Funeral Today for Wm. C. Harper, Former Resident

Funeral services for William Cross Harper were to be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon at the Baptist Church, with Rev. E. V. Becker, pastor of the church, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Levi Price of Monahans.

Mr. Harper died of cancer Tuesday, July 7, at the home of his brother, C. R. Harper, in San Antonio. He underwent surgery in Dallas March 10 and again in San Antonio June 16.

He was born January 16, 1900, in Limestone County, Texas. He came to Knox County with his family in 1919 and lived here until 1925. He married Miss Rose Pullig, daughter of C. W. Pullig and the late Mrs. Pullig, on January 17, 1924. They moved away from Knox City in 1925.

They were making their home in Monahans at the time of his death. He was employed by Richardson and Bass Oil Co. there.

Survivors are the wife; four daughters, Mrs. Linda Hundley of Monahans, Mrs. Billie Martin of Bryan, Miss Edna Harper and Barbara Harper of Monahans; three sons, Ted, Gary and William Harper, all of Monahans; five brothers, C. L. and C. R. Harper of San Antonio, Marvin Harper of Portland, Ore., K. A. Harper of Richmond, Calif., and Jack Harper of Monahans; one sister, Fannie Mae Lemon of Brenham; and one granddaughter, Janice Martin.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and of the Masonic Lodge.

Interment will be in the Knox City Cemetery under the direction of Warren Funeral Home. Masons will have charge of the burial rites.

LARGE CROWD AT GOREE SATURDAY TO HONOR TWO PIONEER DOCTORS

A number of Knox Citizens were in Goree Saturday to join an estimated 1,700 Knox County and other West Texans in paying tribute to Dr. E. F. Heard and Dr. W. M. Taylor, two pioneer doctors who together have served the Goree community 100 years.

The group spent the holiday expressing their affection and admiration during a program that consisted of a few speeches and acknowledgements, presentation of framed photographs, a barbecue picnic dinner, a skit and just plain visiting.

Both Dr. Heard and Dr. Taylor received their MD degrees from the Georgia College of Medicine and Surgery in Atlanta, in 1902. A year later Dr. Heard arrived in Goree, to be followed in 1907 by Dr. Taylor.

Since then, the two physicians have carved themselves a niche in the hearts of everyone they have served.

A number of doctors from over the state joined the Goree doctors patients, friends and neighbors in the celebration.

Local Scouts Off to National Jamboree

Monroe Thomas and W. L. Collins, Jr., left Wednesday to attend the Third National Jamboree of the Boy Scouts of America.

A total of 30 area scouts will attend the jamboree which will be held at Santa Ana, Calif., from July 17 through July 23.

The Scouts left Wichita Falls at 6 p. m. Wednesday by bus. The planned itinerary will take the group through Raton, N. M.; Pueblo, Colo., and the Royal Gorge, with an overnight stop at Grand Junction, Colo. There they will stay at Lincoln Park Auditorium, and have a swim in Mayer Pool. Then on to Salt Lake City and a swim in the Great Salt Lake. Here they will stay at the University of Utah. The next night they will stay at Yosemite National Park, and from there they will go to San Francisco where they will have a tour of the city and stay at the Treasure Island Naval Base, with supper at Fisherman's Wharf.

On July 13, the group will travel on Highway 101 along the Pacific to Santa Ana. The next day they will set up camp and on July 15 they will tour Hollywood, Griffith Observatory, Los Angeles, Farmers' Market, and visit a live TV show. The following day they will go by water buggies to Catalina Island.

The Jamboree officially opens July 17, and the Scouts from here will have a part on the opening night show. They, along with Scouts from Ft. Worth, Abilene and Oklahoma City will have the Chisholm Trail scene.

The boys will meet Scouts from 21 foreign nations as well as from all over the United States. Along with swapping, demonstrating skills, trading tall tales, and Indian Dancing, they will get acquainted with some of the outlying counties around Texas. Hollywood stars will stage the second great show of the Jamboree.

