TAX REDUCTIONS
NOW PREDICTEDBUT IN BOTH TAKES AND
PUBLIC DEBT LOOM FOR
COMING YEAR(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Reduction of both taxes and the public debt are expected to be included in the next session of congress at the next session.

While treasury officials declined today to discuss the details of the proposed recommendations they will attempt to strike a compromise between the departments for both heavy debt retirement and a substantial tax reduction.

The statement from the White House yesterday that President Coolidge regarded retirement of the public debt as of prime importance has dampened the hopes of those who had expected a big slash in taxes. Supporters of debt retirement, however, do not expect to stop at the pace reached in the last fiscal year when the debt was reduced \$1,121,369,383 by application of the entire surplus.

At the same time, they hope to bring the revenue this year above the normal reduction of approximately \$7,000,000 that will accrue from the two permanent sources of debt retirement, and sinking fund and foreign debt payments.

The debt had been reduced from a peak in 1915 of approximately \$15,511,000,000 to approximately \$11,511,000,000 at the end of the last fiscal year. Four times during this period the billion dollar mark, in 1912, 1924 and 1927, but in the other years only normal reductions were made.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 5.—A beauty compact and a few undergarments are not the only things that a girl who has learned from childhood what it means to assume her share of life's responsibilities and to know that humanity pays each and everything it gets, is far less likely to fall by the wayside than the feminine drone, who because of a majority of feminine misdeeds.

So says Minnie Barton, founder of the unique open-door primary here, in which she is a constant reminder to "serve a sentence" for wrongdoing. She calls this haven of any and all upon whom fortune has frowned, "the woman's training home." But her work does not end with offenders. She finds room, even if it is only a place on the bulletin board, for any needy woman in time.

The home was established with a very small beginning to work out her life dream—the dream of saving feminine wayfarers. The inmates are women prisoners, for the most part, released by the court to "Mother" Barton merely on her word to return them at any specified time on their simple promise of good behavior. She assumes the responsibility of "mothering" them.

Another Cause—Lack of Training
Along side of love and finery, says "Mother" Barton, "I place lack of training in the ways to earn an honest living as a chief cause for many many women deviating from the straight and narrow."

If ever there were a time when parents should look to their laurels in training their progeny—girls as well as boys—to be self-supporting and independent of the favor or

can call them—even for a night's rest. There are women whose hurt hearts ache far more sorely than their feet.
Constructive good immeasurable has been achieved in this one building. Its friendly beacon shines afar and Minnie Barton goes on proving there is another way beside fall by high to convert feminine drones and unfortunate into self-respecting, capable citizens.

RAISE FRENCH DUTY

Charges On French Imported Goods Raised To Meet High Levies Placed On U. S. Products.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—The treasury took an expected hand in the Franco-American tariff debate today with the announcement that customs collectors had been directed to impose on a list of French imports increases in duty equal to the increases fixed by France on some American products on September 6. The department said its action was a routine matter and did not involve Section 317 of the tariff act, which provides for retaliatory duties in case of tariff discriminations against the United States, but was taken under special supervision tariff rules.

Inquiry at the state department where the American reply to the last French tariff still is in preparation, with hopes that a means of adjusting the situation created by French tariff discriminations might have been found, developed that the diplomatic branch of the government did not know of the treasury action until after public announcement had been made. What effect the treasury's course may have on the diplomatic negotiations no official cared to say.

Mr. Friend perfected the machine last winter. They are now being manufactured by a Quincy, Ill. firm and Mr. Friend expects to have a score or more of them for delivery by November 1. Orders are coming from many sections of the state, he said.

The first sample machine was made by W. R. Boone of the Lubbock Iron Works.

