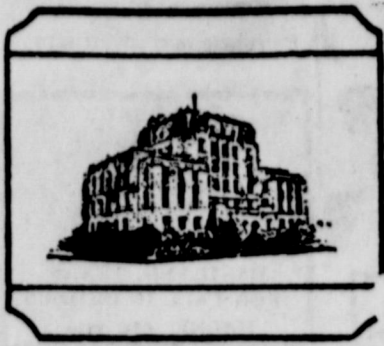

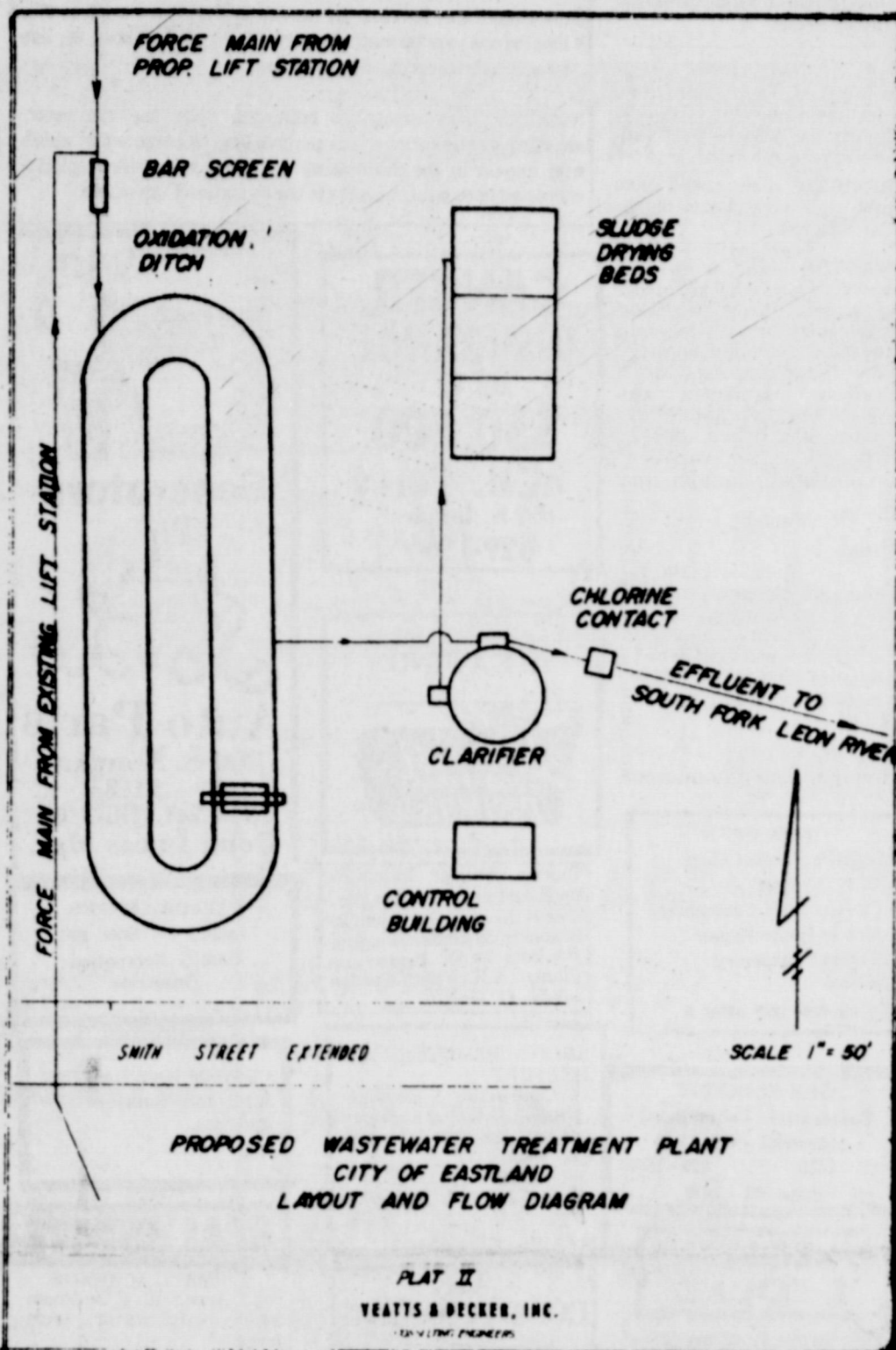
Vacation time is near for the 261 employees at Eastland's Vassarette Plant, according to Plant Manager Gene Johnson.