On the return trip they will visit Boulder Dam, Grand Canyon, the Petrified Forest, the Painted Desert, Gallup and Albuquerque.

POLL INDICATES MOST PEOPLE FAVOR SUPPORTS ON LIVESTOCK

Early tabulation of ballots in the poll conducted by the Herald and other hometown and county papers in Texas showed a wide difference of opinion among the voters, but the majority leaned toward price supports for livestock as well as other agricultural commodities, according to Ted Gouldy, Fort Worth Livestock Reporter, who tabulated the results.

Many marginal comments indicated the voter favored livestock support programs providing there was support on other things.

Stockmen were asked to express their views on four questions, or to submit their own views:

No. 1, I favor removal of all price supports on agriculture.

No. 2, I favor price supports on cattle, hogs and sheep, as well as on other agricultural commodities.

No. 3, I favor flexible price supports on agriculture, excluding livestock.

No. 4, I favor continuation of the present program of fixed price supports on grain, etc., but no supports on livestock.

The fifth proposal was for the reader to submit his own plan.

Averaging the total ballots received through Monday, a little over eight percent favored removal of all supports.

Some 58 percent favored supports on livestock as well as on other agricultural commodities.

A bit over 10 percent favored flexible controls.

Almost 20 percent favored the present program of rigid supports on agricultural commodities, and none on livestock.

About three percent favored their own individual plans.

One Herald reader, who favored the removal of all supports, added the note: "If you and the Good Lord can't run your own business, better sell it or give it away. Washington will get your business in a mess, just like they have theirs."

The Childress Reporter ballots were 2 to 1 in favor of supports for livestock as well as other commodities, but one voter who favored removal of all supports wrote: "Do away with all this gimmy stuff, make the rancher a loan at a cheap interest rate on long time, then expect him to pay his loan off, and most of them will be glad to meet their creditor with a smile and pay their notes."

One Foard County News ballot said stop all supports, all controls and stop all imports. Another favored purchase of 3 to 5 million cattle now. Another called for putting somebody in office who can negotiate foreign markets for our surpluses.

The Bowie Times reported that one ballot said: "Give the producer of all commodities the same guarantee that is given labor, utilities and common carriers and other businesses."

47 Orders for Emergency Feed Received by PMA

Forty-seven stockmen had ordered drought-emergency feed through the Knox County PMA office up to Wednesday afternoon, according to J. T. Gilpin, supervisor.

The orders added to three carloads of oats, one of corn, and several carloads of cottonseed meal and pellets.

At least one carload of feed was enroute to the county a week ago, Gilpin said, but has not arrived as yet.

Prices quoted for the emergency feed, a part of the government's drought-aid program, were \$1 a bushel for corn, \$1.10 for wheat, 50 cents for oats and \$35 a ton for cottonseed meal and pellets.

All applications must be passed by the county committee, which in Knox County is composed of Bill Paimeyer, county agent; T. H. Jones, chairman of the county PMA committee; W. A. Satterwhite of Seymour, area supervisor of the FHA; Jack Idol, Benjamin farmer and rancher; and W. E. Braly, Munday banker.

All applications must be made at the PMA office in Knox City, Gilpin said.

According to B. F. Vance, state director of the PMA, the feed will go only to bona fide farmers and ranchers.

However, he added, bona fide ranchers will include business men and others who had bought a few calves with the hope of putting them on the range and turning a profit, then got stuck on the break in the market.

"If they're already in it, they are eligible," he said. "But we are not going to let anyone go out and buy cattle to feed on this program." Also ineligible are commercial producers, who buy cattle and put them in a pen and feed them for sale.

