A detailed survey of the territory surrounding Lubbock to determine if a sufficient number of dairy cows are kept to guarantee a supply of milk for a large milk products plant and to investigate other phases of the dairying industry will be made in the near future, it was determined by the board of directors of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development, in meeting assembled Wednesday.

This survey is to be made in connection with efforts to get the Douthett Engineering company, owners and operators of a number of milk products plants over the country, to build a large plant here. Recently the president of this company visited Lubbock and another representative was here for several days. Also, the company wired the Chamber of Commerce here just before the last recent board election, that with good roads leading to Lubbock and a sufficient number of dairy cows available from which to get their raw products, the company would establish its plant in this city.

Head Plan For Tech
The directors took under advisement the suggestion of Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college, that it cooperate with the college in advertising the Tech extension school to secure an increase in attendance for the coming year. Dr. Horn held the body that last year it was figured that students at Tech's summer school brought into the business channels of Lubbock approximately \$200,000. He reviewed the growth of this season of the college. It stated that last year with 220 students, the second having 212 and last year, the third 203.

Reports were made by a number of committees and details of planning for the coming year were given by the directors.

BREAKFAST—Baked bananas, cereal, cream, crisp bacon, potatoes hashed in cream, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Vegetable stew, rye bread, apple compote, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked halibut, egg sauce, austring potatoes, mashed turnips, head lettuce with French dressing, toasted cheese sandwiches, steamed cranberry pudding, milk, coffee.

The vegetable stew is improved by the addition of a cup of stock made from the bone of the leg of lamb suggested for the preceding dinner.

Small, square or triangular cheese sandwiches are toasted in a very hot oven and are served with the salad.

Apple Compote Five or six apples, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1-3 cup blanched and shredded almonds, 1 lemon, 1/2 cup whipping cream, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1-4 teaspoon vanilla.

Pare and core apples taking care not to break them. Dissolve 1 cup sugar in water and boil 5 minutes, until syrupy. Add grated rind and juice of lemon. Add apples and cook until tender.

In Dowell, Castleberry and Moody, Coach Morgan has a trio of performers who will make a mark in the Tech stays in the team this season. Plan of Heydler Tabled By Junior Circuit Managers

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—The American League wants its pitchers to do their own hitting. Club owners, meeting today, decided against the plan advocated by John A. Heydler, president of the National League, to have ten-man teams, the tenth to be used as a substitute batsman for the pitcher. They decided the idea was unsound, and cast it overboard with the result that it probably will not even be discussed when the club owners of the American and National Leagues meet in their joint session tomorrow.

The American League also decided to ignore the minor league draft meeting at West Baden, Indiana, January 10, because they felt that no new solution of the draft problem had been offered by the minor league managers in their meeting at Toronto last week. In deciding to disregard the minor league draft meeting, the American League owners followed the National League magnates, who made a similar decision yesterday. Billy Evans, manager of the Cleveland Indians, thought the proposed change was ridiculous.

Frank J. Navin, president of the Detroit club, was re-elected vice-president of the Philadelphia, Washington, St. Louis and Detroit clubs constituting the new board of directors. Trade talk simmered around the lobby of the Congress Hotel but it was mostly conversation. The only deal disclosed was the purchase of Earl Crabtree, center fielder with the Oklahoma City club, and one of the leading hitters of the Western League last season. He was purchased by the Cincinnati Nationals for a reported price of \$10,000.

Eugene "Bubbles" Hargrave, pitcher with the Cincinnati Reds, may become manager of the St. Paul club in the American Association next season. If a satisfactory deal can be arranged, St. Paul, it is understood, was willing to part with Paul Zahniser or "Huck" Betts, pitchers, and perhaps some cash to obtain Hargrave. 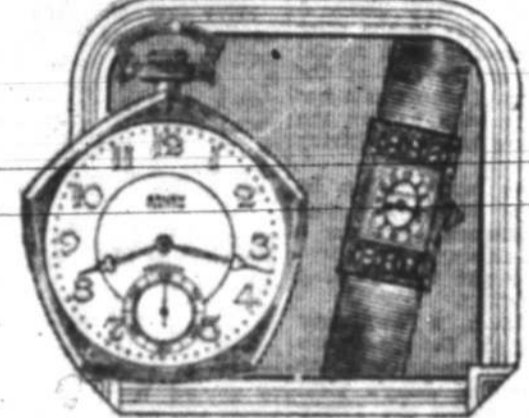

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Unofficial Washington didn't take kindly at all to the first informal utterance of H. Hoover, president-elect.

It had to do with plans for his inauguration. Despite walls of anguish against the era of inaugural simplicity by the Washington citizenry, boards of trade, federal clubs of all kinds and other organizations of non-political character, Mr. Hoover decreed even simpler inaugural services than those of his immediate predecessors in the White House.

The Hoover declaration of policy took the local folks between wind-and-water. They thought it over in silence for a while, but finally broke into open revolt.

What seemed to have actually got the impending local uprising against inaugural simplicity into the action stage was announcement by mine host of that Pennsylvania hostelry, the Willard, that 300 Hoover home-town-ers from Palo Alto had made reservations for inauguration week.

It seemed entirely probable, however, that Mr. Hoover was going to see his first pronouncement calmly brushed to one side by Washington folks and an elaborate inauguration fiesta worked up regardless of his point of view.

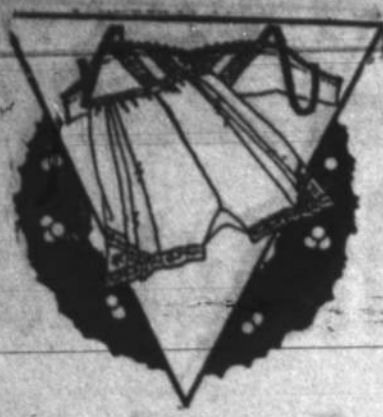
