## Federal Old-Age And Survivor's Insurance Plan

(Editor's Note: The following is the first of a series of articles prepared by W. O. King, manager of the Abilene Social Security Board field office, to be published in this paper. The information contained in the series of articles is educational and of interest to the general public. Additional information can be secured by addressing W. O. King, 205 Alexander Building, Abilene, Texas.)

### Federal Insurance for Wage Earners and Their Families

Most of the changes in the Social Security Act made by Congress last August relate to the provisions for old-age insurance and survivors benefits. Three of the amendments concern almost every family in the United States in one way or another:

1. Monthly benefits beginning in 1940. This is 2 years earlier than was provided in the original act.
2. In addition to monthly payments to insured wage earners who are eligible for benefits after reaching the age of 65, monthly benefits will be paid to aged wives and minor children of these annuitants. Monthly benefits are also provided for aged widows, for orphans, and for widows with minor children; and, in some cases for dependent parents of insured wage earners who die.

The wage tax of 1 per cent each for employers and employees remains the same until 1943. That is, provided the tax will not be increased in 1940, as was provided under the old law.

## HE IS AN AMERICAN

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article, which appeared in the New York Sun, was sent by Karl Hohlitzelle, president of Interstate and Texas Consolidated Theatres, to all theatre managers, to be posted in their theatres. It is so full of truth that a copy was secured by this paper for reproduction.)

He is an American. He hears an airplane overhead, and if he looks up at all does so in curiosity, neither in fear nor in the hope of seeing a protector.

His wife goes marketing, and her purchases are limited by her needs, her tastes, her budget, but not by decree.

He comes home of an evening through streets which are well lighted, not dimly in blue.

He reads his newspaper and knows that what it says is not concocted by a bureau, but an honest, untrammelled effort to present the truth.

He has never had a gas mask on.

He has never been in a bombproof shelter.

His military training, an R. O. T. C. course in college, he took because it excused him from the gym course.

He belongs to such fraternal organizations and clubs as he wishes.

He converses with friends, even with chance acquaintances, expressing freely his opinion on any subject, without fear.

He does not expect his mail to be opened between posting and receipt, nor his telephone to be tapped.

He changes his place of dwelling, and does not report so doing to the police.

He carries an identification card only in case he should be the victim of a traffic accident.

## FINN DEFEAT BELIEVED TO BE NEAR NOW

Russian might was beginning to tell in a serious way against Finnish bravery today, with reports being received that Soviet forces had cracked through one of the first line defenses of the Karelian Isthmus and that Finns had retreated to their second line. It was not thought that they could hold out much longer against the 50 to 1 odds with which they are faced.

At the place where the Reds have broken through the first line defenses, the army is within 12 miles of Viipuri, one of the important cities of Southern Finland. Once through the Mannerheim Line, Finland is believed to be doomed.

Although they are fighting stoutly, the Finns have abandoned counter attacks, in order to preserve their fast dwindling manpower. Reservists of the classes of 1897 and 1896, men of 43 and 44 years, have already been called to the colors, and women and girls are manning telephones, carrying dispatches, and, in some instances, even grabbing up rifles and aiding in the fighting.

Further to the North, reports from Russia state that Red forces have occupied parts of Summa, but these reports are without verification.

Sweden, upon whom Finland had depended for military aid, today declined to lend this aid in an official capacity, though they allowed Swedish volunteers to join the Finnish army. More material aid from France and England is still hoped for by Finland, but it may come too late, as the Russian massed drives are fast turning the tide of battle in most areas.

## Series of Developments in Europe Has Caused World To Wonder What, If Anything, Is Now In the Making

A whole series of developments in Southeastern Europe and the Near East has caused the world to wonder what is brewing, if anything, in the Balkans and the Near and Middle East.

The Italian supreme defense council has just ended a series of meetings in which complete plans were mapped for war if it comes in the Southeast.

