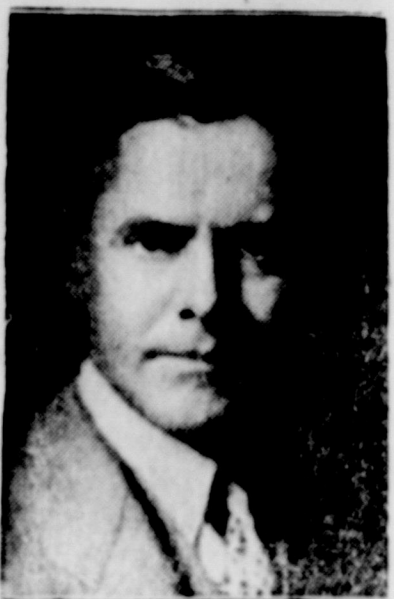
SENIORS TO GIVE PLAY

FOR CONGRESS



W. E. "BILL" LEA

Candidate for Congressman-at-large, Mr. Lea, an attorney and former mayor of Orange, Texas, has many friends in West Texas endorsing his campaign. He is an ex-service man, member of the American Legion and of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, is a Mason, a Shriner and Rotarian. He was appointed to serve on the U. S. Shipping Board in 1928.

W. E. "Bill" Lea Widely Supported In Congress Race

ORANGE, Texas, Apr. 28.—Calling for an immediate increase by \$29 per capita of money in circulation, as permitted by the Federal Reserve Act, reduction of federal salaries and a system of unemployment insurance, W. E. "Bill" Lea, attorney and former mayor of Orange, has announced his candidacy for Congressman-at-large.

His friends point out that the Democratic executive committee ruling that the candidates must signify the place they seek, permits West Texans to vote for Mr. Lea without interference with candidates from other sections. For example, three congressmen-at-large are to be elected; West Texans will vote for one man in this part of the State, one from the North-Central section, and it is hoped that they will make "Bill" Lea their choice from the East Texas place.

Mr. Lea was born in 1889, attended school at San Antonio; Blinn Memorial College, Brenham; Southwestern University, Georgetown; and graduated from Cumberland University Law School at Lebanon, Tenn. After leaving college he taught school at San Antonio and at Orange, and later engaged in rice farming. During the war he enlisted in the 8th Texas Infantry and served until January 1, 1919.

He was elected city commissioner of Orange in 1919 and was elected mayor of Orange in 1920. Since 1925 he has practiced law in Orange and has represented the deep water interests of the Sabine district, locally and in Washington, for the last 10 years.

He was president of the Texas Highway Association for two terms, and was president of the Texas League of Municipalities for one term.

Mr. Lea is a Mason, Shriner, a member of the Rotary Club, American Legion, and honorary member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. "The federal government already has the power, without the passage of additional laws, to immediately relieve in great measure the present depression," Mr. Lea asserted in his opening announcement. "I am in favor of the issuance of three and one-half billion dollars, permitted under the Federal Reserve Act, thereby increasing money in circulation about \$29 per capita."

"It is self evident that there should be greater economy in the operation of the government, and a consequent reduction in taxes. To accomplish this, all federal salaries should be reduced from the top to the bottom, as the cost of living has been reduced almost 50 per cent since the war. The salaries of private citizens go up and down. Those of the federal officials al-

Rail Commission Order Halt S. P. Train Service

An order was signed last Saturday by the State Railroad Commission against the Southern Pacific Lines discontinuing the Argonaut, passenger train between Orange and El Paso, the Texas boundary points touched by this service.

As per the new time table that has been issued by the railroad this train has been discontinued, combining it with the Sunset Limited. The new schedule is as follows: No. 1, Southern Pacific Limited, West bound, arrives here at 11:59 p. m. and departs at 12:10 a. m. No. 2, Southern Pacific Limited, East bound, arrives here at 5:50 a. m. and departs at 5:59 a. m. This schedule only gives Sanderson one train a day each way, and went into effect last Sunday.

A special train, one east and one west is being run through here each day for the present. These trains carry mail, express and baggage and have the following schedule: extra west arrives here at 10:50 a. m. departing at 11 a. m.; extra East arrives at 5:30 p. m. departing at 5:40 p. m.

