Both Dorsey and his opponent, the incumbent state representative Dick Burnett, are residents of San Angelo, which is in Tom Green County, so they are both eligible to run in this district.

County Judge Bill Carter explained that the name was unfamiliar to most local residents because there was not a Republican Primary Election in Mitchell County this year.

Dorsey was elected by acclamation in the Republican Primary in May in Tom Green County.

Valero files suit

Appraisal District to reply

The Mitchell County Tax Appraisal District and the Board of Review are caught between the proverbial rock and hard place by the most recent action of the Valero Transmissior. Company.

Valero has filed suit against the Appraisal District and the Board,

claiming that the values put on the pipeline that runs through Mitchell County are excessive.

The "rock" is the fact that carrying out the lawsuit will cost the two groups more than the amount of taxes in question will bring in; the "hard place" is the fact that if the Appraisal

District and Board lose, the field will be left open for other companies to protest the appraisal on their properties.

Valero, formerly known as the LoVaca Gathering Company, has been fighting the appraisal of their pipeline since 1977, not only with the taxing agencies in

Mitchell County, but also with approximately 60 other taxing agencies throughout Texas.

On January 26, 1981, a delinquent tax suit by the CISD against Valero was heard in Mitchell County by Judge J. H. Starley.

The CISD lost the case and Judge Starley or-

dered a re-evaluation of the pipeline.

Pritchard and Abbott, the appraisal firm used by the Mitchell County Appraisal District, re-evaluated the pipeline, using the formula set forth by state agencies, but Valero still refused to accept the new figures.

Repeated attempts at a compromise solution were rebuffed by Valero and its attorneys.

It was no great surprise, then, when the Mitchell County Appraisal District and the Board of Review received notice of the fact that Valero had filed against See VALERO, Page 2

School takes precautions

"There is a problem, but it's not epidemic," Colorado School Superintendent Charlie Uselton said of reports of lice being found on some school children in Colorado City.

Uselton said that inspections are being conducted and any child found with lice is being sent home with written instructions for the parents on how to treat the problem and how to prevent it in the future. In some cases, proper shampoos and medications are being furnished by the school.

Before being allowed to re-enter school after being treated for lice, each child will be checked. See SCHOOL, Page 2

CISD accepts car bids

The Colorado Independent School District Board of Trustees met Thursday morning in a breakfast meeting at the Villa Restaurant to open bids on the leasing or buying of four vehicles for the schools.

Bids for lease and sale were submitted by Hutchins Ford Sales and Joe Weaver Chevrolet, both of which included arrangements for the school to buy the vehicles and then sell them back to the dealer after six months.

It was decided to accept this arrangement from Joe Weaver Chevrolet for the superintendent. See CISD, Page 2

Wolves victorious over Clyde Bulldogs

Last week, Wolves head coach Tom Ramsey said that his young players were getting

used to playing varsity football, and that they were improving. Evidently Ramsey knew

what he was talking about, as indicated by his team's performance Friday night against the

Clyde Bulldogs in Wolf Stadium.

The Wolves turned in their best performance of the year as they limited Clyde to 242 yards rushing, no yards passing while playing their first contest without committing a turnover, in a 22-8 victory.

The key to the victory was the Wolves made the big plays when they needed them. For in-

stance; early in the second quarter with the score 0-0, the Bulldogs were in Wolf territory. A third down pass was picked off by Dennis Rivera at the Wolf 25 to stop the scoring threat.

For instance; later on in the second quarter with the Pack on their own side of the field facing a second and nine, Doug Chitsey threw a 35 yard strike to

Stacy Tarter down to the Bulldog 31. This led to the first Wolf touchdown.

For instance; right before half, the Bulldogs drove 87 yards to the Wolf three. The Wolves put up a tremendous goal line stand for three plays to stop the 'Dogs at the one when time ran out.

Loans available to small businesses

Economic Injury Disaster Loans have been made available to small businesses in 68 Texas counties, including Mitchell, by the Small Business Administration.

According to Bernard Kulik, Deputy Associate Administrator for Disaster Assistance of the SBA, "Small businesses which are non-farm enterprises in these counties which have suffered substantial economic injury as a direct result of the damage caused by

the above mentioned (June storms) are eligible to apply for economic injury disaster loans."

