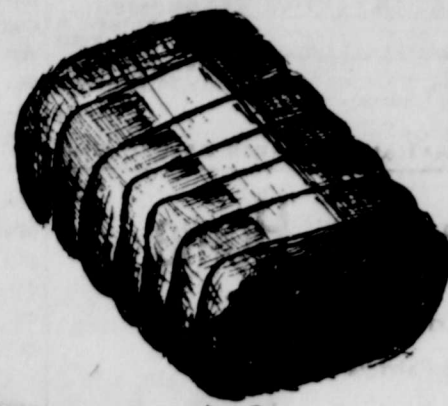

"You Can Do It" Series To Premiere Locally

Briscoe County "do-it-yourselfers" will have "their own" television series with the start of a new program on KAMR-TV (Channel 4, Amarillo) at 1:00 p.m., Saturday, November 23.

According to Patricia Honea, Briscoe County Extension Agent, the new series, "You Can Do It!" is a six-part, educational series on home care and repairs.

"It is designed to teach viewers simple, money-saving care and maintenance techniques," she said. Locally, the half-hour programs each Saturday will be sponsored by Briscoe County Family Living Committee and KAMR-TV.

Created and produced by home economics specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University

System, through a special United States Department of Agriculture grant, "You Can Do It!" is being aired statewide on an alternating basis.

During the six-week series, hostess Cindy Kidwell will teach lessons on such things as repairing leaky faucets, and how to caulk and weatherstrip, Miss Honea said. "On the first program, viewers will learn how to do simple electrical repairs. Other lessons will teach viewers how to make toilet repairs and adjustments, and how to care for carpets."

Tips For Farm And Home

FRUITCAKE-MAKING PROVIDES PRE-HOLIDAY FUN

It's fruitcake-making time, and the fun of baking is a big part of pre-holiday festivity.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, looked at the holiday tradition of fruitcake baking—and buying.

"One big question is whether to make your own or buy one," she noted.

Good quality ready-made fruitcake is a boon for busy homemakers. They come in all sizes—by the slice, in 8-ounce, one pound, one and one-half pound, up to five pound and over sizes.

DARK OR LIGHT FRUITCAKES

Choices range from dark to light types of fruitcake, with both kinds full of fruits and nuts—or for families who like just a hint, the fruit and nuts may be lightly scattered

through the cake.

"But whichever type you choose, read the label first to make sure you buy what you intended to buy. Prices for ready-mades usually depend on the amount of fruits and nuts they contain. The more nuts and fruits, the higher the price," Mrs. Clyatt said.

COST OF HOME BAKING

The specialist pointed out that if you make your own, cost depends on the recipe.

"Check costs of the ingredients before you bake.

"Of course, costs don't consider your time, patience and the clean-up—or your satisfaction."

CANDIED FRUIT CHOICES

Candied fruits are a necessary part of fruitcakes and a welcome addition to pies, cookies, breads and salads. As you look over the selection of candied fruits, you may want to compare the price with the cost of preparing your own, Mrs. Clyatt suggested.

Some choices are citron, lemon peel, orange peel — available in glace form, covered with a light coat of sugar, or in drained form, with all the surplus sugar removed. Also cherries are packed whole in glace form, colored green and red.

"Mixed fruit contains four or five diced fruits such as citron, orange peel, lemon peel, pineapple and cherries. Pineapple, packed in glace form as fingers, slices and diced, colored red, green and yellow is available."

Candied fruit comes in four-ounce containers, but can also be found in vacuum jars, cello-packs and bulk containers. The specialist suggested you consider the total amount of candied fruit you will need for holiday baking and buy it in the larger packages—usually more economical.

Stores usually stock candied fruit to last only through the holiday season since the demand is small during the rest of the year, the specialist said.

HOW TO BUY NUTMEATS

Nutmeats are an important ingredient in fruitcakes of all kinds and there are do's and don'ts for buying them.