All Texas Ranchmen Are To Benefit From Relief Loan

SAN ANGELO, Apr. 25.—The price of sheep is expected to rise \$1 a head in Southwest Texas as one result of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation's loan of \$1,500,000 to the Wool Growers Central Storage Company here.

The advance of this credit means that the company has placed that much paper with the corporation which may renew the loan at the end of the six months period, with the payment of the interest and some of the principal through the sale of the customers of the company of wool, mohair and lambs.

In the current three-year decline of prices on wool, mohair and lambs, through which the company operated, had called for their loans. The payment of these loans all at once would have thrown the sheep and goat industries of the Southwest into a demoralized condition.

U. S. Credit to Rescue

The Reconstruction Corporation and the Federal Intermediate Credit banks came into the picture, releasing vast sums and the financial structure of the whole ranch country was saved.

The loan is really a long term obligation and, according to the act, may be renewed for a period of three to five years. No agricultural industry has operated on such an admirable credit system as the sheep and goat business of this section and with the breakdown of credit, the industry was apparently due for a serious period of illness. The warehouses, which had fathered the prosperity of this country, seemed likely to have their entire investment destroyed.

The arrival of this loan was a matter of great relief to the section at this time. With the wool marketing season in progress, and buyers reluctant to make offers that growers now would consider, it appeared that such prices might have to be taken.

To Help Every Sheepman

Selling at such prices would have meant a further loss in operation. There is no attempt to "bull" the market but to realize better prices and to start the long delayed recovery in the price of ranch commodities.

The loan of the Wool Growers will help every sheepman in the country and already it has been distributed among the ranchmen. Men who had slept fretfully, if at all, for weeks have had the strain relieved and granted a fair season feel that they are already to march

RAIL TRAFFIC IS HALTED BY DERAILMENT

S. P. Freight Leaves Track At Sabinal Sunday Noon

A wreck, which occurred about Sunday noon in the yards at Sabinal held up traffic for about nine hours. A locomotive and seven cars of a freight train were derailed.

The train, which was headed east, was traveling at a fair rate of speed when it struck an obstruction on the track. Of the cars which left the track, two were stock cars filled with sheep, 60 of which were killed. Three of the cars were refrigerator cars and two were empties. According to reports neither the locomotive nor any of the cars turned over after leaving the track. The sheep had been loaded at Spoford.

Following an investigation by Southern Pacific Officials and Sabinal police officers several Mexican youths of Sabinal confessed to placing obstructions on the track.

A wrecking crew from here left early Sunday afternoon to assist in clearing the track.

MISDIRECTED ENERGY

The arguments against the proposed Department of Education, as recommended by the National Advisory Committee appointed by President Hoover, upon the suggestion of Secretary Wilbur, to make a survey of the entire educational situation, generally revolve about the well worn and repeatedly used stock of phrases such as "bureaucracy," violation of state's rights," "Federal Control," "unconstitutional," etc. None of these rights have been placed in jeopardy by any of the bills for a Department of Education which have ever been presented in congress.

Such charges have been easily refuted, the claims shown to be groundless, whereupon the argument ceases and, taking its place, prophecy is introduced—foretelling what will happen damaging the country in the years to come. The same arguments were used and prophecies made against the Department of Agriculture, but the dire results foretold did not materialize and the Department of Agriculture is today ably fulfilling its destiny.

When the President's National Advisory Committee was appointed but few of the members were representatives of graded schools. They were mostly connected with universities, and perhaps the majority of them were originally opposed to the creation of a Department of Education, but when a thorough investigation was made and a complete survey of educational requirements ensued, most of those who formerly opposed came to the conclusion that a Department of Education was an absolute necessity.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Living at home in Childress county has been extended to include making your own mattresses. Shown the method by the home demonstration agent, farm women are busy making \$15 mattresses for an average cost of \$2. New cotton and the best grade of feather ticking are used.

Grocery bills of 4-H pantry demonstrators in Kaufman county have been running from 95 cents to \$2.25 per month the last winter. All year 'round gardens that supplied from 5 to 10 varieties of fresh vegetables helped.

