

Close To 1,000 Take Telephone Tour Yesterday

Approximately 1,000 people saw their telephone system close-up Wednesday, and virtually all were amazed at the seeming complexity of the operation.

Their tour of two plants was part of an open house program by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company which continues today and Friday from the hours of 2 p. m. to 4 p. m. and from 6:30 p. m. to 9 p. m.

Besides seeing a variety of technical equipment in operation, visitors also had a chance to try to beat electronic Tic Tac Toe machine with no better than a chance to tie. They saw a mechanical mouse which eventually wound his way through a maze to his "cheese" and then, with unerring accuracy, hurried along his route in a perfect beeline for the bait.

Telephone employees kept the groups moving steadily along the displays of dial switches which make possible the selection of numbers; the department where phone trouble is spotted; the point where thousands of tiny pairs of wire enter the building; the generators which convert regular current into the DC needed for phone operations; big storage batteries; cable splicing; construction trucks; mobile telephones; the parts required for telephones in one house; how dial tone system helps put long distance calls into millions of homes and businesses across the nation; how business office personnel quickly located cards and service inquiries; how toll line trouble is handled; how information calls are processed.

Big Spring in 1945 had 3,236 phones; today 8,738; in 1945 had 71 employees and \$67,200 payroll; today 112 employees and \$353,000 payroll; had \$65 long distance calls per day now 1,360; had 26,127 calls and now 45,583 per day.

Remodeling Project Slated For Shopping Center On 11th Place

First unit of an extensive remodeling and construction program enlarging the Eleventh Place Shopping Center will be started soon, Jess Thornton announced today.

The \$58,000 program will result in a net increase of 10,225 square feet of floor space. One of the effects will be to provide for major enlargement of the Piggly Wiggly food store and doubling the space for Lewis & 10 store.

The initial unit is to be a new building, 50x60 feet, which will house two businesses now in the center, plus an office space. It will be located at 1002 Eleventh Place, across the street from the present center. Contract has been let to Pioneer Builders of Big Spring for the structure which will cost approximately \$15,000.

This building is to be bricked with windows and doors trimmed in redwood. The store front will be conventional with standard glass doors.

IN UNITED FRONT MOVES

New Strain In Relations
With British Is Feared

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Any initial coalition formed to deal with the war in Indochina probably will be set up without the British, and officials here fear this will impose new strains on American-British relations.

U. S. authorities said today this government would not under any circumstances cease to hope and work for an active British role in the united front which President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles are trying to create.

But present British policy bars any commitments under the outcome of the Geneva conference on an Indochina armistice is known. That may be many weeks away.

The United States, and apparently France and several other interested nations, are not willing to wait that long. If other problems can be solved, it is possible that some kind of informal coalition can be set up in the next three or four weeks.

Eisenhower told a news conference yesterday he thought that a workable united front could be arranged provided the proper Asian nations and Australia and New Zealand would join.

State Department officials are confident those qualifications can be met, once various preliminary events are out of the way.

One of these is the development of an understanding with the French as to the conditions under which the United States might intervene in the Indochina war as a member of an alliance. Another is the forthcoming election in Australia (May 28, American time), after which the Australian government may quickly harden its own policy lines.

Today, after his meeting with the National Security Council, Eisenhower was due to receive New Zealand's foreign minister, T. Clifton Webb, on his way home from the Geneva conference, to gether with Secretary of State Dulles and New Zealand's envoy here, Ambassador Leslie Knox Munro.

Operations will start at once in hopes that Landers Cleaners and the Eleventh Place Beauty Center can move into it by July 1.

Contract for remodeling and enlarging a major portion of the present center has been awarded to Tidmore Construction Company. Front of the new portion will be bricked solid from the interior but will contain two bulletin-type display windows from the exterior. Redwood trim will be maintained. The sidewalk will be widened from the present 6 to a new figure of 10 feet.

The contract for making a 60x40 addition to the 5 & 10 store has been awarded to Pioneer Builders. The enlargement will cost approximately \$13,000 and will double the space for the store. The job will be done by July 1.

Move To Slash Oil
Depletion Aid Loses

WASHINGTON (U-P) — An attempt to cut the oil and gas tax depletion allowance to 15 per cent was defeated in a closed-door session of the Senate Finance Committee yesterday, a member reported.

Oil and gas operators are allowed to deduct 27 1/2 per cent of their gross income from oil and gas properties in figuring their income tax. Supporters of the allowance say it is necessary to encourage search for oil and gas.

Eden Seeks To End
Deadlock At Geneva

GENEVA (U-P) — British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden pleaded private talks with top Communist delegates today in another try to get the deadlocked Indochina conference moving. Formal negotiations were suspended for the day.

The latest snarl was due to continued Red demands that the Communist "resistance governments" of Laos and Cambodia be invited to Geneva. The Western Big Three regard these as Communist-invented "phantom" regimes with no following and no right to representation.

Negotiations dragged to a complete standstill last night after three long secret sessions between the nine participating delegations. A proposal by Eden for a one-day "cooling off" period was accepted, and the talks were suspended until tomorrow afternoon.

Molotov invited Eden to dine with him tonight. In preparation for their talk, Eden conferred with French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault and U.S. Under Secretary of State Walter Bedell Smith.

An hour before they met, Chen called on Eden. A British source said the Chinese Communist leader was returning a call the British secretary had paid to him last week.

Political Rallies

Winton told the NAACP group that the matter would be taken under advisement and indicated a reply to its request after a legal opinion is obtained.

Alamo City Negroes
Seek Use Of Parks

SAN ANTONIO (U-P) — Representatives of San Antonio's Negro population have served notice they will seek unlimited free use of all municipal parks, swimming pools and other public recreational facilities.

A delegation from this city's branch of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People conferred yesterday with City Manager Ralph Winton and parks and recreation director Alvin Schmidt.

Reporters were present at the meeting, the first such move locally since the Supreme Court decision Monday which eliminated segregation in schools.

De Valera's
Votes Slim

DUBLIN (U-P) — Former Premier John A. Costello's coalition appeared almost certain today to tumble Prime Minister Eamon de Valera from office. Counting of ballots in Ireland's parliamentary elections entered its final phase.

De Valera's Fianna Fail (Men of Destiny) party was still the republic's largest faction, but in the voting yesterday it polled about 10 per cent under its showing in the last general election three years ago.

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'Searching' Inquiry Set Into Trade With China

Warning Against Disease Danger Voiced By Fox

Precautions against disease were urged today by Life Fox, city sanitarian, as stagnant flood water still covered the lowlands area along First and Second Streets in western Big Spring.

Immunization against typhoid is to be started at the health unit at 10 a. m. Friday.

The Red Cross still asked that victims of Monday night's flood call at the Red Cross office in the courthouse to register for emergency relief and rehabilitation.

Flood water continued to stand more than a foot deep in much of the inundated section. Jake Morgan, Red Cross disaster chairman, said the water level had dropped only about three or four inches since Wednesday morning.

Runoff was still flowing into the area from the north and west, just about equalling the volume which managed to drain away through the almost-flat channel along the T&P Railway through Big Spring.

Survey teams of the Red Cross and other agencies had not been able this morning to complete an assessment of damages, due to the water. Morgan said, however, that the flood had receded below the floor-level of some homes.

Fox warned that residents of the area should take every precaution possible to avoid infection and disease.

"Since the flood washed over a large area where many kinds of contamination exist, contact with this water could be dangerous," he asserted. "Where water is still standing, exposure to or contact should be avoided."

The sanitarian said that children in particular should be kept out of the water and not be permitted to wade in the pools and lakes.

Skin infection or more serious diseases may result, he warned.

Insecticides and germicides will be sprayed over the area as soon as it is possible to move in with equipment. Fox said. He reported that city water is safe as no breaks have occurred in lines, and any faucet which is above the water level is safe for use.

He said food supplies should be discarded from refrigerators if there is any question as to its safety. Electric and gas connections should be checked as residents move back into their homes.

The sanitarian also recommended that houses be given a thorough scrubbing with soapy water, containing a germicide.

Morgan said families in need of food, essential household furnishings, clothing, or repair of owner-occupied homes should come to the Red Cross office and make application for rehabilitation assistance.

A grant from the national Red Cross will be secured as soon as extent of needs is determined.

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TYPHOID SERUM FOR THOSE IN FLOOD AREAS

Typhoid serum is available to all those affected in the Monday night Big Spring floods, and use of the serum is strongly advised by the Big Spring-Howard County Health Unit.

The serum will be given from 10 to 12 a. m. Friday at the Health Unit offices, 209 East Second Street, under supervision of Dr. J. E. Hogan, city health officer.

The Health Unit said cooperation of all people in the flooded areas is urgently requested. The serum is deemed extremely important to prevent outbreak of typhoid.

Stassen Answers
McCarthy Blast

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Chairman Bridges (R-NH) said today the Senate Appropriations Committee will make a "searching inquiry" into the extent to which free world allies have agreed to relax bans on trade with Red China.

Bridges' plan for an investigation of this issue came after Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) told the Senate yesterday it would be "criminal folly" not to cut off U. S. financial aid to nations which ship the "sinews of military and economic strength" to the Communists.

McCarthy had barely finished his floor address before Foreign Aid Administrator Harold E. Stassen shot back with a statement

that what the senator said was "fantastic, unbelievable and untrue."

Stassen, who has tangled with McCarthy before, said, "We are steadily building for peace under President Eisenhower's leadership." And in an obvious reference to McCarthy's televised tangle with Army officials, Stassen declared, "Sen. McCarthy is frantically reaching for diversionary headlines after the sorry spectacle of his record in recent hearings."

McCarthy, in what he said was a "painful and unpleasant" discussion of Republican "shortcomings," called for the listing by Stassen of "every type of material which we have agreed that our allies can ship to our enemies."

Bridges said in an interview today that the appropriations group, which passed on foreign aid funds, "already has taken cognizance of Stassen's statements indicating a weakening of the ban on trade with the Reds."

"We will want to go into this matter very thoroughly and see that the aid we are giving, or its equivalent, is not directly or indirectly filtering into Communist hands," he said.

Stassen's statement said a full accounting of the administration's "successful administration of trade controls" was given in a report to Congress made public Sunday.

In that report Stassen portrayed free world trade with the Communist bloc as a whole as declining in 1953. While commerce with Red China crept up at least temporarily, he said, "the glittering prospect of a vast and lucrative trade which traders envisioned with the Chinese mainland 'was not materializing.'"

McCarthy told reporters his Senate speech was no "one-shot affair" — that he intends to pursue the subject further.

He said that while he disagreed with some policies, he had supported Eisenhower in 1952 and would do so "if he were running now, because I think his batting average is high."

"I am painfully aware—very painfully aware—of the facts that today's suggestions for a general plan of action by the United States in the Far East will be hailed by some as 'an attack upon the Eisenhower administration,'" McCarthy said.

"However, with the world going up in flames and our civilization facing the imminent threat of further Communist enslavement, every senator and every congressman has a duty to add whatever contribution he may have—hoping that if all suggested courses of action are freely discussed and carefully considered we may arrive at the proper solution."

The baccalaureate is set for 8:15 p. m. Sunday in the high school auditorium. The same hour will prevail for commencement on May 27.

Social Security Plan
Gets Okay Of Panel

WASHINGTON (U-P) — The House Ways and Means Committee late yesterday approved most of President Eisenhower's proposals for expanding social security coverage. And today it turned to White House requests for higher benefits, with another okay generally expected.

