Local Warning For Screwworm Threat

A Mitchell County livestock committee will map plans this week for alerting county farmers and ranchers to a new threat from screwworms.

County Agent Bobby Lemons said the committee will meet probably Wednesday or Thursday with representatives from U. S. Department of Agricultural agencies.

"This action will be aimed toward informing stockmen of the screwworm situation and urge assistance in getting producers to begin a spray program," Lemons said.

Members of the committee

are a unit of Mitchell County Program Building Committee — are L. S. (Bunky) Girvin Jr., Jimmy Henderson, Curtis Latimer, Francis Winn, Dub Waldrip and the county agent.

"At the same time producers will be urged to treat all wounds of stock and to inspect animals regularly and collect samples for identification by Screwworm Laboratory in Mission."

Three positive cases of screwworms have been identified in Tom Green County and the same number have been found in Coleman County.

Sterling County reported

its first confirmed case this week," Lemons emphasized. "And this brings the infestation right up to our county line."

Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service have been warning livestock producers all across the state that this season is bringing the most serious screwworm threat in five years — since the early days of the eradication program.

Rains and damp weather have assisted this screwworm buildup which has resulted extra cowboys being employed in the Rio Grande Valley and Gulf Coast areas to ride the range on the hunt for infected cattle.

Lemons said regular check of animals, spraying and prompt collection of samples for laboratory identification are important in face of conditions.

Vials for sending samples to the Mission laboratory are available at three locations in Colorado City — Colorado Feed & Seed, Shorty Moore's Feed Store and county agent's office — and in Lorraine at Loraine Feed & Seed.

Experts of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program say that gains made against the screwworm in previous years are in jeopardy now unless all producers check his livestock every day and treat all wounds, manmade or otherwise.

Dr. R. C. Bushland, research who helped bring the screwworm program into operation while stationed at Kerrville, believes the situation.

Crash Kills David McKay 5 Hurt In Collision Near Paris

Two cars crashed near Paris, Tex., early Saturday morning instantly killing David McKay, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred McKay, of Colorado City.

Five other persons, two of them passengers in McKay's 1966 Plymouth Valiant, were injured.

The accident happened at 5:35 a.m. 1.5 miles south of Paris on State Highway 24 as McKay was driving with two friends south from Paris toward Commerce.

Mr. and Mrs. McKay were notified of the tragedy at mid-morning in Ballinger where they were visiting Mrs. McKay's mother, Mrs. O. C. Cox. Mr. Cox died July 4 in Ballinger.

McKay, an outstanding high school and college athlete who graduated from Colorado High in 1965, was employed this summer at Campbell Soup Company plant near Paris. He was to begin his senior year at East Texas State University in the fall.

Robert C. Ferguson of Chillicothe and Terry N. Turner, 22, of Tucumcari, N. M., passengers in McKay's car also were East Texas State students, and employed at the Campbell plant.

Both Ferguson and Turner were reported in critical condition Saturday in St. Joseph Hospital in Paris.

Harold Albright, 44, of Paris, driver of the other car and the passengers — Bill Hicks, 44 of Paris and Wade Cope Jr., were also in St. Joseph Hospital with serious injuries.

Albright and Cope were reported with broken legs and Hicks with head injuries.

State Highway Patrol reported that the collision happened as Albright, driving a 1962 Chevrolet, backed out of a residential driveway on the west side of the highway.

After backing into the traffic lane, Albright was attempting to return to the driveway as the cars collided on the highway's west shoulder.

Impact of collision was on the front of McKay's car and at an angle on the other.

McKay was an all sport star at Colorado High. In his senior year he was quarterback of the Wolves, 1964 football team and named defensive halfback on the District 5-A team.

McKay was a leading 4-er on the 1965 Wolf basketball team and shortstop for the 1965 Wolf baseball team which defeated Seymour, 5-0, for district and Alpine, 7-0, for regional championship.

He was a student at South-ern Colorado State, on ath-

letic scholarship in the fall of 1965 before entering East Texas State in January of 1966. At East Texas he earned all Lone Star Conference honors as a defensive back in football.