Four-H club girls in Victoria county raised from 12 to 15 different varieties in their gardens the past winter. Sales of fresh vegetables more than paid the seed and other costs, leaving the vegetables used at home clear gain.

Helped by the county agent, 112 farmers in San Augustine county terraced 3100 acres of land in 1931. The commissioners' court furnished 12 levels to farmers who are trained to lay out terrace lines. One man cut the cost of construction from \$2.50 per acre, using teams, to 30 cents per acre using county road grading machinery.

Denton wheat and Notex oats, both products of the Denton Experiment Sub-Station, have out-yielded ordinary varieties in Dallas county in recent years by about 7 and 11 bushels respectively, the county agent says. A county pedigreed grain growing association has multiplied pure line wheat, oat and barley seed for distribution among Dallas county farmers for the last eight years.

F. G. Rogers of Spur is making American cheese as coached by the Dickens county home demonstration agent and is selling it to his grocer. He says it is a good way to dispose of surplus milk.

"When \$1 a week pays the grocery bill it isn't hard to sell enough eggs and butter, even at low prices to make the living," declares Mrs. John Eastman, 4-H pantry demonstrator in Mason County.

In Brazoria county the men who have been demonstrating the value of improved pastures claim that one acre of improved pasture is worth more than three of ordinary pasture. About 20,000 acres are reported by the county agent mowed to rid fields of weeds, and shade trees have been planted, drainage ditches dug, and better watering facilities added.

S. L. Stumberg, of San Antonio who has large ranching interests in Brewster County, was a business visitor in the city Wednesday. Mr. Stumberg came out Tuesday to look after his ranch interest in this section of the country. He was accompanied to town by his ranch foreman, George Thurman.

Texas Industrial Activities

While the cost is prohibitive, it is of future interest to the cotton-producing States that high grade gasoline can be manufactured from cottonseed. Subjecting the seed to a temperature of 900 degrees and to a pressure of 150 pounds per square inch produces a variety of products—gasoline, fuel oil, coke and thirteen different gases, some of them commercially valuable. Gasoline represents about 50 per cent of the recovery and alcohol is obtainable from certain of the gaseous results.

Abilene manufacturers are planning a Texas products week some time this spring and will invite manufacturers from other Texas towns and cities to join in the display booths. About thirty Abilene manufacturers have agreed to participate and Bart D. Beck of Universal Manufacturing Co., chairman, is hopeful of a representative showing from other Texas manufacturers.

Texas has eighty-nine operating petroleum refineries of which forty have facilities for cracking the oil at high temperatures and under high pressures. They have a daily refining capacity of 845,700 barrels of crude or almost one-fourth of the total capacity of the United States (3,665,830 barrels daily.) California ranks next to Texas, New Jersey is third and Oklahoma is fourth in refining capacities.

Shudde Manufacturing Co., Metal manufacturing, is a new company incorporated at Houston, which also is the site of the I. C. Sales Manufacturing Co., \$25,000 capital, which will manufacture ice cream vending machines.

S. E. Knowlton Creamery is starting construction on a \$40,000 creamery at San Antonio. The industrial department of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce is developing an interest in furniture manufacturing in Southwest Texas.

Additional machinery is being installed in the plant of the Denton Dairy Products Co. which will equip it for turning out from 2,000 to 3,000 pounds of cheese daily and provide a market for much additional milk from 20,000 to 30,000 pounds a day. The output has been contracted for in advance.