Turkish authorities in London have received information that Russia has started building fortifications along the Russian-Turkish frontier and along the pipelines which cross from the Caspian to the Black Sea to carry the oil from the Baku fields, Russia's great oil reservoir.

Despite German denials, it is reported persistently that German engineers are helping the Russians in these preparations.

Britain and France are massing troops in Egypt, Palestine and Syria, with probably 600,000 men under arms in that region.

All these preparations are clues to the answer but the answer is far from apparent.

It is only possible to review the many diverse factors which enter into the situation and look for the possibilities.

In the opinion of several experienced United Press correspondents just returned from Europe, the preparations are mainly for defense purposes—just in case. They believe the difficulties which would be encountered would make an attack unprofitable to either side.

As one of them put it: "I am not expecting my house to burn down but I have it insured."

Ferdinand C. M. Jahn, United Press correspondent for many years in the Balkans, Turkey, and the Near East, has just returned to this country.

In his opinion, there is no indication of aggressive plans by either Germany or Russia to attack Rumania, which has been guaranteed by the Allies.

Germany, he points out, has an obvious interest in preserving peace in the Balkans just now, because only under normal conditions are the Southwestern countries able to furnish the third reich with vital raw materials.

In case of trouble, the Danube route, Germany's chief artery to the Southeast, would become unsafe and the rich Rumanian oil fields probably would be dynamited.

Because of the German-Russian working agreement, an attack by Russia to recover the Rumanian province of Bessarabia is unlikely, Jahn believes. Berlin does not seem to be reckoning on any Russian move in Rumania; otherwise Germany would not be investing money and efforts in Bessarabia, organizing German-Rumanian enterprises for the cultivation of soy beans and other oil-producing plants.

An Allied move against the Baku oil fields would involve the cooperation of Turkey. While Turkey is presently strong for the Allies, there is an important pro-Russian sentiment in that country, and it might be difficult to persuade Turkey to join in.

It would be a hazardous enterprise to try to send an expeditionary force against Russia over the single-track, poorly-organized Turkish railroads and through the narrow passes of the Caucasus Mountains, which are higher than the Alps.

An attempt to ship troops through the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus also would be hazardous and difficult. Balkan military experts estimate such a venture would take 500,000 to 800,000 men.

## Beer Election Is Called Today for Saturday, March 2

The County Commissioners Court today set Saturday, March 2, as the day on which an election to determine whether or not 14 per cent beer and wines, by volume would be legalized in Eastland County.

Before the action by the court Earl Conner, Jr., district attorney, read the court an opinion obtained from Attorney General Gerald Mann that the election would be legal.

A petition containing more than 800 names was presented to the court this week, requesting the election.

## British Weapon Has Power to Destroy A Tank Or Building

LONDON, Feb. 16.—Great Britain now has a new and powerful weapon in France, to be used against the German forces. The new weapon is known as the Bulldozer, powerful enough to push over tanks and parts of buildings and to demolish nearly everything in its path.

The Bulldozer is expected to see lots of service on the Western Front as soon as hostilities are begun on a major scale.

## Car Believed To Be Stolen Left On Road Near Ranger

A car, believed by officers to have been stolen, was abandoned on Highway 80, near Scenic Point, east of Ranger Thursday night, it was reported today.

According to officers the car ran into the rear end of another automobile on the highway, and the driver fled, leaving the car. There was no key in the ignition lock, but it had been wired around so the motor could be started.

The car was towed into Ranger by Constable John Barnes, and is being held pending an investigation.

## Plant Collector, 70, Pedals For Flowers

At 8:30 the Ranger Junior College second team will play the National Youth Administration team of Ranger, a team that has been winning most of its games this season.

## Olden Man's Nose Broken In Mishap

As long as infection does not develop the condition of John Watson of Olden, hurt in an accident this week and now in St. Paul's Hospital at Dallas, will be regarded as fairly satisfactory, friends said Thursday.

