FIGHTING IN MEXICO NEAR TUXPAN IN PROGRESS TODAY

THINK SITUATION NOT ENCOURAGING

REPORTS OF EXECUTIONS CON-
TINUE TO REACH STATE
DEPARTMENT

NEW PRESIDENT IN JANUARY

Result of Convention Which Will Be
Held in Mexico City Awaited
With Interest

Washington, Dec. 28.—General Villa's forces have suspended their attack on Abasco near Tampico and have concentrated their attacks on the seaport of Tuxpan where fighting is in progress today, according to reports to the state department. Reports issued earlier today by the Carranza agency here saying that Gen. Gutierrez had resigned and left Mexico City were contradicted by dispatches to the state department from the Brazilian minister in Mexico City who yesterday had a conference with Gutierrez.

The general situation as reflected in official dispatches, was viewed as not altogether encouraging. Friction is regarded as apparent between the Zapata element and the Gutierrez-Villa faction which thus far, however, has not resulted in any serious break. The chief trouble seems to have arisen over the question of execution and punishment of former federalists. Gutierrez and Villa have been in favor of suspending the executions and giving some federalists an opportunity to join their cause. Zapata, now at Cuernavaca, is represented as opposed to that, as is General Panfili, minister of the interior in the Gutierrez cabinet, and chief spokesman for Zapata. A compromise is being suggested whereby former federalists will be given fair trials; they also would be prohibited from joining the Gutierrez-Villa army.

The American government has found that Gutierrez and Villa look with favor on its suggestion for a general amnesty for political offenders but that the Zapata element seems irreconcilably opposed to it. The situation is expected to develop further at the national convention called for January 1 in Mexico City when a new provisional president will be chosen.

Other messenger advices are in possession of the state department as to military activity of the Carranza forces, but later dispatches say the Zapata forces have advanced to Soldado near Vera Cruz and co-operating with Villa forces are operating in the vicinity of Tuxpan (forces and are driving the Carranza troops to the southeastern portion of Mexico).

Advices from Consul Canada said that Thomas Brenfitt, who went from Washington with credentials from Rafael Zubaran Company to discuss measures of peace with Carranza has been re-arrested at Vera Cruz. He had been taken into custody on his arrival but was released at once from Consul Canada.

BUSCH INTERESTS MAY BUILD MARKET IN WACO

STATEWIDE SERVICE BY UNIQUE LIBRARY SYSTEM

Brings Benefits of Institution To People Throughout Texas Under Novel Plan

Austin, Texas, Dec. 28.—The benefits of the State library are for the people of the entire state, as the result of a unique arrangement whereby this institution has become of statewide, rather than merely local, service. The state library serves every individual in the State both directly and indirectly. The aim of the direct service is twofold. In the first place the State library wants to be to the people of the small town and the rural community what the city library is to the city people. In the second place, it adds the special student interested in the manuscript sources of Texas history or in economic, social and legislative questions.

The only conditions required of any man, woman or child who borrows any book, pamphlet or clipping is that he return the material in good condition in a reasonable length of time and pay transportation charges both ways. In case the desired information can be given by letter, there is no expense whatever.

The indirect service of the State library to every individual in the State lies in its assistance in organizing new libraries and in improving the smaller ones. This service at present is limited for financial reasons to the publishing of a library bulletin, Texas Libraries, to the distribution of library literature written by experts especially for the small library and to counsel upon definite problems submitted in regard to library administration.

Any individual interested in the growth of public libraries over the State should ask the State Librarian to put his name on the mailing list of Texas Libraries.

BIG STEEL ORDER BEING PLACED IN PITTSBURGH

France and Russia Are Large Buyers—Business Since War Started Very Heavy

Pittsburgh, Dec. 28.—Orders for 65,000 tons of high carbonized steel were placed today. 50,000 tons for France and 15,000 tons for Russia. 500 ARE TAKEN TO EGYPT BY
CRUISER FROM PORT
JAFRA

TURKISH GOVERNMENT AGREES

Request is Made of American Ambassador Morgenthau—Washington Is Advised

Washington, Dec. 28.—The cruiser Tennessee with the permission of the Turkish government and at the request of American Ambassador Morgenthau is transporting 500 refugees of different nationalities from Jafra Syria to Alexandria, Egypt. Captain Decker reported the department of the Tennessee from Jafra in a message filed last night and received today at the navy department. Secretary Daniels summarized the report in this statement:

"The Tennessee is transporting about 500 refugees of different nationalities from Jafra to Alexandria. These refugees were unable to get passage by any other means. Captain Decker states that his action was taken at the request from consuls who request approved by the ambassador to Turkey had been made after permission had been given by the Turkish authorities."