Mrs. Clyatt's suggestions are: —Buy unshelled nuts that are clean and free from scars, cracks or holes.

—With shelled nuts, look for kernels that are plump and meaty, crisp and brittle, and if used for garnish—uniform in size and color.

—Unshelled nuts are often, but not always, less expensive than shelled nuts.

—To compare costs: two pounds of unshelled tree nuts make one pound (three to four cups) of nutmeats.

"The small, recipe-size packages are generally more expensive than the 'holiday baking' size (one pound) packages," the specialist pointed out.

BAKING, GLAZING AND DECORATING

"Bake fruitcakes in foil pans, individual-size glass casseroles, or even in tiny muffin tins. Glaze and decorate them after they've cooled. You can bake them in clean, well-washed coffee cans for unusual shapes," she added.

"For a handsome glaze, heat corn syrup to a full, rolling boil and spread with a pastry brush over the top of the cake. Decorations of nuts and red and green maraschino cherries will cling tightly if first dipped on one side in powdered sugar icing before arranging on the cake," Mrs. Clyatt said.

Small Engines Need Winterizing

The life of a small engine can be prolonged with good maintenance and proper winter storage practices.

Eddie Holland, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, offers the following suggestions to get the small engines ready for the winter season.

First, empty the fuel tank, then start the engine and choke it to help drain or use up fuel in carburetor. This is important to avoid fuel gums and additives from drying in the carburetor when fuel, left in carburetor, evaporates while in storage.

Next, remove the carburetor bowl, clean and replace it. Take the spark plug out and put a teaspoon of 10-weight oil in the cylinder. Hand turn the engine a few times (with spark plug out) to distribute oil on the cylinder wall. Clean, gap and replace the spark plug.

On four-cycle engines, Holland advises draining and refilling the crankcase. On two-cycle engines, remove the exhaust manifold, usually located under the carriage section and clean carbon from exhaust ports and manifold. Use care when cleaning exhaust ports so as not to scratch the piston or ports.

A wood splinter is an effective tool for cleaning. One way to tell if exhaust ports are becoming plugged with carbon is the performance of the engine. Plugged exhaust ports cause loss of power, poor engine performance, excessive use of fuel, and missing and sputtering.

With electric-start engines, remove and store the battery during the winter. If the machine is stored inside, some owners prefer to use a trickle charger to

CARE OF BAKED FRUITCAKE

Wrap thoroughly cooled fruitcake tightly in plastic wrap, then in heavy aluminum foil.

"You may want to brush the cake occasionally with fruit juice or cider. Or you can saturate a cloth in the liquid, wrap the cake in it first and then overwrap with plastic wrap. Four to six weeks will complete the mellowing of the delightful fruit flavors," she said.

After the fruitcake is well-seasoned, a home freezer or refrigerator is ideal for storing it. Just be sure the cake is freezer-wrap, she reminded.

