PLAINS GET FIRST FREEZE OF YEAR

AXE MURDERER WIPES OUT FAMILY

MAN AND TWO WOMEN SLAIN, HOME BURNED

NEIGHBORS DISCOVER HOME IN FLAMES; KILLER FLEES

SANTA ROSA, Calif., Nov. 2.—An axe murderer wiped out the C. J. Bertola family of three here today and escaped, his identity unknown, after firing the dwelling. Bertola was a retired grocer. The other victims were his wife, Maria, and their daughter, Camille. Two boys found the home in flames and Bertola's body lying in the yard with an axe wound in the head. Bodies of the mother and daughter could be seen through the flames before the building was consumed, they said. Sheriff's officers immediately left Santa Rosa in search of a suspect, said to be a former sweetheart of Camille Bertola.

TRIAL STARTS FOR OBREGON SLAYER TODAY

RADIO TO CARRY FULL REPORT OF CASE TO MEXICAN PEOPLE

(By Associated Press) SAN ANGELO, Mexico, Nov. 2.—So intense is the interest of the trial of Jose de Leon-Toral for the assassination of President-elect Obregon, and Mother Concepcion charged with being his accomplice, that about 200 persons slept in the streets and plaza in front of the municipal building last night in order to be on hand for the opening of the court today.

A strong police guard was thrown about the building to prevent disorder. The proceedings will be broadcast by radio. The trial is unusual in that generally the assassins of persons high in politics are tried by military rather than civil courts. A thousand persons asked to be admitted to today's proceedings. The court-room seats one hundred; fifty more can wedge their way in. Admission was by ticket only. Thirty names were drawn from a list of one hundred names, nine jurors from these to try the youthful cartoonist.

Above the judge's bench and facing the space set aside for the defendants was a picture of Obregon. "I am ready for anything," Toral said. Then he spoke of the possibility that his crime might be considered political and that death

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Marine Captain Is Killed In Air Mix

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Nov. 2 (P).—A mid-air collision of two planes from Langley field tactical school yesterday resulted in the death of one pilot, Captain Robert A. Archibald, of the Marine corps, while the other, Captain Earl H. Deford, also of the Marine corps landed safely by means of a parachute.

Archibald, like Deford, attempted to make a parachute moment too soon, the parachute became entangled in the tail gear of his plane and he was hurled to the ground. The direct cause of the collision is unknown.

Gangsters Seek To Clog Wheels Of Justice By Terrorizing Witnesses

KIDNAP BROTHER OF GIRL ON WHOM CASE HINGES

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Margaret Welch, star witness in the prosecution of 16 men for primary election terrorism, faced a tragic problem today. She could tell her story from the witness stand, pointing out at least two of the defendants as killers; or she could refuse to testify, and thus, perhaps, save her brother's life, and her own.

Her brother, Laddie, has been kidnapped. Some men took him away Wednesday, just a day before Miss Welch was to tell in court her eye witness story of the slaying of Octavius Granady, negro lawyer and ward committeeman candidate.

Miss Welch herself has been under constant police protection, but no one had thought that an effort to silence her testimony might be made by kidnapping her brother. A telephone call just before she was to go to court yesterday, added further to her hysteria. "We'll blow your head off if you testify," was the message.

The trial of the 16 men was halted yesterday when Miss Welch was unable to appear. She had collapsed following news of her brother's disappearance.

"I can't go on!" she cried. "If I do they'll kill my brother."

Thus far only one defendant, John Armando, had been named in connection with the Granady slaying. Miss Welch's story would link at least two others to the killing, prosecutors said.

Granady, who was Morris Eller's opponent for 20th ward committeeman, was shot down on promenade day, April 10, by men who chased his car a mile through West Side streets.

Buchanan's bond was set at \$1,000 but it had not been made this morning.

One other indictment, charging the same offense, was returned by the grand jury yesterday, but no arrest had been made today, and the identity of the defendant is being withheld until the arrest is made.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2 (P).—Julian I. Farwell, youngest son of Arthur Farwell, Chicago millionaire, was burned to death yesterday when his airplane plunged to earth at Chanute Field, Rantoul, Ill.

Farwell, who graduated from Yale in 1924, was one of the first of Chicago's select North Shore colony to pilot his own plane.

MAN SLAIN AND WIFE BEATEN IN MYSTERY FRAY

COUPLE ASKED LODGING DURING STORM; WERE VICTIMS OF HOST

LIBERTY, Nov. 2.—J. H. Hendrix, 40, Houston carpenter, was shot to death and Mrs. Hendrix was beaten severely over the head at the farm home of John Swiley, 65, near here last night. Swiley was charged with murder. Officers were told that the automobile occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Hendrix stalled during a severe rain storm. The man and wife were directed to the Swiley home where they requested and received permission to spend the night.

TRIO OF DUCK HUNTERS DIE AS BOAT SINKS

STILLWATER YOUTHS VICTIMS WHEN WIND CAPSIZES CRAFT

(By Associated Press) STILLWATER, Okla., Nov. 2.—Three young duck hunters, all believed to be of Stillwater, were drowned today in Boomer Lake, when their boat capsized.

One of the trio was Marlin Murphy, 16, son of C. L. Murphy, Stillwater hardware dealer. The identity of his two companions was not established at once.

