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Victim of Car Wreck

Wm. Kale, Formerly of the Camrick
Community Killed Instantly
In California

Mrs. Harve Cook of the Camrick community, near Gray was in Perryton Friday and told of receiving word of the death of William Kale, 19 year old son of Mrs. C. C. Stanley of San Bernardino, Calif. formerly of Perryton.

Young Kale, who attended the Camrick school and frequently visited in Perryton before moving to California in the spring of 1935 was killed instantly when a truck in which he was riding collided with a motor cycle in the streets of Los Angeles. The motor cycle rider was also killed. The accident occurred Sept. 9 and the funeral was in San Bernardino the following Monday, Sept. 14, Mrs. Cook said.

The victim was the son of the late Bill Kale who was well known in this vicinity.

PASTURE LAND IS FURROWED

SOIL CONSERVATION METHODS
PRACTICED ON 3,500 ACRES
THIS AREA 15 DAMS BUILT

In some areas of Region Six of the Soil Conservation Service, maintenance and revegetation of pasture and range lands is one of the most important problems. Pasture furrowing has been done on 61,108 acres and 483 stock water and water conservation dams have been completed in the past year in demonstration areas according to H. H. Fennell, Regional Conservator.

In the Perryton Camp area pasture furrowing has been done on 3500 acres, and 15 water conservation dams have been completed. Three additional dams are now under construction, nearing completion.

Contour pasture furrows retain water, for grass growth, which would otherwise run off into streams and lakes. Pasture furrows also decrease flood hazards especially on the steeper slopes.

Stock water and water conservation dams distribute watering places for livestock more evenly, thus causing a uniform grazing over the range. They also act as reservoirs which aid in flood control and in raising the water level in wells.

PERRYTON RANGERS LOSE OPENER OF SEASON TO BORGER BULLDOGS

BURK'S GRIDIRON MACHINE SHOWS SPARKLING PLAYS TO HOLD BORGER'S EN- TRY IN CLASS A

The Perryton high school Rangers opened their grid season Friday night under a canopy of electric lights on the Borger Bulldog field in a manner that is very commendable for Coach Burk and his helmeted boys, even though they lost the game with a 6-12 score.

With sparkling running attacks and dazzling passes the Rangers were at all stages of the game a continuous threat for the Bulldogs. Many of the attempted passes were incomplete, but it served as a reminder that when and if they were completed it meant curtains for Borger's Class A entry.

Schroeder, Ranger right half, did an excellent job with his toe, getting his teammates out of several jams. Never was one of his boots blocked, and they averaged 37-1-3 yards each.

Lilly, Perryton's left half, might be termed as the standout of the backfield, with his ball totting and passing, yet McWilliams, quarterback, who made Perryton's lone score, and Jones, fullback, also came in for their share of the good work field.

Burk has a miniature constellation for his backfield, in that each of his regulars is a high school star, supplemented with sufficient reserve power for replacements. Horne, substituting for McWilliams during a good share of Friday night's fray, gave a good account of himself while in there.

Garrison, Nies, Kuhn, Johnson and Ferguson who make up the bulky line, were hustling all the time, and made holes many many times for the backfield plungers, while Kent and Pittman, wingmen, were going down under punts and passes, endeavoring to advance the ball for their mates or assist in cutting down the interference and many times getting "their" man.

From the sidelines, each quarter was smacked full of thrills and occasions for applause for the stellar action on the part of each individual Ranger. And in addition, the coach had on the bench many youngsters who no doubt will be seen in action later in the season and who perhaps will turn in exceptional plays and gains.

There were, of course, lots of plays by the Rangers which netted no yardage gain, and some on which losses were suffered, but it can't be said that Burk's charges were not in there all the time giving the best they had for their team. And with a few more scrimmage practices those rough spots which appeared in the initial encounter will be polished off.

WORLD SERIES WILL OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 30

Baseball fans and business places over the nation are preparing to broadcast and otherwise participate in the world series this year which has been designated to start Wednesday Sept. 30.

At a recent meeting of the managers of the possible contenders in both American and National leagues in conference with Baseball Commissioner Kenesaw (Mountain) Landis the date was set and definite plans made concerning the exhibition.