Governor Bill Clements said the SBA loans will aid Cotton gins, warehouses, implement dealers and other agribusinesses affected because heavy rain and hail damaged area crops last June."

Clements stated that these loans would have been automatic at the end of this crop year,

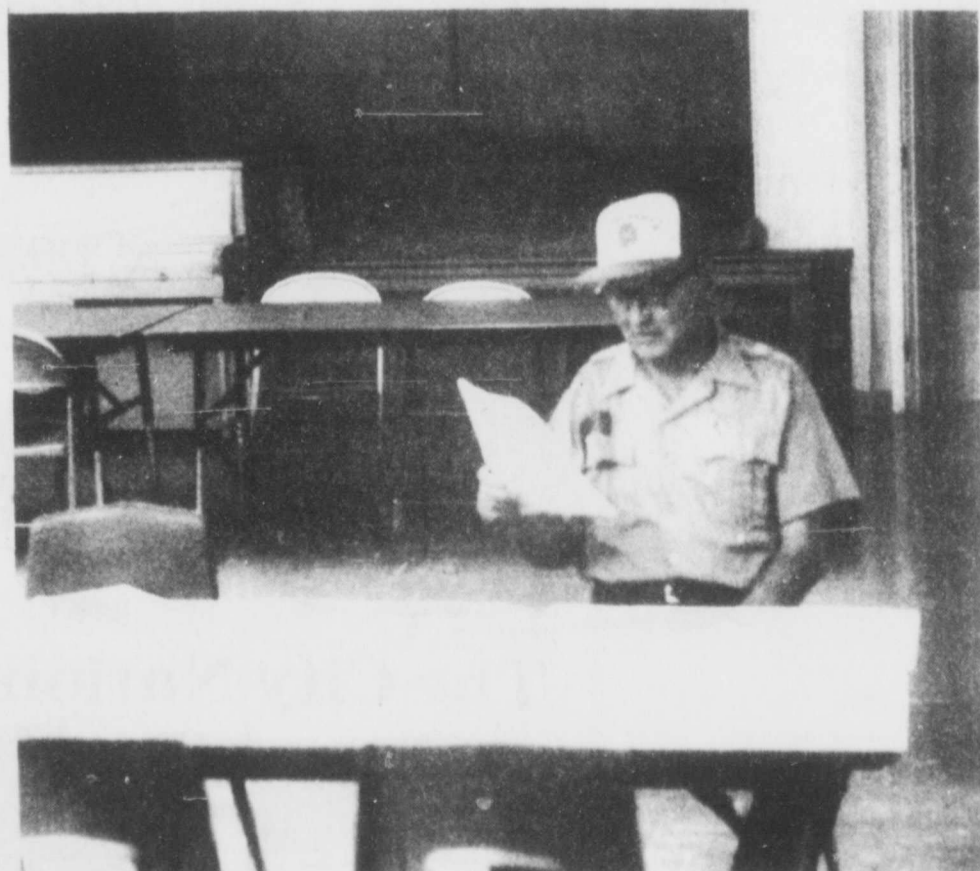
when exact amount of crop losses are determined. See LOANS, Page 2