A fleet of motor boats and a dragnet were pressed into service in an attempt to recover the bodies, none of which had been taken from the water by 11 o'clock.

Murphy's identity was established by other hunters at the lake, who said they recognized him in the boat. The boat belonged to Murphy. His parents said they knew he had gone duck hunting but did not know by whom he was accompanied.

A high wind was believed responsible for the boat capsizing. Two of the three hunters in the boat were standing up to shoot when it went over, other hunters said.

The trio attempted to swim ashore, but managed to stay on top only a short distance. They were approximately 100 yards from shore when thrown into the lake.

COLD WAVE DESCENDING FROM MOUNTAIN REGIONS TAKES ALL OF STATE IN ITS FRIGID GRIP

SMALL DAMAGE TO CROPS IN LUBBOCK VICINITY ALTHOUGH OTHER COMMUNITIES OF PLAINS REPORT YOUNG BOLLS SUFFER HURT

MINIMUM HERE IS FIVE BELOW FREEZING

THIN COATING OF ICE OVERLAYS PUDDLES OF WATER LEFT BY RECENT RAIN HERE; COLD FORECAST TONIGHT, WARMER SATURDAY

Driving the temperature to the twenty-seven degree mark—five degrees below freezing and the coldest weather of the season by seven degrees, a heavy, killing frost visited the South Plains last night and this morning.

A calm cold settled over the section this morning, following a strong, biting "norther" which swept down from Rocky mountain region yesterday. Reaching the coldest temperature at about 6 o'clock this morning the weather became gradually warmer throughout the day.

Cotton of this vicinity suffered little or no damage as a result of the cold spell, according to County Agent D. P. Eaton and Don L. Jones, superintendent of the state experiment station here. It was said that most of the cotton had matured to the point that a heavy frost was more beneficial than harmful.

The frost this morning came on the average date for the first killing frost of the year, although several light frosts had reached here previously.

Although the temperature dropped five degrees below the freezing point, Mr. Jones said today that the bolts did not freeze, and that the frost was welcome at this time. He stated that the cold would stop the growth of small late cotton, but that most of the crop had already matured.

Mr. Eaton said this morning that all of the cotton of the county would be ready for harvesting within the next two weeks if the present kind of weather prevails. He stated that only the immature bolls were damaged by the present cold spell.

"A heavy frost without a freeze was what we needed," Mr. Eaton said. "Before this a blizzard would have caused considerable damage but it would not hurt the crops after the heavy frost of this morning. We have been favored this year by the right kind of weather and the frost came just at the right time."

The prediction for tonight shows continued cold with warmer weather tomorrow.

BUILDER OF ZEPPELIN THAT SPANNED OCEAN TELLS OF DREAMS

(By Associated Press) FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Nov. 2.—Now that the air liner Graf Zeppelin is safely home after her round trip trans-Atlantic voyage, Dr. Hugo Eckener, director of the Zeppelin Works, is going ahead with plans for even mightier and faster dirigibles for commercial service.

He hopes to organize a transportation company in conjunction with American interests to build a larger and stronger airship capable of withstanding the heaviest storms. In that event the Graf Zeppelin, with her two ocean crossings to her credit, will be used as a school ship for training Zeppelin crews and also for other experiments. A new hangar also must be built at a place to be determined later.

Water Reservoir Is Planned At Abilene

ABILENE, Nov. 2 (P)—As a preliminary step in a program of power development from water of Lytle Creek southeast of Abilene which eventually will cost approximately \$5,000,000, the West Texas Utilities company will go before the state board of water engineers Nov. 26, when a hearing will be given on its application to impound 2,500 acre feet of water annually.

If the permit is granted, a second Lytle Lake will be formed, containing more than two billion gallons of water, by erection of an earthen dam 2,500 feet in length.

The power plant to be built near the reservoir would be the company's largest, officials said.

STREET LIGHT NEEDS SHOWN

MAPS CITING LOCATION OF LIGHTS NEEDED ARE PREPARED

Maps showing the necessary addition of street lights for the proposed sixty-three-block extension of the city mail delivery service have been turned over to the city commission for action. Postmaster John L. Vaughn said today.

Members of the commission have stated that action on the light addition would be taken next Thursday, the next regular session of the City Dads. Should this addition be authorized virtually all of the requirements necessary for the mail service extension will be met, Mr. Vaughn said.

A committee of the Board of City Development is at the present time working on a plan of marking the streets of the city, causing another requirement to be met.

The maps used to mark the proposed extension and the necessary lights were furnished to Mr. Vaughn by Tom A. White, manager of the southwestern Bell Telephone company here, who had the maps made at Dallas for this specific purpose. The maps were reduced from the six-foot maps, which are the only ones available here.

As soon as all of the requirements are met, Mr. Vaughn's recommendations will be sent to the Post Office department at Washington. It is hoped to complete the delivery extension in time to care for the Christmas mails.

Freezing temperatures spread farther afield into the Midwest today, threatening the lower Mississippi valley regions with snow and nearly all of Texas with cold weather.

The outlook was for more snow in Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska and Kansas. Strong north winds swept Oklahoma, where the temperatures hovered about the freezing mark. Freezing weather was expected in the Panhandle and South Texas Plains, with the prediction that only the extreme southern portion would escape the cold wave, which followed heavy rains in that state.

