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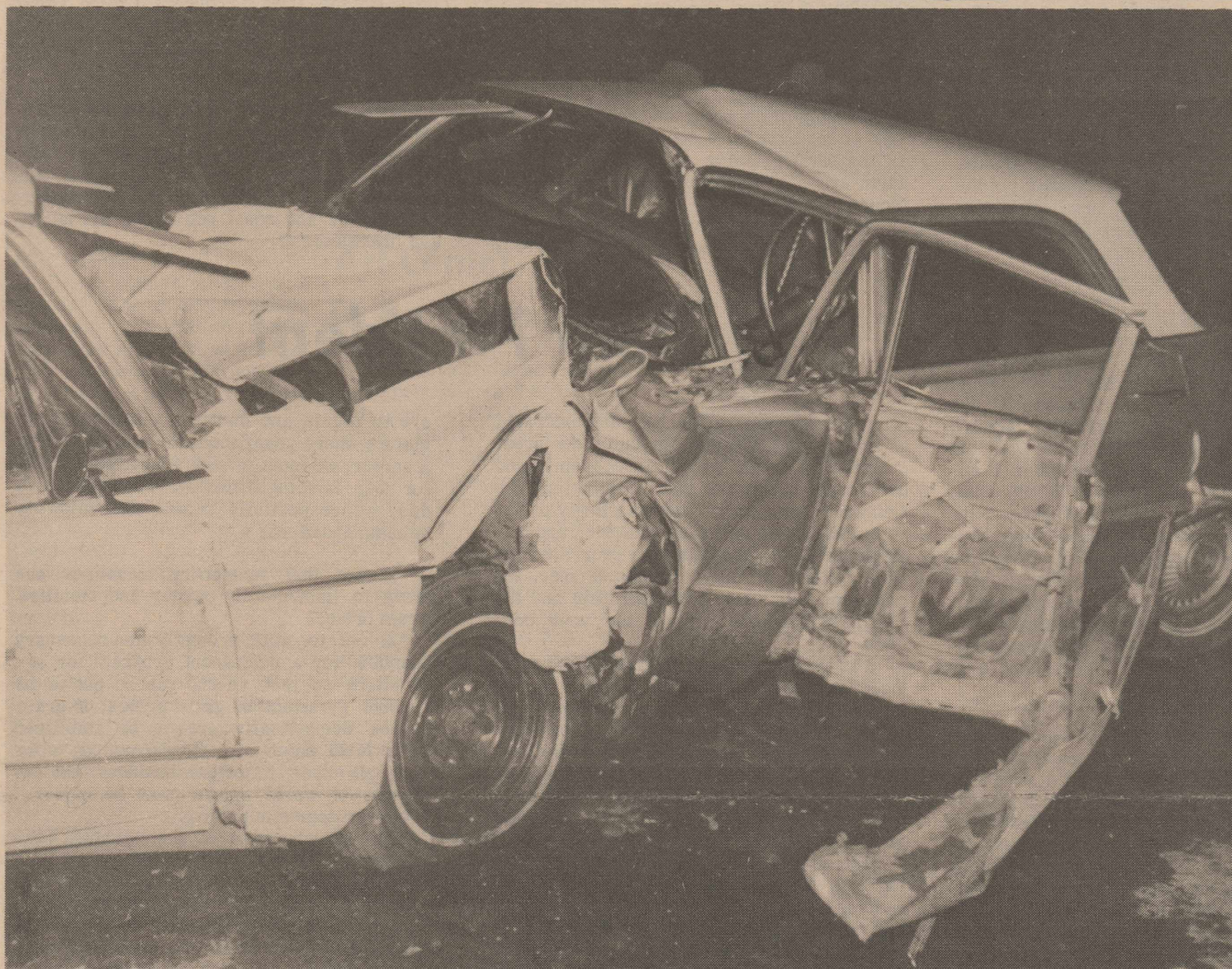

Crash Claims Ten Persons

Ten persons lost their lives in a grinding head-on collision east of Dimmitt Saturday night, as police officers pursued one of the vehicles.

