A CHICAGO HOLOCAUST.

Two Large Buildings in the Fair Grounds Burned and Others Damaged.

ELEVEN DEAD AND THIRTY INJURED.

Thirty Thousand People Powerless to Render Any Assistance, Are Compelled to Stand and See Men Cremated.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 11.—The fear that existed for months in the mind of nearly every citizen of Chicago, a fear never dared to utter, but all felt, was realized yesterday in a fearful holocaust at the fair that claimed nearly two score victims, and for the first time threatened the destruction of the entire white city. The disaster is all the more dreadful because of the sudden transformation from innocent flame into the death-dealing catastrophe. The structure that burned was by comparison one of the small buildings of the fair. It was the old storage warehouse and skating rink and was not the property of the exposition. It was a concession and exhibit of the Hercules Iron works and ice and refrigerating machine manufacturers. In addition to the skating rink there were three 120-ton ice machines and thirty or forty barrels of lined oil. The oil no doubt greatly hastened the conflagration and that the fire was not communicated to other buildings was due to favorable winds. The fire was not generally observed until 1:15 p. m., and within thirty minutes the great loss of life occurred. At the first signal the firemen rushed up the huge shafts surrounding the smokestack, and when at the summit began preparations to fight the flames, which first appeared at this point. Before the hose could be coupled a cry of horror from the crowd below caused the fireman to look down and the whole shaft below was found to be encircled in flames. Instantly every man realized the danger, and there were few to find an avenue for escape. One man suddenly grasped the rope or hose and half sliding, half falling reached the roof, ninety feet below, in a bruised and burned condition but still alive. By this time the crowd below was wild with excitement and weeping women and frenzied men rushed hither and thither wringing their hands in anguish over their inability to render aid. Suddenly one fireman was preparing to jump and every eye turned up. He gave a quick somersault and turned over half a dozen times before he struck the roof, ninety feet below. To the 30,000 spectators he seemed one minute in falling this distance, and when the body struck the roof with a frightful crash and rebounded four feet into the air a groan of horror went up from the crowd. After the first wild leap, one man after another jumped in quick succession as the flames closed in below and the heat became more intense. In nearly every instance the victim turned away and over again before he touched the roof, and in every instance the result of the desperate leap for life was the same—death. The very horror of death riveted every eye to the scene, and while men and women shouted hysterically and wept because they were almost powerless to keep the crowd from danger. The spectacle of death became more terrible as the minutes passed and for the last man on the cupola was reserved the most dreadful fate of all. After his companions had leaped to their death, and as the last man was hesitating, the whole shaft began to tremble and vibrate. The lone fireman understood aright the ominous warning and gave a quick, wild leap. He was too late at the very instant he sprang the whole structure gave way and this human being quivering with life and wildly grasping for support in frenzy of despair, was seen to drop into the labyrinth of flame, finally disappearing in the roaring furnace below. Seeing it was a hopeless task to attempt to save the building the firemen now directed their efforts to keep the fire from spreading. The World's fair stables, just south of the big warehouse, was burning and the fire had spread to the roofs of several hotels across Stony Island avenue, just outside the grounds. With a good deal of effort the hotels were saved, but the stables burned to the ground. In less than two hours from the time the fire started the big cold storage warehouse was leveled to the ground, a smoking ruin. So far as is known eleven firemen perished and thirty other persons are injured.

Persons Dead.
PITTSBURG, Pa., July 10.—For A. R. posts in this city met and decided to take up the cases of the dropped pensioners in this district. At the quarterly payment of pensions here last week 125 cases were dropped from the rolls in accordance with orders from Washington. It is the intention of the G. A. R. posts to test the matter in the courts, and Congressman William A. Stone has been retained as counsel.

Historic Students.
PARIS, July 5.—Riotous demonstrations were made by the students yesterday at St. Germain des Pres and in Rue Jacob. The police were unable to disperse the mob. Eventually a large detachment of cavalry charged and scattered the students. The disorder increases hourly.

