies milk; prevent the delivery of necessary foods; and endanger the very normal life of individuals of cities, towns and villages of our nation—then we believe the rights of those being imposed upon are being taken from them.

And we also are firmly convinced that our government, the president, congress or even the supreme court is failing in protecting the rights of those, who in many instances have fought for the liberties, which we contend are those of every American.

In Chicago veterans, who returned from World War Two are being denied the right to operate taxis; in many cities over the land city employees have gone on strike; in New York they demanded a closed shop for city employees in violation of the state laws.

We have had automobile workers strike; farm machinery workers strikes; steel strikes; Western Union strikes; and now are threatened with a nationwide telephone strike.

And we say it is the right and privilege of every American to work or strike.

But the same constitution, which grants that right to every American also grants him the privilege of continuing to work and refusing to strike if that is his desire.

We are firmly convinced that the 'closed shop' is un-American. We are just as convinced the idea of a bargaining agency for employees unless those employees themselves desire this, is un-American.

And we are firmly convinced it is high time that the president and congress and even the supreme court, if that is necessary, grant the same rights and liberties and privileges to those, who desire to work as they grant to those, who don't want to work.

The government's position in these affairs should be one of representing the great majority of the American citizens rather than some organized group or some well organized industry.

Yes, every man has a right to work or to strike. But he should be guaranteed that right.

And citizens have a right to expect their government to see that they are given those things, which they are guaranteed under the constitution of the United States of America.

It is high time that the rights, privileges and liberties of the American people be given first place in Washington and that politics be relegated to the background as long as more important things are the order of the day.—O. E. P.

## Up and Down Main Street

FOR ARTESIA UP AND DOWN MAIN AND THE FUTURE

On April 2 the taxpaying voters of Artesia will go to the polls and cast their ballots on the question of the city issuing \$90,000 worth of bonds to build an addition to the municipal hospital. In other words they will ask the taxpayers whether they want to go in debt \$90,000 for an addition to the hospital. And the answer of the taxpayers will be made at the polls. Whether we build the addition to the hospital will be determined by the voters of Artesia. Many discussions have been held regarding the hospital. Many have argued the city which has leased the hospital should sell it or give it to the Sisters. Unfortunately that cannot be done under the contract under which it was built. The hospital was erected as a WPA project. That contract not only provides for the hospital to remain in the city's name but it also provides that the city maintain and keep control over it at all times. The contract with the Sisters points out this fact. The contract with the Sisters also provides for lease periods of five years with renewal privileges. It is possible for them to keep the hospital for 20 years under the contract but the lease periods are only for five years with renewal privileges. Contrary to many ideas, the Sisters must maintain the hospital, keep it in good condition and good repair. Any new facilities or equipment must be added by the Sisters. This remains their property and if the time ever comes and they surrender the lease — then the equipment they added belongs to them. We believe these words of explanation are needed and should be given that all may know the situation. Certainly the hospital is not as large as it needs to be; it is not large enough to accommodate Artesia patients and the territory, which it must serve. It needs to be enlarged.

**ORDINANCE NO. 90**  
AN ORDINANCE DECLARING THE NECESSITY FOR ISSUING WATER AND SEWER REVENUE REFUNDING AND EXTENSION BONDS OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO, IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$150,000, PAYABLE OUT OF THE NET INCOME TO BE DERIVED BY SAID CITY FROM THE OPERATION OF ITS MUNICIPALLY OWNED WATERWORKS AND SEWER SYSTEMS FOR THE PURPOSE OF REFUNDING \$33,500 OF OUTSTANDING WATER AND SEWER REVENUE BONDS AND OF MAKING NECESSARY IMPROVEMENTS AND EXTENSION TO SAID WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF SUCH BONDS, PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF AND THE INTEREST THEREON, AND OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ISSUANCE AND PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Artesia, Eddy County, New Mexico, owns and operates, and for many years has owned and operated, municipal water and sewer systems; and

WHEREAS, for the purpose of

improving and extending its sewer system by constructing and installing a sewage disposal plant and necessary appurtenances, the City heretofore issued its 3 1/2% Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds, dated September 1, 1940, \$33,500 of which, maturing in the years 1946 to 1960, inclusive, are outstanding and unpaid; and

WHEREAS, in order to effect a substantial saving of interest, the City Council deems it necessary and advisable to refinance, refund and pay said outstanding Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds, dated September 1, 1940; and

