Texas Tech Students Stage Memorial Services to Honor Two Dead Students at Southern University

With the words: "Precious Lord, take my hand, lead me on, let me stand" echoing during a memorial program for the two Black students who were killed last week at Southern University at Baton Rouge, La., Black students of Texas Tech University paid tribute to those "two brave Black brothers" who died fighting for what they believed to be right.

The beautiful voice of Brenda Lockart of Dallas, Texas, traveled throughout the packed Mesa Room of the University Center last Monday afternoon. Ken Baker, president of the Student Organization for Black Unity (SOBU), presided over the meeting which touched the hearts of everyone present, Black, brown and white students.

Approximately 150 students were present at the noon memorial service, along with many who could not enter the capacity filled room, but stayed in the hallway to participate.

A resolution from the local student organization was read by Baker. The resolution, in essence, paid tribute to the two fellows slain last week at Southern University and criticized the administration for not addressing itself to the terrible incident.

Several Black faculty members of the Texas Tech administration were also



present at the affair. Other Tech students, including Veronica Davis, read poetry and readings in honor of those who died in Southern.

A moment of silent prayer was also held in honor of the deceased. The audience, with Emory Davis as accompanist at the piano, sang, "Lift Every Voice and Sing."

East Lubbock Residents Appear Before City Council to Protest New Plant Proposal in Area

The West Texas Times learned this week that residents of East Lubbock were expected to appear before the city council in a protest against the proposed compost venture. (The Times was printed a day early this week because of the Thanksgiving Holiday).

Announcement Read Sunday

In an announcement sent to churches of East Lubbock last Sunday, which stated: "The city council of Lubbock recently took under study the possibility of placing a garbage compost plant in Southeast Lubbock. We believe this would be just another source of unpleasant odors and

harmful gasses in the air, not to mention junk being blown off into our streets."

The announcement invited all citizens of East Lubbock to be present at city hall and in the city council chambers on Wednesday (November 22nd) at 11:30 a.m. when several "fellow citizens speak to the city fathers against it (the compost plant)."

Roy D. Anderson, chairman of the concerned group, told the West Texas Times that several thousand signatures had been placed on petitions.

It is also expected that a representative from the Local chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) will speak against the proposal.

A minister in one of the local churches told the Times, "We want the city council chambers to turn black on Wednesday," and he encouraged his members and the community to be there in great numbers.

Dallas Blacks Protest Fourth Fatal Shooting by Police in As Many Weeks

Dallas--(NBNS)--Angered by the fourth fatal shooting of a black by police here within a month, black community leaders, led by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, say they may be forced to "provide some more agitation."

That may be the only way whites "will know that our demands should be listened to," protest leaders say.

"The white community, the city council and the police have not listened to us, they have ignored our demands," said SCLC Board Chairman Dr. Robert T. Wilson.

"What we suspect is that we will need to

provide some more agitation in the community so the white community will know that our demands should be listened to."

Wilson said there was an obvious "lack of even-handed dispersment of Justice" in Dallas.

Protests by blacks started immediately after police had shot Charles Davis, 20, is the head with a .12 gauge shotgun as he fled from officers.

Police said that Davis, who was a robbery suspect, was unarmed but the officer thought he was reaching for a gun.

Davis was the seventh black shot by officers since Oct. 11 and the fourth to die in that time.

The same day that Davis was fatally shot, a dozen blacks occupied the city council chambers to protest the shootings. They had not yet learned of the Davis killing.

SCLC Enters Picture

The SCLC has launched a series of peaceful protests and the occupation of the council chambers for about 10 minutes before the scheduled meeting, led to the arrest of the protestors.

They refused to give the council members their seats when they showed up for the meeting. The council then had the police called in and none of the protestors offered resistance to arrest, except one woman who was dragged out of city hall by two policemen.

Shootings Bring Community Together

SCLC leaders, though, say that this latest shooting and arrests will help the community come together.

"We have taken some steps today to unite all the various groups of the total black community toward one purpose," said Board Chairman Wilson.

"I don't know just what we're going to do about the latest shooting," said SCLC Director George Holland. "Perhaps a march, a protest of some kind, today, tomorrow, whenever. We'll decide that when we meet."

Newark Faces Possible Bankruptcy

Newark, N.J.--(NBNS)--A proposed \$212 million municipal budget for 1973 could boost Newark's property tax to a level that Mayor Kenneth A. Gibson has said would push the city past the "point of no return."

At the end of the road which Mayor Gibson can foresee, if the city does not get more state and federal help, lies actual bankruptcy for Newark.

The financial danger is so great that the city's Department of Finance has asked the State of New Jersey to explore the legal consequences of municipal bankruptcy, including the possibility of the state taking over the city government.

