NEW YORK, July 5.—The United States observed its safest and sanest Fourth of July in history this year, according to a check-up by the International News Service. Less than a score of persons were killed by fireworks, while the number of injured is not expected to total 200.

Rioting is Bad At New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS, July 5.—Comparative quiet reigned here today after a night of rioting and stoning of non-union workers, the biggest outbreak of violence since 1890 street car employees went out on strike early in the week.

A laborer was shot and seriously wounded when 520 union men attacked almost an equal number of strike breakers. Many shots were fired and several were injured. Automobiles carrying strike-breakers were stoned.

Tourists' Driving Rules for Safety

As a contribution towards greater safety and more pleasant driving conditions on the highways of the country this summer, the Ford Motor Company has listed twelve rules as suggestions to motorists and has distributed them to dealers over the country.

1. Courtesy comes first. Consider the rights and privileges of others.
 2. Keep your mind on your driving, and anticipate sudden emergencies.
 3. Learn the "feel" of having your car under control.
 4. Obey all traffic and parking regulations.
 5. Keep to the right, and comply with road markings and signs.
 6. Signal for stops and turns—watch the car ahead.
 7. Slow down at crossings, schools, dangerous places.
 8. Never pass cars on hills, curves, crossings.
 9. Adapt your driving to road conditions—rain, ice, soft spots and ruts.
 10. It doesn't pay to take the "right of way" too seriously.
 11. When you drive, remember the times when you're a pedestrian.
 12. Know the law. It was passed for your protection.
- "It is estimated that 20,000,000 persons will tour on American highways this summer," Mr. Harwell continued. "Recognition of the rights of others will be essential. Many unpleasant accidents will be avoided if motorists, at times of close situations, will recall these rules and act accordingly. They are the recommendations of the Ford Motor Company offered to give greater peace of mind to those who travel by automobile."

Old Couple Suicides In Each Other's Arms

Army Fliers Pass 162 Hours in Air

CLEVELAND AIRPORT, July 5.—Two hard-boiled ex-army sergeants, Byron K. Newcomb and Roy L. Mitchell, pressed on toward a new endurance flight record today, with victory just over the horizon. They had passed the 162-hour mark at 12:38 p. m. Eastern standard time, and if they can keep their big blue monoplane, "City of Cleveland" aloft until 12:10 a. m. tonight, they will establish a new record.

CLEVELAND AIRPORT, July 5.—Emerging triumphant from a night replete with discouragements which at times spelled almost certain failure for them, Pilots Byron K. Newcomb and Roy L. Mitchell in their monoplane "City of Cleveland" passed the 146-hour mark at 6:38 o'clock this morning, in their attempt to set a new world's endurance flight record.

At that hour Newcomb and Mitchell were only 16 hours and thirty seconds behind the record of Reg Robbins and Jim Kelly of Fort Worth.

CULVER CITY, Calif., July 5.—Determined to shatter the world's endurance refueling record, L. W. Mendell and R. B. Reinhardt continued to keep their plane in the air today.

At 7:30 o'clock this morning they had been in the air for 72 hours.

WEED KILLING DEMONSTRATION HELD HERE IS SUCCESS

A weed killing demonstration was conducted Friday morning on Judge C. H. Willingham's farm on the Paint Rock road. There were about fifty or sixty present at the demonstration and all were well pleased with the results.

These demonstrations are being conducted over the entire state, under the direction of Texas Farm Bureau representatives, Quincy A. Main, of Brownwood, and D. H. Cunningham, factory representative, were in charge of the work here.

The weed annihilation is done with a chemical preparation which is not harmful to livestock, and kills Johnson grass, Bermuda grass and all kinds of weeds. It is non-poisonous and does not sap any life from the soil.

Farmers are becoming interested in this new method and are making daily inquiries. Mr. Main said Friday.

death was due to a heart attack and high blood pressure.

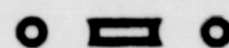
