LOCAL ISSUES ENLIVEN TEXAS VOTING

Change Of Venue Granted In Norris Murder Trial

CHANGE OF VENUE PLEA BRINGS
OUT THREATS SAID REGISTERED
AGAINST PASTOR BY ENEMIES15 WITNESSES, SOME MEMBERS OF NORRIS' CHURCH
SAY ON STAND THAT FAIR TRIAL IN TARRANT
COUNTY WILL BE IMPOSSIBLE

(By the Associated Press)

COURT ROOM, FORT WORTH, Nov. 2.—Judge George E. Hasey, presiding officer in the trial of Rev. J. Frank Norris, fundamentalist pastor who is charged with the slaying of D. E. Chipps, wealthy lumberman, announced this afternoon that he will grant a change of venue when the court reconvenes following the noon recess.

Before making the announcement, the Judge asked all veniremen who had formed an opinion to hold up their hands, which the majority did. The change of venue was protested by State's Attorney Robert K. Hanzar on the grounds of uncontroverted testimony.

COURT ROOM FORT WORTH, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Intense feeling in Tarrant county for and against Dr. J. Frank Norris, charged with the murder of Dexter E. Chipps, were described here today by witnesses called to give testimony on Norris' application for a change of venue of his murder trial.

Some witnesses said they had heard it remarked frequently that Norris "ought to be hung", that "he ought to have his neck broken", that "he ought to be shot", while just as many said he ought to go free.

To Show Prejudice

These witnesses were presented by the defense in an effort to show that widespread prejudice existed and that most of the residents of this county have "prejudged" the case. Some of these witnesses said they had contributed to the Norris defense fund. A. P. Plunkett, a furniture dealer, who said he had contributed \$10 to the defense, told of a meeting of 300 members of Norris' church last Sunday at which the list of 500 veniremen was examined.

A railway mail clerk, J. B. Davis, whose run is from Fort Worth to Amarillo, said he had heard strong opinions on the case all the way from this city to the Northern Texas Panhandle. He said he had heard it stated certain persons had been offered money if they could get on the jury.

15 Witnesses Testify

Fifteen witnesses testified they believed Norris could not obtain an impartial trial.

Dr. Norris listened intently to the testimony that residents of this county had expressed the belief that the pastor's neck should be broken. He sat with his attorneys at the counsel table, alternately smiling, suggesting

Voting Is Heavy
In Hidalgo County

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Nov. 2.—(AP)—With eight rangers under command of Captain Frank Hamer, guarding the principal polling places in Hidalgo county, no friction is expected. The voting during the morning was heavy, although the roads are in bad condition as a result of heavy rains. A heavy rural vote is expected during the afternoon. Rangers were stationed at Mercedes, Los Ebanos, Edinburg, Hidalgo and Weslaco, as all of which booth heavy Mexican votes are usually polled.

The Texas general election was enlivened today in several counties by interest in local races. In such places the state ticket was more or less incidental in the minds of the electors who went to the polls primarily to vote for this or that favorite for county office. But even with that interest early voting was reported light.

In Dallas county the race for sheriff where Schuyler Marshall Jr. sought re-election and was opposed by Allan Seale, also a democrat, was a drawing card. Seale and Marshall have been in prolonged litigation as to whom was the party's nominee.

Some attention was attracted to Hidalgo county because the governor ordered several state rangers to be there today while the polls were open. The governor specifically gave directions the rangers were to watch balloting in Mercedes, Weslaco, McAllen, Edinburg, "and other adjacent towns."

There was little if anything early today to indicate change in the usual custom in Texas that the democratic nomination for office was equivalent to election. The republicans conducted an active campaign in which their nominees for governor, Colonel H. H. Haines, stumped the state, and issued appeals for votes as late as yesterday.

G. O. P. Expects Big Vote

They claimed they expected a number of Ferguson supporters to vote the republican ticket rather than for Governor Ferguson and his husband. Both said, however, themselves would vote a straight democratic ticket on absentee ballots sent from Austin to their home precinct in Temple.

