25-Foot Sloop, Lots Of Nerve And You Can Take That Voyage

NEW YORK, June 14 (UP)—A merry little man with the wit of the Irish ever bubbling through Kevin O. Riorden is the envy of the world's yachtsmen today.

Riorden, along with Humphrey D. E. Barton, recently completed a 47-day 3,600 mile trip across the Atlantic in a 25-foot, single-masted sloop, which didn't have either motor or radio.

"I'm in the process of trying to arrange passage back home."

"And on the largest liner I can find," he quips, blue eyes twinkling.

As for the voyage which is behind him, Riorden seems to think that People have made too much fuss about it.

"It didn't take any courage," he denied. "Actually there was nothing to it."

That, of course, is the opinion of a man who spent his best years chasing the murderous Dacots as Britain's deputy police commissioner in India.

He'll tell you that wasn't very much, either, except for the fact that "I was a bad rider and kept falling off horses, breaking bits off myself."

Riorden thinks that his wife was much more of a hero.

"Imagine, I was just an old fool dragged in at the last moment," he said. "Barton needed a wire and I was it. I got a wire and I went to go and she didn't hesitate a moment. She just said, 'Right off, to go ahead.'"

So they did. They sailed out of Falmouth on April 15th and arrived in the fog which shrouded New York on the afternoon of June 1. But there was quite a bit of sailing in between, and seven gales, the last of which almost stove in the staunch little craft.

"Barton kept telling me I hadn't seen a gale yet," he chuckled. "Well, he didn't say any more after that last one. The waves were 35 feet high and we had to lash ourselves to the boat. Barton fractured a rib and the waves splintered the top of the cabin, filling it knee-deep with water."

Those were the only casualties of the trip.

"Oh, yes, except one," the 64-year-old pleasure sailor said. "I broke a tooth on a ship's biscuit."

Hurt, y'know, for a while."

Listen to Riorden and you get the idea that it was like crossing the lake in Central Park on a quiet Sunday afternoon. This although they feared for a while that they might run out of water, the oranges aboard shivered up, both men started to break out in boils, the eggs they had with them got "very loud", the chronometer fell in the bilge and was useless, and they were constantly soaked through.

"I thought once of rowing over to France," grinned Riorden, who did row him self around the Isle of Wight. "And I threatened to follow Barton in a rowboat if he didn't take me. Actually, I'm too old for such frolics."

So it's home the easy way for Kevin O. Riorden. But he did prove that adventure is still with us, ready and waiting for the taking.

Ranchers Must Care For Grass, Turney Says

"We must take care of our grass," Henry Turney of the soil conservation service said last Thursday night at the regular monthly meeting of the Eastland county farm bureau.

Turney explained how our lack of respect for grass in the past 50 years has practically ruined many of our ranges.

"In the past we thought we had to take all the grass," said Turney, "but now we know we must leave approximately half of it for the grass to survive over a period of years and also to have a better soil to take in and hold more moisture."

L. R. Higginbottom, of Kokomo, presided in the absence of the president, E. E. Backwell and introduced Turney.

After Turney's speech, Higginbottom demonstrated a few slight of the hand tricks which were very interesting and confusing. At Higginbottom's request, J. M. Cooper, county agent, appointed Mrs. Ben Freeman and Mrs. Howard Ingram as program committee for next month.

W. B. Starr made a motion that the Farm Bureau go on record endorsing the Rural Telephone Cooperative movement. This motion was seconded and carried unanimously.

R. L. Palmer of Desdemona, one of the directors of the Eastland county farm bureau urged that all members be present at the next meeting to make preparation for the big membership drive.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Ranger Helps Salvation Army Do Texas Work

The Salvation Army last year reached out to bring to more Texans in need its spiritual and welfare services.

Commenting on the state-wide activities of 1949 given in a report just issued, Lt. Col. John A. Morrison, Texas divisional commander, said:

"Through the generosity of thousands of Texans who contribute annually to the Salvation Army we are able to serve more people than ever before in our history."

G. A. Murphy, chairman of the Ranger community service unit of the Army, pointed out that a part of the support for the state-wide program comes from funds subscribed by the local unit. Miss Helen Dawley is treasurer for the local unit.

Col. Morrison chose three items from the Salvation Army report for highlighting:

1. The giving of 26,945 Christmas toys to needy children plus "Christmas Cheer" packages to 20,229 others.

2. The provision of aid to 91,189 homeless persons—172,180 nights lodging and 433,519 meals.

3. The growth of the Salvation Army's youth program. During the year 28,576 youth educational and character building meetings were conducted with an attendance of 637,981—fifty per cent above the attendance of last year.

In addition, the Salvation Army in Texas and conducted more than 10,000 religious and evangelistic services, provided counsel and assistance to 1,078 ex-prisoners paroled to its care, and provided many other services to those needing a helping hand.

