Step Made for Drive in Liquor

FOR FLOW ACROSS CANADIAN BORDER IS OBJECTIVE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 12.—The department of justice has today taken a step into the liquor traffic by announcing its campaign to stop the flow of liquor from the Canadian border to the city of Detroit.

The department is waiting for congressional action to unify prohibition enforcement efforts, which will require many provisions. Attorney General Cummings called John R. Watkins, United States attorney at Detroit, to Washington to devise a plan whereby his department would cooperate to best advantage with the treasury already operating the smuggling area. Watkins lies between Lakes Erie and Ontario, and the attorney announced his intention to give the treasury the support at his command to prevent further whole-sale of the American and liquor laws.

HUNDRED MORE ORDERED OUT

DETROIT, June 12 (P).—Two hundred additional agents reinforced prohibition and customs in the Detroit area today. Agents were transferred to every part of the States. More than 80 men arrived yesterday to help their posts with the border patrol and the Detroit office is expected to reveal the extent of agents to be moved.

US WORK IS PLANNED

LOUISIANA CITIZENS SEEK TO REMOVE SCANDAL STENCH FROM STATE AFFAIRS

NEW ORLEANS, June 12.—John M. Parker, former governor of Louisiana, called back upon the political horizon from retirement by opposition to the administration of Gov. Huey P. Long, set about today to reorganize the state and "lift the citizenry out of political disgrace."

As president of the constitutional league of Louisiana, organized in New Orleans yesterday by citizens from various sections of the state, Mr. Parker issued a public statement rebuking the official acts of Governor Long and outlining the purposes of the league.

CALLERS 'DROP IN' HOUSE

SEAGRIT, N. J., June 12 (P).—A gaping hole yawned in the ceiling of Governor Morgan F. Larson's sleeping room today where three callers in an airplane literally dropped in.

A biplane, piloted by William Taft and carrying as passengers Olive Jeannine and Roger J. Ryan, all of Red Bank, N. J., landed yesterday on the parade ground in front of the "little White House." Governor Larson's summer home at Camp Larson.

After conversing a few minutes with Mrs. Thomas Hanson, wife of the governor's secretary, Taft took off again. The plane struck a flagpole on the parade ground, tearing off a wing then dived through the roof of the cottage, coming to rest in the ceiling of the governor's room. None of the occupants of the plane was seriously hurt.

AMARILLO COURT TURN DOWN PLEA; GOES TO AUSTIN

The court of civil appeals at Amarillo overruled today the motion for rehearing in the case of M. C. Overton vs. A. W. Jackson and J. B. Massey, injunction suit seeking to prevent defendants from erecting business structures at corner of Broadway and Avenue Q.

The motion for new hearing following a reversal May 15 of Judge Clark M. Mullican's decision here about two months ago, in which the judge of the 90th district court granted the injunction to prevent construction of buildings on the site. Vickers & Campbell, legal counsel for the defendants, following Judge Mullican's decision, appealed the case.

Bonds To Be Voted
BEAUMONT, June 12 (P).—One of the last steps before actual construction of the intra-coastal canal in Jefferson county can get under way will be taken Saturday when the county votes on a bond issue for \$150,000 to provide for a bridge across Taylor's bayou, which will be crossed by the canal, and to provide abstracts and titles for the right-of-way.

Liquor Bill Is Voted Favorably

AUSTIN, June 12 (P).—The house committee on liquor traffic today acted favorably on the King-Graves bill making it unlawful for a physician to prescribe ethyl alcohol or any liquor with alcohol content.

At the suggestion of the authors, the measure was amended in the committee room to provide a penalty of not less than \$50 or more than \$500. It originally would have imposed a penitentiary sentence up to a maximum of five years.

Oil Report Given
AUSTIN, June 12 (P).—There were 435 producing oil and gas wells brought in in Texas during May, according to records of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission. Three hundred and four dry holes were encountered. Fifty-two of the producers were gasers. There were 851 permits to drill issued.

PETITIONS OUT ON NEW SCHOOL HERE

BOARD APPROVES MOVE FOR \$650,000 BOND ISSUE PLANS

Six petitions are being circulated in this city today asking the school board to call an election for the purpose of voting a bond issue of \$650,000 for the erection of a new high school building, following action of the board of trustees of Lubbock Independent School district at a meeting last night.

The petitions will likely be presented back to the trustees Thursday, and immediate action will probably follow.

An election following the preliminary measures, will probably be called for the middle of July.

Dated January 1
Should the bond election be called and voted the bonds would be dated January 1, 1930, and it is estimated that a 15 cent tax rate, based on the present valuation, would mature the bonds in 40 years. The first payment would be made in 1931, but before that time, in all probability, a less tax would mature them in the fall of the coming school year. WIND CAUSES MUCH DAMAGE

RANKIN HIT BY STORM LATE TUESDAY; LOSS IS \$60,000

(By Associated Press)
RANKIN, June 12.—Residents of Rankin awoke today to a severe wind storm that struck their city late yesterday, damaging homes, buildings, and crops and disrupting water and power service.

