Monday, Jan. 25 will find Vega's junior highs meeting the Hart teams on their home court.

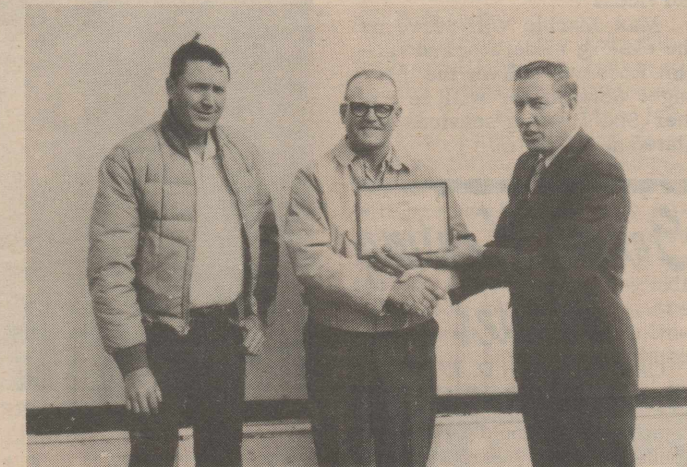
Boys "A" team and girls "B" team will travel to Sudan Jan. 26. First game is at 6:30

Farm Real Estate Loan Limits Raised By New Bill

With President Nixon's signature, Congressman Bob Price of Pampa has seen his proposal to boost FHA farm real estate loan limits by 40 per cent become law. Price was author of the initial legislation raising FHA farm ownership loan limits from \$60,000 to \$100,000.

"Now young people trying to get a start in farming, Viet-

nam veterans and established farmers interested in expanding their operations, will be able to look to FHA for increased financial assistance. This is of vital importance to agriculture in the Texas Panhandle, the State of Texas and other farming areas of the country," Price said.

Price stated that raising FHA loan limits for farm land purchases is an absolute necessity.

"Inflation is a cancer eating away at the wealth of this nation; no person or business is exempt from its effects," he said. "If farmers are to be expected to continue to produce high quality foods and fibres at a cost to the American consumer that is lower than any time in our nation's history, then farmers will need access to expand its sources of credit which they can use to make farming operations as efficient as possible," he added.

The Texas lawmaker said he was particularly proud of his proposal because its enactment would not cost the taxpayer more money. Funds for the FHA home ownership program are raised from private investors through the sale of FHA notes in the private money market.

Farm Programs Are Explained

Charley Hill, Castro County ASCS Executive Director, makes the following announcement:

1971 COTTON PROGRAM:
Allotments will be approximately 67 and one-half percent of the 1970 allotments. Payments will be on the entire allotment, if 90 percent of the allotment is planted. Payment rate will not be less than 15¢ per pound. Setaside acres will not exceed 20 percent of the allotment.

Before the 1971 cotton yield can be established, farmers must report their 1970 production.

"Please bring your 1970 production to this office as soon as possible," Hill said.

1971 WHEAT & FEED GRAIN PROGRAM:

Barley will not be considered a feed grain for 1971. Grain sorghum and corn bases will be about the same as for 1970. Price support payments will be paid on 50 percent of the base. Setaside acres will not exceed 20 percent of the base.

Kindergarten Has Openings

Superintendent Ted Averitt announces that there are still a few openings for children in the public school kindergarten.

To be eligible to participate in the kindergarten program, the child must be economically or educationally deprived and must be old enough to begin school in the fall.

WTSU Professor Speaks To Lions Of ROTC Program

Lt. Col. John Childs, professor of military science at West Texas State University, was guest speaker Monday at the luncheon meeting of the Lions Club. Accompanying him was Sgt. Major Bradshaw.

Twenty-two members were present along with other guests. Jean Foster, Lions Queen, Everett Heller, George Bennett and Orvil Friday.