WHEREAS, in order to supply said City and its inhabitants with good and sufficient water and with proper and adequate sewer facilities, it is imperatively necessary to improve and extend its water and sewer systems; and

WHEREAS, the net income derived from the operation of said water and sewer systems may be pledged to the payment of the principal and interest on revenue bonds issued to refund outstanding bonds and to improve and extend said systems;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, EDDY COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That for the purpose

of protecting the public health, conserving the property and advancing the general welfare of the City of Artesia, Eddy County, New Mexico, and its inhabitants, it is hereby declared necessary that said City issue its revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$150,000, payable solely out of the net income to be derived from the operation of its water and sewer systems, and that said City pledge, irrevocably, such income to the payment of such bonds and interest thereon, the proceeds thereof to be used solely for the purpose of refunding \$33,500 of outstanding 3 1/2% Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds, dated September 1, 1940, and of making necessary improvements and extensions to the existing water and sewer systems.

Section 2. That to provide the funds for such refunding and to meet the cost of such improvements and extensions, bonds of the City of Artesia, to be known as Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding and Extension Bonds, are hereby authorized to be issued from time to time, or at one time, in the aggregate principal amount of \$150,000, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 57 of the Session Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1933, as amended, Chapter 185 of the Session Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1941, and any and all other acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be dated March 1, A. D. 1946, and shall mature on March 1st as follows: \$6,000 in each of the years 1947 to 1950, \$7,000 in each of the years 1951 to 1956, \$8,000 in each of the years 1957 to 1962, and \$9,000 each of the years 1963 to 1966, all numbers inclusive.

Bonds maturing in the year 1952 and thereafter shall be redeemable at the option of the City on any and every date after March 1, 1951, as follows: 2 1/2% of principal if paid between five and six years after date; 2% of principal if paid between six and seven years after date; 1 1/2% of principal if paid between seven and eight years after date; 1% of principal if paid between eight and nine years after date; 1/2% of principal if paid between nine and ten years after date; and at par on or any time after March 1, 1956; provided, however, that bonds called prior to maturity shall be paid in inverse numerical order, and provided further, that a notice of redemption of bonds prior to maturity shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in Denver, Colorado, and mailed to the original purchaser of said bonds thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for such redemption.

Bonds of said issuance maturing in the year 1947 to 1953, inclusive shall bear interest at the rate of 1 1/2% per annum, the remaining bonds of said issue shall bear interest at the rate of 2 1/2% per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st days of March and September in each year. Said bonds shall be in the denomination of \$1,000 each, numbered from 1 to 150, inclusive, shall be payable, principal and interest, in lawful money of the United States of America, at the office of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, shall be negotiable coupon bonds payable to bearer, and each of said bonds shall contain a recital that it is issued pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of New Mexico, and particularly under the terms and provisions of Chapter 57 of the Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1933, as amended, Chapter 185 of the Session Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1941, and any and all other acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto; shall be signed in the name of the City of Artesia, by the Mayor and attested by the City Clerk, with the seal of said City affixed thereto, and the interest coupons thereto attached shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the City Treasurer.

Section 4. That said bonds and coupons thereto attached, and each of them, shall be in substantially the following form:

and to pay interest thereon at the rate of 2 1/2% per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of March and the 1st day of September in each year, upon surrender of the annexed coupons, if they severally become due, and thereafter until this bond is paid. Both principal and interest on this bond is payable in lawful money of the United States of America, at the office of the City Treasurer, in Artesia, New Mexico.

(This bond is redeemable at the option of said City upon payment of principal, accrued interest and premiums as follows: 2 1/2% of principal if paid between five and six years after date; 2% of principal if paid between six and seven years after date; 1 1/2% of principal if paid between seven and eight years after date; 1% of principal if paid between eight and nine years after date; 1/2% of principal if paid between nine and ten years after date; and at par on or any time after March 1, 1956; provided, however, that bonds of this issue called for payment prior to maturity, shall be paid in inverse numerical order, after thirty days' notice of call, as provided in the ordinance hereinafter mentioned.)