Somewhat warmer weather prevailed in North and South Dakota, and in western Nebraska, temporarily releasing those sections from the blizzard which brought a heavy drifting snow mantle to the grazing country.

Omaha and eastern Nebraska received the first touch of snow last night, which followed heavy rain-fall over a 36-hour period. Continued low temperatures with snow prevailed at Sioux City. Snowfall in South Dakota ranged from four to six inches while Southern Minnesota also was visited by snowfall.

Fair but cold weather in the Rocky Mountain states today held little promise of relief from the second storm of the season, which had halted air mail planes, blocked highways, delayed trains and damaged wire communication. More

snow was predicted in a few isolated Wyoming and Montana sections.

Amarillo Shivers In Cold Snap

AMARILLO, Nov. 2 (AP).—Despite a bright sun, ending five days of clouds, mist and rain, Amarillo and the Panhandle today shivered in the most severe cold snap of the year, after dropping to 26 degrees shortly before day break, the temperature at 10 a. m. had advanced to 29. Clear and continued cold weather is forecast for tonight with rising temperatures tomorrow.

BROWNWOOD, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—Cold and clear weather today followed a temperature of 35 degrees here last night.

TOPEKA, Kas., Nov. 2 (AP).—The coldest night of the season with freezing temperatures over the entire state and snow extending into eastern portions was forecast today by the weather bureau today.

ABILENE, Nov. 2 (AP).—Predicted freezing weather barely failed to materialize here last night when the temperature dropped to 24 degrees. A killing frost is forecast for tonight.

BROWNFIELD, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—Farmers here today expressed belief that a light freeze last night had damaged cotton production, for some instances reducing it as much as 25 per cent. Many of the bolls were still wet from recent rains.

PAMPA, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—Winter took a firm grip on this section last night, the temperature dropping to 24 degrees. The wind accompanying the freeze aided in drying out roads made soft by more than two inches of rain which had fallen since Sunday.

CORSICANA, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—A drop of 30 degrees was recorded here last night. The thermometer this morning registered 41 degrees.

SHERMAN, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—The coldest weather of the season arrived here last night, the temperature dropping from 62 degrees to 36 degrees.

SWEETWATER, Tex., Nov. 2 (AP).—Sweetwater had its first freeze of the year today, the temperature dropping to 31 degrees.

GALVESTON, Nov. 2 (AP).—A 26-mile wind out of the north sent thermometers down to 53 degrees here early today. A light rain accompanied the arrival of the northern last night, but today the skies were clearing.

HOUSTON, Nov. 2 (AP).—A cold north wind on the heels of a drenching rain forced the temperature down to 45 degrees, a new low mark for the season, here early today.

PORT WORTH, Nov. 2 (AP).—The temperature dropped to 39 degrees here Thursday night, the lowest of the season.

CANYON, Nov. 2 (AP).—A hard freeze here last night followed a 24-hour rain totaling two and one-third inches.

CHILDRESS, Nov. 2 (AP).—A thin covering of ice on puddles of water left by the recent rains marked the first freezing weather of the season here today. The minimum

temperature during the night was 30 degrees.

WICHITA FALLS, Nov. 2 (AP).—The temperature dropped to 33 degrees here early today, the lowest mark of the season.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 2 (AP).—With the temperature expected to drop as low as 38 degrees, the first frost of the season is predicted here for Saturday. The coldest weather of the season thus far came Friday morning with a low of 44 degrees.

"The basis of all progress, of all advance in our country must be its continual prosperity," he said. "Prosperity at base rests on there being a job for every man—that there shall be stable employment and advancing standards of living. It rests equally upon a stable agricultural industry."

Reviewing then what he said was the progress of the country during the last seven years of Republican administration, Hoover said he could not believe that the American people "wish to abandon these policies of government which have been maintained by the Republican party and without which results so amazing and so stimulating to the spiritual as well as to the material advance of the nation would not have been possible."

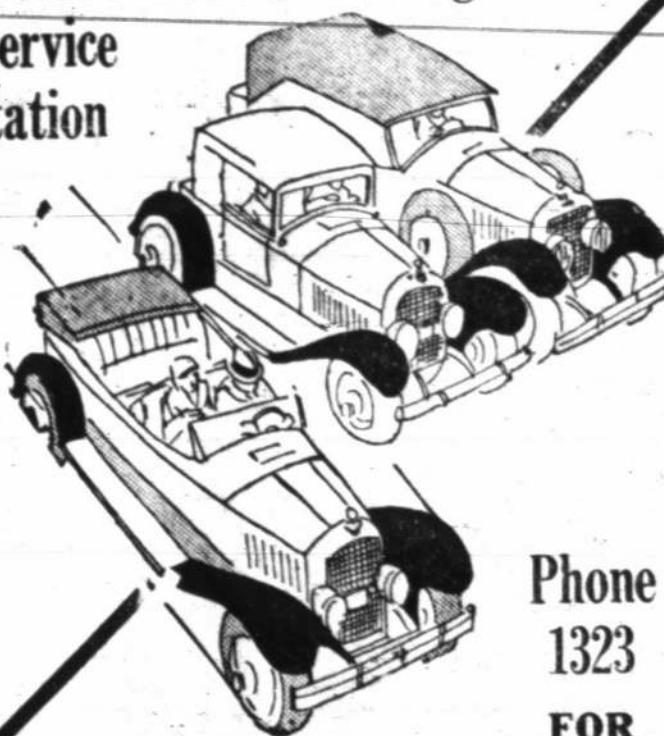

FEW EAT RIGHT DIET, RESEARCH EXPERT AVERS

ABSENCE OF VITAMIN C IN FOOD MAY CAUSE VARIOUS AILMENTS

By COLEMAN B. JONES
(Associated Press Science Editor)