The plant will close for vacation beginning June 28 through July 15, he said.

Of the total number of employees, 255 were eligible for vacation pay and the payroll for the vacation period amounted to checks totaling \$34,169.86.

Adding the weekly payroll of \$23,000, the total payroll released by the company into this area's economy, exceeds \$75,000.

The annual payroll is approximately \$1,250,000, he said. In announcing the vacation schedule, Mr. Johnson stated that this is the finest group of people he's ever worked with, and that he sincerely wishes for each, a "safe and happy vacation period." And he assured, he said, we'll be



EPA To Skip Impact Statement For Plant

The Environmental Protection Agency today announced it will not require an environmental impact statement for the construction of new wastewater facilities at Eastland, Texas.

Arthur W. Busch, EPA Region VI Administrator at Dallas, said an assessment indicates that construction and operation of the proposed treatment plant and lift station will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. EPA's appraisal, which summarizes the assessment and reasons why an impact statement is not required, is available for public review at the Office of Public Affairs, Environmental Protection Agency, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

Busch said EPA is now processing a \$188,770 grant application to help finance the project, which includes an oxidation ditch, clarifier, sludge beds, pump station

and force main. When completed, the new system will improve water quality,

minimize health hazards and provide for orderly development.

Fresh Pure Water Soon Says Water Supply Corp.

Fresh pure water for the folks to be served by the Staff Water Supply Corp. is just around the corner.

That's the word from Corp. President Cecil Reeves and Farmers Home Administrator Supervisor E.L. Foster this week.

The first phase, which takes in the Lake Leon area, is 99.44 per cent complete. Mr. Foster said. The contractor will begin pressure testing the lines early next week. The original schedule called for a June 1 water turn-off, but some bad pipe, damaged in transit, has had to be replaced, Mr. Foster said.

Phase Two, which includes LaCasa, Flatwood, Kokomo-Carbon area is 40 per cent complete and is scheduled for an Oct. 1 turnon.

General Contractor for Phase One, Beall Construction Co. Inc. of Abilene, also won the Phase Two job on a bid of \$229,750.51. Phase One was let at \$254,627.85.

All pipes are in for the system except the LaCasa community and some small areas at scattered points, Mr. Foster said. The two giant storage tanks are nearly full. Scott Welding of Lubbock is contractor for the tanks.

Phase One sees about 66,000

feet of pipe in the ground ranging in size from two to eight inches. All is PVC type. Tank No. One, on the Lone Cedar Road has a 75,000 gallon capacity, is 86 feet high and is sitting on 63 yards of concrete.

Sewer Plant Project Gets \$188,770 Okay

Advertisements for bids to build Eastland's new sewer plant could come in about 120 days, according to word here this week.

Announcement of governmental approval for the project and grant funding, officially came Friday from Cong. Omar Burleson's office.

It marks the second major federally-approved program for Eastland this spring. Help for Eastland Memorial Hospital's expansion and renovation project came a few months ago.

Mr. Burleson said in his announcement: "Approval has been granted by the Environmental Protection Agency for a grant to Eastland for the purpose of a sewer treatment facility including oxidation ditch, clarifier, sludge beds, pump station and force main, in the total amount of \$188,770.00."

Eastland's application has made the rounds of the necessary approving agencies. It was once taken out of the lineup when approval had to be secured for a different discharge point became necessary. As recently as two months ago, a letter from one agency indicated that the application might not be considered this year.

Then word came that the city was to appear at a hearing in Dallas where several applications, including those from the larger towns in the state, were to be considered. City Manager Lewis Tiner, who attended the meeting with engineering firm officials, came back to report that the reception and the indications were that Eastland's chances would be good for approval.