One of the outstanding single events of the year was the completion at San Antonio of a new \$275,000 hospital and home for unmarried mothers who come to the Salvation Army for help from all parts of the state.

MP's Faces Red

Oklahoma Badman Cook Plays Fox For German, American Cops

MUNICH, Germany, June 14 (UP) Hundreds of heavily armed police with orders to shoot on sight searched through Munich and the Bavarian countryside today for Germany's public enemy No. 1, Oklahoma badman Homer Cook, who broke out of jail for the third time in two months.

American military police were ordered: "Don't ask any questions. Fill him full of lead."

The 27-year-old Cook, a 200-pound, six-foot-one former boxer, ripped a bar from a window of the Dachau prison library, leaped outside and dashed across a field into the Bavarian woods.

He scaled three walls, one 12 feet high and topped with barbed wire. A prison guard said he took aim at Cook but that his rifle jammed.

A cold rain fell throughout the night. Cook, with no money and clad only in cotton trousers and undershirt, was expected soon to make some break for food and clothing.

American and German police, led by blood hounds, hunted him throughout the night.

Their chase took them to a displaced persons camp near Dachau shortly after midnight. Terrified residents of the camp were awakened by 50 soldiers and policemen armed with carbines and pistols. No resident admitted seeing Cook, however, and a thorough search failed to show a trace of him.

The last time he was seen was at 3:45 a. m., just as dawn was breaking. A soldier said he saw Cook dash across a road in Dachau and plunge into the underbrush.

Cook was wearing only one shoe, the soldier said. He had lost the other just outside the prison. In one of his previous escapes Cook left his shoes behind on purpose, explaining later: "You can

run faster without your shoes, mister."

Cook was under guard by Pfc. William King, a neighbor from Cook's home town of Muskogee, Okla., when he made his break.

King was summoned before a board of inquiry of high-ranking army officers which met in an all-night session at the prison. No one would comment on results of the meeting after it ended, but one officer said:

"It looks like the United States Army is very embarrassed."

Cook was scheduled to be tried next Wednesday by a U. S. district court on 19 charges resulting from his two previous escapes after he returned to Germany illegally to see his Bavarian girl friend, Anna Sporer, 21.

Officials of the Dachau jail said Cook was in the prison library just after dark to select a wild West book for bedtime readings. Suddenly he slugged the slender King.

Reaching an outside window, Cook ripped off a steel grating and pried an opening between steel bars set 7 and one half inches apart. He then fled across open fields surrounding the prison.

It was Cook's second escape from Dachau prison and his third from jails in Germany since last April 12. He escaped first from the German-controlled Munich jail but was recaptured 24 hours later in the attic of his girl friend's house at nearby Rosenheim.

Brought to Dachau after a terrific fist fight with 10 German policemen, Cook escaped from American custody five days later by wrenching the bars out of his cell window.

Cook was recaptured 56 hours later after one of the most exciting chases in German history.

Employers Are Asked To Help Army Reserve

Herschel Angus, local Army reserve spokesman here, said today that business leaders in this area are being urged to cooperate with the National guard and reserve in releasing employees for short periods of summer training.

Colonel Oscar B. Abbott, chief for Texas Military district, made the following comment on allowing employees to seek summer training.

"Last June I appealed to the employers of Texas," Colonel Abbott pointed out, "to assist in the building of our team for national defense by adopting liberal policies relative to granting leaves of absence to employee members of the various civilian components of the Army. I heartily commend the many of them who cooperated so willingly and made possible the success of summer training plans."

"Again this year I urge that all employers take favorable action on requests of their employees for military leaves of absence in order to increase the strength of our national defense and the security of our country," Colonel Abbott added.

"This year it is even more important," Colonel Abbott said, "that we place maximum emphasis on the training of our reserve and national guard units to augment our regular forces in the event of national emergency."

"While it is an economy to train reservists on a part-time basis, instead of as regulars on a full-time basis, yet such training must attain prescribed standards, and these volunteers must be maintained in constant readiness to accept their responsibilities. It is also their right to be able to be adequately prepared when they are called."

"As members of local reserve and national guard activities, many of the employees of business and industry have been diligently devoting their spare time to various training programs, with and without pay. But in order to achieve maximum effectiveness of such programs, short annual periods of active training duty in contact with the regular forces are very necessary."

"It is sincerely hoped that business and industrial employers, as well as the municipal and other local governmental agencies, will make it possible for these men and women to participate in the regular annual periods of training duty for reserve and national guard units by granting necessary military leaves of absence this summer."

ACHESON ADVISES WEST MUST KEEP ARMED IF THIRD WAR IS TO BE AVERTED

DALLAS, June 14 (UP) — Peace-loving Western democracies must keep their military, economic and moral defenses unified if a third World War is to be averted, Secretary of State Dean Acheson says.

In a major speech on U. S. foreign policy, Acheson said last night that war could come if the "Western democracies relaxed their vigil. But he said dropping an Atomic bomb on Russia as a preventive measure was "unthinkable."