The committee lined up yesterday behind proposals to make more than seven million persons who are excluded now eligible for federal retirement and death benefit insurance.

Compulsory coverage was voted yesterday for about 2,600,000 farm operators and about 500,000 doctors, lawyers, dentists, engineers, accountants and other professional groups—despite strong opposition

Probe Boycott Held Not Likely

WASHINGTON (U-P) — Sen. Mundt (R-SD) voiced a "guess" today that Sen. McCarthy will not boycott re-summation of the McCarthy-Army hearings now scheduled for Monday.

Mundt had just come from a closed door talk with McCarthy, but he said this had not been discussed between them.

Riding The GRUB LINE

With Franklin Reynolds

The 3,300-acre J. Y. Robb Ranch, with 1,500 acres of this in cultivation, was one of the very first ranches in the Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District to have a conservation plan written by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service, and one of the first to complete this plan. Incidentally, it is one of the few ranch-farm operations of such acreage to complete its plan at all.

Under direction of L. H. Batton, who has been manager of the ranch for the last 10 years, the program is a very diversified one including poultry, eggs and cotton for the home lockers and for the market, and the production of feed in the form of improved grazing and silage for the livestock. This establishment, unlike most of those in West Texas, has milk cows grazing portions of the 600 acres of small grain that has been planted on the place.

Situated in the Lomax Community, southwest of Big Spring, it is completely a dryland operation without any irrigated land.

Batton is a man who plans his grazing program, for the approximately 100 head of cattle that are kept on the ranch, for a year or so in advance.

"Keep plenty of green grazing ahead for your cattle," he says, "and you will eliminate calving troubles." He takes pride in recalling that over a 10-year period he has had but two instances of calving troubles.

The bulls on the place are mainly dark-red Herefords of Caubie breeding. The cows are principally crossbred. Some of them are daughters of the milk cows, others show the blood of a Brahman bull that was on the ranch for a short while. The Hereford cross runs through them all. In the matter of straight beef production, Batton likes the crossbred cattle. He has less sickness or other physical troubles with them, he finds them thrifter, producing healthier calves and building more beef on the same amount of feed.

But the parts of the ranch of which he appears to be the proudest are his 30 acres of Blue Panic grass divided into three fields. This grass, he estimates, will carry a cow to the acre for 10 months out of the year. By providing Abruzzi rye for the other two months of grazing, he is able to give the cattle green grazing all the way around the calendar. He explains this program as one of "healthier, heavier cattle, and lower feed bills."

He plans to plant another 100 acres of Blue Panic grass this year, using seed grown on the ranch. Batton is also a great believer in trench silos and this 1954 program calls for enough Redtop Cane to fill the five silos on the place, all located near the feed pens at the headquarters. Four of these silos are of 125 tons capacity each, and the fifth will hold more than 200 tons.

"If these silos won't hold all the silage we grow," he says, "we'll dig them out deeper, or wider

or longer, or we'll build some new ones. I hope to be able to put away enough silage this year to see us through any bad years that may be ahead."

Of the 600 acres of small grain on the ranch, about half of it is Abruzzi rye, and the other half is divided between oats and barley. The ranch manager is a strong believer in Abruzzi rye, and in fact he was one of the very first in this section to plant it. When he originally decided on Abruzzi it was so little known here there wasn't any seed available in Big Spring and he had to get in a truck and go to Rising Star to get it. Since then many others have found it a very profitable crop for the area. He also grows some Hubbard and Madrid clover.

Batton not only provides small grain pasture for his cattle, but also for the 275 hens in egg production, and the 200 pullets he is growing for replacements as the older hens are culled. The poultry production program also includes broilers.

He keeps about 50 hogs on feed, most of them market barrows, but there are also some sows and pigs. Because he is raising these hogs for profit, and pork, not blue ribbons, they too are mainly crossbred.

Less than half of the 600 acres of small grain on the ranch was planted broadcast, and the balance in 40-inch rows, but this year Bat-

ton says that in seeding combine maize he is going to profit by the proof established in Experiment Farm plantings, that maize planted in 20-inch rows, instead of 40-inch rows, will yield from one-fourth to one-third more grain, and at the same time will provide more stubble to far more effectively hold the land against wind erosion, and to channel such rains as may fall down into the soil. Moreover, he comments, it will provide more organic matter for the topsoil.

The ranch is watered with five windmills and during seasons when there are rains these wells are supplemented with five lakes of fresh water. One lake on the place is too salty to be usable.

The cotton allotment on the place this year is 543 acres, all of which will be planted, Batton says. The spring rains have given the entire ranch good underground moisture, and all over the pastures young grass is appearing, indicating that grazing in the past has been so controlled that grass roots have not been killed and that seed

has been given a chance to mature. The ranch manager plans to increase the grazing capacity of his rangeland by adding plantings of King Ranch Bluestem to the native grasses already there. He also plans to do some range pitting to guarantee an increase in the soil moisture from the rains that are coming and to prevent runoff of this precious water. There are about two miles of terraces on the ranch.

To date there have been approximately 1,750 soil and water conservation plans written in the Martin-Howard SCD. The number on the Robb Ranch folder in the Soil Conservation Service files is 102. The original plan for the ranch was written Dec. 15, 1941, and has been

amended from time to time as needed. It is one of the thickest folders in the office, and a record of one of the most complete, and accomplished, farm and ranch conservation programs in the United States.

But what the visitor to this Ranch actually finds when he arrives there doesn't come as any great surprise because he has been able to anticipate something most unusual during the last mile and a half of the drive toward the headquarters occupied by Batton. As the buildings are first seen from the road running to Lomax, their appearance, even at that distance, is a hint of the well ordered layout where everything has its place and where ev-

erything is in its place—the chickens grazing their rye, the dairy cows grazing their oat field, the cattle harvesting pounds of beef from the Blue Panic; the machinery well kept and adequately housed; the premises, feed lots and all, clean, and the workers happy. There's a conservation program for everything on this ranch, not just the soil and water. Batton is also a strong worker for the conservation of wildlife.

Only one thing on the ranch has been a disappointment to Batton, and that is his crow trap. The crows fly around it, and look it over, and shriek their defiant caw-caws at it, but mighty darn few

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of them have ever gone in it. "But I'll get those pesky rascals, yet," the man who manages the place will assure you. And as the visitor makes ready to leave there is one point Batton wants thoroughly understood and this is that Batton alone isn't responsible for the carrying out of the ranch's splendid conservation program.

"I couldn't have done it," he explains, "but for the fact that Mr. Robb also believes in conservation, and that he gives me his wholehearted support in this operation." Then Batton will turn and look back toward Juan Garza, who has been with him for eight years, "and Juan deserves a lot of credit, too. I don't know how I would have gotten along without him. He doesn't speak much English, but conservation is a good story in any language. Juan can read it in our fields and pastures and our livestock. He's another believer in conservation."

Wrapped in White

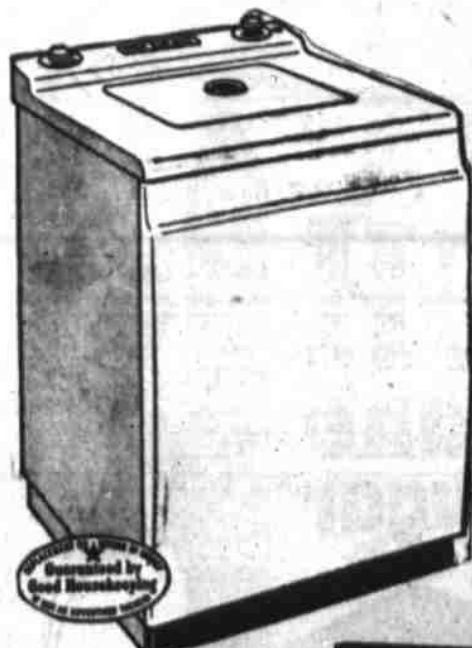

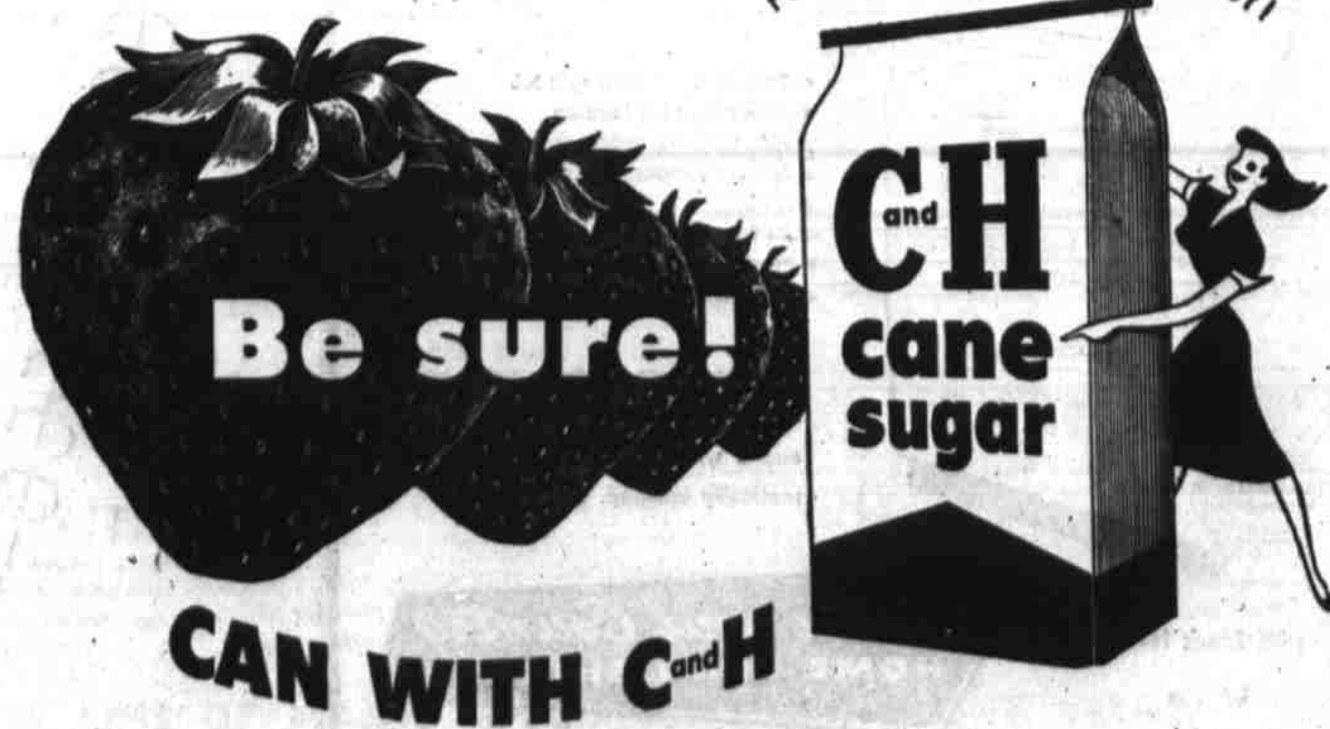

B. B. Lees has arrived to begin preparations for the citywide summer recreational program. Earlier, Grover C. Good, general secretary of the YMCA, the coordinating committee had approved Lees for the post. One other appointment had been made, that of Florence Brown, who will head up the girls' program and gym activities at the YMCA building.

Lees now is available for interviews with persons interested in supervisory work at three playgrounds during June and July.

He also announced that registrations will be received now for the first part of the summer's swimming program.