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GAINS IN BELGIUM CLAIMED BY FRENCH

ADVANCE WEST OF SOMBAER-
TZYDE REPORTED—LOSE
TRENCHES NEAR YPRES

SLIGHT PROGRESS ALONG MEUSE

Capture of 800 Yards of First Line
Trenches Near Lens Is Also
Claimed Today

By Associated Press.
Paris, Dec. 28.—An official statement came out in Paris this afternoon as follows:

"In Belgium we have continued to advance. To the west of Lombarde we are actually at the foot of the sand dunes on which the enemy has established his line of resistance. At a point south of Ypres we have lost a section of trenches near Hellebeke. In the region of Lens under off attacks our yards of first line trenchments."

In the Valley of the River Aisne and in Champagne there has been in intermittent firing which was particularly severe in the region of Rhodins and around Verthes. Here the enemy directed their artillery fire especially against the positions to the west of Perthes, conquered and occupied by us.

On the heights of the Meuse there has been slight progress by our troops along the entire front. In the Vosges the enemy bombarded the railroad station at St. Die, but the railroad service has not been interrupted. In Upper Alsace to the north-east of Stenbach a counter attack of the Germans was repulsed."

SURRENDERS AFTER SIX YEARS, ON MURDER CHARGE

He has surrendered, walking into Sheriff Tobin's office and giving himself up. He was released on \$1000 bond.

DAMAGE IN HARRIS COUNTY BY RECENT HEAVY RAINS

NEW ORLEANS NEWSPAPERS DECLARE FOR "OPEN SHOP"

The principal point that caused the break between the Typographical Union and the publishers was the "five day" rule recently enforced by the union. It provides that a printer holding a position may work only five days a week. This the publishers claim causes confusion and extra expense.

INCIDENT RECALLS POLITICAL HISTORY

E. G. SENTER AND BASCOM THOMAS
AS EX-STATE SENATORS,
SHAKE HANDS

ENEMIES ALMOST SIX YEARS

Story of How Thomas Was Expelled From State Senate, But Came Back, Regaled

Special to The Times.
Austin, Texas, Dec. 28.—Enemies for six bitter years, E. G. Senter and H. Bascom Thomas, both former members of the state senate, are now friends again. Their reconciliation was effected by W. M. Pearson, a mutual friend. They were brought together in a law office, shook hands and renewed their acquaintance.

The enmity which existed for six years between these two men has its origin in the most dramatic and interesting incidents in the political history of Texas. Both men were members of the state senate in the 31st legislature. Senter being from the Dallas district, Thomas from Hopkins county. One day Thomas arose in the senate and speaking on a question of personal privilege, charged that there was an active lobby at Austin and that some of the senators were being emmeshed in its toils. He named no names and made no direct charges, but he used language that was in a way, a reflection upon every senator present. His words aroused a storm of protest and he made a partial withdrawal. In the meantime news of his charges had gone out over the state and he received many messages urging him to "stay with 'em." Accordingly he renewed his charges, both on the floor and in statements to the press. The senate had a long investigation of the matter and the Travis county grand jury also is said to have probed the matter.

The feeling against Thomas grew among the senators and a resolution petitioning his failure to prove his charges and calling for his expulsion from the senate was introduced. On the same day that A. M. Kennedy, then speaker of the house, was called upon by that body to resign, Thomas heard this resolution receive the twenty-one votes required to pass. It took his hat and coat and walked out of the chamber.

His come-back was prompt. A special election was at once called in his district and Thomas ran for reelection. He was elected, but was returned by an overwhelming majority. However, upon his return to Austin he did not renew the charges he had made and the incident for the time being lay over, although the feeling against him continued to be quite bitter.

Runs Against Davidson.

A. B. Davidson is lieutenant governor and president of the senate when the Thomas charges were made and he took the matter very much to heart, feeling that it was a personal reflection upon himself. He was then serving his second term, but decided to run for a third time and Thomas was his opponent. Thomas told his story on the stump in every section of the State. Davidson was defeated by less than 500 votes and Thomas' friends have never ceased to charge that a fair count would have elected the Hopkins county man. No bitterer dish of crow could have possibly been served to the senators than for Thomas to be elected to the lieutenant governorship. In the course of the campaign Thomas and Senter met in joint debate at Dallas and the Dallas attorney was worsted in the encounter. He was running for reelection to the senate and his debate with Thomas is considered one of the causes of his defeat by J. C. McNealus.