Childs spoke on the five main points of the ROTC program at colleges and universities in the U. S. ROTC teaches leadership abilities, he stated. In addition, the program can fulfill military obligations, provide financial assistance for students, help make the student a better citizen for military or civilian life and provides officers for armed services at less expense than other sources and from a cross section of the nation.

Wheat allotments will be approximately 44.2 percent of the 1970 allotments. Wheat certificates will be paid on the full allotment. Set-aside acres will be between 60 - 75 percent of allotments. Substitution will be permitted between wheat and grain sorghum for history purposes.

The feed grain base, wheat and cotton allotments under the set-aside program does not represent an acreage limitation but will be used for the following two purposes. 1. To determine the amount of price support payment. 2. To determine the amount of set-aside acreages.

Once the set-aside and conserving base is met, there is no limit to the number of acres that can be planted. Two or more blank-rows in a skip-row pattern will be eligible for set-aside acres for 1971.

LOAN PROGRAM:
1970 Warehouse storage: Grain sorghum and wheat loan may be extended for the 1971-1972 storage period. 1970 crop: corn, soybeans, 1969 grain sorghum and 1968, 1969 wheat loans cannot be extended.

WHEAT YIELDS:
The county committee is in the process of establishing 1971 wheat yields. Farmers may want to establish a yield based on actual production. The base period for proving 1971 farm wheat yield is 1967, 1968 and 1969.

"To prove your yield" Hill said, "you must have harvested wheat acreage in each of these three years. If you want to prove your 1971 wheat yield you must have filed a written request by Jan. 7."

Childs earned a bachelors degree from Texas A&M University in 1953 and a master's degree from George Washington University in 1968.

He received his commission through an ROTC program and entered the Army as a second Lieutenant in the infantry in November 1953. Initial assignments included tours as a student in infantry school and duty as an infantry platoon leader.

Childs then was assigned company commander in the 101st Airborne Division and in 1962, was assigned to the Republic of Vietnam as battalion advisor to the Vietnamese Army.

Following his initial tour in Vietnam, Lt. Col. Childs attended the Army Command and General Staff College. After an assignment of duty in Washington D. C. as infantry career assignment officer, he returned to Vietnam and served as per-

Kathy Graham Graduates Amarillo Nursing School

Kathy Graham is among the 1970 graduates of Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing.

Graduates of the School have made the highest score in the state in the course, "Nursing of Children", for the fourth time in five years.

Mrs. Clark Earthman, RN, has been the instructor in this course since 1959. The 72 graduates from Northwest who took the State Board Examination for Licensure 1969-70 ranked among the top schools in the state according to reports received recently by Mrs. Marilyn Dyer, Director of the School. Of the 41 Texas schools including seven baccalaureate programs, 14 associate degree programs and 20 hospital diploma schools, Northwest graduates made the highest score in the state in "Nursing of Children" and "Psychiatric Nursing". They ranked second in the state in "Obstetrical Nursing" and tenth in "Medical and Surgical Nursing".

Mrs. Dyer stated that these outstanding achievements of Northwest graduates have been consistent over the last ten year period. Northwest is the largest hospital school in the state with a current enrollment of 302 students. For the past two years, the school has implemented an intensive program sponsored by Federal Loan Funds and Scholarships to re-

cruit students from disadvantaged and depressed areas. A number of students are currently enrolled in the school under this program.

Northwest is also one of the first schools in the nation to develop a program to grant credit to Licensed Vocational Nurses toward completion of the RN program.

Mrs. Dyer stated that the school had received more than 30 requests for information on the LVN program from schools in all parts of the United States who plan to develop a similar program. To date, Northwest has received 300 inquiries from LVN's interested in the program.

