Family violence now at center of attention

While the O. J. Simpson incident has brought the problem of spousal abuse to most everyone's mind, it is certainly nothing new here or anywhere else said Colorado City Police Chief David Montgomery.

"One of the largest incidences of calls we receive at the department involves family violence," said Montgomery.

The laws in Texas say that a police officer answering a family violence call can make the complaint themselves if there is evidence that abuse has occurred.

"We do not have to worry about the complainant changing their mind once we get there...if there is the slightest evidence that abuse has occurred...then we make

the arrest," said the chief. "We'll take them to the county jail and charge them - whether it be male or female and then let the courts decide what the eventual outcome may be."

"If no prosecution occurs it rests with the courts - not with the police department."

Asked just what is considered "assault", the chief replied that it is "any unwarranted contact or verbal threat that the assailant is capable of carrying out."

"Our officers always have to consider if they leave the scene without effecting the arrest... will the abuse start right back up."

Montgomery said the P.D. receives an average of 3 to 4 calls per week for family violence.

He also said that the Mitchell County Hospital would contact the department if family violence is suspected in admittances to the emergency room.

Montgomery said one disadvantage in Mitchell County was not having a shelter for abused spouses but the NOAH Project in Scurry County was providing excellent service in this area. He said the department gives NOAH information of the abused spouse but it is up to them to take advantage of their services.

"We'll contact the victim of abuse and let them know what our services are and what is available to the abused person," said Lea Ann Bell of the Snyder office of NOAH.

The NOAH Project provides

food and shelter for victims of family violence (male or female) and personal and group counseling.

"The maximum stay here is six weeks," said Bell, "and during this time, we let them know what their alternatives are."

"We let them know their options and we will tell them if we think the abuse will continue if they return to the abusive situation," Bell added. "If we feel the abuse will continue - we tell them so - but the choice of returning is strictly theirs."

The mission of the NOAH Project is to provide quality shelter and support services under strict guidelines for persons who are victims of family violence, to provide community education that

raises awareness of the issues and solutions concerning family violence and to be an effective advocate in the effort to strengthen laws and policies concerning family violence.

"We average 3 or 4 calls per week on family violence and yes, we will press charges"

