Bank Deposits Up, Sales At New High

Big Jump Above '57 Mark

Colorado City business, spiraling with booming holiday sales, closed out 1958 of new high level for recent years.

A check of 12 retail firms confirmed reports of outstanding increases in Christmas sales — some of the highest in history.

Deposits at City National Bank, one of the best business barometers, were up more than a million dollars over the same period in 1957.

And building permits for 1958 within the city limits amounted to a record high of \$920,339 with the entire total confined to commercial and residential building.

A dozen firms checked by the Record in the business survey ranged from clothing to grocery. All reported increases over the last year in Christmas sales.

Clothing stores reported large increases in the holiday sales. Not a one contacted in the survey reported a standstill, much less a decrease.

Drug stores reported increases, too, over previous years with big sales in cosmetics and gift items.

Toy sales were in big volume with higher levels than prior years.

Brisk holiday business was reported by jewelry stores.

Grocery stores, too, were in the holiday business swim. People were eating more, buying more in sales for the holidays.

Here are a sampling of reports from local retail firms: "Best Christmas business in history."

"Best dollar volume of business in five years."

"One of the largest volumes of Christmas business in years with a big increase over last season."

"Good increase over last year with big Christmas Eve rush, selling over a dollar worth in five hours."

"Best business ever."

Bank deposits at City National as of Dec. 31 were \$7,674,115 — more than a million dollars above the same date in 1957 when the total was \$6,652,622.

Undivided profits for the bank were up approximately \$32,000 in comparison with the same period.

The bank reported \$3,616. See SALES Pg. 7

BY TEAM OF THIEVES

\$210 Loot Taken from Grocery Cash Register

A pair of thieves rifled the cash register of Fisher's Food Center, 711 E. Second St., Friday evening and escaped with \$210 in cash and checks.

The money was taken at about 6:30 p.m. by a Negro man and woman while owner, E. M. Fisher, was alone in the store.

Fisher was kept busy at the meat counter, packaging orders for the woman, while the man emptied the cash register unnoticed.

Description of the couple was vague, but the groceryman said he believed the thieves to be strangers, possibly just passing through the city.

City police, the sheriff's department and Texas Highway Patrol joined in the investigation. But clues were meager and no developments were reported Saturday.

Fisher said the woman asked for several different kinds of luncheon meat.

"She asked for several slices of about three different kinds," he said, "and I was busy reaching into the meat case, slicing the orders and wrapping the packages."

"I wasn't paying much at

attention, but the man remained near the entrance.

"She paid me at the meat counter, so that I did not have to go to the cash register immediately."

"I was replacing the luncheon meats in the meat case when they left."

"When I returned to the cash register a few moments later, the cash drawer was open and empty."

The meat counter is on the west side of the store about 15 feet from the checking counter where the cash register is located.

Apparently, the man reached over a cigaret display and

rifled the cash register, which usually is kept partially open and is only about 18 inches from the counter.

Most of the loot taken by the couple was cash. One \$50 Cage Bros. payroll check was included, however.

Fisher said the couple were about 35 years old, both tall and neatly dressed. The man was about six feet.

Because he was busy replacing meat at the meat counter, the grocery owner was not certain that the pair left immediately in a car or walked away from the store.

But they were out of sight when he discovered the theft.

AFTER 23 YEARS

B. Wren Retires From City Staff

Byron L. (Barney) Wren met the new year as a different man.

Different, by the fact, that for the first time in more than 32 years he was not in public service.

For Wednesday, New Year's Eve, the city building inspector and fire marshal retired from the municipal staff in a brief ceremony in City Hall.

Wren, 65, had been a member of the city's staff for 23 years since February 1936.

Prior to his municipal service, he was an employe on the Mitchell County Precinct 1 crew for six and a half years, plus three years with the State Highway Department.

For the last 29 and a half years — while with the city and county — he has worked from the same block where City Hall and Precinct 1 equipment are located.

Mayor Pro Tem L. J. Taylor, City Attorney John Worrell, City Manager Rollin K. Sneath, City Secretary Ford Merritt and City Water Supt. Bill Oyler were on hand to bid Wren farewell Wednesday at City Hall.

