Sunday, June 16 Is Father's Day

When the family gathers around the head of the house Sunday, June 16, they'll pay tribute to an unsung hero whose special day of joy grew out of a tragedy.

When his wife died in 1898, the burden of rearing six children fell upon William Smart of Spokane, Wash. The pioneer father endured many hardships in order to keep his little brood together. And one of his daughters, Mrs. John Bruce Dodd, nee Sonora Louise Smart, never forgot the devoted care of her parents.

Inspired by love and sacrifice of her dad, she proposed a special day honoring fathers. The Ministers Alliance and the YMCA took up her idea but it wasn't until 1910 that the first Father's Day was observed in Spokane. On third Sunday in June that year a small band of women met in a church for songs and verbal tribute to fathers.

Celebration of the unpretentious local holiday began to spread, and today, Father's Day is observed from coast to coast and in other countries. Mrs. Dodd's goal to have "fatherhood" revered as greatly as "motherhood," seems to have been achieved.

Near the outskirts of the city of Spokane, a small monument stands as a tribute to Wm. J. Smart, the devoted father, who was the inspiration for the day of thanks to America's fathers.

Rural Traffic Deaths Increase

Rural traffic deaths in the Tyler District, Texas Highway Patrol, increased sharply the first five months of 1963 over the same five months a year ago, Captain Glen Warner, District Commander reported today.

There were 57 rural traffic deaths in the 18-county district during the first five months of 1963, compared to 41 for the same five months in 1962, Captain Warner's report showed.

Franklin County had eight traffic deaths.

Other counties in the district are Bowie, Cass, Camp, Gregg, Harrison, Panola, Hopkins, Marion, Red River, Titus, Rush and Upshur.

In Titus County the Texas Highway Patrol investigated a total of 33 rural traffic accidents. Of these 33 accidents one caused one death, 10 caused injuries to 14 persons, and 22 of the accidents caused property damage only. The estimated economic loss resulting from the accidents was \$12,994.

Austin. — Texas Research League, a nonprofit government study organization that does many administration studies at the request of the state, has issued a report on its year-long probe of the Railroad Commission. Many of its recommendations on agency management and oil and gas conservation already are being programmed.

One scheduled change involves the staffing and management of Railroad Commission district offices. Commission now has 12 such offices. Responsibilities with respect to wells and staff members are so varied that the League believes the system unfairly imbalanced.

District 8 in Midland, for example, has approximately four times as many wells as District 4 in Corpus Christi, but each office is staffed with only four engineers. Wichita Falls has more than twice as many wells as Houston, but two less field men.

Four field men watch over 62,148 operating wells in the Midland district, yet 21 men oversee 26,036 wells in the Kilgore area.

League's answer to the problem is to redistrict and cut the districts from 12 to 10.

The huge Midland district would be divided into three areas with new offices at Lubbock and Fort Stockton.

San Angelo, Refugio, Mt. Pleasant and Palestine offices would be absorbed by other districts under the new operation plan.

COMMITTEE OF 25 AT WORK — Gov. John B. Connally entertained his "Committee of 25" with a coffee, then set them to work. Committee has the year-long task of studying education beyond the high school.

Connally told them Texas needs a "total policy to guide all institutions, all segments of our higher education enterprise." He said this included state, church and private schools, junior and senior colleges and academic and technical institutions.

Committee met and decided to send their chairman, H. B. Zachry of San Antonio, suggestions on how to approach the challenge. They meet again in August.

SPECIAL SESSION TALK DWINDLES — Rumors of a special session to get an appropriations bill more to Governor Connally's liking still are going around. But now predictions are being made about a January session, rather than one in the summer or fall.

Connally said he didn't like the one passed by the Legislature in the regular session because it "short-changed" higher education.

HOME-BUILDING ABUSES — Reported abuses of home building practices and loans were the subject of a recent conversation between Governor Connally and Lubbock District Attorney Alton Griffin, president of the state district and county attorneys association.

Connally said, "It may be that additional legislation will be necessary to get at the heart of the matter."

One reported abuse that concerns them is the alleged practice of "double contracting" wherein 100 per cent home financing is achieved by cushioning appraisals and other real estate sales documents.

APPOINTMENTS — Connally appointed three new members to the State Finance Commission, including S. R. Jones Jr., president of the First Pasadena State Bank in Pasadena, and Rex Baker Jr., president of Southwestern Savings Association of Houston. He also reappointed Taylor attorney Roman J. Bartosh.

Bert Fields, Dallas oil operator, was reappointed and named chairman of the Texas Turnpike Authority, on which he has served since 1953. A new appointee is J. M. Hagger Jr. of Dallas, vice-president of the company that manufactures Hagger slacks for men. Hagger replaced Armistead Rust of San Angelo.

