CRUSHING HOUSE MAJORITY FOR BONUS

FDR to Treat Farming as National Problem

Opposition to the proposal to restore the old Oil Belt interscholastic league class A football district and enlarge it by one school is being voiced. Van Sickle, assistant coach, looked at the lineup proposed by the state league moguls and published in yesterday's Cisco Daily Press, and winched visibly. Compared with the Oil Belt district that Mr. Henderson and his satellites would set up, the Panhandle and East Texas districts would be beer and skittles, whatever beer and skittles happens to be. The champions of those favored areas would emerge from a normal schedule fresh for the inter-district wars, while the winner of the Oil Belt area would stagger out as battered and bruised as a pit bulldog in a battle royal.

The old district alignment might gain favor for sentimental reasons and, if other divisions were similarly treated to toughness and numbers, it would be fair. San Angelo would return to the fold. The Bobcats of the Concho in days gone were simply sparring mates for Abilene, Breckenridge, Cisco and Ranger. Occasionally they won a game, staging some stunning upsets. But things have changed. The Bobcats are the real article these days and their inclusion in the Oil Belt district would multiply the uncertainty and the hardship of getting out of the section as district champions. Cisco, on the other hand, has dropped to a position somewhat similar—only more so—to that originally occupied by the gridders of cemetery training.

But that is not all. The moguls would add Sweetwater. And Sweetwater is nobody's set-up. They whipped the devil out of our boys, as did San Angelo and Big Spring and sundry other teams whose memories are better forgotten than recalled here. And Sweetwater would further magnify the situation that San Angelo would complicate in the first place. No district in the state would offer so much of such high class competition. The winner of such a battle of the giants ought to be declared the state champion without being required to go through the bi-district, quarter- and semi-finals and final games to its bruising intra-district schedule. The rest of the state could play for second place.

Year in and year out Breckenridge, Abilene, Sweetwater, San Angelo and Brownwood would produce powerful teams. Each is a town with only one high school and sufficient material to produce consistently good elevens. In occasional years Cisco or Eastland or Ranger would pop up with a good team—wait until our grammar school boys grow up—and so one could always count upon six strong elevens for the race. What a district! What a program of high school championship football!

In contrast Greenville would be toying with Denton, Highland Park, McKinney and Sulphur Springs; Amarillo, Lubbock, Pampa and Big Spring would play a normal, if highly competitive schedule, with Borger and Plainview thrown in for "breathers," while most of the other areas would be even less burdened.

PRODUCTION CONTROL HELD TO BE ANSWER

100 Farm Leaders Are Gathered in Conference at Capital

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—President Roosevelt today asserted responsibility to treat farming as a national problem, and emphasized a determination for soil conservation and control of production as the answer to the farming situation since the death of AAA.

He rejected proposals to provide subsidies for exports. He proposed no specific plan, but gave notice of his intention to seek legislation on the subject at this session of congress.

Meanwhile Secretary Wallace told a hundred farm leaders gathered at Washington to consider a new farm plan. "We believe a program of using 50,000,000 surplus acres to serve the long-time welfare of the farmer, consumer and land," could be devised. He did not give his views on this method.

AAA Administrator Chester Davis indicated his personal preference for the program involving soil conservation, with the possible use of the domestic allotment plan.

4TH VICTIM IS REMOVED

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 10 (AP)—The fourth victim of a terrific gas explosion was dug from the wreckage of the town hall today. The body was that of Irvin Taylor, a tool-maker, who dropped his glasses in an abandoned cistern under the building last night, and had asked the town marshal, Garlano Bookbank, to help him hunt them. When the marshal lit a match the accumulated gas exploded.

Thirteen persons are known to have been injured.