Thus one old scar was closed when Thomas and Senter smiled and shook hands and wished each other Merry Christmas. But there are other enemies, made by the incidents of 1909 and 1910, that time has yet to reconcile.

NIEUPORT ATTACKS FAIL, GERMANS SAY

REPORT DECLARES WARSHIPS
HELPED, BUT DID NO
DAMAGE

NO ADVICES FROM EAST FRONT

Attacks North of Vistula Are Developing Statement Says, In Spite of Weather

Berlin, Dec. 28.—(Via wireless to London, 3:10 p. m.)—The German army headquarters staff today issued the following statement:

"In the western theatre the enemy unsuccessfully renewed his attacks on Nieuport, supported by warships which did not damage us, but killed or wounded a few inhabitants of Westende. An attack on the hamlet of St. George also failed. South of Ypres we captured one of the enemy's trenches and some dozens of prisoners fell into our hands on this occasion."

"Several violent attacks by the enemy in the region northwest of Arras were repelled. To the southeast of Verdun the enemy repeated his attacks but they were without success. A similar result occurred when he attempted to capture heights to the west of Fismes for which we fought yesterday."

"There is no news from East Prussia or from Poland. North of the Vistula and on the left bank of the Vistula our attacks are developing, notwithstanding the very unfavorable weather."

AMERICAN KILLED BY CANADIAN TROOPS

ANOTHER IS SERIOUSLY WOUNDED NEAR FORT ERIE, ONTARIO

COMPLICATIONS ARE PROBABLE

Not Thought Likely, However, That Any Serious Trouble Will Follow Act

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 28.—One American, Walter Smith of Buffalo and another Charles Dorsch seriously wounded today by Canadian troops patrolling the border at Fort Erie, Ontario, opposite this city. The men were hunting ducks in Canadian waters.

When ordered to land on the Canadian shore they headed for the American side. The shooting followed. The soldiers towed the hunters' boat to the Canadian side. Vice Consul J. B. Currie of Fort Erie said:

"Whatever complications will result is a debatable question. While two Americans were shot the information available indicates they were shooting ducks without a Canadian license and were in Canadian waters where they had no right to be, under the circumstances. No arrests have been made."

The police say Varonax recently discarded his fiance for another. Varonax was shot in the back. Identification was made by means of receipts for diamond rings, one purchased two months ago and the other before Christmas. The police say they symbolize his engagement to marry the girl in the case.

RUSSIANS OUT-MANEUVRE AUSTRIANS NEAR CRACOW

Now Hold Positions Of Advantage After Out Guessing Army Trying To Divide Them

Petrograd, Dec. 28.—The investment by the Russians of the Austrian fortress of Cracow has been raised again. After the discovery of an attempt by the Austrians to divide the Russian forces in Galicia the Russians retreated eastward 50 miles.

Russian forces, according to advices received today from Galicia, have succeeded in crossing the Bjala river and in taking possession of a twenty-mile strip of territory south of Tuchow, thereby separating the two Austrian armies.

The forces of General Bohm-Ernoli, the Austrian commander, are claimed by the Russians to be retreating precipitately and the western Austrian army is said to be badly crippled.

The Russian-Galician army which recently was in touch on the south with the Austrian garrison defending Cracow moved back to Biala River, 50 miles east of the former Russian position. Although the Russian retrogression relieved the investment of Cracow it is claimed to be a marked advantage for the Russians the retirement being due to the discovery of the Austrian forces to cut in half the Russian forces in this region.

The Austrians, reports say, began advancing December 23 from Timbark, 35 miles southeast of Cracow, with the apparent object of swinging around to the left of the Russians along the River Biala northward of Tarnow and joining forces with the army of Bohm-Ernoli, which was advancing along the railroad from Sanok and Lisko. The premature appearance of General Bohm-Ernoli's army south of Przemysl, however, put the Russians on their guard and concentrating along the Biala river they attacked the Austrians at Tuchow, 15 miles south of Tarnow where they prevented a junction of the Austrian armies.

Meanwhile the attention of the Russians was directed to the Austrians advancing from Sanok which movement was checked. After their successes in this district the Russians took the defensive along the Biala river. Christmas day they won the battle of Tuchow, the Austrians retreating throughout the following day losing 3,500 prisoners and eighteen machine guns. Later the Russians crossed to the Russian bank of the Biala and successfully stormed the heights of Siebliska four miles south of Tuchow.

The Russians took possession of a 20-mile strip of territory and thus separated the two Austrian forces. General Bohm-Ernoli's army is said by the Russians to be in full retreat and the western army is reported badly crippled.