Both Killed.
DEBUISS, Pa., July 10.—Two freight trains met on the Philadelphia and Erie road here Saturday morning. Engineer Bradford and Fireman Hall were both killed and Brakeman Shaffer fatally injured.

An Inmate Hanged.
WASCON, O., July 10.—Yesterday morning Frank Hayes, a well-known young farmer, murdered his 22-year-old wife. Their 1-year-old daughter narrowly escaped the fire of the murderer's attack. Mrs. Hayes was butchered in a horrible manner, her throat being cut from ear to ear, her arms and face fearfully hacked and her right leg almost severed from her body. A neighbor arrived in time to see the mother shoot, but his sanity is supposed to be the cause of the horrible act.

Fatal Explosion.
KINGSTON, N. Y., July 7.—During the terrible storm that passed over this city Wednesday night, Van Dusen Brothers' powder magazine at Devil's Lake, a small settlement on the outskirts of the city was struck by lightning and completely demolished. There were about fifty-five kegs of powder in the magazine and their explosion blew the brick structure to atoms, destroyed several buildings near by and injured nine persons, two of them men and the other seven women and children.

Floods in Colorado.
DENVER, Col., July 10.—Southern Colorado was visited Saturday by rains which did great damage. South of Lamar a cloudburst carried away a bedrock ditch flume. At La Junta the streets were covered with water. Fifteen hundred horses and a large number of hogs and fowls were drowned in the vicinity, while crops were badly damaged. Trains on the Santa Fe and Missouri Pacific roads were delayed by the washing away of tracks.

Twenty Persons Drowned.
LONDON, July 10.—Twenty lives were lost Saturday off Skegness, on some portion of England. A party went from the village for a day's sail in a yacht. They were caught in heavy squall some distance off shore and the yacht capsized. Before assistance could reach the people struggling in the water twenty of them, men and women and children, they were mostly artisans and their wives.

Wholesale Robbery.
LEXINGTON, Ky., July 6.—A combine has existed in the freight department of the Cincinnati Southern for some months whereby the road has been robbed of between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Eighteen conductors and eighteen engineers, together with the timekeeper, have been issuing fraudulent checks. The trouble is in the Somerset division.

Killed and Wounded.
ROSEDALE, Ind., July 7.—At mine No. 9, in Parke county coal range Wednesday evening, three empty cars were run down a slope. Four miners were caught in a narrow place. Joseph Craven was instantly killed. Otto Grogan crushed about the temples and will die; Rolla Grogan and Joe Blacketter were badly bruised.

Two Men Killed by Lightning.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 5.—While standing under a tree ten miles south of the city yesterday evening Irving Clark and Frank Spaulding were struck by lightning and instantly killed. Mr. Irving Clark and Minnie Clark were stunned. The World's fair had taken refuge under the tree to avoid the storm.

Children Burned.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 8.—A boy aged 9, and his sister, aged 11, children of Mr. A. Brown, formerly of Austin, Tex., were fatally burned here yesterday by a powder explosion. The boy threw a match into a can of powder, and the fire which followed every stitch of clothing was burned from the girl's back.

Break in the Erie Canal.
ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 6.—The break in the Erie canal here is more serious than it was at first thought to be. Three miles of the canal is dry and 150 men are at work under Division Engineer Bisgood. Navigation will not be resumed for some time.

Will Not Be Executed.
MUSKOGEE, La., July 6.—Judge Shaw granted a writ of habeas corpus for the Choctaws sentenced to be shot at Wilburton Friday. Officers left Tuesday night to serve the writ. The reason of the action is a showing that the condemned men did not have a fair trial.

Claim He Is Henry Star.
DENVER, Col., July 3.—Notwithstanding the statements that the bandit recently arrested at Colorado Springs is not the famous outlaw, Henry Starr, the officers here are confident they have the right man. In an interview the prisoner admitted he was Henry Starr.

Over Niagara Falls.
NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., July 5.—Forty thousand people saw Clifford Calverly perform wonderful feats on his wire stretched across Niagara Falls yesterday afternoon. He beat all time records by running across the wire in 2:35 2-5, which is 1 minute faster than the record.