Apparently Eastland's application was one of 40 considered, and picked as one of about 15 for which the Agency had funds available at this time. It was generally understood that had the application not been approved in this fiscal year, that it would be virtually impossible to secure approval later.

A representative of the city's engineering firm, Yeatts & Decker of Abilene, reported to City Manager Tiner that it would take some 120 days to finalize plans for the plant, presumably after which bids could be called for the construction.

Mr. Tiner further indicated that the agency by its questioning, expects the project to be completed in some 15 months, so hopefully the new plant could be in operation by that time.

The city has been in a peculiar position for some time. For years and years, the Water Quality Board has complained to the city about the inefficiency of the old sewer plant, and then action was taken. A bond election was called in September of 1971 at which time, voters approved \$92,000 worth of revenue bonds to help build a new plant, and an application was made for government assistance in the project.

Paperwork and details since that time delayed the beginning of the project. However the Water Quality Board has not dogged the city about its plant since the application went in.

Cong. Omar Burleson was advised of the city's need for help on the plant when he was

here as principal speaker for the Eastland Chamber of Commerce Banquet in January.

Mr. Tiner said that the money will not come, as he understands it, in a lump sum, but rather in quarterly fundings.

The old plant now being used by city was built in 1919.

The engineering firm first drew preliminary plans for the plant in 1970 and saw total cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$198,700; including \$169,600 for the plant; \$25,700 for

engineering and contingencies; and \$4,000 for legal.

At that time federal grants were available for up to one-third of the total cost. However state participation has increased the amount that could be obtained so that bond issue was drawn for only \$92,000.

Due to the lapse of time, certain revisions have been made to reflect the increases in costs. The engineers' revised total plant construction cost is now shown at \$203,400; contingencies at \$20,300; engineering cost at \$23,500;

legal \$4,000; materials testing, \$500; for a total project cost of \$251,700. The revised grant request was for \$188,700 (the amount okayed) up \$39,700 from the earlier \$149,000 asked.

Site for the new plant would probably be at the old city dump which has been closed with the opening of the city's new sanitary landfill project south of town.

Revenue from the treatment of sewerage is expected to retire the bond portion of the project, it is understood, without any tax increase.

The Minor Lions have played one more game than the Comets and it remains to be seen what Tuesday night's action could hold.