Watson's nose was broken and his lips crushed when the end of a pipe struck him in the face as it was being bent in work at Olden, it was stated.

## Truck Is Wrecked No One Is Injured

A gasoline truck was partly wrecked in the eastern part of Ranger this morning when it struck a telephone pole, a concrete culvert and headed into a ditch, in an apparent effort on the part of the driver to avoid hitting a passenger automobile.

No one was reported injured in the mishap, but damage to the truck was reported to be heavy.

## FINNS MAKING GAINS IN SOME SECTORS STILL

### WITH THE FINNISH ARMY

On the Central Front, Feb. 16.—Finland's silent white ski patrols have smashed a long and determined Russian attempt to break through Mid-Finland and they have threatened another Russian division, the 45th, with destruction, the Finnish commander here said today.

Russian airplanes are dropping ammunition and supplies inside the lines, in indication that large bodies of the Russian troops have been isolated.

The Finns now control the vitally important highway paralleling the frontier between Soumussalmi and Kuhmo. Russian artillery, which had bombarded Kuhmo village for weeks is no longer heard and is believed to be withdrawing.

Dreams of the Russian high command to cut Finland in two have been destroyed, according to information which the Finnish commander made public.

This distinguished man promises to emerge as one of the country's most able military minds. It was he who directed the Soumussalmi victory.

(It was believed certain that the commander referred to, who apparently asked that his name be kept secret, was Gen. Kurt Willenius.)

The commander told me that the Russians could now have little hope of saving what remained of their 45th division.

Sizable Russian detachments are still fighting for their lives, smacking local attacks, supported by crack patrols brought here from the Ural Mountains and Siberia. Just how long it will take the Finnish soldiers to smash them was uncertain. But the Finns were confident.

Russian airplanes have done considerable damage in 10 raids on Kuhmo village, which the Finns now control. As I walked down the main street with the village mayor yesterday columns of smoke still rose above ruins caused by raids last week. Household goods lay strewn in snowbanks. There was a small doll, its head battered, hanging on a back yard fence with shreds of bed clothing thrown there by bombs.

Mr. Uzzell is a native Texan, having lived in Baird, Canadian and Slaton, where his father held business interests. He is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Upon the completion of his seminary training he served as Assistant Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Cleburne. Then he accepted work with the Baptist Home Mission Board and served in Idaho, Washington and California. He is now Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Lancaster, California, and serves a large section of that state under the direction of the Mission Board.

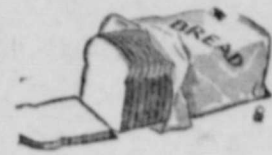

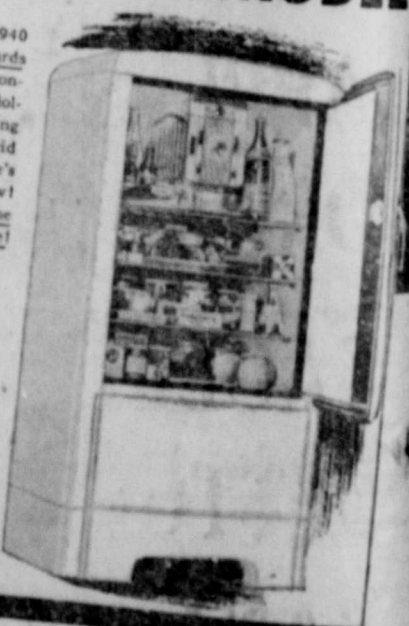

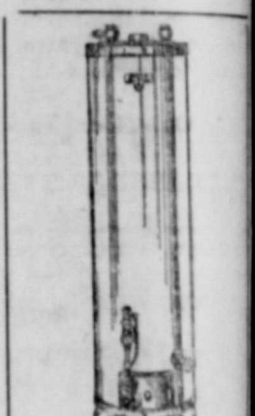