Cloudy, wet, cold, weather with muddy roads in some sections resulting in a lighter vote than otherwise might have been cast.

Voting Very Light

HOUSTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—A light early vote was being cast owing to a general rain over Harris.

Dallas—Cold weather, with threatening rains served to keep voters indoors during the early hours.

Waco—Early balloting light, weather cool.

Amarillo—Clear skies failed to bring out more than a scattering of voters here early today.

Abilene—Cold cloudy weather after a night of slow rains caused a light vote during the morning.

Texarkana—Weather cloudy and cold. Light vote is expected.

Temple—Cloudy skies and cold weather here discouraged balloting. The voting is light.

Brownsville—Light rainfall was reported in all parts of the Lower Rio Grande Valley this morning, with skies having overcast and roads in bad condition. Voting was light in the early hours.

Laredo—22 hours continuous rainfall, roads impassable, voting extremely light.

Corpus—Overhanging skies with threat of rain and dropping temperature caused light vote in early morning hours over half inch rain fell in Corpus last night.

Beaumont—Cold rains; no early balloting.

Vernon—Balloting light, rain, cool. San Angelo—Rains here last night and continued cloudy and cool weather today are expected to contribute to lighter vote than anticipated.

Sherman—Weather cold and cloudy voting light.

Galveston—Weather cold rain, voting light.

San Antonio—Little early interest. Slow rain falling.

Fort Worth—Weather cold, early voting light.

POLLS OPEN AT
BELATED HOURMisunderstanding Turns Many
Early Morning Voters Away;
They Return Later

During the early hours this morning it appeared that Lubbock county voters would not be given an opportunity to participate in the general election, and more than one man told of his poll tax receipt and returned home with a feeling that his "dollar seventy-five" had been badly spent.

Judges Arrive Late

Election judges and clerks began arriving at the courthouse about 8:30 o'clock—thirty minutes after the legal time for opening the polls, and by 10 o'clock most of them had been sworn in and people began casting their ballots.

It seems that there has been considerable misunderstanding concerning the election, for some of the judges say they knew nothing of their appointment, and didn't come to town for the purpose of holding the election. Most of the regular appointed men were absent, but qualified voters who could spare a few hours time volunteered to help out, and their services were gladly accepted.

Voting Is Listless

The general election in Texas creates about as much enthusiasm as a school boy's game of tag—it is something we must take whether we like it or not. Democrats have an idea that their Republican brothers have just about as much chance to win as a pebble would have in the lower regions, so they are not worried.

Quite a few people were at the courthouse when the voting finally began, but a very light vote is predicted.

MAIL CARRIER IS
ROBBED BY PAIR

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Two unmasked men held up a rural mail carrier near here today, and escaped with a mail pouch after a running fight which extended from Harahan to the residential section of New Orleans more than 20 miles.

The pouch, which had been thrown off a passing train, was believed to have contained very little money. The carrier was held up shortly afterwards at a lonely place. He telephoned Harahan and police alerted the men as they drove through that place. They fired a volley at the police and drove past at terrific speed. A hastily assembled posse gave chase, firing as they went.

New Orleans police sent to guard roads entering the city were outdistanced and the bandits disappeared after entering the city.

Aged Temple Man Is
Robbed At Santone

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Christin Mux, 65, of Temple, told police today he had been beaten and robbed by unknown assailants, after police found him in a dazed condition and bleeding from cuts about the head. He said he could not remember clearly what happened but that several hundred dollars and important papers had disappeared.

Burnet Banker Found
Dead At Ranch Home

BURNET, Texas, Nov. 2.—(AP)—John S. Guthrie, 32, vice president of the Burnet National bank was found dead with his neck broken in a cow pen on his ranch six miles from here, it was learned today.

Guthrie had gone out to look after his stock. Alarmed at his failure to return, Mrs. Guthrie headed a search party and found him. It is believed that Guthrie in evading a cow's lunge fell.