The first two games will be played under National league auspices, with the third, fourth and fifth games to be played in New York Yankee stadium.

It is presumed that this year's series will be an all-New York series, and if such is the case there will be no intervening days between games, usually taken up in travel.

For the third straight year, the exclusive rights of the broadcast of the world series has been sold to the Ford Motor Company, Landis announced. Receipts from this feature of the series will, as in the past, be prorated among the participating clubs and players. This year the players' cut of the broadcast money will amount to a maximum of \$59,500, providing the games number but four.

Figures submitted on the seating capacity of the Yankee and Giant stadiums are 63,300 for the Yankee Stadium and 47,400 for the Polo Grounds.

Dream Kitchen On Wheels Is Exhibited In Perryton

Hundreds of Perryton home-makers are expected to visit the All-Electric Dream Kitchen on wheels, being exhibited by Community Public Service Company at the Company office. The Kitchen will be on display today and Friday and Saturday. It will be open for inspection the entire three days.

Built like a Colonial cottage, with green shutters and gay curtained windows the coach contains an ultra modern kitchen, scientifically designed to save work and at the same time provide an atmosphere of beauty and sparkling cleanliness. Not an inch of space wasted. Built-in steel cabinets, with stainless steel work tops, connect the electric range and refrigerator on one side of the kitchen. A large Monel metal sink, with roomy drainboard and built-in electric dish washer, occupies the other side. Overhead cabinets provide a place for canned goods and breakfast food. Even the doorways contain built-in compartments with space for storing mops, brooms and various other kitchen articles.

Everything is arranged for convenience and speed in the preparation of food. The sink is but a step from either the range or the refrigerator. Plenty of table space is provided on both sides of the range. There are drawers for utensils in the range, as well as in the cupboards that flank it. Dirty dishes go right into the dishwasher, where they are cleaned by sprays of hot water. A ventilating fan over the range carries away food odor. Walls are washable and all cabinet work is finished in enamel, making it as easy to clean as a china dish. The Monel metal drain and cabinet tops are stainless and rustproof.

The coach is equipped with a deluxe electric range that does everything but prepare the ingredients for the various dishes. It is equipped with a control device that turns the oven on at a predetermined hour, cooks the food and then turns the oven off, all without attention on the part of the housewife. A Kelvinator refrigerator, electric food mixer, waffle iron, toaster, coffee-maker and cooker complete the cooking equipment. All electrical appliances will be connected and in operation.

The kitchen coach is being brought to Perryton by Community Public Service Company in order to give local home-makers a chance to see a reproduction of a modern all-electric kitchen on the type that is advocated by leading home economists, architects and industrial designers. It will serve as a guide to those who are contemplating the modernizing of their present kitchens or planning to build new homes.

Assistant County Agent Kept Busy
Running Lines, Levels Farm-
ished Farmers

Contouring and terracing have been the most important item of conversation and activity during the past month in the office of the County Agent, George Brockman. Assistant in Wind Erosion arrived in Ochiltree County on August 16, and has been busy running lines ever since. County Agent Stovall has been able to assist in a few cases. The nine levels belonging to the County have been kept busy. It is estimated that more than 50% of the wheat will be placed on contour during the fall of 1936, and a good comparison between the contour tillage and planting with the straight work is expected next year.

Those individuals who have not as yet gotten their lines run and wish to plant their wheat on the contour should get in touch with Mr. Brockman, or if they can handle a level themselves they can find one in several of the communities. Levels are now stationed at the homes of Harry Mountcastle, O. K. Kizzlar, Knox Pipkin, Earl Walde, Van Earl Steed, and anyone living in these communities can secure these levels by returning them to these homes.

Several individuals have secured levels from the office of the County Agent and after finishing with them have failed to return them, when this is done another man who desires to have the use of these levels has to wait and search for these. Mr. Stovall reports. Everyone is requested to return these levels to the County Agent's Office at the earliest possible moment.