The storm, lasting 30 minutes, swept residences from their foundations, ripped away roofs and damaged business buildings. Several dwellings were destroyed.

High School Damaged
The roof of the new high school building was blown to the ground and one wall damaged. The damage to the structure was estimated at \$60,000. The roof of the Harland hotel, a three-story brick structure, also was blown off.

The water tower that served the city was blown down, as were power lines of the West Texas utilities company, which menaced ground traffic for several hours.

Hall added to the damage done by the wind to crops and poultry. First estimates placed the loss between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

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DAIRY COWS IN LEAD IN HALE

(Special To The Journal)
PLAINVIEW, June 12.—There are more dairy cows than people in Hale county according to an estimate made recently by County Agent R. M. Milhollin. Milhollin estimates there are 25,000 dairy cattle in Hale county. Recent estimates of Hale county's population based on scholastic enrollments and other indices are that there are about 22,750 people in the county.

Milk products manufacturers figure that it takes one cow to supply every five people with their actual needs in every locality. Taking that as a basis and figuring that Hale county has 12,500 of the 25,000 dairy cattle are producing milk all the time, there is a surplus of milk from 8,500 that can be turned to manufacturing plants of one kind and another such as creameries, milk plants, cheese plants and the like.

MERRIMAN TO PAY PENALTY COURT RULES

DEATH SENTENCE FOR DALLAS MAN IS AFFIRMED

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, June 12.—The death sentence given Lee Roy Merriman by a Dallas county jury for criminal assault was affirmed by the court of criminal appeals today.

The crime for which Merriman was convicted was committed on December 2. Another man and Merriman attacked two girls after they had taken three girls from their escorts.

Willie Grady, Hunt county, under death sentence for criminal assault, lost his application for rehearing. The 25-year sentence for robbery against W. R. Armstrong, Dallas, was affirmed. He was charged with the holdup of J. L. Corcoran.

The court affirmed three and reversed and remanded three long-time murder convictions.

Edwards, Lander, negro, who claimed he was watching a movie at the time he is charged with having murdered Joe Piccola, white groceryman, here in February, continued today.

Landers yesterday testified he was beaten by officers when they obtained a signed confession from him, and that the yield him the confession would obtain his freedom when presented to the grand jury. He said he could not read.

Union Man Charged

"MISS UNIVERSE" TITLE IS TAKEN TO FOREIGN COUNTRY; AUSTRIAN WINNER

GALVESTON, June 12.—Miss Laila Goldarbeiter of Vienna, Austria, beauty barely out of her teens, today won the crown of Miss Universe. She was the first foreign girl ever to gain the highest recognition in the international pageant of pulchritude.

The delicate charm of the Austrian brunette rather than any dearth of loveliness in North America accounted for the United States cologne being lowered last night for the first time since the event was made international in 1926.

The defeat was softened by the selection of seven United States beauties to the nine other positions. Miss United States, Irene Ahlberg of New York, a blonde, was an easy winner for the runner-up place.

WILSON ASKS FARM RELIEF ACTION HERE

URGES ROTARIANS TO GET BEHIND LAGGING SENATORS

Supporting the farm relief program as advanced by President Herbert Hoover and urging his listeners to write or wire their senators in an effort to break the deadlock over the export debenture rider on the national farm relief bill, Hon. James C. Wilson, Ft. Worth, United States judge, Northern District of Texas, was the principal speaker before the Lubbock Rotary club at noon today.

Showing a broad knowledge of agricultural conditions in the country at large, Judge Wilson, himself a democrat and a campaign opponent of President Hoover, went on record as supporting the president wholly in his farm relief proposals. Judge Wilson referred to agriculture as a paralyzed industry and, describing the South Plains and Panhandle as the greatest farm belt in America, and declared political parties when they interfere with the advancement of the country as a whole.

Owens Farm Himself
The owner of a number of farms himself and for years a student of agricultural conditions, Judge Wilson told of visits to practically every great agricultural state, including a visit to look into organized marketing California, and said Lubbock has the future of Omaha if you people will just support agriculture like you should."

He said the people as a whole stood with President Hoover in his efforts to relieve the farmer and took the stand that he 34 democratic senators and 14 reactionary republican senators, led by Senator William E. Borah of Idaho, had erred when they voted the export

MEXICO CITY, June 12 (P).—Striking students of the Mexican National University were in complete control today of the main building of the university, with the determination, they said, of remaining there until their demands were met. Police did not molest them.

Soldiers Ambushed
RABAT, Morocco, June 12 (P).—Thirteen French soldiers were killed and ten wounded, including two officers, in an ambush of French native troops by dissident tribesmen at the foot of the Atlas mountains.

The fate of 15 Frenchmen and 85 Naive Auxiliaries who were caught in the ambush and unable to fall back with the rest of the French force to the base at Ait Yakoub was unknown. Reinforcements have been dispatched to the area with retributive measures not unlikely.