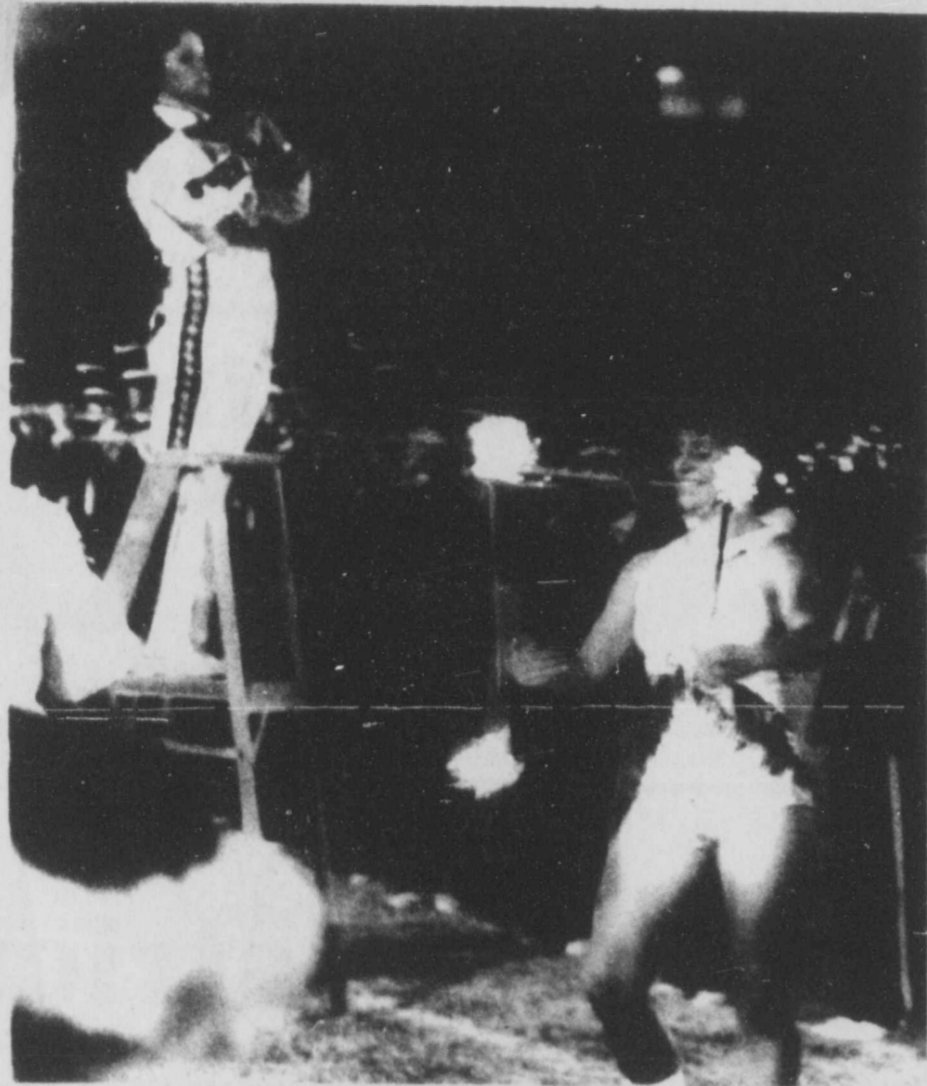
dent's car, a car for the high school, a pickup for the Vocational Agriculture program and a van for use by the athletic department at a net cost of \$200 per month for each vehicle.

open to the Appraisal District and the Board of Review, during which it was mentioned that if Valero wins, other similar companies may be motivated to protest the appraisal on their properties also and would have a good chance of winning if Valero had and the burden of making the lost tax revenue would fall on the individual taxpayer.

Colorado ISD School Superintendent Charlie Uselton told the members of the Appraisal District that McCreary and Huey, the law firm employed by the School District for delinquent tax suits, had agreed to file a reply to Valero's suit if they wanted them to.

The members agreed that filing a response would be the best solution since it would buy time in which to seek out all legal avenues and also hopefully get some of the state laws involved amended or clarified.

Failure to respond would result in the Appraisal District and Board of Review losing the suit by default.

When all the dust had settled in the auction ring at Abilene Auction, 265 head of cattle sold for \$112,031, combined

with \$51,000 in cash donations by generous friends from throughout the Southwest for a total of \$163,031 to help the handicapped.

Leading off the sale were five head of heavy beef donated by Mr. and Mrs. J. Willard Vinson of Abilene which sold for \$1.85 per pound, totaling \$8,214, purchased by

Wayne Moore Pipe & Supply and Wes-Tex Drilling Co. of Abilene.

The second top selling pen was donated by Abilene Cattle Feeders and sold for \$1.15 per pound totaling \$6,146.25. These Charolais cross were purchased by R. W. McDonnell of Abilene.

The top selling pen of heifers brought three times the fed heifer market price on this day.

The combination of Shackelford and Callahan counties' ranchers brought a total of approximately 20 percent of the total amount of cattle and funds gathered by the Rehab Center Monday.

Alexander added that needless to say this had been a tough year in the cattle business but as always our friends were responsive to the needs of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center and dug a little deeper to ensure the success of this year's Round-Up.

The next phase of the CRCC of 1982 was the Horse Sale at Abilene Auction, Saturday to be followed, October 4 with the Sheep and Goat Sale in Junction and a general sale on Wednesday, October 6 in Coleman.