Four of the persons killed in the crash were from Hart and one was the grandson of a Hart couple. Another was from Olton and the others were all from Dimmitt.

Those involved from Hart include Tony Guia, 17; driver, Nicholas Arrizola Jr., 18; Zoila Luna Olivarez, 13; and son Johnny, 16-months old.

Raymond McLain, Nazareth, was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. E. I. "Tump" McLain. The Olton youth was Brigidio Solez Sanchez, 17.

The Dimmitt youths were Johnny Raper, 17; Robert Lewis Caddell, 17, driver; Michael David Geouge, 20; and Jeffrey Eugene Glenn, 17.

A report stated that the eastbound car driven by Guia, was being pursued by three Castro County sheriffs' cars, two Dimmitt police cars and a Texas Department of Public Safety vehicle when the crash occurred just east of Dimmitt city limits.

The events leading up to the wild, 110-mile-an-hour chase through Dimmitt was a call to the Dimmitt police to come to the Tam-Anne Gin located 11 miles west of Dimmitt on Texas 86 to quiet a reported fight.

The fight apparently involved one of the victims in the wreck and another's father. Deputy Sheriff Rex Cowart, arriving at the scene shortly after the call, was told that the person involved in the fight had driven toward Dimmitt.

Cowart then radioed Sheriff Cartwright and another deputy, Granville Martin, who started toward the gin.

But about three miles west

of Dimmitt, they met the car which Cowart had described and gave chase.

Cartwright said he and Martin clocked the fleeing car at speeds up to 110 miles per hour during the ensuing chase, which carried the officers and the car through a Dimmitt police road block and on through town.

The car narrowly missed striking cars stopped at the Broadway Street stoplight, but managed to avoid collisions until reaching the eastern city limits.

There, the fleeing car swerved into the oncoming lane and struck the Caddell youth's automobile head on. The impact of the speeding car drove Caddell's car, which was traveling about 50 miles an hour, 86 feet backward, with the two cars coming to rest "welded together almost firewall to firewall."

Officers, tow-truck drivers and members of the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department worked about 30 minutes to remove the victims from the wreckage of the cars.

Deryl Clevenger, Joe Edd Carson Elected Trustees

Voters Saturday returned one incumbent to the school board and elected one newcomer to the trustee slate. Deryl Clevenger received 75 votes to be re-elected for another term. Joe Edd Carson drew 112 votes to unseat Vernon Mapp.

Mapp and Cecil Ray Jones received 70 and 71 votes, respectively. Cleve McLain received six write-in votes and Doug Higgins drew two write-in votes.

Percy Hart received 151 votes as County Trustee at Large. Robert McLain edged incumbent Donald Wright, 124 to 123, to the Castro County Hospital Board.

Performing bands, Edwards said, compete on an equal basis and are rated on a 1 to 5 scale with 1 as the top rating. The Hart band received a 3 in both concert and sight reading. A 3 rating indicates an average performance for a Class A band.

Edwards explained that for the not yet two year old band

to even compete in the contest was unusual. The rating the band received indicated an exceptional performance by the band. "They made an excellent showing," Edwards said.

Members of the Hart High School Band were feted Tuesday night with a party attended by approximately 60 students.

Following a hamburger supper, entertainment was provided by Jean Foster, Mike Loyd, Duane Clevenger and Darrell Six.

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Editorials

Provide The Punch

An all-out nationwide effort in behalf of the farmers is being planned by the National Federation of Grain Cooperatives and Donald Lloyd, manager of Hart Producers Co-Op Gin is asking the Hart area farmers and businessmen to help in this effort.

Although it is being initiated by the Co-Ops of the nation, it can help every farmer in the United States as well as all small farm-oriented communities, if it has the "punch" that it needs.