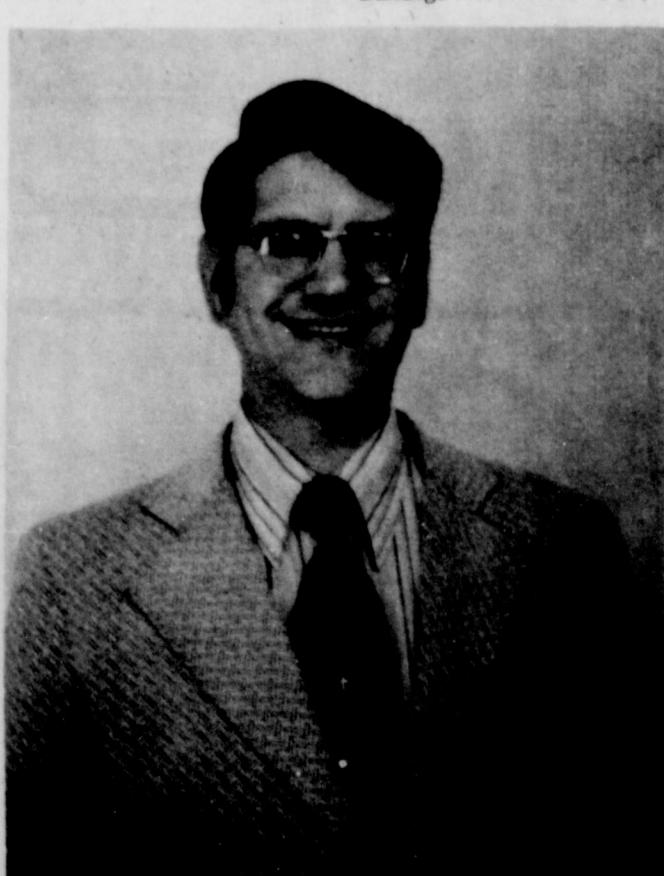

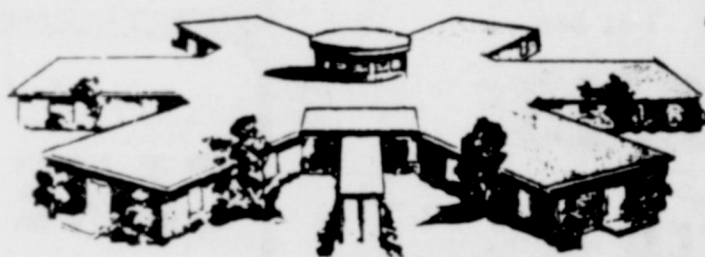

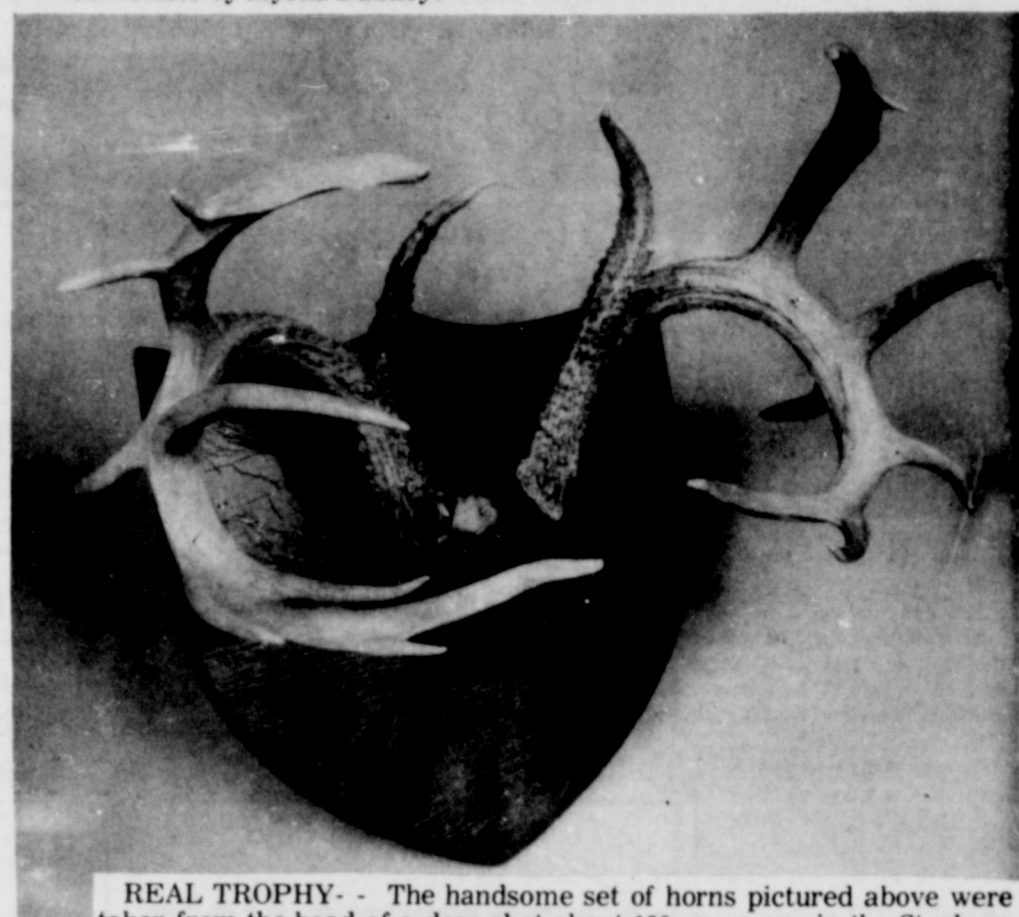

Gordon's Spot

Don't take a chance when you are using pesticides. You could poison yourself, your family, your livestock or your pets.

