Earl Phillips, a Texas Tech University senior graduating in December, 1990, will tell you that when you work for something, "you will appreciate it very much." He will receive a Bachelor of Science degree in restaurant hotel institutional management.

"I have had four years of fast food experience, with 2 1/2 years of managerial experience," says a happy Phillips.

Mr. Kendrick was born September 1, 1935 in Hillsboro, Texas to Robert and Ethel Kendrick. Both parents preceded him in death.

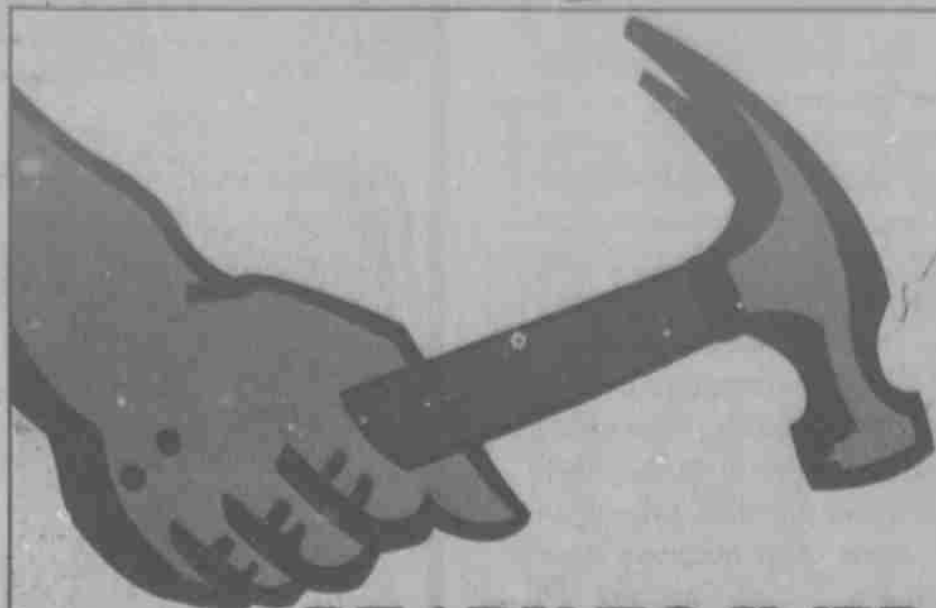
He moved to Lubbock, Texas 42 years ago.

Bush is the civilian Commander in Chief of our military once war is declared by the Congress. Once war is declared by Congress it is George's job to lead us to glorious victory. Our Constitution written by the Founding Fathers does not give the President, no matter how popular, the power to commit this country, our young men and women, to war. War is not flag waving, pledging allegiance, parades, and political speeches. Go as a veteran, a real veteran, what war is like.

"Preparations for the slaughter of human beings have always been made in the name of God or some alleged higher being which mankind has, in its imaginativeness, devised and created.

Before the ancient Phoenicians cut a captive's throat, they performed religious ceremonies with just the same magnificence as did the new generations a few thousand years later before they marched into battle and destroyed their enemies with fire and sword.

The shambles of the world war would have been incomplete without the blessings of the clergy. The chaplains of all armies prayed and celebrated Mass for the victory of the side whose bread they ate. A priest was in attendance when mutineers were executed. A priest put in his appearance at the execution of Czech legionaries.

Throughout Europe, men went to the shambles like cattle, whether they were driven by butchers, who included not only emperors, kings, and other potentates, but also priests of all denominations. Mass at the front was always held twice, when a contingent was moving up to the front line and then again before going over the top, before the bloodshed and slaughter. I remember that on one such occasion, while Mass was being celebrated, an enemy airplane dropped a bomb right on top of the altar and nothing was left of the chaplain but a few bloodstained rags.

Afterwards he was mentioned in dispatches as a martyr, while or airplanes were preparing similar glory for the chaplain on the other side.