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 2 (AP).—Disclosing facts which he believes may account for much that is wrong in the world, Dr. George Walker, Baltimore physician and research worker, today laid before the American Dietetic Association the initial results of a study of the eating habits of 150 families, ranging from the very poor to the very rich.

Investigation, growing out of an interest in the welfare of orphans, the insane and other inmates of public institutions in Maryland and elsewhere, he said, has brought to light a number of significant deficiencies in the every day diets of people in general.

Practically all of those he has studied, he said, whether they average only six cents a day for each individual, or \$1.95, consume too little of the essential minerals, too much of the vegetable and too little of the animal proteins, less than half their requirements in the way of non-digestible fibrous or cellulose material, and probably only 20 per cent as much as they need of raw foods containing the very important but little understood Vitamin C.

Absence Causes Scurvy.
The absence of the vitamin, which is virtually destroyed by cooking in all vegetables except tomatoes and potatoes and is reduced in them, is known to cause scurvy. While this disease of the capillary blood vessels, smaller arteries and veins, is rare in its recognized form except among isolated sailors and soldiers and explorers, Dr. Walker said he believed that many of the disorders which appear in the gums, the teeth, the upper part of the intestinal tract and the bones could be traced to the widespread deficiency of the same dietary element.

Among children in public institutions, he told the dietitians, he found that, while they get enough of the carbohydrates, chiefly white bread and potatoes, not to be hungry, none has been able to investigate has received the variety and kinds of food necessary for the normal growth and future health. They could be fed properly, he estimated, on 33.26 cents a day at wholesale prices.

\$7.31 Cents A Day.
For the average growing child, living at home, he calculated, a minimum expenditure of \$7.31 cents a day, at retail prices, is necessary, and for their parents and grown up brothers and sisters, 44.59 cents. The difference is largely accounted for by the fact that the child needs at least a quart of milk, rich in animal proteins, calcium and phosphorus, every day, while a pint will do for the adults.

The general deficiency in fiber consumption, contributing to a number of human ailments, he thought, was a result of the tendency to pass up the coarse foods, raw and cooked, in favor of the more attractive, highly refined products from which most if not all of the "roughage" has been removed. The lack of the blood building element of iron in 49 per cent of the food accounts analyzed, however, appeared to be more closely associated with economic considerations, as almost any generous diet will contain a sufficiency of this mineral.

Other Minerals Lacking.
Shortages of the other two most necessary minerals, calcium, or lime, and phosphorus, were even more pronounced. In 64 per cent of all of the diets, accounting among other things he said, for the prevalence of rickets, the proportion of

YOUTH SEES OPERA, THEN SUICIDES

COMMODORE VANDERBILT'S GRANDSON, FOUND DEAD IN APARTMENT AT NEW YORK

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—After viewing a presentation of Wagner's opera, "Tannhauser" Wednesday night at the Metropolitan, Noel Morris, 24, great grandson of Commodore William H. Vanderbilt, shot and killed himself at his parents' home in East Seventeenth street.

A typewritten note tucked between the leaves of a diary gave the only clue to the suicide motive.

It read: "Tannhauser wasn't brave enough to stick it out, but I have the courage to do it. This is the last entry." The body was discovered yesterday by a locksmith called to remove the lock on the door of his apartment after his absence had aroused fears of his family. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Dennen Morris, the father being a lawyer and prominent in financial circles. His mother was the former Alice Vanderbilt Shepard.

What connection the story of Tannhauser could have had with Morris' life is a mystery. The opera is an allegory depicting the evils of lascivious love as contrasted with the sweetness of love embodied by a spiritual quality.

His parents said he was quiet and studious, never to their knowledge having been interested in girls.

Calcium containing vegetables and milk was below normal, while 62 per cent were deficient in phosphorus, essential to the growth and health of the nerves and bones, which also is chiefly obtainable from milk. Low milk consumption also figured in the unbalanced distribution of animal and vegetable proteins, 60 per cent of which Dr. Walker said, should come from foods of animal origin because of the scarcity in vegetables of two of the five very complex, indispensable amino acids which make up these elements of diet.