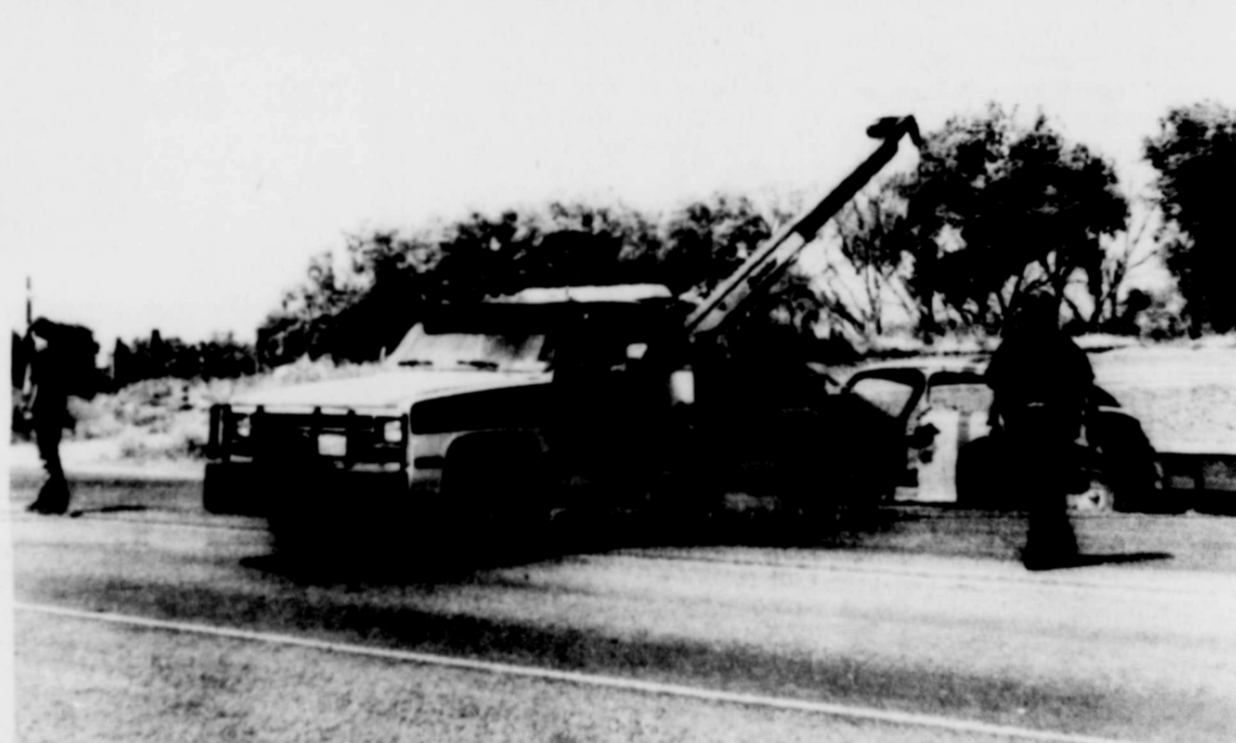

Restoration off to flying start!

Colorado City Police Department personnel and other volunteers have put in nearly 300 hours worth of work on a 1946 Ford coupe that they are restoring to help promote the department's D.A.R.E. program.

It is going to be painted black and white and outfitted with lights and sirens of that era.

The car has been completely dismantled and stripped down and D.A.R.E. Officer Charles Rice was on his way to Snyder to get the body sandblasted when a call came into the police department that a car

body - no wheels, no nothing, just a body of a car the caller said - had fallen off a trailer on the Snyder highway.

"Uh oh," said Police Chief David Montgomery as he heard the call over his police radio and envisioned what had happened.

"Oh no," said Rice as he looked in his rear-view mirror and saw the car body being lifted off the

trailer by the wind. "Surely not," said Lt. Pat Taylor who was dispatched to the scene of the lift-off.

The end result was that the car body (which does resemble an open parachute) did not receive any damage in its brief flight and was put back on the trailer for the trip to Snyder - only this time handcuffed!

Tests scheduled

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) and the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests will be administered on July 12, 13 and 14 at Colorado High School.

The tests will be conducted beginning at 9:00 a.m. in the cafeteria.

All students who were enrolled in grades 10, 11 and 12 in the spring of 1994 are eligible to take any section of the exit-level test on which they have not met minimum standards. In addition, students who are out of school may test during this time also. Students who were enrolled in grade 12 in the spring of '94 are not considered out-of-school examinees.

Review classes at Colorado High will be from 7 until 9:00 p.m. each night beginning Monday, June 27 until July 11. Students are encouraged to attend these review classes if they plan to take the TAAS in July.

GED program now in full swing here

The need for at least a high school degree or high school equivalency certificate (GED) is now greater than ever says the supervisor-teacher of the program at the Wallace Center.

Bob Reily said almost every employer "expects employees to have the minimum of a GED these days." A GED diploma is equivalent to graduation from a Texas high school.

He added that there are financial as well as other benefits from earning a GED certificate.

"It will increase their opportunities in the future," added Reily.

Around 20 students attend class yearly in their quest for a GED here and the amount of time required for the certificate varies greatly.

"Some students are ready when they come out here to the Wallace

Center," added Reily. "We'll give them a pre-test and then arrange for a GED test for them."

He added that it may take up to 120 hours of study for some.

"Most everyone needs some study - especially in math," he said.

Students can enroll at anytime during class periods as classes are held in the summer on Mondays from 6 until 10 p.m. and on Wednesday mornings from 8:30 until 12:30 p.m.

The Monday evening class is averaging around 14 students nightly while six students is the average on Wednesday.

"We invite everyone to come out and study with us if you aspire to obtain a GED certificate," said Reily. "We make this experience educational, fun and as unlike 'real school' as possible."

Over \$5 million distributed here by welfare programs

Mitchell County residents were the recipients of over \$5 million in major welfare programs in 1993 according to the Texas Department of Human Services.

David Maberry, Regional Administrator of the TDHS, said "medical assistance had the biggest impact with \$807,955 spent for families and children and \$783,374 for the aged and disabled for hospitals, physicians, laboratory, x-ray and other services. Also, \$68,386 was spent for families and children and \$331,368 for the aged

and disabled in Mitchell County for prescription medicines."

