Research Project To Show Elderly Housing Needs: Questionnaires To Be Mailed To 300 Lynn County Residents This Week

A research questionnaire on alternative housing options for elderly citizens of Lynn County will be mailed to 300 citizens in the county this week, according to Dr. Zane Curry of Tahoka who is heading the research project. The confidential questionnaire is being mailed to 300 randomly selected residents over the age of 60 in the county, and contains 38 questions concerning housing options and other data.

All who receive the Mature Adult Housing Questionnaire should return the completed information as soon as possible in an addressed/stamped envelope which is provided. Deadline to return the questionnaires is March 15.

The research study has been funded by Lynn County Hospital District to determine the healthcare/housing needs of older residents in Lynn County. The study is being conducted by Dr. Curry, a Texas Tech professor of Environmental Design and Consumer Economics, and may prove to be the basis of plans for a new healthcare housing facility in conjunction with the hospital here. The Lynn County Committee of

the Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council approached the hospital board with the request for Dr. Curry to conduct the survey to determine the possible need for a retirement housing facility here. The RC&D committee told hospital trustees that it may have access to grant money to partially, or even fully, fund construction of a retirement village facility adjacent to the hospital.

The hospital district, however, would own and operate the proposed facility.

"This research project is different from any other, in that design criteria based on the study will reflect what our own local people would prefer in such a housing facility, rather than what some 'experts' opinion of the design would be," said Dr. Curry.

He said that an alternative form of living is needed for many older adults because they do not need to be institutionalized, but need care that is not available while living alone. Lynn County currently has one nursing home facility and one income-restricted apartment complex for the elderly which does not provide any

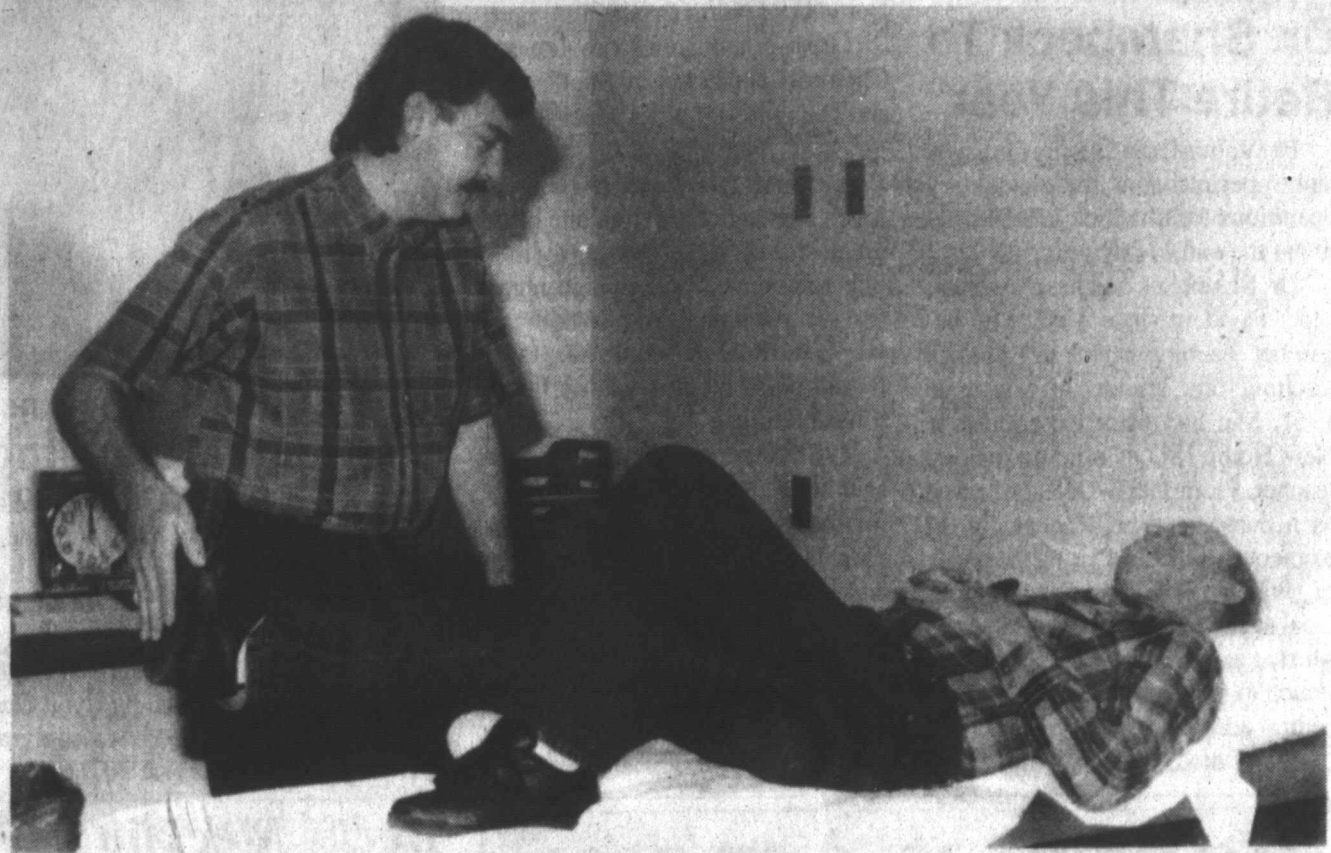
healthcare assistance for its residents.

