YOAKLEYS RETURN FROM CHRISTMAS TRIP

"From memories of childhood, I recall the past as possum and later time came to me once again. Wife, Adlai, Carlene, Ernestine and I loaded into our Chevrolet Sedan enroute to Shiloh, Texas, near Fort Worth and Dallas to visit my dear mother. We drove 1450 miles without a puncture, out \$11.00 for gas and put in oil once, used 1 quart of water in radiator. We found Canadian, Texas, on our way down quietly shopping for Xmas, Mobeetie and Wheeler in the same mood. Shamrock, Wellington and Childress crowded so bad we had to watch our step passing thru. Quannah medium, Vernon moving and Wichita Falls rushing, Bowie busy and from there to Fort Worth quiet. When we reached Ft. Worth limits we went in a jam for twenty miles until we reached the east side limit. I stood and pondered at her magnificent structures and advancement over the days of my childhood. I could look back and see the small street cars with passengers back to back and feet outside, with two or three mules strung out for power, and mud and slime galore.

Friends, I got my eyes opened on prohibition. Of all the dirty dumps you ever saw are now where once the decent saloon was, and let me say the saloon was a credit to compare with the prohibition hole.

I solved the problem why the small town is passing away and the city getting the trade they once had. Not good roads, not cars. Now, they are in the old rut. Why would a man want to purchase gas and oil to drive sixty miles to bargain for merchandise if he could get what he wanted at home. The small town merchant has the old system of all credit and slow service, and out of date stock. One among many was advanced and prosperous. He had modern fixtures, service and down to date stock. Wish to congratulate my own town for their advancement.

We came back via Mineral Wells, Weatherford, Brookridge, Albany and Childress, Texas. Passed by the beautiful K. of P. orphan home in Weatherford. Stopped and shook the hand of Uncle Henry Miller. He is a fine specimen of true manhood, white headed, cheerful and very neat and clean. We stayed all night at Seymour, Texas, at the Seymour Hotel. Had double rooms, with bath and breakfast for five \$8.50, also steam heat. This hotel has fifty rooms, American plan, elevator and colored service, each table a special waitress and service to the dot. Soon we will have the same (The Hobbs).

My mother's store is in a rural district and located just south of her home 200 feet and her five room cottage is on top of a knoll, surrounded with Bermuda grass and in the front yard bushy cedar. We drove in home at 6:00 P. M., by the store and in front of the old home place and stopped and honked our horn, then unloaded for the greeting of a little woman weighing about 110 pounds, with high forehead, blue eyes and gray hair that was once brown and face with that same sweet expression. She said, "well, son, I am glad to see you. Son, has been so long, three years since you were here." Our dinner, boys, was by mother's hand. The table oblong in a dining room of flow-ers, and seats for twelve. Turkey and dressing with gravy, cranberry sauce, blackberry jam, jelly of all kinds, pickles, fruits, vegetables, fruit salad, celery, biscuit, light bread, cake and this and that. Let me close with the memory of a full stomach. Now the parting came the withered weak hand that fell into mine, and the parting lips that said goodbye, son. I once said to a Jew you have no flag. He said, no, but I have a God, a mother and a heart.

FACULTY COMMENT

The mid-year examinations are on this week and things have taken on a rather busy hum with most of us. The teachers will have considerable paper grading to do before the term grades are ready to be announced. After the first term is over, new courses will be started in some instances.

Naturally, of course, there will be a certain per cent of failures at the end of the first term's work as it is usually impossible for every student in school to make a passing grade on every subject pursued. However, in the present instance, a number of failures may be attributed to just a plain case of "loafing on the job." There is no doubt about this. But we feel it is no fault of our teachers as we have from the very beginning of school urged, implored, encouraged, persuaded, admonished and reminded the students,

both collectively and individually, in regard to the importance of doing good thorough work as time went on. Now then if a few "day-dreamers and star-gazers" wake up at this late hour and find out that they are woefully behind the procession, they have no one to blame but themselves. The best thing for a high school student to find out in this world is, that there is such a thing as individual responsibility in doing his school work. He must do his own learning. With the teacher taking the lead, he should be able to follow directions and suggestions. No one would be more glad to see every student passing than the teacher himself or herself. It is easier to handle the student who passes his work than the one who cannot or does not. For this reason, and others as well, it must not be said that the teachers have not done everything reasonable within their power in order to keep the students up to the passing mark at least. The time has come when parents or students need not think that a student will be passed merely because he has spent a year in a grade. What he does in that grade during the year that he is in it should be the determining factor in passing. In other words the quality of his work should be considered above everything else. The wise administrator or teacher is aware of this and will act accordingly.