Disproportionate-share hospital payments totaled \$649,740 and nursing home costs of approximately \$1,863,828 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community care for aged and Disabled spent \$191,147 Maberry added.

Food stamps worth \$893,860 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Aide to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) totaled \$175,851. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government while the department determines eligibility of applicants and issues the food coupons.

Interviews started for girls' coach

Interviews started Thursday with applicants for the vacant girls' basketball coaching position at Colorado High School said interim superintendent, Russell Merket.

Three interviews were scheduled but only two were held. Two more interviews are on tap for this coming Tuesday.

A committee was originally expected to interview five applicants for the job before a recommendation is made to the CHS trustees.

Merket said a decision on the new coach would be made "as soon as possible."

Playday set to benefit Carpenter

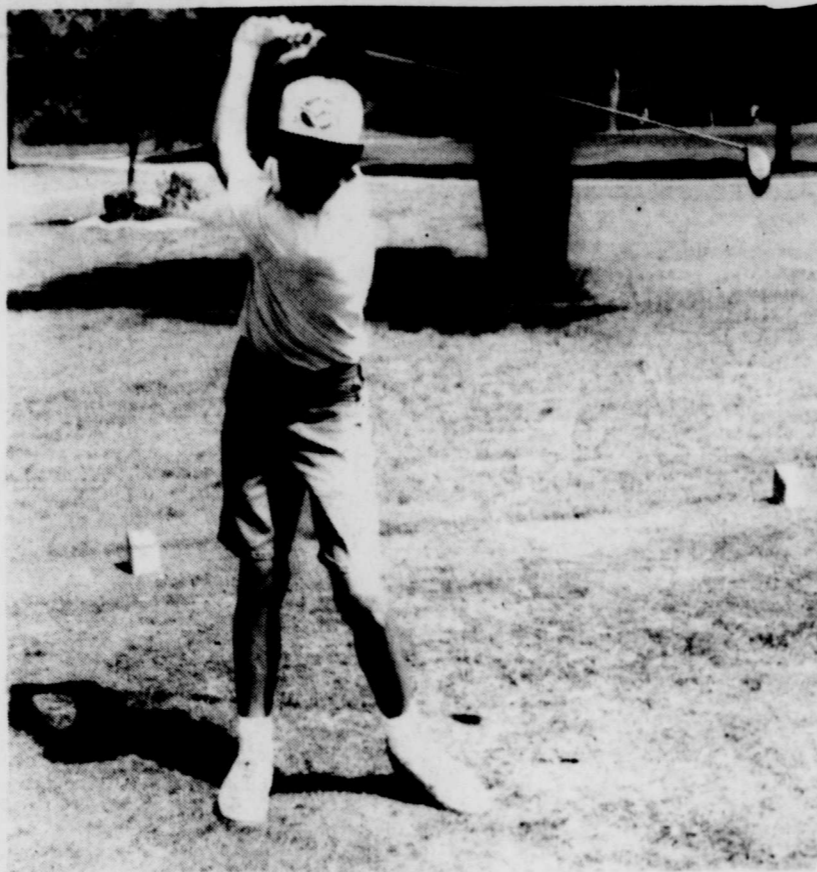
A "team playday" benefit for Andra Carpenter, who was injured when her horse fell on her, will be held July 2 at the Saddle Club Arena in San Angelo.

Texas mayors endorse Governor Ann Richards

AUSTIN -- More than 100 Texas mayors, citing Governor Ann Richards' record on crime, economic development and city-state partnerships, traveled to the capital recently to announce they were endorsing her bid for re-election.

The mayors are among more than 250 from throughout Texas who have already said they are backing Governor Richards.

"We've never had a governor of Texas who has been as active in fighting crime as Ann Richards. More than 100 pieces of legislation dealing with crime passed the legislature and those new laws have begun to make a difference in our community," said San Antonio Mayor Nelson Wolff.

18 year olds must register

Responding to a recent decision by the President, the U.S. House of Representatives voted on May 23 to continue the requirement for all men to register with Selective Service upon reaching age 18. The members considered a proposed amendment to the registration. The amendment was rejected 125 to 273.

Five days before the vote, President Clinton notified Congress that continuing draft registration and providing funding to operate the Selective Service System is "essential to our national security." In letters to the leadership of the House and Senate on May 18, the President based his decision on a recently completed review of the program by a National Security Council working group. He concluded that the Selective Service system and peacetime registration must be retained as a prudent military preparedness measure in an uncertain world, as a link between American society and the volunteer military and as a symbol of national resolve.