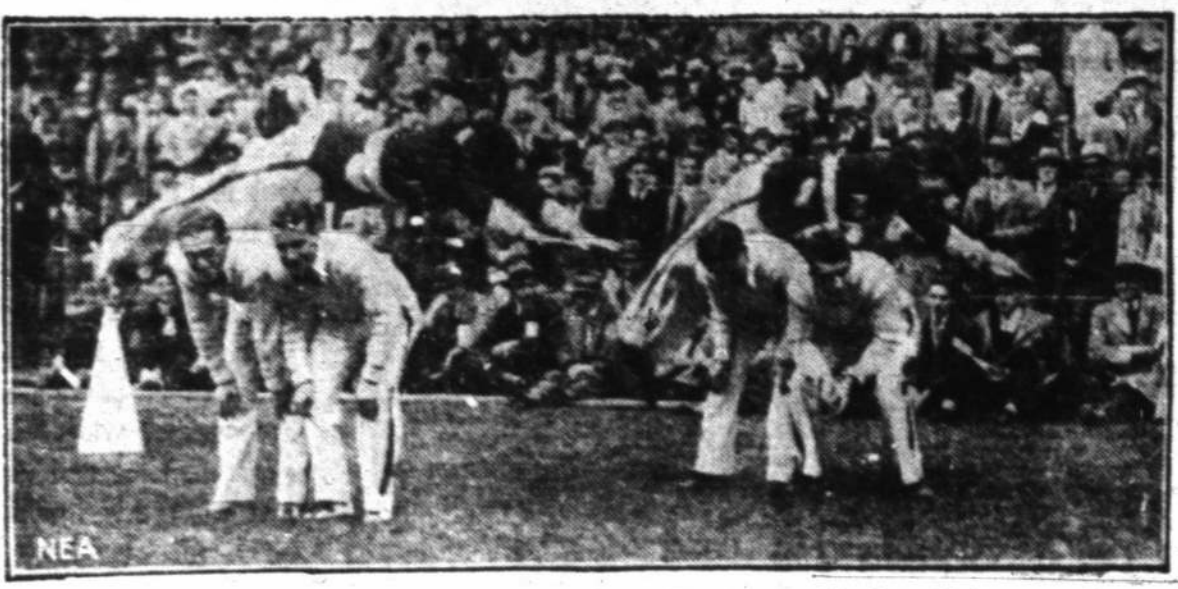
Aggies Buckle Down For Future Clashes

Football Pays For Physical Education

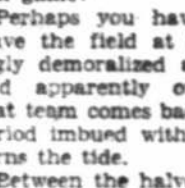
While refusing to admit that negotiations were under way for the purchase of the Braves' manager and second baseman, Veck guardedly hinted that there would be a definite announcement within a few days.

Speaking of Football

Famous Football Coach Tells What He Believes Should Take Place in Dressing Room

University of Pittsburgh Football Coach
What happens in the dressing room between the halves of a football game? Perhaps you have seen a team leave the field at the half, seemingly demoralized and discouraged, and apparently outclassed. And that team comes back after the rest period imbued with new spirit and turns the tide.

Between the halves, much can be done to correct errors and poor play. There must be no guess work and any fault finding must be warranted. I never resort to harsh criticism. I know that the players are young and that they are giving their best.

A team frequently is disorganized when it enters the dressing room and it is up to the coach to encourage the players and give them confidence and determination. When I played football it was customary to allow any slummers, or friend of the school, the players or the coaches to gather in the dressing room before and between the halves of a game. Sometimes there were thirty or forty in the room, and while that sort of thing was not objectionable to me at the time I have since changed my opinion.

When I started coaching, I made it a point to exclude everyone from the dressing room not officially connected with the squad. This is not an easy precedent to start. There are many good friends of the team who feel they ought to be allowed to hear the remarks of the coach and the players between the halves.

The beginning of each season brings up the same old problem and I always follow the same plan. The doors of the dressing room are closed to all except managers, coaches, trainers and players. Before big games, players are keyed to a high tension. I want quietness to the superlative degree and no outside disturbances.

For several weeks, perhaps all season, the coach has been carefully planning for this "zero hour" I want the players instilled with a quiet determination. Everything in the line of equipment the players are to use in the game is carefully laid out for them. Everything possible is done to make the players feel that the coach has their interest at heart.

COACHES WORK ON AGGIE TEAM

REVAMPED LINEUP WILL FACE DENTON EAGLES IN SATURDAY TILT

(Special to the Journal)
COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 2.—The revamped Texas Aggie grid team will face its first test Saturday when the Aggies meet the North Texas "Teachers" College eleven from Denton on Kyle Field. Whether the new style of play and the changes made in the lineup will be made permanent will depend upon the outcome of this game Coach Dana K. Bible says.

On the opening of training this week following their defeat at the hands of the Arkansas Razorbacks, Coach Bible told his charges they were beginning the season anew, and in making this new start the Aggie coaches reduced the squad to 30 men, retaining only those players who were in good shape physically for the final spurt of the season.

Captain Willie Bartlett, an all-conference selection at center last year, has been shifted tentatively to tackle, the position he played in 1926, his first season with the Aggies. Bartlett is one of the outstanding defensive linemen in the conference and playing at tackle is expected to increase his power in the line offensively as well as defensively. With Bartlett at tackle, Line Coach "Chuck" Bassett will probably place Joe Brown on Zeke Sneed at the pivot position. Both men were squadmen last season and have been running in relief roles this year.

Guarding shifting Bartlett, the coaches have taken Floyd off guard and placed him in the backfield at his old position at half. Floyd, shifted to the line early in the season because of his bulk and driving power, made an impressive record as a back on the freshman team last season. His addition to the Aggie backfield will give increased weight and driving power to the offense as he is a hard running and plunging back and a capable passer. He is expected also to add much to the team's interference.