In order for the government to know what the farmers would like to have, they have to

be told. That's where you come in. If you like what the statement to the President says and you wish to voice your opinion, come by the Hart Producers Co-Op Gin and put your signature on the page that will be taken to the President and the Secretary of Agriculture.

All farmers, their wives and all businessmen are urged to read the statement printed below and if you are in agreement come and sign the statement.

After all, what working persons wouldn't like a "fair and equal return for his labor and investment"?

Dear President

Your Administration has demonstrated a keen awareness of agriculture's great contribution to the American economy, and has sought to enhance that contribution. The Congress has been willing unflinchingly to debate the problems of agriculture, and has displayed increasing concern over the economic plight of the American farmer. We commend both your Administration and the Congress for this attitude and your concern.

It is time, though, for a great effort to be made to bring the farmer into the mainstream of the American economy, a position he has not enjoyed except for a few very brief intervals in the past half-century. Government programs of the past have been helpful but all of them have been, and are, of a temporary nature, thereby, leaving the farmer in a quandary about the future.

Farming is a long-term venture, requiring long-term planning and long-term financing and indebtedness. Today's farmers are businessmen, but they are the only businessmen in America whose commodity prices are subjected to sharp peaks and valleys, caused by uncontrollable events, "scare" propaganda or other acts which the farmer can neither foresee nor govern.

The majority of farmers today are skirting outright financial disaster every year. Their indebtedness is increasing yearly. In the past five years, the national farm real estate debt has risen 39%. In terms of dollars, farmers' total indebtedness in this period has increased from \$37.5 billion to \$65.5 billion. Meantime, farm prices have declined. In the past 25 years, the parity ratio has dropped from 108% to an average of 70% in 1971. This has seriously weakened the financial position of farmers. We are rapidly approaching a complete erosion of our entire agriculture community.

If this trend is to be reversed and we

are to regain and maintain a healthy agriculture where young men can be attracted for a career, we must provide economic stability for our farming industry. To accomplish this, we respectfully submit the following recommendations:

1. See that temporary measures are taken to immediately bolster and stabilize grain prices.

2. Set to work promptly the necessary planning for a permanent program for agriculture so that an end can be put to the chronic gyrations of grain prices. If grain prices domestically are to be stabilized at a level which puts the farmer on a par with all other American business, the influence of world prices must be removed from our domestic pricing.

3. The consumers of America must recognize the vital need for farmers to be a healthy segment of the U. S. economy because, only through the high degree of efficiency of the farmer, is the American consumer able to enjoy the limitless benefits of today's American agriculture. Consumers must know that if agriculture deteriorates, the living standard of all of America deteriorates. An informational program to acquaint consumers with the status of agriculture, with the benefits of a healthy agriculture, must be mounted and continued at a high level throughout this transitional period while the agricultural economy is being stabilized. This program can, and should, be the bridge bringing the farmer into the mainstream of American society.

We farmers have supported, and will continue to support all those things that have built a great America. We only ask an opportunity to share equally in the protection and benefits of our American society. We shall be most grateful for your sincere consideration of the above statement.

Cattle Scabies Quarantine May Be Expanded South, East

The cattle scabies quarantine on 34 Texas Panhandle counties may possibly be expanded to nine more counties with stricter dipping requirements, according to Dr. Bill Clymer, Extension area entomologist at Amarillo.

He has received word from the Texas Animal Health Commission that as of June 1, the quarantine may be extended to cover another tier of counties south and east of the current control area. Those that may be added to the list include Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Knox, Baylor and Wilbarger counties; Clymer reports that official dipping will be required of all

cattle in movement except those animals that:

1. are moving directly to slaughter;
2. are moving to slaughter through a livestock market;
3. are moving to a livestock market for sale and dipping prior to release;
4. are released from a livestock market to a dip point with an official permit;
5. are moving to an official dip point;
6. have been dipped within the past seven days;
7. are from a non-control area moving through the control area with no stopovers;
8. are being moved by the same owner from one place to

another within the quarantined area;

9. have been dipped within seven days from scabies-infested states with permit or with a permit to be dipped upon arrival;

10. are from a non-control area being moved into the control area for grazing.