Mayor Gibson, after conferring with state budget officials, announced that the city's local property tax rate would have to be raised by as much as 20 percent to cover a projected \$37.5 million deficit in the proposed \$212 million budget.

Newark's present property tax rate is \$9.63 per \$100 of property valuation. A \$2.50 increase would raise it to \$12.13 per \$100, which would be one of the highest rates in the country.

The Mayor has said that a tax rate of \$11 per \$100 would represent the "point of no return" for the city.

Local PTA Leader Attends State Confab In Fort Worth

Struggs PTA at the annual three day meeting of the 672,585-member association. Mrs. Jean Harris, PTA state president from Agua Dulce, presided at the November 15-17 meetings.

3,000 Texans Attend

Approximately 3,000 delegates from PTA's across Texas attended the 63rd annual convention. Speakers included Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe, from Uvalde National PTA Pres. Mrs. Elizabeth Mallory, Endicott, New York; and Dr. William Beeners, Director of Speech, Princeton Theological Seminary.

Highlighting the convention was election of top officers of the association who will serve a two-year term. These new officers are: President, Mrs. Marvin Armstrong, Lubbock; First Vice-President, Mrs. A.T. Loveridge, East Bernard; Second Vice-President, Mrs. G. Kent Rider, Austin; Recording Secretary, Mrs. Fred W. Parker, Fort Worth.

Convention Adopts Theme

The Convention Theme was "Who Says We Can't? We Can!" Mrs. Phea enjoyed the convention, but wished more of our parents could have attended. "I joined PTA for your child. Did you join for mine?"

Ghetto Choir to Appear at LOIC Friday and Saturday

The Tulsa Ghetto Youth Choir, following successful performances last spring here in Lubbock, will return to the city Friday and Saturday, November 24th and 25th.

Their performances, sponsored by the Lubbock Opportunities Industrialization Center, will be at LOIC, 2200 E. Broadway, on both nights at 8:00. Admission is \$2.00 for adults and \$1.25 for students of all ages.

These young people, ranging in age from 5 to 22, have travelled more than 30,000 miles with their message of dignity, identity and love for their fellow man. Products of the ghetto, they have channeled their energy and their talent into a positive and entertaining response to the conditions of the ghetto.

In addition, they will sponsor a music workshop in group singing from 1:30 to 3:30 and a job preparation seminar from 4:00 until 6:00 on Friday, November 24th. There will be a \$1.00 registration fee for both of these events.

Business In West Texas is Our Business

This correspondent would like to see the West Texas Times, in cooperation with black civic, social and religious leaders launch a campaign in Lubbock and throughout the West Texas area, to ascertain the "black awareness" of businesses and shops that appreciate and, solicit support of black people. Above all, a list or directory should be published of "equal opportunity" business establishments regularly, so that readers will know the names of those places who carry on business practices that are truly American and without regard to race, creed or accident of birth.

Editor Patterson, in a recent editorial, brings this thought to our mind when he mentions the fact that a certain large department store (chain) is reputed to be considering withdrawing advertising from the only black-oriented newspaper in the Lubbock area. We hope this isn't really so, as we know that some of the higher-ups in this same organization are active in progressive black welfare and causes over the nation.

Then we must not forget that many of these All-American business places do employ blacks in every level of their business, some of whom do not get any large amount of black support and patronage, in their particular area. And then there are those business places in West Texas who do not, in any shape, form or fashion, share in "the black experience."

As I See It

As I See It, Blacks are beginning to realize that we have been excluded from participation in the productive economy, and, at the same time, realized that we have been exploited for our consumption of goods and services by major companies in the nation, as well as in our own community of Lubbock.

It's time that we say, "Cut us in, or we'll cut you out of our budgets!" This would mean that we must let the business establishments in our city know that we want them to patronize our efforts, rather than give excuses that they don't have money in the budget or some other type of excuse which is forever given to us.

The reason I'm making this point is because of experiences I've encountered in this newspaper. It appears as though merchants are forever passing the old song of, "We don't have money in the budget to advertise in the Times." Some have even attempted to make me believe that it's cheaper to advertise in the *Avalanche-Journal* than to patronize the Times. "The A/J reaches more people, so therefore it covers the total area," according to many who absolutely refuse to advertise in the Times.

What local businessmen fail to realize is that this media is geared at the welfare of the Black community. And, in many cases, it represents any person, regardless of race, of the "left-out" community.

Many merchants forget that Blacks contribute a great deal to the profits their establishments make. We (blacks) are large consumers of everything from Chevrolets to Scotch Whisky. We buy our share of the latest clothing styles, in the complete line of shoes, coats and suits.

