HOG CHOLERA QUARANTINE EXTENDED TIL FURTHER NOTICE

BAIRD — The sixty-day Texas statewide hog cholera quarantine order has been officially extended until further notice, according to Gregory Gerngross, County Agricultural Agent. All precautions of the previous quarantine order will still be in effect with the precaution to be added to the new order effective May 28, 1971. "While this statewide quarantine order is in effect, all swine shall be quarantined for 30 days at the premise of the purchaser and no movement from such premise except for slaughter shall be allowed for the permit of the quarantine. This premise quarantine will automatically expire after the 30th day."

County Received \$2,422,799 In State And Federal Funds In 1970

AUSTIN — Callahan County received \$2,422,799 in State and Federal funds in 1970, figures secured by Representative Joe Hanna from the legislative budget on State expenditures, revealed.

In State money, \$1,615,859 was received. Federal funds of \$806,940 were funneled into the county. Welfare accounted for the largest sum, with \$864,517 being spent here. Of this amount, the State gave \$227,287 with the Federal government adding \$637,230. Hanna noted that the State ratio of Federal to State funds in the welfare area was only two to one, while in Callahan County the ratio jumped to over three to one.

Education was the second largest recipient of State and Federal funds, with \$799,704 being spent here. Of this the State put up \$739,963 while the Federal government gave \$59,741.

Transportation, or highway and road construction, came in third. In this area \$699,585 was spent, with \$575,759 coming from the State and \$93,826 from the Federal government.

Other monies coming into the County were used as follows: Health, \$18,800. Public Safety, \$38,466. General government, \$3,335. Natural Resources, \$26,392.

CLYDE COMMUNITY PARK PLANS DRIVE TO UPDATE PARK

CLYDE — The Board of Directors of Clyde Community Park met recently to discuss plans and problems now facing the Park. We still don't have the picnic area or play ground for our very young as well as our older citizens. This is because of the cost each year to operate the park. Operation of the park alone cost about \$1200.00 each year. The only income they have for this is profits from the concession stand. These receipts are not enough to cover the cost. Money donated to ball clubs does not support the park. This money is used to operate the leagues, Pee Wee, Little League, Teen-Age and Girls Softball.

Across this great land people are combining efforts and building fine communities. We need this in Clyde. We need a Community Center, miniature golf course, swimming pool, play ground, and picnic area to provide the people a place to go and enjoy themselves. A place where clubs could meet, a place for our young people to have meetings, parties and programs such as the western band that has been organized here. There are many club that could benefit.

These things cannot be done until the people of this community take it upon themselves to make it happen. We appreciate the support of those who are now contributing to our fine ball clubs, but we need the help and support of all the people to make it a success. A drive is scheduled for June 5 to raise money to operate the park. If enough people will support this project we may be able to see

