Of course there are those who are partial to summer and winter as times of the year to cheer for, but such poor souls are outside the ken of Mrs. Ducker and me. We like the equinoctial seasons.

And as Bill Durham of the Fort Worth Press says, "Texas is beautiful in the spring."

The stucco job on the outside of the Eastland Furniture building is beautiful to behold, and on Wednesday it looks as if the outside of the Davis-Marney Drug Company building is going to get a similar treatment. If so, the corner at Commerce and Lamar will be one of the best looking in town, and perhaps other owners of business property in Eastland will be spurred on to the point that the beautification program begun last year by the good women of our city will go on and on.

Movement of the Civic League and Garden Club, which spearheaded the last beautification campaign, to decorate the grounds of the Eastland grade school is a worthwhile one, and I believe the ladies will get results as they have on most of the other things they have tackled.

The idea as I got it in a talk by Mrs. Ed Freyschlag before the Lions Club the other day is to raise some money for at least one project, building a concrete retaining wall at West Ward School so rains will not wash the dirt away, and shrubs and trees may be planted.

However, Mrs. Freyschlag made one remark with which I am in fundamental disagreement, when she said she was sure the pupils at the school would appreciate the new beauty of the place and would do their best to take care of it.

Having been a small boy once, I am in a position to say that I am sure of no such thing, as far as small boys are concerned. This is no effort to throw cold water, but a friendly warning to put in the least destructible shrubs and trees, preferably made of cast iron and brass.

The ladies of the league and club—a combined organization which I, for one, wish had selected a name that would go into a headline a little more easily—also have tentative plans to plant an avenue of trees down North Seaman Street to beautify the town's approaches by railroad, and to conduct a continuing cleanup campaign that will include clearing off the vacant lots of Eastland.

All of this program as I understand the situation is more or less tentative, but no doubt you will see a lot of it taking shape. When the ladies of Eastland start something, they usually finish it with no ifs or buts.

As this is written, I have no idea how the weather will be for the football game here with Cisco, but it would not be surprising if it rains.

At least it would not be surprising to Eastland Coach Johnny Little, who pointed out after the Hamilton game that the Mavericks have played six of their eight games this year on wet fields, and most of them in the rain.

This is a singularly impressive record in West Texas, where the open weather is supposed to be ideal for football.

And as a matter of fact, we have had an exceptionally open fall, except on Friday nights. It's all very discouraging to Little and to Assistant Coach John D. Harvey, who had built an attack on speed and deception this year, and have seen the attack bog down in the mud too many times for their peace of mind.

Mavericks To Meet Cisco In Thursday Night Contest Here

The Eastland Mavericks, with four straight victories tucked away following four straight defeats at the first of the season, will take on possibly their toughest foe of the season Thursday night on Maverick Field in the Cisco Lobos, possible title contenders in District 9-AA.

What is worse, a number of starting Eastland players, including Herbert Barker, Johnnie Hicks and Billy Johnson took down with flu this week and probably will not be at top strength. Billy Brashier, top passer, had a cold and Eddie Hart was nursing injuries.

All in all, Coach John E. Little was using his coach's crying towel to good effect Wednesday.

The game will begin at 7:30 p. m. under the lights. It will be the first game on an Eastland playing field against Cisco in a number of years, and it is likely the revamped field will not begin to hold the crowd.

Cisco, featuring the running of Stanley Williams and an extra rugged line, had a poor beginning, like Eastland, but has snapped back to the point that it is given a chance against Breckenridge next week. The Buckaroos need the game to wrap up the 9-AA title.

Cisco knocked over Ranger 35 to 12, while Eastland lost to the Bulldogs 43 to 6 on a muddy field.

The Mavericks sewed up their fourth straight win last Friday by bowling over Hamilton, 20 to 0, in a strong last-half surge.

Eastland had been playing fairly listless ball as it was held scoreless throughout the first half and into the third quarter. Then something happened to make the boys snap out of it.

A fourth-down Eastland pass was completed on the sideline stripe, the head linesman ruled it complete and waved the chain on down. But a Hamilton coach went out and talked to an official who then ruled the ball had been caught out of bounds and Hamilton got the ball on downs.

Eastland held, Hamilton punted, and Jimmy Mathews returned the punt 40 yards to set up a score. Hicks passed to Mathews for 10 yards for the touchdown and Brashier kicked the point.

A few minutes later, on the Hamilton 33-yard line, Brashier passed to Bobby Blair, who took the 18-yard throw and ran 15 yards for the score. Billy Johnson kicked the point.

In the fourth quarter Hicks passed to Blair for a third touchdown, the ball travelling 20 yards in the air and Blair maneuvering the last 10. Brashier missed the point.

After Cisco, Eastland meets only Gorman, in a game there Thanksgiving afternoon. A win then will clinch second place in the district for Eastland, with DeLeon winner, Eastland and DeLeon last year tied for second place in the district, behind Dublin.

