Wilson Opens Attorney General Campaign As Shepperd Says 'No' to Any State Race

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd grabbed the spotlight with his announcement that he would not be a candidate for "any state office."

And just as the attorney general revealed he would not seek re-election, Justice Will Wilson of the State Supreme Court announced that he was a candidate for the attorney general's office.

Wilson, 44, served as assistant attorney general under Gerald Mann and Grover Sellers before becoming district attorney at Dallas. His term on the State Supreme Court expires this year.

Although Shepperd had forewarned his friend of the impending decision, they were stunned at the announcement. Most expected him to run for re-election. Many had urged him to enter the race for governor.

In giving his decision, Shepperd outlined the record of his office, including the house-cleaning in Duval County; the veterans block-land exposure; the exposure of fraudulent insurance companies; and the establishment of a system of co-ordinating law enforcement activities in Texas.

Shepperd intends to remain where he is until his term ends on Dec. 31. It has been reported that he would accept a business offer in Odessa.

His decision not to run for any state office was announced in a letter to Harry Kates, publisher of his hometown paper, the Gladewater Mirror.

Close friends of Shepperd say that the announcement does not remove him from the list of prospective entrants in the race for U. S. Senator, if and when Price

Personal Privilege

An individual's right to express his opinions, within the bounds of libel, for or against any candidate for public office, or any public issue, will be tested in court by the Texas Press Association.

Under the new Texas Election Code, candidates themselves may publish any amount of advertising, limited only by their own personal finances, and contributions. But an individual is restricted to a \$25 expenditure during the entire campaign.

On the average, that is approximately 30 words over the radio; a few seconds of TV time; and less than 20 inches of newspaper space. And it is below the minimum requirement for billboard advertising.

Hearings on the subject will be before the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Lowry Prison Term

Former Beaumont Mayor Leslie Lowry has been found guilty of perjury, in the organization of an insurance company, and sentenced to seven years in prison.

District Judge Charles O. Betts pronounced the sentence.

Lowry, now a Kansas school teacher, was accused of making false statements in an affidavit filed five years ago in connection with organization of the now defunct Texas Fire Insurance Co. of Beaumont and Ennis.

Supreme Court Ruling

At least one Texas official is aroused by a U. S. Supreme Court ruling knocking the props out from under another state law.

Latest to fall are state anti-secession laws, which the high court says are superseded by Federal law. Apparent effect was to nullify Texas' anti-communist law.

Attorney General Shepperd called the action "a stunning blow to states rights. It rules out another field of state-federal cooperation, and is impossible to reconcile with the reserved powers of the Federal constitution."

Meanwhile Shepperd filed a brief in the U. S. Supreme Court in support of a contested Wisconsin law against disorderliness in labor disputes. Texas has a similar law.

Company Wins Test

Companies which paid the old gas gathering tax "without protest" will get their money back.

In the first test case ruling the Third Court of Civil Appeals held that Tennessee Gas Transmission Co. is entitled to a refund of the \$1,140,966 it paid in taxes. Interest payment of \$249,576 was not granted.

Since the gas gathering tax was declared unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court, the state has returned more than 25 million dollars in taxes, paid "under protest." Last year the Texas legislature granted permission for about 30 companies, which paid without protest, to sue for recovery.

