Be On Alert For Slow-Moving Vehicles, TSA Says

The Texas Safety Association today warned vacation drivers to be on the alert for slow-moving vehicles when traveling on the state's rural roads.

"Slow-moving and oversize vehicles traveling on the same roadway with fast-moving vehicles present real danger to drivers who ordinarily do not drive under such conditions," J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager, said.

"The driver of a fast-moving vehicle frequently does not realize how much he will have to cut his speed when approaching a slow-moving vehicle on the roadway ahead."

Citing the farm tractor as one type of slow-moving vehicle drivers may expect, he explained the speed factor involved.

"The top speed for many tractors is around 20 miles an hour. At this speed a tractor is moving 29 feet a second. A car traveling 60 miles an hour travels 88 feet a second. The car moving 60 miles an hour requires 251 feet to stop under perfect conditions. At 70 miles an hour, 328 feet is required," he said.

Musick also pointed out that hillcrests and curves often hide slow-moving equipment on the road ahead.

"While most equipment operators drive as far to the right and on the shoulder as possible, part of the equipment still may extend out on the roadway. There are times also when it is impossible for the operator to travel on the shoulder of the road," he added.

Some tractor operators attach a 12 to 14-foot vertical pole with a red flag to the vehicle to warn other drivers. Even when a tractor cannot be seen over the crest of a hill, the red flag on the long pole warns drivers that the equipment is present.

Among other safety devices now being used in some states is a pyramid-shaped metal shield which is visible day or night. The shield is mounted high on the equipment. It is intended to alert the driver of a fast-moving vehicle of the presence of the equipment.

Musick also advised drivers to be on the alert for farm equipment crossing the roadway and turning onto or off the roadway.

"Watch for movement of road construction equipment and crews in areas where new roads are being built or repaired," he added.

In closing, Musick pointed out that slow-moving equipment has a tendency to cause other vehicles to follow too closely. This violation is indicated in many investigations of rural accidents. Impatience to get around such equipment is another cause of accidents.

"So, to stay out of trouble where such conditions exist, stay alert, slow down, keep your distance and be patient," he said.

Orville Kinnibrugh, Vera, Gets County's First Certificate Diversion Payment

Knox County's first certificate and diversion payment in the voluntary 1964 Wheat Program was made this week to Orville Kinnibrugh of the Vera Community, one of the thousands of wheat producers cooperating in the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Program.

O. E. Moore, County ASC Chairman, revealed that Mr. Kinnibrugh received a check for \$547.67 under the 1964 legislation designed to help maintain wheat grower income while avoiding any increase in Government costs in the program.

Besides diversion payments, domestic and export marketing certificates are also issued with a domestic certificate having a value of 70 cents a bushel, and export a value of 25 cents.

The cash value of certificates is in addition to the market price or local loan value. Market prices in Texas have been

Camp Can Be A Health Resort

If you and your family are going camping, along with thousands of others, before the summer is over, remember this: A camp can be a health resort if you keep rules of good health and sanitation foremost in your mind.

You will want to take along a standard first aid kit or at least a disinfectant, tape and gauze. Head off infection by washing and cleaning even minor scratches and cuts.

Choose a camp site near a source of water but away from marshes or likely places for insects to breed. You will need the water for washing even though you won't want to drink just any water.

Check with the Texas State Department of Health or health department of the state you plan to visit before you leave home, if possible. Otherwise, check with local authorities to see if the water source is approved, or safe, before you drink.

If, in case of an emergency, you must drink water from an unsafe source, strain through a clean cloth and boil vigorously for at least one minute. Or you may also add 10 drops—about a teaspoon—of bleach per gallon of water. Mix the solution and wait 30 minutes before drinking.

You may choose camp sites which feature tables, fireplaces and toilet facilities. Or you may prefer strictly to rough it, setting up your own facilities. If so, choose a level, dry spot for the tent or sleeping facilities and put the food up away from curious and hungry animals.

You may construct a camp latrine by simply digging a trench some distance from camp or instruct each person how to dig a simple individual latrine in the woods.