Although there has been no need to draft men for military

service during the past 21 years, the nation has maintained the capability to reinstate a draft in a major crisis. Since July 1980, draft registration has been an obligation of virtually all men ages 18 through 25. Federal law requires that every man must register within 30 days of his 18th birthday. Each man completes a short form to provide Selective Service with his name, date of birth, address, phone number and Social Security number. Registration forms are available at any post office. Most men also receive a

registration reminder in the mail a few months before reaching age 18 and they may use it to register by return mail. The Selective Service System has a telephone line dedicated to answering questions about registration: (708) 688-6888.

Men who don't register are in violation of federal law. Non-registrants can be prosecuted and they are ineligible for federal student financial aid, most federal jobs and job training. The law applies to male immigrant aliens 18 through 25 years old as well as male citizens.

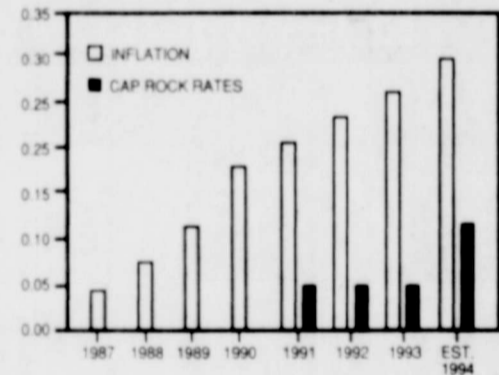

Stenholm presents proposals for the oil and gas industry

D.C. -- Congressman Charles Stenholm participated in a White House meeting with President Clinton and a bipartisan group of members and senators working to address problems facing the domestic oil and gas industry. Stenholm worked closely with Senator David Boren (D-OK) in designing and presenting to Clinton a package of proposals to provide tax incentives and regulatory relief to the U.S. oil and gas industry.

"We had a very good meeting during which time the president listened, spoke, and displayed an impressive knowledge of the industry," said Stenholm. "I was particularly impressed with his suggestion that the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) won't secure a true accounting of the costs of our assistance plan unless they consider the impact of last revenues from stripper wells which are no longer producing."

The 1986 collapse in oil prices cost the industry 300,000 jobs and saw oil production drop by 1.7 million barrels per day. Oil imports account for 50% of domestic consumption and, in 1993, the U.S. spent an estimated \$46 billion on oil and refined petroleum products. Following the oil price collapse that began in Oct., 1993, more than 22,500 Americans in the oil and natural gas producing industry have lost their jobs.

"Over 100 of my colleagues in the House and Senate contacted President Clinton to request this meeting, and 70 legislators from 27 states were represented at today's meeting," noted Stenholm. "I think this type of broad representation indicates that many Members of

Congress understand that what is good for the energy industry also benefits the U.S. in terms of job creation, increased economic activity, and a lower trade deficit. And despite today's price of almost \$20 a barrel for West Texas Intermediate, we need to do something to bring some stability to the industry," added Stenholm.

Among the proposals submitted to the President were the following:

- *A tax credit to preserve marginal production and encourage drilling;
 - *The continued expensing of geological and geophysical costs;
 - *Elimination of the net income limitations on percentage depletion;
 - *Administrative relief from excessive environmental mandates.
- "When one of the participants made the point that this assistance package will have to be paid for, President Clinton countered by noting that the Gulf War was very costly," said Stenholm. "I took this to mean that the administration understands the importance of providing price stability to the domestic oil and gas industry, and I am encouraged that the Congress and the White House are receptive to doing something constructive for the industry."

BOLL WEEVIL REPORT

By Joe Raff CEA-Ag, Mitchell County

As unpleasant as it may be, we all need to start thinking about Boll Weevil control. Before I make recommendations, let me first explain how the boll weevil operates and recap what I have seen this year.

When the boll weevil has come out of the overwintering habitat it needs to find something to eat within 10-12 days or it will die. This worked to our advantage this year with dry conditions early in the year. This kept growers out of the fields until we were blest with rain in mid May. Thus, we missed the first influx of weevils the first of June. The June 1 average trap count was 273 weevil per trap. Fortunately, due to the delayed planting, these weevils were suicidal because there was not cotton squaring at that time. The counts after June 1 have been considerably lower with average counts only reaching 69 and 22 for June 8 and 15 respectively.