It's hard to understand why any business establishment can be so blind as to say that the nine per cent of the population, which is Black, is not worth patronizing, or advertising for its business. As members of the Black community, you should search among yourselves and see some of the things which exist in the community and determine why they are happening.

True, there are merchants who advertise in this media from time to time. I would urge you to patronize those merchants who recognize the fact that there are Black people in Lubbock County, and West Texas, who spend their hard earned dollars in their businesses.

I wouldn't attempt to tell you what to do with your

Incidentally, I visited with Sear's this week as promised, and sure enough, that rumor was true. They feel that they can do a better job of reaching Blacks in the local daily so we're out. I don't know what you're gonna do, but I gotta go look for some other Santa's helper.

Did you know that with 17 people appointed to the present commission to help the City Council spend the \$1.9 million in Federal Revenue sharing funds—there were no Blacks. That's right, there were no Blacks appointed to the commission, although there were 2 Mexican Americans eligible for positions on the same commission. I'm not sure what the present City Council is really thinking about, but one thing I do know—if they didn't like it when a federal representative came out here from Dallas and helped them solve their labor problems during the latest garbage strike, wonder what they will think when the federal representatives come out here and explain to them that blacks helped put that money in the federal budget in the first place?

Revenue sharing never meant that the black people helped pay the federal income tax bill and then were not eligible to sit on the board of advisors to help spend the money when it came back home.

By the way, all 17 members of the commission were appointed by the City Council, past or present, and not one Black was even considered for appointment, so they say!

Such a campaign should elicit the support first of the black ministers and their congregation, and then right on down to the fraternal, civic and social black groups who are or should be vitally concerned with the "advancement of colored people" with apology to the great organization—the NAACP.

Perhaps a symbol, such as "We share The Black Experience" could be developed and promoted by these leaders to be awarded to those business places that really do, after some criteria or standards have been outlined. How about it Editor Patterson? What do you think of the suggestion?

We Can Do Something Now

We do not advocate by any means boycotts, etc., for these un-American businesses, but a program of education and promotion of those business places and people who are All-American. Let's simply take our business patronage to those who are truly "equal opportunity" places in every sense of the word. We are prone to cry and beg so often when there is much that we can do for ourselves, one bellringer wrote me not so long ago. We agree. Don't you?

And any black minister or congregation or black group that would not cooperate in such a West Texas wide campaign to widen and strengthen "the black experience" should be willing to hang its head in public shame.

Our sincere congratulations to Norman Williamson and the *West Texas Times* for its continued interest in the expanded growth and welfare of "the black experience" and may God add support from our liberal brown and white Americans, for we are all in this thing "Together". We would like to hear from bellringers in Odessa-Midland, Lamesa, Brownfield, Amarillo, Abilene, Pecos, Wichita Falls and wherever you live if you read and support your own newspaper: the *West Texas Times*. Write me in care of WTT. I'll get it pronto.

money. Nor would I encourage you not to spend your money with merchants who do not patronize this media or any other Black orientated effort. But I will say this, "Quit being used and manipulated by those persons who could care less about you, yet enjoy receiving your hard earned dollars."

It's not necessary for me to tell you who those businesses are, for you have a good idea. I would appreciate, however, if you would look for yourself and ask questions of the various businesses in Lubbock who do not advertise in this newspaper.

There are milk companies, bread companies, shoe stores, clothing stores, you name them (there are plenty) who refuse to advertise. We've been trying for twelve years and many obstacles have been placed in our path.

I have been approached by several established citizens of East Lubbock, as well as people in other areas of the city to encourage a "selective buying list" and spell out each week those persons who refuse to advertise.

As I See It, brothers and sisters, this newspaper is going to have to do something. What'll it be? I don't know at the present time. I would welcome any suggestions you may have. If you have any comments, then drop me a line to: *AS I See It*, c/o T.J. Patterson, Box 225, Lubbock, Texas, 79408.

This is your media. . . We need your help to overcome the problem of receiving advertising from merchants in our city which you do business with. It is time to let those businesses know that we want to be cut in, or we'll cut them out of our budgets. By the way, Christmas is just around the corner.

Encourages Blacks to Protect Property

A local advisor, planner and counselor for the American Security Life Insurance Company, Casey B. Wiley, often suggests to members of the Black community to put back a little today so they will have it when they are old.

"Why should a person work all their life real hard and then turn around and find out that they don't have anything?", he has asked many times. He is a young man, who, too, encourages members of the Black community to get themselves a will.