It is Dr. Curry's conviction that this study will show the need for a retirement type facility based on the elderly residents' preferences, which would include an emergency call system, meal and housekeeping service, a single-story structure and a location near a hospital.

"It is extremely important for each person who receives a questionnaire to complete it and return it as soon as possible. Each individual's response is very important, and will be treated with confidentiality," he stressed.

Dr. Curry conducted a similar survey in the county in 1989, and says that this new study will update that information in showing what county residents prefer.

The information collected from the survey will be analyzed by Dr. Curry, with the study expected to be completed by May 1993. At that time, survey results and schematic plans will be presented to Lynn County Hospital Board of Trustees and the Lynn County RC&D committee.

County To Have Four Voting Boxes In May Election

Lynn County will have only four voting boxes for the May 1 election when all residents of the state will vote on a constitutional amendment which will decide whether to continue the County Education Districts which tax citizens for support of public schools in the state.

The districts were set up with several counties in each district with the idea that all those paying school taxes would send the major part of their taxes to the CEDs, which then, in theory, would equalize funding for the schools in the district. Lynn County schools are all in the Lubbock CED No. 6, which includes Lubbock, Lynn and several other area counties.

Each school district has also levied taxes, at a lower level.

The May 1 vote will let voters decide on a constitutional amendment permitting the state to take funds from the wealthier school districts and redistribute them to all other school districts.

Because there are no local issues on the May 1 ballot, county commissioners decided to combine voting places for this election, allowing one voting place in each county commission precinct. Voting will be at one location each in New Home, Wilson, O'Donnell and Tahoka, with locations to be announced later.

Commissioners at a regular meeting in Tahoka Monday authorized

Comgraphix, Inc. to microfilm the last two years of property records in the courthouse, which have not been microfilmed since 1991. Cost of filming the approximately 8,000 pages of records has been estimated at \$1,028.

Judge J.F. Brandon was authorized to seek bids on insurance for county buildings, liability and heavy equipment.

All commissioners, including J.T. Miller, Sandy Cox, Jacky Henry and T.A. Stone, were present.

Golf Clubs Are Stolen, One Wreck Listed

Two sets of golf clubs and equipment were stolen from a cart house at T-Bar Country Club between Tuesday and Friday of last week, with the stolen items valued at a total of \$3400.

The clubs were stolen from a cart house owned by Jim Solomon of Tahoka. Solomon said his set of McGregor clubs, a red and white Wilson golf bag and a dozen balls were missing, and another set of Wilson 1200 clubs and two dozen golf balls, owned by Ridd Solomon, were taken from the same cart house. The cart house reportedly was locked with a combination lock, which apparently was not forced.

Dept. of Public Safety officers investigated a one-car rollover about 13 miles north of Tahoka early Tuesday morning, when a 1982 Honda Accord driven by Juan Vasquez Jr., 22, of Tahoka, headed south on U.S. 87, overturned. The driver was treated for apparent minor injuries at Lynn County Hospital after being taken in by Lynn EMS ambulance, then released from the hospital.

Another tire-slashing incident was reported to Tahoka Police Dept. during the week. Richard Whitley reported three tires on his pickup truck parked in front of his residence on N. 8th St. were punctured by a sharp instrument sometime recently.

In jail during the week were four persons on charges of driving while intoxicated, including one first offense, one subsequent and felony offense, one first offense plus driving while license suspended plus outstanding traffic warrants, and one for application to revoke probation on DWI charge. Also in jail were one person for theft by check and one female for burglary of a habitation (Terry County warrant).

3 Have Signed For Local School Board Race

Two more candidates have signed up for the Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Trustees election this week, joining candidate Clint Gardner in the race. Outgoing trustee Brad Hammonds signed up for re-election this week, and Jim Solomon has also signed to place his name on the ballot. Two three-year terms are up for election on May 1.

In the City election, Wayne Huffaker has filed for one of the two-year terms on the Tahoka City Council. City Councilmen Carl Reynolds and Mike Mensch both have terms expiring this year, as does Mayor Jim Solomon. All three positions are two-year terms. No other candidates have filed as of yet.

