Attempt To Rob Bank At Abernathy Is Failure When Steel Door Resists Blows

Failed in their attempt to batter through the door of the money vault robbers who had broken into the vault of the First State bank at Abernathy escaped after unloading safety deposit boxes and taking about \$100 worth of small change which was stacked inside the vault but outside the money compartment, early Tuesday morning.

Entrance into the outer vault was gained by breaking through the door and the wall with sledge hammers. When the door was battered and the combination hopelessly jammed so that a torch had to be used to cut through it, the vault failed in their attempt to get at several hundred dollars contained in the inner vault.

Entrance to the building was gained through a transom over the door and the door was forced open with a pick, or sledge hammer through the transom and the tile wall of the outer vault, through which it is presumed one of the robbers climbed and opened the door from the inside.

The number in the party is not known but it apparently was not more than five. Apparently they worked systematically and deliberately and bank officials believe that two or three hours was required for the work.

Contents of fifty or more private lock boxes in the vault were scattered helter skelter over the floor. A large sledge hammer apparently the one used by the robbers, was found on the floor inside, after the robbery was discovered when employees reported for work.

Various pieces of bank equipment and the broken glass from the transom, together with the hammer and other articles now in the case of officers will be photographed for finger prints.

Citing proof in their opinion that the job was done by professionals bank officials said the robbers evidently intentionally overlooked several Liberty bonds from the private boxes, all of which were registered.

Big Spring Builds Oil Field Roads

BIG SPRING, July 26.—The Big Spring Chamber of Commerce, cooperating with the Howard County Commissioners, voted claims to have constructed the highest type automobile road to the oil fields of any county in West Texas. Approximately \$2,000 has been spent in grading, removing rocks, making ditches, building cattle guards and flagging the road after rains.

T. L. Loudenshield, experienced road builder, has had charge of this road for five months.

The nature of the soil through which the road is built has a high percent of gravel and fine rock which has made it possible to construct a high class road.

The cattle guards are constructed of 60 pound railroad iron. Several hundred cars and trucks pass over this road each day operating out of Big Spring to the oil fields in the Big Spring road territory.

Morgan To Build Big Spring School

BIG SPRING, July 26.—J. Morgan Construction company, of Big Spring was the low bidder and was awarded the contract for the school building to be constructed in South Big Spring. This addition to South Ward building has been made necessary on account of so many new homes being built in that part of town.

The plumbing, heating and wiring was let to A. P. Kuehn, Plumbing and Heating company, of Big Spring. There were six bidders on the job. Plans and specifications were drawn by Peters & Haynes, Architects, of Lubbock.

Work will begin immediately, according to W. T. Strange, representing the architect.

Talks Tax On Fans Who Have Radios

NEW YORK, July 26.—Tex McMichael is quoted in the Evening World today as saying that radio is driving away the purchasers of the cheaper sets at boxing shows and that if fights are to show a fair profit radio fans will have to submit to some sort of voluntary tax.

"Fifty million persons, it is estimated, not a word picture of the Dempsey-Sinclair fight," he said, "just as quickly as those seated in Yankee Stadium and got something for nothing that the onlookers had to pay well for."

"I have an idea that if the immense radio public was appealed to to donate anything they wished from 25 cents to \$1 for the entertainment furnished they would be glad to contribute rather than have radio privileges denied them."

IMPROVEMENTS ON WATER PLANT ARE PROGRESSING
Improvements on the city water and light plant which will represent an expenditure of about \$45,000 are nearing completion, city officials say.

The program when completed will affect adequate equipment to serve a population of 55,000, engineers believe. The addition of a 720 horse power engine, a concrete floor, and a spray pond of cooling and circulation water are included in the improvements of the local plant.