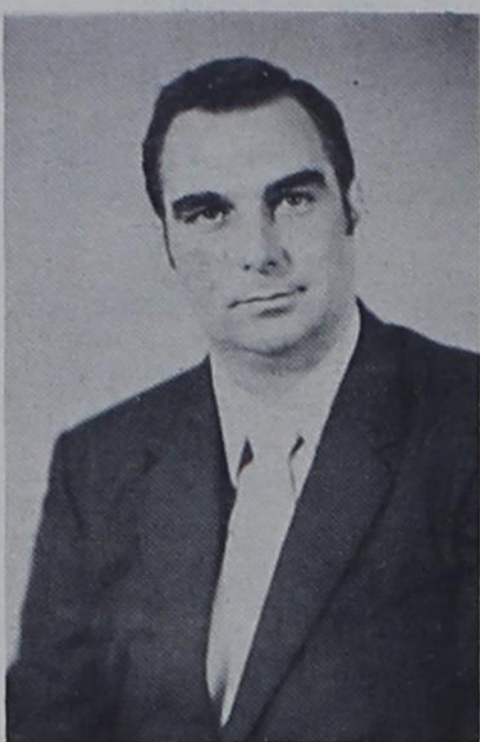
"You know if you are a man who has children, and you and your wife are killed, the state has the say over your children. If the state can't find a suitable home for them, they will then place the children in an orphanage," Wiley points out.

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Zumwalt Cracks Down On Navy Brass for Race Failures

Washington - (NBNS) - Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt, Chief of Naval Operations, has told his top officers they must end racial discrimination in the Navy or be "weeded out" of the service.

Backed up by Navy Secretary John W. Warner, the Navy chief delivered a sharply worded speech to more than 100 admirals and Marine generals at a special meeting in the Pentagon.

"The Navy," he said, "has made unacceptable progress in the equal opportunity area."

And, Zumwalt warned, "every effort will be made to seek out and take appropriate action, either punitive or administrative, against those persons who are engaged in or condoning discriminatory practices or who have violated either the spirit or the letter of our equal opportunity policy."

Zumwalt and Warner acted quickly following racial disorders

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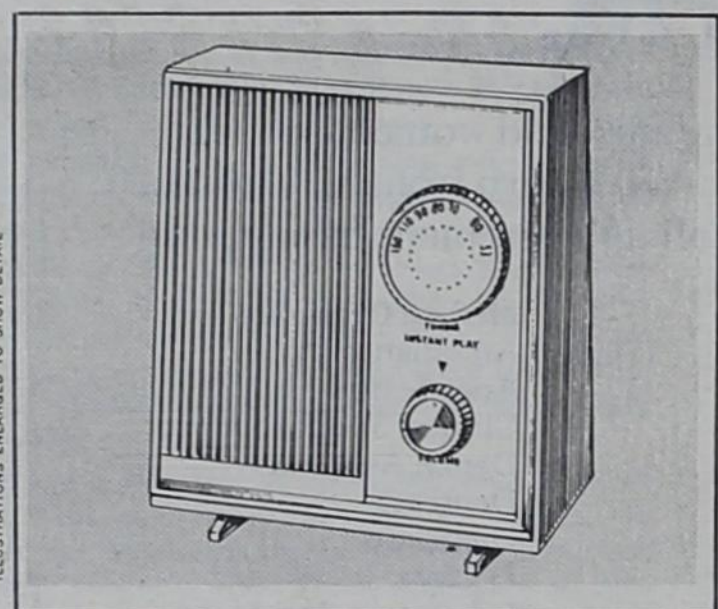

Texas got another championship, Arkansas was sidelined from a bowl, Rice added to the woes of A&M and the Lubbock news media that has been screaming "Bowl! Bowl!" since the Raiders won two games back to back can relax.

Everything turned out as expected over the weekend. Well, almost. There was some question about Tech beating Baylor, but little that Texas would handle TCU. SMU and the Owls pulled upsets.

The Raiders beat pesky Baylor in the Bear's den and that in itself is something, because this marks only the second time, only the second time in 13 tries by the Raiders.

And, in the process, the Raiders grabbed a spot in the Sun Bowl, as well as clinching no worse than a tie for second place in the conference standings.

I have to think of that second place as being even more significant than a bowl berth because Tech wasn't even picked to finish in the top four. And really, the Raiders aren't, on paper, that good.

Tech isn't that good, but it still has won eight of 10 games this year, which is a tribute to (1) the coaches; (2) the Tech squad; (3) the senior leadership; and (4) general support of the team.

Several years ago, Princeton coach Bill Roper made the statement that "a team that won't be beaten can't be beaten." That applies pretty well to the Raiders.

Texas proved that, despite Roper's remark, a big, strong team with desire will beat a smaller, strong team with desire. And TCU obviously put it all together for one game. Aside from that, the Raiders conquered everything in sight, with tough (despite the record) Arkansas left. Tech can win that game, too.

