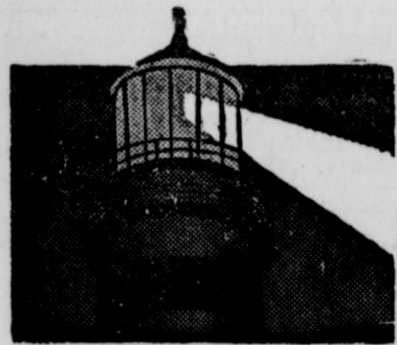

### On The BEAM

Race relations and equal opportunities for the colored people is no joking matter, especially to the Negro people who have been struggling so long for civil rights. Occasionally we run across some item in the newspaper concerning civil rights that is both amusing and ridiculous.

One such item was handed to us this week and we'll pass it along to you. We do not know who the author is but it was clipped from an Andrews paper. Here it is:

Progress in the south on civil rights, registration, voting, and the like has been downright amazing in recent weeks.

An elderly lady, who has been attending West Texas Press Conventions for as long as we can remember, could hardly wait to tell us in El Paso last weekend the latest story about integration progress in Atlanta, Georgia.

As she tells it, Dr. Martin Luther King was making a rapid tour of an appliance store in Atlanta to see how well the store had complied with the equal opportunities act . . . and during the course of the inspection jumped the manager because the store wasn't fully integrated.

"But we are," the manager protested. "We have colored clerks, a colored bookkeeper and a colored assistant manager."

"But look at those washing machines over there," Dr. King said. "Every one of them is white."

"I know . . . but if you look on the inside of those white washing machines, you'll find a black agitator in every one of them."

**Jimmy Hall Received Purple Heart**

Captain James A. Hall, now stationed at Fort Sill, Oklahoma was one of five Americans wounded by a Viet Cong hand grenade on Nov. 15, 1963. Later when the story was known Capt. Hall was commended for his actions and Col. Beryl L. Boyce is shown presenting the purple heart to Hall.

Capt. Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Hall, Jr., Loraine served with the U. S. Military Assistance Advisory Group (MAAG), Vietnam.

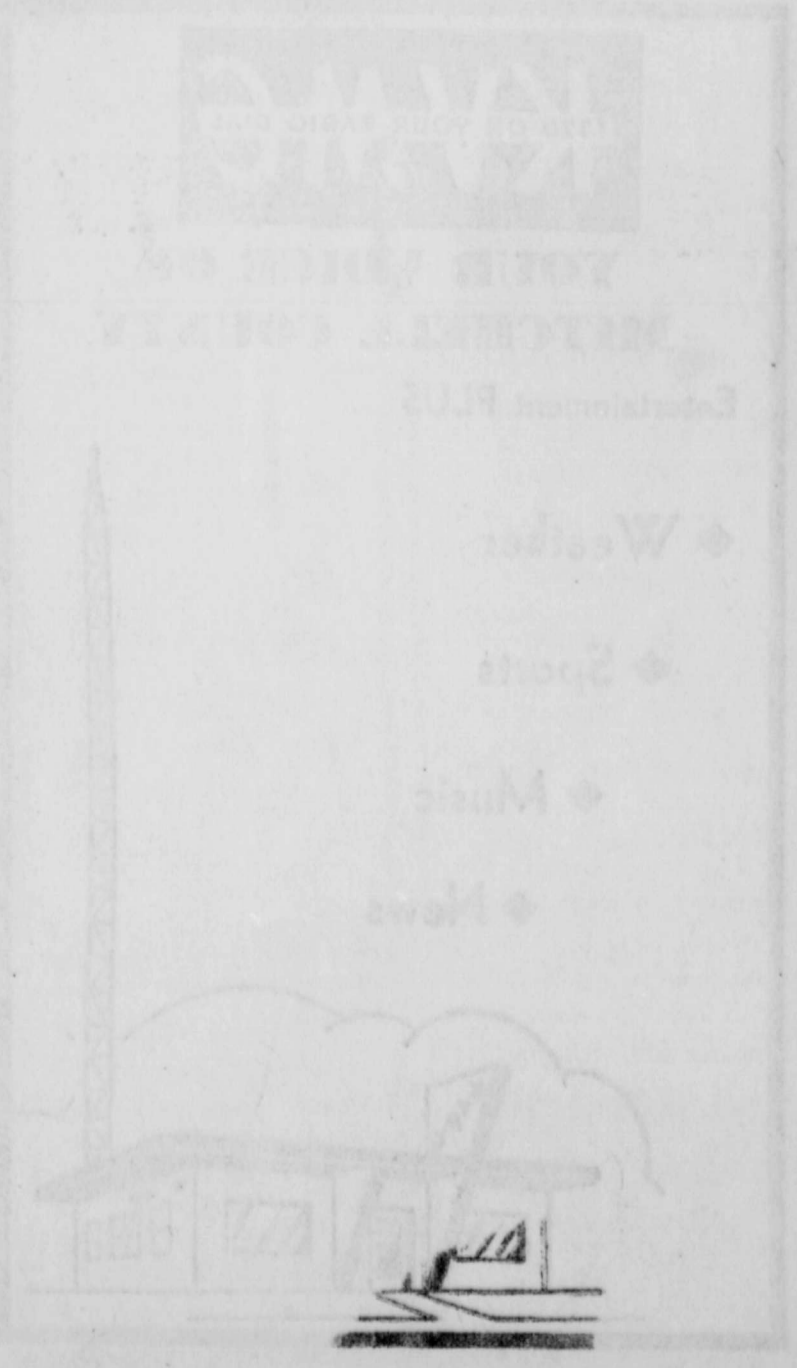

**W. M. U. Hear  
Book Review**

Rev. Jim Turner, pastor reviewed the book, "My Money and God", by Robert Hastings to the members of the W.M.U. Monday, August 30.

This book deals with the subject of Christian Stewardship. "I Am Accountable" is the title of the first chapter and is based on the scripture, "So then everyone of us shall give an account of himself to God". This includes not only our giving but also the way we use our time, words, influence, vocation and opportunities.

The study deals primarily with stewardship of money. This study deals with this subject by asking five questions.

How do I earn my money? What is my attitude toward my money? How do I give my money? Why do I give my money? How will I leave my money?

The way we answer these questions determine whether or not we are good stewards. For instance, Stewardship does not begin when we drop our offering in the plate on Sunday morning, but where we got that money is important to God. It is also possible to have the wrong attitude toward money. The Christian sees money as a tool, not as master. Money is good or evil not in itself but in the way it is used. The reason one gives to God is important. Some motives are good and some are not so good. A representative list of motives for giving might be fear, compensation, self respect, pity, profit, of course the highest motive would be love.

The amount to give is an individual matter. The question is what will get the job done. A father who determines how much to spend for groceries first asks, "How many mouths are there to feed?"

So the question is "What kind of giving will it take to get the gospel to every creature". If haphazard, spasmotic or inconsequential giving will get the job done then that's enough; But the thinking person knows this is insufficient and a mere dream. The church has the big job of carrying out the Great Commission. Go ye therefore into all the

world and preach the gospel, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have Commanded You." Matt. 28:19-20. This kind of task takes the giving of a Christian Steward.