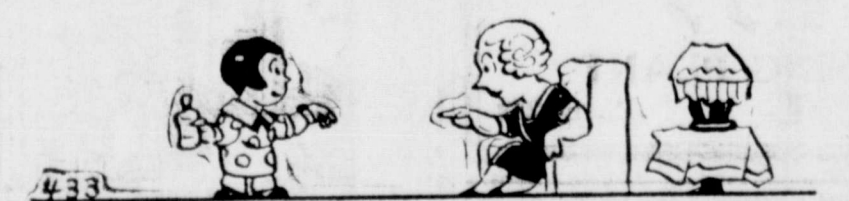

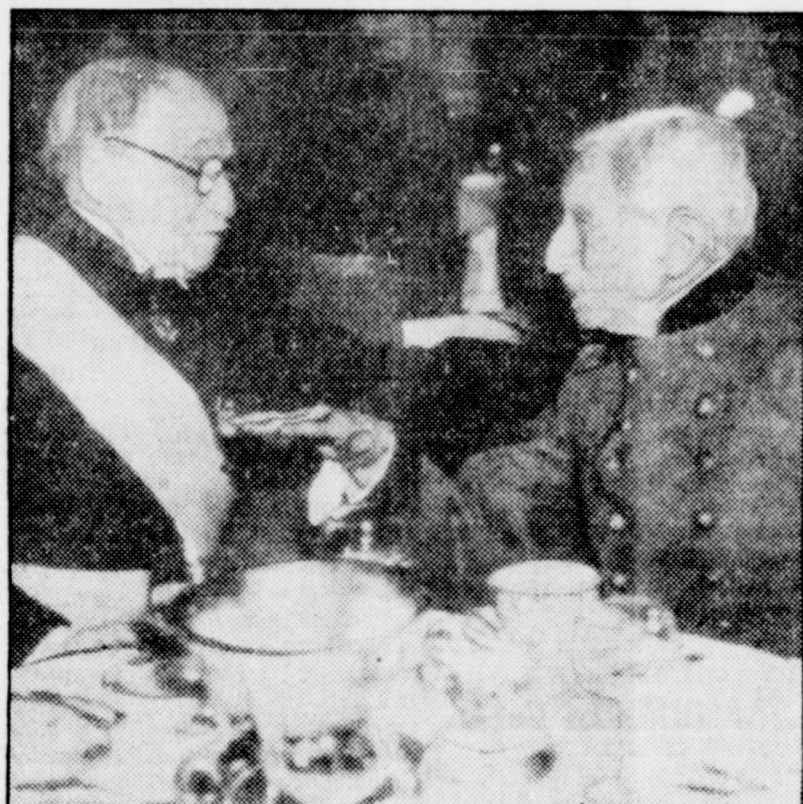

Famous Wonder Car, With 1001 Curious Things, Here Jan. 23rd

The Cisco chamber of commerce, in association with the parent-teacher association announce plans to bring the "World Wonder Car" here to Cisco, Thursday, January 23, 1936.

The largest traveling museum in the country, the World Wonder Car will appear on the streets of Cisco in front of the chamber of commerce, Thursday, January 23, with its strange cargo of over 1,001 exhibits of visual education. Arrangements for bringing the unique motorized exhibition to this City were completed last week by J. E. Spencer, Sec'y of the chamber of commerce through whose co-operation the Wonder Car will be opened to the public during its stay here.

Since leaving Washington, D. C., December 1, 1933, the Wonder Car has visited twenty-eight states besides Texas and has been officially greeted by governors of states visited. Christened by Dr. Charles G. Abbott of the national museum before leaving Washington, D. C., it has been viewed by hundreds of thousands of persons along its route.

EGYPT JOINS IN PROTESTS

(By Associated Press)

Egypt joined Ethiopia and Sweden today and decided to protest Italian bombings of cities and ambulance units on the battle fronts. It was announced that they would protest the bombing of the Egyptian Red Crescent ambulance unit, near Dagganbur, on the southern front.

Ethiopia announced that one Italian officer was killed, and several hundred Somalis slain in the first important clash along the Web river, on the southern front.

Twelve hundred troops left Rome for the front. An official communiqué said that aerial maneuvers along the northern front continued, scattering enemy groups.

Mid-Continent Is Happy in General Oil Price Raise

DALLAS, Jan. 10.—The entire Midcontinent rejoiced Thursday in a crude price raise, the first general advance since September, 1933, as Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Louisiana, Arkansas and New Mexico shared in the increase.

Most large purchasers and many smaller ones Thursday joined the price-raising movement initiated Wednesday by the Sun Oil company at Dallas. The Humble schedule, announced shortly after the Sun took the lead to break the long price deadlock, was followed in virtually all Texas areas save west Texas and New Mexico, where other majors continued to post a flat price instead of the new gravity schedule announced by the Jersey affiliate. Oklahoma and Kansas were given 10c boosts, with 5c to 15c increases in Arkansas and Louisiana.