The Aggie squad has been occupied this week in learning the new plays and formations with which Coach Bible has replaced a large number of the plays used earlier in the season, and a more aggressive style of play is expected from the team in the games to come. The new offense has been working with marked success against the freshmen in scrimmages, and the coaches seem to have worked spirit up to a pitch not attained before.

HUGHES RISES TO DEFENSE OF PARTY LEADER

HOOVER HAILED AS AN APOSTLE OF PROGRESS IN BROOKLYN TALK

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Charles Evans Hughes, speaking tonight in Brooklyn, hailed Herbert Hoover as "the apostle of co-operation," and "an engineer of progress," and asserted that "republican success on election day is the best insurance policy we can write."

Quoting liberally from Mr. Hoover's writings and public statements, and from the campaign speeches of Governor Smith, the former secretary of state said this election "is a choice between two men."

"I have not disparaged the ability or achievements of Governor Smith," he said, "but as between Smith and Hoover, I prefer Hoover."

Condemning campaign attacks on Hoover's Americanism, he declared: "Any intelligent person who attempts to deny his Americanism deserves the scorn and contempt of all fair minded persons. As a candidate for the chief magistracy of the nation... he stands out conspicuously superior. His rejection would be a national calamity."

"The keynote of Mr. Hoover's program is individual opportunity as opposed to unnecessary governmental control."

Mr. Hughes endorsed the republican nominee's tariff policies and questioned Governor Smith's ability to force his own tariff views upon a hostile congress. "In tariff matters," he said, "it is not simply actual measures that count, but agitation and uncertainties which disturb confidence and vex business."

Mr. Hughes, replying to what he described as an attack on him by a leading democratic newspaper, for supporting Hoover, dwelt at some length on an intimation in the newspaper that he might have been more active in preventing the transfer of the nation's oil leases under the Harding administration.

'PATHFINDER' CRAFT OF FORT WORTH NOW IS DUE SATURDAY

Arrival of the Pathfinder airplane, scheduled first Thursday and then Friday afternoon from Fort Worth, was postponed for the second time yesterday afternoon, according to a telegram received by George E. Benson, chairman of the airport committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Landing here will be at Lubbock's temporary airport, two miles north of the city. The airport is being put into readiness and marked off in preparation for the arrival of the planes, Mr. Benson said.

SANITY TESTS GIVEN YOUTHS

ALIENISTS MAKE FIRST OF THREE PROBES OF SLAYERS

(By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Nov. 2.—George Harsh, wealthy college youth jointly indicted for murder with Richard Gallogly, 18 year old member of a prominent Atlanta family, was given a three hour examination today by alienists, the first of a series of examinations said to be made to determine his physical and mental condition.

Harsh is the 19 year old son of the late George Harsh, Milwaukee shoe manufacturer.

The examination, physicians said, had not progressed far enough to reach any conclusion.

Harsh was accompanied to the sanitarium by four deputy sheriffs who were present throughout, and on leaving the jail, the youth was handcuffed for the first time.

Throughout the procedure Harsh, deputies said, co-operated with the physicians.

While defense attorneys continued to decline to comment on the probable plea for Harsh when he and Gallogly are arraigned for trial, the examination by the alienists was pointed to as strengthening reports that insanity would be the basis of the fight to save Harsh, whom police said had confessed to slaying S. H. Meek, a grocery clerk, and Willard Smith, a pharmacist, during attempted holdups.

