WAR LOWERS STANDARD FOR SWEDISH LIFE

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 24.—The Swedish capital now probably is the most prosperous one in all Europe, but it is by no means unaffected by the unusual situation existing in the world.

As winter closes in, unemployment is increasing. In contrast with all other countries in Europe, it was nearly impossible in Stockholm before the war to find a poorly dressed man. Now many can be seen every day. The old proverb how "the Swede is the best dressed man in the world" is no longer true.

Unemployed workers now are knocking on doors and asking for work or money. One year ago not one of these unfortunates would appear in a month.

Unemployed queue up outside of offices and sit all day in newspaper kiosks or canteens. Advertisements in newspapers by people looking for jobs are more numerous and mostly unanswered.

The causes for the large unemployment are many, but there is one capital reason—the war. Foreign trade is strangled, thus affecting home production. Factories, bureaux and shops are reducing personnel and a passing dismissal in labor ranks because the many people called up for military service, has waned. Officially, it is forecast that unemployment will reach a record high this winter.

At the same time prices of all commodities are increasing. Living expenses have increased by 40 percent. Taxes—direct and indirect—have increased by 25 percent and expenses for social dues, shoes, hire of help, light, gas, and street cars also have increased about the same percentage.

It was considered notable that the inhabitants of Stockholm on the big moving day, Oct. 1, moved generally from modern and exclusive apartments to older but cheaper ones. Another sign of the hard time is the increasing number of bicycles used in Stockholm.

Business life in Sweden has slowed. All shops with luxury goods have felt heavy losses. Merchants are complaining about the drop in the number of tourists coming to Sweden because of the war.

British Ambassador Arrives On Newest British Battleship

ANNAPOLIS, Jan. 24.—Lord Halifax, British Ambassador, arrived in the United States today aboard the new British battleship King George V, one of the most powerful battleships in the world.

The King George V was one of the new British battleships, upon which work was started in 1937, which will be surpassed in armament by new British battleships started two years later.

It was not known until the King George V arrived in the United States that it had been commissioned into the British fleet and was ready for service.

Rattler Hunting Season Opens In Stephens County

BRECKENRIDGE, Jan. 24.—Rattlesnake hunting, a combination of a day's outing with attending danger of stepping too close to the quarry, and the spine shiver of aversion the sight of a "singin'" deadly rattler gives, has officially opened in Stephens county.

P. C. Walker, taxidermist, who makes snake hunting a sideline profession, has taken out one party for a test with fair results, now invites any who think they might like to join the party almost any bright Sunday afternoon.

His first hunt, which resulted in 24 diamond backs taken, was not considered near top in numbers, but it showed there still exist in the country despite the thousands of snakes Walker has taken, and he believes many more will be found.

Sixteen of the 24 taken were brought home alive and were presented to Forest Park zoo, Fort Worth. Walker, who has taken about 6,000 snakes in the past three or four years, considers this number merely a feather, however.

If the sky on Saturday afternoon causes him to think Sunday will be fair, he announces a snake hunt.

Procedure after reaching the den depends upon how well the snakes have elected to fortify themselves. Picks and shovels may be all that are needed to open the way and expose the snakes, but often Walker resorts to a healthy blast of dynamite.

Walker says his biggest take of snakes from one den was 227, but not all of these were rattlers. Copperheads and rattlesnakes often hole up together for the winter, and sometimes other kinds are found.

PERMANENT STABILITY FOR RUMANIA IS HELD TO BE UNLIKELY SOON

Reports that General Antonescu has gained mastery over the revolt of the Iron Guards in Rumania cannot be accepted as indicating that permanent stability has been established. The fundamental grievance of the Iron Guards is the recent annexation of Rumanian territory by Hungary under German direction; and the possibility of further uprisings will exist as long as return of at least part of the area is denied.

The seizures of Bessarabia and Bukovina by Russia and Southern Dobruja by Bulgaria have not caused as much open resentment as the loss of Transylvania to Hungary because more Transylvanians have close affinity with the Rumanians. Too, there has been long nationalistic rivalry between Rumania and Hungary.