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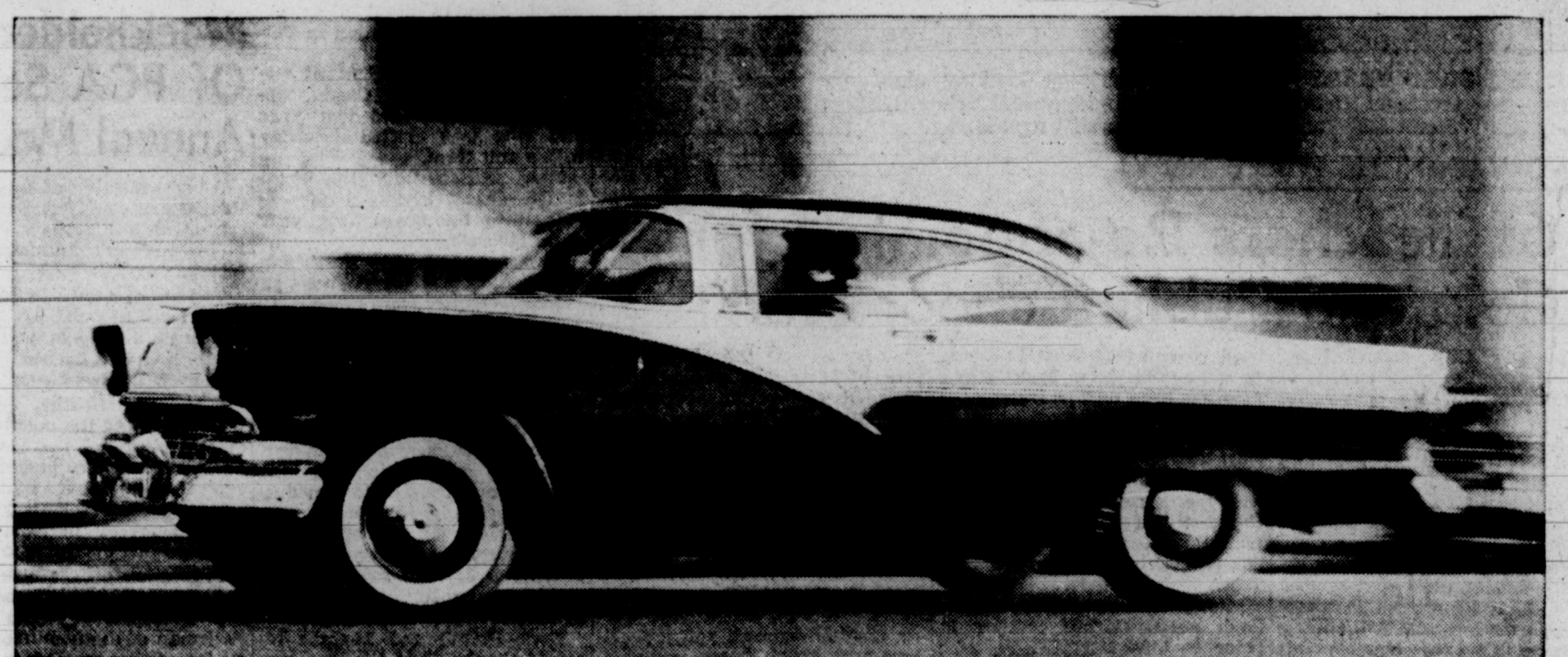

IN TRULOCK HOME

1921 Study Club Reviews Lives Of Texas Newspaper Editors

Lives of two distinguished Texans were reviewed Friday by members of the 1921 Study Club in the home of Mrs. V. R. Trulock, club president.

Mrs. J. T. Pritchett discussed the life of George Bannerman Dealey in her article, "Great Texan's Great Days".

Work of a small town editor, R. Kenneth Towery, was reviewed by Mrs. R. P. Ainsworth.

G. B. Dealey began his newspaper career in 1874 as an office boy on the Galveston News. Mrs. Pritchett began, "and continued in his chosen profession until his death in 1946."

"In 1885 he helped to found the Dallas Morning News, of which he was eventually publisher and part owner," she said.

A Texan first and foremost, Dealey worked tirelessly to promote the development of his city and state, she explained.

He considered his position as publisher of the Dallas Morning News a public office of the highest responsibility, the group heard.

"In 1939 newspaper men from all over the country gathered in Galveston to honor Dealey as the

"Dean of Journalism," Mrs. Pritchett concluded. "It was his 65th anniversary with the News."

Mrs. Ainsworth revealed that Kenneth Towery was winner of the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished reporting of local affairs just eight months after he tried to resign as managing editor of the Cuero Record.

"When a person meets the 32-year-old editor," she said, "it is hard to believe that the slight, soft-spoken man exposed a multi-million dollar land fraud that had gone unchallenged for six years."

"His expose led to 278 indictments against unscrupulous land operators," Mrs. Ainsworth continued, "and the indictment of Bascom Giles, one of Texas' most highly respected officials."