The initial session will start June 8 at the Muni Pool. In the past a number of young, seasoned swimmers have served as volunteer instructors and Lees is anxious to contact as many of these as possible.

Paul Adams, who lives five miles south of town, had some stuff up but with skips. He thinks he will replant everything except his sudan. He had about an inch of moisture. Ackerly itself had 1.3 inches.

Convertibility Of Currency Now Economically Feasible In Europe

By FRANK O'BRIEN
WASHINGTON (AP)—One of the major objectives of U.S. postwar economic diplomacy—a return to freely exchangeable currencies in international trade—is now economically possible but unlikely to take place in the immediate future.

This is the consensus here among economists dealing with the problem of persuading this nation's allies to cut currency control hobbles off their money in international trade and thereby get back to a more natural, competitive way of doing business across borders.

But the threat of large-scale western involvement in the Indochina war, according to opinion here, has stepped in to hold off any general move toward convertibility that may have been near to taking place.

Nevertheless, it was learned, steps are being taken to keep the European Payments Union—a kind of international clearing house of debts and credits for Western Europe—from cracking under the strain of big debts and big credits for another year. And, it is hoped here, before the year is out convertibility will have made the union obsolete.

The problem faced by merchants engaged in international trade is this: To make purchases in another country, they must obtain a sufficient amount of the currency of that country. They do this by exchanging for it currency of their own nation. But there are numerous restrictions on such an exchange. Free convertibility would eliminate those restrictions so that, for instance, the British merchant wishing to make purchases in the United States would have no difficulty converting pounds in his possession into dollars.

Asst. Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Overby and a number of other administration spokesmen scattered over the country making speeches on world trade this week.

World Trade Week. They put convertibility high on their list of developments which must take place if the free world, in their opinion, is to have a stable, secure economy.

Overby, whose specialty is international finance, called convertibility "the most basic" plank in President Eisenhower's foreign trade program. Overby emphasized that a big change has taken place in Europe in the past four years. He said, in a Milwaukee speech Monday:

"As we look abroad today, we

find good reason for increased hopefulness for the freer and healthier and more unified trading and financial world we want. Strange as it may seem in the face of continuing political tensions and large defense expenditures, the free world is in much improved and very good shape in purely economic terms—in levels of

production, of trade, and of real income.

Nevertheless, it was learned, opinion here is that progress toward reconvertibility has been halted until the Indochina crisis has been resolved one way or another. Also, uncertainty about the U.S. economic situation is a deterrent.

Why then, do administration spokesmen keep hammering away at the thesis that conditions have improved, economically, to the point where convertibility is a practicality?

One answer can be found in their speeches. Eisenhower administration spokesmen link convertibility to the defense of the free world. They emphasize the thesis that the United States and its allies are involved in a crisis to which no end can be seen.

And, they say, part of Russia's pressure is an attempt to force on the free world the strains of emergency.

If crisis is to be a normal way of life, they say, some way must be found that is normal and livable to deal with it. Thus, they are prepared to wait out temporary uncertainties like the present Indochina situation and the U.S. business situation. But they are reportedly prepared to insist that the objective should nevertheless be as normal an international life as possible, including commerce unfettered by currency controls.

Flood Conditions Furnish Tests For Disaster Organization Plans

Flood conditions in a small part of the city area afforded a test of disaster and relief set-ups Monday evening. While this occasion hardly could be called a "dry" run under such wet circumstances, the situation was not enough to throw the full weight of a major emergency upon the organizations.

There are a few lessons that might be taken, and doubtless there should be number which would not occur to us that would be seen readily by those who are charged with dealing with such matters. For one thing, the obvious was brought home to us, namely that disasters of any character are by nature unexpected. If this sounds elemental, then it is also fundamental that whatever machinery is employed to handle the situation must be set up well in advance and kept oiled against

the day when it will be required to move. A second, and similar point is that action is needed immediately. As in the case of people who suddenly found their homes were engulfed in water, evacuation must be made at once. Hard on the heels of this, provision must be made available then for emergency shelter, clothing and rations as well as for medical attention if required.

A third consideration is that control and cooperation are urgent. Hundreds of people could rush into an emergency situation and create confusion and chaos instead of doing good unless they go with a knowledge of a job to be done. Under the circumstances the Salvation Army, Red Cross, civil defense, National Guard, peace officers and others did a splendid job. We commend them for it; we also commend the idea of an evaluation of organization and coordination in light of a real test.

Evacuation Offer Turned Out As Suspected—A Diabolical Trick

Those hep Americans who suspected a trick of some kind in the Communists' almost eager agreement to permit France to airlift some 750 French Union wounded from the French front in the first place, it was a trick, as diabolical as any Communist shell-game artist ever thought up. For weeks while the battle raged the French sought vainly for permission to remove its more seriously wounded from Dien Bien Phu so they could be given adequate medical treatment. The Reds rejected all such pleas. But when the place fell, the Reds readily assented.

Now the world knows the reason why. The Reds wanted time in which to reorganize the besieging forces and send them unhampered along a 70-mile jungle road at the end of which lay the upper reaches of the great Red River valley and a clear course to important French positions at the valley's other end.

This movement of the victorious Red army began at once. So did the removal of the French wounded, by helicopter and light plane. But quickly it became apparent this method of rescue was unworkable because the battle-torn runways and land-

ing strips of Dien Bien Phu were unusable. The French asked the Reds to permit repairs sufficient to speed up the airlift of wounded; the Reds said no, while continuing the shift of troops toward the great strategic valley.

Only eleven wounded had been taken from the battlefield when this showdown came. The bulk of the withdrawing Red army was safely across the 70-mile stretch of road which the French might have been subjected to heavy aerial attack, but weren't because they kept their word.

The French delivered an ultimatum: Repair the landing strips, or road-strafing would begin. The ultimatum expired at midnight Monday, and the French sent everything they had against the now almost empty road—to late to accomplish much by way of stopping the withdrawing Reds.

So the 750 French Union seriously wounded, plus several hundred more less seriously in need of medical attention, rot and waste away at Dien Bien Phu, the victims of a Communist trick.

The Reds even refused a French offer to give their own wounded at Dien Bien Phu the medical care they needed.

Things Go Faster In Indochina Than In Geneva And Washington

The main cause of the confusion in Allied policy is that the actual situation in Indochina is, as military writers say, so fluid. The French policy, which the United States has been supporting, which Britain had an important part in forming, broke down suddenly and unexpectedly after the Berlin and before the Geneva conferences. It has been impossible to improvise a new policy amidst the ruins of the old one.

The military strategy of the old policy was the Navarre Plan—which ended in the blunder and disaster of Dien Bien Phu. The political foundation of the policy was the government headed by His Majesty Bao Dai, who spends much more of his time with his family who are living in Southern France than with his army which he has rarely if ever visited.

The military and the political structure of the old policy was already crumbling ominously before such important French Union forces were trapped at Dien Bien Phu. But the crumbling has become a disintegration as that battle disclosed—apparently to the surprise of the French Intelligence—that the Viet Minh had formed a powerful, organized army with more divisions than it was supposed to have and with arms it was not supposed to have supplied by Red China. When we say today that the situation is fluid, we mean that the disintegration is continuing and that we do not know how far it will go.

What we do know is, as I heard someone say the other day—things are moving faster in Indochina than in Geneva and faster in Geneva than in Washington.

The fluidity of the situation explains why the declarations of Western policy are so confusing. Always assuming that it is necessary to make public declarations of policy on an average of about two a week, the trouble with the declarations is that they tend to be overrun by events. And, as the situation in Indochina is shrouded in the fog of war, as no clear and reliable picture of what is going on is obtainable by the public, we did not become surprised at the general bewilderment.

But it is, I believe, reasonable to sup-

pose that the crucial practical problem is how and where the disintegration of the French-Viet Nam position can be stopped. The outer perimeter in the Red River region, which was established by Gen. De Lattre de Tassigny, appears to have held, and the character of the fighting around the city of Hanoi raises the question as to whether a line can be held beyond the perimeter at the port of Haiphong. Mr. Thomas J. Hamilton's dispatch from Geneva on Monday spoke of "military talks to discuss what the United States could do... if a military disaster threatened in Indochina." The military disaster that could threaten might involve the situation of the French Union Army, with the possibility of a kind of Indochinese Dunkirk.

The plight of the French is bound to make it very tempting for the other side to refuse an armistice until they have harvested all the profits, military and political, of the breakdown of the French policy. But the Soviet Union must know that there are grave risks in not concluding the Indochinese war while it still can be dealt with locally by an armistice with the French government.

The best prospect of arranging such an armistice would lie, one might suppose, in a firm commitment that the French forces will be withdrawn when there is a political settlement that has an international guarantee—coupled with Anglo-American representations that they will not stand aside and allow a forced and catastrophic withdrawal of the French forces.

This is a long way from the promise of a victory for Bao Dai over Ho Chi Minh, and there is no way to make it appear as a victory. The French had lost the war in Indochina, not because they were not brave but because they have failed to win the confidence and support of the Viet Nam people, and more precisely of the elite who would have to be the officers of the Viet Nam army and the officials of the government.

Nobody that I have heard of thinks that we could now enter the war the French have lost and win it in their place. That is why, I take it, Sen. Knowland and Sen. Ferguson are saying that they are opposed to sending the American Army in to Indochina. It would be like, said Sen. Knowland on Sunday, "trying to cover an elephant with a handkerchief; you just can't do it."

What we may be able to do is to give our support—not too obviously—to the negotiation of an armistice which provides for the eventual military withdrawal of the French forces but averts a military disaster to that army, and a political disaster to the Viet Nam people to whom the French owe protection. This would mean reducing the Western objectives from what is now unattainable—namely the victory of Viet Nam over Viet Minh—and taking a stand on ground where the results, if we are cautious and prudent and firm and cool, need not be unacceptable. These terms—unattainable and unacceptable—are, of course, the President's own. We are at the point where we must find the ground between the unattainable victory of Bao Dai and the unacceptable disaster of an Indochinese Dunkirk.

Trying To Keep Up With Investigation Of McCarthy-Army Row No Easy Task

WASHINGTON (U)—Even Thurston the magician would get eyestrain trying to watch the rabbit to see what hat it was in in the Senate investigation of the Army-McCarthy fight.

The hearings, which started April 22, seemed all but dead last Monday after they were shut down for a week. They're supposed to start up again next Monday. That's no sure bet.

The inquiry began as an attempt to find out who was lying—Secretary of the Army Stevens and his aides or Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) and his aides—in their bushel basket of charges and countercharges. But now McCarthy says that from his viewpoint "the all-important thing is the motive—who started this, who is responsible for the Army charges."

After some confusion on who did start it, Stevens yesterday said he was responsible. He'll probably have to repeat that under oath. If and when he does, McCarthy may say he's still not convinced. If he insists finding the motive takes precedence over finding the truth or falsity of the charges, he may use it as a reason for walking out without testifying.

No one yet has explained how the Senate subcommittee making the investigation could force McCarthy to testify or even attend the inquiry if he didn't want to. He couldn't be arrested and brought in.

McCarthy is in Washington on Senate business. And under the Constitution no senator can be arrested while serving as a senator except for treason, a felony or a breach of the peace. However, he has never said he wouldn't testify, and he has taken the stand once briefly already.

Yet after all this time only two of the main witnesses—Stevens and Army Counselor John G. Adams—have been called on for full testimony and neither of them has finished yet.

Four main witnesses remain to be called: McCarthy; his subcom-

mittee's chief counsel, Roy M. Cohn; his chief of staff, Francis P. Carr; and H. Struve Hensel, assistant secretary of defense.