As of this week, no Wilson candidates have filed for either the city or school elections. Wilson ISD trustees John Fields and David Wied's terms expire this year. Both are three-year terms for the school district. In the City Council race, three two-year terms will be up for election, with the terms of Donald Klaus, Victor Steinhasser and Oscar Ortega expiring.

New Home I.S.D. trustee Andy Fillingim signed this week for re-election in that race. The term of trustee Russel Barnett is also expiring. No other candidates have signed for these three-year terms.

Lynn County Farm Program Meetings Slated In March

Several farm meetings have been set to discuss 1993 farm programs. Topics to be discussed are: Payment limits and numbers of persons, set aside requirements, flex acreage, ACP, and Conservation compliance. SCS personnel will discuss conservation plans, plowup dates for cover, and required spotchecks.

Jimmy Woodard, Lynn County Executive Director, said "We realize that due to the short time allowed to complete ASCS work, producers may not have an opportunity to ask questions. These meetings have been set to help them obtain information or ask questions they may have."

"Conservation compliance and the management of the crop cover has become a very important part of the farmers operation. I hope to help explain some of these requirements," states Jon Weddle, District Conservationist. All interested persons are encouraged to attend.

No candidates have filed for the New Home City Council election to date. Mayor J.A. Evans and Councilmen Leroy Nettles and Leon Harmonson all have terms expiring this year. All three positions are two-year terms.

No candidates have filed in either of the elections in O'Donnell this week. O'Donnell I.S.D. trustees Bobby Joe Furlow and Jackie Stidham's terms are expiring, and both are three-year terms. Three City Councilmen's terms are expiring this year, those of Tommy Woolam, Billy Edwards and Rex Little. All three positions are two-year terms.

Filing deadline for any of these city and school races is March 17.

THERE IS THIS guy in Tahoka who keeps bugging me about the oldest tree in Lynn County. There's a tree on the courthouse lawn that he thinks may be the oldest, but he agreed with me when I said "If I print in the paper that this tree is the oldest one in the county, I'll get 37 phone calls about trees planted by somebody's great-granddaddy back in 1890 or so."

There were several of us in the room the last time this guy asked me if I had found out yet which is the oldest tree, and one of the other men posed this question: "Who cares?" (Actually he didn't word it just like that).

The tree hunter said he certainly did, and he wants me to find out. I suggested that maybe I could print his name in the paper as saying the one on the courthouse lawn is the oldest, but he didn't want to go out on a limb and say that.

Since I promised I would try to get to the root of the situation, I am now asking that anyone who thinks his or her tree may be the oldest in Lynn County call me at the office or write (Box 1170). I'll compare the notes and calls and print the claims in this column, although it may start some arguments.

There is this oak tree at the Alamo which covers half a block with all its branches and which is still alive (or it was when I saw the Alamo in 1985). I don't know how old it is, but I guess it goes back to about 1835.

Surely there are no trees that old in Lynn County. I don't know how old the one on the north side of the courthouse lawn is, but one person suggested to me that "You can probably count on one hand the trees in the county which are more than 60-70 years old."

"You mean like 'one, two, tree?'" I asked. He then suggested that I please leaf and not come back.