HEREFORD, July 26.—Roy Jackson, former police officer of San Antonio, has been selected traffic officer by the city commission of Hereford, succeeding C. C. Richards, who has been directing traffic for the past six weeks. Mr. Jackson has been in Hereford nearly two years and has recently been employed by the Hereford Motor company. With streets and with a number of "slow" signals on various street intersections, and with no T-turns at Main and Third, it is believed that traffic problems in Hereford will be reduced.

COUNTY COURT OPENS WITH TRIAL OF DAMAGE SUIT

County court which has been recessed for the past several days, will open today with the civil hearing in the case of Kruger and Judd vs. the Fort Worth and Denver Railway to affirm proper damages in condemnation proceedings in connection with securing right-of-way through Lubbock county.

A full court of cases is ready for hearing and will occupy some time in trial, it was stated.

WEST TEXAS OIL NEWS

LAND APPLICATIONS MADE IN OLD MEXICO RULING

Eighty-five million acres have been applied for in accordance with the provisions of Mexico's amended oil law, the government officials announced today. This area was declared to contain 25,000,000 barrels of oil. The application of the law is objected to by the American oil companies. The so-called "hellcats" companies were declared to hold 4,700,000 acres upon which they have not applied for concessions.

HECK PLANS TESTS

J. A. Heck, of the firm of Holmes & Narver, independent oil operators of Amarillo, is back in Lubbock to close up a deal on two drilling. Holmes and Heck have just finished a 2500 foot test in Hartley county, which was dry.

LANDRETH BUILDS STORAGE

Producing companies on and along both sides of the Landreth vacant university strip in Crane county are building more tanks rapidly to avoid further pinching in of their wells. Landreth Production company are building two 55,000 barrel tanks that will increase their number to six, and ultimately to have a battery of 15 to 14 tanks of this size.

Three are full and the four is partially filled. Landreth's production from eight wells is around 5,200 barrels daily. It has five tests drilling and two more to be started soon. Church and Weekly have ordered a 55 and Eastland Oil company is planning to erect one.

Eastland's daily production is around 12,000 barrels but it is only running 2,500 to 3,000 through the pipe line. All the Magnolia's oil is going into storage.

Humble, in cutting the pipe line runs, cut the amount of oil it was handling to approximately one-half or to about 20,000 barrels. Increased production in Union county due largely to Gulf No. 2 Lane, has taxed the Humble facilities further.

Six Humble wells in Crane county are shut in, as are all the Prairie's University production, six in number for lack of storage. Prairie's No. 2 Lassiter, a recent completion has been pinched in to 1,500 barrels, which is about one-half of its normal flow.

SEMINOLE OUTPUT INCREASES

The Greater Seminole field of Central Oklahoma passed the half million barrel mark Sunday registering 501,985 barrels for 423 wells. Monday morning it had jumped to 512,647 barrels from 506,000.

Amerasia Petroleum company has completed Nos. 4 and 5 Cawdon on the northwest edge of the Eastern pool, for 2,000 barrels each. The Cawdon lease has made 23,415 barrels and this gauge does not include the two new wells.

Twin State Oil company extended the Barabara area three-fourths of a mile to the northeast with No. 1 Heine in 2-9-5, making 2,500 barrels initial.

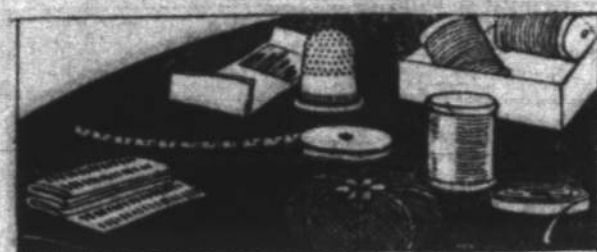

work of their six commission assistants; that work would be speeded up; the opinions of all nine judges would be authoritative instead of only three as now; that civil appeals courts would be limited to 12, which they are not now; that creation of new district courts would be made unnecessary by authorizing the supreme court to transfer judges temporarily from idle benches to busy benches; and that the enforced three months vacation of the supreme court would be eliminated and the court kept open the year round.