Judge-Elect Of Civil Appeals Court Dies

E. J. Miller, judge-elect of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, died Monday in Brownwood, his home, where he underwent a heart attack last week.

Funeral services and burial were in Brownwood Tuesday. Judge Miller had been a judge of the district court there for many years.

His death will create a vacancy on the court here at the beginning of his elective term the first of next year, and the new governor, Beauford Jester, who will take office then, will appoint a successor it was said. The judgeship on the appeals court now is held by Courtney Gray of Brownwood, appointed by Gov. Coke Stevenson after the death of Chief Justice W. P. Leslie.

Exes Beat Gorman By 7-0 Score: To Play Second Game

The Eastland High School Exes, victors in a spine-jarring 7-0 set-to with the Gorman Exes on the local field Thursday of last week, will journey to Gorman for a return tilt Monday night.

The game here grossed \$314.05, of which \$18 went for lighting the field, and the rest was split evenly between the two sponsors. Eastland's \$148 went into a fund to pay for hospitalization and doctor bills for Eastland High players who need care beyond the \$75 now covered by insurance.

Proceeds from the game at Gorman will be divided on the same basis.

The game at Eastland surprised even its most ardent supporters by the ferocity and skill displayed by the two teams, most members of which were ex-GI's.

The winning Eastland score came on a 15-yard pass from Tommy Samuels to Troy Taylor in the third quarter. Eastland threatened one other time, but had a pass intercepted.

Gorman never threatened except on the first play from scrimmage. Taking the ball on their 20 after Jim Taylor kicked off over the goal line, the Gorman huskies pulled a fast one when the center, instead of passing the ball, pretended to, and then took off around end and ran 62 yards with it to the Eastland 18. On four plays, Gorman made three yards, and gave up the ball and the game.

This week, Jimmie Harkrider, who dreamed up the game, received a letter from Breckenridge inquiring about a similar game between Eastland and Breckenridge exes during the Christmas holidays, but the immediate response from some of the Eastland exes was not enthusiastic.

"I don't want to spend Christmas in a hospital," said one.

Eastland B Team Wins From Olden By 7-6

In a finish that had the blanketed spectators gasping, Eastland's B football team Saturday night scored a 7-6 victory over Olden's Class B Hornets.

Both scores came in the last two minutes of play as it looked as if the benumbed teams were going to wind up in a scoreless tie.

Olden scored first on a 45-yard pass and run play after a determined surge with the strong north wind at their backs, and with only a minute or so to play, driving into the wind. Eastland's chances looked dim. Olden missed the try for point.

But on the first play after the kickoff, Jim Smith tore off tackle, headed for the sidelines, got a block or two, and skirted the sideline stripe for 70 yards and a touchdown. Eastland kicked the extra point, and after the kickoff and one play, the game ended.

FSA Functions Are Transferred To New Federal Agency

Credit facilities and services formerly provided by the Farm Security Administration and the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Division of Farm Credit Administration are available to eligible farmers through the Eastland County office of the Farmers Home Administration, L. J. Cappelman, Texas state director of FHA, announced.

Cappelman also announced designation of George I. Lane, Eastland county supervisor of the Farm Security Administration, as interim supervisor in charge of the Eastland FHA office, located on the 2nd floor of the Eastland National Bank Building.

The Farmers Home Administration took over functions of FSA and ECFL effective Nov. 1. The new agency will make production and subsistence loans as well as loans for farm purchases. Facilities are available only to farmers who are unable to get loans they need at interest rates not exceeding five percent from banks, cooperative lending agencies or other responsible sources in their communities.

The farm purchase loans made by the new agency are similar to those formerly made by the Farm Security Administration. Loans are made for 100 per cent of the purchase price of family-type farms, plus needed improvements. Repayment is scheduled over a period of 40 years, and interest rate is 3 1/3 per cent.

Operating credit extended by the Farmers' Home Administration under production and subsistence loan program includes both annual loans and adjustment-type loans at five per cent interest.

Delegation Goes To Brownwood For Talk On Project

A 12-man delegation from Eastland County Wednesday went to Brownwood on behalf of a farm-to-market road from Carbon to Rising Star.

The road, which would fill an important gap in the county's paved road system, would require refinishing and surfacing of between 13 and 14 miles, following the present gravelled road by way of Okra and joining the projected Rising Star-Comanche paved highway about three miles east of Rising Star.

The road would shorten the route from Eastland to Brownwood considerably, and would give farmers and others in the Rising Star and Okra areas a much shorter, all-weather route to Eastland. It also would give much better access to Rising Star and Carbon from a big territory.

The group Wednesday conferred with District Highway Engineer Leo Ehlinger, and said he seemed favorably impressed with the arguments about the need for designation of the road. Next step probably will be sending of a delegation to Austin to talk to the State Highway Commission on behalf of the road.