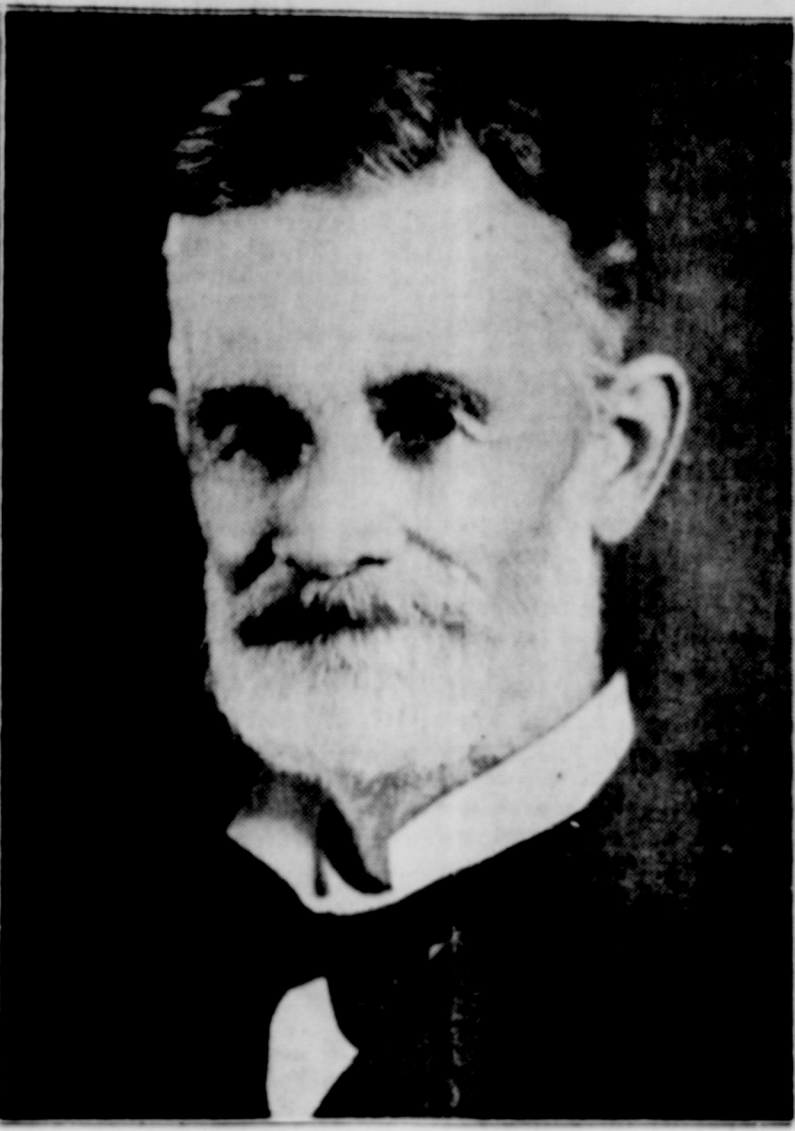

back to prosperity, around whatever corner it may be found.

Small banks of the Southwest and other wool houses are reported to have been relieved by this aid and men who live in distant canyons and come to town only three or four times a year have seen their life investment saved by the intervention of this timely loan.

Every sheep and goat man in Texas, and three are about 20,000 men who run either sheep or goats, has profited from the arrival of the loan.—Del Rio Evening News.

Historical Program Presented By Pupils

At nine o'clock last Thursday morning, April 21st, the pupils of the sixth grade presented a historical program which paid tribute to those seven hundred men, who on April 21st, almost a century ago displayed such daring intrepidity and courage in the Battle of San Jacinto and established the independence of the Lone Star Republic. ways go up. Never in the history of the country have any federal salaries been reduced.

"I believe that the government should discharge its debt to the ex-service men by paying the adjusted compensation certificates in full at this time. The government matures those certificates in 1945, why cannot they be paid when money in circulation is sorely needed, and when the government can find billions to loan industries so that bank notes may be met?"

"Every man has the right to work as he pleases so long as he observes the law, and I am against government by injunction in any form. Government by injunction is now operating against the State of Texas and against labor in all states.

"I think we need a system of unemployment insurance and that this can be worked out on the same basis as our present Workmen's Compensation Law.

"I believe in the protection and conservation of our natural resources, and feel that they should be safeguarded for the people and not for a few special interests. Proper regulations should be had in the case of the vast power interests and I believe that great wealth should be so decentralized by legislation that it will be impossible for the wealth of the nation to be in the hands of a small percentage of the people, permitting control of the many by a few.

"If elected, I propose to work for the people of Texas with all the intelligence and energy that is within me, and hope to assist in bringing those whom I represent out of the present period of depression."