Among companies hiking prices Thursday were the Magnolia Petroleum company, Atlantic Crude Oil Purchasing company, Texas company, Sinclair Prairie Oil company, Stanolind Crude Oil Purchasing company, Associated Pipe Line company, Shell Petroleum corporation, Carter Oil company, Tide Water Oil company, Bell Oil

PHILADELPHIA WINS DEMO CONVENTION

Party Off to Flying Start Toward Well-Stocked Chest

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—The democratic party was off today to a flying start toward a well-stocked campaign chest.

Complete returns from the Jackson day dinners were incomplete, but the treasury had \$200,000 cash from Philadelphia, which won the convention, starting June 23.

The Pennsylvania city, never before the scene of a democratic convention, won out over San Francisco and Chicago when its representatives finally waved a certified check for \$200,000. Then, to meet higher bids, Philadelphia concessions estimated to raise the total to between \$250,000 and \$300,000 were offered.

Party Chairman James A. Farley announced the national convention, intended to renominate President Roosevelt, would start June 23. The republican party will meet in Cleveland beginning June 9.

Before the bidding started, Farley, in opening the national committee's meeting, predicted a "campaign of defamation" financed by the "largest slush fund on record."

"Just remember as we go into the campaign," he told the delegates, "that Franklin D. Roosevelt is the hope of every man who suffers and the foe of every man who does wrong."

In presenting their case, Philadelphia's spokesmen stressed the fact that Independence Hall and

Claims Bodyguard of Senator Long Actual Assassin

BATON ROUGE, La., Jan. 10 (AP)—Dr. C. A. Weiss of Baton Rouge Thursday made public a letter he wrote Gov. O. K. Allen asserting that Senator Huey P. Long was not killed by the former's son, but in all probability by one of the late senator's bodyguards.

Dr. Weiss, who has kept silent since Long was shot in a corridor of the Louisiana Statehouse last Sept. 8, made public his letter denouncing what he said was an attempt by the governor and the latter's political associates to link the son with a conspiracy.

"You know as well as every thinking man and woman that these charges are without any foundation," Dr. Weiss told the governor. "... and are but political lies and propaganda uttered for political purposes and to add suffering to the family and friends of the dead."

Claims Son Assassinated

Dr. Weiss, who said Governor Allen had ignored his letter, wrote the chief executive that the latter well knew that Long was shot "as a result of a personal difficulty and that in all probability was not shot by my son, but by one of his own bodyguards."

The doctor said there was no doubt that his son had been "ruthlessly assassinated by hirelings of the state bureau of identification after being overpowered and disarmed by them."

Governor Allen could not be reached immediately for comment.

The doctor's son, Dr. Carl A. Weiss, an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, was felled with bullets from the guns of Long's bodyguards after he allegedly approached the senator in a corridor of the skyscraper capitol and fired point-blank at him after a brief verbal exchange.

4 AMENDMENTS ARE BEATEN DURING NIGHT

Surprise Move Places Proposal on Floor Today

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 10 (AP)—A crushing house majority passed and sent to the senate today a bill authorizing immediate cash payment of the bonus to nearly three and a half million war veterans. The immediate cost was estimated from one to two billion dollars.

The vote on the bonus bill was 355 to 59.

Chairman Pat Harrison of the senate finance committee promised prompt consideration.

Unless the pressure is too great, the committee considered it was likely to amend the measure, or vote out a less liberal one of its own, realizing that President Roosevelt is against the full payment now.

The legislation was steered past the amendment stage last night in a surprise move which brought grumbling in the house but assured of a quick vote today.

After five hours of debate had developed sharp disagreement over methods of payment—an important question but extraneous since the bill leaves it open—Chairman Doughton (D-NC) of the ways and means committee declined to stop work.

Instead, a roll call which Speaker Byrns described to reporters as "the damndest fool thing I ever heard of," was ordered to bring absent members back from the floor.

Four amendments were proposed. Two were beaten decisively, and two were ruled out of order. When the house adjourned long after dusk, the only motion pending before a vote was one by Representative Treadway (R-Mass) to return the bill to committee with instructions to write in a provision for paying the bonus with relief funds.

The house voted twice against Treadway's proposal in the form of an amendment, defeating it first on a standing vote 116 to 48 and again on a teller vote, 118 to 43.

Not so much as a single comma was changed as the measure stood tonight, with the powerful backing of three veterans' organizations.

It provides that veterans' adjusted service certificates should be payable at once, but offers a 3 per cent interest inducement, until 1945 to veterans who decline to cash them immediately.

Cancellation of any unpaid interest on loans on the certificates also is provided.