Before they ever finish, if the hearing lasts that long, squads of other witnesses undreamed of now may be pulled into the case.

Nevertheless, Sen. Mundt (R-SD), acting subcommittee chairman who said the hearings will begin again Monday, predicted they'd wind up in about 10 days after that.

That may turn out to be as dreamy as the predictions made before the hearings started the first time: that they'd be over in 10 days or two weeks.

This investigation has taken strange twists and turns, including the many hours lost by the investigating senators in their search for a way to save time. The strangest came when President Eisenhower got into the picture.

He refused—on the constitutional grounds that the Senate had no right to nose into private conversations among his advisers—to let

the Senate subcommittee question some of those advisers.

Adams said he had talked with them about alleged improper pressures from McCarthy's office, and was advised to list them in writing. The chronology later grew into the Army charges now before the senators.

McCarthy cried, in effect: "Who really pulled the strings? Did Stevens and Adams and Hensel make the charges against me and my staff on their own or were they pushed into it? Whom am I fighting here?"

The other senators said that was a good question. They wanted to find out, too, and suspended the hearings last Monday to see if Eisenhower could be persuaded to let them question his advisers.

He still said no yesterday and Stevens jumped in to say the Army alone was responsible for the charges. It was after hearing this that McCarthy, perhaps not convinced, said the motive behind the charges was the main point.

"Work has always been the real hobby of sensible men. The closer I get to retirement the less my daily routine looks like a rut, and the more it looks like a friendly bomb shelter. I even hate to tear the page off my desk calendar anymore. It depresses me."

Juggling The Clock Saves Time, But Makes For Much Confusion

For William Willett to use up all the time he has "saved," he'd have to live for millions of years.

Willett is the man who first dreamed up the "daylight saving time" arrangement for running clocks up an hour every summer in many sections of the country.

The digit jugglers estimate that his idea annually "saves" more than eight billion man-hours of daylight. It also has caused some confusion, especially since some areas simply ignore the daylight saving plan while others go ahead running their clocks back and forth.

Where time is kept on different schedules in closely associated areas, the confusion is compounded.

Willett, who lived in Chelsea, England, came out with his time-saving proposal in 1907. He called it—and the English still do—"British summertime."

Britain and much of continental Europe adopted the practice of running clocks an hour ahead early in the summer to take advantage of early sunlight. In World War II, both Germany and the Allies op-

erated on "summertime," although the U. S. called it daylight saving time.

The practice increased industrial output and conserved great quantities of electric power which would have been used to make light, if factories and homes should have continued on the old schedules.

In this country, daylight saving time was abandoned until the advent of World War II when Americans again found it necessary to save. Currently, the nation is just about evenly divided on the time question during summer months.

City dwellers mostly favor the saving time idea. They get off their jobs in the afternoon with several hours of daylight remaining, with time to fish, garden, shoot a few holes of golf or play with the kids. Farm folks are taken advantage of, however.

They usually work until dark anyway, and getting up an hour earlier just makes the days that much longer. Besides, the cows and chickens go right on waking up at dawn, regardless of what the clock says.

'McKinleyism' Might Restore Common Sense To American Life

The quips of Harry Truman may, in his old age, establish the most recent ex-president as a sharp phrase-maker. Most recently he invented the term, "Creeping McKinleyism," which apparently is to offset the term, "Creeping Socialism," invented by another ex-president, Herbert Hoover. Perhaps this is to be the era of the creeps.

McKinleyism is an indefinable term. William McKinley was president during a prosperous period in American history when "the full dinner pail" was a slogan and "the eight-hour day" a demand. It was a time of sound money based on the gold standard when wages were not too high and Andrew Carnegie could look upon \$50,000 a year as a great income. It was a period of enormous developments in industry and commerce in this country.

McKinley was president from 1897 to 1901 when he was assassinated and a nation wept. His had been a prosperous era, following the depression of the Cleveland administration. Even the New Dealers ought to say a word for McKinley because government employment rose from 192,000 to 256,000 during his administration. Government receipts rose from \$347,721,000 to \$567,685,000 and there were no punitive income taxes, no devastating inheritance taxes.

The government debt was trifling, never rising much over \$1,000,000. The expenditures of government were also comparatively small, only reaching \$600,000,000 during the year after the limited Spanish American War.

The population was a rising one, increasing during the period between 1897 and 1901 from 72,000,000 to 77,000,000. The flow was still from East to West, from the seaboard cities to the open spaces. Immigration from European countries continued to be large, although it did not reach the enormous mass migrations of the next decade. During the McKinley years, 1,708,336 immigrants came to the United States from Europe. It was then that the large immigrations from Italy really began, reaching 100,000 in 1900. Immigration from Russia, largely Jewish, began to reach sizeable proportions in the McKinley era.

New industries came into existence. In fact, it was during the McKinley administration that the typical enormous American corporation appeared, often as an amalgamation of existing small and non-

Integrated industries. The non-war-induced industry witnessed its sharpest rise during the administration of William McKinley.

Money and business do not altogether reflect the status of the individual. Are human beings happier on the gold standard than when they are living on depreciated currency? Those who think in terms of the mass, seek for what they call an average man. There is none such. It can be said that during the McKinley administration those engaged in the ownership or management of business, that is, banking in its numerous forms, manufacturing, transportation or the distribution of goods, enjoyed unusual opportunities for self-advancement, for the accumulation of wealth and social status. Such people lived in what has come to be known as the "Gay Nineties" and enjoyed it. Their number was on the constant increase, the recruitment being largely from the farming and white collar elements, although many artisans advanced themselves.

The farmers were troubled by the scarcity of money and their dependence upon New York financing to move the crops. Modern means of agriculture were just asserting themselves; the automobile was not yet a general commodity and good roads were unknown. The Democratic party, particularly in the Middle West, was being saved by a radical concept, Populism, which might be described as a conservative New Deal.

The worker was just beginning to be organized in what was then called "trade unions," a non-socialistic, voluntary form of labor union which developed into the great American Federation of Labor led by the conservative Samuel Gompers. Eugene V. Debs, on the other hand, strove for socialist labor unionism similar to that in European countries and made little progress. The objective of labor was a dollar a day for an eight-hour day, if they could get it.

For most workers, life was tough, particularly for the immigrant groups, but as all of them came from countries where life was very much tougher and the standards much lower, these workers actually felt that they had improved their lot by coming to the United States.

The current era in which we live really begins with McKinley. Who knows? It may end in the Indochina War. "Creeping McKinleyism" may be a restoration of a common sense reappraisal of American life.

Reds Setting Stage To Drive America Into Full Isolation

GENEVA — A month ago Secretary of State John Foster Dulles made his sudden dramatic trip to London and Paris to propose a Southeast Asia defense pact. He believed at the end of that four-day intensive series of consultations that he had gained assent from America's principal allies to go ahead and lay the groundwork as rapidly as possible for an agreement that would call into being defense forces in the same pattern as the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

A series of disillusionments has followed, and it is important to try to appraise the American position in the light of what has happened in a period that has seemed at times to bring the Western alliance close to the breaking point. Dulles' motive was to build a position of strength for bargaining purposes at Geneva.

It is impossible to predict what the American position will be a month from now, but with good luck the strenuous efforts being put forward in a half-dozen capitals will have borne fruit and the framework of a defense pact will be in place. At the very least this will make it possible to draw a defense line for Southeast Asia and put the Communists on notice that crossing the line means war.

Again with good luck, and it will have to be very good luck indeed, a part of Indochina would be included within this defense perimeter and the three Associated States, their independence assured under a respectable armistice reached at Geneva, would be members of the pact. This kind of luck depends on the capacity of the Laniel government, which has just had a squeaky escape from extinction, to carry out measures to strengthen the French position.

The British are still saying they will not agree to any sort of pact, either political or military, until further exploration here shows whether peace can be

reached by negotiation. And the Americans are nevertheless going ahead to recruit support with or without the British.

If the worst should happen in the next month, then the position of the United States and the free world will be gravely imperilled. The Communist conquest of Indochina will have advanced to the stage at which a desperate appeal to save French lives will be the final cry. Already, according to reports from Washington, the French government has asked how America would respond to such an appeal. From Hanoi come reports that Communist irregular battalions are taking to the field with equipment and apparently, according to long prearranged plans, much faster than had been anticipated.

Under such circumstances wavering Asian nations could hardly be expected to lend their support to a defensive pact. British left-wing opposition would be even more adamant than it has been in the recent past.

If this seems a long and ominous look into the future it must never be forgotten that Communism plays not for next year or the next election but for 50 years and 100 years hence. American officials trying to look realistically at this grim moment of peace believe the Russians are in fact driving for a diplomatic political showdown that could result in forcing America back into isolation.

The little brown men throwing themselves in fanatical waves against French strongpoints in the jungle 10,000 miles away are pawns on this vast and terrifying chess board. So are the neutralists and those who live in tragic and quite understandable dread of another war with weapons of immeasurable force. There is no use disguising the fact that today in this struggle America is at a great disadvantage. To falter, to fall apart in further disunity would be to let the game go by default.

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Infielder Asks Showdown With Owner Of Phillies

Star Resents Being Trained

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Second baseman Grady Hamner of the Philadelphia Phillies demanded a showdown with owner Bob Carpenter today over what he termed "Gestapo tactics" of having players trailed by a private detective.

Hamner disclosed yesterday he had hired a private detective to check on the aftergame habits of some of his players. The owner spoke up after a private investigator was arrested Tuesday night when Hamner reported to police he was being trailed.

"I resent this and I intend to do something about it," the 27-year-old player said today. "This sort of treating me and other ball players like two-year-olds is going to wreck our club. We can win the pennant. We have a better team than in '50 when we won."

"But this uncalculated Gestapo tactic will ruin our chances if they're not cut out right away," Hamner asserted.

The second baseman, who came to the Phillies in 1944 as a 17-year-old recruit and developed into one of the National League's top infielders, was bitter about the incident.

Sitting in his North Philadelphia home with his pretty wife, Shirley, the Richmond, Va., native poured out his feeling about being trailed by a private detective to see if he went to bed on time.

"I'm a ballplayer," he said. "I make \$25,000 a year. I've got seven or eight good years ahead of me. I keep myself in shape and never, at any time, has it been necessary to have me followed by a private detective."

Carpenter said yesterday it was a normal major league procedure to keep tabs on players by means of private investigators. He added that he had been using this tactic for a number of years. He said he wanted a baseball team physically and mentally prepared to face the rigors of a major league pennant race.

"I want to be cleared of the implications and inferences that have been followed shows something wrong in a person's private life," Hamner said.

"I know I am of some value to the team. If what I have to say means they're going to trade me, I'm going to speak my piece. I don't like this sort of stuff."

Hamner already has felt the reaction of the episode. The barbs of sharp-tongued fans and some of the bench jockeys on the opposition—the Milwaukee Braves last night—opened up on him. He went hitless in four times at bat and dropped to second place in the National League batting average race with .365.

Several fans shouted, "Who's trailing you tonight, Grady?" "Going out on the town after the game?"

Meanwhile, Charles Leland, 36, of St. Georges, Del., an investigator for the Brandywine Investigative Agency in Wilmington, was held in \$500 bail for a further hearing Monday by Magistrate William Hagan on charges of violating the firearms act. Leland is the investigator arrested by police on Hamner's report. A revolver and a target pistol were found in Leland's car.

The story "broke" yesterday afternoon when it was revealed Leland had been taken in custody on Hamner's complaint someone followed him home from the Phillies' ball park after the Tuesday night game.