Bill McDonald, now federal revenue collector, formerly ranger captain, peace officer and personal bodyguard of President Wilson, became a benedict yesterday morning at Quanah, when he and Miss Pearl Wilkerson of that city were united in marriage. By the Baptist minister. They came to this city in the afternoon, being the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Collier until the night train when they left for Dallas.

The bride is a business woman of Quanah and is said to be a number of years the junior of the groom. It was known in Dallas this morning that Capt. Bill had committed matrimony and the captain did not deny it when seen by reporters. Pressed for details, however, he affirmed that it was "nobody's business."

Felter of Chicago and governor Hodges of Kansas.

FEW RUSSIANS WOUNDED; THESE RECOVER RAPIDLY

Re recuperative Powers of Czar's Soldiers Are Remarkable. Men Are Well Fed

By Associated Press. Petrograd, Dec. 27.—The wounded on the Russian side, considering the magnitude of the operations, are comparatively few, according to officers of the medical service. Moreover, those whose wounds are not of the gravest character recover with great rapidity. This is due to three facts, the physicians say, the first being that the Russian troops have been excellently fed from the beginning of the war, the second that the Grand Duke is using the smallest possible forces at the actual front of the fighting line, and the third, that no alcohol is consumed by any of the soldiers. The hospitals are proving that the recuperative powers of the Russian wounded are now equal to the highest ever known, namely the figures reached in the case of the Turkish Moslems.

NUTT PUBLIC DEFENDER
AS WELL AS PROSECUTOR

City Attorney Does Not Permit Indiscriminate Pleas of Guilty in Court

In some cities the office of public defender has been created to represent defendants in the city police court, and see that their cases are fairly and fully presented to the police judge. Such an officer will not be needed in Wichita Falls as long as the present city attorney, Horace Nutt, is in office. Most city attorneys have been content and have believed their duty done when they have written out the complaint. In more than ninety per cent of the police court cases the defendants are ready to plead guilty in order to get their cases off the docket and the

most of the remaining ten per cent do not know how to get their side of the case before the judge and are easily convicted by a skillful city attorney.

Mr. Nutt, however, is not willing for any man to plead guilty whom he believes not to be a bad citizen to see that his side of the case is gotten before the judge as well as the State's case. In many instances his recommendation that a defendant be discharged has been acted upon favorably by Judge Rye. This does not mean that Mr. Nutt is any less diligent in prosecuting offenders who really ought to be prosecuted. When occasion requires our city attorney can and does insist that the full measure of justice be handed out.

Recipe For Plum Pudding.

One cup finely chopped beef suet;
two cups fine bread crumbs; one heaping
cup sugar; one cup seeded raisins;
one cup well-washed currants; one
cup chopped blanched almonds; one
teaspoonful of salt, one of cloves, two
of cinnamon; half a grated nutmeg,
and four well-beaten eggs. Dissolve

thoroughly from a pint of flour then
mix the remainder as follows: In a
large bowl put the well-beaten eggs,
sugar, spices and salt in one cup of
milk stir the fruit, chopped nuts, bread
crumbs and suet in, one after the other
until all are used, putting in the dis-
solved soda last and adding enough
flour to make the fruit stick together,
which will take all the pint. Boil or
steam four hours. Serve with any
well-flavored sauce.

NEW YEAR'S VOWS SERMON SUBJECT

WARNING ISSUED AGAINST MAK-
ING OF RASH RESOLU-
TIONS

FALSE INTEGRITY DEPICTED

Rev. C. C. Smith Draws Lesson From
This Theme at First M. E.
Church Sunday

A warning against making New
Year's resolutions that one cannot
keep was uttered Sunday evening by
Rev. C. C. Smith, pastor of the First
M. E. Church, in a sermon on "Fool-
ish Vows and False Integrity." He
said it was foolish, through a false
sense of integrity, to stand firm by
vows that were made in idleness. His
text was:

"For the sake of his oath he con-
demned it to be given." Matt. 14:9.

