Old Resident Dies Suddenly

Olander Franklin Darby, constable of this precinct and one of the city's and county's best and most useful men, died suddenly in his office last Friday. He had been feeling bad all day, and his paleness had become noticeable to a number of his friends who mentioned to him that he was looking bad. "I am feeling bad," he replied to a number of his friends, in the Warren drug store where he had stopped on his way from the post office to his office in the court house.

After a few moments spent in the drug store he went to his office, and was sitting in his chair reading a letter when stricken. Mr. Dave Nation, justice of the peace, and who officed with Mr. Darby, was in at the time. He heard Mr. Darby groan, and on looking up, saw him fall forward. By the time he had reached Mr. Darby, he had thrown himself back into his chair and was breathing his last, his sudden death evidently being due to heart disease.

Deceased was born at Florence, Alabama, November 20, 1853; died March 4, 1927, being 73 years, 3 months and 14 days old at the time of his death. He was married March 21, 1875 to Victoria White with whom he lived happily for nearly 52 years, and until death separated them. To the union were born six children, three boys and three girls. Five survive: Ed, Frank, Mrs. C. B. Tims, Mrs. J. I. Baze, and Mrs. Zack Evans.

Deceased professed religion more than thirty years ago and united with the Methodist church. During those years he lived an upright christian life, and died as he had lived—firm in the Christian faith. And not only was he a good man and useful citizen, but he was a good officer, always keeping the faith reposed in him. Despite his advanced years and declining health, he was performing well his duties as constable of this precinct, and was doing much toward keeping down law violation and in bringing violators to justice.

Funeral services were held Sunday, March 6, conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. F. Lawlis, assisted by Dr. I. J. Sparks. His last remains were laid to rest in the Snyder cemetery in the presence of many relatives and friends, among them being: Mrs. W. R. Hurley and Mrs. Mattie Morton, sisters of Fort Worth; L. C. Darby, brother of Greenville; Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Tims and Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Tims of Mansfield, and John Baze and family of Colorado, Texas.

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

BAIRD—Blare of booster bands and flash of booster colors will enliven Baird March 23 when delegates of the Oil Belt District attend the West Texas Chamber of Commerce regional convention on that date. Large delegations from Cisco, Eastland, Abilene, Albany, Stamford, and other towns have signified their intentions of coming in groups.

STAMFORD—E. T. Whitehead, for the past two years publicity manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, will be moved to Fort Worth to take charge of the Fort Worth office of the organization which was vacated when Ray Leeman resigned to become manager of the South Texas Chamber of Commerce. SONORA—Machinery has arrived for a core test for potash to be made in this section immediately. Dr. David Flood of Chicago, eminent geologist, has been here several months and located the test.

EL PASO—The special El Paso edition of "West Texas Today" has been released from the press. The number is not as large as originally intended and gives chief space to the city as "Gateway to the North." West Texas Chamber member towns that were to receive publicity in the special edition will be given space in the regular magazine at a later date.

MATADOR—Motley County recently passed a bond election calling for appropriation of the county of \$250,000 for highway improvement.

FORT STOCKTON—Contracts on primary 40,000 acres and 41,000 acres of secondary land of Red Bluff District are signed and in the Pecos Valley Water Users Association ready for arrangement for presentation to the Reclamation Bureau. The remaining contracts on the land for secondary interest will soon be in.

EASTLAND—A \$250,000 Connelley Hotel, a five story structure with a roof garden, is to be built in Eastland.

LAMPASAS—Lampasas County has a fine source of revenue in demands for its noted high grade cedar posts. Orders for Lampasas cedars come from many points. A recent call for three car loads was received here.

PANHANDLE—Panhandle is to open an early spring paving program, according to plans being worked out between the chamber of commerce and city officials.

MORAN — A big delegation from this town will attend the Oil Belt District convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Baird March 23 in the interest of securing the 1928 meeting for Moran. A big delegation from this town and also the Moran Band will attend the annual convention at Wichita Falls.

PATENTS GRANTED TO TEXANS

Of 841 patents issued in the last week Texas inventors obtained 16. William Herzik of Schulenburg, tractor plow. A further purpose of this invention is the provision of a frame for the support of the plow beam arranged, constructed and braced relative to the tractor frame and the axle to insure rigidity and thereby constitute a frame support for the plow beam.

Rollin L. Drake of Port Arthur, can. One of the objects of this invention is to provide a compact can which can be conveniently packed, together with other cans, without damaging its spout. Mr. Drake assigns his patent to the Texas Company.

Grace E. Almquist of La Porte, hairpin. This invention relates

to hairpins and has for its object the provision of a novel device so constructed and arranged as to hold the hair securely in place.

Charles C. Averill of Houston, process for conditioning crude oil emulsions. This invention relates to the treatment of emulsions of mineral oil and water, such as petroleum emulsions, for the purpose of separating the oil from the water. Mr. Averill assigns his patent to Wm. S. Barnickel & Co.