Arkansas has nothing to lose. The Razorbacks, out of the running and out of the bowl picture, can make things unpleasant for the Raiders. They'll probably be loose as a goose Saturday.

But this Raider team is on the verge of going down as one of the best in Tech history. I don't think that they'll falter. They have too much pride not to win this game.

Out of curiosity, I got to looking at past Raider history. If Tech wins Saturday, only five prior Raider teams will have posted better records. Tops was the 1938 eleven (Cotton Bowl) with the only perfect record by a Tech team, 10-0. The 1953 (Gator Bowl) team had a 10-1 mark. The 1940 (no bowl) and 1941 (Sun Bowl) teams had 9-1-1 and 9-1-0 records. The 1932 (no bowl) team had a 10-2 mark.

+++++
The 1933 Raider eleven posted an 8-1 record for a better percentage, losing only to SMU in the opener, didn't go to a bowl.

Tech's record, of course, has not brightened the bowl picture. Eleven times Raider teams have taken the field with only two victories to show, one Gator, one Sun. (It doesn't seem to matter whether Tech was on TV or not).

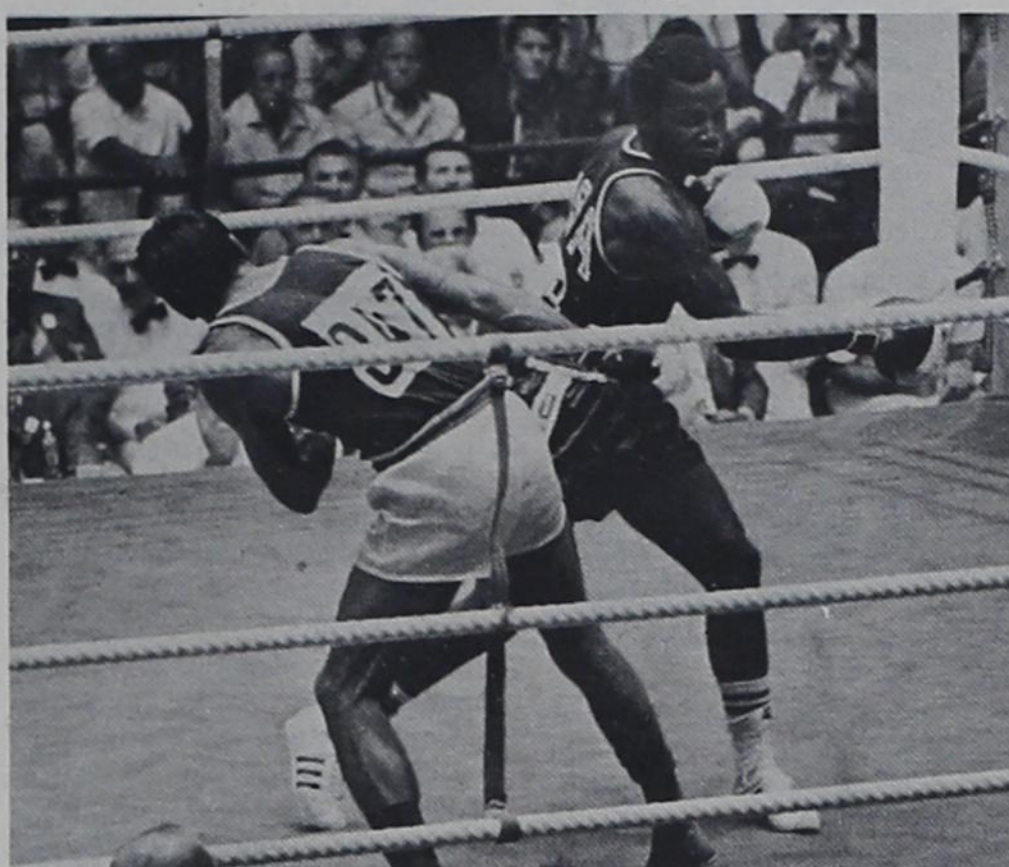

Raider elevens went to bowls twice in the 30s, twice in the 40s, four times in the 50s, twice in the 60s and now is embarking on a promising surge in the 70s. This will be the second bowl in this decade and could be the most productive of all.

And so we come to Thanksgiving, a sport weekend that will drive wives crazy and elate the hearts of all grid fans. There's a titanic battle between Nebraska and Oklahoma. There's the traditional UT-A&M struggle. Two pro games during the day.

Tech's basketball junior varsity opens Friday night here against the National team of Chile, when fans will get a chance to see reserves and newcomers, not the varsity. Then, Arkansas Saturday afternoon and the usual pro games Sunday.