Organist Suicides
NEW YORK, June 12 (P).—Miss Helen Meyer, 24, who for months had watched with anxiety the progress of synchronized sound pictures that eliminate theater orchestras and organists, and who had finally lost her job last Sunday when Lowe's New York theater released its musicians in favor of the new device, committed suicide in leaping from the window of her room on the twelfth floor of a hotel just west of the gay white way.

The plane was owned by Byers, and he was starting on a short flight with Davis at the controls when the crash came. Davis suffered internal injuries and severe bruises. Both were licensed pilots.

IOWAN CALLS FOR ACTION ON MEASURE

"PROGRESSIVE GROUP" IS WANTED FOR FARM BILL

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 12.—Selection of a "Progressive" candidate for president and the formation of an active progressive party was advocated in the Senate today by Smith W. Brookhart of Iowa, who stumped the west for Herbert Hoover, unless the export debenture proposition was approved by the administration as either a part of the pending farm relief or tariff bills.

The suggestion that the debenture plan ultimately might be attached to the tariff measure has been advanced by a number of other senators and is known to have considerable sympathy among house democratic leaders.

The Iowan declared he now desired to say to "progressive" members of the senate-on-behalf side that if the proposition was rejected the time "has come to organize for a fight to the finish."

"If the debenture," he added, "in ten form I have here suggested, or in its present form, cannot be put into the farm bill, I think the bill

BANKERS AID FARMING WORK

PLAINVIEW MEN ASK FOR WELL-BALANCED PROGRAMS

(Special to The Journal)
PLAINVIEW, June 12.—The three banks of Plainview are joining in a campaign of advertising to the farmers appealing for a maintenance of the present well balanced farming program that has characterized Hale county and this part of the Plains for the past few years, and caused it to be referred to by a prominent official of the United States Department of Agriculture as the best balanced farming section in the United States.

This time the appeal from the bankers is to plant the regular acreage of cotton. While a little late to plant cotton because of the late rains over this section the bankers contend that with the floods over the South cotton should bring a good price this fall, and South Plains farmers are in better position to raise it than any other farmers in the country.

Produces Much Cotton
Hale county for many years has been a heavy producer of cotton contrary to the general opinion that no cotton is raised north of the Lubbock and Crosby county north line in the Panhandle-Plains section. With the mechanical harvesting of cotton by means of the cotton pick which was first practiced in Hale county near Plainview this country has been proven as the cheapest cotton raising section in the country, that is that cotton can be produced cheaper than anywhere else. In 1928 Hale county produced fifty-five thousand bales of cotton, in 1929 the production was around thirty thousand bales.

Hale county's well balanced farming program consists of about one-third the cultivated land in cotton, one-third in feed, and one-third in wheat. With the growth of dairying lately the farming situation has been further stabilized and in addition to being the best balanced farming county Hale county has earned the reputation of being the leading county in Texas in dairying.

Prefer Separate Action
The debutante rider has no business on the farm relief bill, the judge said, "and could better be taken care of with the tariff bill or separately. The senators who voted it onto the farm relief bill did so without excuse."

The judge's talk was the first one heard in Lubbock bearing upon the important question of farm relief and was expressed in words easily understood by persons not in close touch with the situation.

Von Struve Talks
H. C. Von Struve, of Abernathy, native Texan and at present a United States consul to Göteborg, Sweden, who is vacationing in this country, made a few remarks based upon the international side of the Rotary. Prior to the speech by Judge Wilson and just concluding the program, vocal selections were rendered by Mrs. R. L. McKnight, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Blocker and Edgar Immon. Singing first as a quartet, then the singers pleased their listeners, following which Mrs. McKnight and Mr. Blocker sang a duet which was also well received.

should be permitted to pass without it."

The Iowa took the floor shortly after the debate convened at noon and at about the hour that the farm relief bill formally was returned to the house as a result of the senate's refusal to approve the measure with the debenture eliminated. The representatives officially were advised that the senate had voted 46 to 43 to insist upon incorporation of the proposition. In the house the measure was placed on the speaker's table to await action, probably tomorrow.

Plays Administration
Brookhart ripped into the administration forces as soon as the senate met and insisted the time had arrived for a fight to the finish on the debenture plan.

"In order to make sure that this is possible," he said, "we should at once organize to put up a progressive candidate in every congressional district and for Senator in every state, who will fight for this program. And if the bill should be vetoed we should follow this with a progressive candidate for president."

Brookhart's suggestion of a third party was met with criticism. He had criticized the statement of President Hoover which described the debenture plan as a "subsidy" which would aid speculators and ruin the farmer.

Suggested Certificates
The speaker suggested the debenture certificates might be given to stabilization concerns and in that way speculators would never get their hands on them.

"If there were nothing to hope from this farm bill by the present provisions, I would vote against it," Brookhart added. "But I believe we will be able to put the debenture into the tariff bill."

Continuing, Brookhart said the president was in "very great error" when he pronounced this bill recommended by the conference report to be the "most important agency ever set up in the government to assist an industry."