Says Bill Misrepresented
The governor charged that the amendment has been "misrepresented by an insidious campaign of misrepresentation and a sordid appeal that it will increase taxation."

"This latter appeal," he said, "is one which no informed man who valued the accuracy of this statement would make."

Former Governor Ferguson and others have charged that the effect of all the amendments would be to increase taxes.

"The amendment," Governor Moody said, "was submitted after combined study was made by members of the legislature and some of the most eminent lawyers in the state. Present in the council that prepared this amendment were executives, representatives, members of the courts and men who in the past have added nothing to our judicial system by their membership on the judiciary of the state and who by their long service acquired intimate knowledge of the needs of the courts."

Not His Bill
"The amendment is not mine as some have said, but it was prepared by men far more capable than I. I would be proud to own its authorship but it is the work of not one mind but of many minds and in it have converged many differing views."

"Regardless of what fate it may meet Monday, I am for the amendment; have spoken for it, and shall vote for it because I believe it to be a measure of improvement and a step in the direction of progress."

"I do not expect all men to agree with me, but have nothing to do with the question is whether it is for the good of the state."

"It has been argued that if the amendment is adopted, the governor would have no authority to appoint the members of the court. That is true. It is urged that so much power should not be reposed in any man."

Some members, believing the murder was due to private vengeance has hesitated to accord the government the exceptional powers of the new measure provided for. Particular objection was taken to empowering the police to search for documents, imprisonment for the possession of documents and deportation of suspicious persons.

CHAMPION TEST FAILS

WASHINGTON, July 26 (AP)—While it was first thought Lieutenant Carlton C. Champion, navy flier, might have set a new altitude mark in his recent sensational flight over the capital, officials of the bureau of standards said today it could be definitely stated of no official world record had been established.

Officials said Champion's altitude would not exceed 29,000 feet, instead of 47,000 as first thought. The recognized world altitude record is held by a French aviator, Caillois, who about a year ago climbed to 32,820 feet.

AMENDMENTS TO BOOST SALARIES

GOVERNOR'S SALARY WOULD BE INCREASED TO \$10,000 MAXIMUM ANNUALLY

AUSTIN, July 26—Every member of the legislature, as well as the governor of Texas would be in line for increased compensation if the proposed amendment concerning their salaries and that of the governor is adopted at the August 1 special election. The proposed amendment has been referred to vote frequently as that to permit the salary of the governor to be raised from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year. That is only part of it, as it gives authority to make the compensation of each legislator not to exceed \$1,500 a year.

In addition to the salary the governor would be given occupancy and use of the governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Present Pay \$5 Day
The present pay for legislators is \$5 per day for the first 60 days of the session, and \$2 a day for the remainder of the session. Each also is entitled mileage of not exceeding \$5.00 for each 25 miles to and from each session. The mileage is computed by "dirt road" on the basis of the most direct and nearest route. The comptroller must keep a table of distance by dirt road to compute the mileage.

The proposed amendment would provide the legislator be reimbursed only his actual traveling expenses to and from the capital.

Proposed Amendment
This proposed amendment is based on Article XVI of the constitution be amended by inserting a new section to be known as "Salaries" which reads:

"All provisions of the present constitution of Texas fixing limitation of the amount of salary compensation of officers and members of the legislature are hereby repealed, and hereafter said officers and members of the legislature shall receive such salary or compensation and expenses as now provided until otherwise provided by law. The salary of the governor shall be ten thousand (\$10,000) per year, and no more, payable monthly and shall have the occupancy and use of the governor's mansion, fixtures and furniture."

The salary of compensation any member of the legislature shall not exceed fifteen hundred dollars per year, and actual traveling expenses from the place of residence to the capitol and return, each session of the legislature, shall hereafter be provided by law and provided that no change in salary or compensation from that now provided by the constitution shall become effective until the first day of January following the first general election held after adoption of this amendment."
