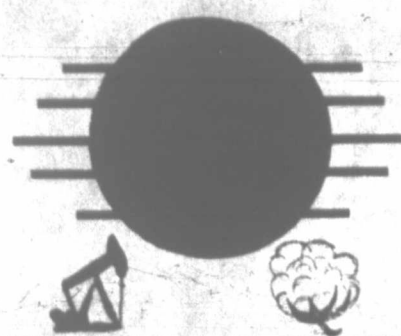

Two directors resign chamber board spots

Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce board of directors Ronnie Aston and Tom Lovell resigned their positions with the board Monday, each citing "personal" reasons for their resignations.

The board accepted each resignation with regret.

Lovell was secretary-treasurer of the board and David Hoover was elected to replace him if the by-laws of the chamber permit.

Aston and Lovell had each submitted letters of resignation dated July 9.

"For personal reasons, I need to be relieved of the responsibilities of being a board member," said Lovell.

Later, Aston said he wanted his letter of resignation to be accepted as well, also citing personal reasons for his decision.

Both Aston and Lovell said

they will continue to co-chair the annual chamber banquet.

Chamber President Bob Rely appointed a committee of Ben Lancaster, Woody Anderson, Cecil Oursbourn, Rene Hoover and David Hoover to determine if someone should be appointed to fill the two vacancies or to leave the positions vacant. Prior to the resignations, the board had 11 members.

Chamber Manager Penny Solomon reported that the recent AJRA rodeo, sponsored by the chamber, should net about \$2,500 this year. She said revenues were down this year and expenses were up. Last year, the chamber netted about \$3,400.

The board discussed whether to continue the rodeo or whether it should be made into an open rodeo rather than the AJRA event. The board agreed to wait another month until a complete financial report is available before making any decisions.

In the past, the rodeo has been the biggest money-making event sponsored by the chamber.

A tourism committee report was given by Miss Solomon in the absence of Jim Baum and Hank Hardwick. She said the city has agreed to raise the hotel-motel occupancy tax but has not decided where the increased tax revenue will go.

She said a brochure about Colorado City and Mitchell County is nearing completion.

She also requested and received permission from the board to purchase an ad in the "West Texas" magazine if the funds can be secured by donation. She said advertising in the magazine, which is distributed annually, will cost in the \$400-\$600 range depending upon the size of the ad. She said 100,000 copies of

New CHS band director named

David Edward Sims, whose bands at Archer City High School advanced to state competition in 1984 and 1985, was named band director of Colorado High School by the Colorado Independent School District board of directors Monday night.

Sims was named to the \$26,000 a year job upon the recommendation of Supt. Charlie Uselton who said "we feel like David will do us a good job."

Sims has been director at Archer City, a class AA school, for the past two years. Prior to that he was band director at Canadian for four years. He is a graduate of Abilene Christian University in Abilene with a bachelor's degree in music. He is married and has three children.

In 1984 and 1985, his marching band, utilizing both middle school and high school students, advanced to University Interscholastic League regional marching contest. In 1984, the band went on to state UIL marching contest, placing sixth. The band earned sweepstakes in 1984-85 and finished third in state honor band competition in 1985.

Sims replaces Steve Smith, who resigned following his first year in Colorado City.

In other business, the board agreed to bid specifications for heating and air conditioning the CVAE building at Colorado Middle School. Geneva Findley, business manager, said that bids are expected to be in the \$20,000-\$21,000 range if all-electric units are used and in the \$25,000-\$27,000 range if combination gas and electric units are installed. School trustees agreed to accept bids on both kinds of units.

The board then went into a budget workshop session to continue its study of a proposed budget for the coming school year. Uselton said the board is faced with trying to trim the budget because of reduced federal revenues as well as reduced local tax revenues. The board will meet again Aug. 4 to study the budget further.

Uselton said a hearing will either be conducted on Aug. 4 or at a meeting prior to time to consider an appeal by a teacher who failed to be named to the