He said in part:
"We are approaching the season
of popular vow-making. Before an-
other Sabbath has passed we shall have
come to the beginning of a New Year
and perhaps many of us shall have
sworn off from something or other
and vowed to undertake something
worth while that we have felt called
upon to do. Doubtless some of us
will be led into making foolish vows
and then out of a false sense of in-
tegrity feel compelled to keep them.
I would like to say something guard-
ing us against the making of foolish
vows. Resolution is good. We get
no where unless we determine upon
a goal and resolve to reach it. That
is what resolution means. Resolution
and integrity go hand in hand. We
value our integrity. We are properly
proud of the fact that we are hon-
est. But a question of distinction is
raised often and we must decide
whether we are to be honest with
self and seemingly dishonest with oth-
ers or whether we will follow a popu-
lar notion of honesty with others and
be false to self. A vow should be
a very sacred thing. If it in any way
involves our integrity we must think
of that before we make our vow.
Hence there is no room for foolish
vows. This is too big a part of us,
too sacred a function to be trifled
with. Our vows should include only
worthy things. If we are aware of
bad habits possessing us it is worthy
of us to solemnly vow to be rid of
them and then our better selves de-
mand that in honesty to self we
keep our vows. If on the other hand
we realize that we are neglecting
some very essential part of our na-
tures it is worthy of us to vow that
from henceforth we will give heed to
that legitimate demand of our better
selves and then our sense of integ-
rity will command us to be true to
self in that case. But to trifle with
this exercise of our freedom and to
belittle personality by bickering with
foolish and trivial vows is beneath
manhood and not worthy of us.

Herod's Idle Promise.
"The text setting illustrates this
point. Herod was a king with much
power. He had little moral compunc-
tions but seems to have been pos-
sessed of a certain regard for his promise.
John Baptist had been cast in-
to prison for preaching the truth
(How foolish to try to stop a truth
by forceful methods of this charac-
ter). Herod's illegitimate wife had
been stung by the keen point of John's
preaching, and she desired his execu-
tion. She knew the king's weakness,
and so during a feast of revel in the
king's palace, when they were all
drunken, she caused her daughter to
execute some oriental dances before
the king which greatly pleased him
and his henchmen. In those days
such performances were openly in the
direction of sensuality. They made
no concealment of their purpose. To-
day we put them on the stage under
the guise of art and expression. The
name only is changed. The purpose
and the effect are the same. We may
call it Neptune's Daughter rather than
Herodias' Daughter, distinction with-
out difference. Herod in his momen-
tary exaltation called the maiden to
him and promised to grant any re-
quest that she might make. His vow
was extremely foolish. He might
have known to what he was commit-
ting himself. But he made the vow
and the maiden instructed beforehand
asked for the head of John the Bap-
tist. The king was very sorry. Per-
sonally he liked John. He knew that
John was right and that he was
preaching the truth and he admired
the bravery of the maiden. But his
word was out and for his oath's sake
he ordered the execution of a man
whom he knew to be innocent of a
crime. He was a weak man in the
possession of great power. He was
sorry but trapped. Every man is a
king in his own right. No man need
be led into a vow that outrages con-
science in its execution. Herod out-
raged his conscience in order to ap-
pear honest. What a contradiction of
ideas. He made a pretense of hon-
esty with his wife and his henchmen
but was openly dishonest with him-
self.

"In a matter so important as vow-
making all foolishness should be care-
fully guarded against. Honesty de-
mands honesty with self. One must
think over all that is involved in the
vow. What may it cost me of self re-
spect if I make and keep such a
vow? The vow itself may be a re-
flection on our intelligence. It may
involve us in foolish if not sinful sit-
uations. If we discover that we have
been misguided and have made fool-
ish vows honesty demands that we
abrogate the vow. When the foolish-
ness becomes evident we should get
ourselves out of the folly as soon as
possible. Our deed contemplated
in our vow is wrong we cannot make
it right by pleading that we have
promised. Herod can not justify the
murder of John on the ground that
he had given his word. One wrong
can not right another wrong. One
wrong, even a very foolish wrong is

likely to involve one in a veritable
chain of wrongs and the sooner one
breaks from the chain the better. De-
cisions are far reaching. Grave con-
sequences may follow our foolish jest-
ing and foolish vow making.

Vowing the Right Thing.

It is easy to see in the case of
Herod how he involved himself in a
foolish contradiction. He recognized
the truthfulness of John's indict-
ment. He saw that he had been deli-
berately trapped into making the
promise, but his word was out. No
matter how grave the consequences his
standard of honesty demanded that
his word be kept. Accordingly he
beheaded an innocent man for telling
the truth. He kept his word but he
was both dishonest and a murderer.
Our foolish vow is made. We awake
to the folly of it. What shall we do
about it? We must be true to our
better convictions. We can not well
afford to be false with self. We can
not escape responsibility for the con-
sequences of our vow. Therefore if
we discover that we have made a
foolish vow we must be true to self
and to the future and break the vow.
In Herod's case the truth proclaimed
by the prophet vindicated itself. The
record has come down to us making
the king's pseudo honesty ridiculous.
It does not change the fact nor the
responsibility is his. We can scarce-
ly conceive of one getting into a po-
sition where he would be justified in
doing wrong to get out. That is what
is involved in this matter of vow mak-
ing. A foolish vow is likely to com-
pel one to do other foolish and sin-
ful things to get out of the first. Ad-
vice to do the wrong thing should
never be heeded. Herod was led
wrong when he shut John up in pris-
on. If he had possessed the honesty
which he later professed he would
have allowed John to go free. Hon-
esty demands a recognition of the
truth. That man who shows me my
fault is my friend. John was Herod's
friend in pointing out to him his sin-