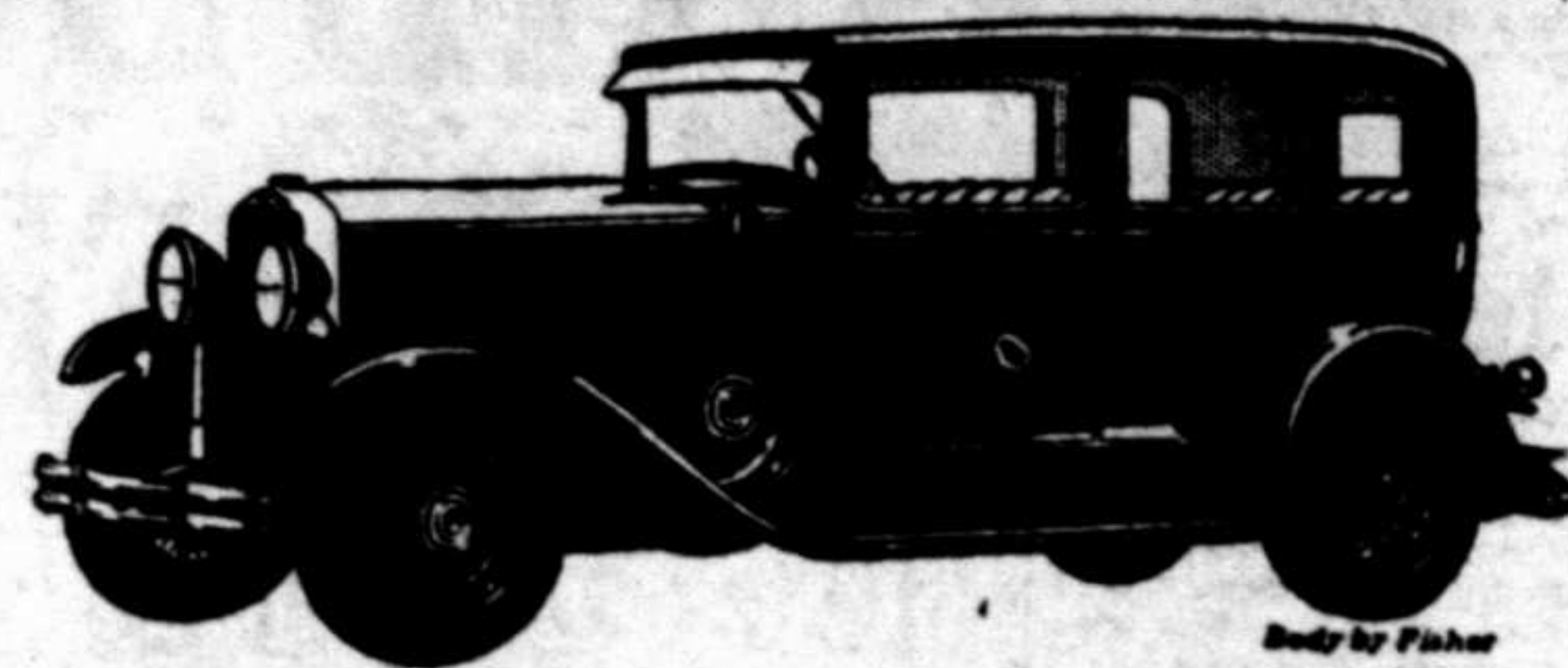

HOOPER GIVES STATEMENT ON FARM RELIEF

PRESIDENT SAYS WORK DELAYED BY ACTION OF SENATE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 12.—President Hoover late Tuesday issued a formal statement asserting that today's vote in the senate add further delay to farm relief and may gravely jeopardize the enactment of agricultural legislation.

Expressing his opposition to the Senate's debenture plan Mr. Hoover stated that "it will not bring relief but will bring further disaster to agriculture."

He added that "immediate profits to some speculators and disaster to farmers" would follow the enactment of this farm relief plan.

Practically Federal Board... chief executive declared that the Senate had in effect rejected the bill which provides for the creation of the most important agency ever set up in the government to assist an industry—the Federal board, endowed with extraordinary authority to regulate the marketing system in the interest of the farmer; to stabilize the industry and to carry out the arrangements in conjunction with the compromise bill, the president stated in every particular the plan advanced by the republican party in the recent presidential campaign.

Other plan of agricultural relief rejected in that campaign was one of the most important issues in the principal agricultural states and was given as a mandate by an impressive majority of these states, the president said.

FAMED MARRIAGE TO END ON ROCKS

LEONARD KIP RHINELANDER SEEKS DIVORCE FROM DAUGHTER OF NEGRO HACK DRIVER

LOS VEGAS, Nev., June 12.—Harley Harmon, attorney for Leonard Kip Rhinelander, disinherited son of a well-known New York family, disclosed today he had prepared a divorce complaint which young Rhinelander plans to file against Alice Jones Rhinelander, daughter of a New Rochelle, N. Y., negro, within the next two weeks.

Harmon, district attorney here, said Rhinelander had lived in Las Vegas and at a nearby mountain resort since January 1 under an assumed name. He had successfully hidden his identity by a moustache and a gain of 21 pounds in weight since coming to Nevada.