Payment of this bond and interest thereon shall be made solely from and as security for such payment there is pledged a special fund created by Ordinance No. 90, adopted March 4th, 1946, and identified as the "Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding and Extension Bond Fund," into which the City of Artesia covenants to pay from the revenues to be derived from the operation of its entire waterworks and sewer systems, after provision only for all reasonable expenses of operation and maintenance, sums sufficient to discharge, when due, the principal of and interest on the bonds of the series of which this is one, and to create and maintain a reasonable reserve for such purpose. The City of Artesia, New Mexico, agrees with the holder of this bond and with each and every person who may become the holder hereof that it will keep and perform all the covenants of said ordinance, including its covenants against the sale or encumbrance of said systems, or any substantial part thereof, unless provision shall be made for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds of the series of which this is one, and maintain such rates for service to consumers that the income of said systems shall be sufficient to pay all operating expenses and other charges and the payments required by said ordinance.

It is expressly agreed that the holder of this bond may not look to any general or other funds of said City for the payment of principal or interest on this obligation, this bond being payable and collectable solely from the revenues to be derived from the operation of said waterworks and sewer systems, and from said Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding and Extension Bond Fund.

This bond is issued for the purpose of refunding outstanding Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds of said City and of improving and extending the waterworks and sewer system of the City of Artesia, and is issued under and in

strict compliance with Chapter 57 of the Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1933, as amended, Chapter 185 of the Session Laws of the State of New Mexico, 1941, and any and all other acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto.

It is hereby certified that all conditions, acts and things required by the Constitution and laws of the State of New Mexico, to exist, to have happened and to have been performed, precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, exist, have happened, and have been performed; and that this bond does not exceed any limitation prescribed by the constitution or laws of the State of New Mexico.

Section 5. Said water and sewer systems shall be operated for the purpose of this ordinance on a fiscal year basis, commencing on July 1st of each year and ending June 30th of the succeeding year.

Section 6. There is hereby created a special fund, to be known as the "Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding and Extension Bond Fund," into which shall be paid all income derived from the operation of said systems. So long as any of the principal or interest on any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding, the said Fund shall be administered as herein provided. Before any of the monies in such Fund are used for any other purpose in any month there shall be paid:

(1) The legitimate expenses of operation and the reasonable cost of maintaining said systems in good repair, including the expense of carrying adequate insurance thereupon.

(2) Into a bank account to be kept separate from all other accounts, there shall be deposited in approximately equal monthly installments during each fiscal year, amounts sufficient to meet the aggregate interest and principal requirements for such fiscal year of the bonds herein authorized.

(3) There shall be accumulated a "Reserve Fund" of \$10,000 which shall be used for the payment of interest on and principal of said bonds in the event said monthly deposits should be insufficient promptly to pay such interest and principal when due. The money in said Reserve Fund may be invested in direct obligations of the United States of America. Said Reserve Fund shall be maintained until the amount therein will pay in full all outstanding bonds of said issue and the interest thereon.

(4) After the accumulation of said Reserve Fund, any amounts remaining may be used to redeem said bonds prior to maturity, or for making necessary extensions to or improvements of said systems, or for such other purposes as may be directed by the City Council.

Section 7. That the City of Artesia, New Mexico, hereby covenants with the holders of any and all of the bonds authorized to be issued by this ordinance, that said City will fix and maintain such rates for the services rendered by said systems as will produce an income sufficient to pay and discharge all reasonable expenses of operation of said systems and the principal of and interest on said bonds, as and when the same become due and payable, and create a reasonable reserve as in this ordinance provided; that no free services rendered by such systems to the City of Artesia, or any department thereof, shall be paid for at the reasonable value of the

services so rendered and that the income derived shall be deemed to be income derived from the operation of the systems and be used and accounted for in the same manner as any other income derived from the operation of the systems.

Section 8. That bills rendered for water and sewer services shall be delinquent if not paid on or before the 10th day of the month following that in which the water or sewer service is furnished, and unless delinquent bills are paid within thirty days after becoming service shall be furnished by delinquent services shall be discontinued.

Section 9. If any legislative or any other body or commission shall ever lawfully prescribe a lower schedule of rates or charges than those contemplated by this ordinance, the payment of the interest on and the principal of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a first and prior charge on the revenues derived from said water and sewer systems, subject only to necessary minimum expenses of operation and maintenance.