Before moving to Cuero, Towery spent most of six years in Veterans' hospitals, recovering from tuberculosis which he contracted in Japanese prison camps.

Edward Murrow paid tribute to Towery on a television program saying, "A circulation of 3,800 isn't much power as newspapers are measured, but courage and power are not always

found in the same package."

The semi-formal affair will be hosted in the school cafeteria.

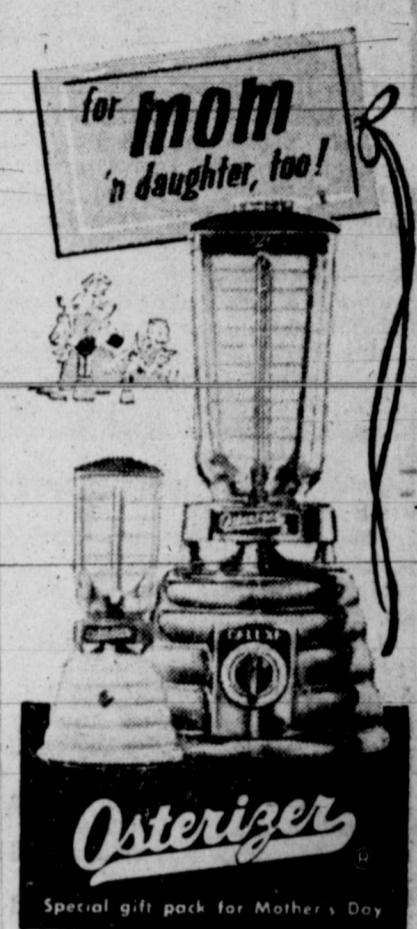

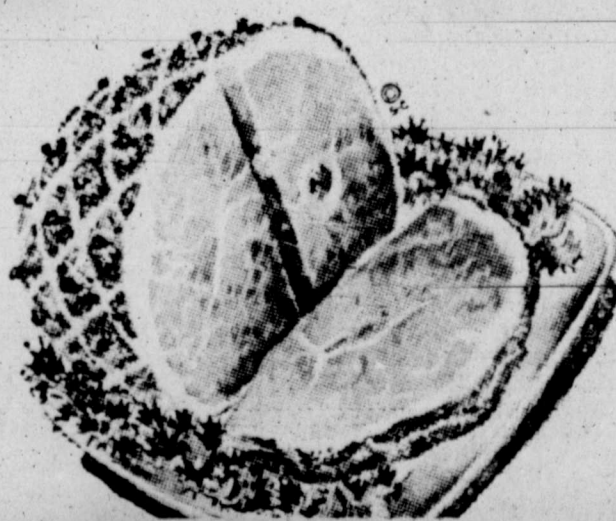

PRE-REGIONAL TRACK MEET

Seven Wolf Cindermen Go To Strong Amarillo Meet

Colorado High's District 5-A track champions will enter Amarillo's Big Sandie Relays Saturday—a severe test for any cinder team.

The meet features the district winners of the strongest teams in the Panhandle and West Texas, a preview of what the regional tests offer.

Colorado High's chances were improved this week when it was revealed that the meet will be divided into two classes this year—Class AA and A.

Last year the Wolves won third in the meet that pitted all classes together. They scored 18 points to finish behind Abilene and Amarillo.

Coach Bob Reilly will carry a seven-man team to Amarillo, leaving here Friday noon in time to rest Friday night before the prelims Saturday morning.

The seven—who qualified for regional by winning at least a third place in district—are Don Fite, Frank Mackey, Doyle Herring, Bancker Cade, Delbert Lewis, Jim Windham and Dru Vowell.

Colorado City may have a chance of winning the Class A division of the meet, mainly on the strength of their two fine relay teams.

Running on the sprint and mile relays are Fite, Cade, Herring and Mackey.

Fite and Cade are also entered in the 100-yard dash and Mackey in the 220.

Herring will run in the open quarter and Lewis in the mile run.

Windham and Vowell will carry the Wolves' hopes in the weight events, each tossing the shot put and discus.

It was Hollis Gainey who paced the Wolves last year at Amarillo with wins in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes in ties of 9.7 and 21.8, respectively.

But Reilly will have to rely on a more balanced team without an outstanding star at this year's meet.