Lake Charles and Corpus Christi Share Extension of Steamboat Line

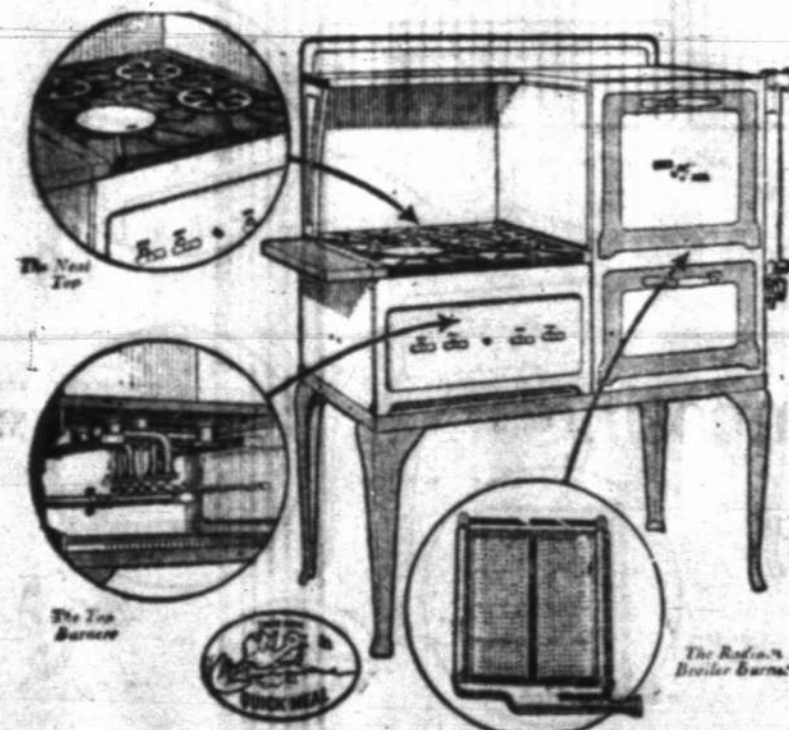

One of the suspects, said to be wanted in half a dozen states on charges ranging from postoffice robbery to murder, was identified as the man who stood in the door of the Stockyards National Bank as a sentinel while three companions attempted the robbery inside. He was identified by a young man who attempted to enter the bank and was ordered back by the bandit at the door.

Further in the day it was stated that four salesman, known criminals were being sought in connection with the Plano holdup and the robbery of a bank at Pampa. The men are said to have left Dallas recently and descriptions of them have been sent officers in many Texas and Oklahoma towns.

A. G. Hubbard of Lamar County Is Claimed by Death Early Wednesday Evening

PARIS, Tex., Oct. 5. (AP)—A. G. Hubbard, widely known Lamar county farmer and banker died here tonight at 8:45 o'clock.

Mr. Hubbard, who was 75 years old, was the father of 10 children, all of whom are living. Among them is Robert M. Hubbard of New Boston, Tex., former chairman of the State Highway commission, and at present president of the Texas Highway association.

Besides Robert M. Hubbard of New Boston, Mr. Hubbard is survived by Thomas A. Hubbard of Paris, Mrs. Craver Brouette of New Orleans, wife of the French consul at New Orleans, Mrs. Mary Meyer of Paris, Mrs. Frank Bailey of Port Worth, Mrs. Dudley McReynolds of Wichita Falls and 15 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

FOUR CITIES SEEK REPUBLICAN MEET

CLEVELAND, SAN FRANCISCO, MINNEAPOLIS AND DETROIT WAT GATHERING

(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP)—Sentiment among republican national committeemen as to the meeting place of the 1928 national convention appears now to be divided among four cities: Cleveland, San Francisco, Minneapolis and Detroit.

Chairman Duties announced today after further conferences with his associates that the national committee would meet here December 6—the day after congress convenes—to make the final selection.

He expressed no preference, however, as between the many cities seeking the gathering.

The chairman's announcement came after nearly a score of the national committeemen had been the guests of President Coolidge at the White House breakfast. They said afterwards that neither the meeting place of the convention nor any other political subject had been discussed with the president. In selecting the convention city, the committee will depart from the usual practice of naming a city-committee to consider the various offers from interested cities. Instead, Secretary Roy O. West will write to the parties interested asking for a statement of the facts for the guidance of the national committee.