Four Men Drowned.

ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Current Happenings of General Interest to the Reading Public.

SERIOUS AND SENSATIONAL SORTINGS.

A Comprehensive Synopsis of the Latest News Culled from the Leading Dailies of the Country for the Past Week.

Charles S. Sherman of Westfield, Mass., has sued his brother, Clark M. Sherman, for \$10,000 damages for injury to his business and reputation. The defendant registered at hotels in Worcester and Williamstown with women other than his wife as "Charles C. Sherman." The specific charge made is false and malicious impersonation. The registrations have been the cause of much trouble in the plaintiff's family.

At Jackson, Tenn., recently, two young ladies, daughters of J. W. Ray, a respected farmer, left home about 7 o'clock to gather berries. An hour later they were found along the track of the Illinois Central railroad with their throats cut from ear to ear. Both bodies were terribly mangled, plainly showing the young girls were outtraced before being murdered.

Charles Walter of St. Louis was pronounced dead by the doctors attending him, a burial certificate was issued by the board of health, the undertaker was about to sew the lid on the coffin when he raised up, discharged the undertaker, and had books and doctors summoned and is now recovering.

The state supreme court of Georgia has rendered an important decision of special interest to lovers. The decision is in effect that a man can carry off and marry a 11-year-old girl in Georgia, and her father, whether he likes it or not, can not have him punished for kidnapping.

D. S. Krieger, a farmer living within a mile of (Camden) Tennessee, S. D., his wife and four little daughters were brutally murdered at their home recently, by Albert Baumbarger, a nephew of Krieger, whom he had been employing at farm work. He then robbed the house and fled.

Frank Willott, an engineer on the northern end of the Texas and Pacific of the Frisco, met with a fatal accident recently near Monett, Mo. While backing up the track his engine turned over on him and he died in a few hours.

At Shelbyville, Ind., to settle a dispute between her daughter and the latter's husband, Mrs. Fred Brownell split Joe Hill's head open with an ax.

Two sisters, Mrs. Grimes and Mrs. Antoinette Cheatewood, living near Grantsville, Cleburne county, Ala., died within forty minutes of each other.

Miss Gabrielle Greeley, daughter of Horace Greeley, married Rev. F. M. Croftin, a pastor of a fashionable church at Westchester, N. Y.

At Little Rock, Ark., the case of Rev. S. H. Buchanan, defaulting ex-treasurer of the insane asylum, has been postponed until October.

In attempting to board a moving train at Ottawa, Ont., Mrs. Paul Martin fell beneath it with her 3-year-old child, and both were killed.

At Mayfield, Ky., Allie Barnett, aged 21, murdered her illegitimate child and implicated a 30-year-old married preacher, who confessed.

At Waynesboro, Pa., George Kiese, 15, stabbed John Kaufman, aged 15, in the back with a pen-knife, and it is feared he will die.

George Clarke, aged 18, a shoe-maker of York, Pa., was drowned in the Chattanooga river near Atlanta, Ga., a few days since.

At Bloomington, Ill., James B. Callon beat his wife. Her son hearing of it shot his step-father with a pistol, most probably fatally.

Three boys fell victims to Petty's island's treacherous tide in the Schuylkill river at Philadelphia, recently, and were drowned.

At Arcola, Ill., Charles Hill was struck on the head with a club handled by Ed Hamilton, a brother-in-law, and will die.

At Jackson, Mich., Mrs. Abram Gilmer placed a can of gasoline on a stove which contained fire, and was burned to death.

At Bachelor, Colo., H. C. Conn climbed a tree to avoid a bear, but the animal followed him up the tree, then killed him.

At Des Moines, Ia., Fred Grant, aged 8, and a 6-year-old brother, accused for possession of a shotgun, were killed.

At Hartshorn, I. T., John Flemming, a miner, sustained a broken leg from a falling shaft of a mine. A mule was also killed.

At Roseburg, Ore., George Richardson was sentenced to eight years in the penitentiary for attempting to wreck a train.