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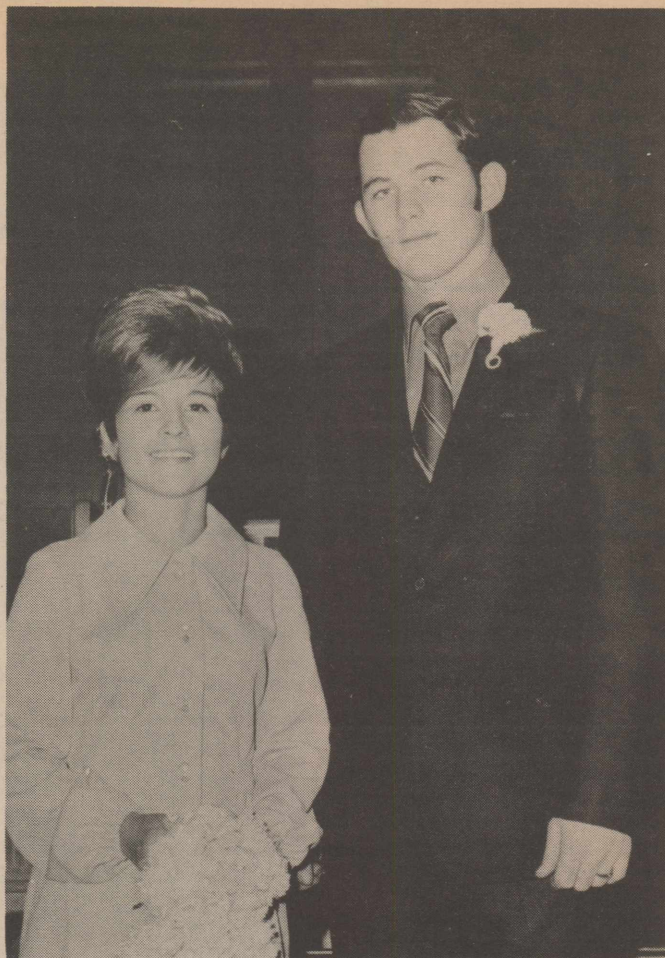

SWPS Announces Additions In Area's Power Production

A 14 per cent addition to the area's electric generating capability in mid-1971 and plans for still another major power production unit in 1974 highlight a nearly 20-million dollar construction program for 1971, announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

The addition to electric generating capability in mid-year will come about when the first unit goes into service at Jones Station, located southeast of Lubbock. The 256,000 kilowatt generator will be the largest single unit on the company's system and will put the company's total power-producing capability at nearly 2,000,000 kilowatts. That's more than twice what it was 10 years ago.

Tolk also revealed plans for the second 256,000 kilowatt machine at the new facility. A twin of the one which will go into 1971 service, the new unit has been ordered from Westinghouse Corporation. Ground will be broken for the second unit in 1972.

"We don't propose to get into any bind insofar as adequate power supply to serve our customers is concerned. It takes longer to get electric generating equipment these days, so we've put our order in to adequately meet our requirements. We are noting an increase in number of customers throughout our service area, an indication that we are returning to a growth pattern, and we want to have the electric power supply that will stimulate that growth," Tolk said in making the plant expansion announcement.

Jones Station is named for

Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech University, and a director of Southwestern Public Service Company since 1945.

When the two units are in service, Jones Station alone could serve a city three times as large as Lubbock or Amarillo and it is just one of eleven generating facilities on Southwestern's interconnected system.

There has been no power shortage problem in Southwestern's service area. In 1970, for example, when some sections of the area were plagued with brownouts and voltage reductions, Southwestern's customers were able to continue to use electric power without restriction and the company passed through its summer peak period with reserves that exceed the peak demand by more than 20 per cent. The 1971 Jones Station addition is designed to provide adequate power reserves during the three year period until the 1974 unit is completed.

1971 is Southwestern Public Service Company's Golden Anniversary Year. The company was incorporated at Roswell, New Mexico in 1921 as the Roswell Public Service Company. Its service area now covers 45,000 square miles in parts of four states and it serves 225,000 customers. It has an investment in plant and equipment that is now approaching 500-million dollars and it has been adding to that investment at an annual average rate of 20-million dollars for the last ten years.