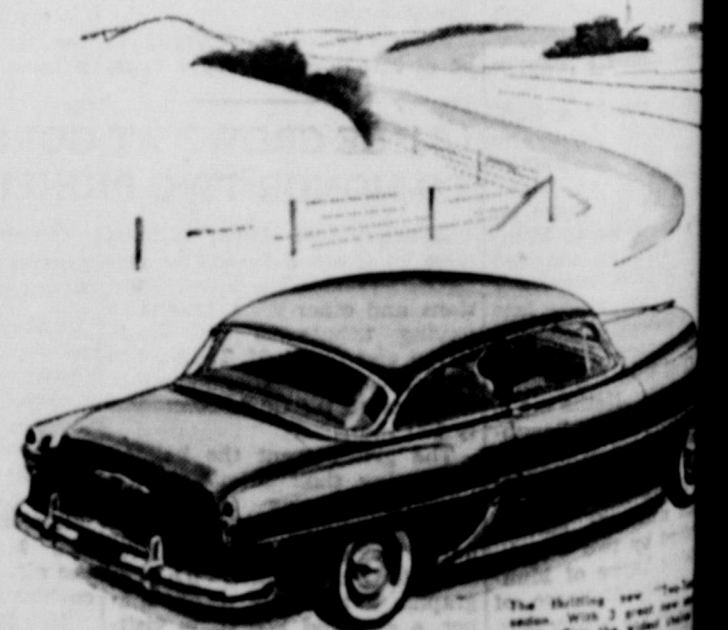

PROTECT HOME FROM INSECTS DURING VACATION. H-D AGENT ADVISES

Cleaning and spraying the house before you close it to go on vacation is a good precaution against household insect pests that otherwise may increase while you are away and cause damage or a serious control problem on your return, Mrs. Georgia Perkins, County Home Demonstration Agent, warned Knox Countians this week.

"Avoid trouble from kitchen pests by storing all food in tight containers and by leaving the entire kitchen clean and free of any traces of food," Mrs. Perkins said. "If cupboard shelves have been sprayed with a five percent DDT solution, this will kill such stray insects as the beetles or weevils that get into flour, cereal or dried fruits, especially in hot weather."

To control cockroaches or "water bugs," chlordane is more effective, the agent said. Apply a small amount of 2 percent chlordane to the baseboard behind the sink, or under the sink or refrigerator, where these insects run, but avoid using this insecticide where food or cooking utensils will be in contact with it.

Moths or carpet beetles can do a lot of damage to any untreated woollens left around the house while you are away. Even lint or bits of fur, hair or feathers can keep these insects alive. Cleaning floors, rugs and upholstered furniture by vacuum is advised to pick up such litter as well as any larvae or eggs of insects that may be in the house. The H-D agent suggests using the radiator cleaning attachment of the vacuum cleaner along cracks in the floor, baseboards, moldings, in corners and other places that are hard to get at. Protect rugs by spraying with a DDT solution and use this spray along baseboards.

The cleaning and spraying also may prevent you from being greeted on your return by a host of hungry fleas hatched during your absence from tiny flea eggs that previously had dropped off your cat or dog, Mrs. Perkins concluded.