Most campers prefer to carry a limited supply of dishes on a camping trip and wash them after each meal. Sand or mud and twigs are acceptable aids in cleaning pots and pans, although a scouring pad from home will do a quicker job.

They can be dried and sterilized in the sun or over the fire. Slipshod dishwashing can produce both an upset stomach and an unhappy camper.

Wherever or whenever you camp, remember — make your camp a health resort.

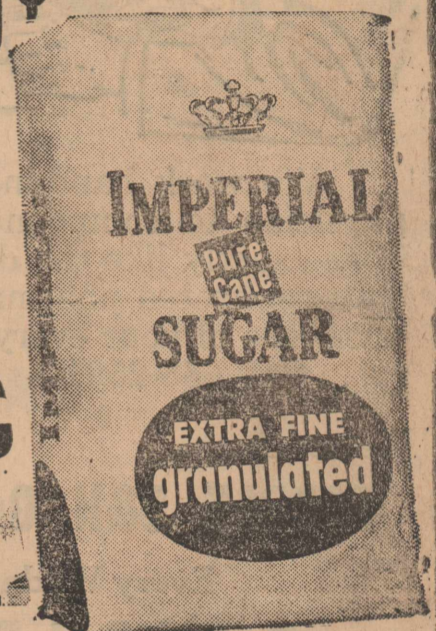

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

A costly plan for "catching up" with other states in the field of higher education has been outlined to Texans by the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School.

It will take considerable money to accomplish just one of the major tests of excellence in education — bringing Texas faculty salaries up to the national average. More is needed for libraries and research facilities.

To help achieve goals in three fields, the Committee recommended that further college construction be delayed. By using present classrooms and laboratories more hours a day and more days a year, this saving can be accomplished, the committee felt.

Gov. John Connally conceded that it will take new taxes to finance the program which he has termed his "No. 1 interest. Neither he nor the committee recommended a financing plan. The committee did say the Legislature should double college tuition, so students and their parents would share more of the cost of education.

Plans calls for expansion of the junior college system, and wide use of vocational training to prepare students for skilled and semi-skilled technical jobs in industry.

Coordination, to eliminate duplication between state colleges, would be placed in the hands of an 18-member board appointed by the governor. Board would take over duties of the present junior college division of the Texas Education Agency and the Commission on Higher Education.

This would put junior and senior college and university supervision in a single group.

Goal would be to make junior college training available to all, and to raise its level of excellence so all junior college credits would be immediately transferable to senior colleges.

Committee, headed by H. B. Zachary, San Antonio construction executive, is taking its case to the public in a series of meetings with business leaders in their communities.

CUT AGAIN — Another 28,000-barrel cut in daily oil allowances was ordered by the Texas Railroad Commission as it held August production to 26.5 percent of the capability of the wells. Two large purchasers complained they are over-supplied with oil and unable to sell it.

A POPULAR PLACE — Texas' State Capitol is being invaded daily by both Texans and out of state tourists who come here to pay tribute to the history of the state. Men, women and children—about three times as many children as parents, it seems — literally crowd the Capitol's halls, their numbers reaching as many as 1,200 daily.

One of the most popular stops on the informal tour (there are no guides) of State buildings is the State Archives and Library just across a walkway from the Capitol.

There, renowned artists Peter Hurd and his son-in-law, Peter Rogers are executing a mural of Texas' history, featuring remarkable likenesses of Stephen F. Austin, Sam Houston and Anson Jones, as well as Davy Crockett and William B. Travis. The mural depicts the conquistador as well as the cowboy.

Visitors are invited to pull up a chair and watch the artists at work, and they do. They are also treated to a newly-arranged re-creation of a room from Gov. Elisha Pease's (1853-57, 1867-69) mansion. Furniture was donated to the archives when former Gov. Allan Shivers purchased the venerable mansion.

MAKING WAY FOR 1990 — A large number of Texas cities with population of less than 50,000 are planning now for the year 1990 by developing a blueprint for progress under a Federal-local program being administered by the state Health Department.

Under this program, a city

can obtain studies of current facilities and projections of future needs in every area from economic sociological needs to budgeting for recaptial improvements. The Housing and Home Finance agency makes grants for the master plans and the city pays one-third the cost, while the Federal agency pays two-thirds.