Admitted Name
Rhinelander reluctantly admitted his true name when confronted with news service pictures of himself. He explained that he had sought to avoid publicity while establishing the six months' residence necessary to

file a divorce action in this state. Cruelly, based upon the "humiliation my wife has caused me by her actions," Harmon stated, would be the basis of the divorce complaint, which will be filed in the Las Vegas district court.

Separation Forced
The disclosure of Rhinelander's marriage several years ago to the daughter of a New Rochelle hack driver was followed by their enforced separation by his socially prominent family. A subsequent suit for the annulment of the marriage, which took place before Rhinelander was of legal age, was denied, and the young couple permanently separated.

Last March the proposed filing of a separation suit by Mrs. Rhinelander in New York was indefinitely postponed as the announced result of Rhinelander increasing her separate maintenance allowance to \$400 monthly.

Pasteurized Milk Is Sanitary Product

Pasteurized milk handled by Bell Ice Cream company, of Lubbock, is not touched by the human hand, a demonstration at the local plant reveals.

Within one hour after milking, the milk, which is Grade A, as classified by the city, state and federal health authorities, is placed in the pasteurizer at the Bell Ice Cream company plant. The milk is heated to 142 degrees, which kills injurious bacteria, but does not effect food values.

Immediately after heating, the milk is cooled to 42 degrees and is then bottled without being touched by hands. After bottling, pasteurized milk is delivered to customers within 12 hours.

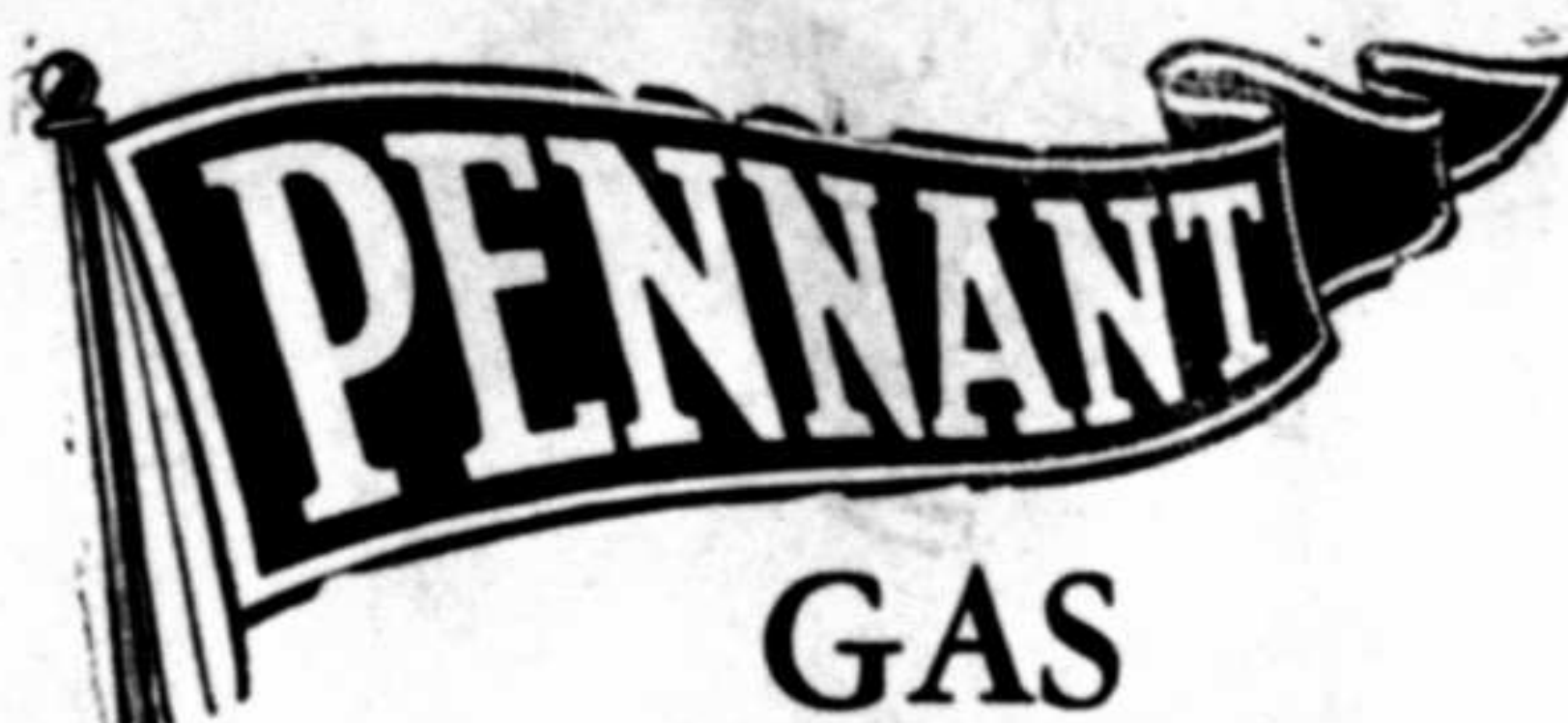

WOMEN COURT SUCCESS ON JUDICIAL BENCH

NEW YORK, June 12.—In the midst of a national discussion of what-to-be-done about the handicap that middle age puts on working women, one-occupation stands out in its unique preference for women over 40.

