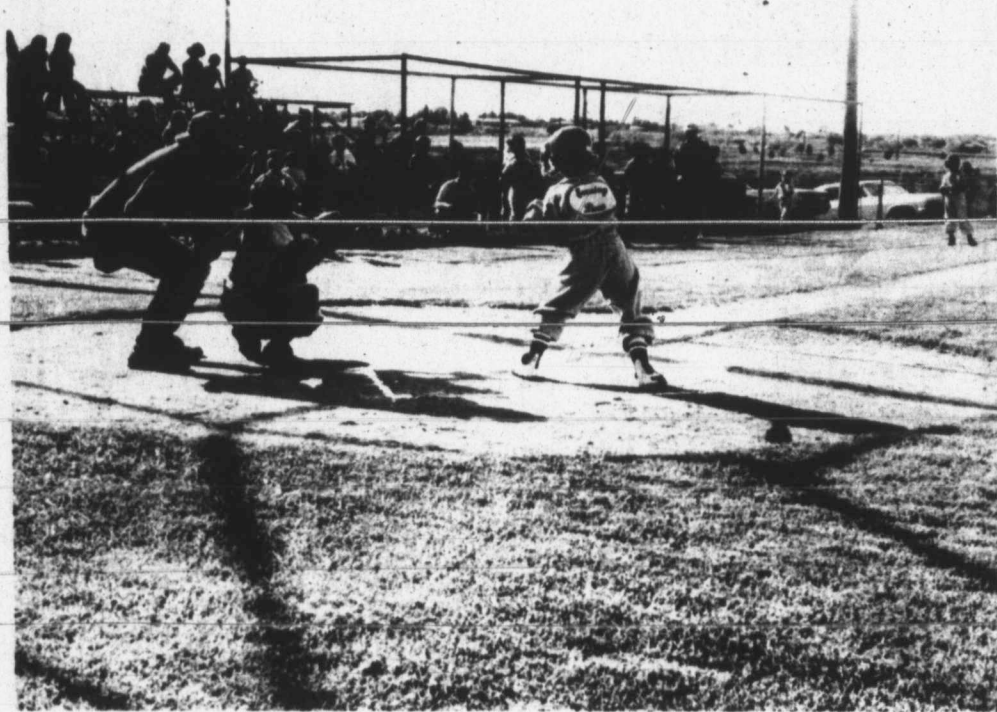




Season Opener

Bids For Court House Elevator Are Sought

Mitchell County commissioners in their regular monthly meeting this past week voted to take bids for renovation of the courthouse, renovations which include the installation of an elevator.

Costs for the elevator and renovation of the courthouse have been estimated at \$45,000. That is the amount that has been budgeted in revenue sharing funds.

The installation of the elevator has been somewhat of a controversy ever since it was put into the revenue sharing budget in March.

The Record has editorially opposed the installation of an elevator in the courthouse, saying that the money could be put to much better use.

A form is included in today's Record for the public to inform the commissioner's how the public feels about an elevator.

The bids for the elevator and renovation of the courthouse will be opened at a special com-

missioners meeting at 1:30 p.m., Tuesday, June 5. Plans and specifications may be obtained from Welch and Hampton offices in Sweetwater.

County Judge Bill Carter has quoted the architect as saying the shaft power and foundation for the elevator will cost \$10,000; the elevator itself would cost \$15,000.

In the \$45,000 figure for the elevator and renovation of the courthouse is money for painting the inside of the courthouse; to put some type of material on the back part of the courthouse to cover up odd colored bricks and \$3,000 to landscape courthouse grounds.

All of this amounts to only \$31,300 but \$45,000 was budgeted to make sure sufficient funds are available, Carter said.

The elevator shaft is to be put where Carter's office is now and Carter's office will be moved to the second floor to adjoin the county attorney's office, the

county courtroom, the district attorney's office and law library.

The driver's license office

and peace justice office will be moved to where the commissioner's court office is now on the ground floor. The driv-

er's license office has already been moved from the third floor. See ELEVATOR Page 8

Death Vehicle

A fiery crash killed a 4-month-old Odessa baby early Friday on Interstate 20 and critically injured three adults. The fire destroyed the pick-

up truck in which the four were riding. The baby and a woman were in the back of the pick-up when the crash and resulting fire occurred.

Odessa Baby Killed; Three Others Injured

A four-month-old Odessa boy was injured fatally and his grandparents and uncle were seriously injured when a pick-up truck hit a culvert, overturned and burned at 2:55 a.m. Friday near Westbrook.

The four Odessa residents apparently were en route to Ft. Worth when the accident occurred about nine miles west of Colorado City in the east bound lane of Interstate 20.

The baby, Bobby Joe Waldrep son of Bennie and Charlotte Waldrep of Odessa, died of burns received in the accident.

at 4:45 a.m. in Root Memorial Hospital.

Highway Patrolman Randy Wilkinson said the pick-up hit a culvert and overturned several times. Fiberglass gas tanks underneath the rear fenders of the pick-up ruptured and resulted in the fire which engulfed the vehicle.