A decision of a Baltimore judge that "no kissing" be allowed in the parks of that city, has been sustained by a higher court.

At Clarksville, Tenn., while riding a horse, William Dyer fell off, his foot caught in a stirrup and he was dragged to death.

KILLED ACCIDENTALLY.

Faith Bishop of Palestine Shoots Himself With a Shot Gun Unintentionally.

GURDERED AND THROWN IN THE RIVER.

Barfield of Florida Granted a Full Pardon by Gov. Hogg—A Fatal Shooting Occurs at Zurich, Switzer County.

PALESTINE, Tex., July 11.—Mr. Faith Bishop, a reputable citizen of this county, was found dead near his residence two miles south of this city Sunday, and lying near him was his shotgun with one barrel discharged and the other loaded with No. 8 squirrel shot. His left side was terribly lacerated and the entire load of shot penetrated his chest and arm and in the region of the heart. The coroner's inquest was held and the verdict rendered that deceased came to his death by gunshot wounds inflicted by himself accidentally. It is supposed that in alighting from his horse his gun was accidentally discharged, which ended his life. He leaves a wife and several children in poor circumstances.

MURDERED AND SUBMERGED.
KERRVILLE, Tex., July 11.—Murdered and thrown in the Gaudalup river, one mile and a half above Jewett Point, in Kerr county. He went to draw the gun from the cabin of the boat when it was discharged, the ball entering his stomach and coming out in his back, killing him instantly.

Hogg. Barfield will return to Florida to reside, his family being located at Orlando.

VALLENTINE, Tex., July 7.—The can-

THE NEW SCHOOL LAW.
State Superintendent Carlisle Writes Judge Aldrich Several Valuable Suggestions.

DEAR SIR.—You are most respectfully advised that by virtue of the provisions of the general school law approved May the 20th 1893 the county of Houston is placed under the district system. It is believed that the earlier the commissioners court districts the county, the better it will be for the schools. The earliest date at which this can be done is August 7 as the law takes effect on that date. I beg to suggest, however that the preliminary work may all be done prior to that date. The districts should be laid off with great care having the convenience of the people in mind. In my opinion each district should be made large enough to support one good school for white children. Except in rare cases no district should be established with a white scholastic population of less than fifty. If each district can sustain one good colored school, it is well, but the law provides that the colored children of two or more districts may be united, if necessary for the maintenance of a colored school.

The districts should be described in the order establishing them, with much care. The metes and bounds of each district should be given, together with the acreage of the whole survey and of the survey included within its limits. If the preliminary work is all done, and is definitely agreed upon, the court could by the August term be ready to make an order establishing the districts. As soon as this is done you should announce the appointment of trustees for each district and instruct them to proceed at once to take the scholastic census of their respective districts enumerating only those from 8 to 15 inclusive. As soon as the reports are in, you should compare the lists with the Assessor's census returns and afterwards make the county apportionment.

The trustees will not be allowed compensation for taking the census and care should be taken to appoint as trustees citizens who feel an interest in the schools and who will do the necessary work for the good of the district.

It is evident that in order to get this done properly not a day is to be lost and I trust you will get everything in readiness and push the matter as rapidly as possible after the law goes into effect.

The Attorney General has ruled that the schools in your county cannot be conducted under the community law.

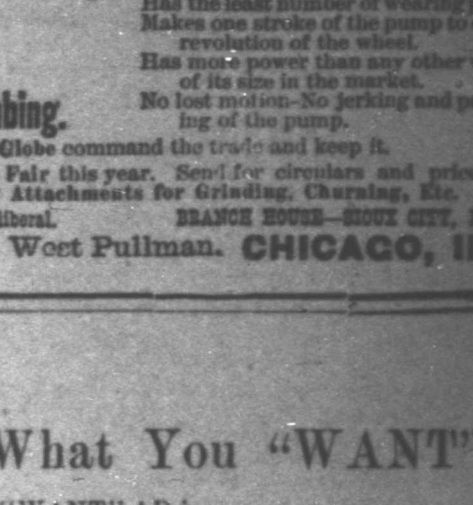