When Antonescu became premier of Rumania, at the time of the dismissal of King Carol, he declared the Rumanian territorial claims would receive his sympathetic interest but that nothing could be done for the present. The Iron Guards, who are ambitious to become the governing power in Rumania, have been using General Antonescu's admission of the impossibility of immediate action to arouse animosity against him.

Antonescu's government has tried several times in the past months to suppress the Iron Guards but without success. The organization now keeps under cover but apparently has sympathizers in very high positions.

1940 Fire Deaths Set a New Record

AUSTIN, Tex.—The 1940 Texas fire death record sky-rocketed five and a half per cent over the previous year, 465 persons losing their lives. This was an increase of 86 over 1939, according to information made available to Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

After reaching an all-time high of 567 in 1936, the number of deaths dropped off until the latter part of 1940 when a large number of persons lost their lives by being trapped in burning dwellings.

Heaviest toll of life was taken during November and December, 137 deaths being reported during those two months. Standing too close to open fires accounted for one-third of the deaths during December.

Negro Held On Beer Sale Charge

Representatives from the county sheriff's office Thursday afternoon raided a place in Eastland occupied by Riley Freeman (colored) and found a quantity of beer and whisky, which they seized.

Proceedings in which the possession for purpose of sale of beer was charged, were filed with Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood. No charge had been filed to date on the whisky charge, which would have to be separate to that on beer.

Freeman was arrested and is being held in the county jail pending the furnishing of bond.

Britain Ousts a Cadet Trainer Who Favored "School Tie"

LONDON, Jan. 24.—The "old school tie" brigade received a setback today when War Secretary David Margesson announced in commons that Lieut. Col. Ralph Charles Eingham had been relieved as commander of an officers' cadet training school.

Eingham, in a letter to the London Times recently, asserted that officers recruited from the middle and lower classes fell down on their jobs. As compared to the officers from the upper classes with college and university traditions behind them, they lacked "man-management," Eingham charged.

Margesson, himself a member of the "old school tie" brigade, explained that Eingham had committed a breach of the king's regulations. To the cheers of the house, Margesson said, "I have decided that this officer no longer is suited to command an officers' cadet training unit."

Eingham's letter had raised a storm of criticism. Eingham became the butt of vaudeville and radio comedians. Low, in a cartoon in the Evening Standard, depicted five "Colonel Blimps" drawn up for parade. One was astride a white charger dressed in "knights of old" armor. Another wore the regalia of knights and crusaders. The other were in modern uniform addressing Margesson.

FIGHTING IN BUCHAREST IS ABOUT HALTED

Gen. Ion Antonescu of Rumania appeared to be getting the upper hand in the Rumanian revolt today, apparently with German support, after a bloody three-day battle with the radical Iron Guardists in which many Jews were slain.

For the first time a Bucharest correspondent was allowed to transmit the heavily censored accounts of what was frankly called a rebellion by the Iron Guard extremists.

Reports received at Ruschuk, on the Bulgarian border, asserted that between 2,000 and 3,000 were killed in the outbreak at Bucharest alone. No estimates were made of casualties elsewhere in the country.

Accounts of the Rumanian outbreak came as Lord Halifax, Britain's new ambassador to the United States, arrived aboard a new British battleship, and British troops, aided by Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia, pressed into Italy's East Africa and smashed deeper and deeper into Libya.

The first account of the bloody three days of revolt in Bucharest was dictated by United Press Correspondent Frank Stevens, from Bucharest to Zurich, Switzerland, for relay to the United States.

The censor cut the line each time he tried to answer inquiries, but he managed to report that he has been under fire much of the time while Antonescu's troops battled the Iron Guard in the streets of Bucharest and Jews were being herded into cellars and slain.

The streets of Bucharest were reported strewn with wreckage from the fighting and the rebels were said to be holding out but were said to be bottled up in one area of the city. What the situation was outside of Bucharest was not known definitely but reports from bordering countries indicated that fighting continued at many points.

Premier Antonescu decreed the utmost severity be employed in suppressing the uprising and accounts said the Iron Guardists are being subjected to mass executions.