"These new restrictions are being implemented in an effort to eradicate the scabies mite and prevent its spread to other areas," the entomologist concludes.

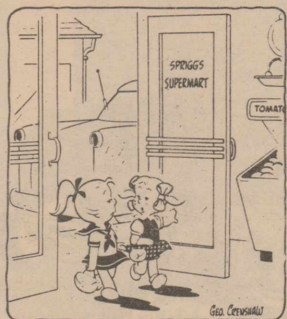

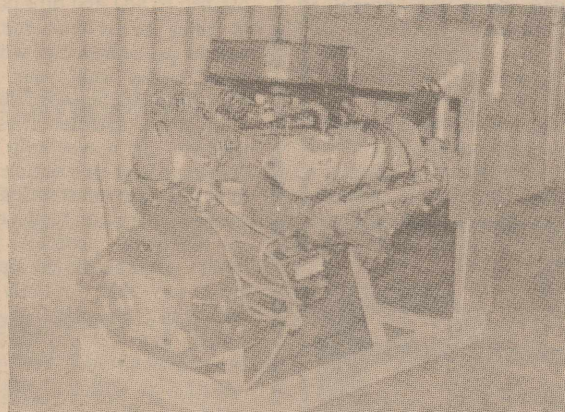

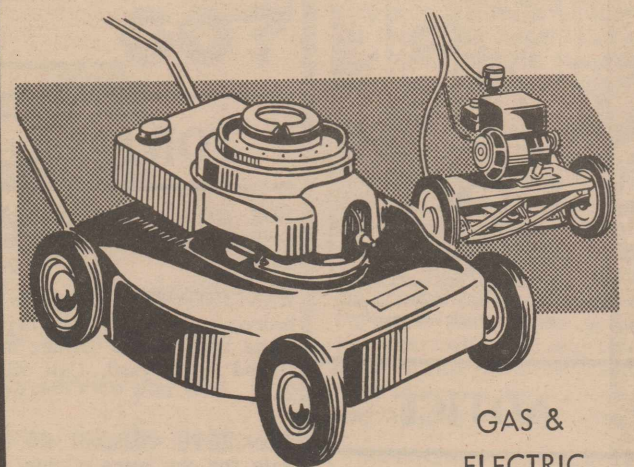

This is the time of year for pretty spring bouquets and

each of us wants our cut flowers to look good for the longest possible time. Here are some tips to help you accomplish this. Wash your container with soap and water before use. Remember to cut stems at a slant, using a sharp knife or shears. Cut flowers in early morning or late afternoon, select and cut flowers that aren't fully open. Remove the foliage from the lower third of the stem and all broken and bruised parts of the stem. Then wash the flowers to remove dirt, sprays and dust. Store flowers in a cool place until you're ready to arrange them.

To give your arrangements longer life don't place them in direct sun. When possible put them in a cool place during the night. Recutting stems of flowers and changing the water every other day gives longer life to cut flowers.

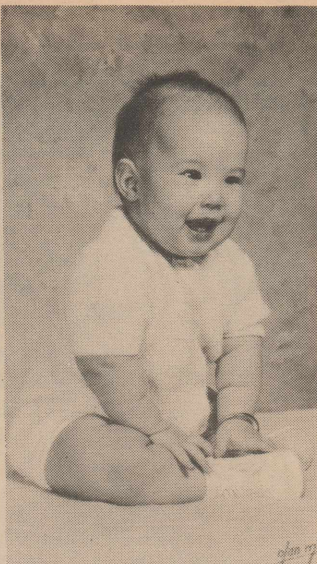

Children and Television



In the wake of the report of the surgeon general of the United States that televised violence does have an adverse effect on children, officials of the television networks have hastened to assure members of Congress that they are taking steps to reduce the amount of killing and other violence in television shows aimed at children.