Taylor, who thanked Wren for his service to the city and community, presented him with a stetson hat and his severance pay check.

"I have certainly enjoyed working with all of you," Wren said, "and this has been a good council."

Reminiscing, Wren counted back years when he started with the city as a maintainer operator — a job he continued for 15 years.

He became building inspector and fire marshal eight years ago.

"I've had a good many bosses," he continued, recalling that he had served under three mayors (before the council form of government) — Sadler, Brazil and Martin; plus four city managers — Boone, Tallent, Dozier and Sneath.

"And I can honestly say that I liked 'em all, but one." Wren doesn't plan to retire to idleness. He has property here that will require attention and he plans some construction business.

Three New Officials Take Oath

Three new faces checked in this week at Courthouse.

The trio — County Judge Elmer Martin, District Clerk Billy Howard (Bill) Erwin and Precinct 1 Justice of Peace T. E. (Judge) Arnold — were administered the oath of office New Year's Eve by retiring County Judge Sam Bullock.

Joining with the newcomers in new four-year terms were Precinct 1 Commissioner W. N. (George) Bacon, Precinct 4 Commissioner Moody Richardson, County School Supt. Roy Davis Coles, County Clerk Gilbert Leach and County Treasurer Louise Hardison — all reelected in last fall's general election.

Administering the oath of office to the officials was the final act in office by Bullock, who decided not to run again for the judgeship to which he was elected for three 2-year terms and one 4-year term.

And Commissioner Court members were ready with a verbal tribute and a gift to signal his retirement.

"Judge," spoke Precinct 1 Commissioner Sam Bullock, "we as members of Mitchell County Commissioners Court want you to know that we have enjoyed serving and working with you these years."

"This gift is a token of our appreciation — appreciation for your service to the county and your friendly relationship with members of this court."

Bullock, whose eyes watered behind his glasses, unwrapped the shirt and tie, then spoke: "I have enjoyed working with this court."

"And I feel it has been an honor to have been elected and to have served as county judge for 10 years."

He then expressed hope and belief that his successor, Martin, would render valuable service to the county.

He then handed Martin a Bible which he had kept in his office through those four consecutive terms of office.

Faculty Announced for Christian Life School

Religious leaders from Dallas, Fort Worth and Midland head the faculty for Colorado City's Second-Annual School for Christian Living.

Faculty for the interdenominational school, Jan. 29 through Feb. 4, was announced Saturday by Rev. Don Hungerford, vicar of All Saints' Episcopal Church and dean for the school.

All total, eight persons are included on the faculty which will direct studies in various fields of Christian living.

Keynote course for the school — taught for the entire enrollment each night at general assembly — will be "Acts of the Apostles," a study of

the spread of the gospel from the time of Christ through the founding of the Christian Church in New Testament times.

Teaching the course will be Rev. Richard F. Neal, a former geologist, now rector of St. Nicholas' Episcopal Church in Midland.

Other out-of-towners serving on the faculty will be Mrs. Luther Holcomb of Dallas, a Baptist and president of United Council of Church Women of Dallas; Rev. Frank Mabree of Fort Worth, state director of Christian Education, Texas Board of Christian Churches; Mrs. Harold Morris of Coahoma, former director of reli-

gious education in various churches across the state and now wife of the Coahoma Methodist minister.

Mrs. Holcomb will direct a new feature of the 1959 School of Christian Living — a youth breakfast each morning.

County Gains Oiler, New Drilling Site

A lone producer and a new drilling site have been logged in oil fields in Mitchell County's western area.

Magnolia Petroleum No. 44 Mary Foster is the new oiler, completed in the Iatan-East Howard Field.

Spotted as a new drilling location is Humble Oil & Refining No. 5 Oren Trulock, a test in the Westbrook Field.

Magnolia No. 44 Foster pumped 162.76 barrels of 28.1 gravity oil, plus four per cent water, on a 24-hour test after fracturing with 409,000 gallons.

Production was from perforations between top of pay, 2,444 feet, and 2,788 feet. Depth was plugged back to 2,807 from previous 2,840 feet.

Site of the new well is 660 feet from south and 2,105 feet from west lines, Section 7, Block 29, T-1-S, T&P Survey.