Defeated Olympic Boxer Will Get Second Crack at Russian in January Vegas Rematch



Reggie Jones, the black Marine corporal who trounced a Russian boxer during the Munich Olympics yet "lost" the highly controversial and widely viewed match, will fight his Eastern European opponent again.

This time, however, the bout will not be fought near either the beer gardens of Munich or the cold monuments of Moscow. Instead, Las Vegas will be the site of the re-match between a Soviet light middleweight named Valery Tregubov and Reggie Jones of Newark, New Jersey.

In the last bout, Jones ended the fight with more points than Tregubov, but the scoring system was so convoluted and complex that the Russian was declared the winner. The crowd of 6,000 watching the bout in person hooted with disbelief calling the officials "Schieber!" (crook).

Disheartened by the event, the young Jones said he would never fight again. However, since then, he has changed his mind.

"I got lots of calls and letters from people I didn't know, telling me to fight again. My Marine Corps coaches and buddies all encouraged me to continue my career and I am going to do just that."

In a few weeks, Jones will be leaving the Corps and those who taught him his new life style. He has hopes for a professional career in the ring but will still be an amateur for the January 27 bout in Los Vegas with the Russian.

Jones had fought before joining the Corps but never put on boxing gloves until he went through training at Parris Island.

In Newark's Weequich High School, he had played guard on the basketball team and in 1968 was named to the All-City team.

His fighting, however, had been confined to the streets of Newark. Joining the Corps in 1969, Jones was stationed at Quantico, Va., when he saw an exhibition bout in 1970.

"The fighter looked good, and I liked the way he stopped his opponent. So I tried out for the team," Jones says. "I sparred with a guy and, of course, he got the best of me. But the coach said I had 'heart', and he let me stay on the team."

At eight p.m. every night, Jones would start working out with the bag and sparring with other amateur boxers. His

proficiency with his fists improved and he soon "started knocking guys out."

Fighting first within the Corps and then at interservice bouts, Jones proved he was a good boxer.

Using his best punches—left hooks to the body set up by right jabs—he became Golden Gloves Champion in two divisions: welterweight and light middleweight.

"I enjoyed the skill that the

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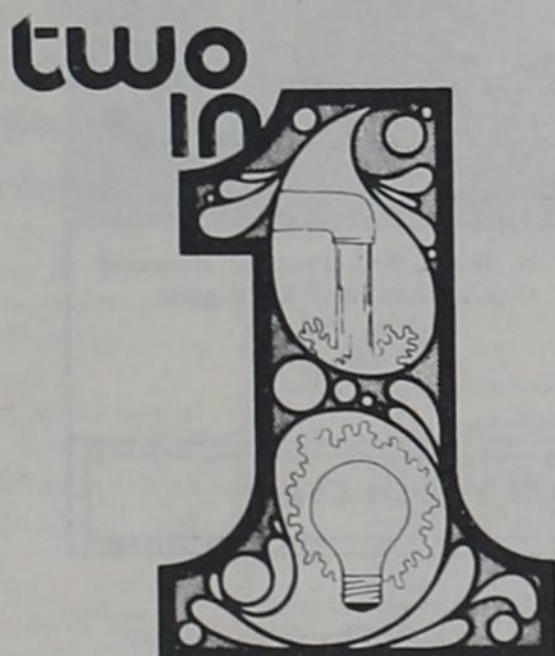
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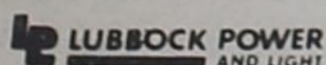
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Three New Black Congressmen will Bring Total in 93rd Congress to Sixteen

Washington—(NBNS)—Each of the three new black Congressional representatives coming to Washington next January will bring with them impressive backgrounds of accomplishments relating to those bread and butter issues that seriously affect Blacks—jobs, education, housing and others.

The two women legislators, Yvonne Braithwaite Burke of Los Angeles and Barbara Jordan of Houston are both lawyers who served in their respective state legislatures prior to their recent elections to Congress.

The Rev. Andrew Young, an ordained minister from Atlanta, was at the time of his election director of the Atlanta Human Relations Commission.

Rev. Young and Miss Jordan are the first blacks elected to Congress from the South since the Reconstruction period which followed the Civil War. All three of the new Congressmen are Democrats.

After graduating in the top third of her class at the University of Southern California Law School in 1953, Mrs. Burke became an ardent civil rights lawyer and member of the executive board of the Los Angeles NAACP.

In 1966, she was elected to the

California State Assembly where she helped bring about legislation changing the harsh garnishment laws, scourges of black workers all over the United States.

The 39-year-old legislator has also worked for legislation promoting better job and housing opportunities for blacks and other minorities. Mrs. Burke won her election to Congress in a newly-created district which includes Watts.