Mystery Surrounds
Death Of Salesman

FORT WORTH, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Officers today were trying to learn what or who caused the death of T. K. "Red" King, automobile salesman who died shortly before daybreak with outward evidences of only minor injuries.

King was deserted last night at a gasoline filling station by a man yet unidentified, who drove up in King's own touring car, Frank Zolaski, station attendant, told police. The man ran to another automobile containing two other men and all fled hastily toward town, Zolaski said.

King, partly conscious, was cut on the lip and forehead and died without telling what happened to him.

FIVE CABINET MEMBERS FLY.
BUT YOU FIND NO PLANES IN
WHITE HOUSE GARAGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Aviation
is not for the president.
That is not for the present presi-
dent. If the late Col. Roosevelt were
in the White House now it is safe to
say that White House airplanes
would be as much an established in-
stitution as White House automobiles.
Col. Roosevelt, II, as every-
body knows, is a chronic flyer.

President Coolidge, however, is
cautious. There will be no planes
in the White House garage as long
as he is chief executive.

Some future president may take
chances in the heavens, but not this
one. Secret service men are no pro-
tection in a plane crash.
Cabinet members, seemingly, are
not so fragile. At all events, several
of them are experienced aerial
travelers. Postmaster General New
flies almost every day. He takes a
plane as indifferently as the average
man takes a taxi.

Secretary of the Navy Willbur takes
an occasional flight. He doesn't do it
as a pastime, like Secretary of War
Davis, but whenever he has a trip to
make, and a plane is available, he
requisitions it.
Secretary of the Treasury Mellon's
flying experience is limited to a very
age he made across the English
channel on his last visit to Europe.

If Secretary of Commerce Hoover
has indulged in any aviation he did
it so unostentatiously that there is
no record of it, but he refused, when
asked, to tell if he had ever tried it.

Secretary of State Kellogg, At-
torney General Sargent, Secretary of the
Interior Work, and Secretary of Agri-
culture Jardine frankly never have
left terra firma in any more romantic
a contrivance than an elevator.

Some of the undersecretaries are
regular professions, like Assistant
Secretaries Davidson, Warner and
MacCracken, in charge of aviation re-
spectively in the war, navy and com-
merce departments.

Assistant Secretary of War Mac-
Nider also does much flying, usually
traveling by plane on tours of in-
spection.

Crow Blackbird.

Crow Blackbird, purple, grackle,
bronzed grackle—the names it bears
in different parts of the country. But
wherever found, and under whatever
name, he is much the same. Noisy,
inclined to be overbearing, he has,
during the last 25 or 30 years, vastly
increased in numbers in many places,
and now occupies some of our parks
and suburbs where he used to be un-
known.
Watch him on some warm spring

day as he shows off before his mate.
He will be sitting sedately enough on
a branch, when all at once he will
swell to twice his normal size by the
process of puffing out his feathers,
drop his wings, open his beak, and, as
you listen for some note in keeping
with all this elaborate preparation,
he will emit a ridiculously inadequate
squeak and subside into his normal
state.

Meanwhile his mate has paid just
about as much attention to all this
performance as you would expect her
to. Nevertheless it is effective.
Autumn is the heyday time when
the flocks gather for the southward
migration. What a lark the birds have!
Such flocks must have quantities of
food, and ordinary methods of forag-
ing will not suffice. Throughout the
country they fly in great bands, seek-
ing the oaks which have borne heavy
crops of nuts.

When a corn field is raided the de-
struction is so tremendous that or-
ganized efforts of reprisal must be
made if the precious crop is not to be
destroyed. Then they pass on to the
rice still farther south and continue
their ravages.

Helpful Health Hints

FRUIT JUICES IN MILK MAKE
BABY STRONGER

By DR. MORRIS FISHER
(Editor Journal of the American Medi-
cal Association and of Hygiene, the
Health Magazine.)

As modern studies of the value of
various food substances in nutrition
have continued, it has become appar-
ent that milk, the main food of in-
fants and children, varies in its vita-
min content, according to the kind of
food that the cow has received and
the kind of life that the cow has lived.
Much depends on whether the cow
has been in the sunlight or in the
stable, and on whether it has been
fed on fresh greens or stored hay.