This is a message that Eastland County farmers will be hearing this summer. Teddy Jordan, of Route 1, Gorman, has been employed by the Extension Service as a program aide this summer. His job will be to remind farmers, mostly peanut farmers, of the need to use chemical pesticides safely. The program is known as "Project Safeguard".

DDT is no longer registered by the state and Federal regulatory agencies for agricultural use in Texas.

Insecticides used as substitutes for DDT are less persistent but generally more toxic and may be a greater hazard to persons handling, mixing, applying or otherwise exposed to the chemicals.

Teddy will visit with each farmer for a few minutes and remind him of rules of safe handling of chemicals.

We have been recommending 10 Sevin dust as a good control for squash bugs and corn ear worms. Jay Carter, feed store owner in Eastland, says they don't make 10 Sevin dust any more, but only 5 dust. I've been told by more than one gardener that 5 Sevin dust won't kill squash bugs.

However they do still make 50 and 80 Sevin wettable powder and Sevin in a liquid concentrate. Either of those used as a spray will give good control of squash bugs and chewing insects. There are also other good chemicals that are recommended for squash bug control. Regardless of the insecticide you use, be sure to read the label first.

can be done about the gray or black mold on their lawn grass.

These molds are fungi which develop mostly during warm, moist weather. The soot-type material rubs off easily on shoes or clothing. The molds derive nourishment from decaying organic matter in or on the soil, such as grass clippings. Under certain conditions, they move upward on grass blades to produce spores. They do not feed on green plants and cause no damage other than shading.

You can remove the mold from the grass by applying water under pressure with a water hose or by brushing with a broom.

We sent a sample of St. Augustine grass from a lawn in Eastland to a Plant Pathologist last week. The report said the grass had the virus disease, St. Augustine Decline (SAD). We have read and heard of the disease in other areas, but this is the first report we know of in Eastland County.

The early symptom of the disease is a yellow mottling of the leaves. There is no control of this disease. The only solution is to re-sod with a resistant variety of St. Augustine grass. A resistant variety known as Floratam is now on the market.

In early July, Eastland County farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from the Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the State of Texas and for each county. Reports are needed from many farmers

Mrs. Beavers has been teaching homemaking in the Lubbock public schools for several years. Her period of training in Eastland began Thursday and will end July 31.



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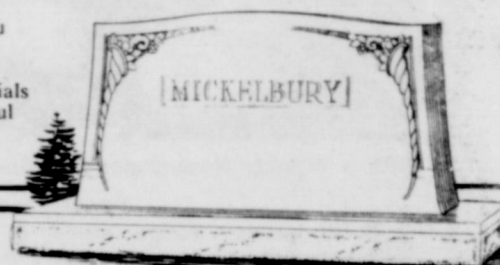

The girl died Wednesday at her home.

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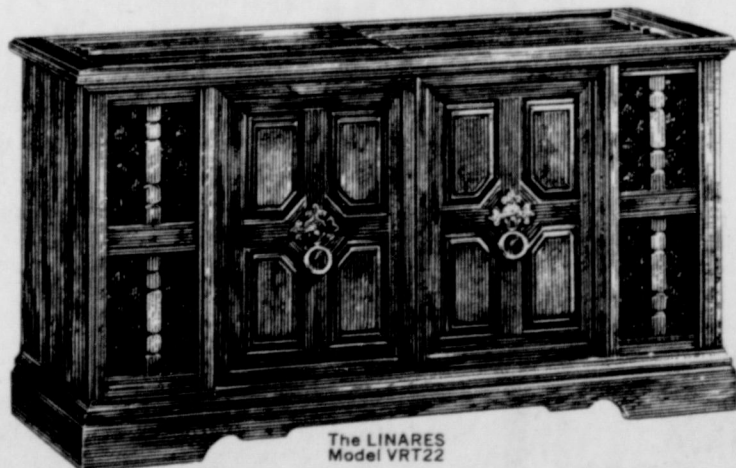
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Reception Honors Mr And Mrs. Earl H. Dick