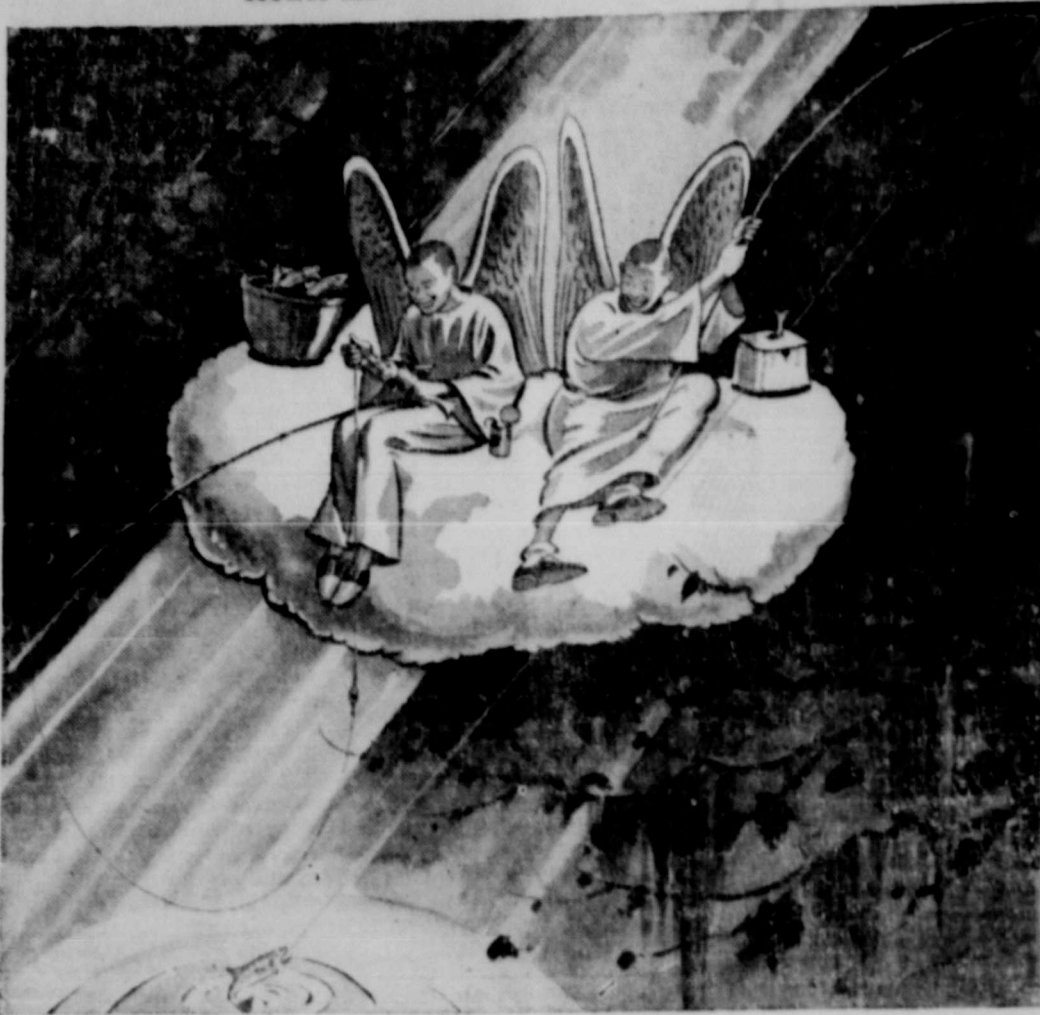

The Chicago News called it "a high adventure in play going," while the Dallas News it was the "most startling original composition of the generation." Mr. Connelly and William Keighley directed the screen version.

Trench Silos Are Proving To Be Farm Profit-Makers

Trench silos are recommended by County Agent J. T. Stovall to save feed, and the cost is small, it is said. Several Ochiltree County farmers who have placed silage in the ground have found it cheaper than stacking it as hay, the quality of the feed is better and the results more satisfactory, it is reported. Another feature of this method of storing feeds is that there is no loss by fire, weather rotting, damage by winds, rats and rodents, regardless of the length of time the feed is left untouched. It is said that the feed in trench silos will keep indefinitely. In some instances, it is reported, feed has been left in silos that have been covered for 12 to 14 years, and when uncovered, found to be in good condition. However, if needed the silo can be opened and feeding started at the end of three weeks, Mr. Stovall says.