By meeting here in December, the republicans will fix their meeting place just a month in advance of the election. The national committee of that party is to gather in Washington January 8 to make their selection from upward of half a dozen communities.

BRITISH TANK SHIP IS FINALLY PRIED LOOSE

GALVESTON, Oct. 5. (AP)—After having been hard aground for two days in the Houston ship channel, the British tank ship, DeLaware, was floated early Wednesday. Part of her cargo of crude oil had to be removed before the ship was freed. A survey of damage was made here and the vessel then proceeded to the United Kingdom. Three tug boats worked about 12 hours in vain to float the ship and it finally was decided to lighten the cargo.

The Columbus, O. Chamber of Commerce, extended that city's bid for the 1931 convention by telegram to Secretary Frank Morrison.

The support of an international chain of radio broadcasting stations, maintained by labor, was proposed in a resolution that was put to a vote.

Repeal of the Sherman Anti-Trust law on the ground that it had been found to be of no essential value in suppressing combinations and the passage of the house anti-monopoly bill, was asked to be endorsed in a resolution of the seamen's international union.

NORTHERN MEXICO STATES PEACEFUL

GROUND FORMERLY WHERE REBELLIONS SETTLED IS NOT AFFECTED

(By Associated Press)

EL PASO, Oct. 5. (AP)—What is generally considered the most comprehensive revolution in Mexico since the De La Huerta uprising during the Obregon regime, apparently has spent its force without affecting the northern states of the Republic where successful movements have usually been fought out.

With the execution of General Serrano and his comrades and the fact that General Gomez has but a small force with him, those conversant with Mexican affairs believe that the rebellious movement had been quelled.

The state of Chihuahua, in which most Mexican revolutionary movements have been bitterly contested, has remained peaceful and reports from other border states indicate they are quiet.

The only effect of the movement at the present time seems to be that of leaving former President Obregon as the only candidate for the presidency which will be held next year to select a successor to President Calles.

Generals Serrano and Gomez both had announced their candidacy and a bitter campaign was under way when the uprising took place.

While censorship had been established by the government, observers have noted that all important developments in the revolt have been announced with reasonable promptness by Calles officials.

PEAK CLIMBER LOST

Fear New York Adventurer Fell Over Precipice During Storm

LEADVILLE, Colo., Oct. 5. (AP)—Although searching parties continued their hunt today for R. E. Matthes, New York mountaineer, who had been missing since last Sunday when he started to climb Mount Elbert near here, it is believed by many who have been assisting in the search that he stumbled over a 500 foot precipice in a blinding snowstorm.

Searchers yesterday found Matthes' footprints in the snow. The trail of the missing mountaineer climber led directly to the brink of the sheer drop.

Serrano, another presidential candidate, executed by the Calles forces in the state of Morelos with 13 of his men, was a near relative of Senora Maria, and until Obregon entered the presidential race, a close friend of her husband.

Several of the 13 who faced the firing squad with Serrano, an ex-minister of war himself, came of prominent Sonora families, with relatives here and immediately across the border. Among these latter there was a subdued mourning—subdued because of the iron hand of General Pablo Marcha, new federal commander of the district. He announced that conscription lines into Mexico had been lifted.

Meeting in Ten States.

From nine states came circumstances of the spread of the uprising against the Calles government, and from a tenth—Chihuahua—the unconfirmed report of a

munity in the federal ranks.

The nine states where the revolt is reported open or incipient are: Vera Cruz, Morelos, Oaxaca, Puebla, Michoacan, Jalisco, Eastern Chihuahua, Sinaloa and Nayarit.

Jalisco, particularly, was painted as honey-combed with revolt. In this state battles, skirmishes or the execution of captured enemies of the government were reported from Atotonilco, Potosucelo, Zapotlan, Ameca and Las Cruces.

At Potosucelo, federal reported 18 revolutionists killed and 52 wounded.

General Lucas Gonzales, commander of federal troops in the southern Zacatecas district, who has been long in the field against the Yaqui opponents of the Calles regime, has left his post without leave and is listed in official quarters as among those hostile to President Calles.