According to a New York shoe manufacturer and dealer in leather goods, the price of shoes of the better grades are to be advanced about 50c per pair and the cheaper grades from 20c to 35c per pair. He does not attribute the rise in price to the scarcity of leather, but it is the increased demand for shoes, brought about largely by the immense orders being received from Europe for shoes for soldiers. He contends there is no scarcity of leather. In fact, he says there is just as much leather available for shoe manufacturing purposes now as there was before war was declared in Europe. This he explains by admitting that while the demand for shoes is greater than ever before and that the number of cattle raised and killed has decreased steadily, that shoe manufacturers have learned to use cloth, rubber and other substitutes for leather in the manufacture of shoes to an extent that over balances the shortage of leather.

The Farmers' Union at its last convention, went on record as opposed to Governor-elect Ferguson's farm tenant proposition which was endorsed by the El Paso convention and the chances are that when the legislature meets and that farm tenant business comes up for consideration something unexpected is going to happen in the way of a tolerably large sized row. But do not misunderstand us. The Democrats of Texas know full well what to expect if Ferguson was elected, and now that what is stood for has been incorporated into the State Democratic platform, it should be carried out in good faith. This business of creating an issue during a heated gubernatorial campaign solely for the purpose of vote catching should come to an end, and the best way to do that is to incorporate such things into law, and then the higher courts can settle the matter of the constitutionality of such laws.

And Gov. Colquitt now attacks President Wilson and his administration. This was not unexpected. In fact, he has just taken up the fight against Wilson where he left off before the presidential primary, and everybody knows what effect his attacks had at that time. Wilson was stronger right here in Texas than Colquitt and all opposition combined. It is the same now. If there has been any change in sentiment at all, it has all been in favor of President Wilson and his administration, and the more fierce Colquitt attacks the president and his administration, the more confidence will Democrats and the people generally have in the president and his great ability to handle the affairs of the country for the best interest of all the American people.

THE STATE UNIVERSITY AND THE RURAL SCHOOLS.

The attention of The Times has been called to an inaccuracy of a recent editorial in which it was stated that the State University wanted an appropriation of \$1,500,000 for the purpose of building dormitories. This, a friend of the University tells us, is incorrect; that the University has never asked for an appropriation for buildings of any kind, and if it did, it could not be granted for the reason that it would be in direct conflict with the State constitution prohibiting any appropriation from being made to cover buildings for the State University, this being the only State institution covered by constitutional provisions of this sort.

It is true, writes this friend of the University, "that the Regents have pointed out the need for additional buildings but these buildings can only be erected by a bond issue, and this bond issue cannot be made unless the legislature is willing for the University to use its income from lands that it has for the purpose of

paying the interest and providing a sinking fund on these bonds.

"A great many friends of the University are of the opinion that this will be a feasible proposition, a similar method being used by our independent district schools in order to secure money to build school buildings, as you know the University is the head of the public school system of the State of Texas, and the great advance which the University has made as the head of the system, although the State University in Texas has less support per capita than any other state institution in the United States.

"It occurs to me that if the State is niggardly and stingy in supporting the head of its public school system, the common schools under this would likely decline in efficiency and feel any loss which may be suffered by the State University because the State shows notwithstanding the fact that we have four Normal schools, that 40 per cent of the high school teachers of the State of Texas are furnished by the University of Texas. In addition to this, through the system of the high school affiliation and visitation of the schools by University officials the high schools of the State receive a direct influence for good."

The point that The Times was trying to make in the editorial referred to, was that the imperative need of the day in Texas, was better educational opportunities in the rural districts. There is no doubt about it, that schools in the urban communities have advanced all out of proportion to the schools in the rural communities, and that this is one reason why the country people are crowding into the cities. The place to start at in building is at the bottom and the foundation of our school system is certainly the rural school. That advancement from the bottom in this instance may be and is greatly inspired and accelerated from the top is certain. With this in view the State legislature ought to make ample provision for the higher institutions of learning of the State. But the importance of providing better educational facilities for the children of the rural districts must never be lost sight of.

THE COTTON LOAN POOL.