The following information regarding trench silos has been released by the County Agent's office:

"Over a large area of Texas the drought has cut the feed crop short and in some cases feed crops have burned up before heading. This kind of feed when cut for hay is almost worthless. Not only does this situation make the livestock man short of grain but short of roughage also. Since our pastures in Ochiltree County are not in a position to afford but very little or no grazing during the coming winter, the livestock man is in a poor position and will have hard going this winter unless he takes steps to save this burned-up feed in such a way that it will make good feed. This can be done and the answer is Trench Silo. By putting dwarf or burned feed in a trench silo, and adding about five barrels of water for each ton of feed, it will make good roughage. Nearly every farmer can find something to put in a trench silo. He may use Johnson grass, Sudan grass, tumbleweed, or any other grain sorghum that he has on the farm.

"The thing to do is to bury all the roughage the farmer can get his hands on. The livestock man that has plenty of roughage can get by in good shape, since he can afford to buy a small amount of cotton

seed cake, and other concentrates, but he cannot afford to buy these feeds and roughage also.

"The cost of silage in the trench silo is very low. The feed can be put in the silo for less than \$1.00 per ton. This grain or feed may be cut with a broadcast binder or row binder, the whole bundles or stalks being placed in the trench. Shingle the bundles in the trench and wet them good. These bundles should be placed lengthways of the silo. Put down a two feet or more of feed each day, wet this good and continue to add feed until the trench is full. This feed should be rounded up well, two or three feet above the level of the ground, and covered over with a layer of 10 to 12 inches dirt."

It is thought that many farmers in this county will take advantage of this method of saving their supply of roughage. Any individual who desires information on how to construct or dig trench silos is requested to call or see the County Agent.

Several demonstrations are planned, and if the farmer when ready to fill his silo will notify Mr. Stovall, he will go to the farm and show the proper method of filling.

RANGERS DEFEATED BY STRONG BORGER TEAM FRIDAY NIGHT

Friday the Perryton Rangers played their first game of the season with the Borger Bull Dogs at Borger, and were defeated 6 to 12. Perryton's quarterback, Ray McWilliams, played an excellent game while he was on the grid, but because of a bum leg he did not get to play the whole game. Granville Lilly filled Ray's position and played a mighty good game as quarter-back with only one weeks practice. Ed Schroeder punted out of some bad situations nicely, and Clyde Jones was a valuable defense man. Waymon Pittman filled his position at Right End and deserves plenty of credit. The Rangers all played good game but just couldn't manage to cross the line that counts but once.

Here is a play by play of the Rangers' first game:

First Quarter

Tennison, Borger, kicks off to Kuhn, Perryton, to the 40 yard line; Lilly goes around right end for 9 yards; Schroeder goes around left end for 3 yards; Perryton receives 5-yard penalty; Lilly goes through his left tackle for 4 yards; incomplete pass, Schroeder to McWilliams; in an exchange of punts by Schroeder and Allen, Perryton gained 5 yards; Lilly attempted a plunge through right guard for 3 yard loss; incomplete pass, McWilliams to Schroeder; Lilly loses 2 yards around his right end; McWilliams again fails with a pass to Lilly. Borger's ball on downs.

Ramers romps around right end for 62 yards and touchdown. Conner's try for point failed. Score 6-0 for Borger.

Conner, Borger, kicks off to Lilly who returned it 12 yards from his 12 yard line. Schroeder then loses 5 yards around his left end; Schroeder picks up 1 yard around left end; Schroeder punts from his 15 yard line to Borger's 48.

Ramers gains 5 through his right guard; Conner then goes around right end for 4 more; Ramers loses 2 through left tackle; Allen punts into end zone.