Hamner said he left Connie Mack Stadium, climbed into his gray Cadillac and drove off a parking lot. He told the cops he observed another car following closely.

Yankees Wind Up Good Road Trip

The world champion New York Yankees came home today from a triumphant Western tour during which they beat the strongest teams in the American League on their home grounds 8 out of 10 times.

With a dozen games immediately ahead against the Eastern tailenders, this looks like the big Yankee push to the top.

The champs are one game behind Cleveland at the moment, but now it's the Indians' turn to take on the Western powers. New York is the only team in what the American League calls East—Baltimore is West—above sixth place.

On the invasion just ended New York was the only traveling team with anything like a winning record. Washington won 3 of 9; Boston, 2 of 10; and Philadelphia, 1 of 8.

The Western teams showed the power in the National League too, but here they were the invaders instead of the home teams. Three of the four broke even or better in the East.

The St. Louis Cardinals jumped from fourth to first with a 6-3 record. They have a single Eastern game left tonight as they stop off in Pittsburgh for a makeup contest with the Pirates.

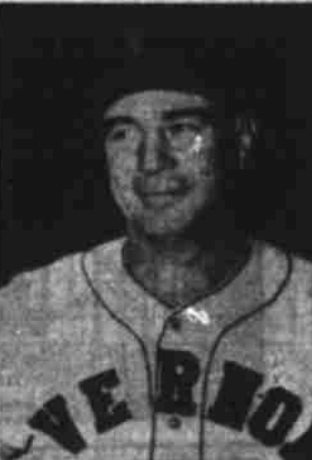
Milwaukee also won 6 of 9 and moved from seventh to fourth. The Chicago Cubs broke even at 5-5. Only Cincinnati faltered, losing 6 of 9.

With the teams traveling, just one other game in addition to the Cards-Pirates encounter is on tonight's schedule. The New York Giants open a five-game set at Philadelphia.

St. Louis grabbed the National League lead yesterday on the combination of a 3-0 victory over the Giants and defendants for Brooklyn and the Phillies. The Cubs swamped the Dodgers, 9-3, with all nine runs coming in the eighth inning. Milwaukee defeated Philadelphia, 6-2. Pittsburgh shaded Cincinnati, 3-2.

The Yankees made it two straight over the White Sox, 3-2. Cleveland won its seventh in a row, 5-3, over Boston. Baltimore beat Washington, 5-3, and Detroit edged the Athletics 4-3.

Vic Raschi, branded as too complacent to stick with the Yankees this season, pitched his first National League shutout and his fifth consecutive victory for the Cardinals. He retired the last 15 Giants in order after giving up five in-

Uncertainty Grips Horse Owners In Preakness

BALTIMORE (AP)—Ring King, a Raggedy Ann little colt even to the trainer who made him whatever he is, typifies entries being made today for Saturday's Preakness in the face of knowledge that the formidable Correlation and Hasty Road already are down to start.

Trainer Tommy Kelly is full of doubt that Ring King belongs in such a high-calibre race as the \$100,000 middle leg of the triple crown. But there's only one way to find out for certain and that's to try, Kelly admits. This is the attitude of almost all the others who will pay \$500 today to enter.

This is the first time in recent history of the Preakness that horses have been entered before the regular opening of the entry box on the day before the race. Scratch time for the race is 5 p.m. Friday.

Robert S. Lytle, owner of Correlation, and Allie Reubens, owner of Hasty Road entered their favorites yesterday. So did Howard A. Jones with For Free and Sunny Blue Farm's Admiral Porter.

Still expected to dare to come in besides Ring King are Maine Chance Farm's Jet Action, Woodmac Farm's Haseyama, Joe W. Brown's Gigantic and maybe T. A. Sena's Nirgal Lad and E. M. O'Brien's Galdar.

Some of the excitement is that after the first prize of around \$80,000 there is \$25,000 for second, \$15,000 for third and \$7,500 for fourth. Mrs. Ada L. Rice put up the equivalent of fourth prize money just to make Ring King eligible and pay another \$1,000 to enter and start.

It all seemed worthwhile after trainer Kelly suddenly began making Ring King tick. Last year, Ring King failed to race because he had a funny leg action that suggested knee trouble.

Kelly, a 35-year-old native of Pikesville, Md., became trainer for the Rices last November. In January, they sent him Ring King in Florida and told him, "Either make him run or break him down."

"I did what the boss told me," relates Kelly. "I made him run. Every time the colt went on the race track I had the exercise boy carry a stick."

At first nothing appeared to result. Ring King ran three times and failed to win. Then he came north to Laurel and won three straight, including two stakes, the Cherry Blossom and Chesapeake.

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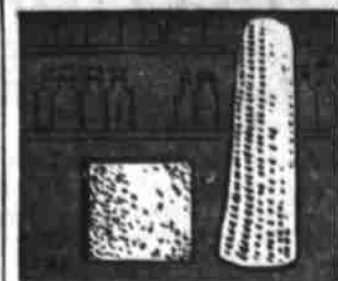
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UNCLE RAY'S CORNER



At left of big corn cob is a square of insulating material, one product of corn cobs.

While speaking about the value of corn as food for people, I might have added popcorn to the list, also the cornflakes which go into boxes of breakfast food.

In addition to corn bread, the meal of corn is employed for mush, scrapple, fritters and several other kinds of food. After special treatment, the kernels of corn can be turned into hominy.

Corn sugar, also called dextrose, is obtained from corn. Other products include oils which go into some salad dressings and play a part in making oleomargarine.

The starch of the grain is made into a white powder called corn-

starch, and this is used in baking. In the laundry, some kinds of clothing are stiffened with starch. Much laundry starch, but not all of it, comes from corn.

Scores of uses have been found for the parts of corn plants, quite aside from the grain. Corn cobs are burned as fuel by some farmers, and chemical firms take chemicals from them. One chemical is used in making a kind of resin which goes into many phonograph records.

Chemists also use the cobs to provide lignin, cellulose, acetic acid and carbon. Useful insulating materials also come from corn cobs.

The leaves of corn have been employed in making low-cost mattresses, and as material for packing. The stalks supply material for some wallboards. Both stalks and leaves are turned into paper for paper bags.

Corn is a native of the New World. Nothing was known about it in Europe 500 years ago.

While Columbus was in the West Indies, he learned that the Indians raised "a sort of grain known as maize." This grain was Indian corn, which now grows every continent where people live.

A U. N. announcement last night said Pfeiffer's appointment had been withdrawn. Presumably Dr. Hans E. Rießer, present West German observer, will continue in the post.

The Jewish Labor Committee of New York and Rep. Javits (R-N.Y.) were among those who protested after Pfeiffer's appointment was announced last February.

Pfeiffer held diplomatic posts under the Nazis in Prague, Moscow, Paris and Rome. He was classified after the war as only a nominal member of the party, who joined to hold his government job.

GOP Solon Gives Truman Due Credit

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass. (U.P.)—Here's one Republican who wants to give Democratic former President Harry Truman "credit for trying up the Communists for three years in Korea."

Rep. Walter Judd (R-Minn.), chairman of a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on the Far East and a onetime medical missionary in Asia, told the Massachusetts Federation of Women's Clubs convention last night:

"If the Communists hadn't gotten tied up in Korea they would have gone directly to Indochina and, by this time, they would have it. During the Korean War, the truth of communism leaked out."

Isle Bases Are Kept Ready, If Unmanned

By WILLIAM J. WAUGH

PEARL HARBOR (U)—Western Pacific islands form America's front-line defense against communism in the Pacific today but the only guns you find there are the rusted relics left by a beaten Japan.

The reason is the old military dictum that the best defense is a good offense.

Millions of dollars are being poured into key islands but it isn't being spent on shore defenses or combat troops.

In nearly a month of travel from the Marshalls north to the Bonin Islands I didn't see one shore-based fighter plane or infantry unit.

These islands once bristled with shore guns of an imperialistic Japan. America uses them today as military transport airports and supply depots.

On Kwajalein, for instance, the 6,500-foot airstrip on the 2 1/2-mile-long island is a major link in our military global air route.

The only planes operating from Kwajalein today are patrol craft. The only guns are small arms.

Guam, obviously the key island in the central Pacific defenses, has many shore guns—but all rusting weapons put there by the Japanese during World War II.

Only two of Guam's airfields—Anderson Air Force Base and Agaña—are operational. Oroquieta and Harmon fields have

been abandoned but the strips are usable.

Tinian, with its two huge air-ports, is virtually unmanned from a military standpoint. Two enlisted men are there.

But those airports—one with 10,000-foot runways from which the Hiroshima and Nagasaki A-bombs were flown—are immediately usable.

Salipan has only a small force, about 100 men.

Two Jims is named by the Air Force. But the force, except for one plane used in air-sea rescue work, is entirely maintenance.

Military planes use it as a stopping place on transoceanic flights.

As long as there's peace in the Pacific no larger weapons are needed. If war should come, the United States plans to be swinging so hard and so fast it won't have to worry about island invaders.

Atomic Scientists Attack Oppenheimer's Suspension

CHICAGO (U)—The Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists lashed out today at the government's suspension of the security clearance of Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer as "a

breach of faith."
The Bulletin, sponsored by a number of scientists who pioneered development of the atomic bomb, took the unprecedented step of adding 16 pages to its May edition for a thorough discussion of the Oppenheimer case.

Nearly two score of Oppenheimer's colleagues or friends, expressed faith in his integrity and loyalty.
Oppenheimer is chairman of the Bulletin's Board of Sponsors.

Oppenheimer, who guided the work of scientists contributing to the development of the A-bomb, was denied further access to classified material on the ground he associated with Communists in the early days of World War II and later opposed development of the hydrogen bomb.

The Bulletin's editorial board said in an editorial:
"It seems to us a breach of faith on the part of the government to call upon a man to assume such heavy responsibilities in full knowledge of his life history and then, after he has demonstrably done his best and given the most valuable services to the nation to use the facts to cast aspersions on his integrity."

Gambler Acquitted In Kidnaping Case

PORTLAND, Ore. (U)—A Circuit court jury decided last night that Jimmy Valentine, 41-year-old gambler, was not the man who tried to kidnap 9-year-old George Brice III last March.

Valentine was declared innocent after insisting it was a case of mistaken identity.

He and four friends testified he was in his apartment at the time the kidnap attempt was made.

Witnesses for the prosecution had testified Valentine was the man who tried, but failed, to snatch the son of a wealthy Portlander from an exclusive school.

The man had forced the boy's mother and her maid to accompany him to the school. There teachers held doors against him, and the gunman fled.

Filipino Solons Want To End Their Senate

MANILA (U)—Angry congressmen sought a constitutional amendment last night to abolish the Senate but Speaker Jose B. Laurel Jr. persuaded them to lay their resolution on the table.

The representatives charged that the Senate had blocked passage of several vital House bills.

"Interlegislative conflicts," the resolution said, "have resulted in the mutilation of legislative measures and in horse trading."

Woman Sues, Saying 'Falsies' Did Damage

DALLAS (U)—A woman sued a variety store for \$2,800 yesterday, charging she had been "burned" by a set of "artificial rubber bust forms."

She claimed the articles contained chemicals which became soluble when she perspired and caused her to become "poisoned, burned and injured."