Section 10. That nothing in this ordinance shall be construed in such manner as to prevent the issuance by the City of Artesia of additional bonds payable from the income derived from the operation of the systems; provided, however, that while any of the bonds authorized by this ordinance are outstanding the City of Artesia will not issue any additional bonds payable from the income of the systems and having a lien on such income on a parity with or superior to the lien of the bonds herein authorized; and provided, further, that so long as any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding, no additional bonds or other obligations pledging any portion of the revenues of the systems shall be issued unless the revenues thereof, for the fiscal year immediately preceding such issuance, shall have been equal, after the deduction of the reasonable expenses of operation and maintenance, to an amount not less than 150% of the total of the following:

(a) The amount necessary to pay the interest and principal requirements of the bonds herein authorized for the next ensuing fiscal year;

(b) The amount necessary to pay the interest for the next ensuing fiscal year on such proposed issue and a portion of the principal thereof to be determined by dividing the amount of such proposed issue by the number of years to the final maturity date thereof.

Section 11. That the City of Artesia will maintain the systems in good condition and operate the same in an efficient manner and at a reasonable cost. So long as any of the bonds authorized by this ordinance are outstanding the City of Artesia will maintain insurance on the systems in kind and amount as such would normally be carried by a private comp-

any engaged in a similar type of business, and will keep proper books of record and accounts, separate from all other records and accounts, in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the systems.

Section 12. That the bonds herein authorized shall be sold for cash, at not less than par, and when executed shall be delivered to Boettcher & Company of Denver, Colorado. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be deposited promptly in a separate account or accounts in a bank or banks which are members of the Federal Reserve System and of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and the City Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to deposit such proceeds in such bank or banks. Such proceeds shall be used solely for the purpose specified in this ordinance.

Section 13. That the holders of any of the bonds herein authorized, or the duly appointed representatives of such holders, shall have the right at all reasonable times to inspect the systems and all records, accounts and data of the City of Artesia relating thereto.

Section 14. That not more than thirty days after the close of each six months' period the City will furnish complete operating and income statements of said systems, in reasonable detail, covering such six months' period, and not more than sixty days after the close of each fiscal year, complete financial statements of the systems covering said fiscal year, such statements to be certified by a competent accountant. True and correct copies of such statements shall be promptly mailed to Boettcher & Company of Denver, Colorado.

Section 15. That so long as any of the bonds herein authorized are outstanding said City shall not mortgage, pledge or otherwise encumber the systems or any part thereof, shall not sell, lease or otherwise dispose of any substantial portion of the systems, and shall not issue any obligations for the payment of which the net revenues of the systems are pledged, except as in this ordinance provided.

Section 16. All costs and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance and payment of bonds and interest as provided by this ordinance shall be paid exclusively

from the revenues of and in no event shall costs or expenses be charged to the general tax levies of said City or to the City or some thereof.

Section 17. That if more sections or parts of this ordinance shall be declared void, forceable or invalid, the same shall not affect, invalidate or annul the provisions of this ordinance which are hereby declared valid, forceable and enforceable.

Section 18. All parts of ordinances heretofore or hereafter enacted to the extent only of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, which are in conflict with or part of any ordinance hereby repealed.

Section 19. This ordinance shall remain in force and effect until the City of Artesia, New Mexico, shall have adopted a new ordinance to the contrary.

Your public statement of Thursday leaves me no other course but to make public certain facts which you either do not know or refuse to reveal.

Our application to OPA for price increase on last July 20 was made while we were still at war with Japan. Since fighting had stopped in Europe, the War Production Board decided that limited production of automobiles was in the public interest. A total of 39,910 was fixed by WPB as the maximum number of passenger cars the Ford Motor Company could produce during the last six months of 1945.

Obviously you cannot make 39,910 cars in six months in a plant designed to produce more than 100,000 every month without greatly increasing production cost per unit. Low cost depends on volume production, as everyone knows. So when the Government — not the Ford Motor Company — fixed production volume it thus determined cost and selling price.

Let me give a specific example. We decided that 32,750 of the 39,910 automobiles permitted should be Fords. The rest were to be Mercurys and Lincolns. The limitation on quantity fixed our estimated cost on the most popular Ford model at \$991.57. The F. O. B. sales price, which included a 5 per cent profit and the usual dealer commission thus became \$1,388.20. This turned out to be 55 per cent more than our last peacetime selling price of \$895.

We immediately filed application on prices for these low-volume, high-cost, wartime cars under OPA's wartime general maximum price regulation.

This action had nothing whatever to do with peacetime price ceilings. It was not until early in September, after the end of the Japanese war, that OPA first issued any regulations having to do with peacetime price ceilings on automobiles.