This is the judgeship. New York's second woman magistrate, Judge Jennette B. Brill, now takes her seat upon the bench. She is 41. This is not mere chance. It is precedent.

Many states in the union cannot legally name a woman judge until she has passed 40, according to "The Standard Juvenile Court Law" which the National Probation Association has just issued. Indiana, Louisiana and Georgia are among these states. Judge Florence Allen of the Ohio Supreme Court, Judge Jean Norris of New York, Judge Mary M. Bartelme of Chicago and practically all other eminent women judges in this country are in those "stirring, thriving middle years."

The significance of it. Of course one might say that this occupation, being so highly technical and requiring so much training, is a mere drop in the bucket and a small argument, indeed in favor of the usefulness of women over 40. But it is significant for several reasons.

First, no women in any profession win quite the influence nor the public respect for their success that judges do. It is a strong entering wedge for the genuine usefulness of the trained mind and experience that only years of work can give a woman.

Second, the occupation of judgeship for women has grown so tremendously in the past three decades, that it offers enormous future opportunities to the women of tomorrow.

Thirty years ago the first woman judge of a juvenile court, Judge Mary Bartelme of Chicago, took her seat upon the bench. Today this fine dean of women judges sees dozens of her sister women entering her field, and incidentally, Judge Bartelme receives a salary many men might envy—\$15,000 yearly.

Three Fields Are Open. There are three distinct vocations in the field of courts that are open for women today. First, there are the judgeships, either juvenile or as magistrates; second, probation officers; third, women referees.

Four of the largest juvenile courts in America are manned by women and dozens of small towns such as Pittsburgh, N. Y., and Boyce, Va., have women judges.

Three women youth of the Madison-Dixon line have shown the South how fair feminine judgment can be. Judge Camille Kelley, who presides over the Juvenile Court of Memphis, Tenn., had the distinction of being the first woman judge in the South, when she was appointed eight years ago. Mrs. Edith M. Atkinson is a judge in Miami, Fla., and Judge Kathryn Sellers presides over court in Washington, D. C.

In many places where there are men judges, women referees serve as their assistants or associates. Court, far-distant juvenile judges appoint women referees to hear all delinquent correctional cases. It is found that girls talk more easily to a woman. Notable women referees in the country are Dr. Miriam Van Waters of the Juvenile Court of Los Angeles, and Miss Mary E. McClintock of the Court of Domestic Relations in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Women started in court careers through probation work. Not many years ago anyone suggesting women magistrates of higher or criminal courts would have been scoffed at. Today, however, there are several making eminent successes for themselves and more opportunities for other women by their example.

Judge Jean Norris of New York has rotated between the Domestic Relations and Women's Courts in America's biggest city since her appointment in 1920. Judge Brill, who will serve out the unexpired portion of the term of Louis H. Reynolds, has served as Deputy Attorney under the former Attorney General, Carl Sherman, and will sit in the New York Magistrates Court. Her salary, by the way, is \$12,000 yearly.

Unusual Judicial Record. Judge Georgia Bullock of the Woman's Court of Los Angeles, handed down more than 2000 decisions.

Many different paths to power in their law field were followed by these judges. Some were school teachers, nurses, settlement workers, editors, before taking up law. Others have wanted from their youth to be lawyers and have spent years in the profession.

Considering the millions of women in industry today these may be a small percentage. But it is hopeful that in at least one important field of activity age is an asset rather than an insurmountable barrier to success.

