### State Head to Explain Brucellosis Controls

Head of the brucellosis program for Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas will explain brucellosis control laws that can be applied to Mitchell County.

Dr. James Henderson will speak at 7:30 p. m. at a meeting of ranchers and farmers in the 32nd District Court room, third floor of the Courthouse.

The brucellosis information program — which will deal with Type 1 and Type 2 animals — has been arranged by County Agent Jack Burkhalter in cooperation with county livestock owners.

Thirty-five Texas counties have adopted types of the control program or have petitioned for the control program in an effort to fight brucellosis (formerly called Bang's disease) — one of the most costly and damaging diseases in cattle.

Certification will result for Type 2 county if not more than 1 per cent of the heifers excluded and not more than 5 per cent of herds are found infected.

There are additional provisions in Type 2 which provide for quarantine of infected herds, retests plus exemption of feed lot cattle under certain conditions.

Expenses for all tests, vaccination identification of animals and enforcement of rules are paid for by state and federal government under Type 2 control.



### 45th Annual District Meeting

More than 250 women from West and Central Texas move into Colorado City Thursday for the 45th annual convention of 6th District, Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

They will arrive from an area bounded by Cisco, San Saba, San Angelo and Colorado City.

## Planning Key To Team's Job

That new 9-point program being set up by Colorado Industrial Team Inc. could result in the "most comprehensive effort for expanded industry this community every attempted."

Naturally, the overall program will depend upon the work of committees in those 9 fields of planning and study.

And the plan is geared for the long haul — over a period of years, not for some quick get-rich miracle.

The program, announced Thursday by the Industrial Team, will set up permanent committees in the fields of labor, taxes, utilities, transportation, industrial sites, insurance, municipal commitments, financing and advertising.

Industrial Team program will work.

The director and his committee assigned to taxes will compile data concerning ad valorem and special tax rates pertaining to all property within the city, county, districts and state.

Experiences of other industry and business relating to taxes will be noticed and recorded. There will be a look into the future, too, to chart the relationship of bonded indebtedness, city, county and districts to the future tax burden of industry and business.

In addition, the tax project will gather pertinent information about the tax conditions here compared (favorably or unfavorably) with other areas and states. This will include not only property ad valorem taxes, but income, sales, gross production and other type taxes.

The Industrial Team plan, of course, will be geared in close cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber's Industrial committee, which suggested and sponsored the organization of Team Inc.

## New Mexico Case Names Boatright

Legal proceedings have been filed here as a step toward extradition of Joe Boatright, local cattle buyer, to New Mexico to face charges of fraud.

A fugitive information complaint has been filed in County Court against Boatright on the basis of a warrant issued in Silver City, Grant County, N. M., concerning a cattle deal there.

The cattle buyer posted \$2,500 bond and date of hearing on the complaint here was set for April 10.

Filing of the information complaint, alleging that Boatright is a fugitive from justice, is a necessary move by New Mexico authorities to seek extradition of Boatright through the office of Governor Price Daniel in Austin.

There will be no additional court action if the extradition process is approved by the governor.

The complaint was filed here by District Attorney Eldon Mahon following the arrival of a warrant from Grant County authorities in New Mexico.

Basis for the warrant is a complaint filed in Grant County last November charging Boatright with "obtaining property with intent to cheat or fraud" in violation of New Mexico penal law.

The complaint against Boatright in New Mexico was made by Alexander Watkins.

Two persons have received fines and jail sentences in County Court for driving while intoxicated.

Manuel Sosa, 21, of Route 2, pleaded guilty to DWI and received a \$75 fine, court costs and 3 days in jail.

Receiving identical punishment also on a DWI plea of guilty was Aldres Torres Valdez, 29, of Colorado City.

Both cases resulted from complaints filed by State Highway Patrolman Buddy Herbenberger.

**Art Studied By Beta Sigma Phi**

"Art is man-made because it is an interpretation of nature and of life—thus the arts are highly personal," said Mrs. R. E. Gregory Jr. as she presented the program on the study of art along with the special guest George Womack to Mu Phi chapter of Beta Sigma Phi Tuesday night in the home of Mrs. George Smith.

"There are certain things that may be explained, things that the average observer may miss entirely and which one they are pointed out to him, may enlarge his way of seeing," she said.

She stated that through ideas artists select the form and create paintings. They express the ideals, the hopes, and the fears of the times in which they live, therefore, they are a record of man.