The understanding of most house members—including democrats

URGE GROWERS NOT TO 'DUMP' PEANUTS AFTER AAA RULING

Warning to peanut growers not to be hasty, after the adverse AAA supreme court decision, and dump peanuts on the market was sounded Tuesday by W. B. Starr, leading Eastland county farmer and a member of the former federal peanut control committee.

Starr reminded that sheller buyers had said that, in the event the processing taxes under the AAA were held unconstitutional, they would pay a \$1 per bushel for peanuts.

The supreme court ruling threw out the AAA "lock, stock and barrel," processing taxes included. Starr indicated that the shellers now have a golden opportunity to make good on their promise.

"But the act of 'dumping' the peanuts on the market would of itself cause lower prices," Starr pointed out. "Growers should proceed carefully and sell normally, if at all."

LINDBERGH'S TO RETURN

LLANDAFF, Wales, Jan. 9 (AP)—The Morgan home offered a welcome to the Lindberghs, but a spokesman announced that the Lindberghs intended to return to America before April.

He said there is "no question that they are remaining until after the Hauptmann case is disposed of and the publicity dies down. When they leave here they will go to London, South France, Sweden and return to the United States."

ward; west Texas and New Mexico, new base 75 cents for oil of 26 gravity and below, with increase of 2 cents for each degree up to 36 degrees, 95 cents for 36 gravity and above.

The new schedules of the Sun, announced by J. Edgar Pew of Philadelphia through the Dallas operating office, provide a 15 cent boost to \$1.15 for east Texas crude, a hike of 15 cents for Conroe on a gravity basis ranging

from \$1.24 to \$1.34 a barrel, a 10 cent increase on gulf coast grade B. On a gravity schedule ranging from 92 cents to \$1.22, and a flat raise of 10 cents on gulf coast grade A and crudes from Duval and Washington counties.

The Sun advance affects approximately 65,000 barrels of oil a day, J. G. Pew of the Dallas office said.

No Action

D. A. Little, president of Magnolia Petroleum company, said here his company had taken no action and he could not indicate when action would be taken.

Atlantic crude oil had taken no steps. It generally refers such questions to the Philadelphia office.

The price advance was the first general increase since September, 1933. The industry had been talking price increase for months without definite commitment.

J. Edgar Pew explained the price advance as "the first tangible benefit to oil producers by reason of the production control measures of the states and the coordination of these state measures under the interstate oil compact."

"The higher prices must be regarded as somewhat tentative," he said. "As their permanent maintenance will be contingent upon the effective administration of these measures. That effective administration will be accomplished only through the hearty cooperation of producers, purchasers, the state regulatory bodies, and the cooperating authorities under the interstate compact."

"One child—a daughter—was born to us. She lived till maturity, married, but later died in Houston. My first wife died November 14, 1930, and I was married the second time to Mrs. Pearl McManus, July 31, 1931.

"At the time of the cyclone I was living in the building between the J. B. Elder place and the Frank Walker home. That was one of the few residences that the storm did not damage. It stood through the big blow and is still standing. The wind moved our house about 25 feet, but did not damage the building. In fact we were using the old style kerosene lamp, which was on the center table, and the storm did not even extinguish the light. No dishes were broken, nor did the clock stop running. There was no jar of the building, it was just like the building had been gently moved on other foundations. Other buildings apparently as well-built as ours were wrecked.

"After the storm I came down town and found 31 persons had been killed. I helped to dig five of the Hickman children from under the debris of the building opposite the West Texas Utilities company's present location.

"A Mrs. Knight was another of the victims. A "2 by 4" piece of timber had pierced her body. She was not dead when we first found her, but expired in a few minutes after the timber was removed. She operated a millinery store a the time."

Mr. Rinehart has spent most of his time since coming here in the grocery business. His store, at the time of the cyclone, was across the street opposite the Red Front Drug store stand. The Christian church was on the lot now occupied by the Nance Motor Co.

NEW DEALERS FEARFUL FOR OTHER ACTS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 9 (AP)—Secretary Wallace Tuesday called a meeting of farm leaders for January 10 and 11 to confer on shaping a program to replace the Agricultural Adjustment administration, brought to a full stop today.

Many new dealers expressed belief that more of the New Deal is doomed. Fears were held for the social security act, the Guffey coal control act, and the Wagner labor relations act.

Results included: Possibility that new taxes would be recommended.