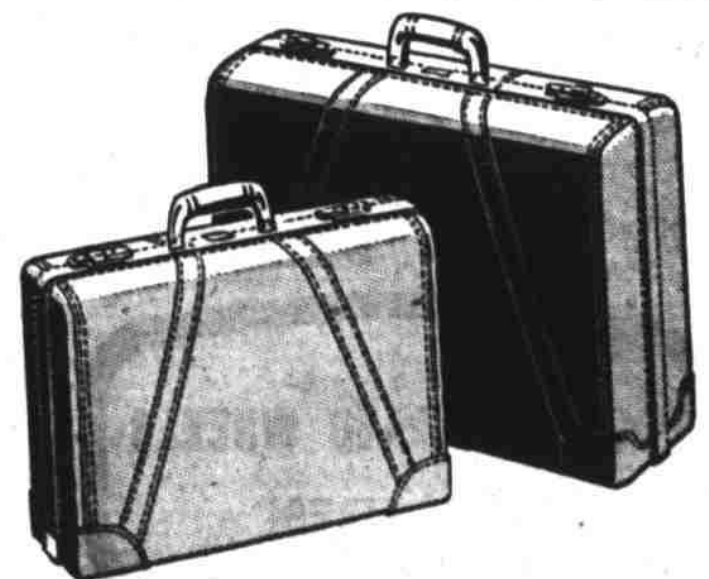

Chiang Kai-Shek In New Term As Formosa's Leader

TAIPEH, Formosa (U)—Chiang Kai-shek began his second term as president of Nationalist China today with a call for more military and moral support and a strong alliance of anti-Communist Asian nations.
Inauguration day was a festive occasion on this Nationalist island despite the threat of Communist air attack from the nearby Red-held mainland.

Thousands of exploding firecrackers provided a noisy background as Chiang and Vice President Chen Cheng took the oath of office in a city hall built during the Japanese occupation.
In a brief inauguration address Chiang declared that his Nationalist army could recover the mainland of China if given a "reasonable amount of moral and material support from the free world and an adequate supply of the implements of war."
He also called on all Asian nations facing a threat of Red invasion to "establish on the Communist periphery a strong collective organization capable of collective action."
Chiefs of all diplomatic missions here were in the audience. Also attending was U. S. Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and top American military and diplomatic representatives in Taipei.
Conspicuously absent was the President's wife who is in a San Francisco hospital undergoing treatment for a skin disorder.

CHARLOTTE, N. C. (U)—Larry Williams lost his wallet containing \$160 in cash and a \$400 diamond ring he planned to give to his girl.
Someone tossed the wallet, which contained Williams' business address, through his office door yesterday. The money was gone but the ring was still there.
But Williams said today he can't marry his girl without any money.

DALLAS (U)—Southern Union Gas Co. stockholders were told at their 1954 meeting yesterday the firm netted its biggest annual earnings last year, \$2,597,900.

Hoblitzelle Rural Award Presented To Cotton Farmer

RENNER, Tex. (U)—A young Fayette County cotton farmer who built a worn-out debt-ridden 180 acres into a fertile expanse won the \$5,000 Hoblitzelle Award for advancement of Texas rural life last night.

The award was presented Clinton Harbers, 32, at an open house of the Texas Research Foundation in observance of its 10th anniversary. The foundation in this community north of Dallas does research in soil, grasses and crops.
Harbers won his prize by fighting a worn-out farm and burdensome debts for seven years. He fought with sound farming principles.
He started 1947 with 180 acres near LaGrange that he had bought with a 100 per cent Farmers Home Administration loan. The farm had grown cotton and corn 51 years. It yielded only 118 pounds of lint cotton per acre.
The soil fertility has been restored almost to that of virgin soil. Harbers has done this through use of legumes and crop rotation.

TV Owners Demand Fast Repair Service

By CLIFTON LAWHORNE

When a television set goes on the blink in Big Spring, the owner expects it to be repaired in time for the evening programs—if not sooner.

"Immediate service is the demand, and TV owners want their sets repaired yesterday," said Dick Hooper, a local television repairman for several Big Spring dealers.

Hooper explained that the television repair business is nothing like that of repairing radios. "When a radio set needs repairing, the owner usually doesn't care how long you take to fix it," he said. "Actually the situation should be turned around. Hooper pointed out, because it usually takes a lot longer to repair a television set than a radio. 'I can take a flashlight battery and a panel bulb and find the trouble in a radio pretty quickly,' he said.

Such is not the case in a TV set, as practically anything can go wrong. "There are no set rules in TV repair," Hooper stated. "Most of the repair is by hit and miss, though we do limit our checks to specific sections of the set when certain symptoms appear."

Hooper has found that 85 per cent

of the trouble in TV sets he has repaired was in the small tubes. But even tube trouble can be a headache, because the repairman has to check all of the tubes until he finds the one which is bad.

When the repairman "trouble shoots" to find out the difficulty in a set, he has to use all his senses. Hooper pointed out. The trouble can be seen, smelled, felt or heard. "A burned up transformer gives a smell that nothing else resembles," he said. "And each resistor is painted with a different enamel that gives its own particular smell. Consequently the smell can tell the repairman where to look.

Such is not always the case, however, and expensive equipment has to be available for checks when all other means fail. Hooper has an oscilloscope and other radar-type equipment which can reveal trouble he could never find.

The last thing that Hooper and other repairmen want to do when looking over a set is to declare the picture tube bad. "We are obligated to exhaust all other possibilities before going into the picture tube," Hooper explained. "Those things cost money."

Money is needed for practically any type of television repair, however. Hooper freely admits that service to TV sets is nearly prohibitive for the average home because of the cost.

Despite the cost, a number of people here are buying TV sets. Hooper says he has seen more 21-inch screens than anything else, though there are quite a few 17-inch and 24-inch screens here. "The larger the tube the shorter the life," he said.

Actually all the standard brand TV sets are good, Hooper said, and one type does not "go out" any quicker than another. All the sets are based on the RCA 630 original circuit, he said. Some manufacturers have developed trigger circuits to lock the picture on the screen, and some have advanced designs in the tuners, it was explained.

The tuners operate at the actual frequency of the station, serving to coordinate the two frequencies in the set, Hooper pointed out. These two frequencies, one for voice and one for picture, each have separate tubes. All these tubes make the sets hard to fix when something goes wrong.

Another thing which the TV repairman must take into consideration, is the video information transmitted on pulses. The pulses serve to lock the picture on the screen and are transmitted for both horizontal and vertical position, Hooper explained.

Because of the two transformers, frequencies, and the video pulses, television repair is not a field for a novice, Hooper pointed out.

"Anyone can learn how to be a tube changer," he said. "But it takes years of experience and a lot of theoretical training to handle the technical installation in a TV set. People with repairs should be careful where they take their sets." Most of his TV repair work is for various dealers here.

Nursing Program Without University Training Is Urged

HOUSTON (U)—A new program which permits nurses to receive state certificates without college training was described here yesterday as one solution to Texas' acute nursing shortage.

E. M. Collier, administrator of Abilene's Hendrick Memorial Hospital, said the program can begin functioning at any Texas hospital in that it has been approved by the State Board of Medical Examiners.

"After a year of study, the committee feels this plan is the quickest way to get good nurses for general hospital service," Collier told the annual convention of the Texas Hospital Assn.

He said the three-year training program operates without university or college affiliation by hospitals.

Work Crews Of City Busy In Month Of April

Street maintenance headed the list of activities in the city public works department during April.

Report issued by R. V. Foresyth, superintendent of the department, shows that 896 street and alley blocks were graded and 206 gutter and alley blocks were hand swept.

Some 246 loads of water were hauled to wet dirt streets, and 125 loads of gravel and caliche were carried to residential streets. Taken away from the streets were 96 loads of street sweepings, 68 loads of excess dirt, and 176 loads of sand.

Foresyth's records also show that 3,355 feet of four-inch stripes were repainted on city pavement. There were 356 miles of gutter swept by the motor sweeper.

Other street activities included the sealing of pavement cracks on 12 blocks, pouring concrete for a drive-way and 13 drive-way aprons, and blading a parking area in the park.

Maintenance crews built two brick manholes and removed one rock fence for pavement installation. Some 21 street signs were re-set, the swimming pool and colored park buildings were repainted, runways on Hamilton Airfield were bladed, and sludge pits at the disposal plant were cleaned.

Unloaded during the month were eight yards of ready mixed concrete and 4,401 feet of six-inch sewer pipe. Two straw brooms were built for the motor sweeper as well as one steel broom. Four loads of crushed rock were hauled for concrete material.

A total of 199 loads of trash were hauled from the residential areas, Foresyth revealed. There were 148 stray dogs caught during the month and 157 killed at the city pound. Some 219 dead

dogs and cats were picked up from the streets about the city. Work around the city dump ground was also pronounced. The entire area was cleaned and bladed, including the roads. The dump ground was also fogged with the city fogging machine, as was the disposal plant. Complaints received by the department during April totaled 36.

Food Prices Inch Up

NEW YORK (U)—Wholesale food prices as measured by Dun & Bradstreet inched up again this week but continued below the all-time peak recorded at the end of March. At \$7.39, the Dun & Bradstreet index for May 18 compared with \$7.31 a week earlier and \$6.47 a year ago. It was 14.2 per cent higher than in the comparable week last year.

"This strawberry shortcake has been a favorite in my family for years—and you know we really like to eat," said Mrs. Harry Hurt when she recommended this luscious-sounding recipe.

Besides being a wonderful cook, Mrs. Hurt is an accomplished pianist, and her hobby is the collection of articles with musical connection, but especially old music boxes. Her pride and joy is a box about two feet wide from Germany with an intricate design of musical notes inside. It is over 100 years old, and she found it in a storage room in the town of Hawley.

There is a French music box over 100 years old in her collection, and one which she especially prizes was brought to her by Wade Simpson from Switzerland.

An old tuning-fork, which she brought in Boston, brought this remark when her husband saw it: "What are you doing with that old piece of iron—going into the junk business?"

Running a very close second to the musical interest is the Hurt's new grandchild, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hurt Jr. Mrs. Hurt has just returned from a visit to

California, where she became acquainted with the newest member of the family. She says she has told all her friends that she has "oh'd and ah'd" over their grandchildren's pictures, and that it is now her time to show her pictures.

This recipe sounds as if it is very easy to make:

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE

Ingredients:
2 cups flour
1/2 cup sugar
2 heaping teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 pound of butter or margarine
1 cup sweet milk

Method:
Sift together first four ingredients. Rub butter or margarine through flour mixture until it looks like cornmeal. Add milk and mix. Pour into greased baking pan and bake in 375 degrees oven. Sweeten to taste 2 cups of strawberries. Crush with fork, reserving a few choice ones to decorate the cake. Split the cake, lengthwise, and butter it while hot. Pour on half of strawberries and put top layer on. Cover with remainder of berries and serve with whipped cream.

Wonderful Idea For New Dessert Is Coffee Bavarian

Just the dessert to surprise the girls and make them really rave about the wonderful, unusual things you always serve!

This coffee dessert looks too pretty to eat, and makes a big impression when it is served because it is so good looking—as well as being full of surprise flavor.

Ingredients:
1/4 cup milk
2 cups cooked white rice
1/4 cup cold water
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
2 tablespoons instant coffee
1/4 cup beet or cane sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup whipping cream

Method:
Add the milk to the rice and cook over a low heat until the milk is absorbed, about 8 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour the cold water into a saucepan and sprinkle the gelatin over the water. Allow to stand 5 minutes. Slowly add the coffee and stir until the coffee dissolves. Add the sugar and salt. Place the saucepan over a low heat and stir until the sugar dissolves. Add the rice and mix well. Cool.