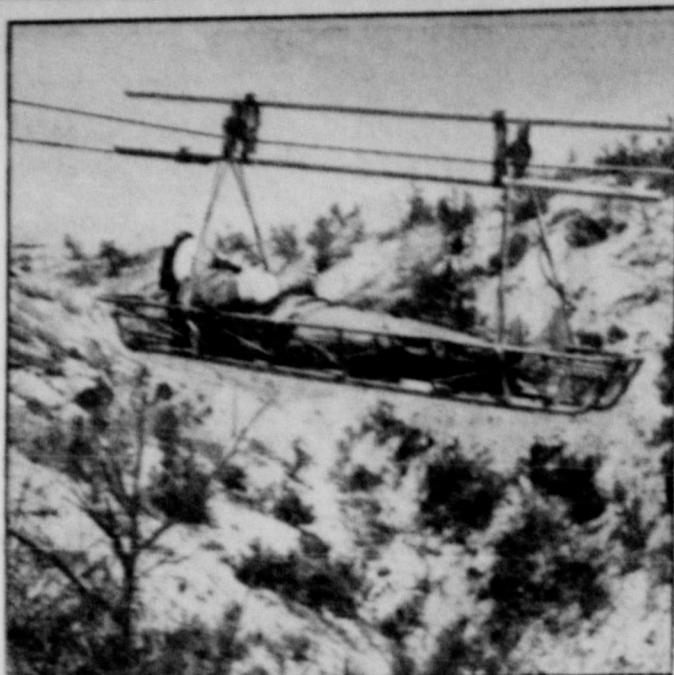

Tape Cut in Contracting for Mexican National Farm Laborers

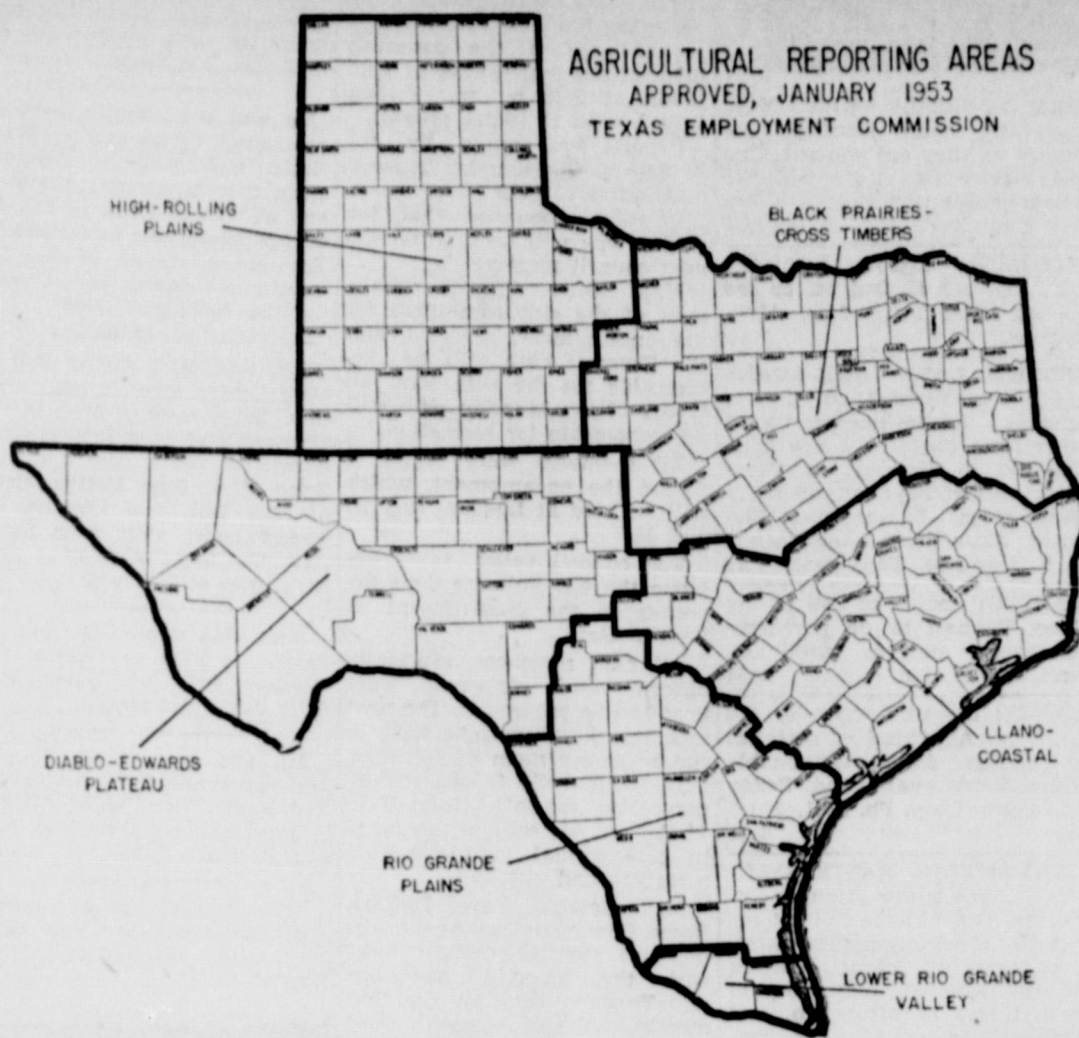
Knox County makes a contract for Mexican National farm laborers to get it harvest. The red tape snipped procedures, the Texas Employment Commission announced.