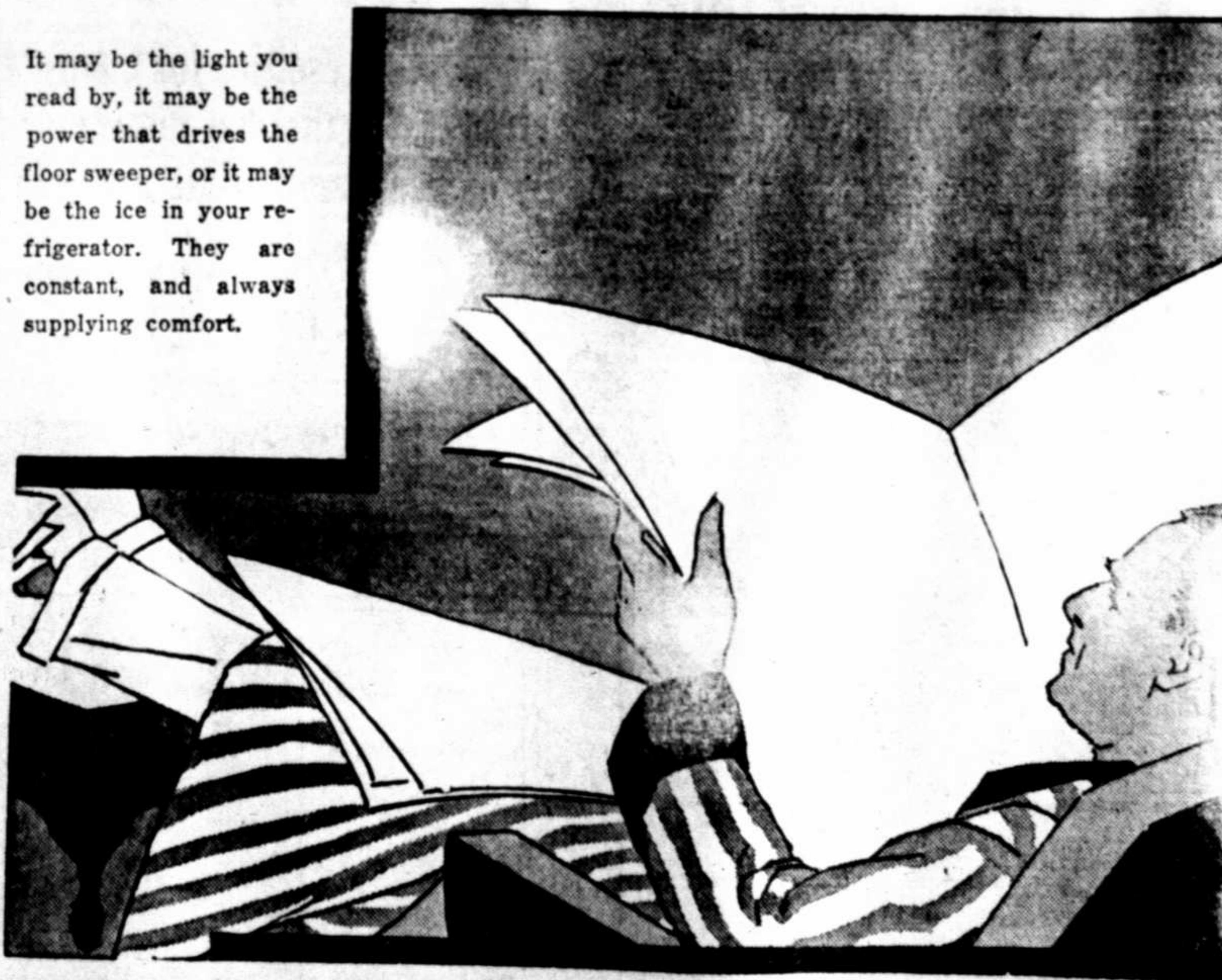

With deep amusement and tenderness Nan saw that Curtis obeyed the 10-year-old son of the cook unquestioningly, eagerly.