Fite picked up a fourth in both the 100 and 220 last year at Amarillo with a 10 flat in the century.

Windham took a second in the shot behind Jon Cantrell of Pampa with a heave of 50 feet 8 3/4 inches.

Wolves ran a terrific 3:27.7 in the mile relay at Amarillo last year only to finish second to Abilene.

Only runner missing from that same foursome is Gainey.

But the top mark of this year's relay quartet is 3:30.3. If they are pushed Saturday they could dip below the 3:30 mark.

C-ity's top competition will probably come from Stamford in the mile relay. The Bulldogs pushed the Wolves last Saturday in the district meet only to finish 15 yards behind.

Wolves have been defeated only once this year in the sprint relay, running against all classes. That one defeat was a close affair at the Permian Basin Relays when Andrews nipped the Wolves at the tape in 44.3 seconds.

Mackey could pick up points in the high jump where he leaped 5-10 Saturday in district.

Herring could finish high in the 440-yard dash if he duplicates his best time this season of 50.7 seconds.

Wolves will compete in the regional Saturday, April 21 at Brownwood with the winners of Districts 6-A, 7-A and 8-A.

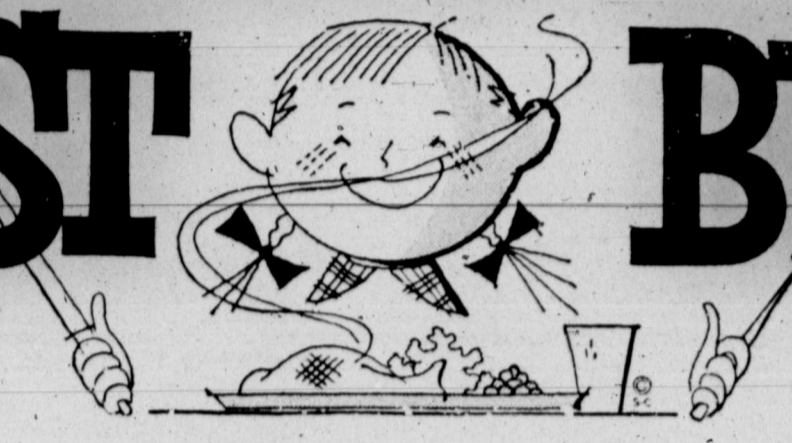
Ash's unit, the 3rd Armored Division, now stationed at Fort Knox, Ky., will replace the 4th Infantry Division in Europe.

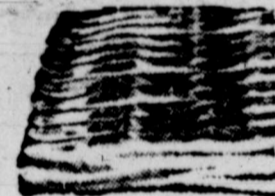

PALMER REPORTS

Address Problem Slows Local Mail

The Postal Department is operating a continuing campaign to reduce the amount of misdirected mail being handled by postal employees, both in post offices and in the Railway Transportation Service. Postmaster S. A. Palmer emphasized this week.

"Misdirected mail multiplies handling and operating costs," said Palmer, "and we have been attempting to eliminate some of the errors and unnecessary handling at this office."

Biggest problem here is that many Postoffice residential patrons and business men have not realized the importance of correct mailing address on both incoming and outgoing mail, according to Palmer.

"Right now," the postmaster said, "we have too much mail that must be handled two or three times before it is delivered."

"This is mail with an incorrect mailing address or none at all."

"For example," Palmer said, "a business man who gets all of his mail in a post office box will sometimes receive mail ad-

ressed to his street address, such as 20 Main Street.

"A good distributor will throw that mail to the city carrier, who must mark it as not being for his route, and return it."

If the business man is known to the distributor, the distributor throws the mail to the box section, if not, perhaps to another carrier or to general delivery.

Business people should be careful to show that their correct address is shown in the letterheads and the return address on their envelopes. Their correct mailing address is, of course, wherever they get their mail, whether in a postoffice box or at a street address, or on a rural route.

Palmer said that postoffices over the country are trying to do a better job and added:

"We'd sure appreciate the help of our patrons. When you extend credit to a customer, try to find out his mailing address, and when you write them or your business associates, be sure that your own correct address is shown on your correspondence."