Barbara Jordan, while serving in the Texas Senate since 1967, as well as continuing a private law practice, has gained statewide recognition for her work in the labor relations field.

A magnum cum laude graduate from Boston University Law School, Miss Jordan is a specialist in the field of workmen's compensation. She was instrumental in getting Texas' first minimum wage law passed.

Winning in a largely black district, Miss Jordan also had the backing of former President Lyndon Johnson.

Rev. Young, usually called "Andy," is a former aide of Dr. Martin Luther King in the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and is well known in national civil rights and liberal circles.

Defeated in his first attempt to win a congressional seat in 1970, Young turned back a challenge by a liberal Republican, State Rep. Rodney Cook, to represent an Atlanta district that is 44 per cent black.

Like Mrs. Burke, Rev. Young's opposition was white.

The three new legislators, all expect to join the Congressional Black Caucus, and will probably bring new vitality to that organization, which some black political observers say has grown somewhat stagnant.

Nationally, the black voter turnout was only 54 per cent of those registered, Democratic Presidential candidate Senator George McGovern won 87 per cent of that vote, according to the Joint Center for Political Studies, a Washington-based research and information organization which concentrates on black politics.

Perhaps the most significant display of the increasing black political sophistication and power was shown in the way traditionally straight Democratic ticket-voting blacks in Mayor Daley's Chicago, went to the polls in droves to crushingly defeat Edward V. Hanrahan, Democratic candidate for states attorney.

Hanrahan is infamous in black communities all over the nation for his role in the savage police murders of Black Panthers Fred Hampton and Mark Clark in 1969.

on the aircraft carrier **Kitty Hawk** and other warships and a sitdown strike of 130 men aboard the aircraft carrier **Constellation**. The incident aboard the **Kitty Hawk** occurred as the ship was returning to its duty station off Vietnam. The **Constellation** was forced to return to San Diego, interrupting a training mission to put ashore the men striking against discrimination in their job assignments.

Secretary Warner said the

Navy's reaction to the incidents is a "pincers movement."

"We're going to get tougher with those who violate military discipline, and simultaneously we're going to get tougher with those who have failed to heed departmental policy," he said.

Zumwalt acknowledged that naval commanders have ignored scores of directives designed to assure equal opportunity for all Navy personnel at sea and on shore.

Commanders, he said, have failed to carry out the two-year-old equal opportunity program "with a whole heart."

"We have some flag officers; we have some captains; we have some commanding officers of all ranks; who have some NCOs who are still unaware of the extent to which they are prejudiced and, we have at all levels some who are extremely aware," he said.

Zumwalt said the Navy's situation today is more difficult than that of the other services. Part of the reason, he said, is that "we started out with the smallest number of minority personnel and have had to move quickly to change the situation."

One in eight Navy recruits this year is black and one in 14 men in the Navy is black. But only nine of every 1,000 Navy officers is black. Only 5 per cent of Navy petty officers is black, although blacks constitute 6.8 per cent of enlisted men, and there are very few black chief petty officers.