The Wichita Times does not think much of the \$135,000,000 cotton loan fund in so far as it is likely to benefit the producer of the staple. It says:

"Up to the present time not one cent of that much talked of \$135,000,000 cotton loan fund has found its way to this section of the country, though we continue to read in the press dispatches that all arrangements have been completed for the operation of the loan. There is a rumor, however, to the effect that the only way that any of the money will be let out on cotton is on 100 bale lots, and if that be true it will be of little benefit to the cotton farmer for the very good reason that only about one in a thousand raises as much as 100 bales of cotton in a season."

Similar complaints have appeared in other papers published in different sections of the State, some of which have said that the necessities of the farmers have already forced them to dispose of the bulk of the cotton raised by them at prevailing low prices.

The sacrifice of the cost value of production would perhaps not be offset by obtaining a loan, as interest, insurance and warehouse charges would accumulate in the interim while the cotton was held off the market in the hope of an advance in price.

However, the statement is now authorized that the loan is made available in all of the cotton-producing counties of the State by the appointment of committees in 175 towns of Texas to advance loans on as low as 20 bale lots, instead of 100 bale lots. To take advantage of the loan proposition, farmers having less than 20 bale lots will necessarily have to pool their holdings up to that amount. The pool, in its operation, hardly meets the expectations of farmers in general. Many will say it promises much and performed but little.

MISS BURMEISTER'S TRIAL IS SET FOR FEBRUARY

LEGION OF HONOR CROSS FOR PRIVATE

ONLY MEMBERS LEFT ALIVE

Company Completely Decimated by Enemy in Attack on En-trenchments

Paris, Dec. 28.—Lieutenant Bernard and private Morand de Jouffrey, the former promoted captain and decorated with the cross of the Legion of Honor, the latter succeeded in rejoining their corps after passing 58 days within the enemy's lines.

When the 12th company of the 140th regiment of infantry, commanded by captain Blandin, found itself isolated from the rest of the regiment and surrounded by the enemy in the center of a wood the evening of August 26 it numbered about 300 men and 40 officers. They decided that under no circumstances would they surrender and at once began an effort to pierce the German lines.

The company made a night attack upon the village of R— Aug. 28, and captured two barricades under a heavy fire, the advance guard losing half of its number.

Captain Blandin, wounded by a bullet in the thigh had to be helped along by his men but he would not give up. After scaling the second barricade the men found themselves before new defenses consisting of wire trellises from behind which the Germans poured a murderous fire into them. The advance guard charged against it twice and was nearly annihilated. The company now numbered 100 men.

Notwithstanding the decimation of their ranks these survivors led by Captain Blandin made another advance of 500 yards. The men brought Captain Blandin to allow them to carry him.

"The safety of the company alone counts," he replied to Lieut. Bernard. "I take command and forward march." The men took a pathetic leave of the captain who crawled into a thicket as the remnants of the company pushed on. Time pressed more and more the enemy growing in numbers hemmed them in closer and closer. They changed in the last moments of the night with only 80 men left.

On October 20th Lieut. Bernard and Private Morand de Jouffrey were themselves worn to the last shred of endurance and they bivouacked that night with the assurance that the Germans would either take them in the morning or they would be found dead there later on.

The two men moved on again in the morning and debouching from a thicket into a clearing October 23 the morning of the 29th day of the march fell weeping for joy at the sight of the familiar red trousers of the French infantry.

FOREIGN WAITERS BARRED IN LONDON RESTAURANTS

War Has Caused None But English To Be Employed. Many Changes Made

By Associated Press.
London, Dec. 28.—"No Alien Enemies Employed in this Establishment," is one of the signs now confronting Londoners in the last days of the year. The signs are posted in the restaurants, tea shops and eating places of the middle and cheap grades. Some go even further and announce "No Aliens are Employed or Served."

This is a triumph for the British Waiters' Union. Before the war foreign waiters were plentiful in the restaurants, tea shops and eating places of London, except in a few of the old-fashioned British establishments, particularly those in the heart of London where an old guard of business men living up to the traditions of former generations remain faithful to their turtle soup, and beef steak and bottle of port, for their midday meal, and dining to famous old resorts which may have been clean and comfortable according to the standards of Dickens' and Thackeray's time, but would command the attention of the Board of Health in an American city.

The staffs of the larger English hotels, from the manager's office to the kitchen, were manned by foreigners. Most of these hotels are owned by companies and the stockholders placed dividends before loyalty to British servants, when British employees had been proven less profitable than aliens, Germans, Swiss and Italians had taken the hotel and restaurant business by storm.