"Composition is one of the most conspicuous and the one least noticed by a person who casually looks at pictures and that is the way the artist has put his picture together—the arrangement of the objects within a picture—the color, form and texture."

The speaker stated that one of the most familiar, most simple of all compositional frameworks is the triangle.

She pointed out that you can discover for yourself dozens of these lines in the landscape, slopes of a hill, rise of a rock a picture.

"In Picasso's Guernica, you can see the triangle scheme adapted to a subject of violence, horror and mutilation."

Mrs. Gregory told the group some of the terms that are used in art work.

"Abstract art is a picture with little or no resemblance to objects in the real world, relying for their interests and emotional impact on form and color alone," she explained.

She said that Impressionism is when the artist puts the color strokes on separately in stead of mixing the colors.

When an artist uses expressionism, she said, this means a modern movement which aims to express feelings, emotions and states of mind rather than to imitate visible nature.

"Still life, the speaker said, is a painting of inanimate objects."

George Womack who was also featured on the program stated that there are 7 fine arts.

He then showed pictures of Vincent Van Gogh which were: "Sun Flower," "Self Portrait," "The Garden of Dr. Goebel," "The Church of St. Auvers" and "Gypsy Camp."

baseball for several years while C-City starts its second year this season. The others also have more extensive summer programs.

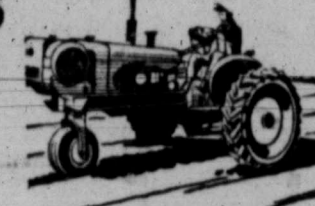

be cooperating with all bona-fide efforts and, in turn, will be welcoming and depending upon the cooperation of all citizens."

The same type of organized work as planned for taxes will be channeled into the other 8 fields of the program.

For instance, the Team Inc. committee assigned to labor will seek to have current information at its fingertips. This will include data as to available labor supply, types of labor, source of labor within the city and the county areas, prevailing wage rates, possibility of skilled and technical labor supply, plus any other labor history which would be of interest to industry.

Here are how the other fields will be dealt with in the Industrial Team project: UTILITIES - Keep close liaison with all utilities operating in this year, maintain current information on utility rates and their breakdowns according to demands and usage. Also provide data on service policies, prospects for extensions, supply of power and services available for future industry, areas most accessible to utilities.

TRANSPORTATION - Compile exact information on freight and other transportation rates, services, schedules, routing, inter change of lines between points of departure and arrival, prospects for improved services in this category, study of weak points and advantages.

SITES - Up to date locations available for business and industrial plants, pointed with maps and photographs. Data to include prices for land and buildings, proximity of utilities and transportation, plus relationship of locations to community's churches, schools, business, residences, etc., and any advantages that might be of interest to industry.

INSURANCE - Full information concerning rates for all types of construction and locations, including detailed mapping of fire zones, study of casualty and compensation insurance structures applicable to this area and state, other specialized problems.

CITY COMMITMENTS - Detailed compilation of city ordinances and policies affecting the community's industrial, business and residential areas, source for all municipal services available, data concerning type of city government and its history here, master planning and other projects that might affect industry in the future. Also close liaison with city officials for cooperation in

community projects.

FINANCIAL - Study and compiling of policies of bank, other local lending institutions, Team Inc., insurance companies, other sources for assistance to industry. Also knowledge of Small Business Administration and other agencies and small business investment companies.

ADVERTISING - Compiling pertinent information about advantages of this area and making it available in attractive, condensed form for easy recognition by all categories of prospects. This will include brochures and other materials.

The 9-point plan is being patterned, to a large extent, on an industrial development foundation which has been recognized for successful operation in Paris, Tex.

The story's central figure is Marnie Van Doren, as a toughened girl who becomes a suspect in the death of a young hot-rod addict and is sent to Girls Town, a home for girls. Her fellow inmates, with whom she at first comes to odds, prove unexpected and formidable allies when Marnie's younger sister, Elinor Donahue, is victimized by hoodlums. "Girls Town" introduces the teenage singing sensation, Paul Anka, in his major motion picture debut and he sings four songs in the film. Walt Disney's "Third Man on the Mountain" comes to the Palace screen Friday and Saturday. In the film, Disney has produced an action-packed drama loaded with excitement and beauty amid the magnificence of the mighty Swiss Alps.