Zumwalt said officers will be

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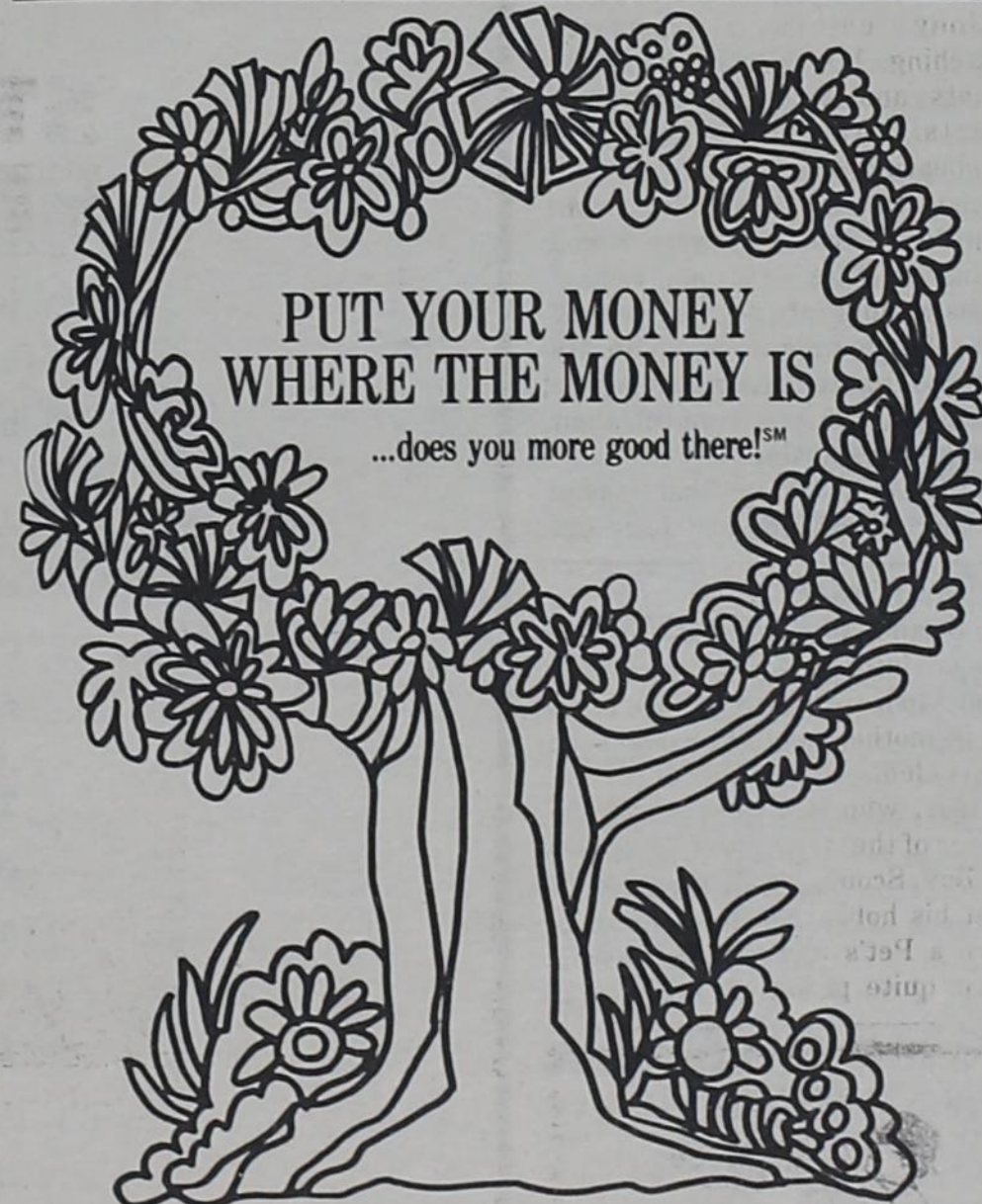

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St. Louis Will Close all Public Housing Soon

St. Louis, Mo.-(NBNS)-The St. Louis Public Housing Authority is closing all the city's conventional public housing next year, which will probably put 25,000 poor people on the streets without homes.

The action—unanimously adopted by the five-member board—comes in the wake of increased financial crisis facing dozens of public housing authorities throughout the country because a huge HUD subsidy is bottled up in the Office of Management and Budget.

"This is not a threat," one commissioner said, "we simply don't have the money to go on operating." Officials said it was the first time such a decision had been reached by a local authority.

St. Louis is expected to be one of 3,000 cities sharing in a \$100 million operating subsidy which has been held up by the OMB for some time, according to federal Housing and Urban Development officials.

"We certainly intend to get those funds to the local authorities as soon as possible," said Norman Watson, assistant secretary for housing management of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

"Until the amount is known by the St. Louis authority, I feel they should delay their decision," Watson said.

But the authority pointed to \$1.6 million that has already been promised to the city, yet they say that even with it, all nine conventional public housing projects will have to be closed by May 1, 1973.

Frank Boykin, chairman of the Board of Commissioners, doubted that any additional money from the \$100 million would be enough to forestall the action.

The authority said if felt duty-bound to begin drawing up plans to relocate as many tenants as possible and give them at least 90 days notice before forcing them out of their homes.

In 1969, it was a nine-month public housing strike here that led to the adoption of the concept of operating subsidies for local housing authorities.

Many tenants, at that time complained that they were forced to put as much as 70 per cent of their incomes into rent payments.

The agreement was finally reached that tenants would pay no more than 25 per cent of their income for housing.

"The only thing that saved public housing, not just here but

across the country, from going the route of Pruitt-Igoe, the notorious St. Louis highrise project was the St. Louis rent strike and the arrival of the concept of public housing subsidies," said an assistant to the mayor of St. Louis.

The Office of Management and Budget is formulating guidelines for distribution of federal subsidies for the cities but they apparently are looking to the already-broke cities to bear more of the burden of supporting public housing.

Corps taught me. Not many 21-year-old blacks get a chance to go to the Olympics. I have even sparred with Mohammed Ali. He is the greatest.

Jones' main goal is to become a world champion and then retire. If, upon taking up the fight game as a professional, he sees he can't make it to the top, Jones plans to quit and go to college.

But right now, all he has on his mind is the fight in Las Vegas with the Russian. It should be one of the most widely watched amateur bouts in history.

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