Obregon circles in Nogales, Sonora, asserted that General Obregon had pledged the full weight of his influence in support of President Calles in crushing any revolt.

FEDERAL TROOPS CLOSE IN ON REBELS

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 5. (AP)—Two federal columns, which are pursuing the two rebel forces under Gomez and Almada in the state of Vera Cruz, are very close to the enemy, General Alvarez, chief of the presidential staff, announced in a statement this evening. A battle between the loyal troops and the rebels was expected soon.

STUDY MEXICO TANGLE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP)—Dwight W. Morrow, new ambassador to Mexico, conferred today with both Secretary Kellogg and Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, who announced that his attitude on the Morrow confirmation would be guided largely by the policy of the government which he is to carry out.

The meeting between the new ambassador and the secretary of state was the first of a number for a general study of the whole Mexican problem before the early departure of Mr. Morrow for his first diplomatic post at Mexico City.

TEXAS FRAUD CHARGES

Fort Worth Oil Corporations Must Face Charge of Using Mails Illegally

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP)—Postmaster General New today issued a fraud order against the Christmas Oil Corporation, Christmas Consolidated Oil Corporation, the International Exchange, Burton Christmas, and A. J. Burton, at Fort Worth, Texas, for illegally using the mails in connection with oil schemes.

The outstanding false and fraudulent pretenses and representations in the Christmas scheme, said Solicitor H. J. Donnelly in his report "are those relating to Christmas' ability, experience and success as an oil operator and geologist; the value in locating oil wells of the so-called geo-physically instrument and so-called 5 or 6 or 7 producing oil wells pouring liquid profits into the coffers of the Christmas Oil Corporation." The evidence shows that the representation respecting these three most material matters were knowingly false and fraudulent when made.

Abyssinians Take
Their Medicine In
Quart Quantities

BERLIN, Oct. 5.—Abyssinians are like many old-fashioned white folks—they place unlimited faith in large doses of medicine when they are ill—says Walter Zahn, the only druggist in Addis Ababa. He is here on vacation after thirteen years of residence in the Abyssinian capital.

Empty champagne magnums are much esteemed in dispensing drugs, because the natives are firm believers in quantity and size where medicaments are concerned, he relates.

Zahn has had some strange experiences during his long stay in Abyssinia. Once a Galla, native from the backwoods came to consult him, put down a coin and asked him to smile. Involuntarily Zahn did so, whereupon the Galla expressed huge delight, for he had been told in his village that the great medicine man had needed to see a man who had teeth of gold, and his quest, required, seemed to him to be the most direct way to make sure he had got to the right man.

In general, Zahn regards Abyssinians as a marvellously healthy race.

"Once," he tells, "I served as an old woman with an internal draught and a poisonous disinfectant for external use. The patient drank the disinfectant and applied the other medicine externally, and, strange to say, she was cured of both complaints and sang songs of praise outside my pharmacy to show her gratitude."

**FRENCH REQUEST
NEW AMBASSADOR**

PARIS, Oct. 5 (AP)—M. Briand, foreign minister, sent instructions tonight to Jean Herbert, French ambassador at Moscow, to inform the authorities that the French government no longer considered Christian Rakovsky persona grata as an envoy and desired that a new Soviet ambassador be sent to Paris.

The recall of M. Rakovsky, Soviet ambassador to France, by the Moscow government, has been expected for several days. Owing to the delay and because of reported interviews which the French minister was having with Maxim Litvinoff, vice foreign minister at Moscow, the French government decided to press its wish for the appointment of a new Soviet ambassador.

Rakovsky has been charged with having advocated a revolution by the Workers of the World and with inciting the troops to rise against all capitalist government. The French cabinet, at a meeting at Rambouillet a few days ago decided to request Moscow to appoint a new ambassador, but disclaimed any desire for a break with Russia.

**USE DOGS IN WAR
ON SMUGGLERS**

PARIS.—As a result of the tobacco smuggling activities along the Franco-Belgian frontier, dogs are parrying on the war between official and law-breakers.