Other fronts were quiet, with the British reported advancing westward in Libya, after capturing a total of 105,000 Italians since the start of the desert blitzkrieg, including those captured at Tobruk.

Military Officers To Testify About British Aid Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Democrats on the House Foreign Affairs Committee voted today to hear three high military and naval officials at a closed session on the British aid bill, after Republican members sought vainly to secure an open hearing.

The decision was reached after Rep. Hamilton Fish of New York had protested Chairman Sol Bloom's decision not to have the officials testify at the open hearing.

Compensation For Unemployed Again Problem of Solons

AUSTIN, Jan. 24.—Unemployment compensation which was a problem in two previous legislatures, bobbed up again today to pester the 47th session.

Unless Texas has an unemployment compensation act that the Federal Social Security Board approves, Texas employers will pay 2.7 per cent on their payrolls to the federal government and unemployed Texas workmen will get no benefits, it was stated today.

College Prexy Will Go Back Into Hole

CHICAGO, Jan. 24.—President Robert Hutchins of Chicago University, said today that he "like the hedgehog, will go back into his hole for another eight years," as students and faculty members issued protests against his speech in which he warned that the United States was drifting into war and suicide.

The Tide of the Future

Now, at last, you can begin to feel the rising of a mighty tide.

It is a Tide of the Future, and it is freighted with the burden of a new world.

There are waves, true, and one of them has been described by Mrs. Lindbergh. But that is a Wave of the Present. It is the wave that has engulfed France, and Norway, and Holland, and Belgium. Beneath and beyond this wave there is a mighty tide, and it is a tide of freedom.

It is too late, again, to look back to 1918 and the dream that was dashed into a million pieces—the dream of a peaceful, decent world, the dream of "a world fit for heroes to live in." We won that war and lost the prize. But that world, that prize, remains infinitely desirable.

Thank the Nazis for one thing, anyway. They have shown us that the world of the future cannot be the world of the past. That much is clear. The security which the Nazis now promise their people is a security which every country must achieve. Few clearly-stated war aims have come from Churchill, but every word from England is that the ancient world of privilege and position is dead. This time the heroes are going to make their own world.

It is on this great Tide of the Future that the President has launched the United States, even though to sail upon it, some waves must be breasted. Whether those waves will mean war for the United States, we do not yet know. It is clear that they will whenever the Nazi leaders believe the United States is no more dangerous at war than in the present status as "arsenal of democracy."

We do not know precisely to what sort of brave new world this tide of the future is bearing us. No blueprints are drawn, no guarantees established. In detail, in manner of administration, no doubt, it will be strangely different from what we have known.

We know only that we cannot be wrong in steering directly toward the Four Freedoms to which the President has rightly dedicated all our strength—freedom to speak and to express ourselves, freedom to worship God each in his own way, freedom from want, and freedom from this ever-impending fear of war which has made the world a nightmare for the past 20 years.

Let us take courage, then, whatever we face, from the fact that while Waves of the Present may break against us, we ride the Tide of the Future.

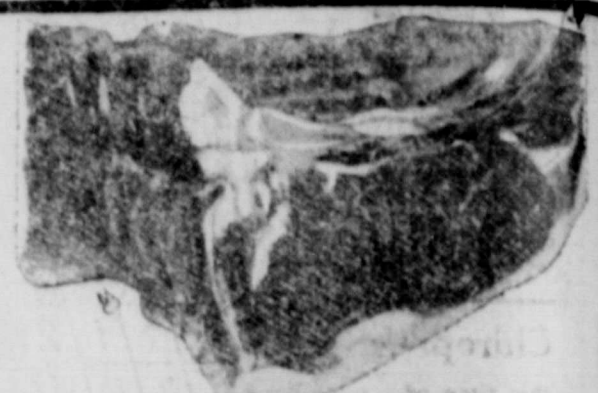

Rumania is Germany's Balkan military base. If civil war were to occur in the country while the Germans were engaged in nearby hostilities, German operations would be handicapped. In addition, the Germans must never forget the possible effect of such disturbances on their vital Rumanian oil supplies.