The new Westbrook Field test, Humble No. 5 Trulock, will drill to 3,200 feet. Site will be seven miles southwest of Westbrook.

CLOTHING STORE TO EXPAND

Barber Shop Moving to Make Space for Retail Expansion

First move in a major business expansion for downtown Colorado City is scheduled over the weekend.

Smith-Gunn-Bassham Barber Shop will move from its present location, 116 E. Second St., to a new location in the same block.

The move will be the first of three to make way for a retail clothing store expansion by W. M. (Willie) Landau, owner of Landau's Men's Store.

Landau has announced plans for an expansion in 1959 that will take over the location to be vacated by Smith-Gunn-

Bassham and two other adjacent buildings — Farmer's Candy Kitchen, 118 E. Second St., and C. S. Thomas Real Estate, 120 E. Second.

Detailed plans for the Landau development and expansion will be announced later.

Smith-Gunn-Bassham Barber Shop will move to the E. Second building previously occupied by Charles Roach Barber Shop and next door west of Best Yet Cafe.

The move will be made over the weekend and Smith-Gunn-Bassham will be open for business Tuesday.

Simultaneously with the

move, Burt Smith and Herb Gunn, former owners of the barber shop, announced the inclusion of Geze Bassham in the shop's partnership.

Bassham has been a member of the Smith-Gunn staff for several years.

The trio — Smith, Gunn and Bassham — purchased the Roach shop, Roach, in turn, will move to Abilene, where he has bought a shop.

Smith began barbering here in 1920. Gunn began his career just four years later in 1924. They became partners in 1949 and moved to their present location in 1951.