This is all to the good. But some of us would have more confidence in the ultimate outcome of these efforts if we had genuine reason to believe that the men at the top of the television industry wanted to produce worthwhile programs.

In an article published recently in "Today's Health," Louis Sabin, magazine editor and author of eight children's books, said, "Television, despite years of golden promise, remains today what it has always been; a waste of time for adults and a mind-warping menace to children."

"The lessons we teach on TV—whether educational or moral—tell children what we expect of them," added Mr. Sabin. "If we expect them to be greedy, violent, shallow-thinking, prejudiced, and amoral, we have no right to complain when they are."

Dr. Haim Ginott has said, "Children . . . should be protected from entertainment in which man's brutality to man is not a tragedy, but a formula."

Parents Responsible

Parents are supposed to have better judgment than their children. The mother who would knowingly allow her child to eat poisoned candy would be rightly con-

demned. How much better is the mother—or the father—who allows a child to put poison into his mind, day after day?

So now the television moguls, agitated by the report of the surgeon general, promise to improve their product. But not immediately. There are many shows already prepared for release in the next months or already in production. There must be more moral poison fed to the children, while the television industry is preparing to do better in the future.

How much better they will do is open to question. How far will you trust a man who has given poisoned candy to your children in the past when he says he won't do so in the future?

Parents cannot escape responsibility for their children's welfare.

The Bible tells us, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

This doesn't mean, "Tell your child what he should do, and when he is old, he will do it." It means what it says: train a child to do what he should, while he is young, and when he is old, he won't forsake right habits which were firmly established in childhood.

What should thinking parents do about their children's television-watching? Be at least as careful about what the child is taking into his mind as we are about what he is taking into his body. Moral poison is actually worse than physical poison.

GIBBON, NEBR., REPORTER: "The good old United States dollar seems to be having trouble over in the foreign countries again these days! The devaluation did not help it any, in fact the foreign markets are ready to devalue it again and perhaps again! Just what will happen to it if the devaluations get larger and larger? Can we read these like the temperature gauge; Minus 10 cents?"

ATWOOD, KANS., CITIZEN PATRIOT: "Any business or industry, whether now located here, or one that might locate here in the future has one prerequisite for success, and that is local support. That's where the general public can play an important part. Those people who continually drive away from home to shop and do business do more to weaken the local economy than they perhaps realize."

ALTOONA, PA., MIRROR: "A newspaperman has the same right to knowledge of public affairs that every citizen has. But in addition he represents the public, which cannot attend all meetings or interview all officials. If a city, county, state or federal official denies a reporter access to public documents, he is denying all citizens the right to know how their government is being operated."

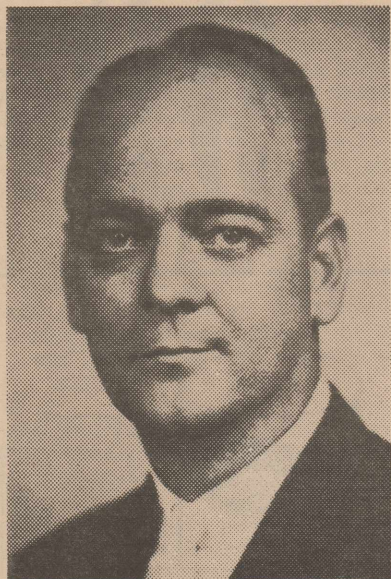

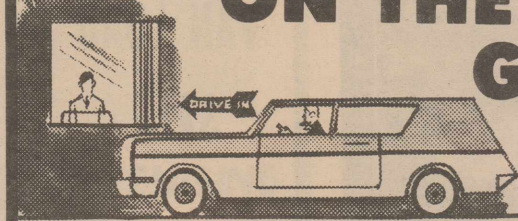
Byron Tunnell, vigorous young Chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas, has announced for election to his second full term on the Commission. His election last year as Chairman

Conserve Water, Cut Crop Costs

Low commodity prices and high production cost make it extremely important for farmers to operate their business efficiently.