May I add that I question the propriety of a government official's calling "outrageous" actions taken in strict accordance with wartime government regulations.

These facts illustrate the point I have been trying to make in my public statements — that high costs and high prices of automobiles are caused by low volume production.

Our one aim since V-J Day has been to get into maximum production as quickly as possible. We have spared no costs. We have paid higher prices for materials, we have used propane gas when we could not get coal, and we agreed to add \$41,000,000 to our annual bill for labor.

But our assembly lines have run by fits and starts because we could not get parts and materials. Actually, we were able during 1945 to produce only 34,439 Ford cars. Our costs per unit on this production have been almost exactly what we estimated for that small volume.

Have no fear that the Ford Motor Company will charge the American people one penny more than it has to for cars. If we did, competition would take care of such a situation very quickly.

For your information, Mr. Bowles, to meet competition we are now selling one of our truck models at \$100 below OPA price ceilings.

### 'Father' and 'Mother' Are Selected For New Mexico Boys Ranch Home

Selection of a ranch "father" and "mother" for the Flying BR, as the New Mexico Boys Ranch home will be called, was announced when A. E. Buck, president of the ranch organization, reported that the directors had unanimously agreed upon Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Jackson Gordon of Mountainair and had expressed the opinion that no better qualified "parents" could be obtained anywhere.

"It is essential that the heads of the ranch home be capable of handling all phases of the ranch home program," Buck said. "We shall build up gradually, and the Gordons are just the kind of people we had hoped to get. Their experience as home makers, first of all, then their extensive experience in farm and ranch management, education, work with boys (including two of their own), and many hobbies and a variety of skills has equipped them for what they, and we, regard as the most challenging opportunity a man and woman could have."

The Gordons were born in Oklahoma and both attended the University of Oklahoma and Texas Tech. He is 45 and she is 38 years old. Mrs. Gordon has specialized in home economics, wood working, weaving, painting and drawing, first aid, clay modeling, and household budgeting, and has somehow found time to acquire a knowledge of such ranch life skills as barbering and the repairing of electrical appliances. Her hobbies are flower culture, wood working, and designing. She is of medium height, with brown hair, blue eyes, "great energy and a fine sense of humor," Buck said.

Gordon, who is about six feet tall and muscular, has been foreman of a cattle ranch, inspector for the Cattle Raisers Association, Fort Worth; superintendent of schools for McKinley County, range examiner for the U.S. Forest Service in New Mexico, and for the last 10 years has been district conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, where he has distinguished himself in his work with hundreds of farmers and ranchers on conservation and production problems and with practical experience in pasture and livestock management, irrigation practices, and general crop culture and rotation.

He is also qualified to do carpentry, electrical wiring, plumbing, general designing, and construction, the ranch president declared. Gordon's hobbies are homing pigeon culture, horse training, bee culture and gardening, and he has long been recognized for his genius at getting along with people, Buck added.

Emphasis at the Flying BR will be on home living and home training, but there will be vocational and physical training along with home chores and farm and ranch duties, and Mr. and Mrs. Gordon

are well equipped to supply trained leadership in all phases of the program, Buck said. Their sons, in the Navy, will resume medical studies upon discharge.

Plans are in progress for drilling a well to insure an adequate supply of good water, and work will commence as soon as casing is obtained; then 100 of the 847 irrigable acres will be planted in grain and vegetables and the entire site fenced. The program calls for gradual development, Buck said, and the acreage in cultivation will give them something to do when they arrive. As soon as housing is obtained, immediate steps will be taken to establish boys in the ranch home.

"We have had the advantage of expert advice in all of our planning," Buck said. "We know exactly what we are going to do and how to do it, and we are rarin' to go. We continue to get letters from over the state asking us to take boys before it is too late, and we want to start up at the earliest possible moment. This program is for all of New Mexico, and there is desperate need for it."

The ranch site of 2000 acres is

on the east bank of the Rio Grande in Northern Sonora.

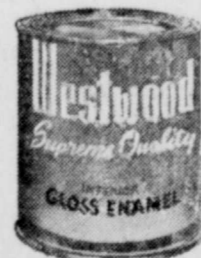

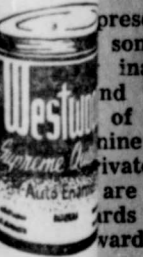