We often hear some one say something about the proposed new high school building which Perryton will have to consider in the very near future. This talk seems to be well in place for, beyond question, if a good crop is made this year, the high school next winter will be crowded beyond all capacity. As it is now, there is no extra room for anything and about two more rooms would come in mighty handy at times. The unfortunate part of the situation is that a brick building cannot be "stretched" to suit the conveniences.

So about the only solution is to make more room. It would not be the best economy in the world to wait and let extremely crowded conditions overtake us. If that were done, it would most certainly mean a year of haphazard, half-done school work. That would mean a greater cost in the long run. Neither would the idea of making a good crop before starting this project make any material difference. The building would likely be put up on a thirty or forty-year bond issue and, even though a good crop might be at hand when it is erected, a bad crop might be here when it is finally paid for. So this item should make little or no difference over such a long stretch of time. The school must go on anyway and a good school with ample accommodations is about the best drawing card that Perryton could hope for in the future. No, this is not too early to begin making plans for a bigger and better school in the future.

A number of schools around over the country have become so crowded that they have to teach in churches, court houses, and most any other kind of buildings available. This condition is never satisfactory and usually results in demoralizing and disorganizing the school. The unity and efficiency of the work is too much impaired when this is the case. One thing that the Perryton School will need in the near future if it is to raise up to the standard of the best high schools, is a good chemistry laboratory. This is impossible in the present building as no room or provision has been made for it. But this is only one item of the many that will be needed.

To be perfectly frank about the matter, we believe that the best thing for both teacher and student to do with his school work is to make it his religion—put it first and let nothing under the sun come between him and that work. School work is,

or ought to be, strictly a business proposition and should have first call over any of the little secondary or incidental matters that are put up as excuses for not going ahead with important school work. If more of us would look at the matter in this light we might be surprised at the good results. So far as we know, this has been the attitude of the most successful men and women in life and no other key to success in any line of endeavor has been pointed out to us. So why not go the safe and sane route. Our "frame of mind" counts a good deal in this world when it comes to success or failure. Yet a good many people go ahead and fail and then wonder how it all happened anyway. We do not have to go far to find the explanation in such cases.

Up to this time, we are extremely gratified at the co-operation of patrons and friends of the school. The co-operation and good will (and we are also glad to say a few compliments) have been a great stimulus and encouragement to us in our work. We are trying to give the people of the Perryton District a school that is worth while and trust that they will be satisfied with, and appreciative of, our best efforts in doing so. It is much easier to conduct the school when we have the patrons with us as this insures a stronger co-operation and approval at all times. We sincerely appreciate their efforts and attitudes in behalf of the school and hope to have this assistance until the end of the year.

It is our intention to run some written themes of our students in the School News from time to time, in the hope that the friends and patrons will enjoy reading them. We believe that this will not only serve as a stimulus to the students in high school English, but will at the same time give the public a sample of our "wares." These themes often are based upon some current topic or problem and show what the students can do in the way of needed thinking. Let us hope that these themes will prove of interest to the readers concerned.

MY EXPERIENCE AS A DIME

I was quickly picked up and spent as soon as they could reach a near by store. 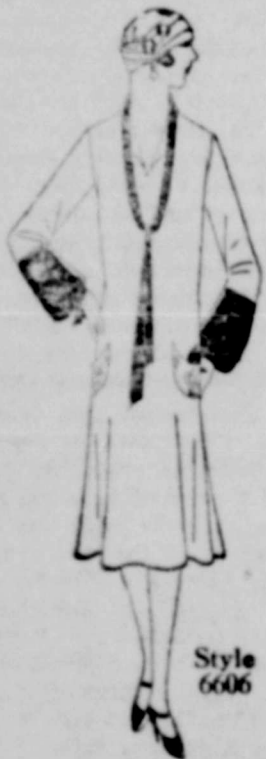

MY LADY NICOTINE.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

Where Narragansetts Fought and Died

It was bitter cold that winter morning in 1675 and the snow lay deep on the ground. But in the Indian fort of Sunke Squaw the hearts of the red men were warm, for in its security they felt little fear of an attack by the white men had driven King Philip, the Wampanoag leader, out of Massachusetts to seek a refuge among Chief Canonicet's fierce Narragansetts. They did not know that the colonies of Massachusetts Bay, Plymouth and Connecticut were sending Gov. Josiah Winslow of Plymouth with a force of nearly a thousand men against them.