Mrs. Mona Lee Tucker, 43, the child's grandmother and the child were riding in the back of the pickup which was covered by a camper shell, when the ac-

cident occurred.

The baby's grandfather, Jerry Wayne Tucker, 46, and the Tucker's son Ronald Wayne Tucker, 19, who was driving, were riding in the pick-up cab.

Tucker and his son were given emergency treatment for critical burns at Root Memorial Hospital and flown to University Medical Center in Denver, Colo.

Mrs. Tucker was treated at Root Hospital and transferred to an Odessa Hospital with serious injuries.

The baby, who was born Jan. 18 in Odessa, also is survived by paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W.P. Abernathy of Odessa.

Hubbard-Kelly Funeral Home in Odessa is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Mailbox Improvement Week Here

A traditional observance which contributes to the appearance of Colorado City streets and roads--"Mailbox Improvement Week"--will be held May 21-26, according to Postmaster A.M. Morris.

"Mailbox Improvement Week" has long served as the starting signal for special community efforts to repair, repaint and make other improvements in the security and appearance of rural and suburban curbline-type boxes in the Colorado City area," Postmaster A.M. Morris said.

"Because more Americans receive their mail today on rural routes than ever before," Postmaster A.M. Morris added "Mailbox Improvement Week" is even more important now than when first observed generations ago in rural areas and small communities."

Postmaster Morris has available lists of manufacturers of approved designs for optional use by customers who want something other than traditional mailbox designs. He is also authorized to approve custom-made mail boxes when they comply with postal regulations.

School Avoids Penalty

Colorado High School escaped by a four-to-one vote being made ineligible to participate in UIL band competition next year after the Colorado High band failed to participate in UIL concert competition March 21 in Midland.

According to UIL rules, bands must participate in contests unless they have acceptable excuses for not doing so.

Action by school administrators resulted in the four to one vote Monday night by the Region 6 Music Executive Committee to allow Colorado City to compete next year.

High School Principal Bill Everett attended the meeting in Odessa Monday night to explain why the Wolves band did not compete. Reasons given for the band not attending the competition included situations that resulted in key members of the band being unable to take part in the contest.

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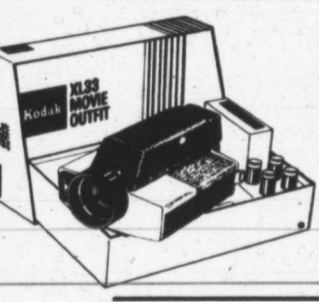
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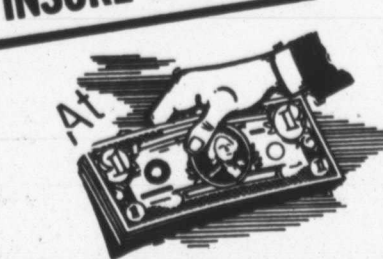

PART ONE is true recorded History of the Famous Colorado Cattle Company's 18 RANCH of more than 300 sections, (200,000 acres) of open range in the early '80s. Much of the early Ranch History is related by Sidney W. Bryan, nearing 90 years, now living at Munday, Texas, who as a child remembers much of the early days. Other interviews and research gives valuable History on this famous Ranch for the first time.

SOME INTERESTING HIGHLIGHTS

1881 Original Ranch was most of Fisher County, and parts of Nolan and Scurry Counties, Texas.

Three Ranches now remain of the Original 18 Ranch—the present 18 Ranch, the Aiken Ranch, and the Davenport, which is operated by Slingin' Sammy Baugh of football fame. Numerous pictures of the Ranches and Baugh appear in the History.

Aunt Abbie, age 90, a freed slave, came to the '18 Country with her white families as first settlers in the early '80s. She was the first Negro in the area. Among the first persons buried in Roby Cemetery.

Story and statistics on Claydonville Oil Field which played a major role in recoup of Fisher County finances after County Depository was lost in unbounded bank failure in 1930.

Two pictures of Coachwhip Snake swallowing Rattlesnakes, and supporting affidavit. These are the only known pictures of the event in native terrain (such pictures have been made of snakes in captivity.) This occurred on 18 Ranch, 1926.

PART TWO

PART TWO is narrative of an "outstanding" pioneer-Ranch family on the 18 Ranch. Sidney Bryan was foreman on the Ranch for 25 years, rearing his family there. In his own words this 90 year old pioneer gives "A Lifetime in West Texas."