Farming is not an exact science and production cannot be performed in an assembly line manner. Therefore it becomes a challenge for each producer to apply his skills and abilities toward efficient, low cost, production.

Since farm commodity prices are controlled largely by supply and demand and due to urgent harvest and disposal of seasonal and often perishable crops the farmer is often forced to sell his crop upon harvest with very little latitude for price negotiation.

The age old plight of the farmer then is to find a way to produce more of his commodity per acre or produce his commodity at a lower cost.

Abundant irrigation water, the most valuable natural resource of the Plains, is one place where production cost may still have room for trimming.

Water losses checked by private companies reveal that some soils may require as much as 250 GPM to overcome the losses in an open irrigation ditch 1/4 mile in length. This loss represents 1/4 of pump and engine wear, 1/4 of the fuel cost, and about 25% less water available for crop use.

Although there may often be considerable initial investment in installation of underground irrigation pipeline, it is very evident that such installations pay for themselves in relatively short periods of time.

As a means of conserving water, preventing erosion, and the prevention or reduction of pollution of water or land the federal government offers cost-share programs such as the "Great Plains Conservation Program" administered by the SCS, and the "Rural Environmental Assistance Program" administered by the ASCS.

Loans are also available for conservation work through the U.S.D.A.'s Farmers Home Administration.

HINCKLEY, ILL., REVIEW: "We probably will make a few people unhappy, but we cannot see the government subsidizing culture, when the people do not want it. The director of the Kennedy Center has said that unless Congress provided funds to bail the center out of a financial mess, they would have to charge admission to the center. This, in our opinion, should be pretty low on the list of places for Congress to dole out our money. Perhaps they should charge for admission--and if it doesn't pay off, then maybe the 'good' arts should find a less grand location for the enrichment of our people."

MORRIS, MINN., TRIBUNE: "The presidential election is... months away and yet a number of distinguished senators are already running around the country in search of support for their presidential aspirations. If there is any semblance of truth in their rantings and ravings about the ills of the country, it would seem that the country would be better served if they went to work in their elected jobs in Congress and tried to solve some of the problems they talk about so freely."

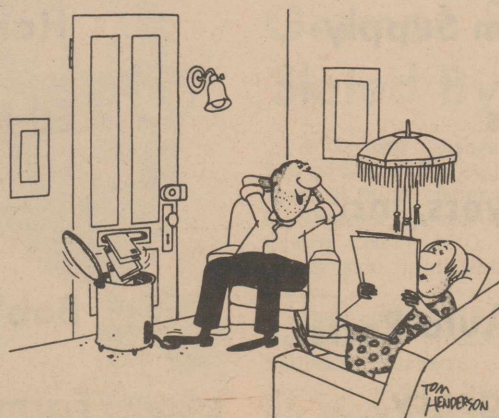

Soil Conservation

Wind Erosion

By TALMADGE PORTER

This type of soil destruction has been a factor in the consideration of soil conservation for many years. We seem to just take it for granted that we will have so much of it.

Most of us are familiar with techniques for preventing wind erosion, or at least methods used in an attempt to control it, but we need to be made aware of them from time to time. Of course if we can keep enough moisture in the soil there is little danger of wind erosion. Therefore in dry-land areas, minimum tillage practices should be performed in such a way as to leave a cloddy surface. If possible it should always be at right angles to the prevailing winds. Also in strip cropping, the strips should be perpendicular to the wind. Usually a vegetative cover of some kind is desirable. If you have grass, avoid heavy grazing until you have a good root

system established in the soil. Then you should use good pasture planning and management to keep grass healthy enough to provide the protection needed during the critical season.

Stubble mulching is a good practice against wind erosion also, and we should avoid the burning of stubble when it can be used for this purpose.