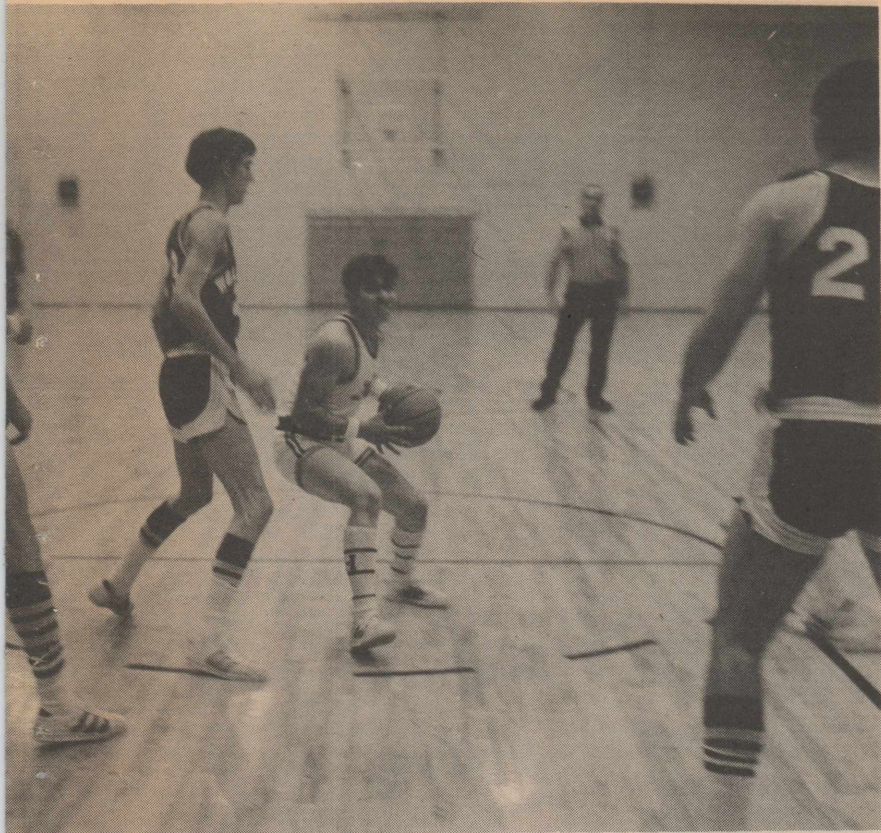

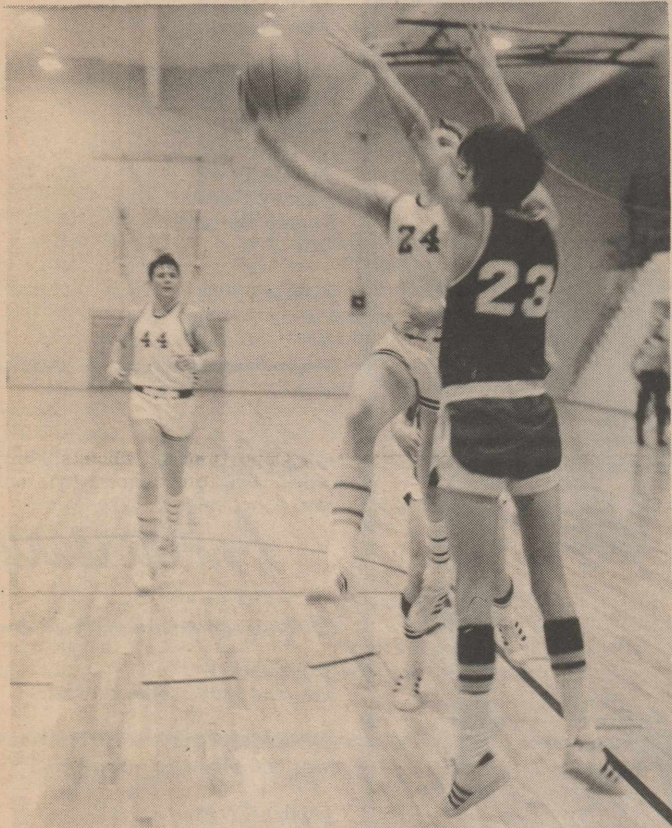
CONSOLATION PLAY -- Hart's "B" boys lost out in the consolation game last "B" tournament at Springlake-Earth.

