

# Farmers Anxious Over Cost Of Gas

"The cost of natural gas for irrigation has increased so tremendously in our area as to raise a question as to how long farmers can pay the price to power their irrigation wells," according to Willie Gene Green, one of the directors of Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association, headquartered in Hereford.

"We have experienced great raises in the charge for natural gas and further increases are threatened during the pumping season. Should the price increase much further, farmers in the area will not be able to

pay the price and will have to cut off their irrigation wells," he explained.

"The supplier of natural gas for irrigation purposes in the Panhandle and South Plains is not regulated by any State or Federal agency, and the farmer can do nothing but pay the price, or have his well cut off.

"In an effort to secure some regulation and protection such as municipalities and other users enjoy, area farmers have formed an association to call their plight to the attention of the governor of the State of Texas, and ask him to call a

special session of the Legislature to halt this spiraling cost and give farmers some protection against unregulated monopoly."

To this end, petitions to the Governor are waiting in local area banks and farm supply centers for interested farmers to sign. Green urges all farmers to hasten to register their interest by signing one of the necessary petitions.

"We are not criticizing any company, we are just trying to do something to protect ourselves. It is a matter of economical survival with us.

This is an effort to make people aware of our needs."

Area meetings are soon to be held for further discussion of

the matter in Plainview, Dimmitt and Lubbock. Dates are not yet available for these meetings.

## Storm Season Nears, Tips Given By Fire Dept.

As all citizens are well aware, the season for severe weather is again upon us. As in the past, the Hart Fire Department will maintain a storm watch whenever the weather appears to be threatening. CB channel 14 will be used. Citizens of the community are invited to turn to channel 14 when a storm watch is in progress and monitor the development of the weather as observed by the Fire Department.

However, citizens are urged not to transmit on this channel unless in an extreme emergency situation. Unnecessary use of this channel while it is in use by the Fire Department blocks necessary communications.

During the periods of severe weather, Hart Fire Department will maintain radio contact with the Castro County Sheriff's Office, and any pertinent weather information will be broadcast to those monitoring CB channel 14.

Citizens of Hart are asked to familiarize themselves with the telephone number used to notify the Fire Department of an emergency. This number is 938-2500 and should be used only for reporting a fire or some other type of emergency. The number to contact the Fire Department for reasons other than an emergency is 938-2595.

Residents are also asked to familiarize themselves with the siren warning signals used for severe weather. Three blasts of the siren indicate a "warning." This means there is a very strong POSSIBILITY of a tornado or some other type of damaging weather. One long blast of the siren indicates "take cover." This means that a tornado has been sighted and appears to be a threat to the community. Citizens are urged to use their own discretion in deciding when the danger has passed.

The Hart Fire Department

expressed thanks to area residents for their past help and cooperation and solicit their continued cooperation in the endeavors discussed above.

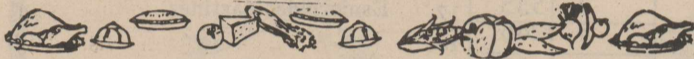

## Cook Of The Week

Included in the recipes she shares this week with Hart Beat readers is a cake sauce which has been in her husband's family for years. They enjoy it poured over any plain cake.

**BROCCOLI SUPREME** (Can be frozen)

1 1/2 pounds fresh broccoli or  
1 10-oz. pkg. frozen chopped  
broccoli  
1 can condensed cream of  
chicken soup  
1 T flour  
1/2 c sour cream  
1/4 c grated carrot  
1 T grated onion  
1/4 t salt  
1/8 t pepper  
3/4 (or more if wanted) c  
herb-seasoned stuffing mix  
2 T butter or oleo, melted

Fresh broccoli should be peeled, outer leaves and tough part of stalks discarded. Cut remaining broccoli into 1-inch pieces. Cook stalk pieces in boiling salted water 5 to 8 minutes; add flowerets. Cook till tender, about 5 minutes more. (or, prepare frozen broccoli according to package.) Drain. Blend together soup and flour. Add sour cream, carrot, onion, salt, pepper; stir in broccoli. Turn into 2-quart casserole. Combine stuffing mix and melted butter, sprinkle on top of dish. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or till hot through.

**IMPERIAL BROWNIES**

3/4 c sifted flour

1/4 t baking soda  
1/4 t salt  
1/2 c sugar  
1/3 c shortening  
2 T water  
1 pkg. (6 oz.) semisweet  
chocolate pieces  
1 t vanilla  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1/2 c chopped pecans

Sift flour, soda and salt together. Combine sugar, shortening and water; bring just to boiling, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; add chocolate pieces and vanilla. Stir until blended. Beat in the eggs thoroughly. Blend in flour mixture, then the nuts. Spread in a greased 9-inch square pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 25 minutes. If desired, frost with confectioner's sugar icing. Makes 16 cookies.

**CAKE SAUCE**

Mix together in saucepan:

1/2 c sugar  
2 T flour  
1/4 t salt  
2 T butter oleo  
Add milk-cook on top of stove to boiling point:  
1 1/2 c milk  
1 t vanilla

Remove from heat, add vanilla and serve warm over plain cake.

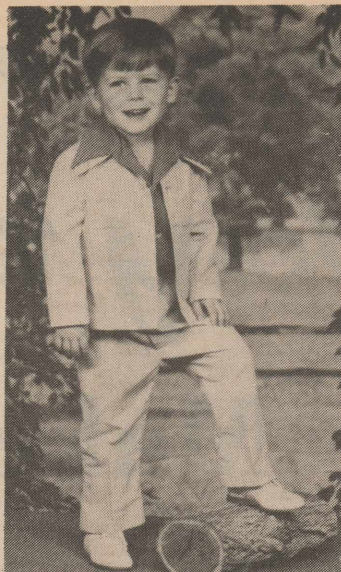