Acheson said Russia has set up a military machine "far beyond the reasonable requirements of defense" and is using it to frighten weak nations into riding the Communist bandwagon.

The Soviets are using their armed strength as a "poised bludgeon to intimidate the weak, and it does confront the world with the possibility that the Soviet leaders may be tempted to make use of military force as an instrument of their policy," he said.

Acheson's speech, sponsored by the Dallas Civic Federation and the SMU Community Course, was

made before a sweltering audience of 4,000 at McFarlin Auditorium on the campus of Southern Methodist University.

Acheson was guardedly optimistic.

"War is not inevitable," he said. "It is our responsibility to find ways of solving our problems with out resort to war and to exhaust every possibility in that effort. That is what we intend to do."

The Secretary listed three approaches to the problem of dealing with Russia, including isolation and appeasement which, he said, would be costly and dangerous.

The third course which Acheson ruled out automatically, "is that we should drop some Atomic bombs on the Soviet Union."

"All responsible men must agree that such a course is unthinkable for us," Acheson said. "Such a war would necessarily be incredibly destructive. It would not solve problems, it would multiply them."

Resorting to isolation would be "to pull down the blinds and sit in the parlor with a loaded shotgun, waiting," Acheson said.

Isolationism, he added, would be "both unrealistic and costly while appeasement would whet Russia's appetite for power."

The Western Democracies made great progress against Russia's

outside pressure and internal politics at the recent London conference, he said.

He referred specifically to the decision of the 12 North Atlantic Security Pact nations to set up "balanced defense forces." He also mentioned the Schuman Plan for consolidating Western Europe's iron and coal resources, and the new European payments union.

"These two steps alone—the Schuman proposal and the payments union—if they materialize along constructive lines, hold the promise of a great new era in Europe," he said.

Meanwhile, Acheson said, the U. S. must continue to give aid to Europe under the military assistance program and the Marshall Plan.

Acheson said one of the impressions he carried away from the London meeting was of the new vigor in European life and in European leadership.

"There was a sense of confidence and of vitality," he said. "There was a firm determination to join us in exercising initiative to secure the peace. I returned from Europe with a renewed sense of confidence that we shall be able to establish the conditions of peace."

CENTRAL HIDE &
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More Water Necessary To Attract Industry, Eastland Rotarians Told

"Eastland and Ranger are going to need, and have to have additional water to that which they have at the present time if they can expect to attract industry," Dr. P. M. Kuykendall, Ranger, president of the Eastland County Water District, told members and guests of the Eastland Rotary Club at the club's regular meeting in the Connelley Hotel Monday.

Dr. Kuykendall was introduced by Rotarian Joe Stephens, who had charge of the program.
It was pointed out that preliminary census figures show that both Eastland and Ranger have lost population in the last 10 years.

"We must get industry if we expect to increase," Kuykendall told his audience. "It is impossible to attract industry unless we can assure them of an abundance of water."

"The Eastland County Water District is now made up of the city of Ranger," Kuykendall said. "Unless Eastland comes into the picture, the district is going to die in its infancy."

Kuykendall told his audience that two government estimates have been made on the possibility of building a dam on the Leon River which would supply Eastland, Ranger, Gorman and De Leon with water. The latest of the estimates placed the cost of the job at \$4,150,000.

"Ranger is in dire need of water," Kuykendall stated. "If we can't finance the project with private money, we will go the government route."

It is not a Ranger proposition in itself," Kuykendall continued. "The present plans call for 32,000 acre feet of water, which would be adequate to supply a population of 100,000."

Kuykendall explained that engineers say it will be more economical to build the lake large, because in that particular location is a natural spillway which will cut construction costs by almost half.

"If we do go the government route, he more towns we get into the project, the better the chances for getting congressional approval," Kuykendall said.

The water district has no taxation powers, and the financing would have to come, at least partially, through a bond plan, Kuykendall explained.

"The dam would be mutually advantageous to both towns," Kuykendall concluded. "It is swiftly becoming an essential thing, and must be put over in the near future. It is the people's problem, and not the total responsibility of the water district."

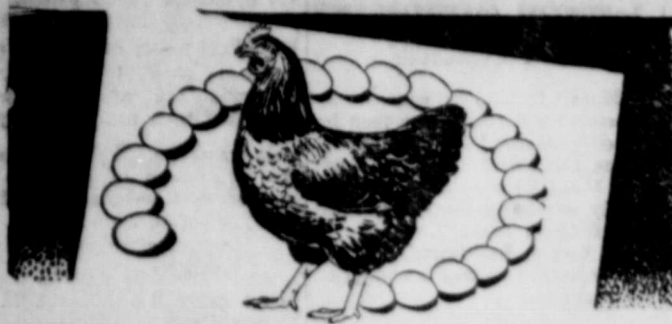