VA work-study program available

Veterans pursuing full-time training on the GI Bill or Vocational Rehabilitation Program may apply for the VA's work-study program, advised the Director, Waco VA Regional Office.

The work-study program offers an additional allowance to veteran

students in return for their employment in VA-related activities.

Congress authorized the program to give needy veterans an opportunity to earn additional money to assist them in paying their own way during their school attendance and to accomplish necessary work for the VA.

Work-study program veterans can earn \$3.35 per hour (minimum wage) tax-free for work performed.

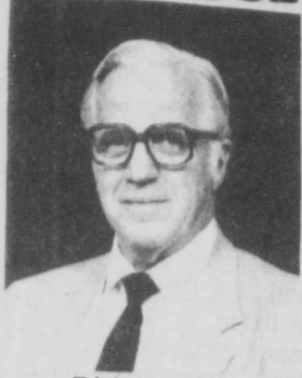

Dick Burnett, state representative, will be the principle speaker at the regular meeting of the Business and Professional Women's Club on October 12 at 7 p.m. in the Civic Center.

A resident of San Angelo, Burnett has been a

member of the FBI and Chief of Police at San Angelo.

Burnett is a Democrat campaigning for re-election as state representative.

During the 67th Session of the Legislature, Representative Burnett was appointed to the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee as well as the House Security and Sanctions Committee, chairing the Subcommittee on the Department of Public Safety.

He sponsored and passed several pieces of legislation, including a water-related amend-

ment to the Texas Constitution which will appear on the November 1982 General Election ballot.

The Speaker of the House appointed Representative Burnett a member of the Interim Select Committee on Child Abuse-Neglect and Child Pornography which will conduct a statewide study and make a report of its recommendations to the next session of the Legislature which convenes in January, 1983.

Burnett's political views are not necessarily endorsed by all the members of B&PW.

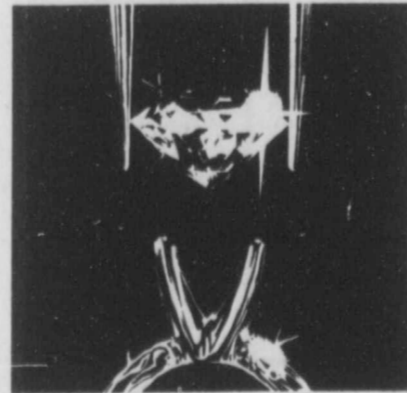

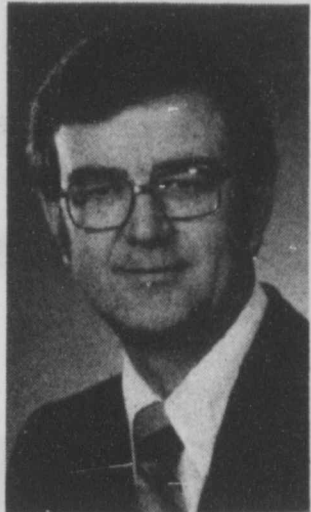

Congress overrides veto of Green Thumb program

For almost 1,000 older workers in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb program, the "battle of the budget" came to a happy conclusion with the recent Congressional override of

the President's veto of a supplemental appropriations bill. The bill provides money for a variety of programs and agencies ranging from the defense department to NASA

to Title V of the Older Americans Act, which funds TFU Green Thumb and other senior employment programs, according to Diane Parrish, Green Thumb state director.

Green Thumbers had already received letters informing them that their last day on the job was to be Sept. 24. Parrish said the letters had to be sent out because "there was no assurance that both houses would override the veto. What we've seen is a minor miracle." The override

vote in the Senate was 60 to 30, exactly the two-thirds majority necessary. "One more vote against the appropriations bill and the dismal news in your letters would have been all too true," she said. "And I'm afraid we all know that there aren't enough jobs

out there in the private sector for 54,000 older workers." Green Thumbers

Speaking to 50 Green Thumb workers at a training session in Colorado City on September 27, Parrish said the Congressional override "was decisive" in saving the jobs of more than 54,000 Title V workers nationwide. The workers are all 55 and over, low income, and provide services for libraries, schools, senior centers, and museums. "Without the override, the only hope would have been yet another appropriations bill," she said, "and there were no real guarantees that another one would have been passed and signed in time to keep the program going." The new bill funds the program through June 30, 1983.