On July 1 the procedure, which took from five

to six weeks to obtain Mexican Nationals, was shortened to the extent that farmers will be able to get these workers in a week or ten days, TEC said.

Not only has much red tape been eliminated, but the farmer's cost has been reduced—from \$15 per worker to \$11 on the original contracts and from \$7.50 to \$5.50 for recontracting, the agency pointed out.

Under the old contracting procedure farmers submitted orders from 30 to 60 days in advance of actual need. This procedure worked a hardship on the farmer because information given today possibly would not be valid 60 days hence because of weather, crop conditions or some other reason. On top of all this, the order for Mexican Nationals had to be reviewed and approved by the Washington office of the Bureau of Em-



ment Security. This delay was cumbersome and irritating to the farmer. This plan has been junked for one more workable. Now, the farmer needing workers goes to an office of the Texas Employment Commission and places an order. If TEC determines that local or migratory workers are not available to do the job at the time and place specified by the farmer, then the local office will prepare an Authorization to Contract Mexican National Agricultural Workers. The farmer will then select one of three Reception Centers

—El Paso, Eagle Pass or Harlingen—where he intends to pick up his workers, and the local office of the TEC then mails the authorization to that point. The farmer then must send his check (\$11 per worker) to that Reception Center. As soon as the check is received by the Reception Center, machinery is set in motion to get the workers from the interior of Mexico. The farmer is notified by the Reception Center when the workers are available, TEC said. The farmer must also submit a "Statement of Housing

and Facilities," which describes the housing and living facilities offered. These must meet minimum standards for the number of workers he needs.

A farm employer who used Mexican Nationals in 1952 will not be required to furnish such a statement this year, provided he does not request more workers than he had in 1952. If he does need more workers than he used in 1952, a new Statement of Housing and Facilities will have to be furnished, TEC said.

As under old procedures, the workers are contracted to individual farm employers and associations on the basis of individual need. However, under the new system, allocations are made on the basis of a total agricultural area need. The state has been divided into six Agricultural Areas set up on the basis of similarity of crops grown, climatic conditions, type of soil, the traditional move-

ment of farm labor, and certain other factors. Knox County is in the area designated the High Rolling Plains.

If after determining the number of workers locally available, and migrant workers who normally flow into the area, it is found that no shortage exists, Mexican Nationals cannot be contracted in that area.

If a shortage results after taking the above facts into consideration, a ceiling or quota of Mexican Nationals will be allotted to the area sufficient to offset the shortage. Whenever crop conditions or other factors in an area create a change of 10 percent or more in supply and demand, the ceiling for Mexican Nationals will be reviewed and revised if necessary.

Knox County farmers desiring additional information concerning the contracting of Mexican Nationals should go to the nearest Texas Employment Commission office.

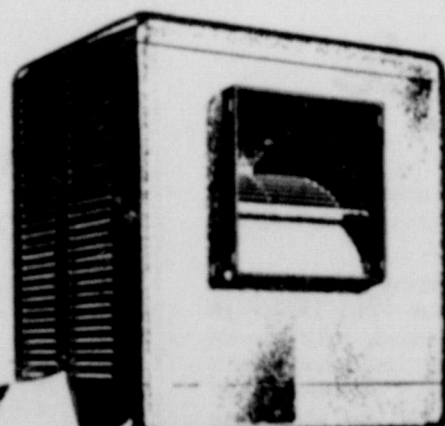