The British Waiters' Union clamored for recognition vainly until the war. Then the newspapers took up its case, and there has resulted a clean sweep of Germans, Austrians, and of Swiss who speak with a German accent. The big hotels are too dignified to placard their windows with the signs that alien enemies are not employed, but they make a more conspicuous and more diplomatic show of patriotism by covering their fronts with flags and loyal mottoes.

TWO-TWO V. C. HAVE BEEN AWARDED

CROSSES GIVEN FOR SOME SIGNAL ACT OF VALOR OR DEVOTION

London, Dec. 28.—The granting of ten Victoria crosses within the last few weeks brings the total number of these awards during the present war up to twenty-one.

The cross is the highest reward given to the British army for "some signal act of valor or devotion performed in the presence of the enemy." The medal is in the shape of a maltese cross of bronze, bearing in the center the royal crown, surmounted by the lion, and below on a scroll, the words "For valor." The ribbon is blue for the navy and red for the army. The decoration is accompanied by a pension of fifty dollars a year. Official lists of surviving holders of the honor at the beginning of the present war contained about 150 names. The ten latest "V. C." awards are as follows:

Private Sidney Godley, Royal Fusiliers: For coolness and gallantry in fighting his machine gun under hot fire for two hours after he had been wounded at Mons on August 23.

Driver Job Drain, and Driver Frederick Luke, Royal Field Artillery: At LeCateau on August 26, as volunteers from a trench under heavy fire, later assisted to drive a gun out of action by taking place of a wounded driver.

Captain Edward Bradbury, deceased, Royal Horse Artillery: Organized defense of battery against heavy odds at Nery on September 1.

Captain William Henry Johnston, Royal Engineers: At Missy on September 14, under heavy fire worked two riffs bringing back wounded and retreating with ammunition.

Drummer Spence John Bent Ask, Lancashire Regiment: For taking command and succeeding in holding position after his officer had been struck down, and other deeds of bravery.

Bombardier Ernest Harbeck, now sergeant, Royal Field Artillery: For conspicuous gallantry on September 15, near Vendresse; although twice wounded persisted in returning to lay his gun each time after wounds dressed.

Lance Corporal Dobson, Goldstream Guards: For bringing wounded men into cover on two occasions while under heavy fire.

The most conspicuous of these ten heroes is Capt. Bradbury, whose battery made a determined stand against the Germans on the day of the retreat towards Paris. Battery L, while covering the retreat was attacked by a strong German force with ten field guns and two maxims. Three British guns were brought into action but two of them were quickly silenced. Bradbury and his men served the remaining gun so well, however, that all but one of the German guns were silenced, and when Battery L was relieved this gun was captured. An account of the action says:

"Captain Bradbury was the real hero. He got the gun into action and gave the orders. Mundy knelt on one side as ranging officer. Bradbury, Campbell and Giffard, with the battery sergeant-major, gunner and driver, served the gun. Bradbury had one leg taken off, but still went on; Campbell and Mundy were killed. Bradbury had his other leg taken off, and Giffard was badly wounded, but still they kept the gun going; and when Bradbury came he found the Germans had bolted. Only the major and Giffard, who received five bullets, survived."

Three V. C.'s have now been awarded in connection with this fight. Sergeant Dorrell and Sergeant Nelson having already received the decoration. In addition, Lieutenant Giffard, Gunner Darbyshire and Driver Osborne were awarded French decorations.

The first Indian to be recommended for the V. C. is Havildar (Sergeant) Ganga Singh, of the 57th Wilde's Rifles. The Havildar, with fifteen men was attacked in the trenches just before dawn by an overwhelming German force. In the brief hand-to-hand struggle which ensued sixty Germans were killed, Ganga Singh sole survivor of his little company, was left for dead in the trench with five bullet wounds. When picked up, he still held tightly the sword of a German officer whom he had dispatched.

This is the first war in which it has been possible for an Indian to win the Victoria Cross. Eligibility to the distinction was one of the boons granted by King George at the Durbar of 1912.

TEXAS BIRTHS OUTNUMBER DEATHS OVER TWO TO ONE

Austin, Texas, Dec. 28.—A total of 106,162 births were recorded in Texas during the two years from Sept. 1, 1912 to Sept. 1, 1914, while the deaths for the same period numbered 51,198, according to statistics just made public by R. P. Babcock, state registrar of vital statistics. Included in the births were 964 sets of twins and two sets of triplets. There were 95,379 white infants and 8,426 negro. Of the deaths 42,375 were white and 2,823 negroes. Of the causes of deaths, tuberculosis was first in the lead, with pneumonia second. The deaths by violence for the period, including suicides, homicides and accidental deaths, numbered 623.