There may be more to the phrase
"milk from contented cows" than ap-
pears on the surface. A healthful cow
is a contented one, and a healthful
cow yields more and better milk.

However, even under the best cir-
cumstances specialists in diseases of
children have found it advisable to
add orange juice, tomato juice, lemon
juice, or other juices of fresh fruits
and vegetables to milk in order to
bring the vitamin content up to a point
that will encourage growth and prop-
er nutrition.

Orange juice stimulates growth, fur-
nishes a considerable amount of min-
erals, has some laxative qualities and

prevents the development of scurvy.

Oranges are, however, difficult to
obtain at times in some communities,
and frequently are so expensive as
not to be easily available to the poor.

A number of investigators have at-
tempted to find substitutes for orange
juice and have suggested the juices of
cheaper fruits and vegetables, includ-
ing particularly the tomato, cabbage,
spinach and carrot.

According to the opinions of these
investigators, scurvy, in a guinea pig
can be prevented by 25 drops of
fresh orange juice daily, 30 to 60 drops
of canned tomato juice, one-tenth of
an ounce of raw cabbage or raw spin-
ach daily.

Tests of Quality

Recently, investigators in the Uni-
versity of Missouri, Mrs. Eva M.
Davis and Hannah A. Stillman, have
attempted additional tests to find out
what proportion of vegetable and fruit
juices would be equivalent to oranges
in growth promoting qualities.

They found that physicians were
justified in substituting carrot, spin-
ach or tomato juices for orange juice
in promoting growth and in supple-
menting the diet.

Cabbage juice, however, was not
adequate when winter cabbage was
used. When the fresh summer cab-
bage was employed, it was found to
be equal in most respects to orange
juice.

A sidelight on the Stillman family
fortunes and quarrels is supplied by
State Press of the Dallas News, in
commenting on a Reporter News para-
graph. State Press says:

Down here in Texas we have some
right to an interest in the affairs of
the Stillmans. It was in Texas that

fortune-building Stillman can be

Stillman, son of the pioneer Texan,

man enjoyed—the advantages of liv-

He married a lady of prominent so-
cial connections, a lady of beauty and
some culture and a dexterous tongue.

such extent that lawyers were en-

her mind to accept her in-laws as her

THE SCOPES CASE

It is to be hoped that when the Su-
preme Court of Tennessee passes
upon the conviction of John Scopes
for violation of the anti-evolution law,
that it will decide the constitutionality
of the act. It should not be al-
lowed to longer be a source of con-
tention in Tennessee but should be
settled once for all.

There has been some suggestion
that because the court imposed a
fine of more than \$10 instead of hav-
ing it fixed by the jury that the case
may be reversed upon this ground.
However there is a supreme court de-
cision which holds that where the
penalty is fixed by law it is not neces-
sary for the jury to fix the punish-
ment.

Be that as it may, the people of
Tennessee desire that the court give
an opinion upon the constitutionality
of the act and it is upon this plea
that the appeal was made. Therefore,
there is little doubt that the court will
determine this question.—Knoxville
Sentinel.

The pile of themes diminished very slowly, and at eleven o'clock she yawned, stretched her arms and walked