This fort, which stood near what is now South Kingston, R. I., covered several acres of ground and was built on high ground surrounded by a treacherous swamp. It was protected on all sides by heavy palisades driven deep into the ground and its only entrance was over a narrow log bridge. It was probably the finest stronghold ever built by Indians, and in it were 3,000 red men.

Winslow's army arrived late in the afternoon of December 19, and, despite the fact that the colonists were weary from their long march through the snow, an attack was launched immediately. Again and again they were driven back as they tried to gain an entrance over the log bridge. Six of their captains and a large number of soldiers were killed. Then Capt. Benjamin Church, the most famous New England Indian fighter, assailed the rear of the fort where it was least protected, and although he was shot three times he succeeded in leading his men over the walls.

Inside the stronghold the battle raged more fiercely than ever, for the Indians put up a stubborn defense from within their wigwams, made bullet proof by the great stores of food piled in them. Finally Church gave the order to fire the wigwams, and as the lodges burst into flames the Indians were forced out into the open. But it was a costly victory for the whites, for their loss was 80 killed and 150 wounded.

Nearly 1,000 of the Indians were killed or died of cold and hunger soon afterward. The power of the Narragansetts was broken. King Philip escaped, but the capture of Sunke Squaw was the beginning of the end. Within a year he had been run to earth and New England's great Indian war was over.

BOX PLAITS

An exceptionally smart effect is gained in the Jenny model I have sketched here at the left. In this dress pairs of the box plaits are held together near the bottom of the skirt with narrow bands of fur applied as shown at A, thus making a kind of double plait. The plait between each of these pairs is left free.

Another unusual and decorative treatment of box plaits is shown in the heavy silk crepe frock at the right. Here the plaits are arranged in points at the top. To do this lay the plaits in the usual way as shown at B. Cut the tops into points as at C. Then slash down about a half inch between the plaits as shown at D. Turn under the raw edges as at E and the skirt portion is ready to be applied to the upper portion of the dress.

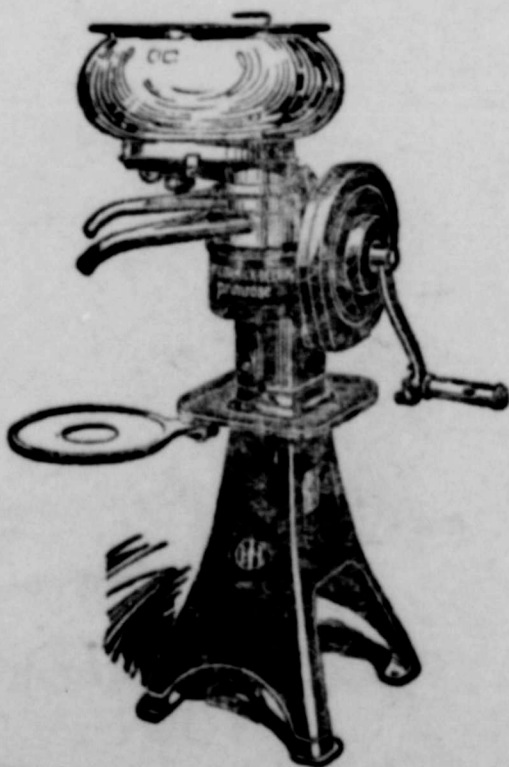

Don't Violate the Law!

The following laws were enacted for the protection of personal property and they must be observed in Ochiltree County. This law will be enforced to the full extent. The following are extracts from the 1925 State Highway Commission Motor Vehicle Registration Rules.

14. The driving of any motor vehicle without the owner's consent is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$1000 or imprisonment of twelve months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 34. Climbing Upon or Attempting to Manipulate Motor Vehicle.—Any person who shall, without consent of owner or person in charge of vehicle, climb upon or in such vehicle, whether same be in motion or at rest, or should while such vehicle is at rest and unattended, attempt to manipulate any of the levers, crank or other device or to set said vehicle in motion, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period of sixty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. (Art. 1259cc. Penal Code.)