In Belgium, where there is no state control, a pound of tobacco can be bought for about 20 cents. But in France, the state monopoly has pushed the price up to 11.25, leaving a 11 cent profit for the smuggler who can get his contraband across the border.

Most of the smugglers have carefully trained dogs which they take into Belgium. At night, they strap a few pounds of tobacco on each dog's back, and tell them to go home. Customs officials, to combat this practice, have trained dogs to catch these law-breakers. The animals always battle to the death, the smugglers often winning the fight because they are equipped with spiked armor.

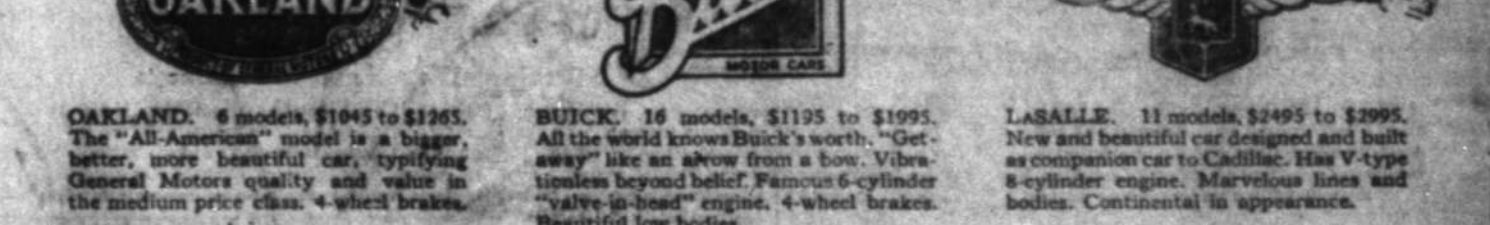

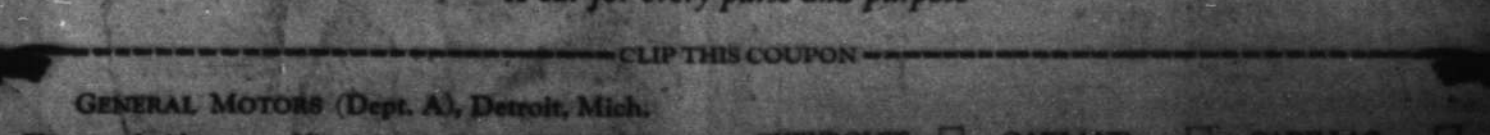

It was recently announced by Dr. Carl C. Hister, the author.

Dr. Hister, who is professor of history in Simmons University here, is a native West Texan, and has studied for years the history of this section. Final acceptance of his volume came recently with a written contract from the Arthur H. Clark Co., of Cleveland, Ohio, exclusive publishers of high grade historical books.

7,000 Head Cattle In Highlands For North Feed Lots

(Special To The Avalanche)
ALPINE, Oct. 5.—With two or three of the biggest herds of the section yet to bid on the Cattle Raisers and Producers Commission company, co-operative marketers, have already contracted for 7,000 head of highland cattle which will go to northern feed lots, according to C. H. Denman, president of the company.

The best judges and appraisers of the North are being brought here this year by the Producers company to look over highland cattle with a view of mixing it with California buyers who have heretofore been getting the cream of the fat stuff, it was stated. Heretofore the Cattle and Coker ranches, the biggest shippers of this section, have sent practically all their fat steers to the California markets, but it is believed by those in touch with the situation that the Northern buyers, especially the Producers company, are going to either get this stuff this year or make the fellow who gets it pay for it.

The co-operative marketing idea is becoming more popular each year with the result that the Cattle and Producers Commission company is getting the bulk of the cattle of the highland and country, it is said. Shipment of the cattle contracted for will begin in November, Mr. Denman said.

Texas Turkeys To Tickle Palates Of Nation's Notables

BRADY, Oct. 5.—Heart of Texas turkeys will tickle the palates of national notables during the approaching holiday seasons. Choice birds will be selected from those exhibitors and will subsequently be sent to Washington.