When the mixture begins to thicken, whip the cream and then add the rice mixture to the whipped cream and gently mix. Turn into a greased mold or into greased individual molds or into compotes. Chill until ready to serve. Serve within 24 hours.

If the dessert is molded, chill until firm. Then dip the mold into hot water. Remove and place a serving plate over the mold. Invert mold and plate together and lift mold from the plate.

Garnish with whipped cream or maraschino cherries or both.

This recipe makes 6 servings.

Crown Roast Is Decorative Cut

A decorative cut of lamb, especially good for entertaining, is lamb crown roast. It is wise to order this cut in advance so the butcher will have time to prepare it, for the ribs must be sewn into a crown.

The roast is seasoned with salt and pepper and placed right side up on a rack in an open roasting pan. The crown is filled with sausage stuffing and cooked uncovered with no water in a slow oven (300 degrees F.). A lamb crown roast requires 30 to 35 minutes per pound for baking.

Mousses Are French Favorites

The French are fond of sweet mousses, and frequent additions to their menus are creme de menthe mousse, maple nut mousse, and a chocolate version of the dessert.

MAPLE NUT MOUSSE

(About 1 quart)
4 egg yolks, beaten
1 cup maple syrup
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup chopped black walnuts
1 pint cream, whipped

Combine beaten egg yolks, maple syrup, and salt in the top of a double boiler. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until mixture coats the spoon. Remove immediately from heat and stir over ice until cool. Add vanilla and chopped walnuts. Carefully fold whipped cream into custard. Pour into two refrigerator trays and freeze without stirring. To serve, pile into parfait glasses, top with additional whipped cream, and garnish with chopped black walnuts.

The marshmallows act as the stabilizing and sweetened ingredient in this mousse.

For Stews And Gravies

Caramelize a little sugar and keep it on hand for coloring a stew or gravy. Caramelization is nothing more than heating sugar—either beet or cane—to a sufficiently high temperature to melt it; in the process the color of the sugar first changes to yellow, then to brown.

Rich Cookie Cakes Are Special Fare

Similar to brownies, these chewy cookie-cakes are rich and delicious. It's a recipe that can be used for company.

BITTERSWEETS

Ingredients:
1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1/4 cup butter
1/4 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
1/4 cup flour
2 egg whites beaten stiff

Topping:
1/4 cup whipping cream
1/4 cup coffee cream
1 1/4 cups semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Method:
Melt 1/2 cup chocolate pieces over boiling water. Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add chocolate and flour and mix thoroughly. Fold in egg whites. Spread in a pan 9 by 13 inches which has been greased, lined with waxed paper, and again greased. Bake in a 350F oven for 25 minutes. Turn out on a cake cooler and remove paper. Return to pan. Combine 1 1/4 cups chocolate pieces, and cream in a heavy saucepan. Place over low heat. Stir constantly until chocolate melts and mixture begins to boil. Boil for 2 minutes, stirring constantly; cool until lukewarm. Beat with electric mixer for 2 minutes. Place in a bowl and cover with waxed paper. Chill for several hours. Bring to room temperature and spread on cookies. Cut into bars. Makes about 20.

Lots Of Vegetables Usable In Stew

A less elegant way in which to serve lamb is stew. Riblets can be used for stew or can be cooked by braising or by barbecuing.

Cooking vegetables with the lamb riblets in a stew is a convenience and at the same time the vegetables absorb the meat flavor. There's no rule that says you have to use certain vegetables in a stew. Look to green beans, lima beans, peas, Brussels sprouts for variation. Browning the riblets for the stew is up to you. Some people prefer a brown stew, some prefer a light stew.

2 pounds lamb riblets
3 tablespoons lard or drippings
Salt
Pepper
Water to cover
4 medium potatoes
4 medium carrots
8 small onions

Brown riblets in lard or drippings. Season. Add enough water to cover. Cover closely and simmer for 30 minutes. Add potatoes, carrots and onions and continue cooking 45 minutes or until vegetables are tender. 4 servings.

Homemaker's Hints

Let the cover of a heat resistant glass casserole do double duty. Use it over an iron skillet; it's lighter in weight than an iron cover and so easier to put on and take off; it also allows you to see your cooking. This trick is particularly handy when you are cooking dumplings.

Here's a little different way to finish off that baked ham. Spread the ham with orange marmalade and put back into the oven to glaze. Serve thin slices of the ham with cherries or whole cloves.

Add crushed potato chips to buttered bread crumbs to use as a topping for a casserole.

Texas Lamb Week Means Ranch Style Barbecue

A barbecued lamb dinner is the traditional menu for picnics, stock shows, and other large meetings in West Texas. A pit 2 to 3 feet deep with a surface area large enough to accommodate the meat is usually dug in the ground to hold the coals, and some sort of wire laid on metal pipe or supports serves as a grate for the meat. A heavy canvas or sheets of tin may be used to cover and hold the heat. Potatoes, salad, ranch style beans, pickles, onions, hot relish or sauce, with iced tea and coffee usually complete the dinner.

Homemade backyard barbecue ovens are becoming commonplace in the trend toward outdoor living. Lamb cuts lend themselves well to this mode of cooking family-sized meals, and the results are delicious.

Good lamb barbecue recipes are not common in the cookbooks, so the services of someone well-known for his barbecuing are obtained to prepare the meat for a big dinner. Most of these "professionals" have their own recipe. The following recipe for ranch style barbecue was obtained from one of the best in the business. The proportions in the top column are for a 45-50 pound whole lamb carcass, while those on the right are for a family-sized 5-7 lb. leg of lamb.

Ingredients:
1 pound oleomargarine
2 large beans garlic
1 gallon vinegar
3 lemons, juice and rind
1 bottle catsup
2 - No. 2 cans tomatoes
1 small bottle mustard
2 bottles Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons hot sauce
Salt & pepper

Smaller Recipes:
1-3 cup butter or margarine
1 clove garlic
1 cup vinegar (reserve 1-3 cup)
2 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 slices rind
2 tablespoons catsup
1/4 cup tomato juice
1 tablespoon prepared mustard
5 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon hot sauce (Tabasco)
Salt & Pepper

Method:
Render out some of the tallow from around the kidneys until you have about 1 cup of fat. (This is

omitted if you are barbecuing a leg of lamb). Add the remaining ingredients (except the salt and pepper), including the lemon rind, bring to a boil, and simmer about 5 minutes. Reserve enough of the vinegar to baste the lamb 2 or 3 times with pure vinegar.

Start your barbecue with a slow fire and give it plenty of time. "Never rush it, for if you ever burn a crust on it you might just as well start all over. It should be cooked at least 6 hours, and 7 is better. If you use very fat lambs, 8 or 9 hours." (For a leg of lamb, allow at least 45 minutes per pound

and as much longer as you desire).

Salt and pepper the lamb before you put it on the fire, and baste it with pure vinegar the first two or three times you turn it (about every fifteen minutes), rubbing off whatever salt and pepper that show on the meat. After that, baste with the sauce each time you turn it, while the meat is very hot, and keep it well soaked in sauce.

You can also barbecue the leg of lamb inside in the oven. Pre-heat the oven to 500 degrees, salt and pepper the lamb, place on rack over pan, and roast for about 10 minutes at this high heat. Reduce temperature to 275 degrees, then start basting, first with vinegar, then with sauce, about every fifteen minutes. Allow a minimum of 45

LAMB CELERY RING
2 cups diced cooked lamb
1 1/2 cups chopped celery
2 tablespoons minced onion
1 teaspoon salt

minutes per pound, and as long after that as you desire.

The pan drippings make a wonderful sauce to serve with the meat. Always serve the barbecue piping hot.

1/4 teaspoon curry powder
3 cups cubed bread
3 eggs
1 tablespoon melted lard or drippings
1 1/2 cups hot gravy or milk
Mix together lamb, celery, onion, salt, curry powder, bread, eggs and melted lard or drippings. Add gravy or milk and mix well. Place mixture in a well-greased 9-inch ring mold. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 1 hour. Serve with tomato sauce, if desired. 6 servings.

Deficiencies Would Continue If Schools Are Reshuffled Hastily

By CHARLES MERCER

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—If Negroes and Whites were immediately reshuffled throughout the South's school system, "the same general deficiencies in physical facilities, teacher training, curriculum and the like would exist."

This is one of several conclusions set forth in the most intensive non-partisan study of school segregation ever undertaken in the nation. It was made by the Fund for the Advancement of Education, formed by the Ford Foundation, and made public today.

Entitled "The Negro and the Schools," the study is the result of research by some 50 educators, sociologists and economists. It is written by Harry S. Ashmore, executive editor of the Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock, Ark.

In such a reshuffling of white and Negro students in the South, says the study, "abstract justice might be achieved, in that the deficit would fall evenly upon members of both races, but the overall standard of public education would not be materially improved."

The study does not recommend changes but describes existing conditions in many sections of the country. The foundation made Ashmore's book available to newspapers and periodicals for unrestricted use. Following are some of its highlights:

"The South is only now reaching the point where there are enough classrooms and enough teachers to meet the minimum demand of its children for education. There has been general discrimination against Negroes. It is true, but it could have been corrected only by pouring additional money into the total system or by lowering the standards of white schools."

"If at any point in the past discrimination had been wiped out by total integration the effect would have been that some Negroes would have gone to better schools and some Whites to worse—but no appreciable economies would have resulted to make additional funds available for improvement of the total system."

Southern schoolmen "have had to recognize—as the public often has not—that the gap between white and Negro schools is only one aspect of the region's total problem, and that there is no way that it can be considered apart

from the overall deficiencies of the southern school system.

"The general disparity between white and Negro schools has its counterpart in the inequalities be-

WCTU Blasts Liquor Industry Advertising

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Woman's Christian Temperance Union said today the liquor industry is "willfully using . . . advertising to break down standards in the home and create juvenile delinquency."

WCTU's views were set forth by its president, Mrs. Glenn G. Hays of Evanston, Ill., in testimony prepared for a House Commerce Committee hearing on legislation to ban interstate advertising of beer, wine and liquor in newspapers and periodicals, on radio and television.

Ike Sees Danger From Guatemala

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, commenting on shipment of arms from Red Poland to Guatemala, said yesterday it would be a terrible thing if a Communist dictatorship were established on this continent.

On other subject the President had this to say: Segregation—In a response to a question, the President said he has not the slightest advice for the South on how to carry out the Supreme Court decision holding that segregation of whites and Negroes in public schools is unconstitutional.

The President added, however, that he has sworn to uphold the Constitution and that he intends to do just that. Asked whether the court decision may have placed his administration on a political hot spot because the ruling was handed down during the regime of the Republicans, the President shot back that the Supreme Court is not under any administration.

The President also was asked whether the court ruling might alienate some of his personal political supporters in the South. His reply was that he has stood always for honest, decent government and always will.

Southeast Asia—Eisenhower said it might be possible to form a

united front against communism in Southeast Asia without the participation of Britain. Asked whether the United States would act without Britain, he replied that it depended on the attitude of the proper Asiatic nations and Australia and New Zealand.

Falcon Dam Priority Proposed For Cities

WASHINGTON (AP)—Cities will be among the agencies having priority on power produced by Falcon Dam on the Rio Grande under a bill approved yesterday by the House Interior Committee.

The bill, which would authorize the Secretary of the Interior to market the American share of the power, gives preference in sale to municipalities, public corporations, cooperatives and non-profit organizations.