Even though we are seeing less boll weevils in the fields now, historically we have one more surge of weevils coming out of overwintering habitat the first part of July. Also, with average counts of 22 weevils per trap there is still concern; because I have found about 10-15% of the fields starting to square. This means that these weevils will probably survive.

It's time to start scouting fields. Dr. Fuchs in San Angelo suggests that a grower should put out 4 traps per field. If a grower finds an average of 1-3 weevils per trap in one week do not spray. When trap counts average more than one but less than four the first week of squaring, field inspection for weevils will be necessary to make a proper management decision. If 2 or more weevils are found per 100 plants checked, an insecticide treatment is probably needed to prevent later economic damage.

Insecticides and treatment levels for overwintered boll weevils are below:

- Guthion (2L) 1 pt./acre
- Vydate (2L) 1 pt./acre
- Vydate (C-LV) 6.4-8.5oz./acre

There are other insecticides that can be used however, research has shown that these two products are the most effective.

Ag processing can create jobs

More communities should pursue ag processing opportunities because such companies can provide an economic boost in both rural and urban Texas, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said recently in a speech at the Dimmit County Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

"Towns and cities have been doing everything but laying out a red carpet to attract prisons," Perry said. "But along with attracting prisons, I suggest to you the same type of efforts should be made to lure ag processing companies—companies that turn Texas cotton into Levis and Wranglers; companies that use Texas-grown vegetables in their salsas; companies that create sausage and other meat products from Texas livestock and companies that use vegetables grown right here in Dimmit County in their prepared salads."

According to the latest study conducted, Texas processes only 8 percent of its agricultural commodities, while the national average for in-state processing is 20 percent.

Along with creating jobs, Texas needs to increase its ag processing rate because exports of high-value agricultural products are growing, the commissioner said.

"Our ag exports are shifting from low-priced, bulk commodities to high-value ag products," Perry said. "In fact, high-value ag exports account for more than 70 percent of

this nation's agricultural sales to Mexico. Mexico is already Texas' largest trading partner, but where will they go for steaks, frozen dinners and other high-value ag products if we continue with our dismal ag processing rate?"

Perry outlined the state's three agricultural strengths: a diverse climate that enables farmers to grow just about anything; a prime location that provides a trade gateway to Mexico and the rest of Latin America and a Texas mystique, with food companies throughout the nation using the name "Texas" to sell products.

"We've got the climate, we've got the location and we've got the Texas mystique—all of which add up to an agricultural economic powerhouse if we know how to take advantage of it," the commissioner said.

However, some current policies could undermine Texas' strength, Perry said.

Bullock appoints committee on family violence

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock named a special Senate committee to look into possible changes in the way Texas handles family violence under criminal and civil laws.

"You don't have to look to California, you don't have to leave Texas to see painful reason to reassess the protection we afford abused spouses and children in our own state," Bullock said in appointing Sen. Mike Moncrief of Fort Worth to chair an interim committee on domestic violence.

"I worry that victims of domestic violence can fall through the cracks in the justice system," Bullock said. "We have got to see if there are holes that should be closed in our laws, including the new stalking law."

Besides Moncrief, Bullock appointed Sens. Judith Zaffirini of Laredo, Florence Shapiro of Plano, Buster Brown of Lake Jackson and Royce West of Dallas to the committee.

"These senators each have unique expertise to contribute to this work. Failure to deal with domestic violence aggressively from the outset is asking for greater problems and more tragedy down the line," Bullock said.

"We must tear down any legal barriers to swift and sure concerted action by the courts, the police and the human service agencies, both public and private, which deal with family violence. The right hand must know what the left hand is doing and they must work together," he said.

Bullock said that Moncrief, author of the stalking law, is particularly well suited to head up the study because "he has keen insight into family violence and the toll it takes, as well as the compassion that must be afforded the victims."

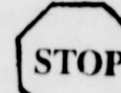

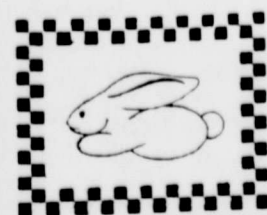