His college football career was cut short, however, a

year after when he received a "bad" injury in spring training.

His father, Fred McKay, formerly a member of Safetyway in Colorado City and Big Spring, is employed at Lone Wolf Electric Co. here. His mother was a

Sp-4 Wayne Parham Says Hello From Saigon

It was 11 o'clock at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Parham, 1004 East 6th St., on Sunday night when the telephone rang.

For the lad calling it was 11 noon Monday, on a hot day in Saigon, capital of the Republic of South Vietnam.

Wayne Parham, aged 20 and recently promoted to Specialist 4, began with a loud and clear "Hello, Mother!" and then assured his parents and brothers, "I'm fine!"

Only disappointing thing about the unexpected trans-ocean call was that the operator asked the Parham family to hang up their extension phone for better transmission. The family had,

naturally, grabbed both phones off the hook when they heard Sp-4 Parham's voice and everybody was talking at once, said his mother.

In Vietnam since February the Colorado High School graduate is with the 199th Light Infantry Brigade.

Recently, after combat duty in the Long Binh area, Sp-4 Parham's outfit was moved into Saigon. His cheerful letters home seem glad of the change from jungle to city.

"Even though things could get rough here," he wrote, "we're glad to get away from jungles and rice paddies."

He has written of helping

to guard the bridge in the vicinity of the American Embassy and other "important buildings" day and night.

Parham frequently mentions the South Vietnamese children whom he calls "the kids." He and his buddy built a shower, using a 55 gallon drum and "the kids" bathe water for baths, happy over gifts of candy.

He writes vivid descriptions of the rain and the pleasure of hot scrambled eggs, buns, butter and peach jam for breakfast. He writes, most often of all, little messages to his three younger brothers, Sammy, 19, Larry, 17 and "Little Pete," who is 9.

Of a trip to the Cholon section of Saigon he wrote "I guess it was the first time I've eaten a good hamburger with pickles and tomatoes, French fries, and donuts, since I've been over here."

Another letter tells how Sp-4 Parham is waiting to open a package until off duty that night. "Mr. and Mrs. Eual Henderson sent the package and I'll send thanks to them," he adds.

The young soldier sends most of his money home for banking after his title to his church, Oak Street Baptist, is taken care of.

"I keep \$24," he explains, "which is all I need more, really, as there's not much to buy where we are."

He writes his mother and father every day except for the day of June 30 when everybody was out of writing materials, and was

1968 Wheat Certificate Value Set At \$1.38 Bu.

Curtis Latimer, chairman of Mitchell County Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Committee, has announced that certificate payments to farmers participating in the 1968 wheat program will begin August 19 at the ASCS office here.

Wheat certificate payments will have a value of \$1.38 per bushel, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

Payments are based on the difference in the July 1 wheat parity price of \$2.63 per bushel and the 1968 crop national average loan rate of \$1.25 per bushel. The 1967 value was \$1.36 per bushel for certificate payments.

Wheat marketing certi-

icates are authorized by the two-price provisions of the Food & Agriculture Act of 1965, guaranteeing participating farmers 100 per cent of wheat parity price for their share of the wheat used for domestic food.

"This substantially bolsters farm income for wheat while permitting support of market prices through loans at levels more competitive in world trade channels," said Latimer.

The 1968 payments will be based on the projected production of 40 percent of the farm's planted acreage within the 1968 wheat acreage allotment. About 85 percent of this county's wheat

allotment is on participating farms, Latimer said.

Nationally, certificate payments to approximately 837,000 farmers will total about \$730 million for the 1968 wheat crop, as about 85 percent of the national allotment is on participating farms. When related to the total production on the 40.2 million acres of allotment, the \$730 million in certificate payments represents additional income at national average of 55 cents on each bushel produced by participants.

Total average return per bushel will depend, Latimer said, on price farmers receive in the market from their wheat crop.

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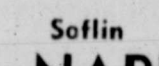
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