Harry A. Clark of Wichita Falls, sheave tensioning and adjusting device. This invention further aims among its objects in so altering the position of the spudding sheave, to eliminate frequent breakage of the sheave hanger, and consequently the repair expenses and time consumed in making repairs.

Marvin Blair and Charles O. Grove, swivel socket. This aims to provide a rope socket which may be readily cleaned of accumulations of sand and mud, as well as to provide for the insertion and removal of the cable without requiring that the swivel socket be removed and replaced at each operation.

Daniel S. Donovan and Joseph R. Brown of Dallas, process of producing commercial baking dough. This invention relates to new and useful improvements in processes of producing commercial baking dough.

Homer C. Thrift, Burkburnett, apparatus for screwing together and unscrewing joints of pipe and the like. One object of this invention is to provide an apparatus which is specially adapted for use in unscrewing the joints of pipe or casing as the same is withdrawn from abandoned wells.

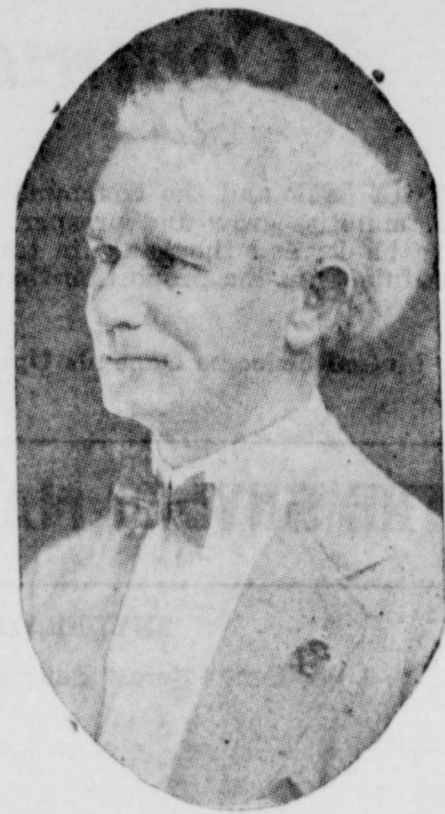

Napoleon "could work for eighteen hours for a stretch at one subject or many." No 8-hour day for him. One of his ministers complained that "it would require a constitution of iron to go through with what we do. After a day's ride in a carriage we no sooner alight than we mount on horseback and sometimes remain in our saddles for ten or twelve hours successively." In his fortieth year Napoleon rode ninety miles without stop in five hours and a half. His surgeon, Percy, said that he was "made of iron, soul and body, always on horseback, galloping about in all weathers, bivouacking, working like ten men, never ill, never tired." Even his enemies declared that Napoleon had a capacity for work equal to that of four other men. Scientific Monthly.

Gave Up Prized Sword in Expiation of Crime

In the high mountains beyond Nikko, in central Japan, nestles Lake Chuzenji, and above it the sacred mountain Nantai San rears its bare crest. Once it was the dwelling place of a pacific Buddhist hermit saint. Pilgrims from all parts of Japan climb its steep slopes. They are dressed in white robes, carry staffs and rosaries in hand, and chant a Buddhist prayer as they climb. An avenue of scarlet lacquer "torii" or gateways, guides the pilgrim to the shrine on the summit.

Near the peak is a bare patch of rock, overlooking a steep precipice. On this rock is a heap of swords, daggers and other weapons, rusted with age. In ancient times a man who had committed a deed of blood made a pilgrimage to Nantai San and offered up his weapon in expiation of his crime. To the Samurai, the warrior, his sword was his most prized possession, and the murderer who sacrificed his precious sword gave up in atonement what he valued more than his own life.

This heap of ancient sword blades, daggers and other weapons can be seen on Nantai San at present, a relic of feudal times.

North Carolina Giant

Miles Darden, who was born in North Carolina in 1798, and died in Harden county, Tennessee, January 28, 1857, was the world's largest man, claims the North Carolina Historical Review. He was 7 feet 6 inches tall and weighed a little more than 1,000 pounds. Thirteen and a half yards of cloth, one yard wide were required to make him a coat. When he died 24 yards of black velvet were needed to cover the sides and lid of his coffin. This was 8 feet long, only 1 inch less than 3 feet deep and was 32 inches broad. Miles Darden lived a quiet, uneventful life; apart from his world record size he seems to have been a hard-working ordinary man.

Because of his size and strength Dr. Samuel Johnson was advised by a certain luckless publisher to get a writer kept and term paper. Set upon one night by four footpads, he kept them at bay until the watch came up. He frequently in his younger years walked from Littlefield to Birmingham and back again, a distance of 30 miles, without fatigue, and in his trip to the Hebrides Boswell says that "twenty-five days were never passed by any man in more vigorous exercise." He was a bold swimmer, and though he ordinarily moved like a lumbering elephant, he at sixty-eight writes delightedly, "I ran a race this day and beat Baretti!" Scientific Monthly.