County Judge Lewis Crossley, one of those who met Ehlinger in Brownwood Wednesday, said it likely would be next summer at the earliest before the proposed road could be included in the farm-to-market program, since the program is mapped and approved well in advance.

Those who made the trip Wednesday included Crossley, County Commissioners Lon Medford, Virge Foster and Henry Davenport; County Auditor Don Parker; Dr. T. G. Jackson and Ben Stevenson, both of Carbon; Perry Burns of Okra, and Will Tyler, Frank Robertson, Bill Herrington and Fred Siekman of Rising Star.

The current farm-to-market road program in the county includes a road south of Cisco, part of which has been built; one east of Eastland, on which bids have been opened; one south of Ranger, and improvement of the Ranger-Morton Valley road.

On the road east of Eastland, low bidders were Markham, Brown, Krume and Kearney on 4.8 miles of road construction with a bid of \$45,576.

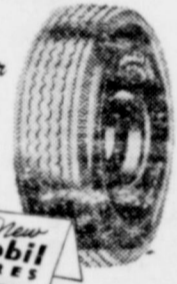

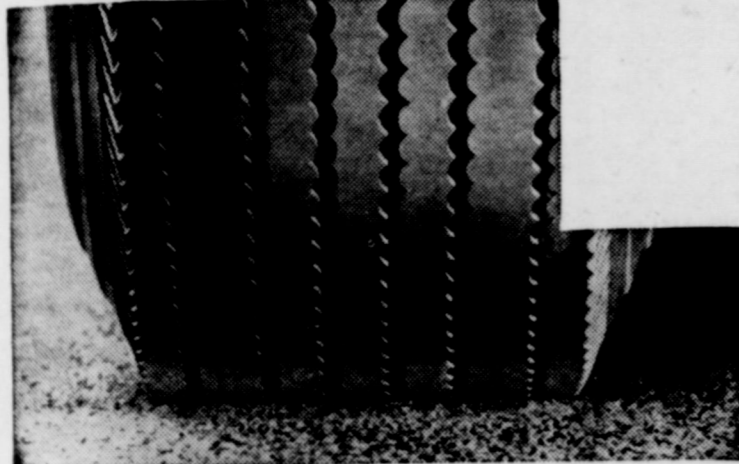

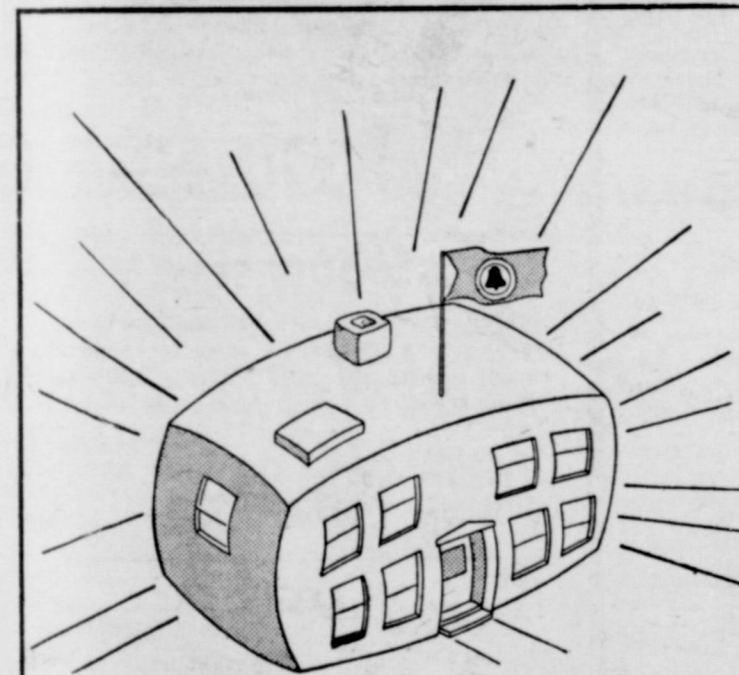

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE, USE, AND DISCHARGE OF FIRECRACKERS, TORPEDOES OR OTHER DETONATORS WITHIN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, FIXING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS:

SECTION I: No person shall hereafter sell, use, or discharge any kind of firecracker, torpedo, or other detonator within the City of Eastland, Texas.

SECTION II: Any person violating the foregoing provision of this ordinance shall be punished by fine of not more than twenty-five and no-100 (\$25.00) dollars, or by imprisonment in jail for not more than five (5) days, or by both such imprisonment and fine.

SECTION III: The fact that there is no effective penal ordinance of the City of Eastland covering the above subject, and the fact that the sale, use and discharge of firecrackers, torpedoes, and other detonators constitutes a fire hazard and danger to the public health and safety of the City and its peoples, creates an emergency requiring the suspension of the rule requiring an ordinance to be read and passed at several meetings, and this ordinance shall be in force upon passage and publication as provided by the charter of the City of Eastland.
