Colorado City has a new field worker in the Texas Welfare Department office, in Civic House. Miss Margaret Nunley assumed her duties here Friday morning. She follows Wendell Roland who was transferred to Rusk. Roland became field worker in the Mitchell County office six months ago when Dee Tom, veteran Welfare worker, resigned from the department to assume new duties as City Housing Authority administrator. The new Welfare worker for this town and county, Miss Nunley is a former student of North Texas University. Her home is in Coleman, where she has been a Girl Scout adult leader. For 5 years she was full-time secretary-treasurer of First Methodist Church and for two different two-year periods worked in the business office of Root Memorial Hospital. As county treasurer she succeeds Miss Louise Hardison who, after 11 years in that office, did not seek re-election. Miss Hardison, member of a pioneer local family, worked for a number of years in the city tax office before winning the county treasurer post. LAST CHRISTMAS IN GERMANY

SP4 Freddie Harrison Home For Christmas This Year

This Christmas, when the Luther Harrison, Jr., family gathered around the Christmas tree, SP4 Freddie Harrison was gathered with them.

Last Christmas he celebrated on a lonely army base in southern Germany, just outside Boeblingen, not far from Stuttgart.

SP4 Harrison was stationed there with the 97th Signal Battalion. He joined the Army in January of 1961. He spent eight weeks in Fort Hood for his basic training before his first 12-day leave. Fort Jackson, North Carolina, was his Army home for the next three months.

July 5, 1961, Harrison went to Germany. He had not been back to the States until he arrived this December 18. After his 30-day leave, he will return to Germany.

In explaining the difference between a Christmas in Germany and a Christmas at home Harrison said, "The Germans don't have the Christmas spirit like we have at home. The only symbolism of Christmas there is a Santa Claus here and there. They do have Christmas trees, but they leave them bare, with no lights or ornaments. They don't put gifts under the tree until the night before Christmas. The gifts are not gaily wrapped, like ours. In fact, most of them are not wrapped at all."

"There are some Christmas lights, but none are colored. The only decorations outdoors is a string of white lights here and there. People do not stay home together on Christmas. The whole family goes out to celebrate."

Harrison said the German New Year was not so different from the American New Year. He said that most Germans celebrate New Year with a party.

"At a German New Year Party," he said, "they have huge feasts. I have never seen a German drink water. They consume about as much beer per day as we consume water. Everyone drinks beer. Even as young as twelve years old. German beer is different from American beer. American beer is approximate-

ly 6 per cent alcohol, and German beer is 13 per cent alcohol. The most popular food is schnitzel, some hip like our breaded veal cutlets."

Approximately 50 per cent of the people near Stuttgart speak English, Harrison said. "The people are very much like we are. Their cities look a great deal like American cities. The teenagers tend to be more serious and not so flighty as American teenagers. German parents are much more strict. Probably because of this the average age of the teenagers when they get married is much older than the average age of an American teenager. Probably because of this also, the divorce rate is much lower."

Harrison said that the youngsters in Germany grow up much faster than American youngsters. "When a girl is fourteen," he said, "she begins wearing heels and grown-up clothes. The teenagers do much the same thing as American youngsters. I saw the movie 'The Alamo' while I was there. It was funny to hear the Texans and Mexicans speaking German."

Harrison's job at the base is in the Battalion Headquarters. He is Personnel Administration Specialist. He meets the soldiers coming out to the base and processes their papers, gets their records up-to-date, and classifies them as to where their barracks are and what and where their jobs on the base will be.

"The barracks on our base are much like a college dormitory," Harrison said. "German bases have much better living quarters for the soldiers than American bases do. They have very large rooms, with five to twelve soldiers to each room."

"Our day starts at 5:30 a.m. We have a 6 a.m. reveille. We line up before the barracks for inspection. Breakfast is over at 7 a.m. and we have until 10 minutes of eight to clean the barracks. At 10 minutes of eight, we line up for work call with another formation. The 1st Sergeant will make all announcements at this formation line-up."

"Our work day begins at 8 a.m. We work until noon, except Saturday. On Saturday, we can stay out until one. Leaves are the same as in the States, 30 days per year, on the rate basis of 2 1/2 days per month. Most of the soldiers save up their leave-time until they have enough time to travel."

"In May of this year, a group of us went by train to Paris, France, and from there caught a plane to London, England. We did this on a 10-day leave. In November of 1961, we went by train to Madrid and Barcelona, Spain, and in July of this year we traveled by car to Zurich and Basil in Switzerland."

Harrison said that kitchen patrol came to each soldier about once every three months. He said that there were two shifts of cooks, and the shifts of midnight on every night.

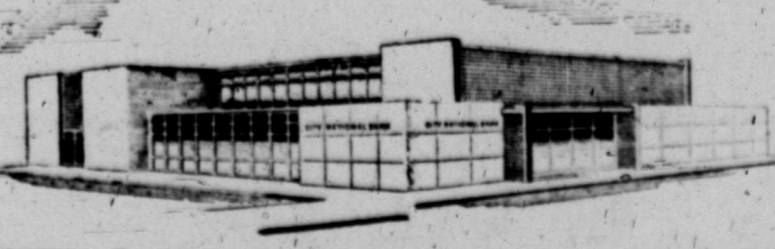

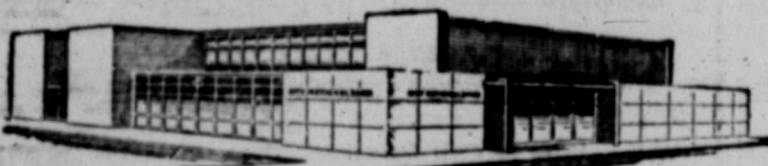

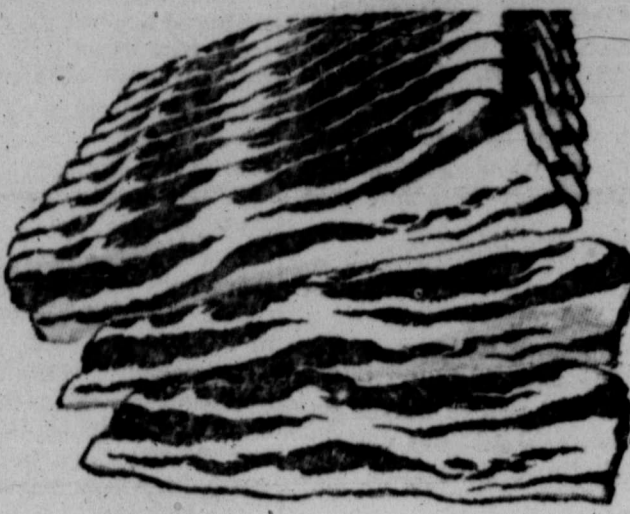