Jenkins Back From Telegraphic School

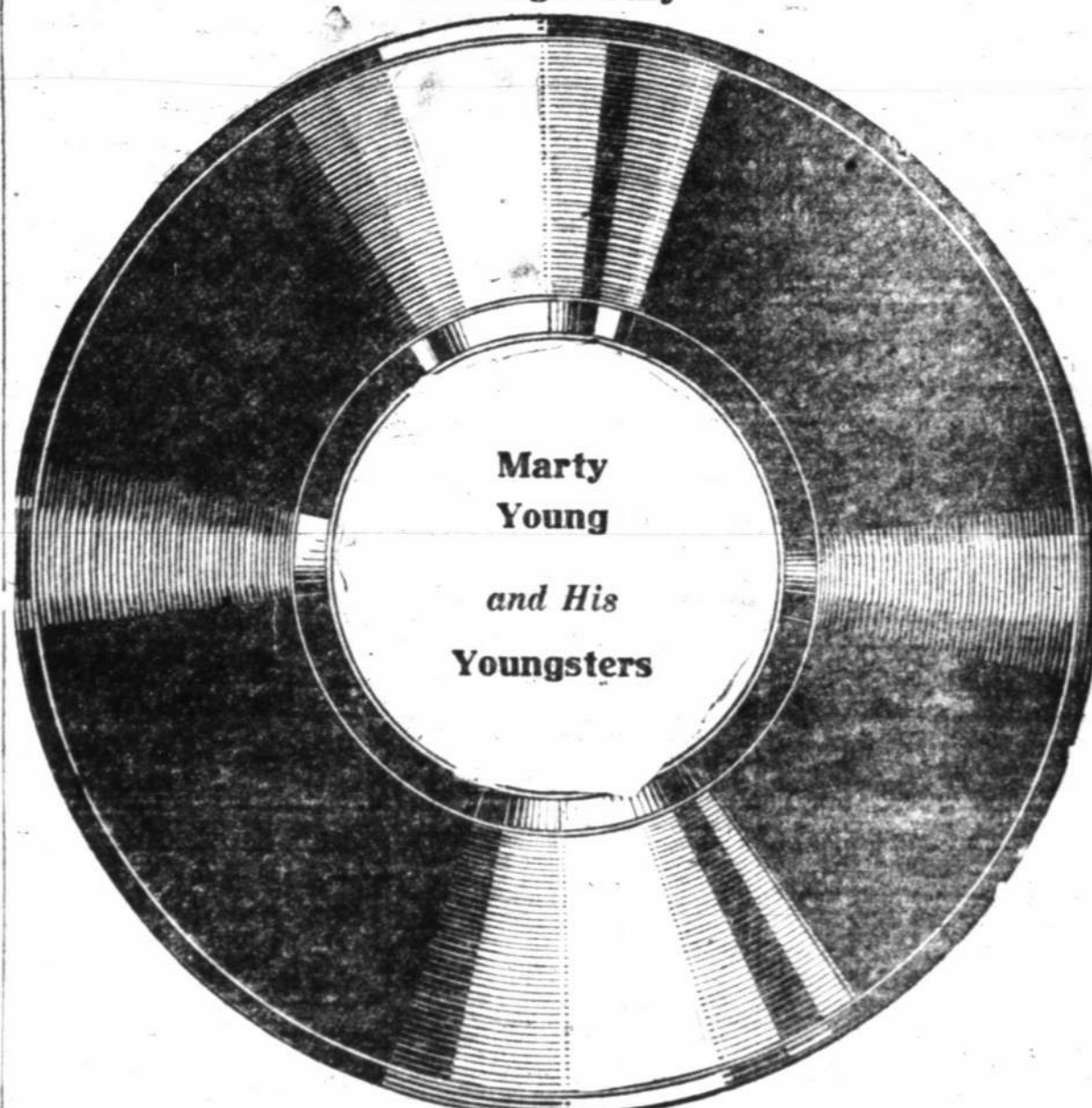

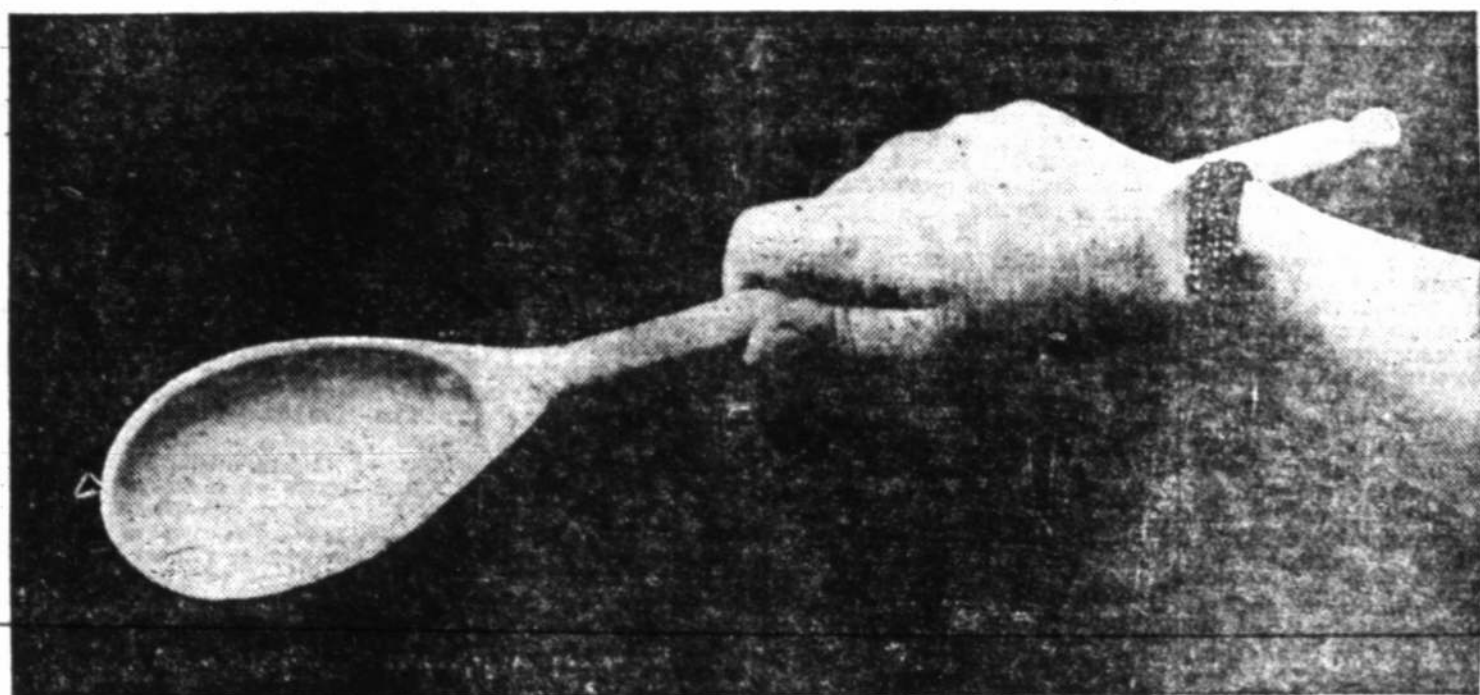

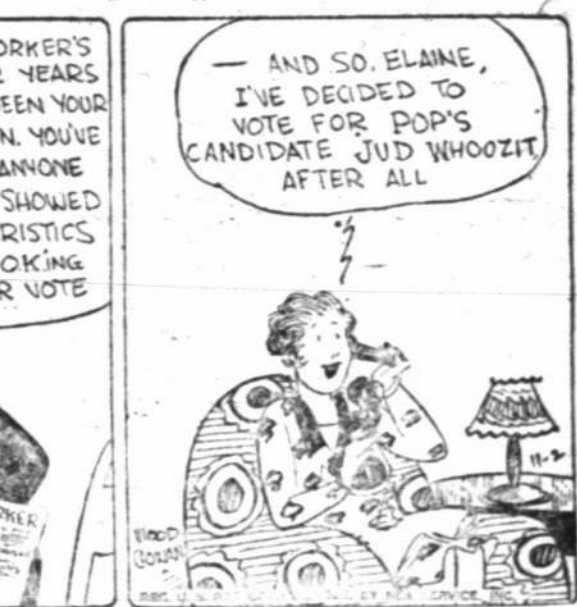

a large argument. Is Intropective Campaign One thing, however, is fully apparent. This has been acampaign of national self-examination. Not for many years have the parties gone to the country talking so little of foreign affairs and so much of home affairs. Intropection has turned the light of public discussion on such domestic questions as prohibition, agriculture, immigration, waterpower and general business stability. In a literal sense, it has been a time of national soul-searching. Considering the interplay of the issues with the concurrent awakening of class and group consciousness, the campaign may be characterized as the most sweeping national stock-taking since the United States became a really cosmopolitan country.

What sort of a balance the voters will strike off at Tuesday's election, and whether it will be in favor of Hoover or Smith, still rests on the replies to a complicated set of questions, which are the same questions the politicians were asking themselves when the campaign began.

How great a defection will there be on the religious issue? How will Smith's gains among Republican wets compare to his losses among democratic drys? MAN FOUND DISROBED, BRANDED K.K.K.

POLICE DOUBT STORY OF PHILADELPHIAN THAT HE WAS KIDNAPED, BRANDED ON STREET

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The story of a Philadelphia man that he had been kidnaped on a busy New York street, disrobed, bound and gagged and branded with the letters "K. K. K." was doubted by police today. They had the man removed to a psychopathic ward for observation.

He identified himself as Frank Kirkpatrick, 34 years old, a real estate broker of Germantown, a section of Philadelphia. He was found inside the fence around the reservoir in Jerome Park, The Bronx, last night. He was clad only in an overcoat. A pamphlet dealing with the political campaign and written by himself was stuffed in his mouth.

On his chest and arms were carved the letters "K. K. K." which doctors said had been scratched on the skin either with a knife or a pin. None of the wounds were deep and all could have been made