Talk of creation of 48 "little AAA's" or federal grants to farmers for "proper land use," or a quota system for crops to be sold domestically at government-guaranteed prices.

Some supporters asked for a constitutional amendment.

SPENCER IS RE-ELECTED C OF C SEC'Y

Re-election of J. E. Spencer as secretary and nomination of 14 business men from which the city commission will select seven directors to fill as many vacancies occurring on the board this year was the principal business of the regular meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce Tuesday night.

The financial report for the year showed that the chamber had expended a total of \$4,996.94. Allowance from the city, as proceeds from the two-mill tax voted for maintenance of the chamber is now \$392 per month, the board was informed.

Retiring directors are Dr. F. E. Clark, C. P. Cole, J. J. Collins, Dr. Charles Hale, Ed Huestis, W. H. LaRoque and J. B. Pratt.

Highway development constituted the chief item of last year's program, the oral report of Sec'y Spencer showed. Projects on which the chamber worked with uniform success included the relocation of Highway No. One over Eighth street through the city; the Leeray road; paving of a gap in Highway 23 north of Cisco, and paving of Highway 89, the No. One "cut-off" between Strawn Mountain and Weatherford.

Registered Pistols

INCLUSION of revolvers and pistols within the regulations requiring the maintenance of records of possession of firearms is urged by Attorney General Cummings, in his annual report to the congress. Under existing statutes machine guns, sawed-off shotguns and similar weapons must be registered, and the attorney general points out that since pistols and revolvers are commonly used by outlaws of every type they should also be brought within the regulations.

THIS would be, indeed, a tightening of the lines about the lawless elements of the country—if it could be made effective. The possession of firearms by thousands of persons in every state has long been a source of trouble for law enforcement agencies, and if the problem could be solved by requiring the registration of owners of deadly weapons the entire crime situation might be remedied.

IT has been found, however, that statutory regulation is distressingly ineffective. The present requirement that machine guns and similar weapons be registered seems not materially to have reduced the number of these guns actually in the hands of the outlaws of the country. A discouraging view of the proposal for requiring registration of pistols is supported by the record of efforts in this state to control the sale and possession of these weapons. Despite a law prohibiting their sale, pistols are bought and sold in practically every county and it is comparatively easy for anyone to secure one or more, and there are probably few households that do not possess at least one.

HONEST and law abiding citizens would offer little or no objection to a requirement that they register whatever weapons they might possess, as Attorney General Cummings suggests. A point of difficulty is that the outlaw was a law-abiding citizen before he armed himself with a weapon and used it in violation of the law. The country can not be disarmed by regulatory measures.—Brownwood Bulletin.

A Real Race Looming

PRESUMING that Allred will seek a second term, it appears the "traipsing" governor will have plenty of company in the

July democratic primaries. Even at this early day there is one avowed candidate, Senator Roy Standerford, of Belton, and two other tentative candidates. These are Senator W. K. Hopkins, of Gonzales, and speaker Coke Stephenson, of Junction. Both are prominently mentioned.

ROY SANDERFORD, who has definitely stated he will make the race, is a former lieutenant of former Gov. James E. Ferguson, and it is only natural to suppose that he will control the major portion of the Ferguson strength—whatever that may be. Also, Sanderford was manager for Charley McDonald in his race for governor in 1934. Sanderford expects, and doubtless will have, the support of McDonald, who, in addition to his political strength developed in the last campaign, is one of the strongest and most dangerous opponents any candidate ever had. McDonald is known as the most forceful and most resourceful campaign speakers in Texas, as was developed in his support of the winning campaigns of the Fergusons in other years.

COKE STEPHENSON, present speaker of the house, has made many political friends while presiding over that body. He has shown himself capable, a square shooter, and able to take care of himself in a campaign.

SENATOR HOPKINS, should the rumor prove true and he enters the race, will have to be reckoned with. He is one of the strong members of the senate, and has lost no political prestige by reason of being a member of that body.

HE comes from a thickly populated section of Texas, a section largely dominated by German-American voters, who will be found lined up pretty strong for him. In fact, with the exception of that strength that always has, and will be expected to support the man Ferguson endorses, they will support Hopkins.

THESE are only a few of the names that have been mentioned as probable candidates to oppose the present incumbent, but there will doubtless be many others.

WHILE it is admitted that Governor Allred will have plenty of company in this race, yet it will be a horse-race, and neither of his opponents may expect a walk-away.