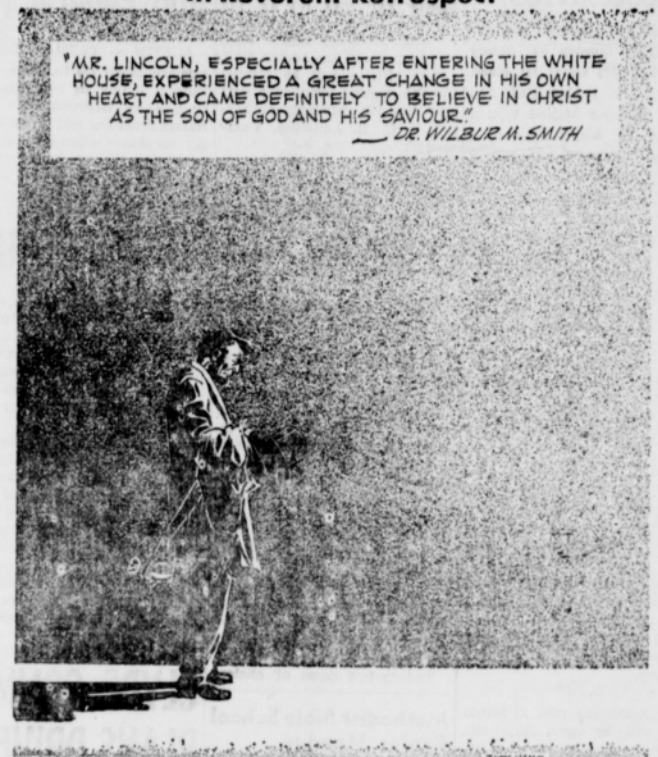

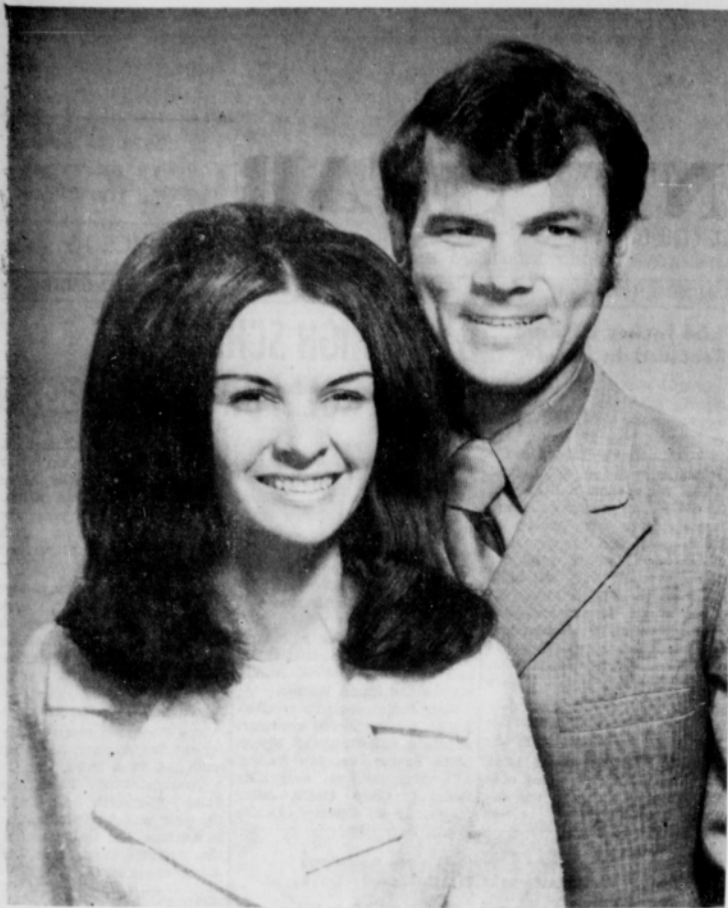

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Ever notice how we stumble over ourselves when a phony smile or a limp handshake is offered from our foes. The latest gesture from Chou-En-lai of Red China or Soviet boss Lenoid Brezhnev seems to set us off as if we were going down the trail to meet the returning Prodigal Son.

Of one thing we can be certain -- the Communist leaders are nobody's fools. Unfortunately, they may be getting us in the position of being exactly that. They may have us sized up better than we have ourselves.

They see diminishing American power and influence in Asia gaining momentum by the day, week and month. In addition to the withdrawal of troops from South Vietnam, Thailand, Korea, Japan, Okinawa, and the Philippines, they see the abandonment of interest in the affairs of that part of the world.

They observe the increased pressures in this County for a similar retreat from Western Europe. They are well aware of the moves in the United States Congress to immediately end the war in Vietnam without conditions attached, to abolish the draft, to limit the war powers of the President, to cut off money for defense preparedness and otherwise withdraw into isolationism.

They know the implication of America's retrenchments. With Great Britain out of the Far East and Japan limited in military capabilities by WW I treaty, there would be little to stand in Red China's way.

If the U. S. departs Western Europe, NATO would likely dismantle itself. Given time there is serious doubt the Nations outside the Iron Curtain would maintain a collective strength to counter Russia.

In one way or another the countries of the free world have long looked to the United States for assurances. If and when their confidence of reliance is shaken, they likely will adjust themselves to a new reality and make the necessary accommodations with the power existing in their part of the world.

So, it should not be surprising that the leaders in Red China and Moscow are coming up front and center with what appears to be conciliation, even if it's only a ping-pong match

or a vague Russian promise not to point any more missiles at us than is necessary to destroy us.

Chou En-Lai, with a kindly smile over the ping-pong table may well have Communist China on its way into the United Nations without even subscribing to its charter of purpose.

Soviet boss Brezhnev appears willing to negotiate a "balanced and mutual reduction" of forces

in Central Europe. He advances support of limiting strategic nuclear weapons, but proposes no reduction in capabilities, superior in some respects to that of our own.

It is not a matter of being the world's policeman or of supporting every government around the globe. We've done too much of that -- and, incidentally, with the support of gung-hoism to this policy by most of those who now would have us fold our hands in pious good hopes and do nothing. Rather it concerns what is best

for the safety and protection of our future. If we, as a Nation, allow our disillusionment, disappointments and discouragement with events in Southeast Asia, to break apart U. S. Military alliance in Europe -- to let our National defenses deteriorate -- then the price and tragedy of Vietnam is many times multiplied.

In these matters it can be well assumed that the Chinese and Russian leaders know how to appraise this world situation, both long and short ranges. The awful question is, do we?

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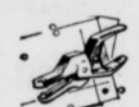
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Chrisman Resigns As Chairman Of County Historical Committee