Cook's Corner

Easy recipes for those who hate to cook

"I should have written Book," says Shirley Delaney. "I use a lot of mixes and a lot of packages; they're high-priced cooks—they know what they're doing."

A peek into her pantry proves that these are not empty words: the shelves are well-stocked with boxes and packages that bear pictures of delicious-looking dishes.

Mrs. Delaney is not without creativity in her cooking, though. Her recipes do lean heavily on prepared foods, but they also have a touch of "homemade" to them and are quite satisfactory to herself and her daughter, Cara, who graduated from high school last spring. Her son is away at college.

She chose these recipes on the following basis: "One Rise Rolls—the kind you can make up and they're ready to cook by the time you get the meat cooked. Fast cooking is all I do. An Oriental Pea Salad that we all just love. And Pecan Pie. Those are three that I can do without looking them up."

ONE RISE ROLLS (for four)
One-third c. milk
One-third c. water
One-third c. oil
Warm in bowl in microwave.
Sift together and add to liquid:
2 c. flour
2 tsp sugar
½ tsp salt
1 pkg. dry yeast
Add 1 egg and stir vigorously.
Add more flour to make pretty stiff dough.
Roll out on floured wax paper and cut with biscuit cutter. Place on greased cookie sheet and brush with melted butter. Let rise in warm place about 30 minutes and bake at 375 degrees until brown.

ORIENTAL PEA SALAD
2 boxes frozen green peas (thawed)
1 bunch green onions (chopped)
1 can water chestnuts (sliced)
Mayonnaise to moisten
Salt and pepper to taste
Add 1 can of Chinese

noodles just before serving.

PECAN PIE
Use your favorite pie crust recipe and fill the bottom of the pan with pecans.
Mix: 3 eggs
1 c. sugar

1 c. white corn syrup
Dash salt
Pour into crust and bake at 400 degrees for 40 minutes. Be sure to put a cookie sheet that fits the dishwasher under the pan to avoid cleaning the oven.

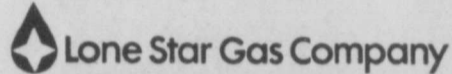

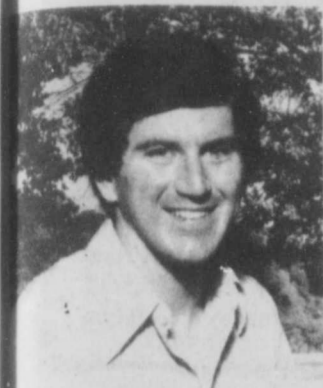

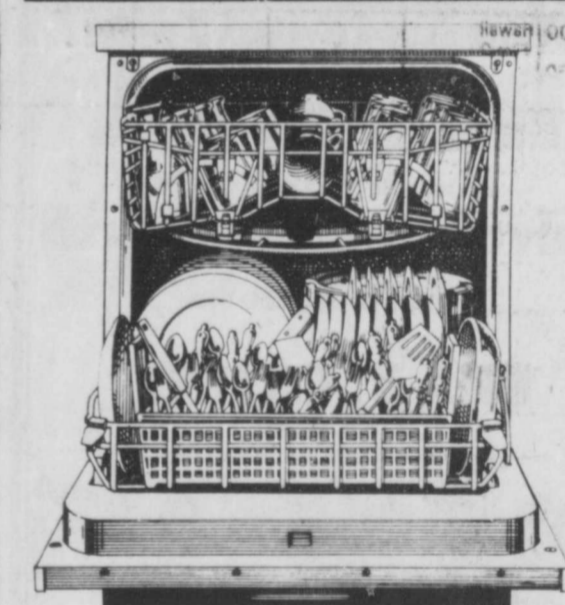

Plans should aid farms

National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan said Secretary John Block's announcement of a cotton acreage reduction program along with advance payments should help bolster sagging farm income.

The program announced by Secretary Block calls for a 20 percent reduction from the 1983 base of more than 15 million acres to be eligible for program benefits. An additional five percent paid diversion is offered to participants.

An advance payment of 50 percent of the expected 1983 payments will be made at the rate of 6.4 cents per pound for expected deficiency and 12.5 cents per pound for the diversion payment. Sign-up for program compliance and advance payments began Oct. 1, and the advance payments were made at that time.