ACTION ON THE HARD COURT -HHS "B" teams competed last weekend in a basketball tourney in Springlake-Earth. The girls won second place in the tournament.

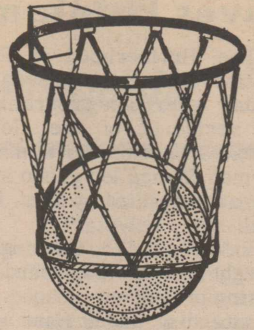

Homemakers Haven

Game meat has come a long way from being cooked in an open pit to our present day methods. The modern methods and seasonings enhance the flavor of these seasonal treats which once were daily fare.

SMOTHERED DOVE

Use 12 to 15 dovebreasts. Fry these as you would chicken, then drain off grease. Add 2 cups water and 1/4 cup margarine. Cover and bake in slow oven, 275 degrees for 1 1/2 to 2 hours. This makes the dove very tender and forms its own delicious gravy.

BARBECUE DUCK

6 ducks
water to cover ducks
1 pint barbecue sauce
2 onions.

Parboil ducks and onions in

deep sauce pan with a tight fitting lid. The onions take out "gamey" taste. When tender remove ducks and place in shallow pan with lid and baste with barbecue sauce 30 minutes.

PHEASANT

Slice pheasant breasts. Pound like steak with a few sprinkles of Accent. Dip in milk and roll in fine cracker crumbs. Fry in oil slowly til golden brown on both sides. Salt to taste.

The other pieces of pheasant: roll in flour. Brown slowly. Pour off oil. Pour one can of cream of celery or mushroom soup plus one can of water over this. Salt to taste. Simmer slowly in oven for 1 hour at 300 degrees.

QUAIL AND RICE CASSEROLE

6 quail

1 pkg. Jolly Green Giant pilaf rice

1 can mushroom soup

1 can of bits and pieces of mushrooms

Soak quail in salt water about 30 minutes. Then prepare and fry as usual. When nice and brown, place in pressure cooker and steam about 20 minutes. While they are steaming, prepare the rice. Combine rice and can of soup and mushrooms, placing the quail in mixture. Cover. Bake in oven about 20 minutes at 300 degrees.

VENISON BURGERS

1 lb. ground deer meat

1 T. chili sauce

1 stalk celery, finely chopped

1 chopped onion

1 carrot, ground up

Mix ingredients together, form into thick patties and fry until brown in heavy skillet. Cover pan and cook slowly until done.

DEER CHILI

2 lbs. venison, coarsely ground

1/4 lb. rendered tallow

4 large chili pod peppers

2 T. chili powder

6 small cloves of garlic

6 crackers

Salt to taste

Put tallow in pot. Add meat and cook over low heat about 15 minutes. Take seed out of pepper pods and grind with crackers; add to chili meat and cook very slowly a few minutes; add enough hot water to thin. Simmer until meat is tender.

Savings Bonds Sales Reported

According to a report received from Judge R. E. Wilson, Chairman of the Castro County Savings Bonds Committee, sales of Series E, and H United States Savings Bonds in Castro County during the month of November totaled \$4,502. Eleven-month sales were \$36,158 for 60% of the 1970 goal of \$60,000.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$14,915,027 compared to \$12,962,108 during November 1969. The January-November sales totaled \$166,883,983 for 93 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$179.9 million.

Over the Nation during November there were new purchases of E and H Bonds amounting to \$373 million. Sales for the first eleven months of 1970 were \$4,281 million - 5.8 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds totaling \$212 million were reported for the first eleven months - a 27 per cent increase over the \$167 million exchanged during 1969.