Perryton's ball on their own 20 yard line; Jones through left guard for 6 yards; Lilly through left guard for 3 more; Jones through right guard for 5; Lilly through right guard for 3 yards; Schroeder around left end for 5 more yards; then Jones through left tackle for 4; (Borger substitution, Robertson for Conner) Lilly smothered an attempted pass for loss of 8 yards; Lilly fails on flat pass over the line and Perryton gets five yard penalty; Jones then goes over center for 6 yard gain; Schroeder punts to Borger 44 yard line.

Ramers goes through his right guard for three yards; he again goes over left tackle for 4 more; but loses a yard on his next attempt through left tackle; Allen then punts 15 yds. to Perryton 35 yard line.

Lilly goes through right tackle for 1 yard; Borger penalized 5 yards; Jones through center for 4; and again through center for 3; quarter ends.

Second Quarter

Schroeder around left end for no gain; McWilliams loses 1 yard over center; incomplete pass, McWilliams to Schroeder; Schroeder punts to Borger 12 yard line.

Allen punts to Perryton's 42 yard line and McWilliams returns to his 28 yard line; two incomplete passes McWilliams to Pittman and McWilliams to Kent; (Borger substitutes Badgley for Davies at center) McWilliams passes to Schroeder for 9 yards; Schroeder then goes over left tackle for 2; Jones over left guard for 7, and again in the same place for 4 more; then McWilliams goes through center for 6 yards and a touchdown tying the score; Jones fails on try for point. (Perryton substitutes Horne for McWilliams).

Perryton kicks off over Borger goal line. Borger's ball on their 20 yard stripe. Ramers over right tackle for 1 yard; Ramers around left end for 11 more; Tennison around right end for 5; Robertson cuts through left guard for 1; and again over center for 3; Allen punts 45 yards to Perryton 14 yard line.

Jones around left end for 5; (Flowers substitutes for Nies at left guard) Lilly through right guard for 4; Jones over center for 3; Jones through left tackle for 2; Horne loses 2 around right end; Schroeder punts 60 yards to Borger's 14 yard line.

Robertson around left end for 3; Tennison around right end for 1; Tennison over right tackle for no gain; Allen punts 25 yards to Lilly on his 43 yard line which he returns 8 yards. End of half. Score 6-6.

Third Quarter

Allen, Borger, kicks off to Lilly on his 6 yard stripe and he returns the

ball 18 yards to his 24 yard line; Schroeder around left end for 4; Horne around right end for no gain; Schroeder punts 40 yards to Borger 25 yard line.

Ramers romps around right end for 32 yards; he then gets off an incomplete pass to Sechrist; Ramers around left end for 3; Allen over right guard for 3; Allen then over left guard for 3 more; Perryton receives ball on downs on their 34 yard line.

Lilly goes around right end for 7; Lilly then fumbles and recovers for 2 yard loss; but he picks up 6 on the next play around left end; Lilly rams right guard for 3; then right tackle for 6; Jones gets 1/2 yard over center; and Lilly fumbles ball on next play through right guard and Borger recovers on its 45 yard line.

Allen hits wall at center and fumbles, Perryton recovering.

Lilly picks up 4 on reverse through right guard; then he passes to Horne for 10 more; Lilly through right guard for 2; Lilly complete pass to Schroeder for 13; Lilly loses 1 through center; incomplete pass, Lilly to Schroeder; then Lilly completes pass to Pittman for 6; Lilly loses 8 around right end, and ball goes to Borger on downs, on its 19 yard line.

Ramers over right guard for 4; Allen around left end for 4 more; Tennison around right end for 4; Allen around right end for 9; Allen over left guard for 2; Allen recovers his own fumble for 5 yard loss; Allen around left end for 4; Allen kicks out of bounds on Perryton's 13 yard line.

Perryton gets penalty of 5 for off-side; Lilly goes over right guard for 7; and Jones goes over left tackle for 5 more to end the quarter.

Fourth Quarter

Lilly fumbles ball and Borger recovers on Perryton's 20 yard line. Allen goes around right end for 8; Tennison over right tackle for 2; Allen through right guard for 1; Tennison through left guard for 2; Ramers around right end for 3; Ramers failed to gain through right guard and Perryton takes ball on downs.

Schroeder punts from 4 yard line to his own 40 yard line. Allen goes around left end for 5; Conner cuts through right guard for no gain; incomplete pass, Ramers to Raber; Allen punts out on Perryton's 4 yard line.