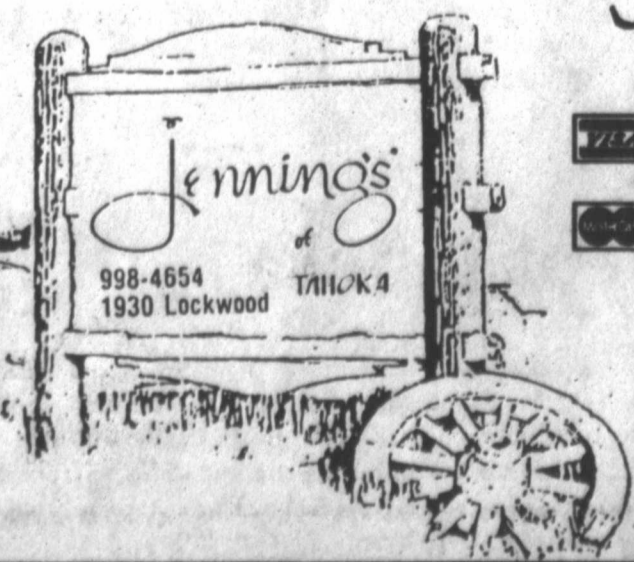

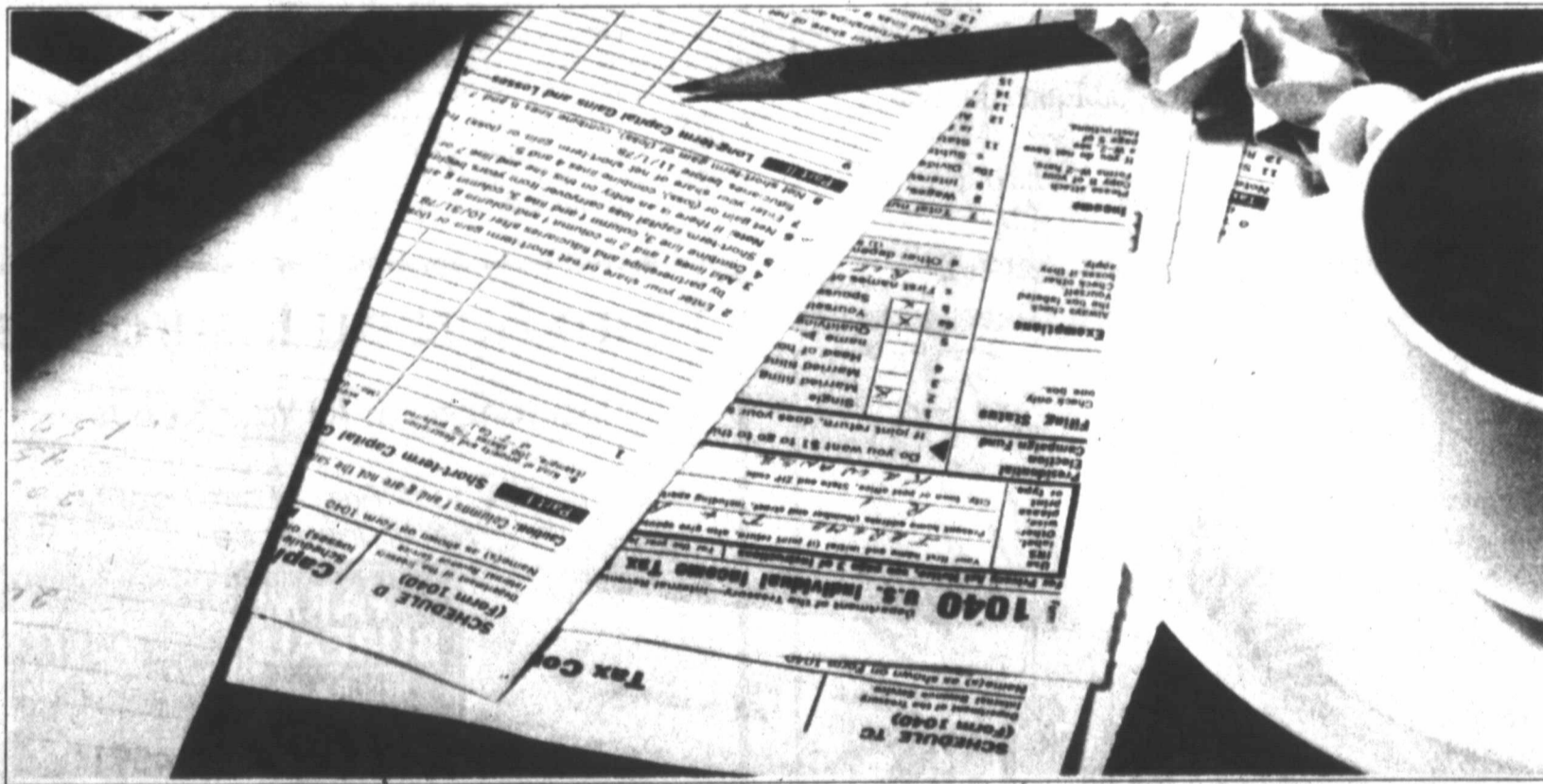

Dry Hydrant Well Sites Completed

The four dry-hydrant wells in Lynn County have been completed which will provide access to irrigation well water for area fire fighters. Sponsored by the Lynn County Committee of the Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Council, the hydrant adaptations for irrigation wells were fully funded by a grant from the Texas Forest Service.

The four well locations are in different areas of the county, with one located on the Lance Hlavaty farm about 13 miles north of Tahoka on Hwy. 87; one south of Petty on Charles Smith's property; one approximately 7 miles east of Tahoka on Hwy. 380 on Jim Strickland's land; and one two miles west of Draw near Jimmy Williams' home.

The RC&D has several other projects in the works, and will seek grant funding for such projects as new EMS communications equipment, new fire truck and fire hall/community center facilities for Tahoka, museum and community center/swimming pool renovations in O'Donnell, and others.

RC&D from New Home, Stoney Gill and Freddie Kieth.

The local committee will sponsor the Wes-Tex RC&D second annual meeting at Poka-Lambro facilities on Friday, March 5, with approximately 150 sponsors from the 16-county area expected to attend. Registration begins at 9 a.m. and a luncheon will be served at noon. Registration fee is \$6 per person.