by Kirkpatrick himself, doctors said. Kirkpatrick told District Attorney McGehean that he had come to New York to give the pamphlet to John J. Raskob, chairman of the democratic committee.

He had visited democratic headquarters and then had been kidnaped and branded in republican headquarters. The pamphlet was entitled "Intolerance by an Intolerant."

Mrs. Kirkpatrick at Germantown said her husband feared "the political teachings of the Roman Catholic church."

GIRL VICTIM OF FIRE DIES

POLICE SAY TRUTH OF CASE IS CARRIED TO THE GRAVE

(By Associated Press)
LAKE BLUFF, Ill., Nov. 2.—Edna Knaak, 30 year old book agent and physiology student, died early today, three days almost to the hour from the time she submitted her arms, feet and head to self-torture in the furnace of the Lake Bluff police station.

With her death, officers said, was locked the story of what actually happened during those hours before the Tuesday dawn when Miss Knaak, after sitting alone all night in the police station, went into the basement where she later was found, near the furnace, badly burned.

Even should evidence develop pointing to a second party as having had a hand in the tragedy, officers said the young woman's story that she alone had inflicted the burns as self-torture to prove her faith in a "spirit love" would almost certainly prove a bar to successful prosecution.

Miss Knaak died a few hours after her former psychology teacher and adviser, Charles Hitchcock, had gone on crutches to her bedside and pleaded with her to "tell everything." Hitchcock has been laid up for a week with a broken ankle, an accident of which Miss Knaak apparently did not know when she went to the police station Monday night. It is a police theory the girl had intended to meet Hitchcock, who is also night watchman of Lake Bluff, at the station.

"Hello Fritz," Hitchcock said to the dying girl. Miss Knaak looked him full in the face, but did not speak. He asked her several questions the authorities had prepared: "Why did you do this terrible thing? Who let you into the police station? Why didn't you telephone me?"

The girl made no reply. As Hitchcock hobbled from the room he called back, "goodbye."

"Goodbye," said the girl. It was the last word she ever spoke.