A typical town under study is the West Texas city of Winters, which has a population of 3,200 and will spend \$4,845 toward a \$13,365 master plan.

So far, 109 cities have enrolled in the planning project to see where they can go and how they can get over the next 25 years.

PUBLIC PIER — Parks and wildlife Department will advertise a second time for bids for concession rights on the new State fishing pier at Port Lavaca. Only one person submitted a bid July 1, after 13 said they were interested.

The 3,200-foot-long pier, which replaced one destroyed by Hurricane Carla, is said to be the world's longest fishing pier. Access to it will be free to the public, but the department is trying to provide a source of bait, soft drinks and fishing gear via a concessionaire contract.

ANIMAL HEALTH HEAD CHANGE DUE — Texas Animal Health Commission will decide on July 27 on a new commission director to replace Dr. R. G. Garrett of Taylor who plans to resign.

Decision will be made at a meeting to be hosted by Chairman Ed Nolle of Sandia at his Knolle Jersey Farm in Jim Wells County. Nolle said there have been several "well-qualified" applicants for the post, but declined to list them. However, it has been rumored that a staff veterinarian with the commission, Dr. S. B. Walker, will be favored.

BRUCellosis PROGRAM IS BLOCKED — Animal Health commission postponed to September a decision on whether to let a Type II brucellosis control program be set up in one part of Brooks county.

Commission has been informed that many Brooks county producers want to organize a program, but the King Ranch which has 3,991 of the 16,000 head of cattle on county tax rolls does not.

Approval of the owners of 75 per cent of the cattle in a county is necessary so the proponents want to organize a program in just the soil conservation district which covers all of the county except King Ranch property.

Commission said it lacked sufficient information for a decision at this time.

WEST TEXAS SCHOOL — West Texas cities that want to be home to a new West Texas School for the mentally retarded will have to wait until at least September 14 to learn which will be chosen.

Chairman of the Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools' site selections committee, C. E. Bentley of Abilene, said his committee will report to the board on that date. However, Bentley did not say that the committee will make a definite recommendation on a single site at that time.

INDUSTRIAL Development — Texas Industrial Commission is boasting in the July issue of Texas Parade Magazine that 27 new plants were announced in Texas in May. Map used to illustrate the new industry points out quite prominently the fact that while the Dallas-Fort Worth area gained 12 of these new plants, seven were located in Panhandle towns and six others were in other small towns.

Commission announced that Patrick J. Ryan of the Lamesa Chamber of Commerce and Sylvan R. Lange of Greater Marshall Industries have been approved for the first year class at the Industrial Development Institute in Norman, Okla.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULINGS — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr ruled that a county elec-

tion board must furnish voting booths for all polling places within each city of 10,000 or more inhabitants.

Carr also ruled that a county clerk does not have authority to charge the fee for releasing of a chattel mortgage or lien on personal property at the time such mortgage is filed.

VETERANS' COMMISSION — State Auditor C. H. Cavness reports that the Veterans' Affairs Commission helped Texas Veterans and their dependents and survivors obtain \$93,591,000 in benefits during the year which ended August 31, 1963.