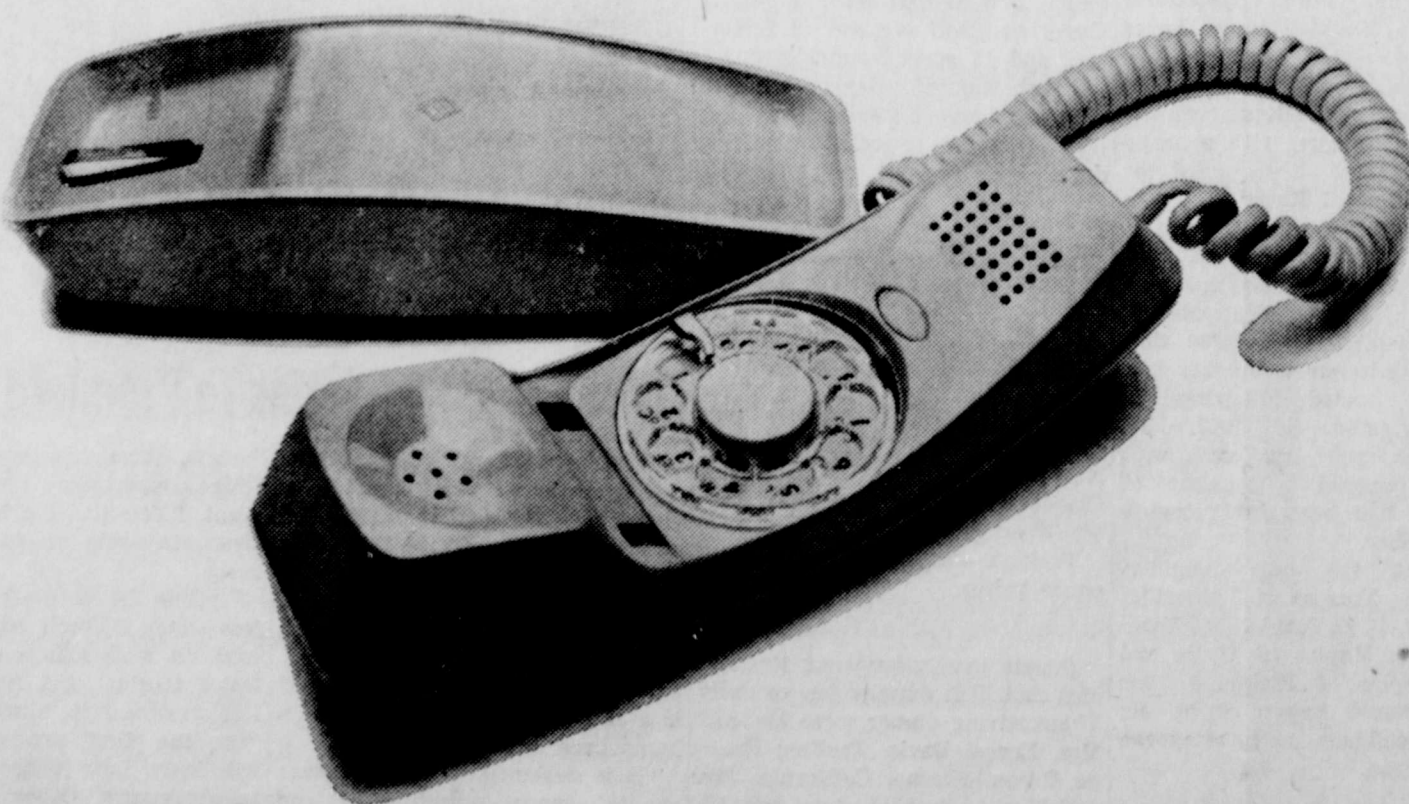
Help us, Heavenly Father, to run through all obstacles and pass by the mistake of others