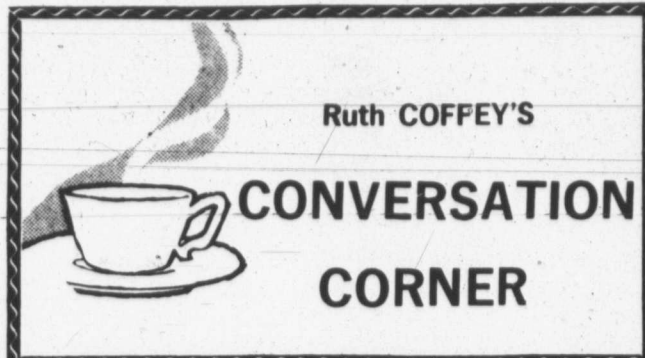
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CONVERSATION CORNER

BY ORDER OF THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

DISPOSAL OF IMPOUNDED DOGS NOT REDEEMED AFTER FIVE DAYS; PROVIDING FOR SUMMARY DESTRUCTION OF RABID DOGS OR DOGS SHOWING A DISPOSITION TO BITE: PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE OF A FINE OF ANY SUM NOT TO EXCEED \$200; VALIDITY CALUSE; EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. License Fee There is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, 3 months or older, kept or owned within the City of Colorado City, Texas, an annual license fee of Two Dollars and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any such dog to pay over to the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, the said license fee annually as it accrues. The Director of Finance shall collect or have collected under his supervision all such license fees.

SECTION 2. Humane Officer A city employee shall be known and designated as the Humane Officer, who, among other duties shall carry out the terms and provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. Tag Upon payment of said license fee, the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog with a tag on which is stamped the year and the registration number, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog.

SECTION 4. Vaccination Certificates The Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, shall not issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of a dog, 3 months or older, unless and until such owner or keeper shall furnish a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating that such dog has been vaccinated against rabies by him, within the space of fifteen days immediately preceding the date of such application.

SECTION 5. Permit Upon the payment of said license fee, the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized

agent, also shall furnish the owner or keeper of each dog, 3 months or older, with a permit to keep each dog within the City of Colorado City, Texas, for the period herein provided. The permit shall contain a description of the dog with reference to breed, sex, name, size and coloring, the name and address of the owner or person to whom the permit is issued, and a statement of the date upon which such dog has been vaccinated as shown by the certificate of the veterinarian presented by the applicant. Such permit so issued shall automatically terminate and become absolutely void and ineffective one year from the date of such vaccination as stated therein.

SECTION 6. Certificate of Vaccination All dogs, 3 months or older, within the City of Colorado City, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian on or before July 1, 1973, and once each year thereafter. It is further provided that every veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog kept within the City of Colorado City, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog, and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, a brief description of the dog, and the date of vaccination; provided however, that the fee charged by such veterinarian for such vaccination certificate shall not in any case exceed the sum of Two Dollars.

SECTION 7. Lost Tags Whenever any person has complied with the provisions of the preceding sections of this ordinance, and the license fee tag is lost or otherwise destroyed, it shall be the duty of said owner or keeper of said dog to procure another tag from the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, by paying the value of said tag and all costs that may have accrued as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 8. Prohibiting Removal of Tags It shall be unlawful for any person within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, to remove from the collar of the dog covered by a permit issued under the terms of this Ordinance, the metal tag or badge issued by the Director of Finance as herein provided, except upon the expiration of one

year from the date that the tag was issued.

SECTION 9. Impounding of Dogs (a) It shall be the duty of the Humane Officer or Officers of the City to take up and impound each dog, where so ever found within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas that does not have attached to its collar, the metal tag required by this Ordinance, showing that a permit for the keeping of such dog has been duly issued as herein provided.

(b) It shall be the further duty of said officer to take up and impound any dog tagged or untagged found within the corporate limits of the City of Colorado City, Texas, that is not securely fastened by a leash or kept within a closely fenced enclosure.

(c) It shall be the future duty of said Officer of the City of Colorado City, Texas, to take up and impound any tagged or untagged dog creating a nuisance by its actions, upon the duly received and filed complaint of any citizen.

SECTION 10. Redemption of Impounded Dogs and Disposal of Same.

(a) The owner or keeper of any dog captured or impounded under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be permitted and allowed, within five days after such dog shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog, upon payment to the Director of Finance, or his duly authorized agent, the sum of Five Dollars per day, or any fractional part thereof, during which time said dog may have been impounded, and upon securing a permit to keep said dog as herein provided.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dog fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section, within the five day period then said dog shall be disposed of in a humane manner by the Humane Officer or Officers of the City, or sold for pound costs as provided in paragraph (a) of this section.

SECTION 11. Summary Destruction of Rabid Dogs - The Humane Officer or any Police Officer of this City shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog in the

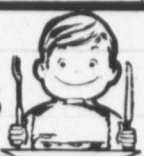

streets which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 12. Duties of Owner It shall be the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog 3 months or older to comply with all provisions of this ordinance and shall provide a safe suitable leash and/or a closely meashed fenced enclosure for the keeping of said dog and it shall be the further duty of said owner or keeper to keep said dog either securely fastened by leash or within a safe suitable enclosure.

SECTION 13. Penalty. Any person violating any provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$200.

SECTION 14. Validity Clause Each and every provision, paragraph, sentence and clause of this Ordinance has been separately considered and passed by the City Council of the City of Colorado City, Texas, and each said provision would have been separately passed without any other provision, and if any provision hereof should be ineffective, invalid or unconstitutional for any cause, it shall not impair, nor affect the remaining portion nor any other part thereof, but the valid portion shall be enforced just as if it had been passed alone, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 15. Effective Date This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.