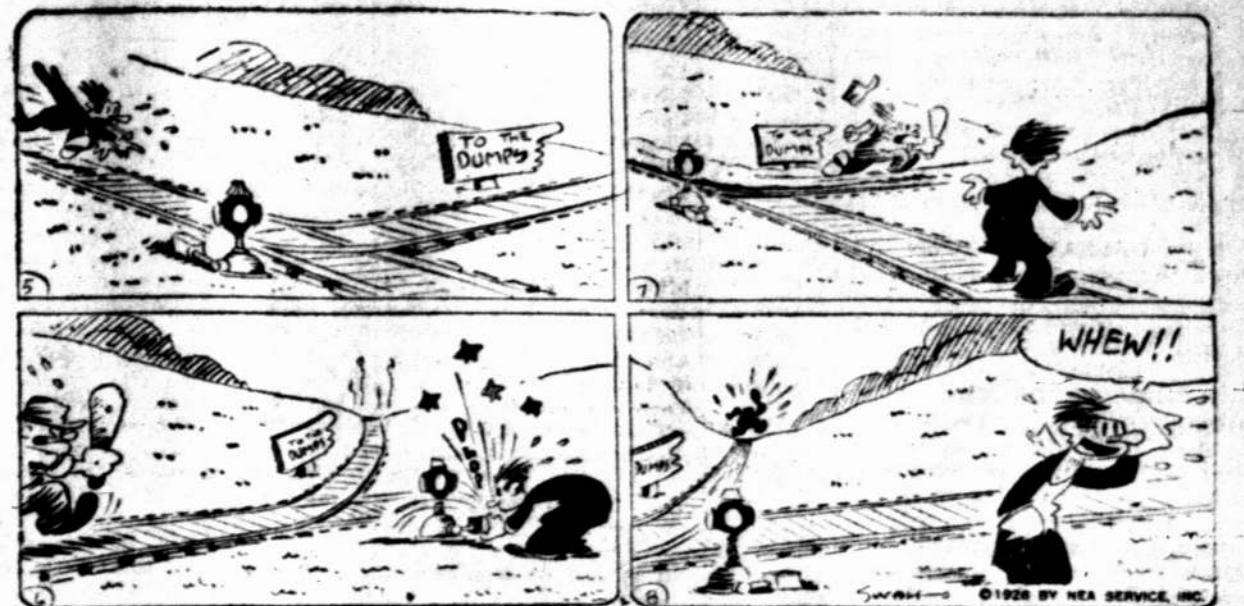

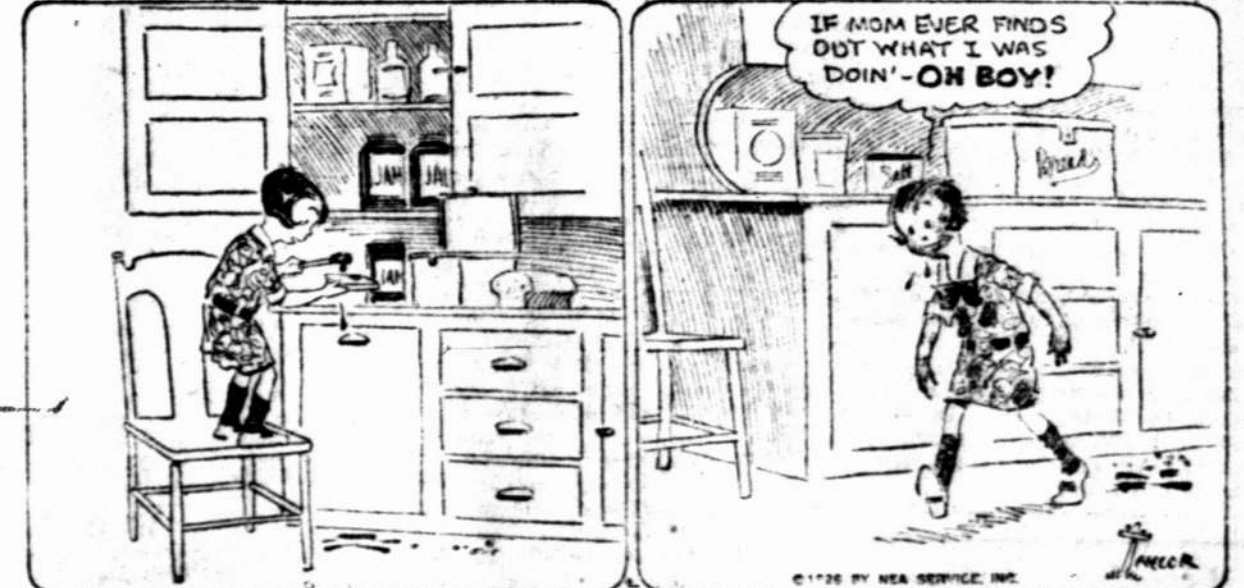
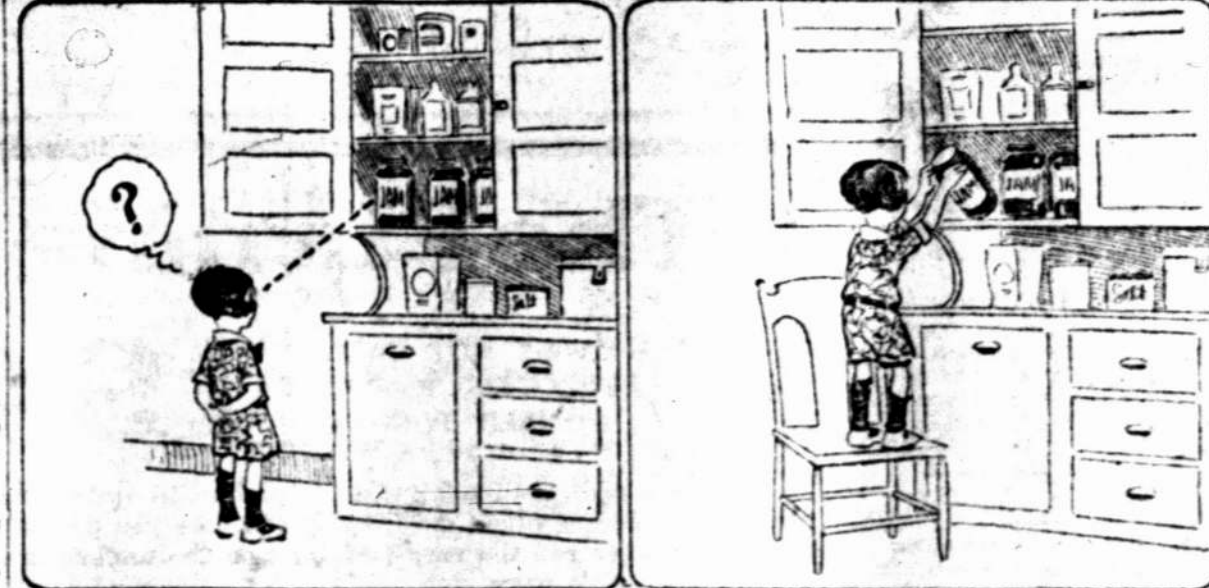

JURY HUNG IN BIG CASE HERE

Three-Cornered Park Rumpus Results In Jurors Being Unable To Agree

After spending eight days in the trial of the 'city park case,' the three-cornered land suit between Senator W. H. Bledsoe and T. T. Price as one party, Dr. M. C. Overton as another and the City of Lubbock as the third, resulted in a 'hung jury' at 5:30 Monday afternoon. Doctor Overton, pioneer Lubbock physician, maintained in the case that he had conveyed the land to Messrs. Bledsoe and Price in 1909 with the understanding that it be offered to the city as a park site. Messrs. Bledsoe and Price said they bought and paid for the land while the city entered suit for it on the grounds of Doctor Overton's testimony. Monetary value of the land is set at \$40,000.

Members of the Lubbock fire department had an easy time in October, Fire Chief W. E. Twitty said this morning. They were called to action only ten times during the month, the chief stated, surpassing the record of September by four calls.

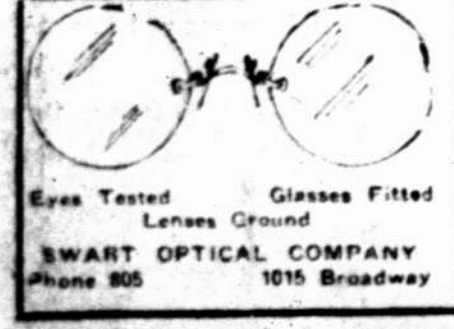