Report Czech Killings

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—Radio Free Europe charged today Czechoslovakia's Communist government has been killing the incurably ill and insane for more than two years. The American-sponsored radio quoted "independent and reliable sources."

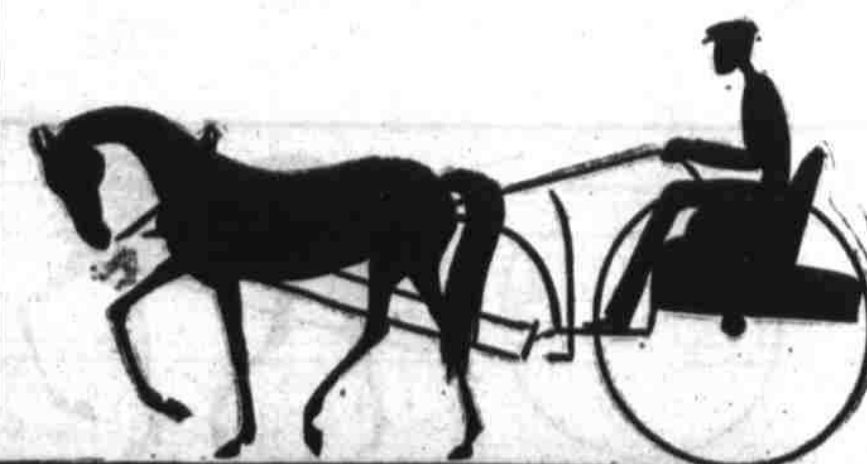

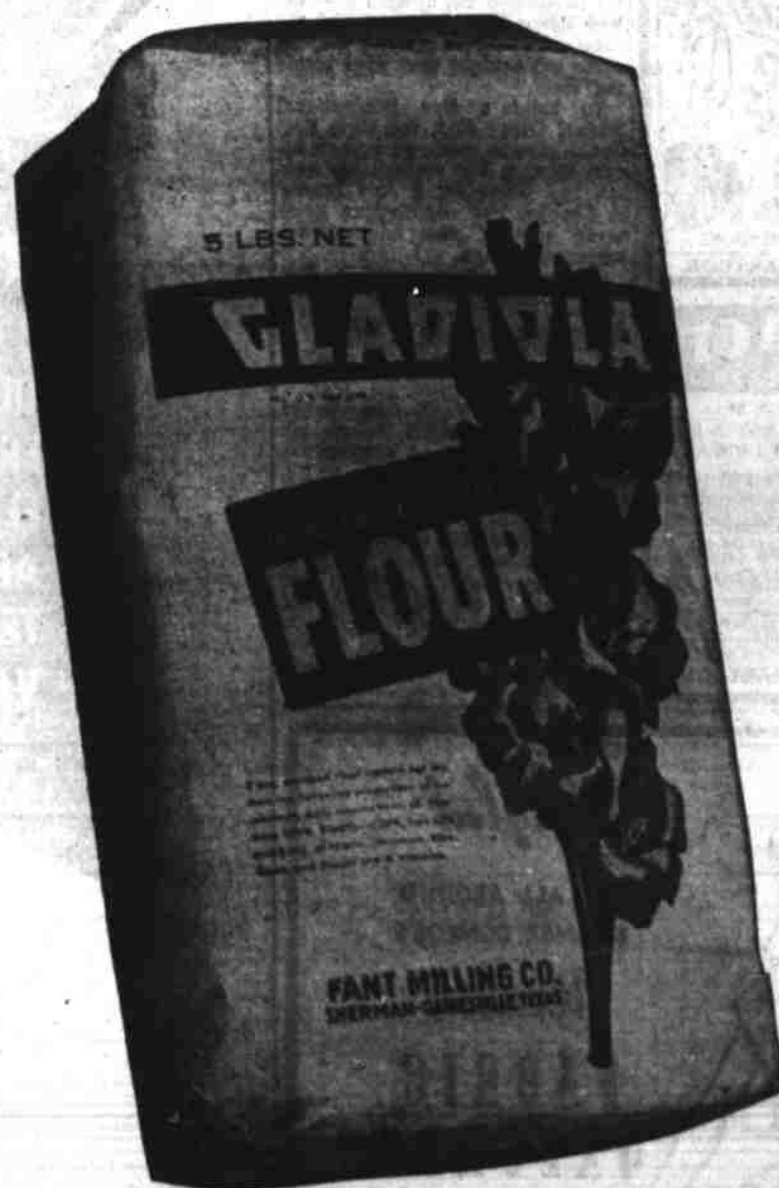

Bridges And Giant Dam Whip Rowdy Rio Grande

MISSION, Tex., May 20 (AP)—Thirteen bridges and a giant dam have whipped the rowdy Rio Grande. They bind Texas and Mexico along the river's 1,240-mile course from El Paso to the Gulf.

In the old days, treacherous currents and sand bars trapped unskilled or unwary travelers. When you got across, somebody was likely to take a pot shot at you.

New modern engineering has tamed the capricious stream. The U.S. Border Patrol and the Mexican

can federal keep the border peaceful.

The biggest force in taming the river was the new Falcon Dam, dedicated last Oct. 19 by Presidents Eisenhower of the United States and Adolfo Ruiz Cortines of Mexico. It will limit the floods that used to course down the Rio Grande to the Gulf and sometimes swallowed up her bridges.

The newest bridge, a \$333,000 band of steel, was completed in November, just south of here. New highways were laid out to join it, and the Mexican government has mapped out a 250-acre townsite to serve a chemical plant and an oil field nearby.

To beat the river's floods, the bridge is built in a special way. Hermetically sealed box girder beams allow the bridge to float. If it should be washed out, the beams will float in as little as two feet of water.

An older bridge at Laredo, built in 1922, beats the river in a different way. The builders used aluminum rails that can be removed in 30 minutes and carried to safety. Even a plaque placed in the center of the bridge by the Pan American Roundtable to honor all the women of the Americas is aluminum and removable.

These are toll bridges, like all

those joining Texas and Mexico. Federal and state governments have no control over any of them, except for customs inspection and policing.

You can even try to buy a bridge—and unlike the hicks who try to buy the Brooklyn Bridge, you won't be regarded as a sucker.

For example, the company running the United States half of the bridge at Del Rio went bankrupt last summer. This side of the bridge was sold at public auction. The city of Del Rio tried to buy it but was outbid \$5,000 by the Citizens Bridge Co. of Eagle Pass with a \$275,000.

The bridge at the big international port of Laredo is city owned. All the other bridges—at El Paso, Eagle Pass, McAllen, Brownsville, Ysleta, Presidio, Roma, Rio Grande City and the new one near here—are privately owned.

The franchises vary greatly. The Roma Bridge Company has a perpetual franchise from the state. One at El Paso was granted in 1902 and runs 85 years. The Laredo franchise is on a year-to-year basis.

The only place on the border where you can cross—legally—without paying a toll is at Falcon Dam, 45 miles upstream from Mission. A paved road across the big water storage project joins the two countries.

The old Zapata, Tex., customs station was moved to the dam when spreading Falcon Lake inundated the international bridge at Zapata last summer.

Texas highway officials wish all the crossings were free.

"Texas is the real gateway to Mexico for the entire United States," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said. "It has long been the opinion of the Texas Highway Commission that the free flow of traffic between the nations would be improved if at least some of the bridges were state owned and free. We would like to see no toll bridges at all across the Rio Grande."

"Over a long period of years we eliminated toll bridges over the Red River into Oklahoma and the Sabine into Louisiana, as well as some toll bridges that were inside the state."

To build a free international bridge, Greer said, the state first would have to make an agreement with Mexico. The commission long has had plans for a free bridge at Laredo, but negotiations have never reached the international agreement stage.

bridge at Del Rio but never at Laredo. The highway commission hasn't pressed for the Del Rio bridge because it would be only

an indirect link with Mexico's highway system.

Greer said Texas would like to have free bridges at Laredo, El Paso and Brownsville as a starter.

Doctors Are Urged To Take Lead In Giving Up Inhaling

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—A new wrinkle in the cigarette smoking-lung cancer controversy has been suggested by a Boston doctor: stop inhaling until the question is settled.

Meanwhile, it's okay to smoke if you don't inhale, says Dr. Richard Overholt, one of the country's leading chest surgeons.

Overholt, who says "there's no question" in his own mind that there is an "association" between heavy smoking—with accompanying inhalation—and some cases of lung cancer, told reporters at the 50th anniversary meeting of the National Tuberculosis Assn. last night.

"The public ought to be warned that there is a possibility of such an association, and we ought to urge them to stop inhaling smoke until the issue is settled."

"If present investigations show there is no link, then all right. But, if it is shown that there is a link, then the tobacco companies ought to eliminate the responsible material or materials from the tobacco."

The doctor also urged that physicians take the lead in giving up inhaling, a suggestion perhaps inspired by something that happened earlier in the day when Overholt was presiding at a panel discussion on lung cancer.

The majority view of the six-member panel was that there

might be an association between heavy smoking and lung cancer, although only two, including Overholt, voiced strongly positive views.

But when Overholt later asked the audience of 200 doctors how many, out of the approximately one-third who indicated they were smokers, would give up smoking, not a single hand was raised.

Amid laughter, Overholt said with a smile: "Then this panel has been a total waste of time."

Texans Settle Tax Claims At Discount

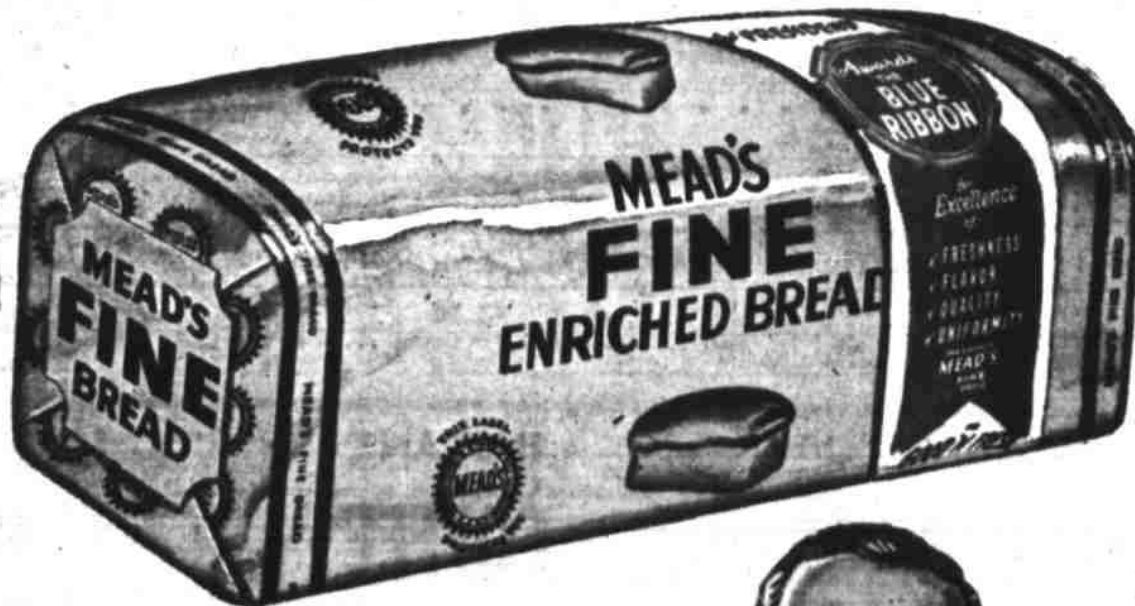