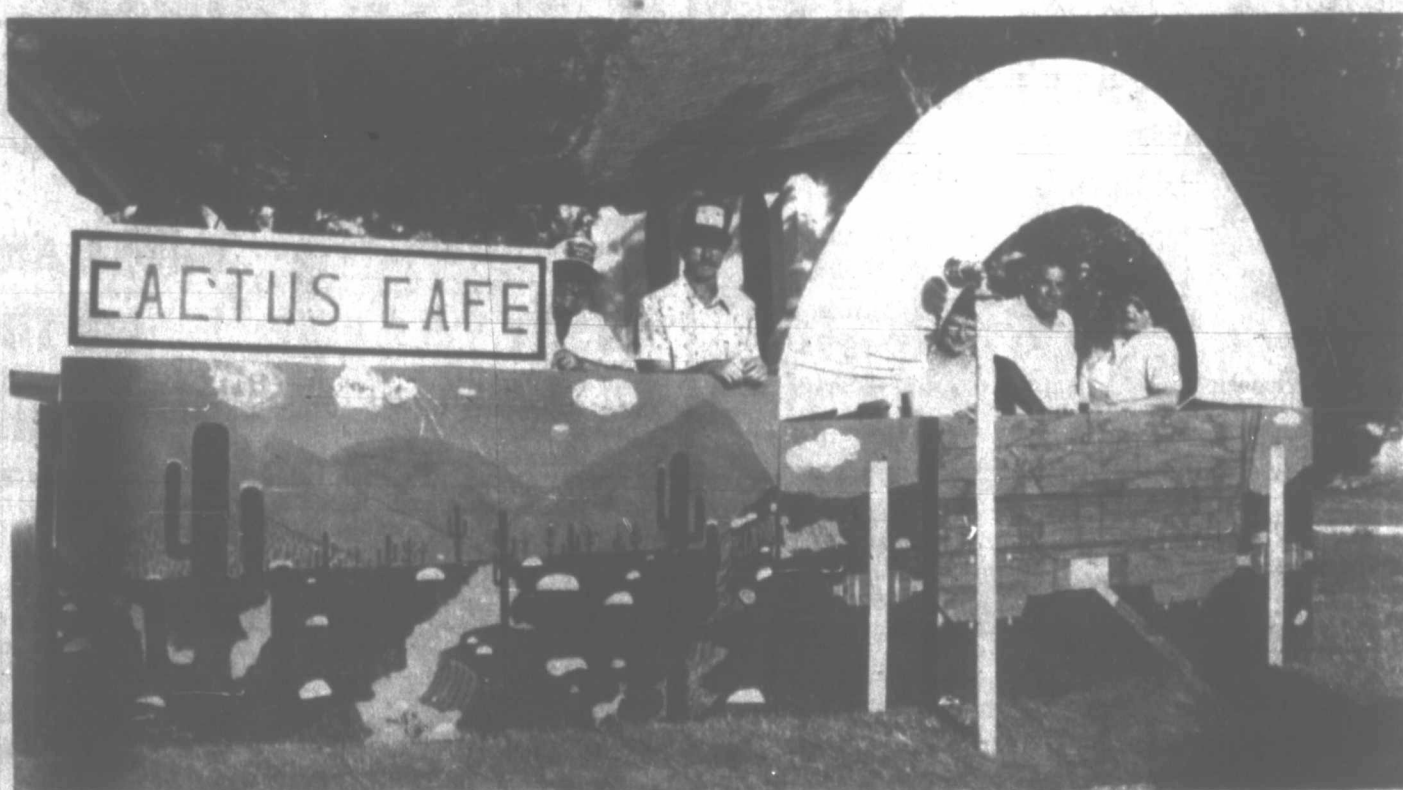

County Oil News

Showing ability to pump 32-gravity oil at the rate of 50 barrels per day, the No. 95 W. L. Foster has been completed in Mitchell County's portion of the Howard East Iatan Field, 10 miles southwest of Westbrook.

Chevron is the operator. In addition to oil, the well made a minor volume of casing-head gas and about 100 barrels of waste water per day.

Chevron took the hole to a 3,054-ft. bottom and perforated for production at 29926 to 2,961 feet in the Clark Fork Formation.

A completion rig has been called on station at the No. 16 J. D. Fuller in Mitchell County's Sharon Ridge Field about three miles southeast of the Ira community.

Spudded on June 15, the well was taken to total depth of 1,840 feet with Mrs. W. M. Keck Jr. as the operator. It had carried permit for 2,100-ft. maximum drilling depth.

First production figures have been filed for a newly completed well in Mitchell County's East Howard Iatan Field, nine miles southwest of Westbrook.

It is the No. 185 Mary Foster, showing ability to pump four barrels of oil daily along with 181 barrels of waste water.

Mobil Producing is the operator.

The well was taken to total depth of 3,400 feet and was plugged back to 3,200. Production will be from the Clear Fork Formation, 2,454 to 3,130 feet into the wellbore. Oil tested at 29-gravity.

The No. 96 W. L. Foster is shut-in after being bottomed at a depth of 3,026 feet and perforated for possible production at 2,577 to 2,910 feet at a drillsite in the Howard East Iatan Field, Mitchell County. The lease is about 10 miles southwest of Westbrook.

Drilling and perforations have been completed at a trio of water injection wells in the East Howard Iatan Field in Mitchell County, nine miles southwest of Westbrook. Perforations were made at intervals ranging from 2,557 to 3,203 feet in the Clear Fork Formation.

Mobil Producing is the operator.

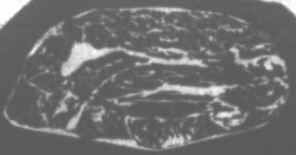

two runs during the fourth inning.

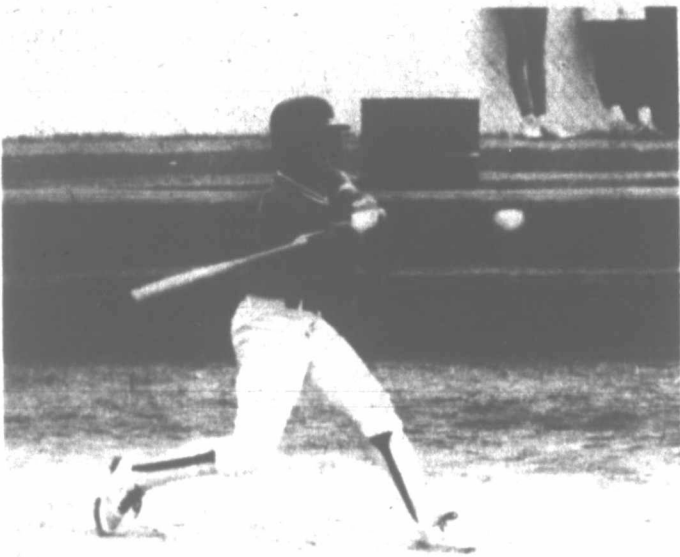