Breihan commended the Secretary on his action. He pointed out that the Council's Board of Directors earlier this month had requested that the Secretary use all tools at his disposal to reduce the cotton carryover to not more than 3.5 million bales as soon as practical.

The action had been made necessary by an unusually large 1981 crop and weak market conditions, leading to an excessive carryover of 6.5 million bales, Breihan explained.

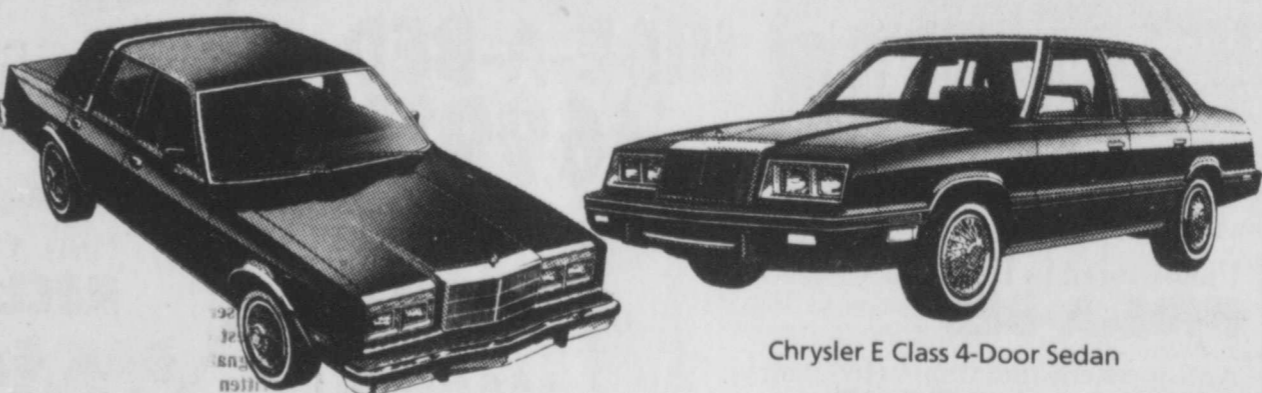

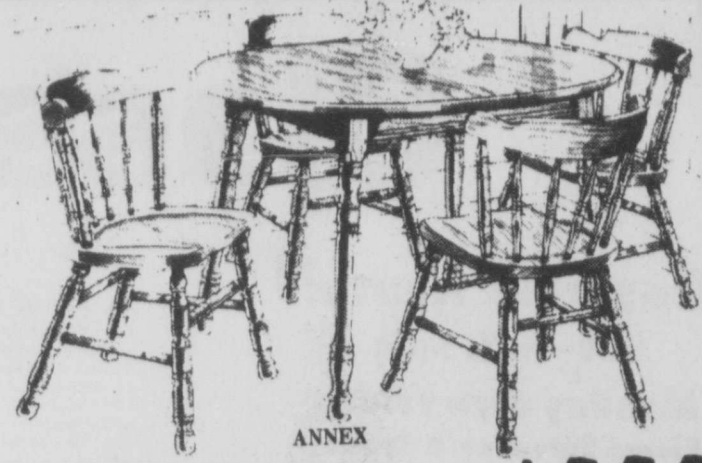

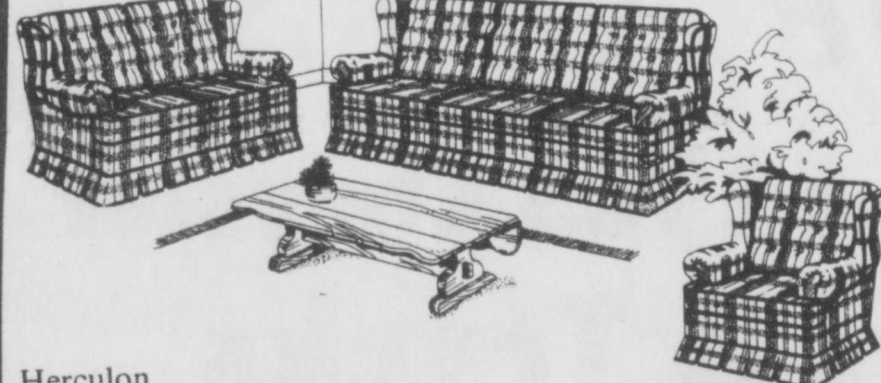