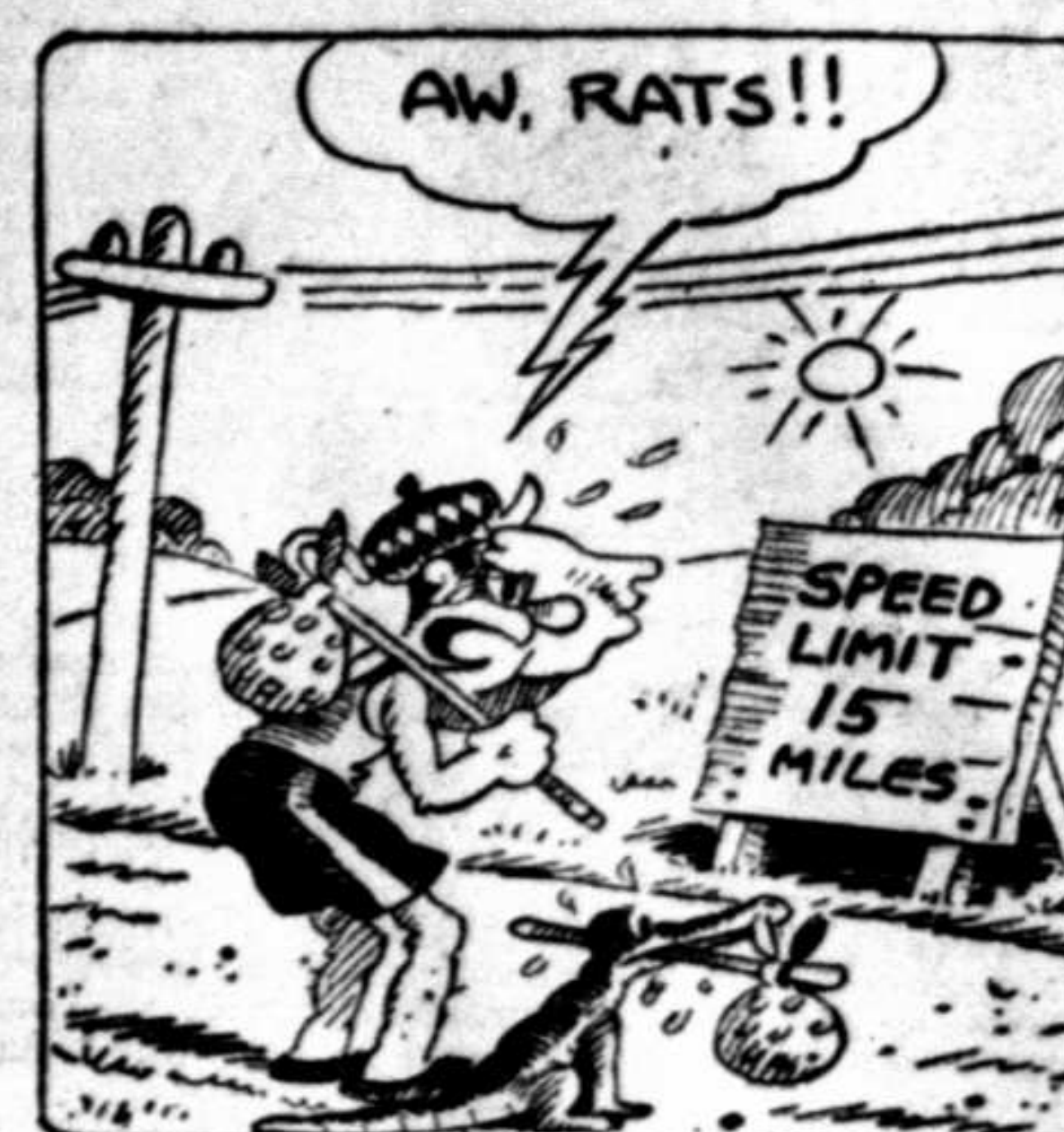

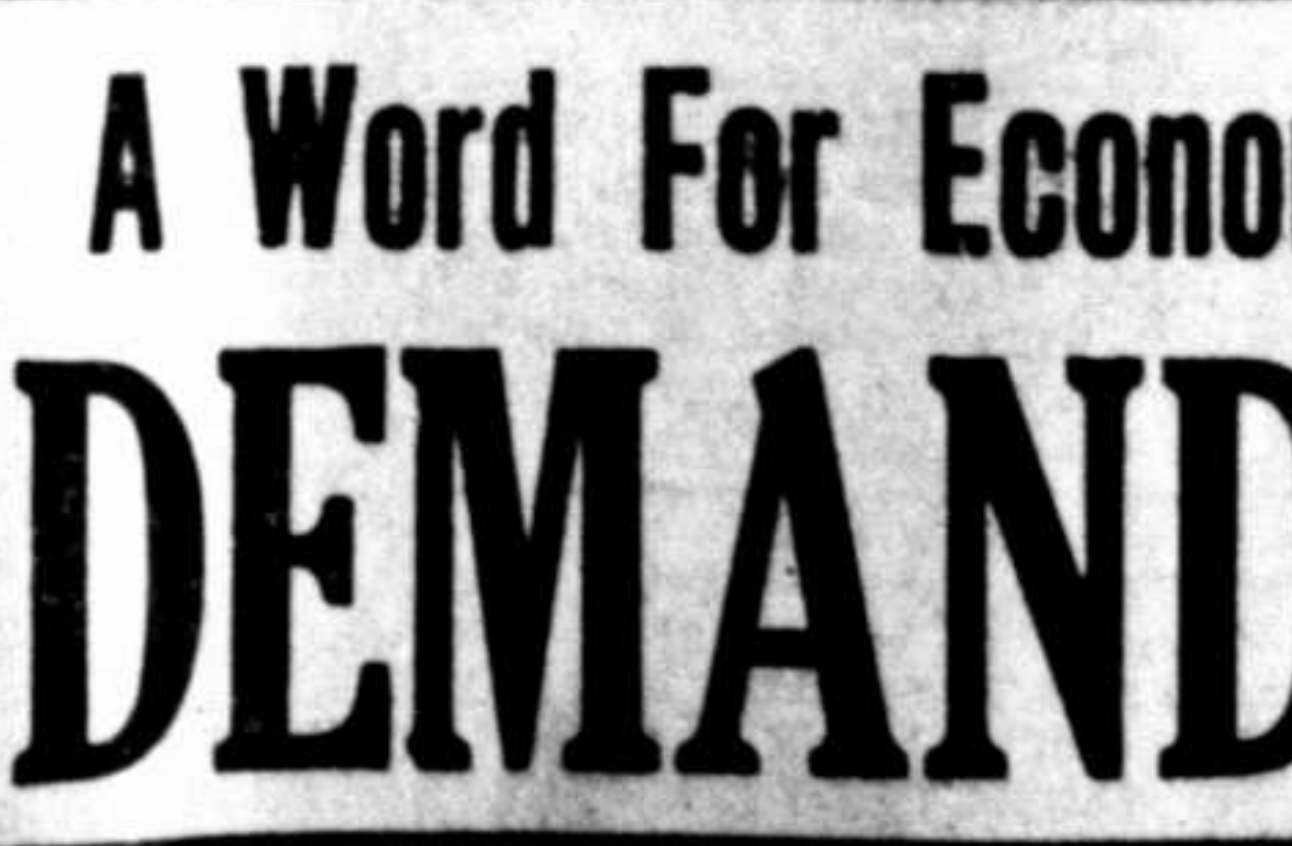