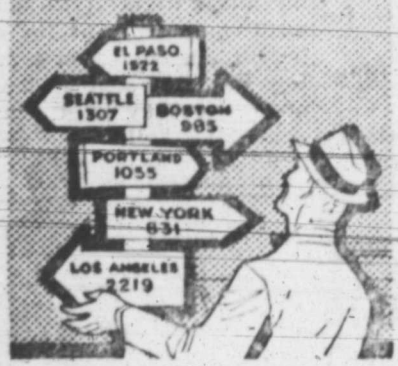

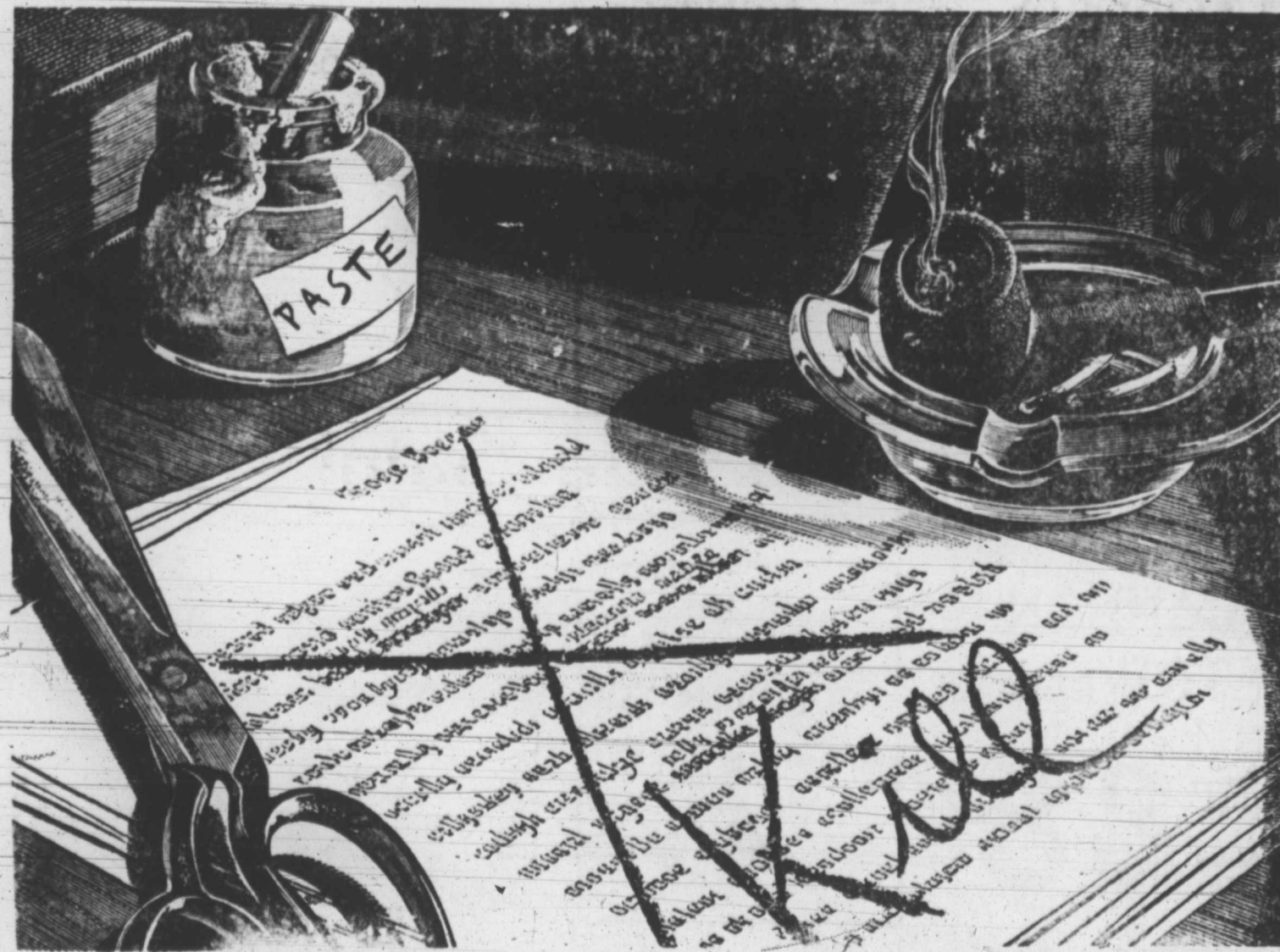

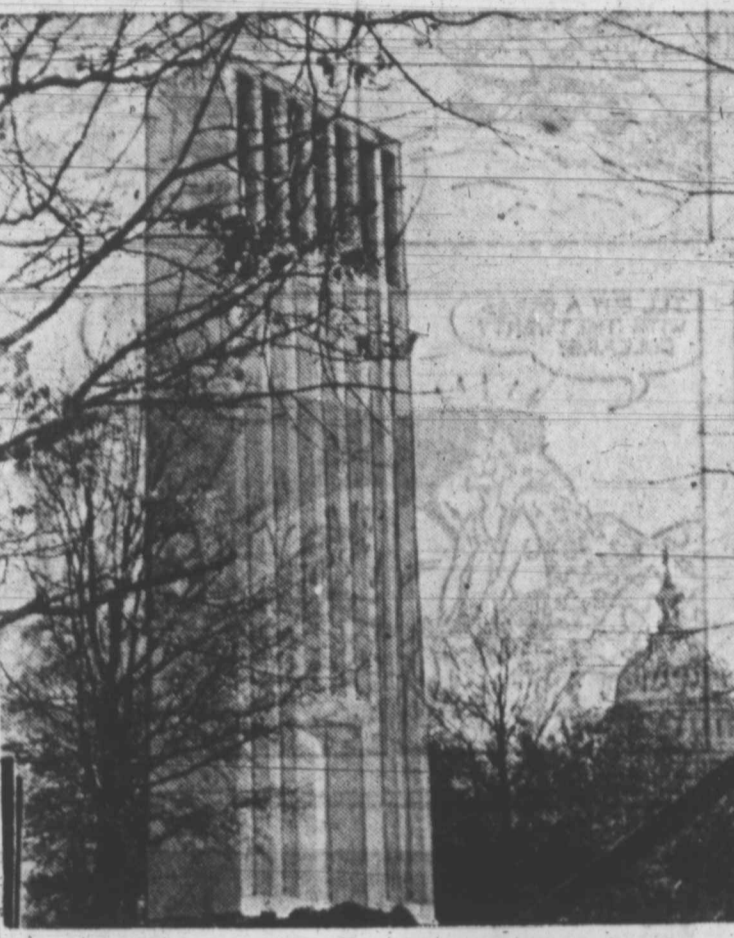