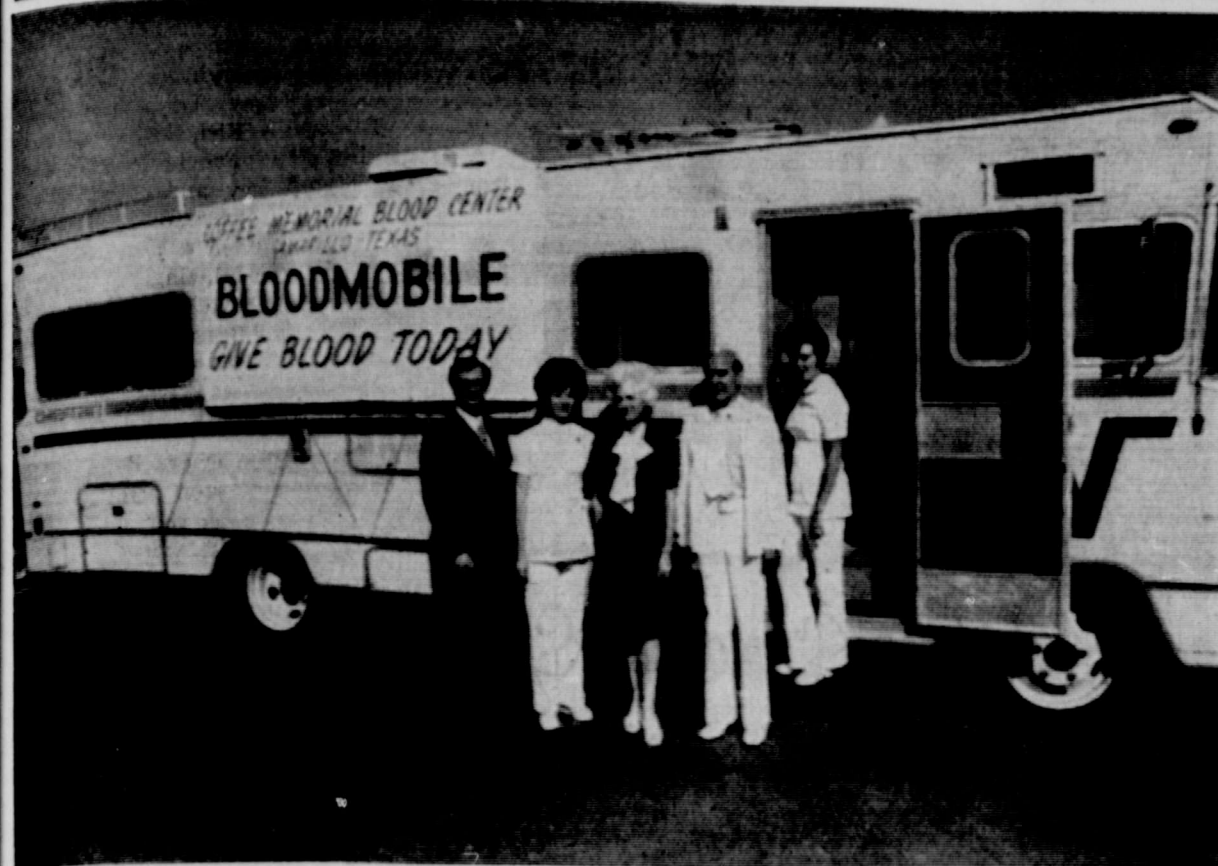

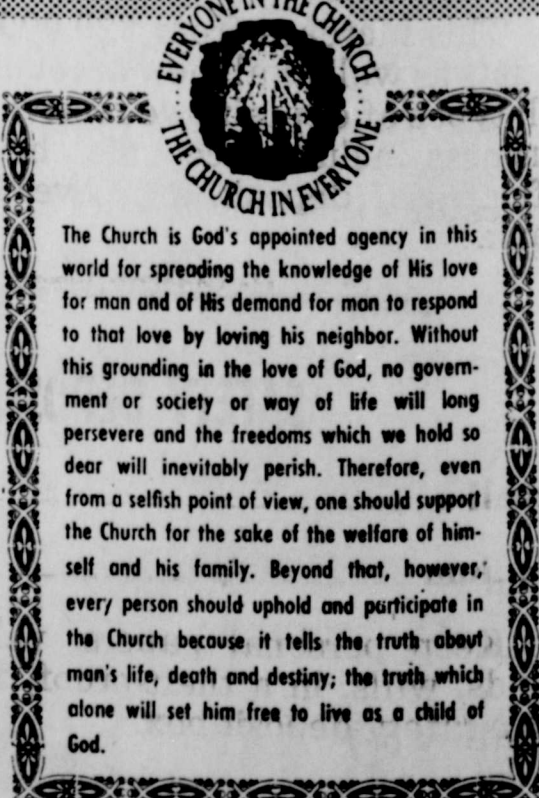

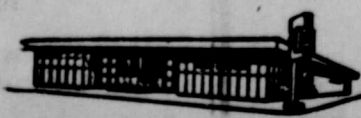
There is one dream and ambition they both have, however; and that is to be like our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and to be of service to the church. Their goodness is of God.