BESIDES this being his first term, Allred has other credits to his administration that will not hurt his candidacy. About the most serious charges brought against him so far is his junketing trips away from the state.

DEFENDING these junkets the Fort Worth Press of Thursday editorially said that Allred's advertising Texas and the centennial at the Rose Bowl "could not have been procured by a centennial press agency for a year's salary paid the governor."

THEREFORE, the Fort Worth Press believes Allred was serving Texas and the centennial more efficiently while away at the Rose Bowl than would have been possible had he remained at home, as the Texas governor proved to be a better drawing card on the gridiron than any other feature, except the two football teams. He was frequently interviewed, and never failed to boost Texas and her centennial. The same was true of his radio broadcasts between the halves of the game, and the same may be said of his address at the Jackson Day dinner in Nashville, where he made the principal address.

AS the Fort Worth paper says, he is one of the younger men of the nation that seems to have succeeded, or these invitations would not be extended to him. The Daily Press, while not now committed to any candidate, is free to state that Texas' young executive has lost no political grounds by his junketing trips away from his official duties. He has made so much better governor than many believed, that many who never voted for him before, will be found fighting under his banner in the coming primaries.

BUT there will no doubt be a real "hoss" race on the democratic turf in Texas next summer.

New Tests Are Being Spudded In Shackelford

ABILENE, Texas, Jan. 10.—A. Eppenhauer of Fort Worth spudded Thursday his No. 1 J. P. Morris in western Shackelford county as an offset to the Ray & Stanforth No. 1 J. P. Vickers, north extension well to the Mims Bluff Creek pool. It is an east offset test to go to 1,600 feet, being located 220 feet from the south and west lines of the northeast quarter of section 207, ETRR survey, three miles southeast of Lueders. Extension to the Mims pool given by the completion of the Vickers well was followed by two more tests drilled north in a line. The east completion, the Ray & Stanforth No. 3 Vickers, was drilled through eight feet of Bluff Creek sand into water and was plugged back over the week end to 1,587.1-2 feet. Sand was topped at 1,582 feet.

Discovery of the good producing possibilities of the pool came with the completion of the Charter Oil & Gas company No. 5 Mims for 337 barrels. Charter No. 3 Mims was deepened last week from 1,598 to 1,603 feet without increase, and was plugged back to 1,596 feet. It was completed in July at approximately 50 barrels. It is in the south half of section 207.

Some came back onto the floor with their coats on and carrying their hats. Many grumbled the unexpected move by which the bill was considered for amendment and at least two exchanged remarks about a "dirty trick."

The first amendment, suggested by Representative Fish (R-NY) would have used the \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund in the treasury for bonus payment. Representative Blanton (D-Tex), presiding, declared it was out of order.

Treadway then made his proposal for payment from relief funds, only to have it go down to defeat by votes divided almost strictly along democratic and republican lines. Representative Whittington (D-Miss) had a similar proposal which lost on a voice vote.

The fourth proposed amendment to forbid federal agencies to cut veterans receiving the bonus from relief rolls, was offered by Representative Marcantonio (R-NY) and that, too, was held not germane.

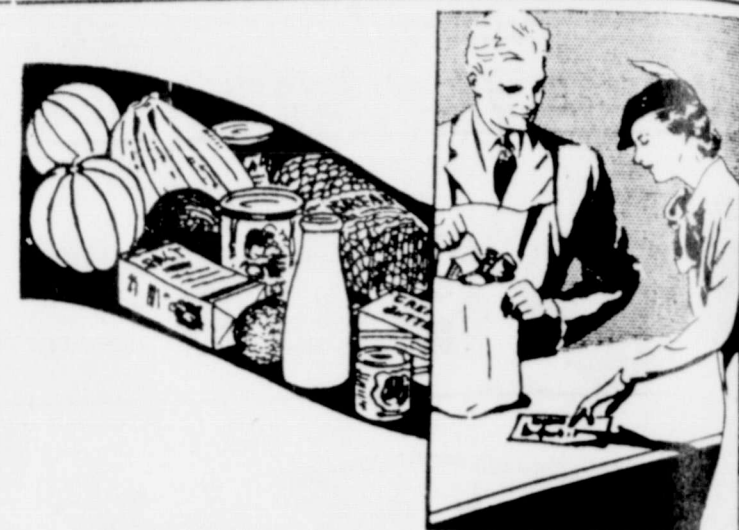