Schroeder then punts out to his own 38 yard line. Ramers rams center for 1 yard; incomplete pass, Allen to Raber; Tennison is then thrown for a loss of 12 yards around his right end; Allen punts out of bounds to Perryton's 28 yard line.

Borger intercepts pass from Lilly to Kent.

Allen fumbles and recovers ball for 17 yard loss; incomplete pass, Allen to Raber; Allen completes pass to Tennison for 18 yards; incomplete pass, Conner to Raber; lose ball to Perryton on downs.

Lilly goes around right end for 4; Perryton gets 15 yard penalty; Schroeder then punts out to his own 40 yard line where Allen returns it 20 yards.

Incomplete pass, Conner to Sechrist; Conner completes pass to Tennison for 15 yards; and Ramers goes over goal through right tackle for touchdown. Gaiser fails at attempt for extra point. Score, Borger 12, Perryton 6.

Schroeder returns Borger kick-off 15 yards to his own 45 yard line; incomplete pass, Lilly to Pittman; on a double pass, Lilly to Kent to Schroeder 40 yards were realized; (Borger substitutes Robertson for Tennison) Allen (Borger) then intercepts Perryton's pass and scoots along sideline for 42 yards.

Conner then goes over right guard for 4; Allen loses 2 on attempt around right end; Ramers picks up 5 around left end; Allen punts over Perryton goal line and ball put into play on Perryton's 20 yard line.

Incomplete pass, Lilly to Pittman; Lilly passes to Kent for 18; incomplete pass, Horne to Schroeder; incomplete pass, Horne to Schroeder; incomplete pass, Lilly to Pittman; Allen (Borger) intercepts pass of Horne to Kent, to end the game.

CODE OF ETHICS FOR MEMBERS OF NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASSOCIATIONS

Having been elected to membership in this Association, and having subscribed for and become the owner of certain shares of stock in said Association, each member should realize that:

1. A national farm loan association is a cooperative credit organization, chartered under the Federal Farm Loan Act, and is a part of a cooperative farm credit system through which farmers obtain loans on long terms and at a low rate of interest; that national farm loan associations were intended to be the foundation and credit strength of the system and can become such only by members living up to their obligations to both the association and the Land Bank; that the business affairs of the association, including the election of applicants to members of the association, the election of Directors chosen by the members of the association, the success of a national farm loan association is dependent upon each member of the association faithfully performing the obligations of membership.

2. Land bank loans are made by the Federal Land Bank of Houston only to members of national farm loan associations; that each national farm loan association endorses the loan of each of its members and becomes liable for the payment thereof, and in admitting an applicant to membership the Board of Directors does so relying upon the good character, ability and intention of the applicant to meet all of his obligations to the association, and to pay promptly the obligations arising under his mortgage to the Bank. A member cannot discharge his obligation to his association by merely surrendering the mortgaged property.

3. Through membership in the association, members have pledged with the association the shares of capital stock owned by them, and each has assumed the stock liability, thereby enjoying participation in and bringing to agriculture a system of cooperative credit with easier terms and lower rates of interest than agriculture can obtain from any other source; that if a member fails in any respect to discharge his obligations, he places a burden on his brother members. No member lives unto himself alone.

Therefore, by reason of the privilege of sharing and enjoying these benefits, it is the duty of each member of the association to do his honest best to keep and perform his obligations to this association as follows:

- (1) To pay to the association before maturity at the Land Bank the semi-annual installments.
- (2) To pay at maturity all taxes on the mortgaged farm.
- (3) To keep in repair the improvements thereon.
- (4) To protect the security of his loan from erosion.
- (5) To perform faithfully all of the terms and conditions of his deed of trust to The Federal Land Bank of Houston.
- (6) To this end, each member should, if necessary, carefully budget both his income and expenses, thereby making advance preparation for meeting promptly these obligations.
- (7) Each member should also endeavor to perform such duties to his association as attending annual meetings, electing qualified directors, and aiding executive officers in the discharge of their duties, and encourage other members to do likewise.