CARR'S CHORES LIGHTENED — After August 23, the governor will have to make 15 more state board appointments. These 15 citizens named will take the place of just one man—Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Switch was made possible by a bill, supported by the attorney general, which passed during the recent legislative session. End result will be to peel down the pile of "ex officio" jobs, which have burdened attorneys general in the past, and give Carr more time for his main job as the state's head lawyer.

GOOD NEWS — Although state and federal animal health officials

reported that 72 Texas counties are now tagged "screwworm infested" the report was good news, said Dr. R. G. Garrett, executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Garrett said that 333 samples confirmed as screwworms in the March 31-April 27 period represented a decrease of 95 to 98 per cent in the number of cases in years before the screwworm eradication project went into effect.

"We're real happy with the success of the program," Dr. Garrett said. "We hope to be completely successful in wiping out the screwworm by the end of the three-year program." He said livestock producers were responsible for the stamping out of the costly pest in at least two ways: Through their \$3,000,000 contributions and through "excellent" cooperation in reporting cases and sending samples.

"It's strictly a producers' program... initiated by livestock producers and wholeheartedly supported by producers."

The three-year, \$12,000,000 producer-federal-state program almost has reached the mid-way point in its progress.

BUS DRIVER OF THE YEAR — Records of more than 8,000 school bus drivers were screened before Elmer J. Ashby of the Carlisle Independent School District, Rusk County, was selected "Texas Public School Bus Driver of the Year" by the Texas Education Agency.

In 25 years of service, Ashby transported school children 300,000 accident-free miles, without missing a day for personal or superficial reasons.

'STATES RIGHTS' BILLS IN AIR — The 85th Legislature passed two proposed 'states rights' amendments to the U. S. Constitution. But both are a long way from changing the law of the land.

One would make it simple for the states to initiate other amendments to the constitution; the other would prevent federal courts from ruling on states redistricting as population shifts occur.

To make the grade, both would have to be adopted by 34 states. So far, only 11 have approved the first proposal, and 12 have affirmed the second.

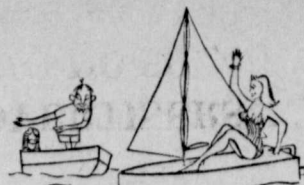

Knowing the rules of the road is vital for safe and competent small boat handling. Since they are based on common sense, these rules are easy to learn and remember. Mercury boating authorities say the following are among the most important: keep to the right in narrow channels and when meeting another craft head on. And "commit" yourself early by turning off a collision course when there is still considerable distance between your boat and an oncoming one. Give way to any boat approaching in your danger zone—your right-hand side from dead ahead to slightly more than a right angle. Sailboats have right away over powerboats. Craft being overtaken and boats leaving docks also have the right of way. Observing these rules will enable you to meet any water-borne traffic situation with confidence.

Alcorn Comes Out Against Standard Work Week for Farmers of Country

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur discusses work this week, a subject he doesn't mind talking about, if you follow us.

Dear editor: I was looking through a farm magazine the other night and ran across a letter by a farmer with a curious problem.

He wanted to know why farmers can't have a standard work-week like city people. "Why can't we have a standard," he asked, "so when we quit work at 6 we won't feel we're loafing."

This question brings up so many answers I hardly know where to start attacking it.

In the first place, I've never had any trouble knowing when to stop working. I've sometimes had trouble knowing when to start, but never when to stop.

Maybe city people have to be told when they're tired, but I've never had that shortcoming.

This farmer went on to say he'd like to know what work hours other farmers put in around the U. S., on the grounds a uniform standard could be established and a man could get off his tractor at a certain time each day without feeling sheepish about it.

A man who has to watch his

neighbor to know when to stop plowing is in the wrong business. On the other hand, any neighbor who watches me to learn when to start, will go broke.

But this idea of a standard work week for farmers worries me. You let somebody in Washington hear about it, and it won't be long before he'll come out with some new legislation called an Hour-Control Program, with government checks cut if you go over or under it.

A farmer's day begins when he wakes up and ends when he goes to sleep, and what he does during these hours is his own business, provided the support price is satisfactory. And any farmer who can't figure out how to spend those hours, without looking over the fence to make sure he doesn't work longer or shorter than his neighbor, ought to move to town and get a job where somebody can make these decisions for him.

I don't want anybody telling me how many or how few hours I can work a week. This is a matter I can decide for myself, even if it takes me the first five days to decide what I plan to do the last two.

Get Refund Federal Gas Tax Form

Form 2240—Claim for Refund of Federal Tax on gasoline used on a farm—is now available at the County Agent's office. Both the card, which must be filled out and mailed to the District Director, Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas, entering the number of gallons used by the individual on his farm for farming purposes during the period July 1, 1962 thru June 30, 1963, and the duplicate are available.

This form is to be made out in duplicate: The white paper copy is to be retained by the individual and the card form is sent to the Internal Revenue.