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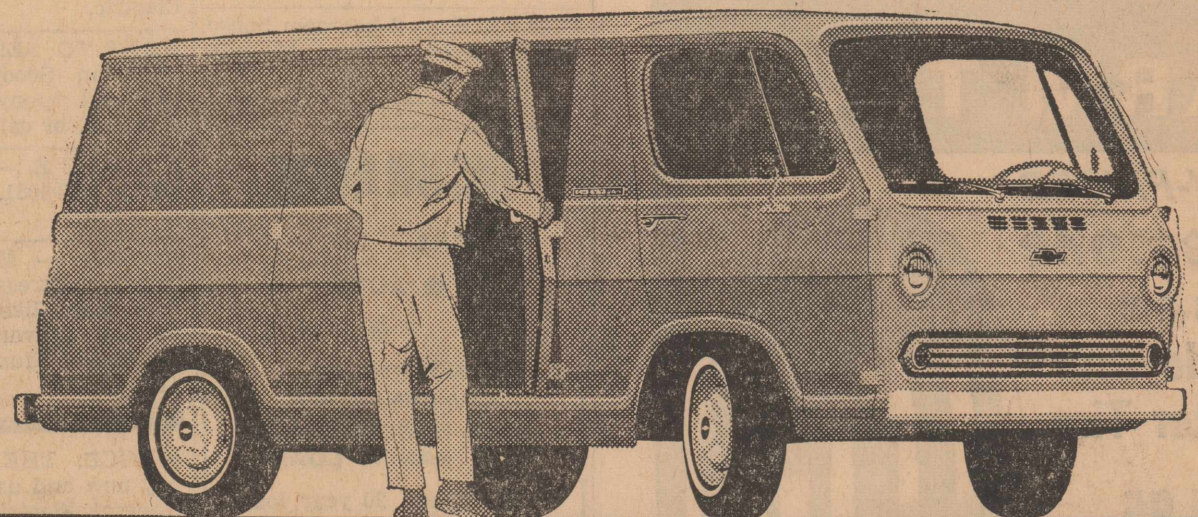

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

THE LAWYER'S ROLE

There was a time when the method of trying lawsuits was so technical that the lawyer was considered a behind-the-scenes manipulator.

Now, since the public has come to know more about trial procedure, this erroneous conception largely has been corrected. The attorney is pictured for what he really is—a hard-working fellow who presents a case in a manner designed to fully and legitimately protect his client's interests.

The lawyer's duty starts with his first contact with his client. When advised of the controversy, he usually questions his client thoroughly to determine all of the facts involved. His first duty is to objectively evaluate the facts involved. He immediately advises his client to tell everything.

Facts and circumstances which may seem trivial to the client can be of great value to the lawyer in the trial of the cause.

The attorney then fits the law to the facts involved, and determines the theory under which lawsuit or controversy must be approached. It is surprising to the layman to learn that no two cases are alike; and, that nearly always it is necessary for a lawyer to "hit the books" to find a case or decision which governs the particular principle involved. This is sometimes a long and arduous task depending, of course, upon the intricacies of the factual and legal situation.

Quite frequently the lawyer will find it necessary to take statements of opposing parties or of witnesses to determine what facts they know that will confront him later in the trial. He is permitted to do this under our rules at any time before the trial. He also immediately starts planning his strategy, and determining the main points, factual and legal, upon which he will rely.

The next step in nearly every instance is negotiations between the parties which may not lead to a settlement. This usually takes considerable time, ingenuity and diplomacy. As a result many cases are settled out of court.

If the case is not settled, the attorney then prepares for trial. The case may be won or lost in trial preparation.

One of the most important aspects of a trial is the jury. The fate of the lawsuit is determined by 12 persons drawn from different walks of life, of different interests, and frequently of different race, sex, and nationality. The lawyer presents his client's case to the jury through examination of witnesses and the introduction of other evi-

dence. Based on this evidence the jury decides what are the facts of the case and renders its verdict in accordance with their findings.

DRIVERS' ED. CLASS OVER

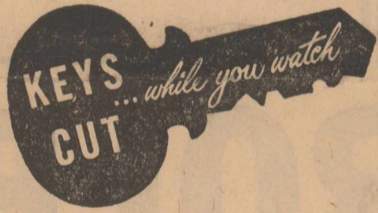

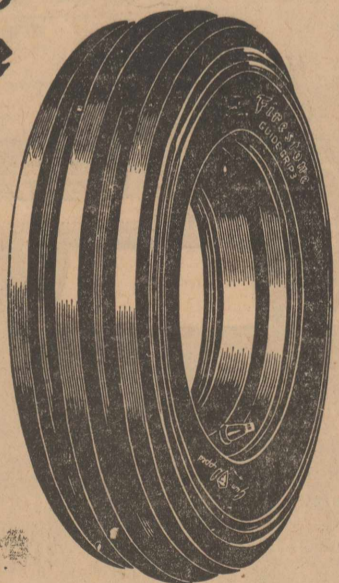
